

Mortgage assistance still available in pandemic's 3rd year

Homeowners who have been impacted economically by the COVID-19 pandemic can still get mortgage assistance at the state and local level as programs find new money to meet demand.

Locally, the Indy Affordable Modification Program (IndyAMP) has invested \$2.6 million since starting last year and is in the process of getting another grant from the city to continue its work.

The project, run by Renew

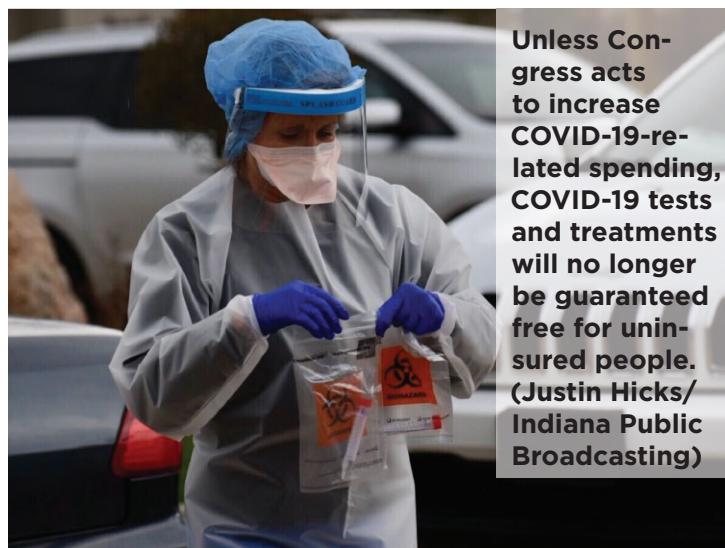
A lawsuit filed by fair housing organizations in multiple states alleges dozens of properties that advertise for people 55 and older have violated federal accessibility requirements. Two of the complexes named in the lawsuit are in Indianapolis.

The organizations, including the Fair Housing Center of Central Indiana (FHCCI), allege Clover Group and its various entities are guilty of "widespread and flagrant violations" of the Fair Housing Administration's rules related to accessibility. The lawsuit says all properties advertise as being fully handicapped-accessible.

Also named in the lawsuit is an architect firm based in New York.

The lawsuit lists 38 properties, most of which are in New York, Ohio and Pennsylvania. The two

COVID tests, treatments are no longer guaranteed free. That could worsen health disparities

Congress rejected pleas from the White House to pump more money into programs that ensure COVID-19 tests, treatments and vaccines are free for everyone. Public health experts warn the funding cuts will worsen health disparities and hurt those who are already most vulnerable.

At the start of the pandemic, many wished there was a pill people could swallow to make a COVID-19 infection go away. Two years later, we have not just one, but two of those pills, in addition to other outpatient and inpatient treatments.

The federal government established programs in 2020 to ensure access to COVID-19 care regardless of insurance status. But studies show life-saving treatments have not been equally accessible to all who need them. Among people who tested

positive for COVID-19, patients of color were less likely to access monoclonal antibody treatments, according to an analysis from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

In mid-March, Congress rejected pleas from the White House to pump more money into programs meant to remove barriers to COVID-19 care and assist the most vulnerable. This means COVID-19 tests and treatments will no longer be guaranteed free for uninsured people. Public health experts expect the situation will worsen disparities in treatment access and other COVID-19-related care, just as another subvariant could soon cause a new wave of cases

"We have a pattern in the United States of pumping a lot of money into public health during an emergency, and then cutting back once the emergency is over," said Jeffrey Levi, professor of health policy and management at George Washington University. "I think what we're seeing now is for the first time, Congress actually cutting back in the middle of an emergency, which is even worse."

Calif. group votes to limit reparations to slave descendants

California's first-in-the-nation task force on reparations has decided to limit state compensation to the descendants of free and enslaved Black people who were in the U.S. in the 19th century, narrowly rejecting a proposal to include all Black people regardless of lineage.

The vote March 29 split 5-4, and the hours-long debate was at times testy and emotional. Near the end, the Rev. Amos Brown, president of the San Francisco branch of the NAACP and vice chair of the task force, pleaded with the commission to move ahead with a clear definition of who would be eligible for restitution.

"Please, please, please I beg us tonight, take the first step," he said. "We've got to give emergency treatment to where it is needed."

Gov. Gavin Newsom signed legislation creating the two-year reparations task force in 2020, making California the only state to move ahead with a study and plan, with a mission to study the institution of slavery and its harms and to educate the public about its findings.

Reparations at the federal level has not gone anywhere, but cities and universities are taking up the issue. The mayor of Providence, Rhode Island, announced a city commission in February while the city of Boston is considering a proposal to form its own reparations commission.

The Chicago suburb of Evanston, Illinois, became the first U.S. city to make reparations available to Black residents last year, although there are some who say the program has done nothing to right a wrong.

California's task force members — nearly all of whom can trace their families back to enslaved ancestors in the U.S. — were aware that their deliberations over a pivotal question will shape reparations discussions across the country. The members were appointed by the governor and the leaders of the two legislative chambers.

Those favoring a lineage approach said that a compensation and restitution plan based on genealogy as opposed to race has the best chance of surviving a legal challenge. They also opened eligibility to free Black people who migrated to the country before the 20th century, given

Indianapolis and its partners, isn't a standard mortgage assistance program. Instead of getting money to put directly toward their mortgage, homeowners who have been affected by pandemic refinance — including late payments and fees — below market rate to save money.

The program is open to Marion County homeowners who owe between \$20,000 and \$200,000 on their home. It is administered in partnership with Merchants Bank of Indiana, Stock Yards Bank & Trust and Woodforest National Bank.

Renew Indianapolis CEO Steven Meyer said the program has assisted 19 households, and homeowners have saved an average of \$170 on their monthly payment. Over a 30-year period, that amounts to about \$61,000.

Meyer said the program received 146 applications from 26 ZIP codes. About 45% of loans went to households at or below 80% area median income.

Direct mortgage assistance programs were already in place, Meyer said, so the benefit of helping

people refinance is it can create long-term affordable housing. He said the plan is to continue the program even after the pandemic.

IndyAMP is a revolving loan fund, so as homeowners repay their mortgage, the money goes back into funding the next round of loans.

Meyer said Renew has applied for more funding from the city — \$720,000 this time — but isn't sure when the money might be approved or available. Learn more about IndyAMP at indyamp.org.

At the state level, the Indiana Housing and Community Development Authority (IHCDA) recently announced it received almost \$167 million for mortgage assistance as part of the American Rescue Plan Act.

Along with mortgage payments, the Indiana Homeowner Assistance Fund can be used for property taxes, homeowners insurance, and homeowner or condominium fees. The program is a continuation of the Hardest Hit Fund, which ended in the summer of 2021.

To qualify, applicants must have an income equal to or less than 150% area median income, adjusted for household size, or 100% of the national median income, whichever is greater. Applicants must also have experienced a financial hardship after Jan. 21, 2020, associated with the COVID-19 pandemic.

The maximum each household can receive is capped at \$35,000, which is paid directly to the mortgage lender.

