## 2020 census is coming

What you need to know

The federal government needs a way to figure out how to appropriate more than \$675 billion annually for programs that impact housing, education, transportation and other everyday facets of life.

The best way to do that: Count everyone, and see where they live.

That's why the government conducts a census every 10 years, and the next one is basically here already. (The 2020 census began in Alaska on Jan. 21.)

Beginning in mid-March, households will get invitations in the mail to take the survey, which can be completed online, by phone or by mail. This is the first time the census can be filled out online.

Every home will receive the invite by April 1, and respondents should fill out the survey according to where they lived on this day. (If you move on April 8, for example, and haven't yet

## Public safety initiative faces uncertain future

A public safety summit led by some Indianapolis City-County Council members and the Indianapolis Fraternal Order of Police was postponed and faces an uncertain future as councilors try to figure out what it should look like.

Republican councilor Brian Mowery, who was part of the group that announced the "citizen-driven public safety initiative" on Feb. 10, said in an interview the original idea was to host a series of meetings at different locations around Indianapolis.

The first one was supposed to be Feb. 17 at the Crowne Plaza near the airport.

"This is not a Democrat or a Republican issue," Mowery, who represents southern District 25, said at the Feb. 10 press conference.

But it appears to be heading that direction.

Mowery said he got the impression that council President Vop Osili and councilor Maggie Lewis, both Democrats, were interested in being involved with the group, but said he later heard from Osili that he and Lewis

didn't want to be associated with the group.


Osili was not available for comment, but Brandon Hergert, policy director for the council, said Osili and Lewis told Mowery they were "happy to think through how to address issues together" but weren't comfortable being involved with the group because they felt there weren't enough details.

Multiple attempts to reach Lewis were not successful.

"To be quite frank with you, I'm not quite sure what's changed, what's going on," Mowery said. "It's disappointing, but I'm still hoping they'll help where they can."

Even Mowery isn't positive what the group will look like going forward. While he wanted a series of meetings, Mowery said he heard from Democrats who wanted it to

filled out the census, you would fill it out as though you hadn’t moved.)

Census-takers, also called enumerators, will knock on doors from May to June to remind people who haven’t responded.

### WHY IS THE CENSUS IMPORTANT?

Not filling out the census means missing out on money. A study from John Washington University found that each person who doesn’t fill out the census costs their community about \$972 annually

Multiply that by 10 years, until the next census, and that means missing out on almost \$10,000 per person.

Rain Wilson, director of the Performing Arts Academy at Indiana Black Expo, said organizations committed to social justice can be negatively impacted when Black and brown people are undercounted in the census.

“Getting these numbers right affects money,” she said. “We need to let the money folks know we are here and have needs.”

Other than the hundreds of billions of dollars that the government needs to hand out for various programs, numbers from the census also determine how many congressional seats each state gets and how districts should be drawn.

The most representatives Indiana had was 13 from 1873 to 1933. The state had 10 representatives until the 2000 census, when it was reduced to the current nine.

### WHAT QUESTIONS ARE (AND AREN’T) ON THE CENSUS?

There’s a section on the census for each person living in the home and asks about their age, sex, race, Hispanic origin and relationship to the head of the household.

The census does not ask about religion, income, education, employment or other more personal questions. (The U.S. Census Bureau compiles that data from the annual American Community Survey, which samples a limited number of people.)

The census also does not include a question about citizenship. U.S. Secretary of Commerce Wilbur Ross announced in 2018 the census would include a citizenship question, which many said would discourage Hispanic communities from filling out the census and result in undercounting.

The U.S. Census Bureau announced in 2019 it would remove that question.

### WHAT HAPPENS TO THE DATA?

Title 13 of the U.S. Code prevents the U.S. Census Bureau from releasing any identifiable information about individuals, households or businesses, even to law enforcement.

All staff take a lifetime oath to protect personal information, and any violation comes with a penalty of up to \$250,000 and/or up to five years in prison.

To support historical research, the U.S. Code does allow the National Archives and Records Administration to release census records after 72 years.

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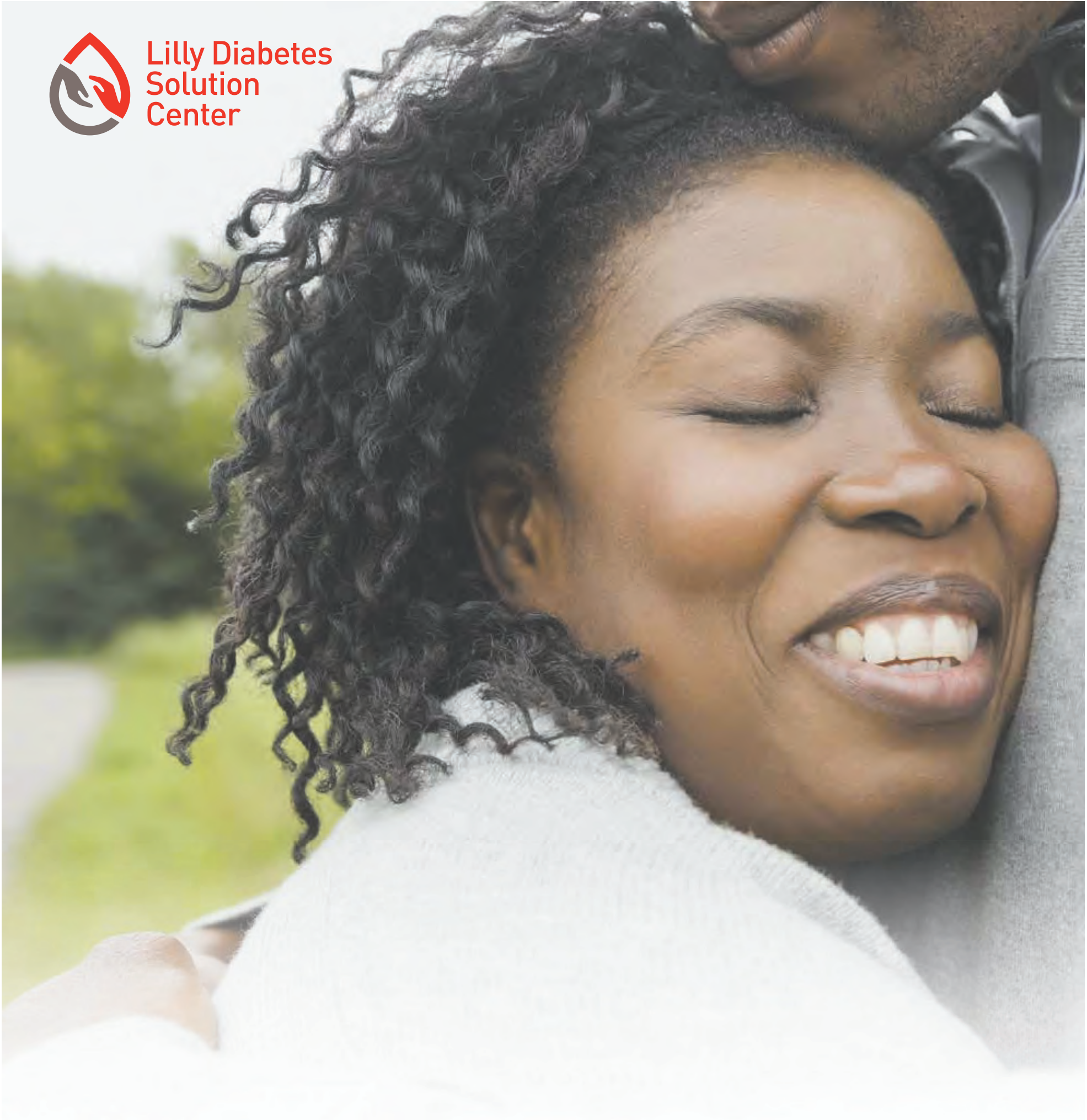
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## Film tour focuses on integration, Black excellence

