Douglass Park nearing 100 years old, needs new family center

Members of the Martindale-Brightwood community, along with officials from the city and parks department, recently discussed the history of Frederick Douglass Park and the possibility of building a new family center.

There isn't an exact price tag on a new family center, but it would likely cost at least \$15 million. Frankie Casel, president of the group Friends of Frederick Douglass Park, said \$15 million is a years-old estimate. She guessed the cost would be more like \$20 million now. The current family center is 65 years old.

Casel spoke as part of a panel that included four other people who are either longtime residents of the Martindale-Brightwood area or at least grew up using Frederick Douglass Park. The meeting, held Jan. 23 at Little Bethel Missionary Baptist Church, was part of an ongoing series of community events hosted by The City League, a

Minorities, women face substantial barriers in business, study finds

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Minority and woman-owned businesses are underutilized in city contracts, according to the 2019 City of Indianapolis Disparity Study, conducted by Colorado-based BBC Research and Consulting. The findings were no surprise to Antonio Lipscomb, president of Minority Contractors Collaboration. "I'm the only African American in the state who has a nationally accredited school through the National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER)," Lipscomb said. "Even with that being the case ... a lot of these contracts go to other people that may not be plugged into the city like I am. Even though I am a minority business with the state and the city, I have never been in a position where I could even be contacted about these contracts to work." The study was done to assess the effectiveness of the Minority-, Women-, Veteran-, and Disabled-Owned Business Enterprise (M/W/V/DOBE) Program. Mayor William Hudnut created the program in 1984 to enhance opportunities for M/W/V/DOBE businesses in city contracting. When it comes to minority participation in the city's con-

Organizations get grants to alleviate poverty

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A new United Way of Central Indiana (UWCI) fund will support organizations that want to implement more aggressive strategies in addressing poverty. The large nonprofit awarded \$750,000 to 14 organizations in the first round of the Social Innovation Fund, which is designed to inspire new ideas and programs when it comes to helping those who live in or near poverty. Dress for Success Indianapolis, an affiliate of the worldwide nonprofit, will use its grant to start a new mobile services unit to reach women who don't have reliable transportation to get to the downtown location. The organization received a \$55,000 grant, according to Shayla Pinner, director of marketing and development. That money will be used to purchase vans large enough to carry clothes and technology such as laptops. Other Dress for Success affiliates already have a similar transportation system, but Pinner said the Indianapolis staff — which consists of six full-time and two part-time employees — is too small to pull off that kind of expansion. "We've never had the capacity really to go out into the community," Pinner said. "It's been all hands on deck here." The organization will hire a mobile services coordinator to successfully implement the program. The job is posted at indydfs.org. "I think what's gonna happen is we will be able to serve a lot of women who would never think that they may might be able to be one of our clients," Pinner said. Flanner House will use its grant to extend its farming operation with a greenhouse that Executive Director Brandon Cosby said will have more than 15,000 square feet of growing space. "Our farming operation has been fairly successful, but that's really limited based off of weather," he said. "This will allow us to provide fresh produce options year-round." Flanner House will grow the food through a method called aeroponics, which uses fish waste as fertilizer and doesn't require soil. Cosby said locals from the community will be hired as part of the expansion, and the goal is for the newly acquired skills — he described aeroponics requiring "advanced skills" — to be transferrable to high-wage jobs.

When it comes to the work nonprofits do to try to alleviate poverty, the emphasis is usually on just making sure the bottom doesn't fall out. Families and individuals are in need right now, so reassurance that bigger change is on the way doesn't help them in the interim. But the projects UWCI is funding through its Social Innovation Fund are forward-looking. Alan Bacon, senior director of the fund,

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Yoon’s long road to the ballot

Since December 2019, Isaya Yoon, 34, has been collecting signatures to get her name on the ballot to run for governor as a Republican. Working outside in the cold has taken a toll on her voice, which now has a rasp and breaks in and out on occasion. But a sore throat isn’t the only thing bothering Yoon about the campaign process.

The lack of resources for outsiders looking to run for public office, as well as requiring independent candidates to get 45,000 signatures to get their name on the ballot as compared to 4,500 for party-affiliated candidates, is another roadblock for Yoon, who plans to run as an independent if she doesn’t get the necessary signatures by the Feb. 5 deadline.

Another roadblock was created by the 2019 failure of Senate Bill 571, which sought to make it easier for independent hopefuls to get on the ballot by removing the distinctions between third-party and major party candidates.

“I’m all in,” she said, “regardless of how this ends.”

Yoon, a business owner in Jeffersonville, said when she began looking into a run for office, she reached out to several prominent Republicans in the state, including Rep. Susan Brooks, to no avail. Yoon alleges that emails and calls for guidance went unanswered. The Brooks camp said Yoon never reached out to them.

The signature requirement for independent candidates is a huge disparity meant to keep Democrats and Republicans in control in state government, she said.

“Indiana has some of the most restrictive [campaign] laws in the country,” Yoon said. “We have to make the changes necessary to make it easier for independents to get on the ballot. The laws aren’t fair to candidates or voters.”

These disparities toward third-party candidates are what pushed Yoon to run as a Republican. A lifelong independent with self-described conservative leanings, Yoon believes in voting for your values, not for your party. And her values are what she hopes resonate with voters.

An opponent of abortion and an advocate for the Second Amendment, Yoon takes issue with the democratic socialist movement, and hopes to appeal to both Republicans and moderate Democrats and bridge the divide she sees in our state and country. Yoon also takes issue with Gov. Eric Holcomb’s administration, arguing he is dismissive of minority voters and is “bought out” by pharmaceutical companies, which influenced his opposition to legalized medicinal marijuana, which Yoon supports.

Gov. Holcomb’s team did not respond to a request for comment.

As a Black woman who supports President Donald Trump, Yoon was worried about how she would be

perceived.

“I wrote down the pros and cons of me running,” Yoon said. “Obviously, knowing that I voted for Trump and knowing that I support our president ... one negative was the possibility of Black Americans not liking me ... or disown[ing] me. Most people, though, have been so open and sweet to me.”

Among Yoon’s supporters is lifelong friend Rachel Jerrell. When Yoon reached out to tell her about wanting to run for governor, Jerrell agreed to help her collect signatures but didn’t agree to vote for her until they had conversations about her policy positions.

“I like that she won’t waiver on her pro-life stance,” Jerrell said. “... She is in touch with being a mom and having a family, and she’s passionate. She’s relatable, and she really wants to help people, it’s what drives her.”

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Paying for college

One of the biggest dilemmas families and individuals face when deciding to go to college is determining how to pay for it. With the cost of obtaining a college degree steadily rising, it is often difficult, if not insurmountable, to simply pay tuition, fees and other expenses out-of-pocket. Fortunately, higher education institutions can offer various forms of financial aid to students that help to make the cost of attendance more affordable.