IHCDA spokesperson Lauren Houck said it's too early to estimate how long the money will last or how many households the program may help, since not every household will need all \$35,000.

The agency created a needs index, Houck said, to determine which counties will likely need the most assistance. It takes into account factors such as household income and area demographics.

Ignite leader hopes to revive school at undetermined location next school year

A local charter school is trying to find its footing after its contract to operate within Indianapolis Public Schools was not renewed.

Ignite Achievement Academy is in the process of searching for a new building as it prepares to meet ambitious student academic standards next school year.

"Not at all dwelling on the past," said Shy-Quon Ely, Ignite co-founder and head of school. "I think we learned from the past, but our focus is on the visions of our future, the vision of our model and the ultimate expression of it."

IPS ended its contract with Ignite, which had been operating Elder Diggs School 42 since summer of 2017, in December. District leaders said the decision was based on several factors, including instability among teachers, low academic performance and deficiencies in compliance with special education requirements.

Ignite will cease operations at the school once the academic year ends in June.

Ignite has prided itself for its community engagement activities and unique student experiences, such as classical music playing in the halls and 'king' and 'queen' bathroom signs. The goal was to uplift its students, who are 80% Black and 11% Hispanic. A majority of students come from low-income families — 92% receive free and reduced lunch, a national standard for identifying childhood poverty, according to the IPS data.

Ely said he wants to create a similar K-6 learning environment next year at a different location.

"We believe that there's a genius in every person," Ely said. "Whether that's an adult, whether that's a child — doesn't really matter. The genius in there is waiting to be unleashed, and creating the right environment can do it."

Ely said Ignite is considering multiple building options for the new location. It could stay on the westside or move

to another area of the city. The school plans to provide transportation for students, regardless of the new location.

Ignite hopes to serve 250-350 students in the fall. It currently serves 350 students at Elder Diggs, but enrollment has consistently decreased. In the 2017-2018 school year, when it first started operating the school, roughly 500 students were enrolled.

The school is working with Enroll Indy to evaluate and confirm enrollment projections, and according to Enroll Indy, roughly 150 families have indicated an interest in staying with Ignite for next school year. Ely hopes that number will increase once the school's location is announced.

Staff will also have the opportunity to continue with Ignite. But that's another area where Ignite has struggled in the past. In 2021, teacher retention plummeted to just below 50 percent — the lowest in IPS, and 20 percent lower than the next-lowest school.

Ignite's probation status, academic goals for next year

The city's Office of Education Innovation — which authorizes and oversees the school's charter — warned Ignite in August 2019 that the school wasn't meeting its standards and must improve student attendance and academic proficiency in both math and English Language Arts. In December 2021, the mayor's office threatened to revoke the school's charter, placing it on probation. Ignite must meet the following goals by fall 2023:

- Improve student growth on the school's formative assessment from fall 2022 to spring 2023. At least 60% of students must show a year's growth. This must be accomplished by spring 2023.
- Meet 90% attendance for the 2022-23 school year. This must be accomplished by summer 2023.
- A proficiency rate of 8.9% for both English and math ILEARN assessments during the 2022-23 school year.
- A passage rate of 74% on the

IREAD-3 assessment for the 2022-23 school year.

- Outperform students' assigned schools (the neighborhood school the student would have attended if they did not opt to attend Ignite) on ILEARN in 2022-2023.

Ignite would have to make significant improvements to reach those standards. For example, Ignite had a chronic absenteeism rate of about 50 percent during the 2019-2020 school year. But in 2020-2021, the attendance rate was 84%, according to IPS data. And according to state data, less than 7% of students were proficient in English and just more than 4% were proficient in math during the 2018-2019 school year. About 46% of students passed the IREAD-3 assessment in the 2018-2019 school year. That increased to 56% in the 2020-2021 school year.

Despite the school's challenges, Ely said he believes Ignite has the right strategies, partners and environment to improve student success.

"If we're just looking at a data point, like ILEARN in a pandemic, I don't think that's the best way to determine if children are learning or if they're growing socially, emotionally and academically," Ely said. "It's a holistic approach that we're taking."

The city's Office of Education Innovation will meet with the school at least three times a year to discuss academics.

Clyde Posley, who's also a local pastor, has supported the school by providing professional development instruction and helped navigate the school's position with OEL. Posley has commended Ely's school model and efforts to help students who may experience domestic abuse or food and housing insecurity.

"I expect Ignite to do well, I really do," Clyde said. "I would not put my name and my reputation, my relationships, behind a person or concepts I didn't believe in."

Why Ignite wanted to leave IPS

Ely said one of the biggest challenges the school faced during its partnership

with IPS was switching school models.

He initially designed his charter program as part of local education reform group The Mind Trust's two-year school design fellowship. The goal was to create a school for kindergarten through second graders on the eastside of Indianapolis, then expand it to other grade levels over the years.

But when the opportunity arose to run Elder Diggs School 42, Ely chose to switch gears.

Ely said students began to show some academic improvement during the first year at Ignite — IREAD scores improved, but ILEARN/ISTEP scores dropped. Then the COVID-19 pandemic hit.

"I think the biggest challenge is being able to make progress through a global pandemic, when children and adults have to wear masks, and they have to social distance and you're in and out of school — it just makes an already arduous task that much more difficult," Ely said.

Ely said he appreciated the partnership with IPS and the ability to serve the westside community, but over the past few years he has considered continuing without IPS — by either opening a second school without IPS or moving Ignite — so the school could have its own building and transportation.

According to a school facilities report, the building is one of 12 that received a poor facility composite score, which is based on a school's physical and exterior condition, ability to support learning and technology infrastructure.

Ely also said IPS bus transportation has been unreliable.

"Particularly given a restart [school], we need students to be in their seats when class starts so that we can deliver on our promise," Ely said.

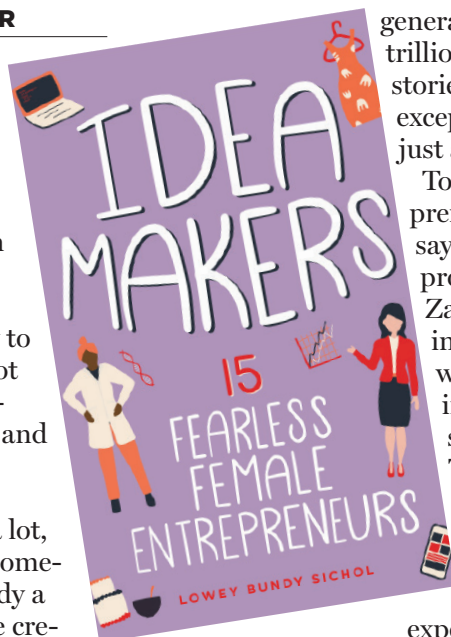
‘Idea Makers: 15 Fearless Female Entrepreneurs’

You’re a problem-solver. You see something that you can make better and so you do. You’ve never met something that can’t be improved, fixed or altered in some way, and the solutions always come easy. It’s a gift, really, one that you’re happy to share with people, so why not take a page from “Idea Makers” by Lowey Bundy Sichol and make it a career?