When Robert Cotton moved to Valparaiso in 1969, his family was the first Black family to ever live in the town. At 11 years old, Cotton was aware of the dichotomy of the town; some residents met his family with vitriol, others with love and support. Coming of age in a predominately white town in the middle of national turmoil shaped Cotton into the man he is today — a two-term city councilman who has called Valparaiso home for more than 50 years.

Cotton's story and more will be showcased at the INseperable Film Tour, hosted by Indiana Humanities on Feb. 26 at the Indianapolis Arts Center. According to a press release, Indiana Humanities aims to "bridge the divide between urban, suburban and rural communities." To do so, the film tour will consist of five short documentaries that explore urban and rural identities.

When filmmaker Pat Wisniewski heard about the story of the Cotton family, she knew she wanted to share it through a documentary. "From Sundown to Sunrise" was born.

"Growing up in Chicago, I always realized that there was a lot that divided us ... and it always bothered me," Wisniewski said. "When I saw this story, I thought it was fascinating that people crossed those lines that were set by people them-

selves, and they changed the trajectory of the town."

If you ask Cotton, however, the film isn't about his family. It's about Valparaiso, and by extension, America.

"It's not about us or me," Cotton said, "It's about Valparaiso. ... It's about people coming together and being neighbors, good neighbors."

Both Cotton and Wisniewski agree that this message has a deeper message in today's political climate.

"This film is perfect for today," Wisniewski said. "It kind of tells us that we have to stop the perpetual dysfunction of dividing each other by race and cross those lines to see the humanity in one another. I think it could be a gift to America. We've made headway, but as a country, we still live segregated in so many ways."

Another film featured in the tour will be "Larry from Gary," focused on Larry Brewer, a dance teacher at Emerson School for the Visual and Performing Arts.

Filmmaker Dan Rybicky, an associate professor of cinema and television arts at Columbia College, learned of Brewer after seeing a performance from Brewer's students. Rybicky was inspired by Brewer's dedication to his students and wanted to highlight what Brewer gave to the Gary community, and the power of the arts.

"I hope my documentary shows the way in which art drives the human spirit, while still humanizing the challenges that face art education, especially in cities like Gary," Rybicky said. "... This is also meant to be a celebration of what is happening in communities of color, and to celebrate the beauty and talent in Gary."

#GospelChallenge teaches music, history

Gospel music is a tenant of Bishop Leonard Scott's life, both as a man of faith and as the founder of one of the oldest gospel labels in the country. Now, Scott wants to bring traditional gospel songs to a younger generation through the Gospel Challenge.

The Challenge is sponsored by Rock Community Church, where Scott pastors. School and church choirs can apply for the competition and share videos of their group performing traditional hymns and gospel songs. Judged on the talent and passion of the performance, the winning group will receive \$1,000 to expand the program, as well as a professional recording session at Tyscot Music and Entertainment, Scott's label.

While trying to figure out ways to keep hymns and traditional gospel music known, Scott said it became clear that getting students learning and performing these songs was the best way to reintroduce the classics to a younger generation.

"The idea stemmed from a Maya Angelou quote about 'if you don't know where you came from, you can't know where you're going,'" Scott, 70,

said. "Music is a powerful tool, and gospel music has a positive impact. What you fill your temple with, you fill your mind with, and that's what you become."

Groups will have multiple chances to apply for the scholarship. According to Valerie Jones, publicist for Bishop Leonard Scott Ministries, there will be five "Challenge periods" that will last for five weeks at a time throughout the school year. The first winner of the challenge will record at Caring Place Church on May 19.

"I just hope that the challenge will get more people interested in some of the songs of our heritage," Scott said. "And I hope they'll start including the songs in their lives, because gospel is so powerful. It gets you through what you're going through."