Federal financial aid is administered by the U.S. Department of Education and can be awarded as grants, loans or a combination of both to students who wish to attend any institution in the United States that has been federally approved to participate in Federal Student Aid programs. Students do not have to reside in the state where the school is located in order to receive this form of funding either. Obtaining federal financial aid starts with completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), which can be accessed at www.fafsa.gov. This free application takes about 20 minutes to complete. FAFSA opens on Oct. 1 of the year prior to the academic year for which the student is applying, which means that the FAFSA for next year is open right now. Federal financial aid awards are need-based, meaning that award amounts are based on the student or family's income and ability to pay in relation to the cost of attendance for the schools they are choosing. While this is the most widely used means of financial aid, it was surprising to learn that many don't take advantage of the funding that is available to them. A recent study conducted by the National Center of Educational Statistics concluded that about 25% of those who are eligible for federal financial aid never apply, mostly due to believing their family may be ineligible or may not qualify for financial aid.

Financial aid from the state is similar to federal financial aid but is administered by a state governmental agency and can only be used at institu-

tions located in the state by college students who are also residents of that state. In our case, state financial aid funding is overseen by the Indiana Commission for Higher Education (CHE). Like federal financial, state-based financial aid in Indiana is also need-based. The CHE's two financial aid programs are the Frank O'Bannon Grant and the 21st Century Scholarship, Indiana's early promise program. Students must sign up for the 21st Century Scholarship while they are in middle school to be eligible for this funding when they attend college. Although every student who signs up for the 21st Century Scholars program is accepted, less than half of those who are eligible actually apply, essentially leaving free money on the table that could help pay for college.

Institutional aid can be scholarships or grants awarded by the institution from funds they collect through donations to the school. Institutional grants are typically need-based, while scholarships can be need-based or merit-based. As the name implies, merit-based scholarships are earned and based on a student's levels of achievement in areas such as academics, athletics, performing arts or other special disciplines. In both cases, applying for institutional aid may require completing a separate financial aid application.

Consequently, the prospect of paying for college can be daunting to consider. However, federal, state and institutional financial aid are readily available at most colleges and universities to help defray the expense. Students and their families must be vigilant in making sure that they are taking advantage of the funding that is available to them. In many cases, students do not receive financial aid because they simply do not apply. If you have questions or just don't know where to begin, start by contacting the college or university's Office of Financial Aid for help and information.

Schools need food for their students, and a lot is wasted

A recent study conducted by World Wildlife Fund (WWF) found Indianapolis schools are apparently doing better than others around the country when it comes to reducing food waste, but the numbers are still difficult to comprehend. The six local schools that participated in the 33-day study were on track to waste an average of 8,063 pounds of food and 3,968 milk cartons per year.

That's 17.9 pounds of food and 17.4 milk cartons per student.

The average for the study, which included 46 schools in eight states, was 39.2 pounds of food wasted per student.

"It's just shameful to watch food go into a trash can when it could be going somewhere else," said Butler University Laboratory School 60 Principal Ron Smith.

School 60, which is part of Indianapolis Public Schools, participated in the study along with IPS Schools 84 and 91, Orchard School, Oaklandon Elementary School in Lawrence and Noble Crossing Education in Noblesville.

Beginning this school year, every IPS elementary and middle school has at least one sharing cart, where students can put food or drinks they don't want and other students can pick items they do want, according to Dena Bond, the district's food service director.

The sharing cart is the starting point of the district's food recovery program. Schools with a food pantry can also keep the food, or it can be donated to an off-site food pantry. Administrators also can send food home to students in need.

Bond said she's aware of 33 schools that make donations of some kind.

Jim Poyser, executive director of Earth Charter Indiana, helped lead the food waste study locally and said he was surprised to go to a school on pizza day and see students apparently didn't care for the pizza.

That's something Bond pays attention to at the district level because recovering food is "the last stop in trying to prevent food waste."

She said it's important to give students food options they actually enjoy in order to limit the likelihood that students pick something in the lunch line but end up not eating it.

Some schools also partner with Food Rescue, a Carmel-based organization that helps schools limit food waste and offers a tracking tool so administrators and students can trace their impact.

School 60 was the first school to begin food recovery in 2016, so Smith, who's been at the school for 10 years, said he didn't necessarily learn anything from the waste study numbers that he didn't already know anecdotally.

The school also has a garden, so some food is composted and used there.

Most of the school's leftover food is donated to the Mid-North Food Pantry across the alley. A letter the food pantry's leadership sent School 60 said more than 12,400 pounds of food was donated in 2019.

"Because of donors like you," the letter read, "food insecurity in Indianapolis is a problem we can overcome together."

The amount of waste that comes from school cafeterias seems to be something more people are paying attention to now compared to when Smith got to School 60 a decade ago.

"I think people are more aware of the issue of food waste, which is a healthy thing," he said. "That includes kids. It's not just adults."

If enough schools and school districts take food waste seriously, Poyser believes it could be one more way to push back against an impending climate crisis because there would be less methane produced from rotting food.

"I think it's one of those — and there's a pun here — low-hanging fruit actions we can take to tackle waste and address the climate crisis," he said.

Tasha Beckwith brings census to life

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Not many get excited about filling out the census, and some may avoid it altogether due to a lack of understanding of what it is and how their information is used. Indianapolis-based artist Tasha Beckwith is looking to change that. Beckwith, 37, was one of two local artists chosen by the Indianapolis Arts Council to use their talents to shed light on the upcoming census, beginning in March.

The Count Me INdy art campaign hopes to use visual art to convey the theme of “Whoever you are, wherever you’re from, you matter.” The art will be displayed throughout the

city to emphasize the importance of the census.

“Getting involved with this was important to me, because I didn’t know much about the census and how much my input mattered,” Beckwith said. “I wanted to make sure that I could convey the message of inclusion and slip in the information about what it really means to take the census and how it affects the community. I try to make sure that I can include that information in the artwork and include the demographics that aren’t taking the census, including the Latinx and the Black community.”

While creating her portion of the

project, which consists of collages highlighting various demographics in the city, Beckwith learned many people avoid the census out of fear. Many in the Latinx community, particularly those without a legal status, were afraid the information would be used to deport them. In the Black community, Beckwith heard concerns about how their information would be used.

According to Count Me INdy campaign manager Callie Kennington, individual census responses are protected under federal law and kept confidential for 72 years. The information cannot be accessed by any branch of government, including the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) or Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE).

Instead, information given on the census can be used to determine

how — and where — local and national funds are spent, including education grants, health care programs such as SNAP and WIC, and emergency services. Businesses and community centers can also use census information to determine how to best serve their customers and communities.

“I’ve never gotten the chance to use my art to teach people about different subjects,” Beckwith said. “I’m a visual learner, so I hope this project helps people learn more about the census and inspires them to take it.”

New show celebrates Nina Simone

It would be nearly impossible to sufficiently tell the story of Nina Simone in a single performance, and that’s not what Will and Justin Sears-Watson are trying to do with their new production, “Nina Simone, High Priestess of Soul.” The production — which they describe as a celebration of Simone through dance and spoken word — will play Jan. 30-Feb. 2 at Phoenix Theatre Indianapolis, 705 N. Illinois St.



The Jan. 30 showing is at 7:30 p.m. The Jan. 31 and Feb. 1 productions are at 8 p.m. The Feb. 2 show is at 2:30 p.m. Tickets range from \$20 to \$32 at tickets.vendini.com. Justin, the artistic director, said it was a challenge to put a show together that he felt was worthy of who Simone was because of her large body of work, her activity in the civil rights movement and her struggles with mental illness (she was diagnosed with bipolar disorder in the late 1980s). As a pianist, singer and performer, Simone earned her badge as “the high priestess of soul.”

