The Central Indiana Community Foundation (CICF) on Aug. 9 announced it will withhold funding from Indianapolis Public Library (IndyPL) until a “measurable change toward a more equitable internal environment is evident.”

CICF funding for IndyPL comes from The Indianapolis Foundation, an affiliate of CICF. The library fund has a total of \$28 million in it that IndyPL can use for expenses outside its operating budget. Last year, the library received \$703,235 from the fund, according to Tamara Winfrey-Harris, vice president of community leadership and effective philanthropy for CICF. Much of that funding went toward community programming and outreach, including making Chromebooks and Wi-Fi hotspots available for checkout in the Haughville branch.

“We think it’s really important for any organization that is on a journey to interrogate whether they’re equitable. The first step is some internal searching, and the library is doing that,” Winfrey-Harris said, citing a planned climate survey study. “We look forward along with the public to hearing what the results of that survey are, and I think

then we can sit down with the library and talk about what the metrics are for returning funding. ... But we wouldn’t presume to tell them what they need to do.”

For members of the Library Workers Union, the next step is clear: CEO Jackie Nytes should resign.

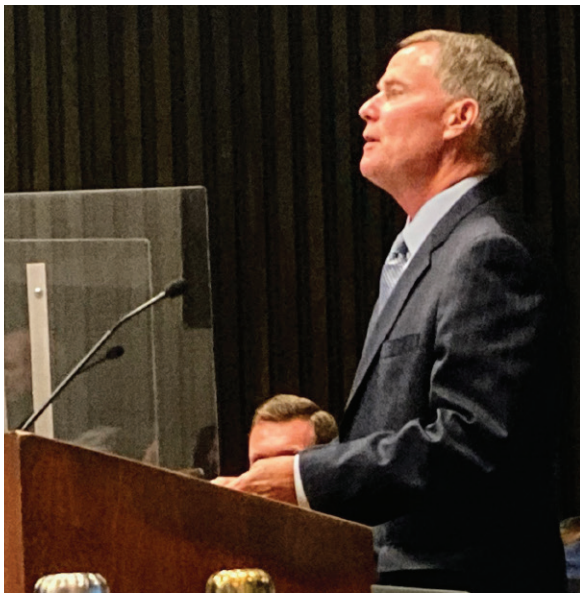
Since May, when board President Jose Salinas muted former employee Bree Flannelly while she discussed her experiences with racism and ableism at Central Library, former and current employees, along with board member Dr. Patricia Payne, have called on Nytes to step down.

“I do think it’s a good thing that CICF is withholding funding,” Payne said. “It’s hard to say that, because you really don’t want to jeopardize the community because of what is going on in terms of leadership, so it’s very hard. ... The library belongs to the community, but you have to take some hard steps if we are going to make sure that the community has all it deserves, and it’s not going to get that with the present leadership.”

Stephen Lane, special collections librarian and union member, said changes in funding are a clear indicator that change is needed and quickly.

“We’re on the clock now,” Lane said. “We need [administration] to work together

## Hogsett unveils 2022 budget

Mayor Joe Hogsett proposed the 2022 budget during a city-county council meeting Aug. 9. The \$1.3 billion budget includes a historic amount earmarked for violence reduction, and also incorporates millions of dollars accrued from the American Rescue Plan (ARP).

Some of the deadliest weeks of the pandemic, Hogsett said, were due to lives lost from gun violence, not COVID-19.

“Gun violence is a public health crisis,” Hogsett told the council. As of Aug. 4, there have been 156 homicides in Indianapolis. To curb the violence, Hogsett proposed \$33 million from ARP funds

## Wheeler Mission expands capacity, services at Center for Women & Children

Stephanie Doss is learning how to love herself again. It’s hard work, after years of off-and-on homelessness and dealing with mental health issues and substance abuse.

Doss, 55, is part of an addiction recovery program at the Wheeler Mission Center for Women & Children, where she’s been for the last five months. She has her own apartment there and hopes to go into servant leadership training when she graduates from the program in a couple months.

“Wheeler Mission saved my life, opening these doors to me,” Doss said. “It gave me hope to get a renewal in life.”

The Center for Women & Children will be able to help more people like Doss after unveiling a \$13 million expansion Aug. 11. The expansion includes new emergency shelter beds, transitional apartments for mothers with children and additional staff.

The center will be able to nearly triple its capacity and provide the following:

- 164 new permanent beds, including 30 transitional apartments for mothers with children
- 84 new family shelter beds
- 40 new emergency shelter beds
- 15 full-time and three part-time staff members
- 50% increase in program-

ming, including counseling, job training, addiction recovery and social enterprise

- A day room for women and children to be inside
  - A new child care area
  - Indoor play space for children
  - Expanded on-site medical and mental health clinics
  - Redesigned and expanded dining areas
  - Appointment visiting rooms for people meeting with community service providers
  - Expanded education center
- “For someone like me, it means hope and encouragement,” Doss said of the upgrades.

Of the 1,928 people who were homeless during the most recent annual count in January, 621 were women, and 54% were African American. Total homelessness was up 21% from 2020.

Perry Hines, chief development officer at Wheeler Mission, said the expansion will help the organization deal with a likely uptick in homelessness after the eviction moratorium ends in October. Wheeler Mission has also worked with the city to provide hotel rooms for people experiencing homelessness, a program that will end in the next couple of weeks, Hines said.

“We needed all of it,” he said of the expansion. “This is a big deal for us.”

## Hogsett: Indianapolis is ‘extraordinarily safe’ despite rising homicides

City officials reviewed crime trends through the first half of the year and laid out their vision for public safety moving forward during an hour-long presentation Aug. 5.

Mayor Joe Hogsett, near the end of the event, said Indianapolis is an “extraordinarily safe city” when considering the city’s population — about 875,000 — versus the number of murders and other violent crime.

The presentation was four days before Hogsett went to the city-county council with his 2022 budget proposal, which includes \$295 million for Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department.

### What the numbers say

Overall violent crime was down through June 30 compared to last year, as was overall crime of any kind. Aggravated assault saw the biggest dip — from about 2,250 in 2020 to 1,250 this year — and robberies were also

down.

There was a 34% increase in criminal homicides through July 30 compared to last year. There has also been a rise in non-fatal shootings, which were up 25%, though that number is lower than it was earlier this year.

Hogsett said multiple times Indianapolis is not alone. Criminal homicides increased nationwide by an estimated 25% in 2020, according to data from the FBI, even though other crimes such as robberies and property crimes decreased.

“The fact that large cities all across the country are experiencing the exact same thing indicates to me that the scope of the problem goes beyond our borders,” Hogsett said.

### Where IMPD sees hope

Lauren Rodriguez, director of the Office of Public Health and Safety, highlighted teams of people — not all of whom are associated with IMPD — who work closely with the

to figure out how you're going to implement this climate study, and other parts of the demands from the union still need to be met, including resignations from Jackie Nytes and board President Jose Salinas. That would be a good start in getting CICF to see that we're moving in the right direction so those funds can be released."

Nytes has previously said she has no intentions of stepping down. However, she could not be reached for comment as to whether the CICF announcement changed her stance. A representative for IndyPL said the funding hold will not impact any program-

ming for 2021, and the library is evaluating the impact for 2022.

Despite efforts — including having board members go through racial equity training and the recent hiring of a diversity fellow to work in the human resources department — Payne said she hasn't seen many changes from administration to indicate they're taking the comments from staff to heart. However, she said employees are speaking out more than ever.

"Since I've been on the board, I haven't heard the voices of staff like I am hearing now," Payne said.

"That's the good thing from all of this. They're speaking out and they have the courage to do this, and all that started because of Bree and the way that she was muted and treated. I'm very happy to see and hear voices coming forth that we have never heard before. Administration is going to have to finally listen to them, one way or the other."

over the next three years to go toward modernizing the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department (IMPD) and adding 100 new officers to the force.