“I coulda thought of that!” You’ve probably said that a lot, especially after you’ve seen something that’s making somebody a lot of money. You could have created that. You could improve on that idea right now. You could be rich like Mark Zuckerberg or Jeff Bezos or Elon Musk.

But what about female entrepreneurs? Says Sichol, about 40% of the businesses in the U.S. are run by women,



generating nearly \$2 trillion a year. Their stories are just as exceptional, and just as inspirational.

To be an entrepreneur, Sichol says, solve a problem. Heidi Zak realized how inconvenient it was to buy a bra in-person, so she founded ThirdLove. Jenn Hyman understood that designer clothing was expensive, and she

sketched out Rent the Runway.

If there’s something for which you have a passion, then look at the story of Alli Webb, who knew that women wanted fun, fuss-free beauty and so she founded the Dry Bar. Lisa Price followed her nose, quite literally, into

Carol’s Daughter, an empire that offers wonderfully scented beauty products specifically for African American hair and skin.

Think about Reshma Saujani if you like to make a difference by helping others. She had two careers before realizing that helping girls learn to code was what she loved to do. Jasmine Crowe knew the stats: Millions of people go hungry every day in this country, and her Goodr helps fix that problem.

Finally, pay attention. Good ideas often come naturally when you work hard and keep your eyes open. It happened to Tate’s Bake Shop’s Kathleen King and Spanx’s Sara Blakely, and it could happen to you.

As you’re paging through “Idea Makers” and feeling quite inspired, one thing might eventually strike you: The women inside these pages are not necessarily household names. Some, in fact, may be totally unfamiliar to you which, in a way, makes its own point: Fame isn’t a requirement for entrepreneurship. The Gwyneth Paltrows and the

Beyonces of the world aren’t the only ones who can launch businesses.

In her introduction, and repeatedly through the profiles she shares, author Lowey Bundy Sichol also shows that gender has nothing to do with success, either, nor does speed. The stories of the women inside this book subtly show perseverance and dedication, two traits that are often ignored in many be-an-entrepreneur books. That honesty may, for readers who dream of being their own boss someday, be the best part of what you’ll read.

You might find this book in the Young Adult section, but it’s completely appropriate for an adult who’s struggling to find a path. If that’s you, reading “Idea Makers” may solve that problem.

File the FAFSA by April 18 to make higher education more affordable

With the April 18th FAFSA application deadline for state financial aid rapidly approaching, nearly two-thirds of eligible Hoosier students have not completed this vital form that unlocks millions of grant dollars to fund education beyond high school.

To help Hoosiers pursue higher education affordably, state officials are reminding students and families to file their FAFSA form and encouraging them to reach out to the non-profit financial aid experts at INvestEd for assistance.

“Whether you have a concrete plan for post-secondary education this fall or you’re still exploring your options, you should still file the FAFSA,” said Joe Wood, President and CEO of INvestEd. “Our state ranks fifth in the nation in the amount of need-based aid available, so there’s funding available in most cases. Some families mistakenly think they won’t qualify for aid, but you’ll never know if you don’t file.”

- To prepare to file the FAFSA, experts at INvestEd offer the following advice:
- 1.Filing the FAFSA is free – you should never pay for help completing or submitting it.
 - 2.You’ll usually need financial documentation, like tax returns, W2s and bank statements to complete the form.
 - 3.Completing the FAFSA isn’t a commitment to enroll in post-secondary education. Even if you’re only considering attending college, you should complete the application in case you decide to go.
 - 4.This form determines eligibility for state and federal aid. Pell grants, work study and subsidized federal loans are offered based on information from your FAFSA.
 - 5.Most colleges require the FAFSA to determine need for school-specific scholarships.
 - 6.Filing the FAFSA isn’t just for students pursuing a 4-year-degree. It’s also necessary for some trade schools and associate degree programs.
- According to a recent survey from INvestEd, nine in 10 Hoosiers agree that it’s important to have access to free, Indiana-based financial aid literacy when preparing to avoid taking on too much student loan debt.

INvestEd has worked with Hoosier families for more than 40 years to make college and post-secondary education more affordable, offering free guidance online, by phone, or during in-person events. The “boom and bust cycle,” he said, makes it nearly impossible to sustain improvements in health equity. And it’s the nation’s most vulnerable who suffer.

For example, the federal government will halt the program established in May 2020 to reimburse providers for testing and vaccinating people against COVID-19. Now, those who are uninsured or underinsured could be billed for vaccines and COVID-19 tests.

“What I see playing out is: uninsured people avoiding COVID-related care. For low-income individuals, even relatively small co-payments will inevitably push people away from getting tested,” said Dr. Adam Gaffney, a frontline pulmonary and critical care physician and professor at Harvard Medical School.

That could hamper infection control and worsen COVID-19 data and surveillance efforts. More importantly, Gaffney said, it will make the nation’s most vulnerable unable to access effective treatments, like oral antiviral pills and monoclonal antibodies. Some of these medications have been shown to cut the risk of hospitalization or death for high-risk patients by as much as 89%. But to get one of these treatments, you need a positive COVID-19 test and a prescription.

“We’re beginning to treat COVID more like any other illness: care being rationed by ability to pay,” he said. “And that’s the exact opposite of what we should be doing.”

A system that ‘favors the wealthy’ could get even more inequitable

Even with federal dollars flowing, uninsured people were more likely to be infected with the coronavirus and less likely to get tested for it. They were also less likely to get vaccinated, even though vaccines were free.

But that does not mean that the programs weren’t used. According to Gaffney’s analysis of CDC data, the program covered nearly \$19 billion worth of services, including \$6 billion in treatment, \$1.6 billion in vaccines and \$11 billion in COVID testing for the uninsured.

That’s all going away if federal lawmakers don’t move to restore funding. Funding cuts mean COVID-19 treatments, which are already in limited supply, will become even more scarce.

The federal government has purchased millions of doses of four outpatient COVID-19 treatments. Most of the supply is distributed via state health departments to hospitals, pharmacies and clinics that request doses. A portion has been set aside for direct shipment to clinics that operate in underserved communities disproportionately affected by COVID-19.

The White House has said the supply could run out as early as late May if funding is cut.

When supplies are scarce, designing systems for fair allocation becomes even more important to ensure equity, said Dr. Douglas White, endowed chair of ethics in critical care medicine at the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center.

But many states have not done that, he said, opting for a “first come, first serve” system.

“We know that ‘first come, first serve’ favors the wealthy and well-connected,” White said. “And for people who have poor health care access, ‘first come, first serve’ basically puts them at the back of the line.”

About 9% of the U.S. population is uninsured, and Black and Hispanic Americans are more likely to be uninsured compared to white Americans, according to data from the U.S. Census Bureau.

States aren’t tracking who’s getting COVID treatments

Most states have no information about who receives outpatient COVID-19 treatment, because they are not asking for it.

After setting aside 15% of the therapeutics for health centers that cater to underserved populations, the federal government left it up to each state to decide how to distribute the remaining 85%.