“I think we’ve brought something to the stage that’s very emotional, very meaningful, and people will feel different when they leave,” Justin said. “... I hope we’ve done her some honor.”

Part of the goal of the show is to open up audience members to the idea that Simone was a true genius, someone who may have been more celebrated as a Black woman if she came along a few decades later.

She’s still a “long, long, long way from getting her due as an artist,” said Will, the executive director, but he’s hoping this show can be part of the posthumous effort to immortalize Simone, who died in 2003 at 70 years old.

“The show just makes you feel good,” Will said. “There’s some history to it. There’s a lot of neat little features. ... It’s definitely going to impact the audience in a positive way.”

If all goes well, Will joked there should be an uptick in Apple Music downloads of Simone’s work from Indianapolis.

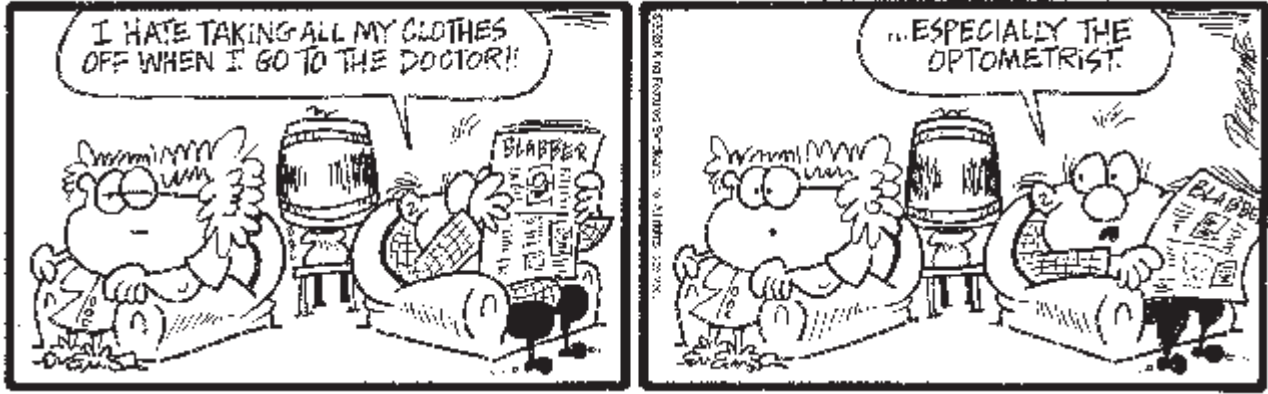

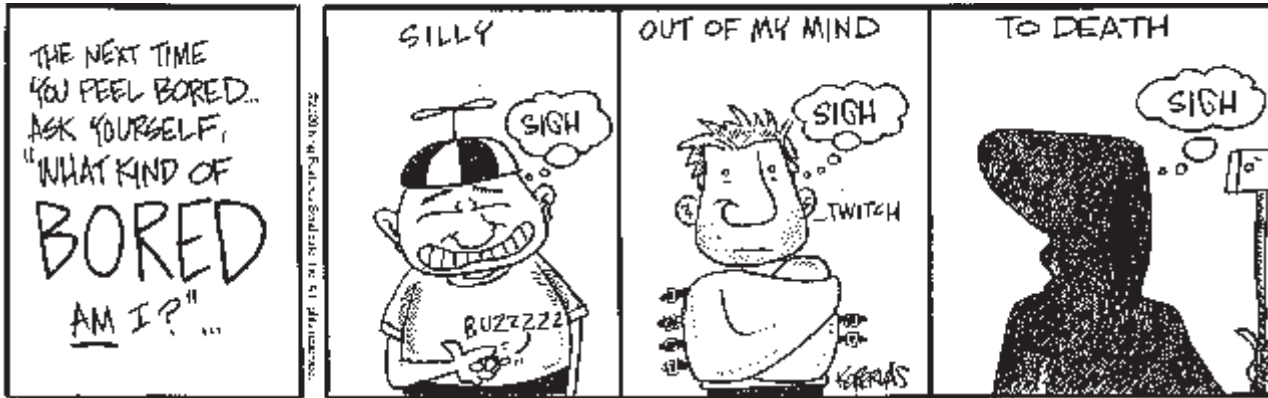

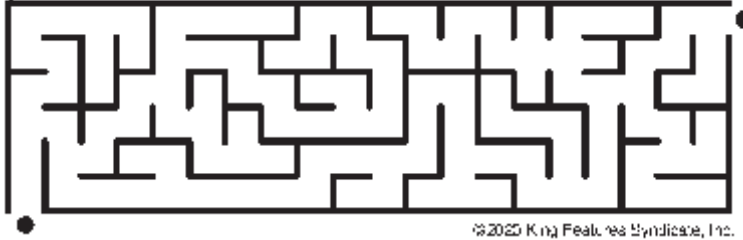

The absurdity of white supremacy

Last week, Jan. 21, to be exact, a strange thing happened. Well, not so strange if you're Black in America, as it occurs all too frequently to Black people, especially Black men.

Ball State University marketing professor Shaheen Borna called campus police on Sultan Benson, a student majoring in business administration. Benson is Black. Borna isn't.

The offense: When a student left in the middle of class, Benson wouldn't move to that empty seat after Borna told him to do so. Benson sat near an electrical outlet so he could charge his laptop. The other seat wasn't near an outlet, so, logically, Benson didn't want to move. Sounds reasonable enough, right?

Obviously not to Borna. Campus police were initially confused as to why they were called. The students in class assured the officers the incident was petty and didn't warrant police

involvement. The officers gave Benson two options: move or leave the class. He left the class. On the video circulating on social media, you can see him handing a fellow student the cord to charge his laptop, adding validity to his claim of needing to plug in his computer.

While Benson had plenty of defenders — several students commented they've had this professor and problematic behavior isn't new for him — others say Benson should've moved seats. Somehow the absurdity of calling the cops on a student for not switching seats is lost on them. That reaction wasn't just extreme, it was off the charts! For people to act as if this action is justified further reinforces the belief that no matter how benign the act, a Black person is always a threat.

This incident hits close to home because I'm a Ball State alum. I won't say I'm shocked by this incident, but I am infuriated. Ball State University President Geoffrey Mearns says the professor used poor judgment. I disagree. Judgment presumes logic was involved. It's clear logic wasn't involved in Borna's decision. It was an emotionally-based decision, so poor emotion

was used (if there's such a term). I'm not Borna so I'm just spitballing here, but I'm guessing fear or pride were the emotions he felt. He either feared this Black man or he didn't want to look weak in front of his students. (As if calling the police on a student for something as innocuous as moving seats makes you look tough.)

If Borna feared this student, I'd like to know why. What did this young man do that warranted a phone call to the cops? If he's in class — in college — there's a pretty good chance the young man is there to learn. I keep up with current events, but some trends miss me. Is there a trend where students today go through the trouble of enrolling in college, making a schedule, paying for college and going to class only to sit there and harass the professor? And if this is a new trend, who are these parents who are allowing their children to go to school and waste thousands of dollars just for kicks?