The funding would go toward license plate readers, 22 new civilian public safety officers to focus on non-emergency situations, a virtual training system, community cameras and mobile trailer cameras with gunshot detection. For the first time in history, however, the city will not fund any privately operated prisons, Hogsett said.

"I definitely think [the budget] will make a difference," IMPD Chief Randal Taylor said. "The only way we're going to make a difference is by joining hands and working this stuff together, and this budget is doing just that. I'm looking forward to seeing the changes it will bring."

Over the next three years, \$30 mil-

lion would be allocated for mental health services for juveniles and adults. This includes in-school mental health services and violence prevention programming, the creation of an overdose treatment center and mental health support for the Juvenile Detention Center.

"We thank the mayor for presenting a budget proposal that highlights the critical needs of our community," Councillor Maggie Lewis, D, said in a statement. "During these most uncertain times with the effects of COVID-19 still affecting many of our residents, we must all remain steadfast in our efforts to ensure the proposed budget will achieve the mayors goal of enhancing our neighborhoods, strengthening services provided by city-county government agencies and placing our city on a pathway towards economic recovery."

Hogsett said the budget, if approved, has the potential to change the lives of Indianapolis residents.

"Tonight, we have the opportunity to lead, not follow," Hogsett said. "This plan once implemented will save lives. This plan, once funded, will make our city safer."

Not everyone in the community agrees.

When the additional funding for IMPD was announced earlier this summer, Indy10 Black Lives Matter organizer Jessica Louise told members of the Public Safety and Criminal Justice Committee the policing budget should only be increased when "we have exhausted all other options to help and heal" Indianapolis.

"Pour resources into our community," Louise said, "not our cops."

While a large portion of the proposed 2022 budget would go toward violence

prevention, Hogsett also emphasized the need to address the root causes of violent crime, many of which were exacerbated by the pandemic.

With \$5.5 million slated for reentry services, including the creation of a dropout recovery high school in the Twin Aire neighborhood and the expansion of the Keys to Work program to employ 75 to 100 people, the city is hoping to increase resources and curb the unemployment rate that hit historic rates during the pandemic. Further, \$6 million would be allocated to increase food access throughout the city and \$20 million for affordable housing.

community to prevent or interrupt violent crime.

A group called Peacemakers work with IMPD officers to identify people most at risk of either committing a violent crime or being a victim and connect them to resources for support.

The Indy Public Safety Foundation funds a program for people, called interrupters, who step in when there are conflicts, whether in person or on social media. Interrupters aren't formally affiliated with law enforcement. They logged a total of 427 interruptions as of Aug. 4, according to data provided by OPHS.

IMPD Assistant Chief Chris Bailey also spoke highly of the Crime Gun Intelligence Center, which focuses on serial shooters. The unit seized 174 guns

and made 163 arrests as of July 28, according to IMPD.

"Any suggestion that our IMPD officers aren't out there working and doing the best job they can to remove violent criminals from the street is just a false narrative," Bailey said.

### Outside recommendations

The Criminal Justice Lab at New York University's School of Law, which the city partnered with in 2020, came back with recommendations that included better managing the types of calls IMPD responds to and using a more targeted approach (from 11 p.m. to 3 a.m.) to address violent crime. IMPD says it has implemented those recommendations.

The National Institute for Criminal Justice Reform recommended working with community and criminal justice partners to tailor interventions to those at the highest risk of violence since its analysis found most victims and suspects had been arrested about eight times on average by the time of the homicide.

The group also recommended IMPD enhance its weekly shooting review meetings — where the department identifies recent shootings that have a likelihood for retaliation — and do a better job of sharing information across multiple units.

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## How some Indianapolis school districts will try to remedy pandemic’s learning losses

Warren Township Superintendent Tim Hanson knows what his district has to do to recoup the learning students lost during the most disruptive months of the pandemic.

He needs more licensed teachers in Warren Township schools to work closely with students in reading and math. But he doesn’t know if he can get enough of them this year, especially for middle school math. “We just haven’t been able to identify or locate candidates,” Hanson said.

Finding math teachers has always been hard. But Hanson faces additional obstacles: the pandemic, public health uncertainties, a state teacher shortage in key areas, and Indiana’s comparatively low teacher pay.

The new school year brings huge challenges to Hanson and other superintendents. They must figure out the needs of students who missed much of last year, and devise ways to help them catch up while navigating safety protocols — and political debates — like masks and fluctuating health orders, and unknowns like enrollment and long-term funding.

Across Indianapolis, administrators are shrinking class sizes, creating more small learning groups, and hiring teachers to work with students who need help.

Warren already has added 12 interventionists to help with reading in elementary schools.

Warren Township also will resume testing three times a year to monitor student growth and progress and is working on shrinking class sizes.

The district aims to cap kindergarten at 24 students, elementary classes in the high teens or low 20s, and higher grades at 30 students.

The district is using federal funds to pay teachers per-hour to tutor after school. On last spring’s state tests only 8% of Warren Township students passed both the English and math state tests, one of the lowest rates in Marion County.

“We’re not going to be able to make up one year in one year; it’s going to take some time,” Hanson said.

Warren Township also is hiring liaisons to provide families with resources, support and district communication.

“When schools and families are working together, that increases the success for the student,” Hanson said.

Perry Township also is trying to arrange more small-group learning. The school district has tapped federal relief funds to hire 23 additional teachers to provide individual and small group instruction in schools.

Test data from last school year flagged more students who need additional help, Superintendent Pat Mapes said. That includes many students who are

just beginning to learn English — Perry Township serves the highest percentage of English learners in the city.

For those students, working in small groups is critical, Mapes said. “Most of the time, it’s trying to master literacy skills so they can understand English and start moving through coursework.”

The district will test progress monthly.

“We don’t have to wait for 10 weeks to go by, or wait for half a year to go by,” Mapes said.

Lawrence Township also is hiring family engagement liaisons to support students and boost attendance at each school, said Troy Knoderer, the district’s chief academic officer.

In Indianapolis Public Schools, Superintendent Aleesia Johnson said the district will use federal relief funds for additional staff training. The district has added 10 professional development days.

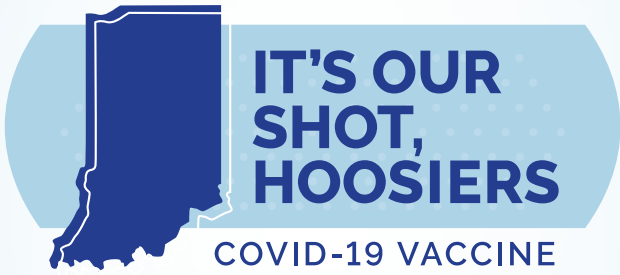
“If our teachers feel prepared and better supported to do so then we’ll see the outcomes in the instruction that students receive each day,” Johnson said.

Realizing that the federal funds expire in a few years, she said that the district is trying “to not staff in such a way that three years from now we’re facing an exacerbated fiscal cliff.”

“I’ve made my decision, and it is you, young lady, who I want to play me,” Franklin told Hudson. “Respect” follows Franklin from age 10 in 1952 to 1972. The film also showcases the talents of Forest Whitaker, Audra McDonald, Heather Headley, Mary J. Blige, Titus Burgess and Marlon Wayans.

“They want to hear you sing,” says Rev. C.L. Franklin (Forest Whitaker) to his 10-year-old daughter, Aretha (Skye Dakota Turner). And she did, eventually singing herself into 25 Grammys, a posthumously awarded Pulitzer Prize Special Citation and the history books.

How Franklin became the Queen of Soul and loved by millions is the subject of this fairly detailed and very entertaining biofilm that charts her rise from childhood to 1972 and her making of the classic, live-recorded album “Amazing Grace.” This project stars Jennifer Hudson, the singer who was handpicked by Franklin to play her. Like a queen anointing a princess, Franklin deemed: “I’ve made my decision, and it is you, young lady, who I want to play me.” That endorsement makes this “Respect” the quintessential Franklin biodrama and any others, not so much.

