Here's what Indiana's proposed legislative and congressional maps look like

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Indiana's legislative and congressional district maps are poised to be among the most gerrymandered in the country now that the redistricting process is nearing the end. Allegations of gerrymandering — or manipulating district boundaries to favor one political party over another — are often leveled against Republicans, especially in red states such as Indiana, though Democrats have been accused of doing the same in states such as Maryland. Either way, in Indiana, where

Republicans have supermajorities in the House of Representatives and Senate, redistricting is a one-sided affair that leaves Democrats and their voters clamoring for fairness. The Senate will vote on redistricting legislation Oct. 1, and Gov. Eric Holcomb is expected to sign the bill into law shortly after. The House approved the legislation earlier. Here's what each proposed map looks like.

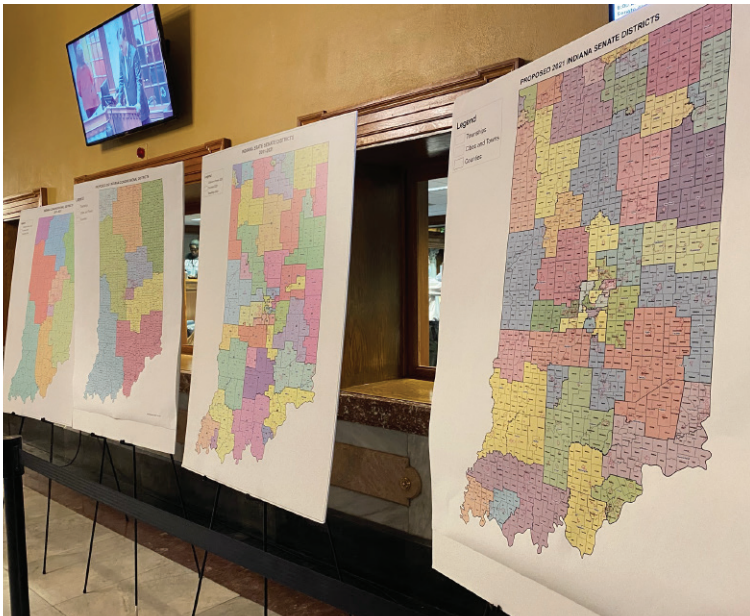
Redistricting process nears finish line

Indiana will likely become one of the first states in the country to pass new legislative and congressional district maps as legislation nears the finish line in the state Senate before going to Gov. Eric Holcomb's desk. The Senate Elections Committee approved the maps Sept. 28, one day after Democrats and others continued to accuse Republicans during a committee hearing of using an unfair, secretive process to draw maps. The House of Representatives already passed the redistricting legislation the week prior. The full Senate is expected to vote Oct. 1; Holcomb will have to sign the bill into law or veto it. The House will need to concur with an amendment the Senate Elections Committee added. The amended Senate map gets rid of majority-minority districts in Marion County that were included in Republicans'

tee hearing of using an unfair, secretive process to draw maps. The House of Representatives already passed the redistricting legislation the week prior. The full Senate is expected to vote Oct. 1; Holcomb will have to sign the bill into law or veto it. The House will need to concur with an amendment the Senate Elections Committee added. Lori S. White Inauguration of new DePauw president

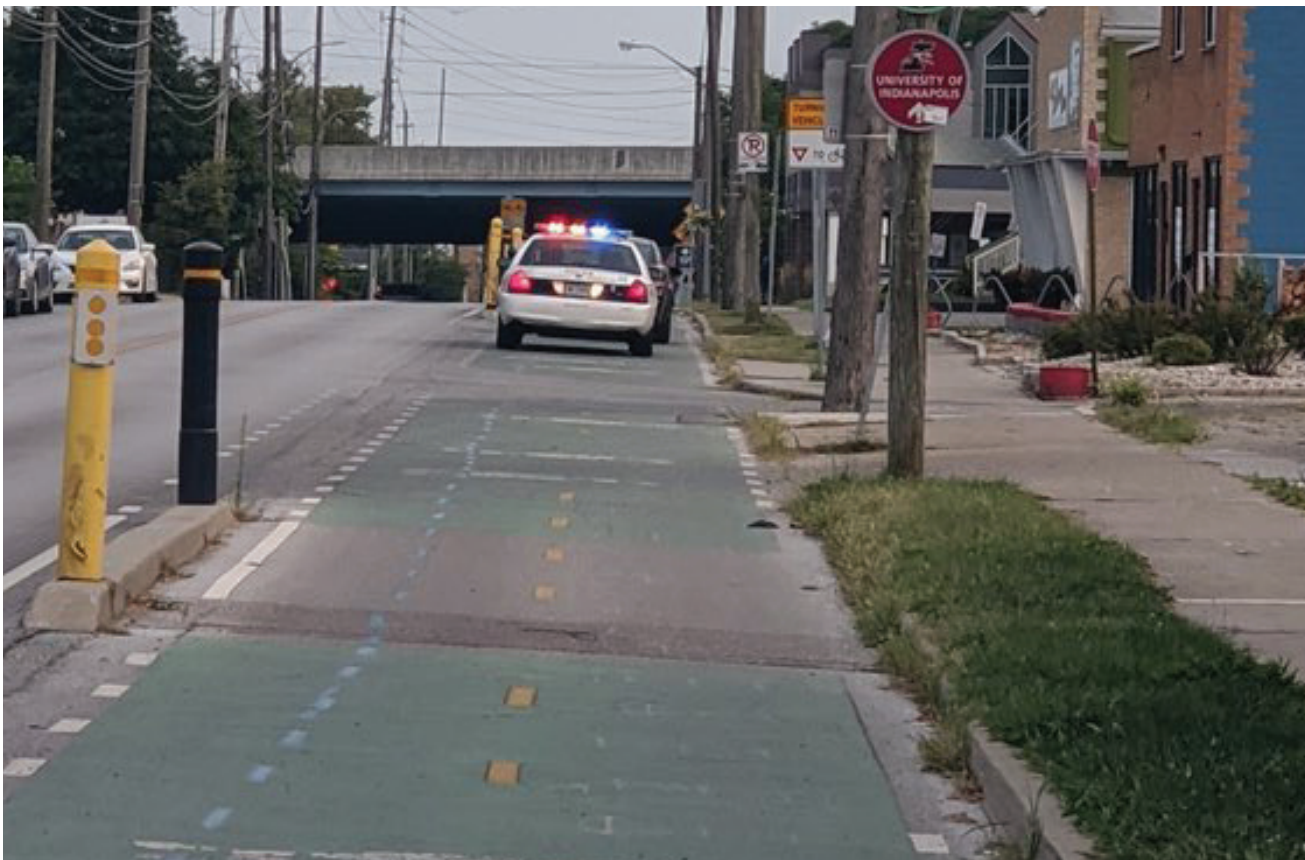

Collisions involving cars, cyclists and pedestrians on the rise

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Bishop Jennifer Baskerville-Burrows moved to Indianapolis in 2017. The New York City native came to the Circle City by way of Chicago. With her residential history, Baskerville-Burrows was accustomed to walking to get around town. But in Indianapolis that seems to be nearly impossible. "I've never seen a city with so few sidewalks," Baskerville-Burrows said. When biking with friends to train for a marathon, Baskerville-Burrows said they avoid main roads as much as possible, not just because of inadequate sidewalks, but to avoid reckless drivers. According to a study from the National Safety Council, vehicle-related deaths nationally rose 8% from 2019 to 2020. Throughout Indiana, the rate of fatal accidents rose 8.1% in that same period. In Marion County, that number rose 31%. In 2021, there have been 189 vehicle incidents involving pedestrians that resulted in 19 deaths, and 58 vehicles collisions with cyclists, resulting in four deaths, according to the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department (IMPD). In 2020, 19 pedestrians died as a result of an incident with a vehicle. On Aug. 27, a car struck Saleina Marcelus, 12, as she crossed Mitthoeffer Road to get to her bus stop. The driver took off and has not been identified. Marcelus died of her injuries days later. There are no sidewalks on the stretch of road Marcelus had to cross. Just three weeks later on Sept. 15, a car involved in a two-car collision struck and killed 7-year-old Hannah Crutchfield outside her school in Irvington. Two adults were injured, as well. These incidents sparked citywide outcry and a call to action from Indianapolis leaders. Following Crutchfield's and Marcelus' deaths, Reps. Mitch Gore and Blake Johnson proposed legislation in the state House of Representatives to address reckless driving by giving municipalities the option to add cameras to school zones, as well as allowing Indiana State Police and other agencies to apply for funding to pay overtime to officers working traffic enforcement. Gore, who is also a captain with the Marion County Sheriff's Office, said one reason for the uptick in accidents is drivers got used to less traffic during

the early days of the COVID-19 pandemic and never adjusted when people started going back to work. "I know, personally, my commute during the shutdown took about 15 minutes as opposed to 25," Gore said. "When people started going back to work, no one reset their expectations for what their commute used to look like pre-pandemic, that they can't drive like they used to when the roads were empty." Dawn Olsen may be considered lucky. In 2019, a car hit her while she was running through the intersection of Pennsylvania and Vermont streets. Though Olsen had the right of way, the driver attempted to "beat" her through the intersection, and Olsen ended up on the hood of the car. After sliding herself off, the driver took off without stopping to make sure Olsen was OK. Olsen was able to walk back home with bruising on her back and hip.