Health officials in many states have steered supplies to major hospital systems and commercial pharmacies, where anyone with a prescription can receive them.

But other states, like Minnesota, tried a different approach. The state is restricting the distribution of the oral antiviral Paxlovid to health facilities where a system is in place to prioritize patients who need it most.

JP Leider, director of the Center for Public Health Systems at the University of Minnesota School of Public Health, helped develop Minnesota’s allocation system. He said the approach

makes it possible for high-demand drugs in low supply to be reserved for the most at-risk patients, taking that burden off of places like commercial pharmacies.

The federal government provided guidance about who is clinically eligible for the treatments, but that still left some discretion up to the states.

During the omicron wave, for example, Leider said there were up to 10 clinically eligible patients waiting per dose of the monoclonal antibody treatment in Minnesota. Most states came across similar scenarios of extreme shortages.

The federal government also does not require providers to track or report demographic information about who receives the treatments. So, many states across the Midwest, including Ohio, Indiana and Illinois, don’t require it either.

This concerns Dr. Giselle Corbie, director of the Center for Health Equity Research at the University of North Carolina Chapel Hill.

“The reality is that these data are critically important,” she said. “Health inequalities disappear when we stop collecting data on race and other social identities but the impact does remain.”

Corbie worries disparities in access to health care will be exacerbated as programs that aimed to foster equity of access to COVID-19 care come to an end.

Beth Rwohle, CEO of HealthLinc, a federally qualified community health center in Indiana, shares those concerns. For now, she said the center still has “a lot of” tests, vaccines and treatments to serve the uninsured, but the funding cuts will create other challenges for her clinic.

“We are so used to having to find ways to serve our uninsured. This is just another barrier that we need to find a way to go over,” Rwohle said. “My wish is that we had more of a heads up.”

People can’t access a treatment they don’t know exists

Even though the supply of COVID-19 therapeutics has been limited, Rwohle said demand has been lower than she expected.

Until recently, HealthLinc in Valparaiso, was the only federally qualified health center in the state that received direct shipments of the new COVID-19 antiviral drugs. Rwohle said the clinic received 245 doses in January. But as of mid-March, only 60 doses — less than a quarter of the supply — had been used.

Federal data shows millions of doses are also sitting unused on shelves in pharmacies around the country, according to reporting from NPR.

Rwohle said she wonders if people aren’t getting as sick as they were earlier in the pandemic and as a result have not sought out COVID-19 treatment.

Low demand may be also due to lack of awareness about the treatments and knowledge about how to get them.

The White House launched a new website, COVID.gov, which aims to make it easier for people to find COVID-19 treatments, tests and vaccines.

But even if people are aware of the treatments, it doesn’t guarantee equitable distribution. Dr. William Trick, director of the collaborative research unit and a hospitalist at Cook County Health in Illinois, said racial minorities and underserved populations are the ones who likely need treatments the most but are least likely to access them.

Trick co-authored a CDC study that found relatively equal access to inpatient treatments once patients were sick enough to be hospitalized. But for outpatient treatments, like monoclonal antibodies, researchers found from November 2020 through August 2021, Hispanic patients received treatment 58% less often than non-Hispanic patients, and Black and Asian patients received treatment 22% and 48% less often, respectively, than white patients.

Part of the reason could be: People of color are more likely to face barriers, like inability to take time off work when sick and less access to primary care physicians. As a result, Black and Hispanic patients may not seek care until they’re seriously ill and require hospitalization.

“The problem isn’t just one of distribution,” Trick said. “It’s how do you get the people to know about the medication and come to the right clinical setting to get the medication?”

A power struggle of good vs. evil

Until recently the name Ginni Thomas meant nothing to me. If I ever heard of her, I don't remember. I could've went my whole life and not known who Ginni Thomas and been just fine.

Unfortunately, I now know who she is, and that's not a good thing.

Virginia Thomas, or Ginni as she's called, is the wife of Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas. The two have been married for 35 years. They've often referred to each other as "best friend," and it's been said by those who know them well, Ginni Thomas is the one person Clarence Thomas listens to. Basically, they're a close-knit couple. I commend them and believe all married couples should be as close as they're purported to be. My issue isn't on their closeness. That "King of Kings" comment threw me for a loop. I know who the King of Kings is, so who is Meadows talking about?

Thomas responded: "Thank you!! Needed that! This plus a conversation with my best friend just now... I will try to keep holding on. America is worth it!"

Thomas can believe what she wants. It's a free country. The issue, however, is the influence her beliefs have on her husband's work as a Supreme Court judge. I know couples can keep personal life and professional life separate, but it's unlikely these best friends keep many secrets.

A Morning Consult/Politico survey, conducted April 1-4, found 53% of voters believe Justice Thom-

as should recuse "himself from cases related to the 2020 election due to his wife's actions, including 76% of Democrats, 52% of independents and 31% of Republicans." I wasn't polled but count me in that number.

Justice Thomas has his own mind, yes, but there is an obvious conflict of interest. I was taught you should err on the side of caution and avoid even the slightest appearance of a conflict of interest. A Supreme Court justice should at least be held to this same level of ethics as a journalist.

What I've found most disappointing is just how partisan politics is today. Keeping power is top of mind. Maybe it's always been that way, but it seems it's all about one side winning. No one seems to care about the greater good. No one seems to care about working together for the good of this country. It's an all-or-nothing, which has left a divided country.

So, when I see Thomas' texts and read about her involvement in trying to overturn the election, I see someone who truly believes the election was fraudulent. It's her mission to right this wrong. And that's what this country has devolved to: good vs. evil. Not just two sides where people see things differently, but both working toward the same goals. It's easy for the righteous to vilify evil.

You don't compromise with evil. You don't let evil have power. This is a sad state of affairs for America.

We are watching

As Russia's completely unnecessary (and increasingly brutal) war in Ukraine rages on, President Volodymyr Zelensky has been steadily trying to ratchet up the pressure on the United States and its allies to provide more assistance to his country. In pleading his case, Zelensky is appearing in every forum from the Congress, to news shows, to the Grammy Awards. Broadcasting from a bunker somewhere in Ukraine's capital, Kyiv, Zelensky told the music show's viewers: "The war. What is more opposite to music? The silence of ruined cities and killed people. Our children draw swooping rockets, not shooting stars. Over 400 children have been injured and 153 children died. And we'll never see them drawing. Our parents are happy to wake up in the morning in bomb shelters, but alive. Our loved ones don't know if we will be together

again. The war doesn't let us choose who survives and who stays in eternal silence."

President Joe Biden and the Congress are listening. They've approved billions of dollars to address Ukraine's military and humanitarian needs. As I've previously stated, I'm all for that. Indeed, I've been exceedingly clear about my support for Ukraine from the beginning of this war. Russia's invasion is just one of the myriad ways in which democracy is under assault both in the U.S. and abroad. While the global postwar order is not at an existential crisis — yet — the time is now to move beyond platitudes in confronting and defeating totalitarianism. Democracy must be a nonnegotiable imperative. Beyond that, it is unimaginable to me that anyone could look at what's going on in Ukraine and not be deeply moved.