Detroit 1952, 10-year-old Aretha is a precocious musical prodigy lauded by her dad, C.L., loved by her grandmother (Kimberly Scott, “The Abyss”) and envied by her siblings. Years later as a young adult in the 1960s, Franklin (Hudson) tours

churches with her father, who watches her like a hawk, warding off suitors. C.L. helps his daughter land a recording contract with Columbia Records in 1960, and Franklin releases jazz/pop-orientated albums to little success. When she hooks up with hustler turned manager Ted White (Marlon Wayans), C.L. is peeved: “You are not leaving this family for that piece of trash!” Yet this is when Aretha finds her stride. She develops her own brand of soul music, which starts with the gospel/blues tinged “I Never Loved a Man,” recorded with the Muscle Shoals Rhythm Band on Atlantic records in 1967. The rest is soul music history.

Director Liesl Tommy and the film’s producers made a smart decision when they had the entire cast sing live. It’s a strategy that worked wonders for “Les Misérables,” and that directive gives the performances and recreated recording sessions an authenticity that enhances the artistry. Whitaker, Hudson, Turner and Audra MacDonald as the mother belt out songs. Titus Burgess as Reverend Dr. James Cleveland, Franklin’s musical mentor, Saycon Sengbloh as the adult sister Erma, Hailey Kilgore as sister Carolyn and Brenda Nicole Mooror as Brenda harmonize well. Their voices are heavenly, making the songs feel richer. Classics like “Dr.

Feelgood,” “Think,” “Ain’t No Way,” “Chain of Fools” and “Sweet Sweet Baby (Since You’ve Been Gone)” resonate so much the music carries the film over any rough spots.

The script by playwright-turned-screenwriter Tracey Scott Wilson doesn’t miss much in the star’s formative years: Franklin’s often strained relationship with her domineering dad, ‘tween and teenage pregnancies, White’s notorious spousal abuse and the singer’s bouts with alcoholism. The latter two plot points provide some of the film’s highest drama, moments when Aretha was scared for her life, humiliated in public and facing inner demons that put her on a path of self-destruction.

That human frailty is balanced by the exhilarating moments (recording her first hit), shows of courage (civil rights activism with MLK and supporting Angela Davis) and creative breakthroughs (watching the scenes where she arranges songs with the band is magic). The characters, large and small, are well drawn with depth and dimension. The dialogue floats safely above a soap opera-ish feel. Mom to her daughter: “Your daddy does not own your voice.”

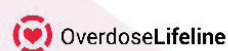
For 2 hours and 25 minutes, tight editing (Avril Beukes, “Queen Sugar”), a constant influx of historical moments, rousing concert performances, interactions with famous people (Dinah Washington played by Mary J. Blige, Clara Ward by Heather Headley and Smokey Robinson by Lodric D. Collins) and Franklin’s life journey will keep you entranced. The production design (Ina Mayhew, “Queen Sugar”) aptly recreates the ‘50s, ‘60s and ‘70s. The eye-catching clothes (Clint Ramos, “Lingua Franca”) suit the characters and the times; their only imperfection is that they often look too new, not lived in.

Most of the ensemble performances are strong, with Hudson as the anchor and her singing as her strongest asset. While her acting cannot match that of a trained thespian (Viola Davis, Angela Basset) and her accent seems to waver at times, she does convey the emotional trauma the star experienced in some very impressive scenes. Her interpretation of Franklin, when she sings, mimics her walk and gestures and displays that badass attitude captures the aura just right. Scenes in which Hudson wears an Afro wig and revels in her militant Young Gifted and Black phase are the ones when she looks most like Franklin.

Whitaker as the overbearing father who tests his daughter is appropriately irascible. Everyone who plays the sisters, young and old, sings and acts well. Marc Maron as the legendary record producer Jerry Wexler is sufficiently animated while Burgess as the musical director Rev. Cleveland shows just the right sensibility as Franklin’s emotional foundation. If there is a weak link it is Marlon Wayans as the troubled and abusive husband Ted White. His performance is tepid and shallow. A real pro, like the late Chadwick Boseman, would have taken this opportunity to turn White, a pivotal character, into a memorable, menacing persona. Wayans does not.

What’s on view is so fascinating and the storyline so involving and consequential that when the film ends at Franklin’s famous church concert, you wish there was more. This is where a traditional theatrical film format is lacking. The Queen of Soul had a life so rich and long it could fill a miniseries and still not touch all the breakthroughs, influential moments and endearing times that made her such an icon.

Still, her legacy has been captured in her records, a bio book “Respect: The Life of Aretha Franklin” and now in a film that captures her essence and dispenses it through the vocal pipes and the acting prowess of the one woman Franklin herself deemed worthy of telling her story. The entire production is reverential, but Jennifer Hudson should be particularly proud. She has done her job. She should take a bow. The Queen of Soul knew what she was doing.

“She’s really blossomed,” she said. Mackenzie can now play a couple of piano chords, something that she was not able to do with her previous piano teacher. “He gave her a challenge and made sure she met that challenge. He wants to see her do well.”

iDREAM promotes self-expression for children ages 6-18 through writing, singing and playing the piano. Youth can participate in vocal and piano lessons, song and script writing classes and an opportunity to perform with the Nap Tunes Children’s Choir.

Aisha Evans saw a shift in her daughter’s confidence after working with Peay for over a year. Ashlyn Evans, 11, used to be shy singing in front of a crowd, and now she holds her head up high and sings a little louder.

“This is something she is very passionate about,” Evans said.

The monthly tuition for the iDREAM center is \$75, however, Peay hopes to create more partnerships that will help defray the costs for members who may not be able to afford the tuition. He also plans to expand by opening more iDREAM centers throughout Indianapolis and offer choreography and dance classes for members in the future.

When people think of Indiana, the first thought is not typically fashion. Technology, health and farming — especially corn — are some of the things that come to mind before runways and intricately sewn garments.

Indiana Fashion Week (INDFW) is looking to bring fashion — and in turn the talent of local designers, stylists, producers, directors and makeup artists — to the forefront of Hoosiers’ minds.

“There’s a saying: ‘There’s more than corn in Indiana’ and there is, there’s fashion,” said INDFW show producer Temara Payton.

INDFW, hosted by nonprofit Indiana Fashion Foundation (IFF), will be Aug. 14-21 at various locations around

Indianapolis, including the Indiana State Fairgrounds and Hilbert Circle Theatre. The events will include a pop-up fashion show, photography exhibit, fashion panel and an emerging designers runway show and competition.

The purpose of the fashion week is to showcase work created by local artists and help establish Indianapolis as a viable creative economy and fashion market, said Denisha Furgeson, CEO and founder of the Indiana Fashion Foundation.

The theme for this year’s INDFW is “Connect” because IFF wants to demonstrate how fashion connects people and can be a viable link between other more established industries, such as agriculture, health care and technology.

“It’s about showing how fashion connects and creating opportunities for

those in the creative industry to actually do what they love,” Ferguson said.

The guest speakers at The Summit are Thomas Walker, co-founder for hip-hop clothing brand Cross Colours, and Chicago designer Vic Lloyd. Some of the brands participating in the design competition are Broken Needles, Neighborhood Maniacs and No Rivals. Tickets for this event are \$10 with student ID, \$20 general admission and available on [indianafashionweek.com](http://indianafashionweek.com).

Two days later, IFF will host a cocktail hour and tour of sewing facility StitchWorks at 6 p.m. Then, a panel of to-be-confirmed speakers will par-

ticipate in the Making it IN Fashion Conversation, which will be 7:30-9 p.m. at Circle City Industrial Complex and online at [indianafashionweek.com](http://indianafashionweek.com). The StitchWorks tour is invite-only, but those interested can email IFF and request an invitation. The fashion panel does not require a ticket.