Black Americans let out a collective sigh of relief when they saw how well this situation was handled. It could've been worse. That's what's so infuriating about these calls to police for no other reason than a Black person

being Black. The police aren't here to solve every petty disagreement that arises. It's a waste of taxpayer dollars, and Black people's lives are often put in jeopardy. At this point, Borna feels foolish. I can't imagine how he would feel if the situation turned violent or deadly. This is how Black people in America think, and this is why we were relieved. White privilege is never having to think that way.

As I stated earlier, judging from social media posts, students think this professor is a jerk. Being a jerk is one thing. Being a racist jerk is another. He's likely been both for a very long time. I'm not sure how Ball State should reprimand Borna. If he's tenured, firing isn't that simple. If he has to undergo diversity training, it begs several questions: is this the first time, if it's the first time, why isn't this a regular requirement, if not the first time, why didn't his behavior change, and why not intermittent workshops to keep the information fresh? While his behavior may be an isolated incident, he's not the only professor on that campus who needs diversity, inclusion and equity training. It should be a regular part of the job. ASAP.

Black lives matter inside the womb, too

Last week I read the painful, poignant and powerful column that my friend and colleague Marshawn Wolley wrote. Wolley's essay concerned the ongoing high murder rate of African Americans in Indianapolis

— the overwhelming majority of whom were killed by their fellow African Americans. As he always does, Wolley laid out a clear, cogent and well-researched polemic.

From the outset, allow me to state that this column is by no means a rebuttal to, or rebuke of, Wolley. In fact, I affirm the central thesis of his column. Rather, I am reacting to one statement in particular. Wolley wrote, "Defenseless Black babies were murdered in Indianapolis." He was referring to the fact that very young children, including babies, have been victims of violence — unintentionally and intentionally.

This statement arrested my attention in large measure because I am a dedicated father. My mind traveled very quickly from instances of shootings, to various forms of domestic violence ... to abortion. According to a 2019 Gallup survey, Americans are pretty evenly split between people who identify as "pro-life" as compared to those who

identify as "pro-choice." (Basically, younger, less religious, higher earning and more educated people tend to identify as pro-choice, whereas older, more religious, lower earning, and less educated people tend to identify as pro-life.)

In context, it is obvious that Wolley did not intend to engage in a discussion about abortion policy. That is not my aim, either. However, as a moral imperative, it is important to understand that respect for Black lives should not begin outside the womb. (And, as I frequently remind my pro-life counterparts, such concern should not *end* outside the womb.) Also, to be crystal clear, I don't use the word "murder" in relation to abortion. Doing so amounts to "word porn" that does nothing to advance the cause of preventing abortions.

As is the case with every major socioeconomic issue in America, race plays a role in this discourse. In this case, I am fully aware that many white pro-lifers exhibit very little concern for babies (of whatever race) *after* they're born. (I refer to those people as "pro-birth" rather than "pro-life.") In the same way that Black feminists often distinguish themselves from white feminists by referring to themselves as "womanists," I distinguish my pro-life stance from the majority of my white evangelical friends. They only care about the "genocide" of the unborn, not "Black lives." If they did, they

would actively advocate for policies that assist low-income mothers and young children.

Further, unlike my pro-birth friends, I strongly oppose the death penalty. My opposition is based in part on the fact that it is racially biased. I also oppose it on moral grounds, even when I am comfortable that the person was rightly convicted for a heinous crime. Why? I don't believe in the orderly, state-sanctioned murder of *any* human being. Yet, I don't understand how so many of my anti-death penalty friends can have so much compassion for those who are (in some cases) the most guilty, but have little or no compassion for those who are the most innocent.

As I always feel obliged to do in such discussions, I affirm that the key to preventing abortion is the prevention of unwanted pregnancies. Thus, I am a strong advocate for birth control and sex education. I will also affirm that the grossly disproportionate rate of poverty and other social ills among African Americans greatly contributes to the fact that Black women are as much as five times as likely to have an abortion as white women. Finally, I would *not* overturn Roe if I had a magic wand. I hold that view for a variety of reasons, not the least of which is the fact that overturning it would immediately have a disproportionate and devastating effect on women who are African American and/or low income.

However, even after acknowledging the preceding, consider this sobering fact: Going back at least to 2012, more Black babies have been aborted in New York City each and every year *than were born there* during that same time-frame. Let *that* sink in for a moment. Further, while exact numbers are difficult to obtain, roughly 16 million Black babies have been aborted since Roe was decided. By any objective standard, that is a tragedy — irrespective of the underlying causes. Thus, for me, this issue is far beyond any political posturing.

The legal and social fights regarding abortion rights are as vehement as they have ever been. Donald Trump's presidency has encouraged a spate of anti-abortion laws because he has appointed judges (and justices) who are staunchly pro-life. His current stance on abortion is one of the key drivers of his popularity in the Republican Party.

I understand that my view is not popular among a substantial portion of our community. But I have learned from most of my heroes. They have all been unafraid to take a stand — and to do so alone if necessary. In the end, we are cognitively and morally dissonant if we continue to call ourselves "kings and queens" even as we continue to sacrifice our unborn "princes and princesses" in such epidemic numbers.

Will a woman be president in 2020?

In a most unusual endorsement, the New York Times has endorsed both Sens. Elizabeth Warren (Massachusetts) and Amy Klobuchar (Minnesota) for the Democratic nomination for president. Apparently, the editorial board of the Times disagrees with Sen. Bernie Sanders (Vermont), who allegedly told Warren a woman could not win

the presidency. I'd love to see the right woman in the White House, but I've been among the many who have wondered openly if, in a polarized and sexist United States, a woman can win both the nomination and the presidency.

Though polls are not a definitive measure of who

will win an election, Warren and Klobuchar tend to poll more weakly than the men in the race — Vice President Biden, Sanders, and former Mayor Pete Buttigieg. Have we come such a long way since 2016 that a woman is electable? Can so-called progressive men who want to get 45 out of the White House overcome their gender bias to vote for a woman?

Clearly, the Times not only thinks a woman can win, but in endorsing two women for the Democratic nomination, they are saying that women are the best of the Democrats in the race. And, in the past two years, we've seen signs that women are gaining politically. The women's sweep of the 2018 elections certainly bodes well for women. At the same time, is gender a sufficient qualification for the presidency? Three years after the first flawed but overwhelmingly successful Women's March in 2017, the re-alignment of the march "movement" has illustrated cracks in the foundations of feminism.

These flaws perhaps go back to the scuffle over who should get the vote first between our nation's first feminists like Elizabeth Cady Stanton and civil rights activists like Frederick Douglass. In resenting the fact that Black men got the vote before white women, those early feminists used extremely disparaging language against Black men, using terms like "savage" to suggest these men did not deserve to vote.

Can anybody say "intersectionality"? Or to make it more clear, use the words of Sojourner Truth and say, "Ain't I A Woman." The women's march movement fell apart because women were not on the same page. Accusations against Tamika Mallory and Linda Sarsour, two of the co-chairs of the march, caused much discussion and rancor, so much so that the second Women's March attracted a fraction of the people who showed up to the first one. And the third march was operated on a different model. It

did not equal the excitement or momentum of the first march, although there were many more local marches and other activities associated with the marches.