Yet, we should be mindful of the fact that there are, and always will be, conflicts around the world in which civilians are in danger of losing their freedom — and their lives. I

understand that the stakes are high in Ukraine given the threat that Russia poses to the stability of Europe and the wider world. The fact is that the geopolitical and military implications of Russian imperialism play into the West's calculus as much as the human tragedy that is unfolding. Policymakers here and in Europe understand the dire threat that Russia poses.

Yet, I wonder what this nation (and our allies) will do when there is a conflict that involves a majority Black or brown nation that is just as brutal but doesn't necessarily pose a threat to democracy or the world order — especially if it doesn't garner the overwhelming worldwide coverage that Ukraine has. The U.S. is obligated, for example, to defend Taiwan against Chinese aggression. We must also be very wary of North Korea's bombastic moves (and prepared to meet to counter them as necessary). But what about the ongoing crises on the African continent and in Latin America? The West in general, and the U.S. in particular, has a moral obligation not to allow humanitarian

crises to go unchecked, even when the security of our homeland is not directly threatened. If we are truly to be the world's "indispensable nation," let us act like it.

If such mobilization of military might and monetary means does not occur for conflicts outside Europe, millions of Black folks will say, "See, I told you so. White folks in America only care about white folks in other countries being slaughtered. We stood firmly with them on the side of the Ukrainians. Where are those white folks now?" This sentiment would be very understandable. Indeed, I would share it. But morality, which knows no racial or geographic boundaries, demands that we stand on the side of justice and humanity — wherever and whenever they are threatened. It is also incumbent upon us to continue the 400-year struggle for justice and humanity for African Americans. We will not fail to do so. And we are watching.

\$500,000 to the City of Indianapolis for mental health and substance use treatment services for people in need of permanent supportive housing
\$75,000 to Community Action of Greater Indianapolis Inc. for behavioral health treatment and services, including supportive services
\$300,000 to Ivy Tech Community College for a mobile unit to offer training and other services
\$600,000 to the United Northeast Community Development Corporation for a job training initiative, including supportive services
\$250,000 to Flanner House of Indianapolis Inc. for facilities and equipment
\$100,000 to Eclectic Soul VOICES Corporation for a job training program, including supportive services and stipends

I am incredibly honored to have secured these federal dollars, which is the latest in a long line of big wins for our community and our state. Through the American Rescue Plan, which became law in 2021,

I helped bring more than half a billion dollars back to our community for schools, universities, transit and more. In addition, the bipartisan Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, which I proudly supported, will update Indiana's transportation networks and help create many more good paying jobs. Thanks to this law, I'm confident we will remain "The Crossroads of America" for years to come.

For Black Hoosiers, these lifelines are particularly important. Our community continues to suffer from systemic inequalities that hinder our access to health care, a quality education, good jobs and other necessities. While we're making progress in reducing these inequalities through laws like the Affordable Care Act and the American Rescue Plan, there's still a lot of work to do. Local governments and nonprofits play a major role in promoting equity, and they do it with a powerful understanding of the needs of the communities they serve. Indianapolis complexes are Pleasant Run Senior Apartments and Wynbrooke Senior Apartments. A third complex in McCordsville is named in the lawsuit.

The alleged violations “signal that people with disabilities are not welcome,” the complaint says.

In general, alleged violations outside of the buildings include not having enough accessible parking spaces for residents with disabilities, not having accessible routes to primary entrances and not having mailboxes that are accessible to people in wheelchairs.

Alleged violations in the interior of buildings include not having accessible bathrooms and patios.

The lawsuit was filed March 22 in the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of New York Syracuse Division.

The complaint includes photos from the fair housing organizations’ investigations. At Pleasant Run Senior Apartments, for example, photos showed a striped access area in the parking lot without an accessible curb cut in the sidewalk, as well as a car blocking a sidewalk ramp.

FHCCI began its investigation of Indiana properties in June 2021 after being informed of possible disability discrimination.

Clover Group lists a general phone number that directs callers to leave a voicemail. The company has not

responded to a request for comment. On its website, the company says: “At Clover Group, we pride ourselves on delivering an affordable housing option committed to independence, dignity and helping the 55+ community live the life they always have.”

According to census data, about 14% of people in Indiana have some form of disability, though the FHCCI believes that is likely an undercount.

Congress passed the Fair Housing Amendments Act’s design and construction accessibility requirements in 1988. Any multifamily housing with four or more units built for first occupancy on or after March 13, 1991, must meet those requirements. According to the

lawsuit, that applies to all of the properties named in the complaint.

“Even with the passing of the fair housing accessibility amendments over 30 years ago, we still see blatant violations of disability discrimination throughout Indiana,” Brady Ripperger, FHCCI deputy director of administration and advocacy, said in a statement. “Persons with disabilities deserve basic, accessible housing, free from inaccessibility and discrimination.”

The housing organizations have requested a jury trial.

possible difficulties in documenting family history and the risk at the time of becoming enslaved.

Others on the task force argued that reparations should include all Black people in the U.S. who suffer from systemic racism in housing, education and employment and said they were defining eligibility too soon in the process.

Civil rights attorney and task force member Lisa Holder proposed directing economists working with the task force to use California’s estimated 2.6 million Black residents to calculate compensation while they continue hearing from the public.

“We need to galvanize the base and that is Black people,” she said. “We can’t go into this reparations proposal without having all African Americans in California behind us.”

But Kamilah Moore, a lawyer and chair of the task force, said expanding eligibility would create its own fissures and was beyond the purpose of the committee.

“That is going to aggrieve the victims of the institution of slavery, which are the direct descendants of the enslaved people in the United States,” she said. “It goes against the spirit of the law as written.”

The committee is not even a year into its two-year process and there is no compensation plan of any kind on the table. Longtime advocates have spoken of the need for multifaceted remedies for related yet separate harms, such as slavery, Jim Crow laws, mass incarceration and redevelopment that resulted in the displacement of Black communities.

Compensation could include free college, assistance buying homes and launching businesses, and grants to churches and community organizations, advocates say.

The eligibility question has dogged the task force since its inaugural meeting in June, when viewers called in pleading with the nine-member group to devise targeted proposals and cash payments to make whole the descendants of enslaved people in the U.S.

Chicago resident Arthur Ward called in to the virtual meeting, saying that he was a descendant of enslaved people

and has family in California. He supports reparations based only on lineage and expressed frustration with the panel’s concerns over Black immigrants who experience racism.

“When it comes to some sort of justice, some kind of recompense, we are supposed to step to the back of the line and allow Carribeans and Africans to be prioritized,” Ward said. “Taking this long to decide something that should not even be a question in the first place is an insult.”

California Assemblyman Reginald Jones-Sawyer, who voted against limiting eligibility, said there is no question that descendants of slaves are the priority, but he said the task force also needs to stop ongoing harm and prevent future harm from racism. He said he wished the panel would stop “bickering” over money they don’t have yet and start discussing how to close a severe wealth gap.


“We’re arguing over cash payments, which I firmly don’t believe are the be all and end all,” he said.