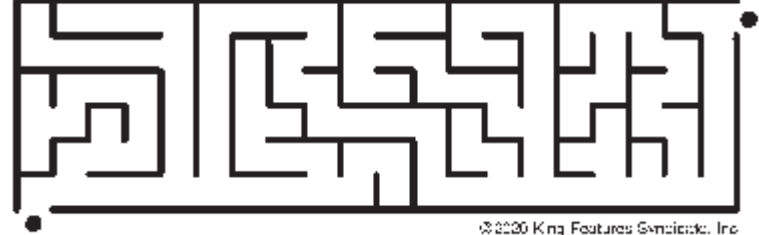

The integration myth

Integration destroyed the Black community. That’s a strong statement, I know. I often receive quizical looks when I say these words to people. In the words of Sheryll Cashin in “The Failures of Integration,” I am integration weary. For many, integration is synonymous with equality and the Civil Rights Movement that started with Brown v. Board of Education in 1954. We know segregation in the form of separate but equal didn’t work. That decision set the course for the fight for equal access to education, housing, banks, employment, etc. Since segregation didn’t work, the answer must be on the opposite end of the spectrum. Integration must be the answer — or so those who worked so hard for us to have equality thought. There were just a few flaws in the

equation. Equality doesn’t equal equity. (Enough E’s in there?) We missed the mark in the fight for equality. We should’ve been fighting for equity. The difference? Equality promotes fairness and treating people the same. That’s the abstract ideal we’re striving toward, right? It’s the ideal we pretend we’ve accomplished. However, you must have equity, which is giving everyone what they need to be successful, before you can reach equality. This is where disparity comes in. African Americans didn’t start on a level playing field, so all of a sudden seeing us as equal doesn’t work. We’re going to race each other, but if I give myself a 200-meter head start in a 400-meter dash, it’s likely it will be very difficult for you to catch up to me let alone win. So, it’s difficult to imagine that 66 years after Brown, we’d catch up. Often we speak about equality when we really mean equity. We thought integration would mean acceptance, and we would no longer have to worry about receiving less

funding for our schools, being ignored by our local government, hospitals not serving us, banks not providing home loans, etc. We thought we could move out of our neighborhoods into the nice, i.e. white, neighborhoods and we’d be accepted. What we’ve realized is that integration may have made many actions illegal, but it didn’t change people’s minds. White supremacy still exists and permeates every facet of our culture. What Dr. King and others who fought for our civil rights didn’t realize is that while we made some tremendous gains, we had some tremendous losses as well. We lost our neighborhoods. We lost our sense of community. We lost our businesses. We lost our doctors. We lost our dentists. When segregation forced us to stay in the same neighborhood, we relied on each other because we had to. We created our own cities within a city because we had to. We started Black-owned businesses because we had to. No one had to beg, plead and encourage us to buy Black because we didn’t

have a choice. When we moved into the nice (white) neighborhoods, we left our neighborhoods to crumble. How many businesses shuttered their doors? How many doctors or dentists, lawyers, etc. had to close their practices because they no longer had patients? When those with the means to move left, they left behind those who couldn’t afford to do the same. That meant they may not have been able to afford maintenance, and the handyman who gave a discount or accepted a home cooked meal as payment moved. The tax base shrank, which led to a cut in municipal services. All of these things work together. The sad part is, as we started moving toward the nice neighborhoods, white flight to the suburbs began. Now, we’ve followed white flight to the suburbs, and white people continue to move farther away. Still, we chase them into nice neighborhoods, all the while destroying our own, not realizing we had nice neighborhoods all along.

Will Black folks buy what Bloomberg is selling?

Michael Bloomberg’s entry into the presidential track meet has been stunning. Unlike other late entrant Deval Patrick, the Black former Massachusetts governor, Bloomberg’s decision to run has upended the race. The former mayor of New York City has God-only-knows how many billions of dollars, and he’s not reluctant to spend them in his bid to displace Donald Trump. (He is reported to have unloaded more than \$400 million on political ads.) Bloomberg is uber wealthy, uber brash and uber serious about buying the Democratic Party’s nomination — or at least renting it. Unfortunately, Bloomberg has tons of baggage regarding racism and sexism that would have disqualified presidential aspirants in recent years. Bloomberg is addressing damning allegations from several women, including that he has repeatedly made sexually-charged comments over the years. Then there is the issue of race, especially in regards to the negative effect Bloomberg’s “stop-and-frisk” policy

had on New York’s Black and brown population. The number of stops that police made was *literally* greater than the total population of Black young men in the city. Bloomberg has been recorded making stereotypical (and inaccurate) comments about the relationship between crime and race. Nonetheless, a recent Quinnipiac poll placed Bloomberg’s approval rating among Black folks at second only to Joe Biden (whose campaign is flailing). Does that seem strange? It shouldn’t. As has been the case in scores of elections, African Americans might be left with the choice of voting for a rich and/or powerful white man who has seemed to repent of his racial sins, versus voting for a rich and/or powerful white man who has *not* repented. In the same way that people of Hispanic heritage are not solely focused on racist immigration policies, African Americans are willing to overlook certain racist actions if we believe there *might* be a chance of a better future for us and our children. The fact is Black folks have pretty much always chosen not only between the “lesser of two evils,” but also between the “lesser of two racists.” Understandably, not all Blacks folks are convinced. As New York Times columnist Charles Blow noted, even the NYPD criticized Bloomberg for

stop-and-frisk. Other Democratic presidential candidates have been harmed more by allegations of racial insensitivity. I have been critical of Pete Buttigieg because of the racial challenges that he exacerbated as mayor of South Bend. Bloomberg’s record is arguably *worse* than Buttigieg’s. However, there is a key difference between Bloomberg and Buttigieg: Bloomberg decided to repent. He did so belatedly; he may have done so *insincerely*. But repent he did. Mayor Sylvester Turner of Houston, who is Black, put it this way: “You don’t judge people by the mistakes they have made. You judge them by their ability to fess up.” Turner has endorsed Bloomberg. By contrast, for all his Midwestern charm and school-boy earnestness, Buttigieg’s refusal to own *his* blemished racial record speaks to an arrogance that is reflected in his demeanor and trademark smirk-as-smile. Whereas Donald Trump openly disparages the idea that he has ever made a mistake, Buttigieg apparently believes that people aren’t bright enough to notice his deflections when asked about his tenure in South Bend. In the end, whatever Bloomberg’s faults, he will never be applauded by people like David Duke and Richard