"You feel, worthless isn't the right word, but it's like I had absolutely no value to them as a human being," Olsen said. "They had no interest in figuring out if I was OK. They just cared about making sure they put a distance between myself and their vehicle. "I still run downtown, but I'm hesitant, not just because of this incident, but I know other people who have been hit and had close calls," she said. While this was the first time someone actually hit Olsen, she said she'd had a few close calls. "I have, admittedly, slammed my fists on more hoods than I should," Olsen said. "If I can touch your car, you're way too close to me." Gore said having more officers enforcing traffic laws in communities can help curb reckless driving,

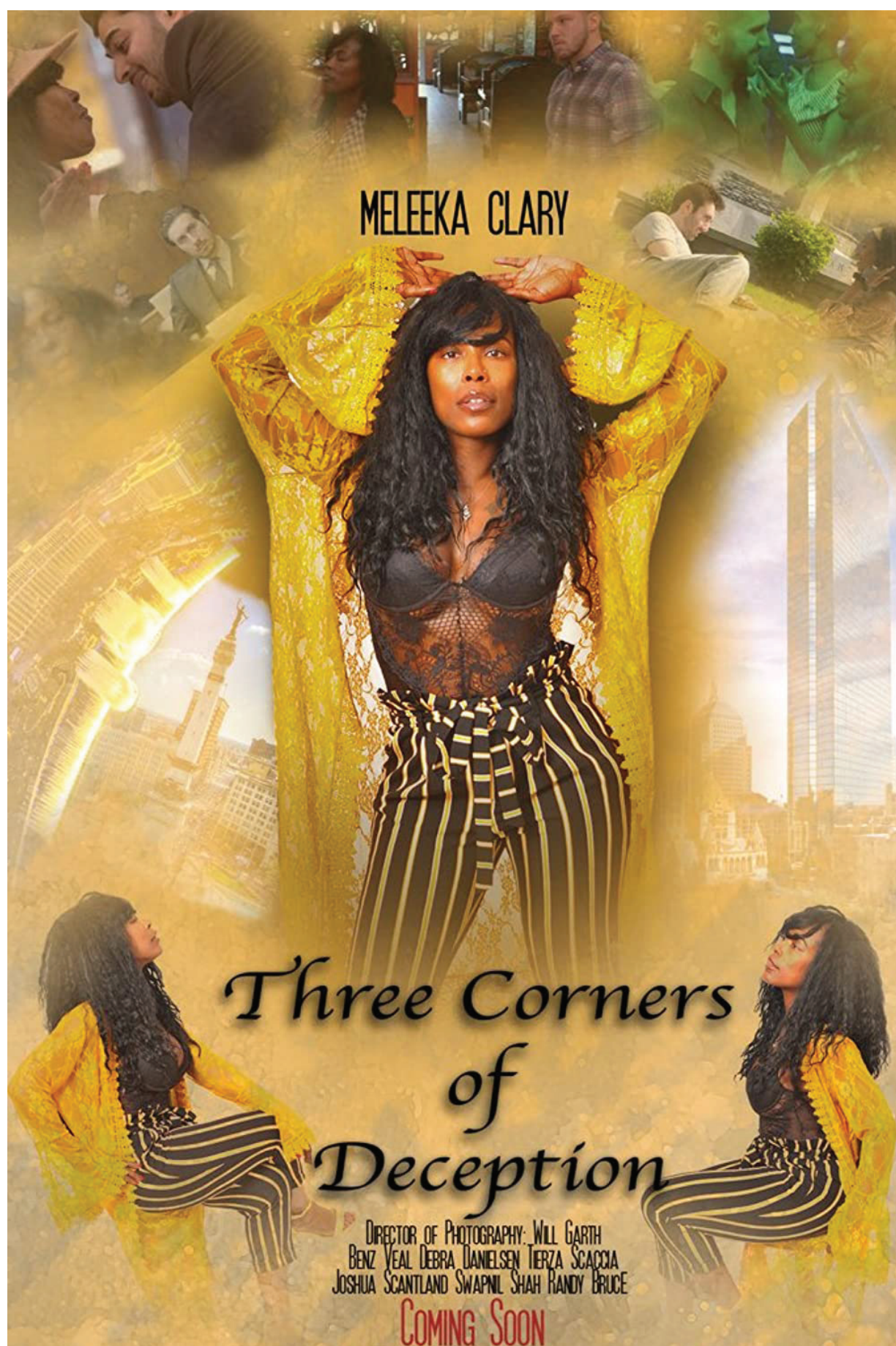

Local filmmaker shares her story through 'Three Corners of Deception'

Growing up, Meleeka Clary always dreamed of being an entertainer. Despite early success in dance and theater, the Boston native went on to receive a master's degree in criminal justice and a law degree from Concord Law School in California. But it was a whirlwind love affair in Indiana and the acrimonious custody battle that followed that challenged Clary's perception of the criminal justice system. Those experiences inspired the 2020 film "Three Corners of Deception," which will be screened Oct. 5 at Kan-Kan Cinema, 1258 Windsor St.

The Indianapolis Recorder spoke with Clary about her story and the movie, which was filmed partially in Indianapolis.

Indianapolis Recorder: What was it like sharing your story? Did it ever get to the point where it just felt too vulnerable?

Meleeka Clary: Yes, it did feel that way at the beginning because it's such a touchy story, it's passionate and something that I went through. It wasn't as easy to explain as I would have liked it to be. The movie is a little over two hours, but the pain reached almost 13 years. Going through something like that wasn't easy, but I'm religious, so God wanted me to explain my story, and he gave me the strength and courage to do so.

IR: Did you learn anything about yourself while making the movie?

MC: It freed me. I felt closed off, depressed and very scared as I was explaining my situation and sharing with the public. Making this movie, I was free and was able to let go of the situation. I'm not scared anymore. The movie really gave me peace. ... For me, making this movie isn't about fame; it was for justice.

IR: What do you hope audiences take away from the film?

MC: Awareness. I want them to understand that family is important, and so is the strength of an individual person. I survived this, and I'm still going. I shouldn't have had to fight this fight, but I'm not fighting alone. I have God on my side. I want people to know that they can get through anything.

Local organist featured soloist at Indianapolis Symphonic Choir event

Kim Kenny was just 9 years old when she first sat down at an organ. Her father's church, Calvary Community Church, needed a musician. Drawing inspiration from the likes of Aretha Franklin and Twinkie Clark, Kenny said her talents were cultivated and nurtured in the church. Now 33, Kenny received her master's degree in music from Butler University and will be the featured soloist at the Indianapolis Symphonic Choir's performance of "Sacred Masterworks: Musical Majesty of Choir & Organ" event Oct. 2.

Last year, Kenny won national awards for opera and classical music and was contacted by the Indianapolis Symphonic Choir shortly afterward about the performance. Both of the pieces she's performing — Mozart's "Laudate Dominum (translates to "O Praise the Lord") and Francis Smith Thomas' "My Feet Are Tired But My Soul is Resting" — take Kenny back to her roots.