Reparations critics say that California has no obligation to pay up given that the state did not practice slavery and did not enforce Jim Crow laws that segregated Black people from white people in the southern states.

But testimony provided to the committee shows California and local governments were complicit in stripping Black people of their wages and property, preventing them from building wealth to pass down to their children. Their homes were razed for redevelopment, and they were forced to live in predominantly minority neighborhoods and couldn’t get bank loans that would allow them to purchase property.

Today, Black residents are 5% of the state’s population but over-represented in jails, prison and homeless populations. And Black homeowners continue to face discrimination in the form of home appraisals that are significantly lower than if the house were in a white neighborhood or the homeowners are white, according to testimony.

A report is due by June with a reparations proposal due by July 2023 for the Legislature to consider turning into law.

House passes \$35-a-month insulin cap as Dems seek wider bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House has passed a bill capping the monthly cost of insulin at \$35 for insured patients, part of an election-year push by Democrats for price curbs on prescription drugs at a time of rising inflation.

Experts say the legislation, which passed 232-193 on March 31, would provide significant relief for privately insured patients with skimpier plans and for Medicare enrollees facing rising out-of-pocket costs for their insulin. Some could save hundreds of dollars annually, and all insured patients would get the benefit of predictable monthly costs for insulin. The bill would not help the uninsured.

But the Affordable Insulin Now Act will serve as a political vehicle to rally Democrats and force Republicans who oppose it into uncomfortable votes ahead of the midterms. For the legislation to pass Congress, 10 Republican senators would have to vote in favor. Democrats acknowledge they don't have an answer for how that's going to happen.

"If 10 Republicans stand between the American people being able to get access to affordable insulin, that's a good question for 10 Republicans to answer," said Rep. Dan Kildee, D-Mich., a cosponsor of the House bill. "Republicans get diabetes, too. Republicans die from diabetes."

Public opinion polls have consistently shown support across party lines for congressional action to limit drug



costs.

But Rep. Cathy McMorris Rodgers, R-Wash., complained the legislation is only "a small piece of a larger package around government price controls for prescription drugs." Critics say the bill would raise premiums and fails to target pharmaceutical middlemen seen as contributing to high list prices for insulin.

Sen. Chuck Grassley, R-Iowa, said Democrats could have a deal on prescription drugs if they drop their bid to authorize Medicare to negotiate prices. "Do Democrats really want to help seniors, or would they rather have the campaign issue?" Grassley said.

The insulin bill, which would take effect in 2023, represents just one provision of a much broader prescription drug package in President Joe Biden's social and climate legislation.

In addition to a similar \$35 cap on insulin, the Biden bill would authorize Medicare to negotiate prices for a range of drugs, including insulin. It would penalize drugmakers who raise prices faster than inflation and overhaul the Medicare prescription drug benefit to limit out-of-pocket costs for enrollees.

Biden's agenda passed the House only to stall in the Senate because Democrats could

not reach consensus. Party leaders haven't abandoned hope of getting the legislation moving again, and preserving its drug pricing curbs largely intact.

The idea of a \$35 monthly cost cap for insulin actually has a bipartisan pedigree. The Trump administration had created a voluntary option for Medicare enrollees to get insulin for \$35, and the Biden administration continued it.

In the Senate, Republican Susan Collins of Maine and Democrat Jeanne Shaheen of New Hampshire are working on a bipartisan insulin bill. Georgia Democratic Sen. Raphael Warnock has intro-

duced legislation similar to the House bill, with the support of Sen. Majority Leader Chuck Schumer of New York.

Stung by criticism that Biden's economic policies spur inflation, Democrats are redoubling efforts to show how they'd help people cope with costs. On March 31, the Commerce Department reported a key inflation gauge jumped 6.4% in February compared with a year ago, the largest year-over-year rise since January 1982.

But experts say the House bill would not help uninsured people, who face the highest out-of-pocket costs for insulin. Also, people with diabetes often take other medications as well as insulin. That's done to treat the diabetes itself, along with other serious health conditions often associated with the disease. The House legislation would not help with those costs, either. Collins says she's looking for a way to help uninsured people through her bill.

About 37 million Americans have diabetes, and an estimated 6 million to 7 million use insulin to keep their blood sugars under control. It's an old drug, refined and improved over the years, that has seen relentless price increases.

Steep list prices don't reflect the rates insurance plans negotiate with manufacturers. But those list prices are used to calculate cost-sharing amounts that patients owe. Patients who can't afford their insulin reduce or skip doses, a strategy born of desperation, which can lead to serious complications and even death.

Ending Tuberculosis through Testing and Treatment

Tuberculosis, or TB disease, is one of the world's leading infectious disease killers. The bacteria that cause TB can live in the body for years without symptoms. This is called inactive TB or latent TB infection.

Without treatment, inactive TB can become active TB disease at any time and cause illness. Once TB becomes active, it can spread from person to person through the air. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's "Think. Test. Treat TB" campaign aims to reach those most at risk by changing attitudes around TB with awareness about the disease.

According to CDC, up to 13 million people in the United States are living with inactive TB and many don't know it. They don't have signs and symptoms of TB disease and cannot spread TB bacteria to others. However, if these bacteria become active and multiply, inactive TB can develop into active TB disease. CDC says anyone can get TB, but those who are at a higher risk include people who:

- recently spent time with someone who has active TB disease
- were born in or who frequently travel to countries where TB disease is common, including those in Asia, Africa and Latin America
- work or live in places with high risk for TB transmission, such as hospitals, homeless shelters, correctional facilities and nursing homes
- live or used to live in large group settings where TB is more common, such as homeless shelters, prisons, or jails

A person who is at risk should talk to their primary care physician or medical provider. The good news is that simple testing can determine if you have inactive TB, and several

short and convenient treatment options are available that can protect someone from getting sick.

There are two tests for TB. A TB blood test measures how the immune system reacts to the germs that cause TB. A TB skin test involves using a small needle to put some testing material under the skin. A return visit to the healthcare provider is required in 2-3 days later to see if there is a reaction.

Public and private healthcare plans may cover the costs of testing and treatment for TB infection.

More than 8 in 10 people who get sick with active TB disease in the United States each year get sick from long-standing, untreated inactive TB, which can develop into active TB disease years later.

The Tuberculosis (TB) program at the Marion County Public Health Department coordinates public health nursing case management activities for all residents with active or latent TB.

Services include providing TB therapy at no cost to clients, medication administration of directly observed therapy, sputum collection, assurance of appropriate care, and contact investigations.

Additionally, the TB program provides expert advice to area healthcare providers on TB, maintenance of all Marion County TB records, and monitoring of trends for outbreak and targeted testing purposes.

The TB program offers the Tuberculosis and Refugee Care (T.A.R.C.) Clinic for follow-up of uninsured Marion County residents and newly arrived refugees.