The winner of the INDFW Emerging Designer Competition in 2019, Jenn Felts, and her brand Tokyo Twiggy will be featured in a trunk show 6-9 p.m. Aug. 17 at Storefront Theatre of Indianapolis. Attendees do not need a ticket and will be able to talk with Felts and purchase items from her brand, which is inspired by Japanese fashion and culture.

IFF will also host a flash mob fashion show at 7:30 p.m. Aug. 18 at the Indiana State Fair. A few models will par-

ticipate in the fair parade and then get out by the Midway arch, where more will be more waiting to strut and show off 20 outfits of “elevated fair wear,” said INDFW hair team lead Christina Lockett.

This pop-up fashion show is one way the IFF is attempting to reach new audiences and make the Indiana fashion community more well-known, Ferguson said.

“They have thousands of people that come through there,” she said. “It’s about being able to just expose those creatives to another market while also exposing that market to more fashion and glamour.”

There will also be a ticketed fashion photography exhibit 7-9 p.m. Aug. 19 at Paradox and an invite-only VIP guest welcome party for Steven Kolb, CEO for the Council of Fashion Designers of America (CFDA), CFDA connects coordinator Elliot Carlyle and fashion designer Rinat Brodach, who was in the first season of Amazon Prime show “Making the Cut,” 7-10 p.m. Aug. 20 at a private location.

On the final day of fashion week, there will be a fashion fair 12-3 p.m. on Monument Circle, and at Hilbert Circle Theatre there will be VIP lounges 5-7 p.m. and the final runway show, featuring the Emerging Designer Competition, 7-9:30 p.m.

The fashion fair will have a DJ, photo backdrops and a fashion display with 10 models wearing looks from Indiana designers pulled by Indiana stylists, such as INDFW lead stylist Raemia Higgins. The fair is free and does not require a ticket. These display looks will also be the first down the runway at the main show.

The main event of the night is the Emerging Designer Competition, in which eight Midwest designers will show a five-piece collection and be judged on criteria such as their creativity and composition. The winner of the competition will receive a \$5,000 manufacturing grant to produce some of their designs.

One of the competition’s participants is Indianapolis-based streetwear designer Monty Matuka. Matuka’s brand More Equality Less Ignorance (MELI) features sophisticated streetwear, created using more elevated fabrics such as silks and linens and tighter-fitting cuts, with many unisex articles of clothing. His five pieces for the show will be upscale everyday attire, or clothes that people can wear while in the office, running errands or going to din-

ner with family.

Another competitor and Milwaukie-based designer Stacy Hogan will be showing off her five-piece collection “Anything but Basic,” which includes classic clothes with a twist. Hogan specializes in creating plus-size designs and said she looks forward to showing off her ability to create clothes for all body types at the show.

“Sewing for individuals with multiple different sizes is one of the things I take pride in,” she said. “There’s not an individual that I haven’t been able to design a look for.”

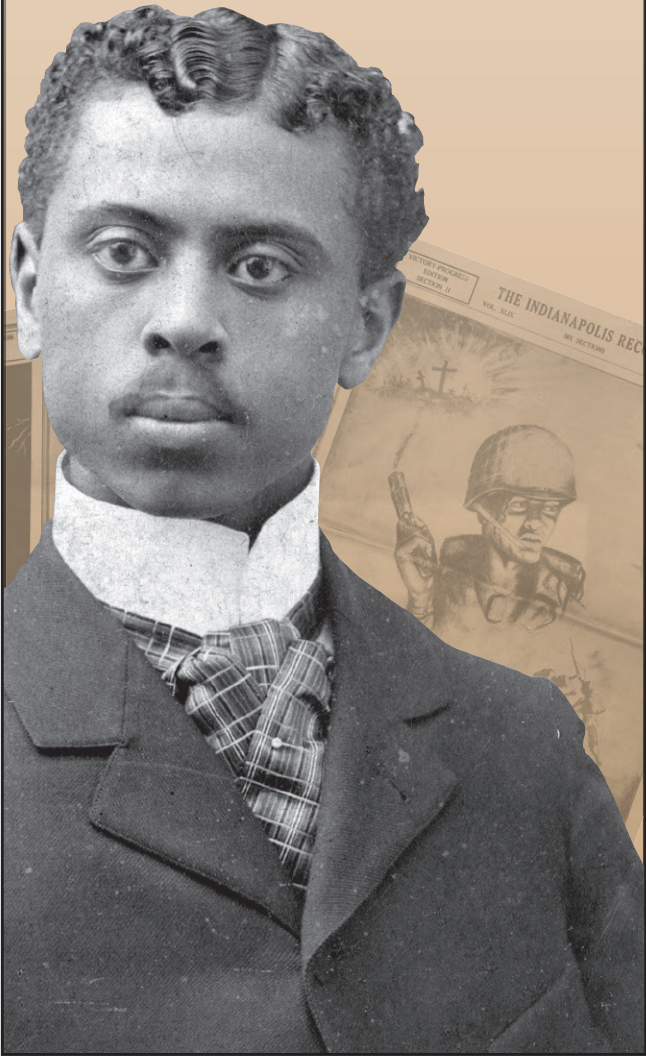

‘A great month to be Black’

I used to think of February as the blackest month of the year. It’s the month set aside to honor and celebrate Black history in all facets. Sure, June, aka Black Music Month, celebrates our contributions to what is known as a universal language, but it’s not as all-encompassing as

February.

However, August is giving February a run for its money. This month is Black Business Month, Black Philanthropy Month and Black August. August is Black, y’all.

I acknowledge, celebrate and honor my culture, 24/7, 365, but it’s always good to take time to pause and make deliberate decisions for collective uplift. And collective uplift is what it’s all about. Try to support your business on a rugged individualism or pull-yourself-up-by-your-bootstraps mentality and see how long your business lasts. You have to have customers — support — to make your business a success. Wouldn’t it be great if each of us were our own little island and didn’t need other people to survive? Maybe, but that’s not how it’s set up.

I vividly remember my “Each one teach one” blue T-shirt with the white letters making a circle. I understood the significance of the words then, but today I understand on a deeper level. Some of us like to fool

ourselves and think we made it all alone, but I guarantee there are parents, teachers, mentors, coaches, friends, family — someone — supporting each of us in our endeavors toward greatness. Heck, even your doubters give you fuel to push yourself. While a nifty slogan, “each one teach one” is about collective uplift and that’s what August is about for Black people.

Black Business Month reminds us to spend our dollars with Black businesses. We know our businesses often have less capital and access to less capital, were hit hard by the COVID-19 pandemic, and many didn’t receive a Payroll Protection Program loan or a smaller amount than other businesses. The call to support our businesses became even more acute in 2020, and we haven’t let up. I continue to see people purposely searching for Black-owned businesses from doctors to party planners.

Black Philanthropy Month celebrates our culture of giving dating back to Africa. What I love about Black Philanthropy Month is it makes us aware of how generous of a people we are. It’s the affirmation we need to defend against the negative messages that come with being Black. This year’s theme is “TENacity: Making Equity Real” as Black Philanthropy Month celebrates its 10th year in existence. Philanthropy is often viewed through the narrow scope of monetary donations. However, philanthropy is giving of your time and talent not just your treasure, and Black people have a long history of giving of their time, talent and treasure. Donating money is vital, but that’s

not the only way to give. Sometimes, and for people who’ve often had limited resources, giving of time and talent was the only way to give. I’m reminded of the “aunties” and grandmothers who take on children who need a home or cook enough to feed the neighborhood.

Black August pays tribute to our resistance — our collective strength, revolutionaries, freedom fighters, political prisoners and our continued fight for our humanity. Black August began in San Quentin State Prison in California in 1979 to honor fallen members of the Black liberation movement. It’s interesting to note many important events for Black people happened in the month of August: enslaved Africans brought to Jamestown, 1619; the start of the Haitian Revolution, 1791; Nat Turner’s rebellion, 1831; and Watts rebellion, 1965, to name a few.