"I think what's beautiful is that they appeal to who I am, with my church and gospel background," Kenny said. "Thomas was a close friend of Martin Luther King Jr.'s family and was inspired by a woman who participated in the bus boycott and the song is very hymn-like ... and the Mozart piece is very reverent and very elegant. ... I just love them both."

Beyond performing, Kenny also uses her talent to share the arts with children in the Indianapolis area. In 2018, she founded the Indy Youth Urban Music Academy to create a safe place for a diverse group of students to cultivate their own musical abilities. With roughly 300 students enrolled and several partnerships throughout the city, Kenny said the program helps children not only gain expertise in various art disciplines but helps them

become more well rounded in their daily lives.

"Art education allows students to create connections with the arts and other disciplines," Kenny said. "A student that's exposed to music education is a student who is well rounded."

Kenny said these benefits, as well as technological innovations during COVID-19, have made many organizations strive to make the arts more accessible. Both she and Indianapolis Symphonic Choir Artistic Director Eric Stark say this event will help new audiences engage with the art.

"Focusing an entire program on majestic works for chorus and organ, 'Sacred Masterworks' features beloved greats by renowned composers alongside incredible lesser-known masterpieces," Stark said in a statement. "What these works have in common is their unique ability to tap into the incredible sonic impact of voice and organ. What a thrill!"

 4. This form determines eligibility for state and federal aid. Pell grants, work study and even federal student loans are offered based on information from your FAFSA.
 5. Most colleges require the FAFSA to determine need for school-specific scholarships.

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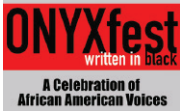
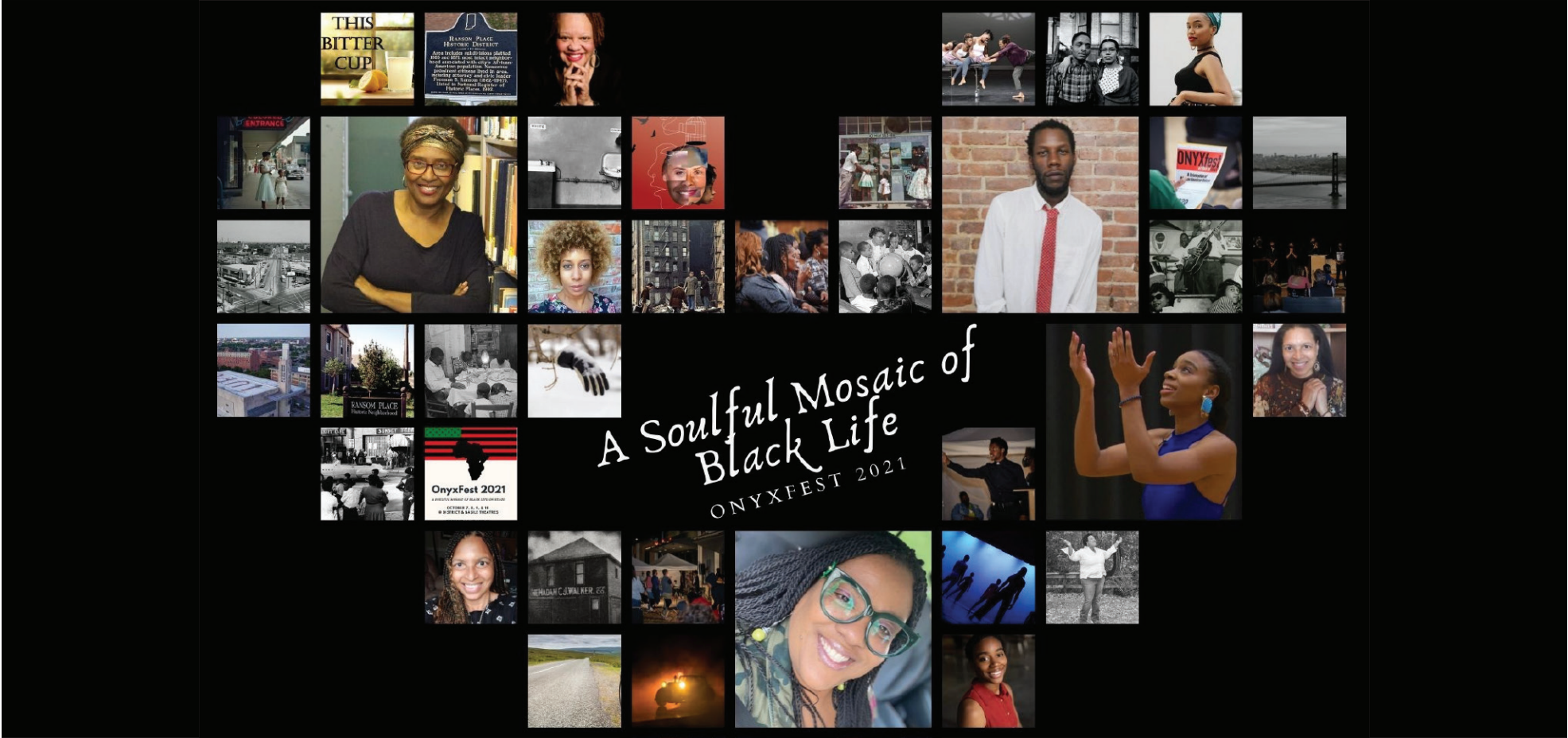

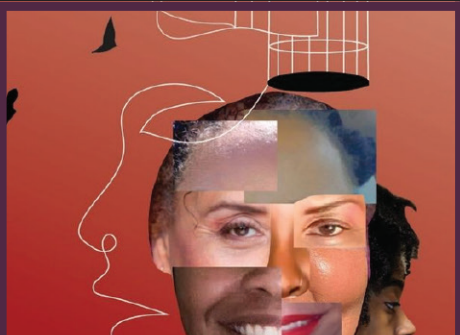

Health project helps schools get in front of academic problems

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A health data project at some Indianapolis schools is helping school officials get ahead of academic issues by meticulously tracking how often students go to the nurse’s office and what they complain about.

The Paramount Health Data Project collects data from schools and can use it to figure out which students might need extra academic support — ideally before those problems actually show up in the classroom.

When a student goes to the nurse’s office, the nurse will log information about why the student was there, and school officials can regularly pull the data to find red flags.

If a student visits the nurse 10 times within a three-week period, for example, that can be a red flag because, regardless of what the health issue is, the student is missing time in the classroom. School officials can then work with teachers and, if necessary, parents to make sure the student gets whatever extra help they might need.

“This program is the best health intervention, next to quitting smoking, that we’ve seen in the last 20 to 30 years,” said Tommy Reddicks, CEO of Paramount Schools

of Excellence, one of the first schools involved with the program.

The “academic cliff” at Paramount is seven nurse visits, Reddicks said, at which point school officials know they need to intervene.

There are also certain red flags that apply to some schools and not others, depending on geography and demographics.

Bridget Tucker, a nurse at Paramount’s middle school, said one of the school’s big triggers is

dermatology — eczema, for example. She said dental issues are one of the triggers at more affluent schools.

“If we know as soon as that student has triggered that red flag, we can keep on them and make sure they have the resources here and at home that they need,” Tucker said.

Addie Angelov, co-founder and executive director of the project, started working with schools on lead poisoning in 2013 and noticed

how difficult it was to find good data, so she and others began collecting data. The project included eight schools at the start of the pandemic, and data went as far back as 2013.

“We give schools great data so they can make really good decisions,” Angelov said.

Students who live in poverty get the majority of their health care from schools, Angelov said, and that can be a problem considering the limited resources schools

have to work with. It’s difficult to know how many Indiana schools don’t have a nurse because the state only tracks the number of certified nurses employed by each district.

Schools that work with the project can use the data to apply for federal title funds to support their health care initiatives.

Ryan Gall, executive director of Victory College Prep, said his school recently got a nurse, and he’s looking forward to

getting a better understanding of the data.

Anecdotaly, Gall knows there are some students who go to the nurse often, but the school hasn’t been able to analyze the impact yet.

“This is one of those no-brainer things that feels like it should be in every school,” he said.

Finally listening to the voices of Black women

No matter your race or ethnicity, if you're a woman, your voice is often ignored. However, if you're a Black woman, your voice isn't even heard let alone ignored. We're used to being over-looked and dismissed. Our cries aren't heard as our tears don't matter.