Spencer, white supremacists who embrace Donald Trump. That’s not simply because Bloomberg was born Jewish. Despite his prior racist statements and policies, the fact is that Bloomberg does not appear to be inherently contemptuous of African Americans. Last, but certainly not least, there is the question of whether Bloomberg would do anything to close the ever-increasing financial gap between the “haves” and the “have-nots” (and “have-too-littles,” to borrow a phrase from Dr. Cornel West). Bloomberg is one of the billionaires who has signed the so-called “Giving Pledge,” which commits the obscenely wealthy to give away at least half of their fortune. He has also pledged to increase Black job prospects and homeownership if elected. Of course, even if he is being honest about all of that, it still amounts to tinkering around the edges of systemic economic inequality. The former slogan of the New York Lottery was, “Hey, you never know.” The idea is that one should take a chance because of the potential reward. Much the same could be said about Bloomberg’s candidacy. After all, what the hell do we have to lose?

The census seeks to count each and every individual residing in the U.S. Each household will receive a form so that everyone (relatives and non-relatives) residing in that particular home are counted. Completing the census is our civic duty. The census is very important for a few reasons. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, there are three major reasons that being counted is important. The

information from the 2020 census will be used to:

- Ensure public services and funding for schools, hospitals and fire departments in the amount of \$675 billion annually.
- Plan new homes and businesses and improve neighborhoods.
- Determine how many seats your state is allocated in the House of Representatives and inform the redrawing of congressional district boundaries.

By federal law, “individual responses to the census are confidential for 72 years and cannot be shared with anyone, including law enforcement, immigration, tax agencies or even the President of the United States.” All of those categories affect everyone who lives in the U.S., citizens or non-citizens. Congressional representation is critical in order to create legislation that will improve our country. 2020 will be the first year that the census can be completed via computer or smartphone. Households will receive an invitation in the mail to respond online to the census. Some will also receive a paper questionnaire. There will still be census-takers who will go door to door to reach people who haven’t responded via paper or online. Staff members at your local public library will be prepared to assist you with completing your census online, if needed. As a genealogist, census records are vitally important in researching family history. Completing the census query this year will allow your descendants in 72 years to learn where you lived and who lived with you in 2020. Finding your ancestors in the census records is an exhilarating experience.

1870 was the first census that counted people by name who had formerly been enslaved. In the 1870 Louisiana census, St. Marys’ Parish, Rebecca Curtis and James Curtis are living together in the same home with Levi, Willie (female) and James. The census record indicates that Rebecca and James were born in Virginia. The record indicates the younger members were born in Louisiana. All members of the house are shown as farm laborers, except for Rebecca, where it indicates “keeping house.” The information in the census record confirmed oral history that had been shared with me by the elders in my family during the many family reunions that I was blessed to attend. A census record is a snapshot in time. Don’t miss out on taking a picture of the people residing in your home. In Jemele Hill’s podcast, “Unbothered,” she recently spoke with Angela Rye and the topic of the census came up. Rye mentioned #DontBeThatAncestor. Rye encouraged everyone to answer the census. Enable your descendants to find where you were living in 2020. I encourage you to learn about the census by going to 2020census.gov or countmeindy.com. Follow the instructions on the questionnaire when it is sent to your home. Make your household count; ensure that your and our community are fully accounted for. Talk to your friends and family about the importance of completing the census. Completing the census is one way that you can exercise your power and help to preserve your family’s history.

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# IBE outlines plans to celebrate 50th anniversary

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Indiana Black Expo will host a series of events through summer to celebrate the statewide organization’s 50th anniversary, culminating with the 10-day Summer Celebration in July.

Summer Celebration, which lasts July 9-19, of course includes the free concert July 17. This year’s lineup features Keith Sweat, Stephanie Mills, Johnny Gill and El DeBarge. The concert will be at American Legion Mall.

A second free concert July 18 at the Indiana Convention Center will feature national recording artist Raheem DeV Vaughn and an R&B artist to be announced later.

Summer Celebration also includes a film festival, business conference, employment opportunity fair and more. IBE is adding a track for middle and high school students this year, as well as millennial-age adults, who are emerging leaders. They’ll take part in business workshops, financial literacy, an educational summit and more.

Instead of the usual paid concert at Bankers Life

Fieldhouse, which will be under renovation in the summer, IBE will host a gala July 18 in the Sagamore Ballroom at the Indiana Convention Center.

IBE will host 50 Fest on June 13 at its headquarters, 601 N. Shortridge Road. The event will include a naming ceremony to name the building the Rev. Charles Williams Center.

Rev. Williams was president of IBE from 1983 to 2004 and is celebrated as the person responsible for resurrecting and expanding the organization.

50 Fest will also feature a free concert, amateur boxing and vendors, as well as a chance for com-

Mckinzie said IBE is partnering with experts on an “extensive landscape study” to help answer questions such as whether the organization’s current purpose reflects future aspirations and if services and programs are aligned with the needs of the state’s African American youth and families.

She said the results will be made public “early” in the fourth quarter of this year, which begins in October.

IBE began its 50th anniversary celebration in January by honoring volunteers. The statewide conference for chapter members is April 17-18.

be a one-time event.

Democratic councilor Dan Boots, who spoke at the press conference, said in a text message he was under the impression that the initiative was a “single event, from which attendees would take away preferred practices back to their respective organizations and neighborhoods to implement.”

He said anything including a series of meetings wouldn’t be different from a commission, which Democrats on the Public Safety and Criminal Justice Committee recently rejected when Mowery and other Republicans tried creating a commission that would have studied violence and its disparate impact on African Americans.

Boots said he and caucus leadership would be “happy to collaborate” on a one-time event under three conditions: developing a format for the event, having an understanding of the goals, and having a plan to engage organizations and speakers to represent those most impacted by violent crime.

At the press conference, Boots said he was “broadly supportive of any proposal to gather input from the community.”