Black August reminds me that while the fight isn’t over, so much of the heavy lifting was done by those who came before me. So many of our ancestors bore the brunt of the abuse of white supremacy so we could live a better life. I won’t squander it, and that’s why patronizing Black-owned businesses, and donating our time, talent or treasure (or all three) to each other is the very least we can do this month.

February is a time of reflection, but let’s make August a time of action. Let’s make it a great month to be Black.

Boycotting Olympic athletes

The former Soviet Union invaded Afghanistan in December 1979. A few months later, at the urging of then-President Jimmy Carter and the Congress, the U.S. Olympic Committee

boycotted the 1980 Summer Olympics in Moscow. Four years later, the Soviet Union retaliated by barring its athletes from competing in the Summer Olympics in Los Angeles. (In an ironic twist of history, Afghanistan sent athletes to the 1980 Games — but boycotted the 1984 Games.)

As a young child at the time, I didn’t comprehend the complex geopolitical machinations that prompted the boycotts. I did, however, understand that Americans supported our Olympic athletes no matter what. Sort of. OK, not really.

Years later, I learned the history behind the iconic “Black Power” salute that Tommie Smith and John Carlos gave during the 1968 Summer Olympics in Mexico City. (Interestingly, the other man on the podium that day, Australia’s

Peter Norman, joined the Americans in wearing a human rights badge on his uniform.) Smith and Carlos were forced to leave the Olympic village. They were also vilified in their home country by the media and by most white Americans.

Even the International Olympic Committee, which was headed by an American, took umbrage. A statement from the IOC said that the action that the athletes took was “a deliberate and violent breach of the fundamental principles of the Olympic spirit” (emphasis added). It goes without saying that the violence against which the two men protested was ... actual violence.

Smith summarized the controversy perfectly when he said, “If I win, I am American, not a black American. But if I did something bad, then they would say I am a Negro. We are black and we are proud of being black. Black America will understand what we did tonight.” In the wake of Dr. King’s assassination just six months earlier, Black America very much understood what Smith and Carlos did.

It is nearly impossible to separate race from the equation even when it is less obvious. For example, the legendary Carl Lewis was heavily criticized for — get this — running around the

track with a U.S. flag after winning the 100-meter race at the Olympics. Yes, this actually happened in 1984. (Remember, that was the year that the former Soviet Union boycotted the Games, so “nationalism” was at a fever pitch.) Several other Olympic athletes had done so, including Caitlyn Jenner, who won the Olympic decathlon (as Bruce Jenner) in 1976. Admittedly, Lewis wasn’t the most likable sports star. Still, he was lambasted for being a patriotic American. At the Olympics. In America.

Given this background, there is little surprise that Gwen Berry (whom I referenced in a prior column), the U.S. women’s soccer team and the U.S. men’s basketball team — among other current Olympians — have been targets of heavy criticism from right-wing Americans. (Many of these “patriots” find common cause with the Jan. 6 insurrectionists.) The athletes’ “crime” is that they have expressed solidarity with marginalized people.

I began to ponder why so many people are so upset. I mean, how does someone who calls himself or herself an American vociferously root against Americans who are competing on behalf of their country? Can you imagine what the reaction would have been if, for example, Blacks had rooted against the “miracle

on ice” U.S. hockey team in 1980 — for any reason whatsoever?

Critics argue that there should be no politics during the Olympics. Yet, no one who knows the history of the modern Games (which most people agree began in Greece in 1896) would argue that they have been free from politics. Not in 1896. Not in 1936. Not in 1972. Not in 2008. Not even when the Games were canceled in 1916, 1940 and 1944. (Incidentally, Australia, Britain, France and Greece are the only countries to have participated in every Olympics since 1896.)

Further, it is cynical and immoral to castigate those who stand up — or take a knee — for others. One does not (or, at least, should not) shed one’s humanity when one puts on an Olympic uniform. These athletes are not decrying American ideals. On the contrary, they are demonstrating the highest regard for the ideals that most Americans profess. Indeed, these brave athletes are protesting the denial of the full fruits of being an American to some of our citizens. Their compassion is worth its weight in gold.

Coming back to America

I was recently asked what it’s like to be me. The pat answer I give is fantastic. However, the person asking the question wanted more specifics. They wanted to know what it was like for me to hold the opinions I do and be Black at the same time. To be honest, I really had to give that some thought because the views I have I’ve pretty much had all

my adult life.

Being an Army brat and spending my formative years in Europe, I never had to deal with race as a significant day-to-day issue until I returned to the United States. This isn’t to say before then that I was colorblind; it was undeniable I was Black, but when your neighbors are white, Asian, Latino, German, French, Dutch, etc., you’re just another part of the stew, and you go on about your business.

It was returning to America to finish college where I got my first real taste of an attitude that I person-

ally found offensive and, in my opinion, was more detrimental than any racism white people could perpetuate.

I was attending Northern Illinois University to finish up my degree in broadcasting and journalism. I decided to join a social organization called B.R.O.T.H.E.R.S., a group of young Black men dedicated to working with other Black college students who had trouble adjusting to college life. I thought to myself, “It seems like a noble goal.” Also, with many NIU Black students, they were the first ones in their families to attend college, so there was a lot of pressure on them. So when I went to the orientation meeting and introduced myself, everyone was happy to hear there was an “Abdul” in the group. That didn’t last long, though. The head B.R.O.T.H.E.R. began to speak, and after welcoming everyone, he said, “You know they don’t want you here. They just want your money, and then they will kick you out. The only way you can beat them is with us.”

It took me five seconds to figure out who they were because this college-educated young man sounded like my uncle, who found it easier to explore conspir-

acy theories that kept the Black people down than the classifieds. After the head B.R.O.T.H.E.R. gave his speech, I asked a simple question: “Are you for real?” He said, “Yes.” I told him he was doing more harm than good. I told him these kids have enough pressure on them and don’t need someone who looks like them making it worse. I then picked up my backpack and left. As I walked out the door, someone said that brother is lost.

I wasn’t lost; I just found my sanity. Over the next 25 years, I would run into many people who remind me of that head B.R.O.T.H.E.R. I’ve run into them in both graduate school and law school. I’ve run into them as a reporter and commentator. I’ve run into them in politics. I’ve run into them as an educator. And I run into them at family events. At the end of the day, their only mission in life is to justify their own existence by scaring other people into thinking they are necessary.

My attitude has always been when people started “talking crazy,” someone had to call them out. As a grown-up 25 years later, it’s a strategy that still works, although I’m not as brazen as I was at 25.

There is too much at stake to just simply walk away. So, as long as I have a forum, radio, television, print, internet to express my opinions and call out the nonsense, I will. It’s the right thing to do; it provides a counterbalance to the crap being pushed on people, and to be honest, it’s actually a lot of fun.

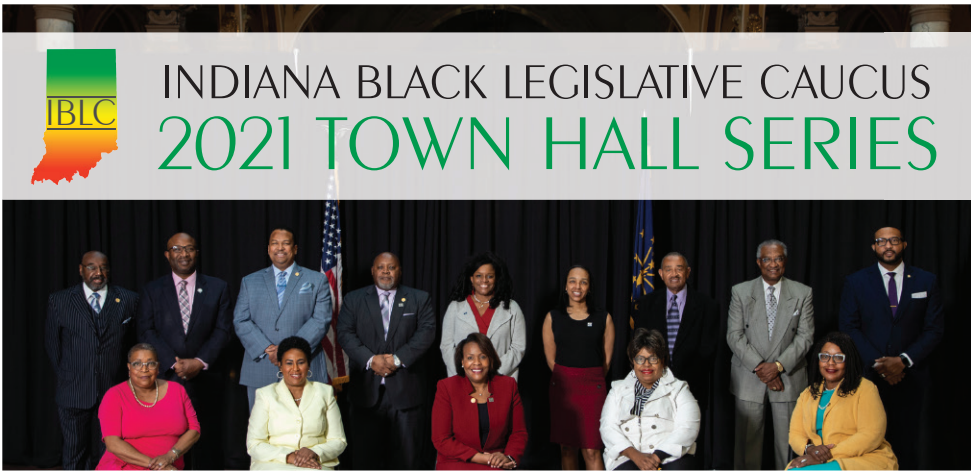

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## US turns to social media influencers to boost vaccine rates

DENVER (AP) — As a police sergeant in a rural town, Carlos Cornejo isn't the prototypical social media influencer. But his Spanish-language Facebook page with 650,000 followers was exactly what Colorado leaders were looking for as they recruited residents to try to persuade the most vaccine-hesitant.