Women can't "come together" unless they acknowledge our differences, as well as our similarities. Thanks to Tarana Burke and folks like professor Kimberly Crenshaw, some Black women are openly addressing issues of race and class in feminism. But I've heard few white women, either politicians or intellectuals, deal with issues of racism in the women's movement. Is there really "a women's movement"? There are women's issues, and women's marches, and an exhilarating display of anti-Trump sentiment three years ago (don't forget that 53 percent of white women voted for that man), but when do women come together?

In other words, gender is not a qualification for higher office. And if the women endorsed by the New York Times do not fully explore the concept of intersectionality and speak on it, they will likely sideline some votes, even though many others would vote for Bubba the Fool to get rid of 45. Both Warren and Klobuchar are exciting candidates. Warren's progressive ideas endear her to the left, and Klobuchar's more moderate approach to social and economic challenges appeals to others. The Times did a good job of contrasting the two women.

But can either win the presidency? When then one-term Sen. Barack Obama ran for president, I liked him very much but didn't think a Black man could succeed in this racist nation. Thankfully, I was wrong. Can a woman win in 2020? I'm hoping the best candidate will win, and the best candidate may well be a woman.

men’s basketball league that hosts an annual tournament.

Frederick Douglass Park, which is 99 years old, has been part of the foundation of the community, especially because of the swimming pool and golf course.

Casel said the park was a “home away from home” for her and her three children, who moved into the area in 1971.

Elizabeth Gore, who serves on the Indianapolis Public Schools board and said she’s lived in Martindale-Brightwood for more than 50 years, was on the panel and remembered her children learning to play tennis on the tennis court.

“The park has meant so much to our family,” she said.

IUPUI anthropology professor Paul Mullins gave a presentation about the history of segregation in Indianapolis and why Frederick Douglass Park — the first Indianapolis park for African Americans — was often times a central piece in the struggle for equality.

Deputy Mayor David Hampton was one of a few elected and appointed officials who spoke at the meeting.

“We have to put the love and investment into Frederick Douglass Park,” he said, “because it’s one of our historic parks.”

Gerald Trotter, one of the community members on the panel, asked why the type of fundraising effort it will take to get a new family center seems to always be left up to the community, even though it would go to benefit a public park.

City-county council member William “Duke” Oliver explained capital improvement for parks isn’t part of the city budget, but he said he would work with Friends of Frederick Douglass Park and Indy Parks Foundation for a possible fundraising collaboration.

tracting process, the study found minority- and female-owned businesses face significant barriers such as lack of mentorships, less encouragement and lack of capital.

BBC used data from Jan. 1, 2014 to Dec. 31, 2019. During that five-year period, the city of Indianapolis awarded \$128.1 million out of \$876 million to minority-owned businesses. Women and minority-owned businesses were eligible to bid on \$169 million, or 19.3%, of contracts.

Companies owned by white women were awarded the majority of those funds at \$74.4 million, and African American-owned businesses received the second highest percentage of funds at \$53.4 million, or 6.1%.

Lipscomb hopes the findings in this study make local government more aware of the minority-owned businesses that need work.

“I can’t speak to why we haven’t been contacted, because I’m not behind those doors,” Lipscomb said. “All I know is that it’s not happening for me and for a lot of other businesses that I’m aware of. I’m hoping this sheds light on the fact that we are available and open for business. ... We don’t want to talk any longer, we don’t want to fill out additional papers, we want to be given the work.”

Dr. Sameer Bawa, managing director for BBC, said the disparity shown in the study highlights the need for the M/W/V/DOBE Program, run by the Office of Minority & Women Business Development. Bawa looked at survey responses from business owners that suggested the city should work to encourage mentorship and protegee programs for small business owners.

This study is the first of many steps toward parity in local business, according to Camille Blunt, director of the Office of Minority and Women Business Development.

The office will accept public comment on the disparity study through Feb. 29, and Blunt plans to use those comments and ideas to decide what changes can be made to the contracting process to benefit business owners.

“We’re ready to get to work,” Blunt said.

said UWCI is in a position to both serve people now and try to find solutions to poverty.

“What are we not deploying in the community currently that we could actually start to explore to really see if we can move the needle and solve some of these issues, versus just providing the safety net?” Bacon said.

That safety net is still important, he said, but it doesn’t have to be the only focus.

“Without the safety net, the solutions look different,” Bacon said. “And without solutions, the safety net would get too robust and maybe break.”

Other organizations that received funding included Exodus Refugee Immigration, Trinity Haven, Public Advocates in Community Re-Entry (PACE) and Crossroads Education.

Bacon warned the annual fund probably won’t produce successful programs and ideas every time, but that’s because of the aggressive nature of what the fund is meant to accomplish.

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Helping women work safely during pregnancy benefits moms, babies and employers

As an obstetrician, state health commissioner, a mother and now grandmother, my passion is to attack Indiana's infant mortality and maternal health issues from every front. In Indiana, we are fortunate to have the support of Gov. Eric J. Holcomb, who is committed to improving the health of our moms and babies. That is the foundation of his proposed legislation that would require reasonable accommodations in the workplace to help protect pregnant women.

More than 80,000 babies are born in Indiana each year, and the majority of them are born to women who work outside the home. Women make up almost 50 percent of Indiana's workforce, and of those, nearly one-third are ages 16-44, a range that includes the peak child-bearing years.

Working during pregnancy is generally safe, according to the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology. However, for women in physically demanding occupations or those with medically complicated pregnancies, work accommodations can allow for continuous and safe employment during pregnancy, which benefits the woman, her baby and her employer.

Throughout my obstetrical career, I have collaborated with employers to support women who work safely well into their last month of pregnancy. I have seen hospitals adjust workflows so that pregnant providers and nurses do not have to lift patients from one bed to another. We have shifted their roles in the operating room so they did not have to stand for prolonged periods and avoided putting the pregnant caregiver at risk by caring for highly infectious patients whenever possible.

Pregnancy accommodations are often simple, such as having water to drink at a work station, being able to sit down or take more frequent breaks, limiting the amount of weight a woman must lift repetitively, allowing a snack between meals for a pregnant woman who is diabetic, or taking steps to reduce falls as her center of gravity changes.

These basic changes can have a significant impact on the health of moms and babies, including a lower risk for preterm birth, the number one cause of infant mortality in our state. They also can benefit employers by allowing women to work longer into their pregnancies. I once saw a pregnant attorney hospitalized on bed rest bill a record number of hours because she was able to continue working remotely.

While the federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration has guidelines regarding workplace exposures to radiation and other toxins that can harm a developing fetus, existing federal law surrounding pregnancy accommodations is vague and ambiguous. Many employers, including those in Indiana, offer some level of accommodation. The proposed legislation would add clarity for employers and

women without creating any undue burden on businesses.

To date, 27 states, including Illinois and Kentucky, and Washington, D.C., have passed additional laws clearly outlining what reasonable pregnancy accommodations are expected in the workplace. I believe this legislation will help eliminate confusion and create consistency among Indiana employers and employees.

I am proud to be from Indiana, because as a state we value families, children and the unborn child.

Pregnancy is just a season in the life of a woman and her family. Supporting her during this critical time allows employers to improve morale, protect the

investment they have made in training that individual, and potentially decrease the financial burdens created by absenteeism or high health care costs associated with preterm birth. By creating partnerships between employers, obstetrical providers and pregnant women and making reasonable accommodations during pregnancy and the newborn period, we can decrease Indiana's high infant mortality rate, improve maternal health and ensure that our workforce remains skilled and robust.