It took decades — more than 25 years — but Black women were finally heard when it came to Robert Sylvester Kelly, better known as R. Kelly. Kelly was found guilty of racketeering and sex trafficking. A jury comprised of seven men and five women and a federal judge finally listened to the Black women — and men — who provided horrific testimony of abuse at the hands of Kelly.

R. Kelly is a pedophile, and R. Kelly is abusive. Kelly's behavior has been an open secret for years. The public first found out something was amiss with Kelly when he married Aaliyah. We dismissed it, and things seemed to get quiet. Then the infamous sex tape came out and all manner of sordid accusations. We heard about Kelly hanging out at his old school, picking up young girls. We heard about him frequenting a nearby McDonald's — a hangout spot for high schoolers — and picking up up girls there. People chose not to listen to the Black girls because Kelly is a musical genius and Black girls don't matter. Those girls were "fast."

He kept making music, and Kelly fans kept buying it. Radio stations kept playing it. TV stations kept playing his videos, and musicians kept working with him (some of my faves, too!). For a while, R. Kelly was everywhere. And all the while, he was abusing young women and molesting young girls. Their accusations were ignored, though, because a celebrity of Kelly's stature doesn't need to chase young girls when he could have any woman he wanted. The thing is Kelly didn't want mature women. It's been proven multiple times, and he's all but said it. It's too bad it took several articles, a documentary and TV interviews for us to see R. Kelly for who he is.

I find it interesting and telling that in all of these years, while the conversation centered on Kelly's molestation and grooming of teen girls, the girls were blamed for their abuse. The girls were called promiscuous. People said they were searching for fame and celebrity and willing to do whatever it takes to get it (as if that's a good excuse for Kelly to molest a teen). However, I heard none of these similar comments when during Kelly's six-week trial, it came to light he also molested teen boys. The boys weren't blamed. Matter of fact, it seemed like a collective hush fell over his supporters. I didn't hear the outrage or the "they're lying" comments as I do when we talk about these "fast girls."

Kelly faces 10 years to life in prison and will be sentenced in May 2022. Chuck D., an artist I've long respected, took to Twitter to ask, "How long should R Kelly spend in prison – and does a USA system give a man a chance for a man to change his world

around?" Chuck D. likened Kelly's predicament to that of Ike Turner and Rick James, two artists who also went to prison and came out for the better, he said. U.S. Rep. Danny Davis, D-Illinois, who represents Chicago, expressed Kelly could be welcomed back into his city if he redeems himself.

Funny how both Black men centered the Black man accused of crimes not his Black women victims. Why is Kelly the first concern? Because he writes great songs? Yes, I understand Kelly was molested and abused as a child, and those who experience such trauma often inflict it on others. However, that isn't an inevitable outcome. Kelly has not shown remorse and in fact denies any wrongdoing. If he wanted redemption, he had a chance to change his ways when he was acquitted of child pornography in 2008. Instead, he became more brazen and began flaunting his perverted ways in our faces. He even called himself the Pied Piper of R&B. R. Kelly wasn't worried about redemption. He was too busy thinking he was untouchable.

I'm not happy to see a Black man go to prison. I am happy to see these Black women were finally heard. I also hope to see those in his circle, those Yes men and women who were his accomplices, pay a price for their role in aiding and abetting Kelly's behavior. By covering for Kelly, those men and women allowed the abuse to continue and they're culpable on some level as well. This shouldn't just end with Kelly. I hope this signals a new day and sends a message to Black women that our voices will be heard.

I was called the N-word



In 2015, I took my then-8-year-old son and 10-year-old daughter to a play called "Anne and Emmett." The play centers on a fictitious conversation between Anne Frank, the German-

Jewish teen who died in a Nazi concentration camp, and Emmett Till, the Black teen who died at the hands of racists in Mississippi. The dialogue includes several racial slurs. I will never forget my son turning to me to ask what a "n-----" was. I told him that I would explain it to him after the show, hoping that he would forget. He didn't.

I was conflicted. On the one hand, I was relieved that he didn't know the history of the word, which meant that he didn't know the pain that is associated with it. On the other hand, I felt guilty as I pondered whether my former wife and I had sheltered our younger children too much.

This memory came flooding back to me last Sunday after an incident with

a 20-something white male. While on a grocery run, I made a legal U-turn at an intersection (as had several cars in front of me). This young man was turning right to go in the same direction. He pulled sideways in front of my car, gave me the middle finger and made a lewd gesture with his tongue and two fingers. Though I was surprised, I shrugged it off.

At the next light, which was red, his car stopped immediately behind mine. He hopped out, ostensibly to give money to a panhandler. But this was a pre-text. On his way back to his car he deliberately threw a small object at my car, hitting my door.

I jumped out of my car to confront him. As I approached his car, he began rolling up his window. (I may or may not have issued a strongly-worded challenge for him to exit his vehicle.) Initially, he declined my request, so I turned to go back to my car.

Up to this point, my subconscious assumption was that this was simply a conflict between two men; it hadn't occurred to me that race was a factor. It was. He began calling me "n-----,"

so I again asked him to get out of his car. He did, but not before securing a weapon that was similar to a crowbar, except that it had a handle instead of a curve on the end.

I approached him with the intent to fight. However, I suddenly became aware of screaming coming from three rows away. It was a 20-something white woman who was pleading with me to return to my car. In trying to convince me, she said, "Stop! I know it's not *you!* Please get back in your car!" I paused for a second to consider my options. Then I turned and went to my car.

My two teens, brother and grandson were in the car. My daughter asked me what had happened. (She, my brother and my son were oblivious as to what was going on.) My kids were quite surprised to learn what had transpired, but that didn't keep them from upbraiding me for potentially putting my loved ones in danger. I tried to explain how no self-respecting Black man would let such an incident pass, but they remained unconvinced. (Thankfully, my brother was squarely on my

side.)

It had been several years since I had experienced anything similar, so I was caught off guard. In that moment, none of my titles, my degrees or my accomplishments mattered to me. (I'm certain that they wouldn't have mattered to him had he known about those things.) My daughter suggested that I could have ended up in a jail cell if someone had called the police. Worse, I could have become a hashtag. Yet, all that mattered to me was defending my honor and my race.

I am reminded of Dr. King's admonition about "the myth of time." He warned us that racial progress "does not roll in on the wheels of inevitability, but comes through continuous struggle." I don't know whether this young man is representative of his generation any more than young Black men who commit violent acts are representative of theirs. I do know that we, as a nation, are still far from the presumed goal of racial harmony.

Creating a 'more perfect union'

"You can pray until you faint. But if you don't get up and try to do something, God is not going to put it in your lap. And I believe ... that one day in Mississippi — if I have to die for this — we shall overcome." Fannie Lou Hamer

Fannie Lou Townsend Hamer (1917-1977) was an activist and civil rights leader who advocated for voting rights and racial equity for Black Americans. She was the recipient of many accolades as well as honorary membership in Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Inc., a public service organization. The youngest of 20 children, she was born to Lou Ella and James Townsend, sharecroppers in Mississippi, on Oct. 6, 1917. Hamer grew up in poverty and left school to work the cot-

ton fields when she was 12 years old. In 1944, she married Perry "Pap" Hamer. The couple worked on a plantation together for 18 years.

In 1961, Hamer attended a meeting of the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) and Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC). Hamer was upset about the move to hinder Blacks from voting. She joined SNCC as an organizer and spearheaded the effort to encourage Blacks to register to vote at the Indianola, Mississippi, courthouse. The group was prohibited from voting due to the use of an unfair literacy test. After this she was fired by the plantation owner where she worked and lived. Eventually, the Hamers were forced to leave.

In June of 1963, Hamer was traveling back with other activists from a literacy workshop. Stopping in Winona, Mississippi, the group was arrested on a false charge and jailed. While being held, Hamer and her colleagues were beaten almost to death by the police.

Despite this harrowing experience, Hamer continued to organize voter registration drives. She later co-founded the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party (MFDP). In 1964, the MFDP challenged the all-white Mississippi delegation to the Democratic National Convention in Chicago, Illinois. She told the committee, in a televised presentation, how Blacks were being prevented from voting across the country. "If the Freedom Democratic Party isn't seated today, I question America," Fannie told the Credentials Committee. "Is this America where we have to sleep with our phones off the hooks because we be threatened daily just 'cause we want to register to vote to become first-class citizens." Her advocacy resulted in enabling two delegates of the MFDP being given speaking rights at the convention.