Cornejo, 32, is one of dozens of influencers, ranging from busy moms and fashion bloggers to African refugee advocates and religious leaders, getting paid by the state to post vaccine information on a local level in hopes of stunting a troubling summer surge of COVID-19.

Colorado's #PowertheComeback target audience is especially tailored to Latino, Black, Native American, Asian and other communities of color that historically have been underserved when it comes to health care and are the focus of agencies trying to raise vaccination rates.

It's part of a growing U.S. state- and city-based movement using local social media influencers to reach the most vaccine-hesitant at a neighborhood level. Health authorities in Chicago, Oklahoma City, San Jose, California, New Jersey and elsewhere are running similar campaigns.

The effort comes after Colorado and other states have tried lotteries, college scholarships and other incentives to boost slumping vaccination rates as the highly contagious delta virus variant sweeps the nation.

Cornejo's Facebook page has become a widely trusted source of information about what the police do — and cannot do — for Latinos in the Colorado River Valley.

"It started last year when I saw misinformation that directly affected our department, rumors like police were arresting people without a mask," said Cornejo, a 10-year veteran with the Rifle Police Department. "Or that people get magnetized when they're

vaccinated. Sometimes people are just plain scared. I give them fact-based information, nothing political about it, so they can make an informed decision."

Whether the social media push will move the needle with America's unvaccinated remains to be seen.

The country last week reached the milestone of having at least one dose in 70% of adults. It came a month after President Joe Biden's target date, even though most can easily get the shots in the U.S. unlike other countries where they're in short supply.

"I'm highly skeptical you can get enough appeal to the remaining 30% of adults who after all this time have not gotten the vaccine — it's a lot to ask of an influencer," said Jeff Niederdeppe, director of Cornell University's Health Communication Research Initiative and co-director of The Cornell Center for Health Equity.

More likely to tip the scales is an increase in private companies and organizations requiring vaccinations

of employees and patrons, he said.

In Colorado, the state pays citizen influencers up to \$1,000 a month for their work on Instagram, TikTok, Snapchat, Facebook and other platforms. The influencers post about their own vaccine experiences, dispel myths and misinformation, alert followers to pop-up vaccine clinics and direct them to information provided by state health authorities.

Abena Antwiwaa, a 29-year-old fashion blogger in Aurora, wrote about her nerve-racking decision to get vaccinated on Instagram. Born with sickle cell anemia, Antwiwaa needs monthly blood transfusions. She worried about her low immunity and potential side effects.

"I was so nervous about getting vaccinated, and I shared that experience," said Antwiwaa, who suffered nothing more than a temporarily sore arm. "It resonated with a lot of people."

Save one: a vaccine skeptic who engaged Antwiwaa on safety concerns. Eventually, after a bit of back-and-

forth, he got the shot.

"That made all the difference to me," Antwiwaa said of agreeing to do the campaign.

This is what marketing firms like Denver-based The Idea Marketing, California-based Xomad and Chicago-based Res Publica Group want to see. They're hired by health agencies to identify local influencers and coordinate messaging.

Xomad has developed a platform where influencers, content creators and health officials can rapidly fine-tune or change messaging to respond to events such as last spring's pause in the use of Johnson & Johnson vaccines, new online misinformation or an expansion of age groups eligible for shots.

Rob Perry, Xomad's CEO and founder, notes that a July study by the Knight Foundation and the city of San Jose found a direct correlation between a flurry of local influencer posts on Instagram and higher daily vaccination rates.

"Even in Silicon Valley they needed

An anti-stigma campaign launched by the Marion County Public Health Department in May continues its effort to bring a message of hope and encouragement to people who are struggling with substance use disorder (SUD).

"You're Worth It" addresses the guilt, shame and self-doubt of those in the community who are struggling with SUD and empowers them to seek help.

Campaign video and print ads feature Kristy and Phil who are in recovery from SUD and are currently working as peer recovery coaches. The campaign is aimed at adults ages 18 and older with empowering messages to uplift those struggling with SUD by telling them they are worth it, no matter how times they have sought help in the past.

"You're Worth It" is currently scheduled to run through the end of August.

Resources developed as part of the campaign are available at MarionHealth.org/WorthIt, including information on getting help now, how those still considering treatment can stay safe, and additional resources for family and friends.

The campaign also hopes to inspire individuals who have found recovery to share their story using #YOUREWORTHIT to help inspire hope through social media platforms.

"Recognizing that you need help and taking the first step to get connected to resources is a difficult decision for anyone dealing with substance use disorder, whether it's the first time or it's the hundredth time," said Virginia A. Caine, M.D., director and chief medical officer of the Marion County Public Health Department. "We must stand together with loved ones and neighbors in our community to let them know they are important and to help them take that first step toward a healthier life."

Data to Action Grant coordinator and epidemiology manager at the health department, added, "This campaign is an important feature of our overall response to substance use disorder and overdoses in our community. We are working with our partners to offer a variety of services to assist those that need help with addiction and to maintain recovery. Without people taking that first step to seek out help, our efforts cannot bear fruit."

Special thanks are offered for the support and input of the INSTEP Consumer Advisory Group which is made up of people with lived experience with substance use disorder. The group provided valuable feedback for the types of messages it thought would be most impactful for those currently struggling with substance use disorder.

"You're Worth It" is funded by National Association of County and City Health Officials' Implementing Overdose Prevention Strategies at the Local Level (IOPSL), and Overdose Data to Action grants from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

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Faith leaders pray, fast to curb violence

There’s a lot of ideas on how to curb violent crime in Indianapolis. Among them: changing the budget for the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department (IMPD), creating grassroots organizations and getting children into after-school programs.

Local faith leaders say we need a divine intervention.

At a gathering on Monument Circle on Aug. 5, a handful of pastors, led by Pastor Clyde Posley of Antioch Baptist Church, shared prayers for Indianapolis and announced a seven-week fast.

Posley said while policing and grassroots efforts are important, prayer has to be at the helm of any anti-violence work.

“This is not meant to replace the efforts of the police or the mayor,” Posley said. “... Making Indianapolis a safer place will require God to help us tackle the evil forces in our city.”

Last year, Indianapolis had a record number of homicides, with 214 people being killed. As of Aug. 5, 2021, there have been 156 people killed in the city.

Throughout the fast, which requires those physically able to fast every Thursday for 24 hours, Posley asked participants to pray for five things:

- The power of God to cast out/release the city from the evil spiritual forces perpetuating gun violence and violent crime in Indy
- Unity among city leaders, faith leaders, IMPD and elected officials in the ongoing battle for a safer Indianapolis
- Wisdom to implement the specific violence reduction programs and approaches that are most effective
- A resurgence of public confidence in God and His voice throughout Indy
- Restoration of Godly family structure/values/principles and community commitment to youth and next generation development

Charles Ware, founder of Grace Relations at the College of Biblical Studies, said this season of fasting and prayer is a call for unity among Indianapolis residents and pleaded with Hoosiers to “cry out to God” and ask for direction.


“Tell us what you want us to do,” Ware said in a prayer. “... We’re weak, we’re confused. We need a divine intervention.”