Mowery said he would still “optimistically” like to make an announcement early next week about plans for the initiative going forward.

But Democratic councilor Leroy

Robinson, who chairs the Public Safety and Criminal Justice Committee, was supportive of the initiative in an interview before the postponement and said he still stands by that support.

“Anytime that elected officials can rally around issues that are important to our city, that’s always a good thing,” he said. “There’s no qualms with leaders, elected officials, community members rallying around issues that are important to the community. Thumbs up from me.”

Robinson has since laid out public safety plans that could take effect over the next year, including policy changes, proposals before the council and better communication with the community.

The Feb. 17 meeting would have taken place following a violent weekend in Marion County, with four killed in Indianapolis and one in Beech Grove.

Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department investigated 31 criminal homicides as of Feb. 17, including a quadruple murder Feb. 5. The department investigated 16 criminal homicides by the same time last year.

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traffic stop on the evening of Aug. 2, 2019, special prosecutors announced in their final report.

The officers “were faced with an armed subject and an actual deadly force threat,” according to the report, and have no criminal liability.

According to the report, released by special prosecutors Mark Hollingsworth and Daniel Carnes, officers attempted to have Downing, a passenger in the van, exit the vehicle after he gave false identification information.

Torres attempted to open the passenger door, but Downing did not comply, according to the report.

Officer Jereme Morris told Downing to “stop reaching,” after which a “brief struggle” ensued.

Downing then grabbed a handgun and pointed it at the officers. Torres and Lorah shot Downing, who, according to the report, then threw the gun out of the van.

“Officer Torres and Officer Lorah did not see Downing discard the handgun,” the report reads, “and were under the belief that Downing still had the gun in his possession during the entire time shots were fired. Officers continued to command Downing to display his hands and Downing did not comply.”

IMPD initially said officers found a gun under Downing’s body.

Back-up officers arrived and pulled Downing from the vehicle after he tried getting to the driver’s side (the driver, identified as T.D., got out of the van and laid on the ground when officers started shooting).

Downing was handcuffed, according to the report, and emergency medical personnel attempted life-saving measures, but Downing was pronounced dead on the scene.

The report does not say how long after Downing was shot that medical personnel arrived.

A statement from IMPD said the officers’ actions will be “rigorously reviewed for compliance with both state and departmental policies.” The officers will remain on administrative leave while an internal investigation continues. The statement also said the prosecutors’ report will be reviewed, and a Firearms Review Board will meet in the “near future” to determine if the officers’ actions were in compliance with department policies and training.

fidavit, the murders occurred when the group attempted to rob Roberts’ apartment on the 4100 block of Shady Oak Drive.

Initial hearings for the four defendants are scheduled for 1 p.m. Feb. 20 in Criminal Court 3.

Mayor Joe Hogsett released a statement applauding Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department for “quick action and thoughtful investigatory work.”

“While nothing can bring back the four young people whose lives were cut much too short by senseless violence,” he said, “these charges serve as a meaningful step toward delivering justice to the impacted families.”



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NTT IndyCar Series is Penske’s biggest challenge

Like most open-wheel racing enthusiasts, I was pleased when the Hulman George family elected to sell the Indianapolis Motor Speedway (IMS) to the most powerful man in motor sports. After all, the Indianapolis 500 has been Roger Penske’s personal playground for decades, and his dominance as a team owner will never be matched. With his vast business acumen and virtually unlimited personal financial resources at his disposal, 16th Street and Georgetown Road could not be in better hands and is positioned for future success.

Just last Friday, he announced an aggressive (and overdue) plan to invest in the facilities at IMS and, just for good measure, also disclosed the purse for the upcoming 500 would be fattened by some \$2 million. All this will occur before the track welcomes fans in May at IMS, and it’s a great start to his ownership of what many like yours truly still believe is the greatest race course on earth. Along with his purchase of the famed oval, Penske also agreed to purchase

The car count for the series is always up in the air, and whatever he can quickly do to help those he once obliterated as a competitor is sorely needed. Translation: There are a lot of warts that came with the acquisition of the series, and while it may have been a package deal, the fact remains the challenges in fortifying the series are daunting. From placating engine manufacturers, to obtaining more money from his television partners and developing a plan to resuscitate the Indy Lights Series and the Brickyard 400, this man has a lot on his plate, so be patient. While he is the most dynamic figure in motor sports, he’s not a miracle worker, so temper your expectations, and enjoy the ride. It will no doubt be interesting, and I for one am betting on Penske to prevail in what is clearly the biggest challenge in his professional career, and you should too. Taking time to prepare for the Easter season

Plenty of people observe the Easter season by reading their Bible more than usual, making sure to get to church on the important days and of course giving up something from their normal routine for Lent.

It's a solemn time in the liturgical calendar, as Christians across the country and around the world consider the sacrifice made by their savior Jesus Christ, who was tempted by the devil, brutally beaten by Roman soldiers and nailed to a wooden cross. It's during the praying beforehand when she figures out what she's going to give up, though Stallworth said she hasn't yet decided what she'll give up this year. Taking time to prepare for the season isn't very common, Stallworth said, but thinks it's a good idea because it "prepares you mentally." Kelly Birdsong-Hill said it's important to prepare for the season because a lot of people who observe Lent end up deviating in some way from the life they live the rest of the year, whether it's giving up a certain food or not using social media. As someone who gives up a certain food for Lent, Birdsong-Hill, 55, said she's constantly reminding herself that "you eat to live, you don't live to eat." The historic Pan African pursuit of dignity and the vote

*"First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people, for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life, godly and dignified in every way."* — 1 Timothy 2:1-2

One hundred years after President Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation that freed African peoples from the horror of chattel slavery in the United States, Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King stated the following on Aug. 28, 1963:

“Let us not seek to satisfy our thirst for freedom by drinking from the cup of bitterness and hatred. We must forever conduct our struggle on the high plane of dignity and discipline ... We cannot be satisfied as long as the Negro in Mississippi cannot vote and the Negro in New York believes he has nothing for which to vote.”