Hamer had a deep love and concern for children which was expressed in her advocacy for education. She admonished Black teachers to "teach our children more about our history since school books left it

out." This unfortunately still rings true today.

Fannie Lou Hamer is an amazing and powerful example of the power of one person who is committed to affecting change. We stand at a precipice in our country. A great awareness of the lived experience of Black Americans has occurred over the last year. The wider community is reading books, having dialogues about systemic racism and its continued negative effect on historically excluded groups. Still more is required. We must look inward to determine what we can do to change the trajectory of our country for the better. Each person has the power to make a difference. Writing your representatives, running for office, assisting with a campaign, creating an organization or joining an existing one, and most importantly, if you see something say something. We cannot sit by and allow injustice to continue. We have to be the change we want to see in the world. This work is not easy, but it's vital to the very survival of our country and this experiment called democracy. Lifting as we climb.

Preamble to the U.S. Constitution: "We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, ensure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America."

Take some time to read the United States Constitution, Bill of Rights and 27 amendments. What can you do to create "a more perfect union"? We can learn so much from Hamer and others. Civil rights leaders Coretta Scott King said, "Struggle is a never-ending process. Freedom is never really won. You earn it and win it in every generation."

Parks are essential, but what if a community park doesn’t serve its people?

When Sabae Martin was a young teenager in middle school, her mother used to ask her not to go near the basketball courts at Tarkington Park on 39th and Illinois streets. But Martin went anyway. She wanted to get a glimpse of the cute boys playing — what her mother expected she would be doing. “That’s my favorite memory of this park to see all of the fellowship of basketball and the camaraderie of competition,” Martin said with a beaming smile and reminiscent eyes as she stood on the same spot. A generation later, Seretha Edwards also went to Tarkington Park with her friends every single day after school. There was always some kind of festivity going on — someone’s birthday or graduation. Edwards often considered there to be an open invitation to whatever was happening at the park. “Yeah, even if we didn’t know the people having a birthday party, we were kids at the time. You know, nobody’s gonna turn a kid down wanting a hot dog,” Edwards said. But the playful kids have grown. Martin is now 63, and Edwards is 40. They remember Tarkington Park as a cultural hub for the Black community around the Butler-Tarkington neighborhood. It’s where stories of joy, competition and discovery unfolded every day.

Disparities take a toll Today, the area where the park is located is at the intersection of stark racial, health and socioeconomic disparities. And part of that is due to the city not making the neighborhood a priority for years and systemic barriers that keep the Black community from having a voice in their own neighborhood.

As Martin stood at the edge of Tarkington Park by Illinois Street, he pointed to a few abandoned shops. “There used to be a grocery store here, and a grocery store there. And I repeat the same thing: Where did they go and where are the replacements and why is it taking so long?” Martin said. At some point, one of the grocery stores was turned into a brewery, just across from the playground. It shut down in 2018. Last year, a CVS Pharmacy on 38th Street also closed and

now is a car wash instead. The road bordering the park — 38th Street — divides Indianapolis into two very different communities. To the north, houses cross the million dollar mark. The streets are lined with greenery, mature trees, manicured yards and fancy lamp posts. Residents are predominantly white. To the south of the street, the color scheme starts to change, as if it is an Instagram filter or a Hollywood movie preset — there are smaller and older houses, more concrete and more Black and brown residents. The park is located in the ZIP code 46208. A study by the Indiana University School Richard M. Fairbanks School of Public Health shows this zip code has one of the lowest life expectancies in greater Indianapolis — 73

years. That’s nearly 11 years less compared to zip codes less than 10 miles away. The average income here is almost half the national average. And 53% of the residents are African American or Hispanic — they mostly live in the lower-income part of the ZIP code. The white residents are clustered in the higher income part which is less than a 2-minute car drive away.

‘We were fenced off the park’ Coach Donnell Hamilton, or Coach Nell, knows the area well. He grew up around here and used to come to Tarkington Park all the time. “This is like a central meeting point for all neighborhoods around here and

Advancing Tech in 46218 Partner Profile: Goodwill’s Excel Center

Eleven Fifty Academy is so excited to be working with many community partners on our Advancing Tech in 46218 initiative. Thanks to the support of a grant from Lilly Endowment through its Enhancing Opportunity in Indianapolis initiative, we are collaborating with many area stakeholders to open the doorway to tech for residents of the Martindale-Brightwood neighborhood. We recently sat down with Shelley Ashley, Goodwill of Central and Southern Indiana’s Senior Director of Mission Advancement, to talk about her work at The Excel Center and how the organization connects Indiana adults to new opportunities.

Q: What is The Excel Center? A: The Excel Center is a tuition-free high school for adults to achieve their high school diplomas. We operate at 15 different locations across central and southern Indiana through our Goodwill territory. Across all these campuses we help individuals move toward education, employment, and increased earning potential. Our students are earning a high school Core 40 diploma, not a GED. To support this, we provide wraparound services like childcare and transportation assistance. In addition to their Core 40 diploma, we help our students complete dual credits or an industry-recognized certification. That is one of our graduation requirements, that students must earn college credit or an industry certification. This is because we recognize that we are serving adults who need to get their education and get moving into a career pathway.

Q: What are the major achievements you have made as an organization in the community? A: Since our program started in 2010, we have graduated around 7,000 students. 60% of those have school aged children or younger. The age range

of Excel Center students is 16* — 72 (*many of the Excel Centers accept students eighteen years and older), with an average age of 29. Our achievements are not just transforming the lives of our students but also making a generational impact on their children and other family members. Our teachers and life coaches work with our students to help them gain skills and social capital to navigate the challenges that come through life. If you want to see a glimpse into the work we do, there is a documentary called Night School that followed the lives of three of our students. It is a great snapshot not just of our students but also our staff.

Q: What has been the relationship between The Excel Center and Eleven Fifty Academy to date? A: We have partnered with Eleven Fifty for five or six years by sending students there who have IT aptitude and interest in growing those strengths. It is part of our mission to help all students align their interests with opportunities. Eleven Fifty is a great partner for us in the pipeline from high school to the next step launching a fulfilling career. The partnership has inspired us internally to equip our teachers and design our curriculum to support students in acquiring tech fundamentals. We offer or have in the past offered a variety of tech certifications such as COMPTIA+, COMPTIA Fundamentals, or basic Microsoft Office. Some of our teachers have gone through training to build out this curriculum in a way that supports our students down the path to Eleven Fifty or other tech programs. At graduation we want students to be able to see their bridge into the next step of whatever career they aspire to.

Q: What are the barriers to entry in tech that you think programs like Advancing Tech in 46218

help students overcome? A: I think one barrier is just being aware of the opportunities that exist. One of the things I think about a lot is, how do we get more exposures and diversified exposures to career opportunities for students? When we ask adult learners what they want to do after graduation, it’s often something high-level like “help people.” What we have to help students do is understand the wide and vast workforce landscape and help them gain opportunities to learn more about what kinds of jobs are out there. In many cases they haven’t had the opportunity to explore the job market so we try to guide them to an epiphany in that regard. We believe the Advancing Tech in 46218 initiative will be a very intentional way to make students aware of some of the most meaningful and high-paying jobs in the economy today. A lot of the time, digital literacy is another gap for our students. They know how to use a smartphone or may have basic computer skills, but beyond that is an exciting opportunity to acquire more skills. The Advancing Tech in 46218 initiative will also provide more structure and intention around the skills that can be developed, showing students jobs they can achieve and helping them connect to the necessary post-high school training.

Q: What excites you about the tech job opportunities in Indianapolis right now? A: For our students, it’s the chance to get a foot in the door at the entry level. Tech offers lots of entry-level jobs that allow students to enter the tech space, use the competencies and skills they have already developed, and grow their career along with their mastery and interest in IT.

We know that when you learn technical skills, there also must be context on how they are applied. Finding an entry level job is where growth can really be launched. The trajectory of someone’s life can be changed as they also meet employers’ needs. We really try to encourage our students to be life-long learners, constantly reevaluating their goals. So, starting from a place of alignment and opportunity is a major benefit to keep them on that path.