Reengaging the vision of Black freedom during Black August 2021

The World Conference against Racism, Racial Discrimination, Xenophobia and Related Intolerance was held in Durban, South Africa, from Aug. 31 to Sept. 7, 2001. The vision of the conference was global engagement in a broad anti-racism agenda for the first time in the post-apartheid era. The conference’s objectives were (1) to produce a declaration that recognized the damage caused by past expressions of racism and that reflected a new global awareness of modern forms of racism and xenophobia, (2) to agree on a strong practical program of action, and (3) to forge an alliance between governments and civil society that would carry the fight against racism forward. This conference produced the Durban Declaration and Programme of Action, which eventually led to the International Decade in Solidarity with People of African Descent, adopted by the United Nations in 2013 for the 10-year span of 2015-2024.

During Black August 2021, we commemorate the 20-year anniversary of that historic global conference and continue the decade of solidarity that arose from it. We also advocate for a permanent Forum on People of African Descent, which was mandated by the UN General Assembly in 2014 but has not yet been established. This season brings another opportunity to embrace the sacred value of freedom — including freedom from racism, hunger, mass incarceration and over-policing. It is an opportunity to recognize, yet again, the disproportionate



prevalence of poor maternal and child health and nutrition in Pan-African communities in the United States and around the world. This moment invites all people to join in solidarity for Black freedoms and for Black liberation from the damaging legacy of racism. And this moment invites all people to remember the ancestors who advocated for freedom and liberation.

This month, we are mindful of the loss of Haitian President Jovenel Moïse, and we remember the enslaved people of African descent in Haiti who resisted their enslavement and led the freedom struggle. The Haitian Revolution, from 1791 to 1804, established the second modern independent nation in the Americas — although the United States would not officially recognize Haitian independence until 1862, just before the Emancipation Proclamation.

Bread for the World is an advocate for Black freedom from hunger, past and present. 

## Explainer: Will we need vaccine passports to do fun things?

NEWPORT, R.I. (AP) — Ready to go out on the town before summer ends? In parts of the U.S., you might have to carry your COVID-19 vaccine card or a digital copy to get into restaurants, bars, nightclubs and outdoor music festivals.

After resisting the divisive concept of vaccine passports through most of the pandemic, a fast-growing number of private venues and some local officials are now requiring proof of immunization in public settings to reduce the spread of the highly transmissible delta variant of the coronavirus — and to assuage wary customers.

It's unlikely the U.S. will adopt a national mandate like the one in France, which began requiring people to show a QR code proving they have a special virus pass before they can enjoy restaurants and cafes or travel across the country.

But enough venues are starting to ask for digital passes to worry some privacy advocates, who fear the trend could habituate consumers to constant tracking.

### WHO'S ASKING FOR VACCINE PASSPORTS?

New York City set the tone last week when Mayor Bill de Blasio announced that the city will soon require proof of COVID-19 vaccination for anyone who wants to dine indoors at a restaurant, see a performance or go to the gym.

But a growing number of private venues, from Broadway theaters to music clubs in Minneapolis and Milwaukee, have established their own similar rules for patrons.

"I'm a firm believer in the right for people to choose whether or not they get the vaccine," said Tami Montgomery, owner of Dru's Bar in Memphis, Tennessee, which will soon start asking for paper vaccine cards along with photo identification. "But it's my business and I have to make decisions based on what will protect my staff,

business and customers."

Only in a handful of states — Texas and Florida are the biggest — are private businesses prohibited from requiring proof of vaccination.

### HOW DO THEY WORK?

In some places, venues are simply asking you to bring your vaccination card — the same piece of paper you get from health providers and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Taking a picture of that card at home and then showing the image to the bouncer at the club can also work.

New York City offers a streamlined way of showing a photo through its NYC COVID Safe App, in which people can store images of their vaccine cards and then display them in the app when needed.

Other places are encouraging people to register their credentials using a scannable digital pass like New York's statewide Excelsior Pass or similar systems adopted by California, Hawaii and Louisiana and private companies like Walmart and the airport security app Clear.

Such passes are designed for convenience and to prevent fraud. But that's also where the biggest privacy concerns emerge, said Adam Schwartz, senior staff attorney at the Electronic Frontier Foundation.

### WHAT'S WRONG WITH QR CODES?

The barcode known as a QR code was originally designed to help track products in a factory. These days, it's increasingly being used to track people.

"Those systems are a giant leap towards tracking people's location," Schwartz said. "There's a very real risk of mission creep once there are scanners at doors and people are showing their scannable token to pass through."

But the coalition that helped create the Smart Health Card framework used by New York, California and the Canadian province of Quebec say they've already set privacy safeguards to guard against misuse of health data.

So long as a venue is using a VCI-compliant scanner, there shouldn't be anything to worry about, said Dr. Brian Anderson, chief digital health physician at MITRE and co-lead of the Vaccination Credential Initiative, which counts Apple, Microsoft and the Mayo Clinic among its members. "That app won't store an individual's data beyond the time that the QR code is scanned," he said.

help reaching the immigrant, Black, Latino and Vietnamese communities,” Perry said. “No one’s bashing anti-vaxxers over the head. The last thing these trusted messengers want to do is polarize their followers. It’s their followers’ choice.”

Health officials say so-called “nano” and “micro” influencers, with fewer than 10,000 and 100,000 followers, respectively, are well-positioned to reach Generation Z and Millennials who get their news from social media.

The Oklahoma City County Health Department debuted the approach in late 2020, hiring Xomad to recruit local influencers to suggest ways their followers could celebrate stay-at-home holidays, agency spokeswoman Molly Fleming said. The campaign changed with the rollout of vaccines and could change again with the advent of booster shots, as well as with non-COVID-19 issues such as a recent uptick in syphilis cases, she said.

One Oklahoma influencer is Pandora Marie, a 40-year-old street dancer and artist of Chicana, Chickasaw and Choctaw descent who has built a 30,000-strong Instagram following. She infuses her messaging with references to Native American culture and dance.

“When I started to share the COVID posts, I had people asking questions, which is always a good sign,” Marie said.

Fleming acknowledged it’s hard to measure how many vaccinations

among 18- to 29-year-olds and minorities the strategy delivers.

But officials can see residents’ interactions with posts, “and when you’re spending public health dollars, that’s important,” she said. “If we pay for a billboard, we don’t know if you’ve seen it or if it changed your life at all.”

In Chicago, Cook County Health has worked with influencers such as McKinley Nelson, a young activist who uses basketball and entertainment to protect inner city youth from street violence. Its #MyShot campaign encourages 18- to 34-year-olds in Black and Hispanic communities to seek out vaccine information.

Soon to be called Life is Better Vaxxed, the campaign is one element in a multilayered communications strategy that includes vaccine information ads at gas stations and barber shops, and on coasters in bars, said Cook County Health spokeswoman Caryn Stan-cik.

“The mission, as it always has been for us, is equity,” Stancik said. “Our digital strategy targets individual neighborhoods and zip codes, and in these communities we layer in as many strategies as we can to help get people vaccinated and address misinformation.”

It appears to be helping, she said. “I don’t want to say this alone will work,” Stancik said. “But people are coming to hundreds of pop-up local clinics based on digital word of mouth, so the information is resonating.”

## James' unique style took him on Hall of Fame journey

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Edgerrin James took pride in exceeding his standards — and ignoring everyone else's.

It made him a perfect complementary piece to Peyton Manning and Marvin Harrison in Indianapolis.

The man drafted fourth overall in 1999 — ahead of Heisman Trophy winner Ricky Williams and as the hand-picked replacement for Marshall Faulk — carved out his own Hall of Fame career with a gritty work ethic, a free-wheeling personality and a commitment to stay true to his roots.

“I figured out you could still be yourself and accomplish what you wanted to do,” he said recently while preparing to finally give his

induction speech after a year-long delay due to the COVID-19 pandemic. “I didn't have to put on a silly face or a hat, I found that you could be successful and still be yourself.”