Judge blocks Air Force discipline over vaccine objections

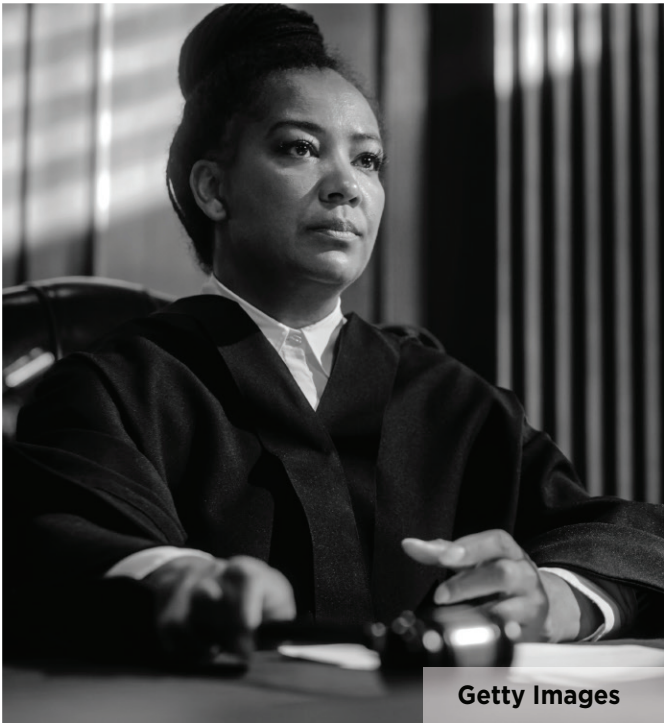
TOLEDO, Ohio (AP) — A federal judge has blocked the military from disciplining a dozen U.S. Air Force officers who are asking for religious exemptions to the mandatory COVID-19 vaccine.

The officers, mostly from Wright-Patterson Air Force Base near Dayton, Ohio, along with a handful of airmen and reservists, filed a lawsuit in February after their exemption requests were denied.

U.S. District Court Judge Matthew McFarland in Cincinnati granted a preliminary injunction March 31 that stops the Air Force from acting against the officers, airmen and reservists until their lawsuit is resolved.

The plaintiffs accuse the Air Force of using a double standard when it comes to approving exemption requests, saying it had allowed thousands of medical and administrative exemptions but only a handful for religious reasons.

Last week, a federal judge in Texas barred the Navy from taking action for now against sailors who have objected to being vaccinated on religious



grounds.

U.S. District Judge Reed O'Connor had, in January, issued a preliminary injunction preventing the Navy from disciplining or discharging 35 sailors who sued over the Navy's vaccine policy while their case played out. A week ago, O'Connor agreed the case could go forward as a class action lawsuit and issued a preliminary injunction covering about 4,000 sailors who have objected on religious grounds to being vaccinated.

Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin last year made vaccinations mandatory for service members, saying the vaccine is critical to maintaining military readiness and the health of the force. But members of Congress, the military and the public have questioned if the exemption reviews have been fair.

Those who refuse the vaccine can face discipline up to being discharged from the service.

The officers who filed the lawsuit in Ohio said they had followed their chain of command and each had talked with an Air Force chaplain to determine the sincerity of their beliefs.

Why the future of the world's largest religion is female – and African

(THE CONVERSATION) At the start of 2019, Bill and Melinda Gates released a list of facts that had surprised them the previous year. Number four on their list: "Data can be sexist."

"There are huge gaps in the global data about women and girls," they explained.

My interest was piqued — not only as a demographer, but as a woman and mother of girls.

I research women in global Christianity and am frequently asked what percentage of the religion is female. The short answer is 52%. But the long answer is more complicated — women make up a much more substantial part of Christianity than that number makes it seem.

The goal of my research is to put the spotlight on Christian women's contributions to church and society and fill in gaps in our data. Headlines about religion may be focused on the words and actions of Western male leaders, but the reality of the worldwide church is quite different. More and more Christians live outside Europe and North America, especially in Africa — and women are central to that story.

Measuring faith

Social scientists have shown for decades that women are more religious than men by a variety of measures — everything from frequency of private prayer to worship service attendance. Christianity, the world's largest religion, is no exception. Data from the Pew Research Center show that, compared to Christian men, Christian women are more likely to attend weekly church services (53% versus 46%), pray daily (61% versus 51%), and say religion is important in their lives (68% versus 61%).

It's not a new trend. In the Gos-



pels, women were the last at the foot of Jesus' cross, the first at his tomb. Research has shown they were critical to the growth of the early church, being more likely to convert to Christianity than men, and most of the early Christian communities were majority female. Throughout history, women were exemplars of the faith as mystics and martyrs, royal women converting their husbands and supporting convents, and founders of denominations and churches that are now all over the world. Women make up the majority of Christians today.

What researchers don't have is comprehensive data on women's activities in churches, their influence, their leadership or their service. Nor are there comprehensive analyses of Christians' attitudes around the world about women's and men's roles in churches.

"Women, according to an old saying in the Black church, are the backbone of the church," notes religion and gender scholar Ann Braude. "The double meaning of this saying is that while the churches would collapse without women, their place is in the background," behind male leaders.

But there's not much actual data, and without good data, it's harder to make good decisions.

At the center of the story

My current research is illustrating that women are the majority of

the church nearly everywhere in the world, and that its future is poised to be shaped by African women, in particular.

Christianity continues its demographic shift to the global south. In 1900, 18% of the world's Christians lived in Asia, Africa, Latin America and Oceania, according to my research. Today that figure is 67%, and by 2050, it is projected to be 77%. Africa is home to 27% of the world's Christians, the largest share in the world, and by 2050, that figure will likely be 39%. For comparison, the United States and Canada were home to just 11% of all Christians in the world in 2020 and will likely drop to 8% by 2050. Furthermore, the median age of Christians in sub-Saharan Africa is just 19.

One of the most common refrains about the church in Africa is that it is majority female. "The church in Africa has a feminine face and owes much of its tremendous growth to the agency of women," writes Kenyan theologian Philomena Mwaura.

Or as a Nigerian Anglican bishop recently told me, "If anyone tells you a church in Nigeria is majority male, he's lying."

It's clear that women have been a crucial part of Christianity's seismic shift south. For example, consider Catholic sisters, who outnumber priests and religious brothers in Africa — and on every continent, in fact. Mothers'

Union, an Anglican nonprofit that aims to support marriages and families, has 30 branches in Africa, including at least 60,000 members in Nigeria alone. In Congo, women have advocated for peacebuilding, including through groups like the National Federation of Protestant Women. Next door, in the Republic of the Congo, Catholic sisters were at the forefront of providing shelter, education and aid in postwar recovery efforts.

Yet here, too, more precise data about African women's contributions and religious identities is lacking. And beyond quantitative data, African women's narratives have often been ignored, to the detriment of public understanding. As African theologians Mercy Amba Oduyoye and Rachel Angogo Kanyoro have stated, "African women theologians have come to realize that as long as men and foreign researchers remain the authorities on culture, rituals, and religion, African women will continue to be spoken of as if they were dead."


Far from dead, African women live at the center of the story — and will continue to do so as healers, evangelists, mothers and the heartbeat of their churches.

to observe you, what in your roots would stand out about you? What details would catch their attention? What part of your story would give wings and fly as they write? Would it be a story of faith — meaning the time spent living for Jesus Christ? Or, would it be a story of wasted time — always pursuing vain pursuits?