Heart Month Focuses on Awareness and Prevention

Cardiovascular disease remains the leading cause of death in the United States. According to the American Heart Association (AHA), nearly 1 in 3 U.S. adults have high blood cholesterol, a major risk factor for heart disease and stroke.

American Heart Month in February is an annual celebration urging Americans to join the battle against heart disease.

The Marion County Public Health Department supports education and awareness of heart health to improve the quality of life in residents.

AHA hosts Go Red for Women luncheons during February here in Indiana and across the country. Launched in 2004, the Go Red for Women movement raises awareness about heart disease in women.

In the United States, a woman dies from heart disease every 80 seconds making it the leading cause of death. Through Go Red for Women, AHA educates women that up to 80 percent of heart disease is preventable through healthy lifestyle changes that include a healthy diet, increased physical activity, healthy blood pressure, healthy cholesterol, healthy blood sugar, healthy weight, and quitting smoking.

The 16th annual Go Red for Women Experience and Luncheon for the Indianapolis area is on Friday, Feb. 28 from 10:30 a.m.-1 p.m. at The Westin, 241 W. Washington Street. This event offers women a chance to get pampered, enjoy a fashion show, hear from heart disease survivors and support the AHA mission. For more information, visit heart.org/indygoesred.

Prior to Go Red for Women, only 30 percent of women knew that heart disease was their greatest health threat. A decade after Go Red for Women launched, close to 56 percent of women recognized this fact, nearly a 90 percent increase in awareness.

By wearing red, participating

in these events and financially supporting the American Heart Association, Hoosiers will help save lives.

One way to lower the rate of heart disease and stroke is through prevention. Being physically active is an important aspect of overall health for women. Not only does this ensure women live longer and healthier but also improves risk factors for cardiovascular disease, such as high blood pressure and high cholesterol.

Healthy eating is critical to managing weight and preventing cardiovascular disease in women. About 45 percent of U.S. deaths caused by heart disease, stroke and Type 2 diabetes are because of poor dietary habits, such as high sodium intake, high sugary drink consumption and low intake of fruits and vegetables.

High blood pressure, or hypertension, is the second leading cause of preventable heart disease and stroke death — second only to smoking. Hypertension is known as the "silent killer" because often there are no symptoms, despite its role in significantly increasing the risk for heart disease and stroke.

The Marion County Public Health Department offers programs that support good heart health, including quit smoking resources. The Chronic Disease staff provides screening and education services to Marion County neighborhoods, worksites, places of worship, schools, and community health centers.

They also work with community stakeholders and partners to address policy, systems, and environmental approaches to enabling healthier lifestyles.

Programs focus on cardiovascular health, diabetes, nutrition, school wellness, sodium reduction programs in the community, and tobacco control.

Group plans to turn vacant jail into Black community pillar

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (AP) — Half a century ago, the five-acre lot in Chattanooga’s Bushtown neighborhood was a thriving Black Catholic school. Two decades ago, the property was a work release center, a symbol of the mass incarceration that had torn apart the surrounding community.

Today, Kevin Muhammad has a vision to restore the abandoned lot to a pillar of the Black community. The local leader of the Nation of Islam said his plan for the Community Haven in Bushtown is about redeeming the property and elevating the neighborhood.

“Local talent doesn’t have a venue or an avenue to be able to become known,” he said. “There’s a lot of Usher Raymonds who haven’t been uncovered yet. There’s a lot of Samuel L. Jacksons. There’s a lot of Reggie Whites here in this city who haven’t been exposed.”

Muhammad presented his plan for the property on North Hickory Street to a standing-room-only crowd during Martin Luther King Jr. Celebration week. The Community Haven will feature athletic courts, an outdoor amphitheater, media studio, urban garden and a trade school, he said.

Previously, the lot was the home of the St. Francis School, a Catholic primary school from 1950 to 1971. Former students said the school played an important role in educating the community during the time of segregation. In 1977, the state converted the buildings to a work release center for incarcerated people. The center was eventually closed and the property was vacant for more than a decade before Muhammad bought it.

The first thing Muhammad’s team did when it bought the land in March 2019 was take down the barbed wire, he said. They also had to clear trees and brush that had grown over the property, covering the sidewalks and masking entire buildings near the back of the lot.

The Community Haven began about four years ago in Alton Park with the renovation of a home into the nonprofit’s headquarters. In 2016, Muhammad launched the local chapter of 10,000 Fearless, an unarmed community patrol. The group now has four patrol cars and a public service truck, he said.

Muhammad plans to move the Community Haven’s headquarters to the former clergy house in Bushtown, he said. That renovation project was entirely self-funded to prove the group is committed to the project before asking for outside money, he said.

Rev. Charlotte Williams, pastor of Eastdale Village Community United Methodist Church, said the center will be an institution to build self-sufficiency and honor the legacy of Bushtown, which was an all-Black municipality during legal segregation.

“We want it to be something that the people that

have come before us can be proud of, that the people that are with us now can be proud of and that the people that will come after us will be proud of,” Williams said. “We can have a place that we can call our own that will provide us with the tools that we will need, because for so long we have been in survival mode.”

The nonprofit is hoping to have the sports court on the property renovated by spring so local children will have a place to play as the days get longer and schools are out, Muhammad said. That project alone will cost at least \$50,000.

In total, Muhammad said, the property requires millions of dollars in investment.

“Chattanooga has some of the most charitable foundations in all of America, and this is a program they should buy into because it’s going to benefit the entire community,” he said.

The project will require significant city and Hamilton County support, requiring the government to

buy-in to people living and working in the Black community, Muhammad said. Some of the ideas for the Community Haven, such as converting the old school building to a trade school, emerged when the city did not respond to Muhammad’s 2016 “State of the People” address requesting increased support for formerly incarcerated people, he said.

“Since our city didn’t want to do it, we have to do it,” Muhammad said.

Muhammad admitted building momentum for the project beyond the surrounding community will be difficult. The nonprofit is faith-based, not designed to promote Islam. If he were a white, Baptist preacher, his vision would already be funded, he said.

“This is not a Muslim thing. It’s not a religious thing. This is a community thing. This is not a race thing. This is a humanity thing,” Muhammad said. “This is for everyone.”