When he arrived in Indy, many weren't sure what to make of the guy with dreadlocks and gold teeth — or how he would be fit in the locker room.

Harrison was a quiet perfectionist. Manning was the vocal, unwavering leader. James, meanwhile, dropped light-hearted one-liners almost on command, bringing laughter to a locker room full of focused, emerging stars.

James once said he hoped to be a tourist when his playing days ended and later downplayed his absence from offseason voluntary workouts by explaining he understood the difference between voluntary and mandatory.

But football was James' top priority and nothing deterred him from improving his craft.

“As long as he was a good player or a good teammate, I didn't care how he came across to the media,” said Hall of Fame executive Bill Polian, who drafted James. “I cared about how he did his job and he always did his job. He did it in incredible fashion.”

In 11 seasons with the Colts, Arizona Cardinals and Seattle Seahawks, James logged 3,028 carries and 12,246 yards. He caught 433 passes for 3,364 yards receiving and scored 91 career touchdowns, tied for No. 31 overall. He won two league rushing titles, the 1999 NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year Award, was a two-time All-Pro, a four-time Pro Bowler and a member of the NFL 2000s All-Decade Team.

While he never played in a Super Bowl with the Colts, he was part of Arizona's 2008 NFC championship team. Colts owner Jim Irsay sent James a ring from Indy's Super Bowl-winning 2006 team — after the third member of Indy's vaunted triplets left in free agency following the 2005 season.

“You respect it and appreciate it because they didn't have to do that,” James said. “I was still part of the team. It was just business and you go about your business. As far as the Colts, that's home. They're the one that brought me in and to me it's still home.”

The circus-like catches and nifty runs made the highlights, but James contributed in less noticeable ways, too.

He took the lessons he learned in Immokalee, Florida, and combined them with the pass-blocking sessions he attended at the University of Miami and became one of the league's best protectors.

James' long journey began at the local public high school where the powerhouse Hurricanes found him. At Miami, he primarily shared carries until his breakthrough moment in early December 1998: 39 attempts, 299 yards and the winning score in an upset of No. 3 UCLA.

Suddenly, James was ascending on NFL draft boards and making impressions.

“He was special from the beginning,” said Irsay. “It's not what they say or even how they say it or how they look or how they dress. It's that feeling you get when you're in a room with someone like that, a special person who is going to do special things.”

After going 3-13 in 1997 and 1998, Polian figured with three quarterbacks slotted ahead of the Colts in the draft it gave him a chance to trade the disgruntled Faulk, select his replacement and collect additional picks.

Most expected the Colts to take Williams or trade the pick to New Orleans for all six of its selections. Instead, Polian threw a curveball by selecting James.

“He had superior acceleration in the hole, superior ability to block, superior ability in the passing game to run routes and make people miss,” Polian said. “I thought Ricky was more of a downhill power runner and didn't fit what we did necessarily.”

Irate Colts fans threatened to boycott the team. A 20-day holdout that Polian thought might set back James' progression didn't help. James didn't care.

He stayed in shape and in contact with Manning and opened the regular season with back-to-back 100-yard games. James finished the season with a league-high 1,553 yards rushing as the Colts capped a record-breaking single-season 10-win turnaround with a playoff trip.

## Sharife Cooper's late 3 lifts Hawks to 84-83 win over Pacers

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Sharife Cooper made a go-ahead, 3-pointer just before the buzzer that lifted the Atlanta Hawks to an 84-83 win over the Indiana Pacers in the NBA Summer League on Aug. 10.

Cooper scored 21 points — making 5-of-8 3-pointers — and had nine assists. Atlanta drafted the 6-foot-1, 180-pound guard with the No. 48 overall pick after he entered the draft following his freshman season at Auburn.

Jalen Johnson, drafted No. 20 overall from Duke, had 18 points and 10 rebounds for the Hawks. Atlanta's Skylar Mays, a second-round pick last year, scored 16 points.

Chris Duarte, selected No. 13 out of Oregon, led Indiana with 21 points and seven rebounds. Second-year pro Cassius Stanley scored 14 points, third-year pro Oshae Brissett had 13 points and Isaiah Jackson, taken with the No. 22 pick, added 13 points.

Cooper's game-winning shot from the corner, in front of the Pacers' bench, was the eighth lead change in the fourth quarter.

**CELTICS 107, NUGGETS 82**

Aaron Nesmith scored 33 points and made 7-of-9 3-pointers while Payton Pritchard had 21 points, 12 assists and eight rebounds to help the Boston

Celtics rout the Denver Nuggets.

Nesmith, drafted No. 14 overall last year, had 11 points in the first quarter as the Celtics jumped out to a 31-25 lead. Pritchard, who is also in his second year, and third-year pro Carsen Edwards were in double figures in the first half to help Boston lead by 20 points at half-time after shooting 62%.

Bol Bol, son of former NBA player Manute Bol, led the Nuggets with 26 points and nine rebounds. He is trying to make the most of his opportunity in Las Vegas after playing sparingly in his first two NBA seasons.

Denver's Nah'Shon “Bones” Hyland, drafted No. 26 overall, scored 16 points and Davon Reed added 10 points in his hopes of making it back to the league. Reed was not in the NBA the previous two seasons after appearing in 31 games over two seasons with Phoenix and Indiana.

**BULLS 92, SPURS 89**

Patrick Williams, drafted fourth overall last year, scored 30 and second-round pick Marko Simonovic had 13 points to help the Chicago Bulls earn a comeback win over the San Antonio Spurs.

San Antonio outscored Chicago 26-14 in the first quarter and led by 15 points at halftime. The Bulls went on a run early in the fourth quarter to take the lead

and held on for the victory.

Second-year pro Tre Jones had 23 points and rookie Joe Wieskamp scored 11 points for the Spurs. Jaylen Morris scored 20 and Malik Newman had 19 points for the Spurs, who are giving both players another chance to play in the NBA.

**ROCKETS 111, PISTONS 91**

In a featured showdown between the No. 1 and No. 2 picks, it was Jalen Green who received more offensive help from his teammates in Houston's win over Detroit.

Green, the second overall pick who bypassed college basketball to play in the G League, scored 25 points in 30 minutes — going 6 of 11 from the field and 10 of 11 on free throws. His third and final 3-pointer gave the Rockets an 18-point lead with two minutes left.

Josh Christopher, the No. 24 selection out of Arizona State, helped Green run the Houston offense with 15 points and seven assists. Turkey's Alperen Senogun, the No. 16 pick, controlled the paint for Houston with 21 points, eight rebounds and three blocks.

Cade Cunningham, the No. 1 pick after spending one season at Oklahoma State, was 8 of 18 from the field for 20 points to lead Detroit. Luka Garza, Iowa's high-scoring big man, added 15

points.

**KINGS 89, WIZARDS 75**

Louis King led six Sacramento players in double figures with 16 points and four 3-pointers.

Davion Mitchell, the No. 9 pick who was pivotal during Baylor's championship run, was 5 of 8 from the field to add 12 points for the Kings.

Sacramento made 14 3-pointers and Washington turned it over 21 times.

Caleb Homesley led Washington with 17 points and Corey Kispert, the No. 15 pick from runner-up Gonzaga, was held to eight points in his debut.

NBA Finals MVP Giannis Antetokounmpo sat courtside with siblings Thanasis and Kostas to support their brother Alex, who entered late in the fourth quarter for Sacramento.

**TRAIL BLAZERS 86, CLIPPERS 66**

Kobi Simmons, from the 2017 draft, led Portland with 15 points and Emmanuel Mudiay, the No. 7 pick in 2015, added 14 in a blowout victory.

Antonio Blakeney, who scored 27 in Portland's opener on Aug. 8, and George King each scored 12 points.

Jay Scrubb had 15 points and 10 rebounds for Los Angeles, and Daniel Oturu added 11 points and 13 boards. The Clippers shot 24 of 88 (27.3%) from the field.