Q: What would you say to an adult learner hesitating to take the next step in continuing their education? A: It’s never too late. It’s not too late for you. One of the things I think is special about The Excel Center model is that we have students that enroll who were maybe lacking one credit to graduate. Others are those who never even attended high school. And we also serve students anywhere in between. We work with each student individually to develop a plan to help them get to their goals. That’s what I want people to know. It’s a myth that it’s too late or you can’t do it. This is a judgment-free place where your past doesn’t matter. We want to help you look ahead and move towards your new goals. And what we really appreciate about our partnership with Eleven Fifty Academy is we know they share those values. We’re so excited about the Advancing Tech in 46218 initiative. We love so much the collaboration, innovation, and the partnership that have already developed and will continue to deepen. There is a huge tech need in Indianapolis, and a huge group of people with interest who need help finding the path. We are excited to be helping students change the course of their lives and the lives of their families. We are delighted to see where this goes for our students.

Importance of Pregnancy and Infant Loss Awareness Month in Indiana

October commemorates Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) Awareness Month and Pregnancy and Infant Loss Awareness Month. Historically, Indiana has had a higher-than-average infant mortality rate (IMR) that can vary based on socioeconomic factors, like race, income and geographic location. For example, the Indiana Department of Health (IDOH) reports that the IMR for white infants was 6 per 1,000 live births in 2019, while the IMR for Black infants was 11 per 1,000 live births. Based on these numbers, 50 additional Black infants would have survived in 2019 if Black and white infants had the same IMR.

In honor of this important month, Dr. Cameual Wright, vice president and market chief medical officer of CareSource, a nationally recognized nonprofit health plan, is sharing information on how Hoosier mothers can ensure a healthy pregnancy.

Importance of prenatal care

The IDOH's Maternal Mortality Review Committee reported that of all pregnancy-associated deaths in 2018, only 44.4% of women had access to prenatal care in the first trimester of their pregnancy. Factors that can impact a woman's ability to access prenatal care can include income, insurance coverage, location of prenatal care facilities and other social factors. The same IDOH committee also reported that there are 33 counties in Indiana that are considered maternal care deserts, which are counties that

lack easy access to maternity health services.

According to the U.S. Office on Women's Health, babies of women who don't receive prenatal care are three times more likely to have a low birth weight and five times more likely to die. In 2020, The United Health Foundation reported that there was a 6.6% difference between the minority group with the highest percentage of infants with low birthweight and white infants with low birthweight. The same report cited in 2020, only 78% of women who had a live birth had adequate prenatal care in the first four months of pregnancy. Women should make routine visits to their doctor's office to monitor their health and wellness throughout their pregnancy.

How to create a safe sleep area for your baby

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), sudden unexpected infant death (SUID) is "a term used to describe the sudden and unexpected death of a baby less than one year old in which the cause was not obvious before investigation." Many of these deaths happen during the infant's sleep or in their sleeping area. Types of SUID incidents can include SIDS, accidental suffocation or strangulation in a sleep area and unknown causes.

The IDOH reports that the state's SIDS rate is 14.9 per 1,000 live births higher than the U.S. average. Across the nation, SUID rates for American Indian/Alaskan Native in-



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fants and non-Hispanic Black infants were more than double the rates for non-Hispanic white infants. Parents and caregivers can help create a safe sleep environment by observing the CDC's following tips:

1. Always place the baby on their back during sleep time and avoid stomach or side sleeping.
2. Use a firm, flat sleep surface covered with only a fitted sheet to reduce the risk of sleep suffocation and SIDS.
3. Keep your baby's sleep area in the same room where you sleep until the baby is six to 12 months old. Sharing a room may decrease the risk of SIDS by 50%.
4. Keep soft bedding, like pillows, blankets and stuffed animals out of the baby's sleep area to avoid suffocation.

Looking forward

Gov. Eric Holcomb reported that in 2019, Indiana saw its lowest IMR in over a century. The state's IMR fell from 6.8 to 6.5 per 1,000 live births, and the IMR for Black infants decreased from 13 to 11 per 1,000 births. The number of infants who died before their first birthdays in Indiana also decreased from 559 to 527 per year, a number even lower than the 602 infant deaths in 2017. These statistics are very encouraging, however there is still much work to be done.

At CareSource, we encourage all mothers to connect with our case managers who work side by side with them through their pregnancy to provide education and coordinate care. Through our Babies First program, we provide incentives for obtaining recommended prenatal care, well-child care, immunizations and lead testing. We are also partnering with the state

of Indiana on the My Healthy Baby Program, which identifies women early in pregnancy and connects them with an OB Navigator, who provides face-to-face, personalized support to a woman during pregnancy and the first few months of her baby's life. In addition, we are supporting the Indiana Pregnancy Promise Program, which promotes recovery from opioid use by providing maternal and infant support. Despite an improved IMR, Indiana can still make significant strides to decrease health disparities in the state. The insights taken from the information above can guide new parents through this exciting, but often challenging time in their lives. CareSource believes we can all work together to keep moms and babies healthy in 2021 and beyond.

Who is Eligible for a COVID-19 Vaccine Booster Shot?

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recently issued a recommendation for certain persons in the U.S. who have been fully vaccinated for at least 6 months to now receive a booster dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine.

According to CDC, anyone aged 65 years and older, and adults 50-64 years old with underlying medical conditions, should get a booster dose of the vaccine.

The risk of severe illness from COVID-19 increases with age and among adults of any age with underlying medical conditions.

Residents of long-term care settings aged 18 years and older should also get a booster shot of Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine. Because residents in long-term care settings live closely together in group settings and are often older adults with underlying medical conditions, they are at increased risk of infection and severe illness from COVID-19. People aged 18-49 years with underlying medical conditions may get a booster shot of the vaccine based on their individual benefits and risks. While this group has an increased risk for severe illness from COVID-19, the risk is likely not as high as it would be for adults aged 50 years and older who have underlying medical conditions.

People aged 18-64 years who have an increased risk for COVID-19 exposure and transmission because of an occupational or institutional setting may get a booster shot of Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine based on their individual benefits and risks. This might include those who work or reside in certain settings such as health care, schools, correctional facilities, and homeless shelters. These risks can vary across settings and based on how much COVID-19 is spreading

in a community.

Studies show that after getting vaccinated against COVID-19, protection may become less over time in its ability to protect against the Delta variant. Although COVID-19 vaccine for adults aged 65 years and older remains effective in preventing severe disease, recent data suggest vaccination is less effective at preventing infection or milder illness with symptoms.

New evidence also shows that, among healthcare and other frontline workers, vaccine effectiveness against COVID-19 infections is decreasing over time. This drop in effectiveness is likely due to the combination of protection becoming less after a certain amount of time since getting vaccinated, as well as a higher strength of infection of the Delta variant.

Data from a small clinical trial show that a Pfizer-BioNTech booster shot increased the immune response in trial participants who finished their primary series 6 months earlier. With an increased immune response, people should have improved protection against COVID-19, including the Delta variant.

Only these certain groups of people who have been fully vaccinated with Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine for at least 6 months are recommended by CDC to get a booster dose at this time.

This recommendation may change in the future as more data become available. Data on the effectiveness and safety of Moderna and J&J (Janssen) booster shots are expected soon.

Famed cathedral names artist to replace Confederate windows

Washington National Cathedral announced Sept. 23 it has chosen contemporary artist Kerry James Marshall, renowned for his wide-ranging works depicting African American life, to design new stained-glass windows with themes of racial justice that will replace a set with Confederate imagery that were removed in 2017.

The landmark sanctuary said in a statement that the four windows will tell "a new and more complete" story of the nation's racial history. Poet Elizabeth Alexander will write a poem to be inscribed in stone tablets alongside the windows, overlaying older ones that venerated the lives of Confederate soldiers.

The project is expected to be completed by 2023.

The windows will replace a set that honored two Confederate generals, Robert E. Lee and Stonewall Jackson, with saint-like reverence and had included a Confederate flag. The cathedral removed them in 2017, prompted by a larger national reckoning over Confederate imagery and white supremacy in the wake of deadly right-wing attacks in Charlottesville, Virginia, that year and in Charleston, South Carolina, in 2015. The window openings have been covered with plywood since 2017.