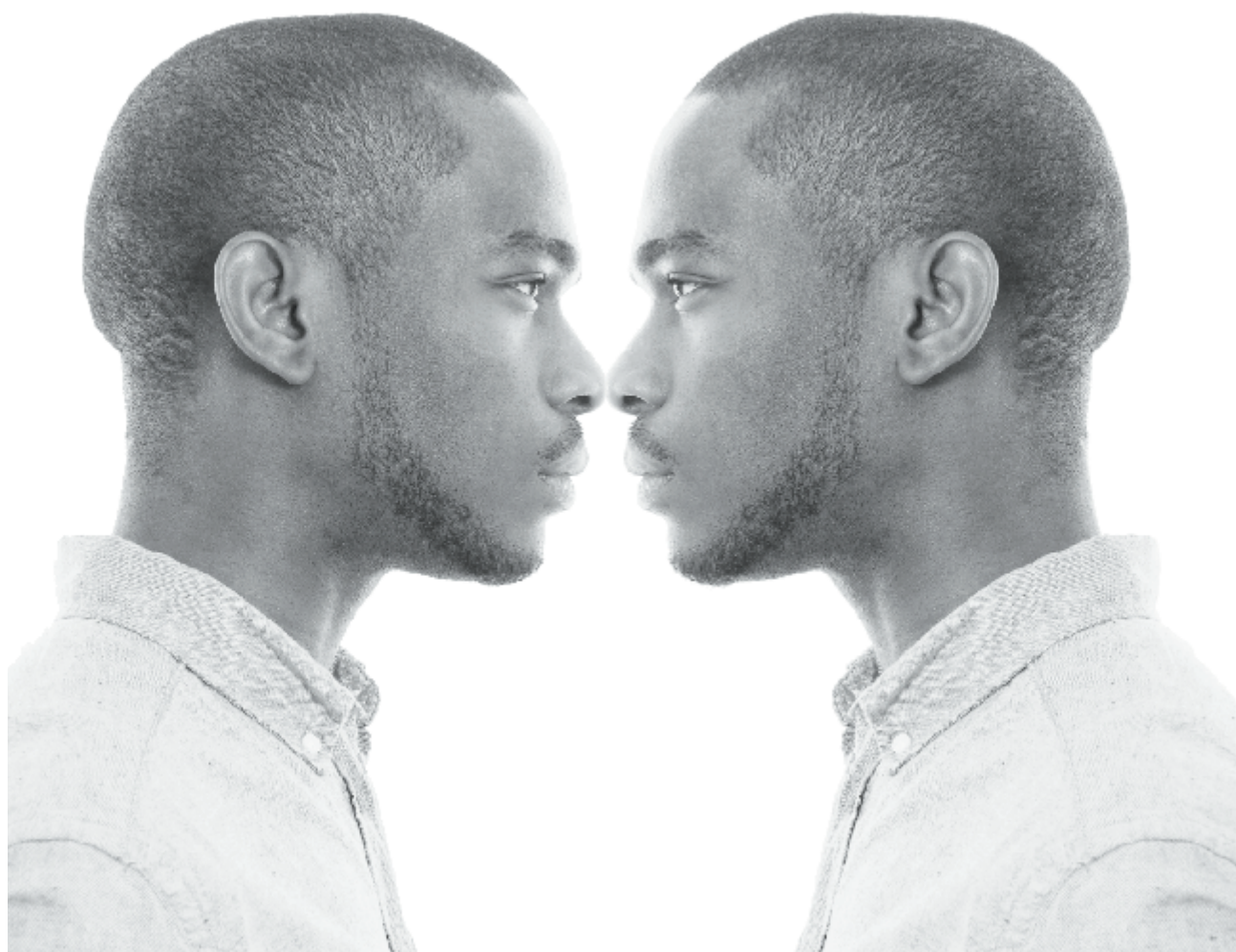

Happy new year. It is hard to believe that the year is 2020. I bumped into an old acquaintance from high school yesterday — someone I had not seen in about 10 years. As we were talking, I thought to myself, “Wow, he looks old.” I wonder if he was thinking the same thing about me. Probably. In my mind, my high school friends are all still 18 years old. Seeing them in person shows reality is quite different. But commenting on aging appearances is not very kind, and thankfully, neither of us said those thoughts out loud.

My job is to teach college students business communications. Many people think I teach grammar and spelling, but that's not what business communications is about. I teach communication strategies for business professionals, so our students will be able to communicate whatever they need to communicate — positive messages, negative messages or somewhere in between — without losing credibility. They also don't want

to come across as incompetent, rude or uncaring. No one wants to do business with someone they think is a jerk or does not know what he is doing. I want my students to be the business professionals with whom everyone wants to work. I try to teach the same concepts to my 7-year-old son, but it is tough. Seven-year-olds don't really care about credibility. They care about what feels good in the moment, which at times

could be saying something mean or hurtful. My son has come home from school upset that another kid was mean to him, e.g., called him a name, refused to trade him a Pokémon card or some other equally offensive act. I advise him to walk away from the mean kid or to not play with him anymore. But my son wants to retaliate — to say something despicable back, or even worse, to tell on the other kid. As humans, we are hard-wired to feel emotion first — before logic and reason have a chance to catch up. So I understand his desire to retaliate and resisting those urges is hard. I think we can all find examples of times when we have said or done something in the heat of the moment that we wish we could take back. There are a lot of examples in the world today where we see grown adults saying hurtful and mean things. They may tell half-truths, lie by omission or call others names. Those behaviors make me terribly uncomfortable and embarrass me. I don't want to be associated with folks who behave in a dishonest or cruel manner. I certainly don't want my son to feel those behaviors are acceptable, and I definitely want my college students to understand those behaviors are not appropriate either. I am not sure when it became OK to share every controversial or mean thought that crosses our minds, but it seems as if

many folks these days have lost (or just thrown away) that filter. Behaviors that are callous or dishonest (whether in person or online) will damage your credibility and cause others to question your overall decency. That is not good for your personal life or your business. How can I, a parent and a teacher, help to build a more civil generation, when incivility is everywhere we look? How can I influence my child and my students to see kindness as a strength? I have come to the conclusion that I can only control my own behaviors, and I try my best to lead by example. I say please and thank you. I look others in the eyes when greeting them. I am working on looking at and commenting on the positives that I see and not focusing on the negatives. My new motto is to complain and criticize less, offer ideas and solutions more. Am I always successful? No, but I am trying. In this new year and new decade, my goal is to push civility and kindness to the top of the list. Being kind, even when someone is not being kind to you, shows strength and discipline. And it'll get you ahead in business.