Dr. King echoed the words of St. Paul, the missionary, to his younger mentee, Timothy, in I Timothy 2:1-2. Like Timothy, Dr. King was a mentee of moral leadership during his time.

People like Rev. Dr. Howard Thurman, a mystic and scholar, and the Rev. Dr. Benjamin Mays, the past president of Morehouse College and a global Christian leader, come to mind. Ms. Ella Baker was also an important organizing and young adult strategist who worked with King.

Dr. King, St. Paul and Timothy the Apostle cared deeply about the acts of supplications, prayers, and intercessions for the people and those in leadership. Each shared a vision of a peaceful, godly and dignified life of the people shepherded by such leadership that would foster these spiritual virtues. They took risks that illustrated their commitment to this. But perhaps it was their unjust imprisonments that most dramatically displayed this — or, in the case of St. Paul and Dr. King, their martyrdom.

The history of African peoples inside and outside the United States bears witness to similar sacrifices made by African peoples to obtain their emancipated freedoms in 1863 and 1865 — religious liberty, citizenship and the right to vote and run for elected office. Still, these gains are challenged by economic and racial structures, policies and practices that fuel the disproportionate numbers of African peoples

affected by hunger and poverty. The historic and present stubborn barriers of voter suppression, the assault of reduced voter protections, and the lack of voter rights after imprisonment disproportionately affect the voting rights of people of African descent in the U.S. persist. Even in a post-President Obama presidency season, there are no viable presidential candidates from racial-ethnic groups not of European descent.

How are we to end hunger and poverty without electing leaders who address these indignities? Voting at every level, completing the census, and fair representation matter! I invite you to reflect further on these themes with

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## First impressions: What women notice about each other

According to a Forbes 2019 survey, there are specific factors that influence how women judge each other. You may be surprised to know what the most influential factors were in the survey. Regardless of the hours spent choosing new clothes, applying makeup and getting your hair just right, nine times out of 10, you will be judged negatively on these and other factors simply because it's the nature of women to judge each other. According to the Forbes research survey, the first thing your rivals look at when they size you up is your appearance, body image and how proportioned your weight is with your height. For the study, 2,000 women between the ages of 18 to 45 were questioned about how they formed first impressions of females.

Eight in 10 admitted they judged other women when they met them for the first time, although one in six claimed they didn't mean to.

While 54% said they first looked at the size of a woman's waist, 45% said they checked whether she wore too much makeup. Other areas women are judged include:

- Weight and body size
- Hair length, style and intense silent observation of whether it's real or fake
- Smile
- Skin, complexion and manicured nails
- Height and weight in proportion to height (body size)
- Noticeable hair roots (hair colors not matching up)
- Is the "fake" tan overdone
- Shoes
- Jewelry
- The man she's with (his looks, appearance, notoriety and is he well known)
- Whether or not she has straight white teeth

These factors are critical to our understanding of what contributes to this problem. This is your journey of self-awareness. We can't fix what we don't face, and facing it will help us to heal ourselves, which is where the problem is rooted. Early childhood beliefs and behaviors are a pivotal time in our lives when we observe and learn these behaviors from our mothers and other female role models. The goal is to develop relationships that are stronger, more collaborative, more authentically open and less constricted by cultural norms about gender. Girls and women can bond together for the joy these connections will bring and for the social good to which it can lead. My goal is to connect women in nurturing and loving ways — to promote positive changes for girls and women worldwide.

I encourage the women reading this column to have open conversations with your girlfriends, and each other, about your current relationships, especially when hurtful, angry or competitive feelings are involved. This is the catalyst for broaching a challenging issue and for facilitating increasingly honest discussion among women and girls. These columns will serve as a guide for parents and teachers. Also, mothers can help their daughters to think more critically about the societal messages bombarding teen girls regarding how they should think, feel and behave. It will also help them choose gender behaviors and beliefs more aligned with their true selves and decrease hatred and emotional disconnection from their female counterparts. They will learn how to manage their anger toward each other, and more importantly, get to the root of why the anger exists.

## Pattern magazine celebrates a decade of Indianapolis arts

When Indianapolis makeup artist Nikki Brown, 47, thinks about the creative community in the city, she can't imagine it would look the same without Pattern magazine.

Throughout its 10 years of existence, the magazine has been celebrating the creative community in Indianapolis by profiling artists and incorporating their work — from makeup to graphic design — in their publication. Pattern also hosts networking events to bring artists together and support their endeavors.

When founder Polina Osharov moved to Indianapolis from Chicago in 1999, she was surprised how quickly she fell in love with the city — specifically the arts scene.

"We have a really strong DIY (do-it-yourself) vibe that is rooted in 'let's roll up our sleeves and get it done' mentality," the Russia-native said. "Our market and our community is smaller than they tend to be in larger markets, and I think we have a greater sense of community here."

This sense of community inspired Osharov in 2010 to start Pattern, a publication that offers local artists the chance to share their work. Included in its wide range of collaborators, the magazine works with many Black artists from around the city, including Brown.

"Pattern is something that everyone really needs," Brown said. "It's a really important magazine to be a part of. ... It supports entrepreneurs and artists and showcases and promotes their talent."

For the first time in 10 years, Osharov said, Pattern will be able to afford collaborators for their work.

"Up to this point, it has been 100% volunteer based," Osharov said. "This year, we're starting to pay contributors, so we're pretty excited about that."

It goes without saying that most enterprises wouldn't survive 10 years with people working for free. What makes Pattern different?

"Pattern is known for inclusivity," Brown said. "There's more [representation] than there is in other publications. I wanted to support what they were doing,

and whenever I'm available to help out, I will support anything that they are putting on, or any shooting they are doing."

Without Pattern, Brown doesn't believe local artists would have the opportunities they have in Indianapolis. However, both Brown and Osharov believe Indianapolis could benefit from a greater investment in the arts.

While many may not view the arts as an economic driver, arts and entertainment made up 4.2% of the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) — over \$736 billion going toward the national economy — in 2015, the last year that information was released. This, Osharov said, is evidence that investing in the arts could make a huge impact on the Indianapolis economy.