The setting is particularly significant in the massive neo-Gothic cathedral, which is filled with iconography depicting the American story in glass, stone and other media, with images ranging from presidents to famous cultural figures and state symbols.

The cathedral, also the seat

of the Episcopal Church's presiding bishop and Diocese of Washington, regularly serves as the setting for ceremonies tied to major national events.

In replacing the windows, the cathedral acknowledged a need to correct what it called a "false narrative of what America once was."

The old windows "were a barrier to our mission and impediment to worship in this place, and they had no place being in sacred space," the Very Rev. Randolph Marshall Hollerith, dean of the cathedral, said in a news conference.

"This is a once-in-a-generation opportunity for the cathedral to not only create beautiful art but to stake a claim about what and who we value," he added.

Marshall, who made his first visit to the cathedral this week, said it's too soon to say what the new windows will look like.

"It was really important for me to come here and really get a sense of what the place is, what's already here, what the mission they've tried to accomplish is, and then how I might be able to fit whatever it is the cathedral needs in order to fulfill its ambition for these windows ... into that space," he said at the news conference.

He noted that the cathedral set a "monumental" goal of having the windows depict the pain as well as the dignity of "the African-American struggle for justice and equality."

"This is something that's actually going to take a lot of time, because history itself, as most people know, is a very complicated narrative,"

he said.

Hollerith called Marshall "one of the greatest artists of our time" and praised Alexander as "one of our nation's most eloquent and compelling voices."

This will be Marshall's first work in the stained-glass medium after a long and acclaimed career using a variety of media to create portraits and other works depicting Black life. Marshall was a MacArthur Fellow in 1997.

Alexander, president of the Mellon Foundation, recited one of her poems at the 2009 inauguration of President Barack Obama and has published multiple books including Pulitzer Prize finalists.

She said in a statement that she was honored to be part of the cathedral's "effort to ensure that those who worship within its sanctuary know that it is truly a space for all people, and that the stories relayed through its sacred walls, windows and other iconography represent the truth of our nation."

The cathedral has loaned the Robert E. Lee window to the National Museum of African American History and Culture for a new exhibit, "Make Good the Promises: Reconstruction and Its Legacies." The museum said the window represents the "myth-building and the nationwide intimidation of African Americans through the embrace of Confederate symbols."

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Faith groups aid Haitian migrants

Faith-based groups — many of them longtime advocates for a more welcoming immigration policy — have been scrambling to keep up with fast-paced developments in the Haitian migrant crisis, trying to assist those in need while assailing the harsh Border Patrol tactics employed against them.

Before thousands of Haitian migrants dispersed last week from a camp in the border city of Del Rio, Texas, a coalition of churches and other groups was providing them with sandwiches, water and other essentials. Since dispersing, many of the migrants have received help from faith-based groups in Houston and El Paso as they seek to connect with relatives and sponsors throughout the United States.

Immigration hardliners criticize some of the efforts by religious activists, saying their efforts encourage still more migrants to come. But those providing the assistance see it as an extension of their religious mandate to help the needy.

"We are apolitical," said Carlos Villareal, a Houston-area leader in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, which has mobilized volunteers at a short-term transition center in Houston to assist hundreds of migrants arriving from Del Rio.

"Our concern is mainly with the families, that we can help them," Villareal said. "It's also the Golden Rule — do unto others as you would have done unto you."

The transition center was set up earlier this year at the request of the White House in response to earlier migrant surges, Villareal said. It provides the families with a place to shower, have a meal and contact sponsors who would pay for their plane or bus tickets to join them while their cases go through the immigration process.

Most of the Haitian migrants are expected to ask immigration judges for

asylum or some other legal status — requests that could be denied and lead to eventual deportation.

Villareal says he encounters migrants with stories similar to that of his parents, who immigrated from Mexico in search of a better life, not to be a burden on society.

"These people are just here seeking an opportunity," he said.

Mobilization of faith-based groups began almost from the start of the sudden migrant surge in Del Rio, with Haitians converging from various Latin American countries to which they had fled from their beleaguered Caribbean homeland.

Volunteers from a coalition of Christian churches and other groups in that region along the U.S.-Mexico border prepared more than 10,000 sandwiches for Haitian migrants camping under the bridge that connects Del Rio with Mexico's Ciudad Acuña, said Shon Young, president of the Val Verde Border Humanitarian Coalition.

Their work began with about 20 churches and grew to more than 100 churches and other organizations, said Young, who is associate pastor at City Church Del Rio.

His church also collected donations, and the coalition set up an Amazon

wish list that included juices, hand sanitizer and snacks. The response — from U.S. and Haitian organizations and from far-flung individual donors — has been overwhelming, Young said.

The camp held more than 14,000 people at its peak. Many of the Haitian migrants are being expelled and flown back to Haiti, but many others who gathered in Del Rio have been released in the United States, according to two U.S. officials.

The Department of Homeland Security based Haitians from Del Rio to El Paso, Laredo and the Rio Grande Valley along the Texas border, and added flights to Tucson, Arizona, one of the officials said. They are processed by the Border Patrol at those locations.

The El Paso Baptist Association has been offering migrants COVID-19 testing and providing food, clothes and a place to sleep while they contact their family members or others sponsors. Since late July, the association has assisted more than 300 migrants, most of them Haitian, and was expecting many more to arrive from Del Rio, said Larry Floyd, the group's executive director.

Catholic-led and other faith-based nonprofits have long been at the forefront of efforts to support migrants

and asylum seekers along the Mexican border, providing crucial services on both sides of the Rio Grande.

Pope Francis has praised the work of Sister Norma Pimentel, the executive director of Catholic Charities of the Rio Grande Valley. Other well-known groups include Jewish Family Service of San Diego, which provides housing and other assistance to migrants, and Annunciation House in El Paso, which provides shelter to migrants while they arrange travel to other U.S. cities.

Annunciation House, which says its mission is based on Catholic social justice teaching, has geared up to receive several hundred migrants coming from Del Rio, said executive director Ruben Garcia.

"First they're tested," Garcia said. "Once they're COVID tested, we begin to accommodate them."

At times, faith-based groups have injected themselves into a polarizing national debate over immigration policies. Although many praise their work to help migrants, some critics say it encourages more people to come to the U.S.

"A lot of these religious groups conflate two issues ... they are rendering assistance to people who are in front of them who need help. That's different

from advocating government policy that would import more people like that," said Mark Krikorian, executive director of the Center for Immigration Studies. The center favors more restrictive immigration policies.

Many religious leaders joined a call last week organized by the national nonprofit network Faith in Action urging President Joe Biden's administration to stop deporting migrants to Haiti without giving them a chance to seek asylum in the U.S. and to protest their treatment after images surfaced of Border Patrol agents on horseback using aggressive tactics.

"That is unconscionable and cannot be tolerated today," said the Rev. Alvin Herring, Faith in Action's executive director.

The Network Lobby for Catholic Social Justice has called for more oversight of U.S. Customs and Border Protection. The network's government relations director, Ronnate Asirwatham, says CBP has a "history of systemic abuse and racism."

The group joined more than 160 Catholic organizations in a letter asking Biden to end Title 42 authority, named for a section of a 1944 public health law that then-President Donald Trump used in March 2020 to effectively end asylum at the Mexican border.

Herring, who traveled to Del Rio with other faith leaders to assess the situation first-hand, says it is vital to press for Biden's administration to make good on its commitments to migrants.

"We see the singling out of our Haitian brothers and sisters for this despicable abuse, which we believe is racist and immoral," he said.

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Americans have little trust in online security: AP-NORC poll

Most Americans don't believe their personal information is secure online and aren't satisfied with the federal government's efforts to protect it, according to a poll.

The poll by The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research and MeriTalk shows that 64% of Americans say their social media activity is not very or not at all secure. About as many have the same security doubts about online information revealing their physical location. Half of Americans believe their private text conversations lack security.

And they're not just concerned. They want something done about it. Nearly three-quarters of Americans say they support establishing national standards for how companies can collect, process and share personal data.

"What is surprising to me is that there is a great deal of support for more government action to protect data privacy," said Jennifer Benz, deputy director of the AP-NORC Center. "And it's bipartisan support."

But after years of stalled efforts toward stricter data privacy laws that could hold big companies accountable for all the personal data they collect and share, the poll also indicates that Americans don't have much trust in the government to fix it.