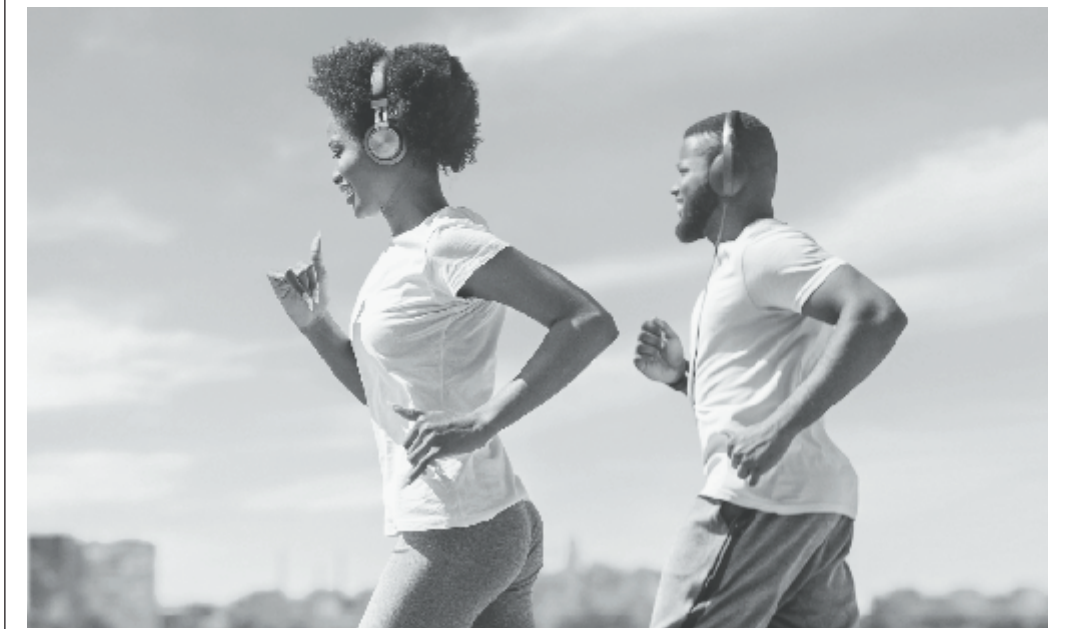

Bryant left deep legacy in LA sports, basketball world

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Kobe Bryant inspired a generation of basketball players worldwide with sublime skills and an unquenchable competitive fire. He earned Los Angeles’ eternal adoration during his two decades as the fierce soul of the beloved Lakers, and he was respected by basketball fans from every place with a hoop and a dream, including his native Philadelphia and in Italy, his other childhood home. Less than four years into his retirement, Bryant was seizing new challenges and working to inspire his daughters’ generation through sports and storytelling when his next chapter ended shockingly early. Bryant, the 18-time All-Star who won five NBA championships and became one of the greatest basketball players of his generation during a 20-year career all with the Lakers, died in a helicopter crash Jan. 26. He was 41. The crash occurred in the foggy hills above Calabasas, California, about 30 miles northwest of downtown Los Angeles. Bryant and his 13-year-old daughter Gianna died. In all, nine people were on the helicopter. All died. Bryant lived south of Los Angeles in coastal Orange County, and he often used helicopters to save time and avoid Southern California’s notorious traffic. He traveled to practices and games by helicopter before his playing career ended in 2016. He continued to use them after retirement as he attended to his new ventures, which included a burgeoning entertainment company that recently produced an Academy Award-winning animated short film. The basketball world and Los Angeles reacted with an outpouring of pain

and disbelief. Bryant is all but certain to be elected to the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame this year, when he is eligible for the first time. “For 20 seasons, Kobe showed us what is possible when remarkable talent blends with an absolute devotion to winning,” NBA Commissioner Adam Silver said. “He was one of the most extraordinary players in the history of our game with accomplishments that are legendary ... but he will be remembered most for inspiring people around the world to pick up a basketball and compete to the very best of their ability.” The crash occurred about 20 miles from Mamba Sports Academy, Bryant’s basketball training complex in Newbury Park, California. A youth basketball tournament — the Mamba Cup — was scheduled for a second day of competition Jan. 27 at the facility, and Bryant had attended the opening day Saturday with Gianna. Bryant and his wife, Vanessa, had four daughters. He had been a vocal booster of women’s sports since his retirement, coaching and mentoring basketball players around the world while also backing women’s soccer and other endeavors. Bryant retired as the third-leading scorer in NBA history with 33,643 points, all scored in Lakers purple and gold. The self-nicknamed Black Mamba was a prolific, gifted shooter with a sublime all-around game and a relentless, hard-edged work ethic that thrilled his fans and almost everyone else, even those who reviled him. Taking cues from Michael Jordan, one of his idols, Bryant played with a swagger that compelled him to talk trash, to guard the toughest opponents, to play through pain and to demand the ball at the biggest moments of games.

He didn’t always hit them, but Bryant never stopped trying. “He had zero flaws offensively,” LeBron James said Jan. 25. “Zero. You backed off of him, he could shoot the 3. You body him up a little bit, he could go around you. He could shoot from mid-range. He could post. He could make free throws. ... He was just immortal offensively because of his skill set and his work ethic.” Bryant held the No. 3 spot in the league scoring ranks until the day before his death, when James passed him during the Lakers’ game in Philadelphia. “Continuing to move the game forward (at)KingJames,” Bryant wrote in his last tweet. “Much respect my brother.” Bryant had been spending more time with his daughters since leaving the league. The Bryants’ first daughter, Natalia, turned 17 a week ago. Bianka Bella Bryant is 3 years old, and Capri Kobe Bryant was born last June. Gianna, better known as Gigi, had a promising youth career and a competitive pugnaciousness that reminded everybody of her dad. Bryant sat with her courtside at a Brooklyn Nets game late last year, clearly passing along his wisdom to his daughter. News of Bryant’s death inspired an outpouring of grief around the sports world and beyond, but it was felt particularly painfully in Los Angeles, where Bryant was unquestionably the sprawling city’s most popular athlete and one of its most beloved people. Hundreds of fans — many in Bryant jerseys and Lakers gear — spontaneously gathered at Staples Center and in the surrounding LA Live entertainment complex Jan. 26, weeping and staring at video boards with Bryant’s image before the Grammy awards

ceremony. “I thought he was going to live forever,” Lakers great Magic Johnson told KCBS-TV. “I thought he was invincible. ... There was nobody who took more pride in putting on that Laker uniform than Kobe. Nobody.” Bryant retired as the Lakers’ franchise leader in points, games played, 3-pointers and steals — no small feats on a franchise that has employed many of the greatest players in basketball history. Bryant’s future appeared to be limitless in retirement, whether in sports or entertainment. He opened a production company shortly after leaving the Lakers, saying he was just as passionate about storytelling as he had been about his sport. He won an Oscar in 2018 for his contributions to “Dear Basketball,” an animated short about his relationship to the game. He also produced content for ESPN. In 2003, Bryant was charged with attacking a 19-year-old employee at a Colorado resort. He had said the two had consensual sex, and the charge was eventually dropped when the woman declined to testify in a trial. The woman later filed a civil suit against Bryant that was settled out of court. Bryant went on to become one of the NBA’s most popular players and the face of the Lakers. Winning a record four NBA All-Star Game MVP awards, he was the overall league MVP in 2008 and a two-time NBA scoring champion, but he also earned 12 selections to the NBA’s All-Defensive teams. He teamed with Shaquille O’Neal in a combustible partnership to lead the Lakers to NBA titles in 2000, 2001 and 2002. He later teamed with Pau Gasol to win two more titles in 2009 and 2010. A two-time Olympic gold medalist with the dominant U.S. team, Bryant retired in 2016 after scoring 60 points in his final NBA game. In December 2017, the Lakers hung banners retiring his No. 8 and No. 24 jerseys in the Staples Center rafters in an unprecedented double honor. Bryant looms large over the current generation of NBA players, most of whom grew up either idolizing Bryant or absorbing his work ethic and competitive spirit in the same way Bryant’s generation learned from Jordan. Bryant exemplified and passed on that mentality to James, Stephen Curry and the NBA’s current wave of high-scoring superstars. He entered the NBA draft straight out of suburban Philly’s Lower Merion High School in 1996 after a childhood spent partly in Italy, where his father, former NBA player Joe “Jellybean” Bryant, played professionally. Bryant was occasionally estranged from his now-65-year-old father, but reconciled. Bryant spoke four languages and played a major role in the NBA’s international growth over his two decades in the league, traveling the world and connecting with athletes in other sports and celebrities. Bryant’s final NBA seasons were dogged by injuries, but he still went into retirement with that jaw-dropping 60-point performance against Utah.