"We punch above our weight class with our creative talent as a city," she said. "My goal is to try and figure out a way to strengthen our local economy to attract businesses from outside the state, like ad agencies and film production, anything along those lines. ... Raising the visibility of our creative community can help bring companies to Indianapolis, and it will give a lot of local artists work."

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Damien Center expands food pantry's reach

After years of having a food  
pantry that served only those  
with HIV, staff at the Damien  
Center grew weary of turn-  
ing hungry people away. So,  
they recently expanded the  
nonprofit organization's food  
pantry to serve anyone in  
need.

Ashley Jackson, one of the  
leaders of the weekly pan-  
try — known as Community  
Tuesday — said turning away  
those without an HIV diag-  
nosis pushed workers and  
volunteers to address the  
growing need in the Holy  
Cross community.

“When you're able to bring  
yourself to ask for food, you  
really need it,” Jackson said  
of the stigma surrounding  
food insecurity. “We wanted  
to provide more for the com-  
munity.”

With help from Damien  
Center staff, volunteers and  
community partners, Com-  
munity Tuesday has been  
held biweekly since Jan. 7.  
So far, as many as 60 people  
have been served in one day.  
Jackson hopes this number,  
and the size of their allo-  
cated space, will increase with  
warmer weather.

Community Tuesday doesn't  
hand out pre-packed bags of  
groceries and toiletries, but  
offers individuals the chance  
to “shop” for items, as well as  
the opportunity to meet new  
people.

Before visitors begin to fill  
up their two grocery bags



with items such as tuna  
and apples, they can grab a  
sandwich provided by Second  
Helpings and eat together at  
one of the several tables set  
up on the second floor of the  
center.

This sense of community  
and belonging, volunteer Jef-  
frey Tuttle said, is what the  
Damien Center represents to  
clients, and now to the larger  
community.

Tuttle, who has been a client  
of the Damien Center since  
his AIDS diagnosis in 2001,  
was hired to work part time  
in the food pantry and helped  
develop Community Tues-  
days.

“The Damien Center is  
my family,” Tuttle said. “It's  
my community, my friends,  
and I'm saying that not as

a worker, but as a client.  
They're accepting of everyone,  
and it's so important to have  
community, brotherhood and  
smiles, and that's what the  
Damien Center provides. ...  
It's changed my life.”

The Damien Center, which  
offers testing and treatment  
for sexually transmitted infec-  
tions (STIs), still operates  
a food pantry just for those  
with HIV.

Jackson and Tuttle make  
sure the Community Tuesday  
pantry stays full and organize  
drop-offs for donated goods.  
Jackson said the biggest need  
for the pantry is toiletries,  
including toilet paper and de-  
odorant. As for grocery needs,  
anything high in protein,  
such as tuna or peanut butter,  
is always recommended.

As a line began moving  
in the Community Tuesday  
pantry recently, upbeat music  
filled the room and people  
began sitting down with their  
lunch, greeting one another.

“We don't want this to be a  
daunting experience,” Tuttle  
said. “We want it to be a com-  
munity experience.”

- Children under the age of 12 are not required to remove their shoes during screening.
- If you’re flying within the United States, children under the age of 18 traveling with an adult usually don’t need more identification than a boarding pass. However, some air-

lines may ask for a birth certificate for lap infants. Call ahead of time to see which documents you need.

- Your child will need a passport if flying internationally. Child passports must be renewed every five years until the age of 16.
- If your child is traveling internationally with only one parent, you may need to bring a notarized letter of consent from the child’s other parent or legal guardian.

## Research aims to solve racial disparities in Alzheimer's disease

African Americans are twice as likely to develop Alzheimer's disease than white Americans. The reasons why are unknown because the group is underrepresented in research.

An Indiana University researcher is looking to change that by studying Alzheimer's disease in underrepresented groups with LEAD — Longitudinal Early-Onset Disease Study.

Dr. Liana Apostolova of the IU School of Medicine has been studying early onset Alzheimer's — meaning symptoms of cognitive decline appear before the age of 65 — for two years as part of a five-year research grant. While research into this rare form of the disease is already limited, African American, Latino and Asian American representation in research does not reflect the general population of the United States.

"We need to increase minority populations in research and begin looking into ways to raise awareness in the community so they can come and find us," Apostolova said. "This is not a form of the disease where we can set up a health clinic, because it's a rare variant. We need to raise awareness."

Because of the lack of representation in research samples and a general lack of understanding of early onset Alzheimer's, which Apostolova said progresses rapidly and more aggressively than late onset Alzheimer's, it's unclear why African Americans are more likely to develop the disease.

However, doctors do know health issues such as diabetes and vascular disease can increase one's risk of developing Alzheimer's. According to the United States Department of Health and Human Services, African Americans are 60% more likely than white Americans to have diabetes, and 40% more likely to have high blood pressure, a key risk factor for vascular diseases.

Apostolova hopes to increase the number of minority patients that she studies to determine the risk factors for early onset Alzheimer's, as well as why certain demographics are more likely to develop the disease.

Laura Forbes, communications director for the Indiana chapter of the Alzheimer's Association, said the chapter has volunteers focusing on education and awareness in the Black community.

"We're working to spread awareness of the [medical] trials that are going on," Forbes said, "and dealing with some of the mistrust toward doctors that exists within the African American community."

Through her study, which is funded through the National Institute of Health, Apostolova and her team work with 600 cognitively impaired patients

and 100 cognitively normal patients between the ages of 40 to 64 to study genetic imaging, fluid biomarkers and collecting data on decline of cognitive abilities. Patients are studied for three years to monitor the progression and speed of decline.

While it is normal in middle-age to sometimes forget names of people or forget the reason for walking into a room, cognitive decline hinders one's ability to live independently, Apostolova said. With Alzheimer's — either early or late onset — patients can struggle with driving, paying bills, taking medication or keeping up with basic hygiene. Repeating the same information or asking the same questions multiple times are also red flags that someone's memory loss is related to a health issue, not just a normal part of aging.