A majority, 56%, puts more faith in the private sector than the federal government to handle security and privacy

improvements, despite years of highly publicized privacy scandals and hacks of U.S. corporations from Target to Equifax that exposed the personal information of millions of people around the world.

Indeed, companies such as Apple have made a big push to pitch themselves as attuned to consumer privacy preferences and committed to protect them.

"I feel there is little to no security whatsoever," said Sarah Blick, a professor of medieval art history at Kenyon College in Ohio. The college's human resources department told Blick earlier this year that someone fraudulently applied for unemployment

insurance benefits in her name.

Such fraud has spiked since the pandemic as perpetrators buy stolen personal identifying information on the dark web and use it to flood state unemployment systems with bogus claims.

About 71% of Americans believe that individuals' data privacy should be treated as a national security issue, with a similar level of support among Democrats and Republicans. But only 23% are very or somewhat satisfied in the federal government's current efforts to protect Americans' privacy and secure their personal data online.

"This is not a partisan issue," said Colorado

state Rep. Terri Carver, a Republican who co-sponsored a consumer data privacy bill signed into law by Democratic Gov. Jared Polis in July. It takes effect in 2023.

The legislation, which met opposition from Facebook and other companies, follows similar measures enacted in California and Virginia that give people the right to access and delete personal information. Colorado's also enables people to opt out of having their data tracked, profiled and sold.

Carver said it took several years to get the law passed, and advocates had to abandon some priorities, such as the idea of enabling people to opt in if they want to

allow processing of their personal data — instead of making them opt out.

The poll also found broad agreement in how Americans look at technology: 81% of Democrats and 78% of Republicans say they view technology as playing a major role in the country's ability to compete globally. Seventy-nine percent of Democrats and 56% of Republicans see value in the government's technology investments.

At least 6 in 10 adults support the federal government taking measures such as spending more on technology, expanding access to broadband internet and strengthening copyright protections to improve U.S. competi-

tiveness.

There are some generational variations in support for government policies to safeguard data privacy and security, though majorities across age groups are in favor. While 85% of adults age 40 and older are in favor of stronger punishments for cyber criminals, 70% of younger adults say the same.

The AP-NORC poll of 1,004 adults was conducted June 24-28 using a sample drawn from NORC's probability-based AmeriSpeak Panel, which is designed to be representative of the U.S. population. The margin of sampling error for all respondents is plus or minus 4.3 percentage points.

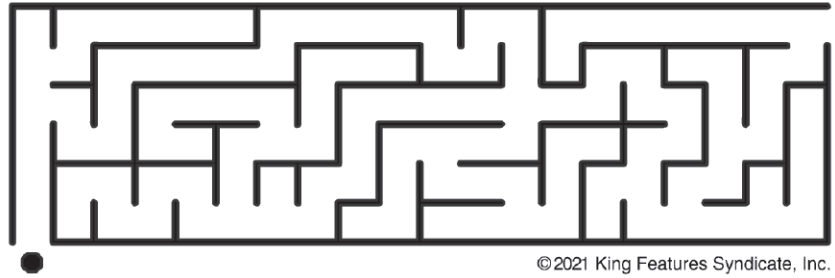

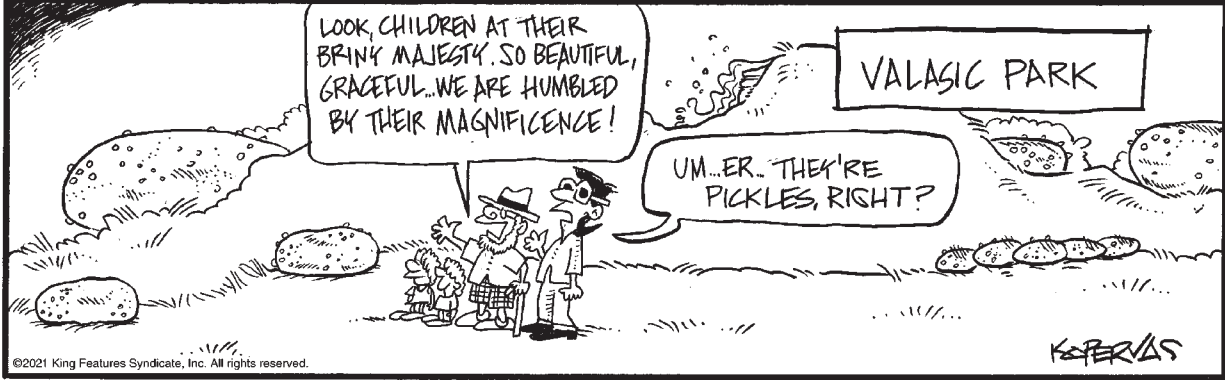

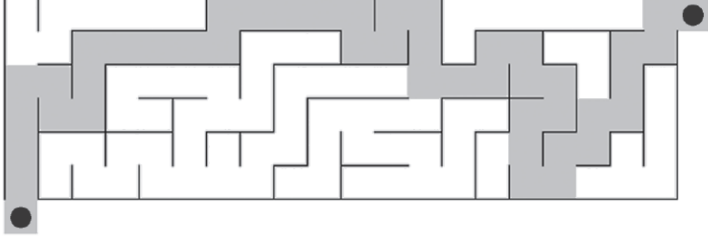

Palou's championship solidifies changing of the guard for IndyCar

I vaguely remember what life represented in my early 20s. Still looking for the perfect job and routinely raiding my father's refrigerator come to mind, but I certainly wasn't wheeling a race car around in a dominant fashion.

As someone who has followed IndyCar racing for more years than I'm inclined to admit, I never dreamed I'd witness the youth movement that has overtaken the sport, and while I was reluctant to embrace it initially, I am, as they say, all in with it now after watching Alex Palou soar to championship heights at the Acura Grand Prix of Long Beach. He secured his first driver's title and officially put the competition on notice that it's clearly the sign of things to come in the series.

The 24-year-old Spaniard made it look rather easy this year by capturing three race victories along with nine podium finishes and, just for good measure, three pole positions en route to securing his first NTT IndyCar Series championship. It was somewhat of a formality for the always polite and energetic Palou, as he headed to the last race of the season with a 35-point margin over fellow young gun Pato O'Ward.

There are, however, no such thing as easy races in this series, and when he put a bow on a remarkable sophomore season by driving tactically and finishing fourth to clinch the title, he was quick afterward

to give all the credit to Ganassi Racing for the opportunity and to his crew for providing him with great race cars the entire season.

"I don't know what Chip (Ganassi) saw in me my rookie season, but I'm so grateful," the elated Palou said in his post-race comments.

Ganassi countered by saying Palou had broken a long dry

streak for the No. 10 car and his young driver reminded him of six-time IndyCar Series champion Scott Dixon.

Fitting statements indeed from both parties to summarize Palou's maiden voyage with the team and to further cement the fact that IndyCar now belongs to young guns, much to the chagrin of the many talented veteran drivers.

Notes from the Paddock: While Palou's meteoric rise is remarkable, 22-year-old Pato O'Ward came close to capturing the title, finishing second in driver points by virtue of a stellar season for Arrow McLaren, which saw him capture four poles and two wins, and is among the favorites to win it all in 2022.

Speaking of incredible

performances by young drivers, perhaps no one's future is brighter than Colton Herta, who won the Acura Grand Prix of Long Beach in a dominant fashion after doing the same the week before at Laguna Seca. While he's barely old enough to legally drink the Victory Lane champagne, he too is a force to be reckoned with and will only continue to improve next season driving for Andretti Autosport.

Despite all the aforementioned talk of the youth movement being served, there were some interesting stories at Long Beach regarding veteran drivers on the move next year.

2019 Indianapolis 500 winner Simon Pagenaud ran his last race for Team Penske and will join the ranks of Meyer Shank Racing next season.

Ryan Hunter-Reay ended his phenomenal run at Andretti Autosport and is now a free agent. He has offers on the table to drive both IndyCars and sports cars next season.

Like Pagenaud, he is still capable of winning races.

Yours truly had the distinct pleasure of riding in a pace car at speed before the race this past Sunday. Let's just say I'm glad I didn't eat any breakfast before taking the hot lap. My sincere thanks to Acura Motorsports for letting me experience the rush on track.