"We're trying to raise awareness of early onset cases," Apostolova said, "because we hope if people listen or read about this research, they might recognize symptoms in someone in their family and bring them in."

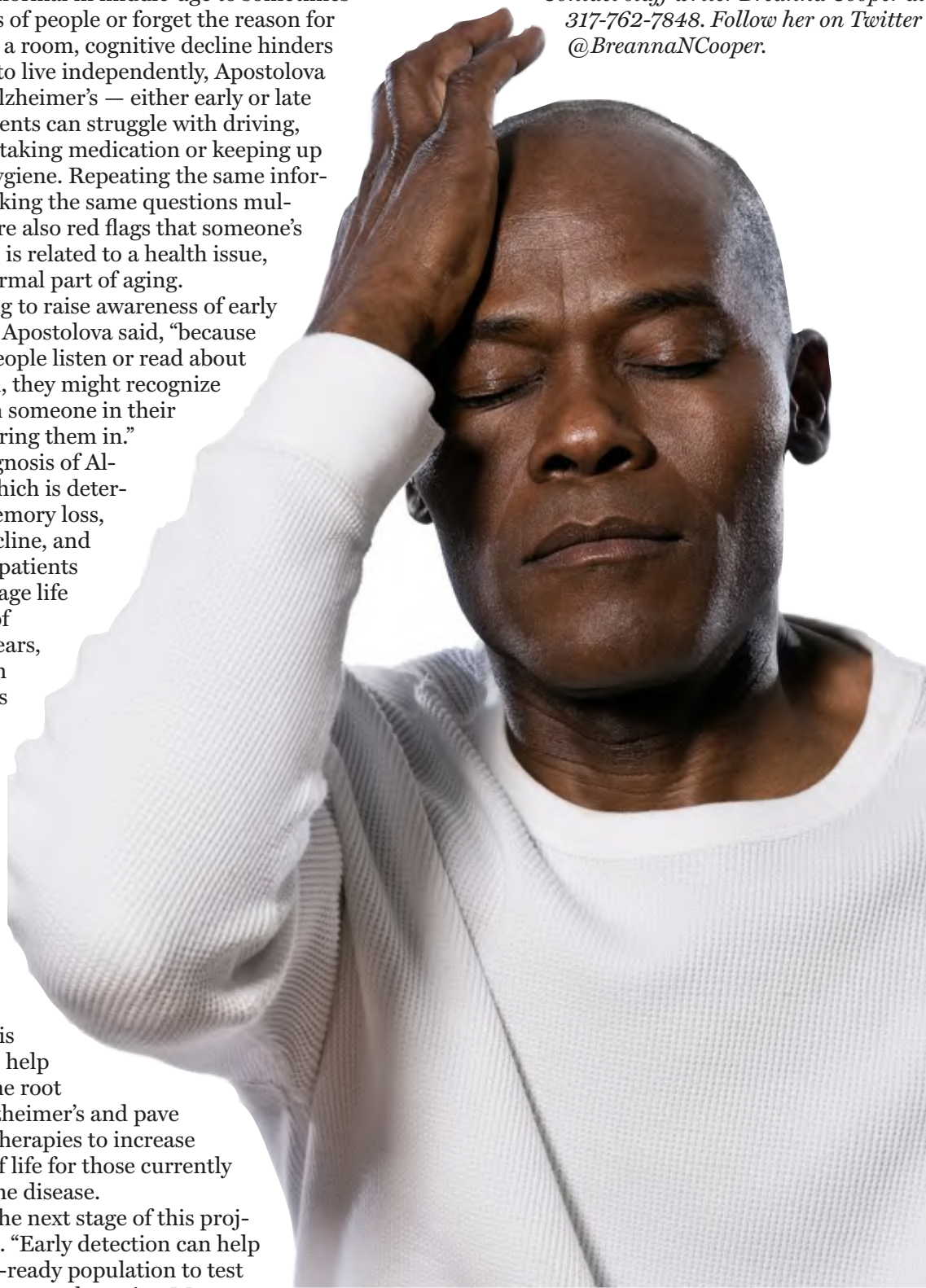
After a diagnosis of Alzheimer's, which is determined by memory loss, cognitive decline, and brain scans, patients have an average life expectancy of eight to 12 years, starting from the first signs of cognitive decline.

While Apostolova said it's difficult to determine how close researchers are to a cure for the disease, she hopes this research will help determine the root causes of Alzheimer's and pave the way for therapies to increase the quality of life for those currently living with the disease.

"Trials are the next stage of this project," she said. "Early detection can help create a trial-ready population to test out promising new therapies. Many

times with early onset patients, they are otherwise healthy, they're less likely to have diabetes and heart disease than older patients, so we can study the disease in a purer form, without the noise from other disorders."

## Prescription Pills Can Pose a Danger to Children

Each year an estimated 400,000 poison center calls and 50,000 ER visits are the result of young children ingesting medications belonging to an adult. A study in The Journal of Pediatrics finds that, in more than half of these cases, an adult had already removed the prescription medication from a child-resistant container.

The findings come from a study of calls to five U.S. poison control centers by researchers from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Emory University School of Medicine, and the Georgia Poison Center.

The current study found four common scenarios in which young children get into prescription pills after the pills are out of their original containers:

- Adults put pills into baggies or other small containers that are not child-resistant to carry with them away from home.
- Adults leave pills out on countertops or on a bedside table for someone to take later.
- Adults sometimes spill or drop pills and may miss some when picking them up.

Results found that, in most cases, the children got into their parents' pills. However, for some prescription medications that can be very harmful to young children in small amount, more than half belonged to grandparents.

CDC recommends keeping medications in the original child-resistant packaging. If pills must be removed from their original containers, a few precautions can help keep children safe:

- Keep purses, other bags, or pockets with medicines in them up and away from young children.
- If pills are spilled when taking or transferring medications, double-check to make sure that all pills are picked up.
- Have the poison help number on hand, (800) 222-1222, and call immediately if a child might have swallowed medicine or a vitamin.