Exodus Chapter 3 talks about Moses’ faith story. He played a role in the redemption of Israel. In dissecting Moses’ faith story, we learn how to be an effective leader. New vehicles must average 40 mpg by 2026, up from 28 mpg

DETROIT (AP) — New vehicles sold in the U.S. will have to average at least 40 miles per gallon of gasoline in 2026, up from about 28 mpg, under new federal rules unveiled April 1 that undo a rollback of standards enacted under President Donald Trump.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration said its new fuel economy requirements are the strongest to date and the maximum the industry can achieve over the time period. They will reduce gasoline consumption by more than 220 billion gallons over the life of vehicles, compared with the Trump standards.

They're expected to decrease carbon dioxide emissions — but not as much as some environmentalists want — and raise new vehicle prices in an industry already pressed by inflation and supply chain issues.

For the current model year, standards enacted under Trump require the fleet of new vehicles to get just under 28 miles per gallon in real-world driving. The new requirements increase gas mileage by 8% per year for model years 2024 and 2025 and 10% in the 2026 model year.

Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg, whose department includes NHTSA, said the rules also will help strengthen national security by making the country less dependent on foreign oil and less vulnerable to volatile gasoline prices. Gasoline nationwide has spiked to an average of more than \$4.22 per gallon, with much of the increase coming since Russia, a major oil producer, invaded Ukraine in late February. It cost \$2.88 per gallon just a year ago, according to AAA.

Gas prices also have helped to fuel inflation to a 40-year high, eating up household budgets and hitting President Joe Biden's approval ratings.

"Transportation is the second-largest cost for American families, only behind housing," Buttigieg said. The new standards, he said, will help keep the U.S. more secure and preserve "the freedom of our country to chart its future without being subject to other countries and to the decisions that are being made in the boardrooms of energy companies."

But auto dealers say more stringent requirements drive up prices and push people out of an already expensive new-car market. NHTSA projects that the new rules will raise the price of a new vehicle in the 2029 model year by \$1,087.

Trump's administration rolled back fuel economy standards, allowing them to rise 1.5% per year, which environmental groups said was inadequate to limit planet-warming greenhouse gas emissions that fuel climate change. The standards had been rising about

5% per year previously.

But the new standards won't immediately match those adopted through 2025 under President Barack Obama. NHTSA officials said they will equal the Obama standards by 2025 and slightly exceed them for the 2026 model year.

Some environmental groups said the new requirements from NHTSA under Biden don't go far enough to fight global warming. Others supported the new standards as a big step toward reducing emissions, with the American Lung Association calling for even stronger standards to drive a transition to all new vehicles having zero-emissions by 2035.

"Climate change has gotten much worse, but these rules only require automakers to reduce gas-guzzling slightly more than they agreed to cut nine years ago," said Dan Becker, director of the Safe Climate Transport Center at the Center for Biological Diversity.

Officials said that under the new standards, owners would save about \$1,400 in gasoline costs during the lifetime of a 2029 model year vehicle. Carbon dioxide emissions would drop by 2.5 billion metric tons by 2050 under the standards, the NHTSA said.

John Bozzella, CEO of the Alliance for Automotive Innovation, a large industry trade group, said increased regulations will require supportive government policies. Regulators should consider safety, consumer buying preferences, improved fuel economy and the transition to electric vehicles, he said in a statement.

NHTSA sets fuel economy requirements, while the Environmental Protection Agency develops limits on greenhouse gas emissions. NHTSA officials said their requirements nearly match rules adopted in December by the EPA, so automakers don't have to comply with two rules.

Franklin Township Community School Corporation

Shall Franklin Township Community School Corporation increase property taxes paid to the school corporation by homeowners and businesses? If this public question is approved by the voters, the average property tax paid to the school corporation per year on a residence would increase by 24.4% and the average property tax paid to the school corporation per year on a business property would increase by 16%. The political subdivision may issue bonds or enter into a lease to complete the 2022 Safety, Security, Capacity and Improvement Project, consisting of the renovation and expansion of Franklin Central High School, maintenance and repairs to school facilities including site improvements, and the purchase of equipment and technology, which is estimated to cost \$98,485,000 over 22 years. The most recent property tax referendum within the boundaries of the political subdivision for which this public question is being considered was proposed by Franklin Township Community School Corporation in 2011 and failed.

Perry Township Schools

Shall Perry Township Schools continue to impose increased property taxes paid to the school corporation by homeowners and businesses for eight (8) years immediately following the holding of the referendum for the purpose of funding the continuation of current academic and support programs and services and essential transportation services at their current levels? The property tax increase requested in this referendum was originally approved by the voters in May, 2015, and originally increased the average property tax paid to the school corporation per year on a residence within the school corporation by 44.5% and originally increased the average property tax paid to the school corporation per year on a business property within the school corporation by 38.4%.

Imprisoned Griner gets support from USA Basketball teammates

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — A’ja Wilson wishes that she and her USA Basketball teammates could do more to help Brittney Griner right now.

They’ve all been straddling the line of trying not to say anything that could potentially hurt the WNBA star’s case as she’s still imprisoned in Russia on drug allegations, but also wanting Griner and her family to know that they care about her.

“We’re not talking BG the basketball player, we’re talking about BG the wife, the daughter, the sister, the human being,” Wilson, the 2020 WNBA MVP, said April 1 at USA Basketball training camp.

“That’s what I’m caring about. I get the silence and you don’t want to talk about it. I can’t even imagine to put myself in that situation. It’s tough,” she said.

Griner, one of many stars who play in Russia during the WNBA offseason, was detained after arriving at a Moscow airport in mid-February. Russian authorities said a search of her luggage revealed vape cartridges that allegedly contained oil derived from cannabis, which could carry a maximum penalty of 10 years in prison.

The 6-foot-9 Phoenix Mercury center was returning to the country after the Russian League took a break for the FIBA World Cup qualifying tournament. The two-time Olympic gold medalist recently had her detention extended to the middle of May.

“Hopefully everyone’s doing what they need to do to make sure she get’s home safe,” Wilson said. “That’s going to be the top priority of all of us. I know it’s tough and hard.”

Players have been keeping discussions about how to best help Griner within their community. WNBA players have been very cohesive in the past when rallying behind issues such as voter registration or the Black Lives Matters movement.

For the first few weeks following Griner’s detention, it was decided that it was clearly better for them to say less. That’s changed over the last few days as players have been more available and willing to talk.

“I can guarantee you this, this group here and

women of the WNBA, we’re not going to forget about Brittney Griner,” USA Basketball coach Cheryl Reeve said. “Brittney’s not here, we’re going to do the things she would have done. She’s very philanthropic. Try to honor her in that way until the highest level of government can work this out.”

Breanna Stewart has stepped up to help The Phoenix Rescue Mission, a charity that Griner has been involved with for a long time.

“While BG is away I wanted to support her and her charitable efforts and do what I can from an off-the-court standpoint to help her and her family,” Stewart said.

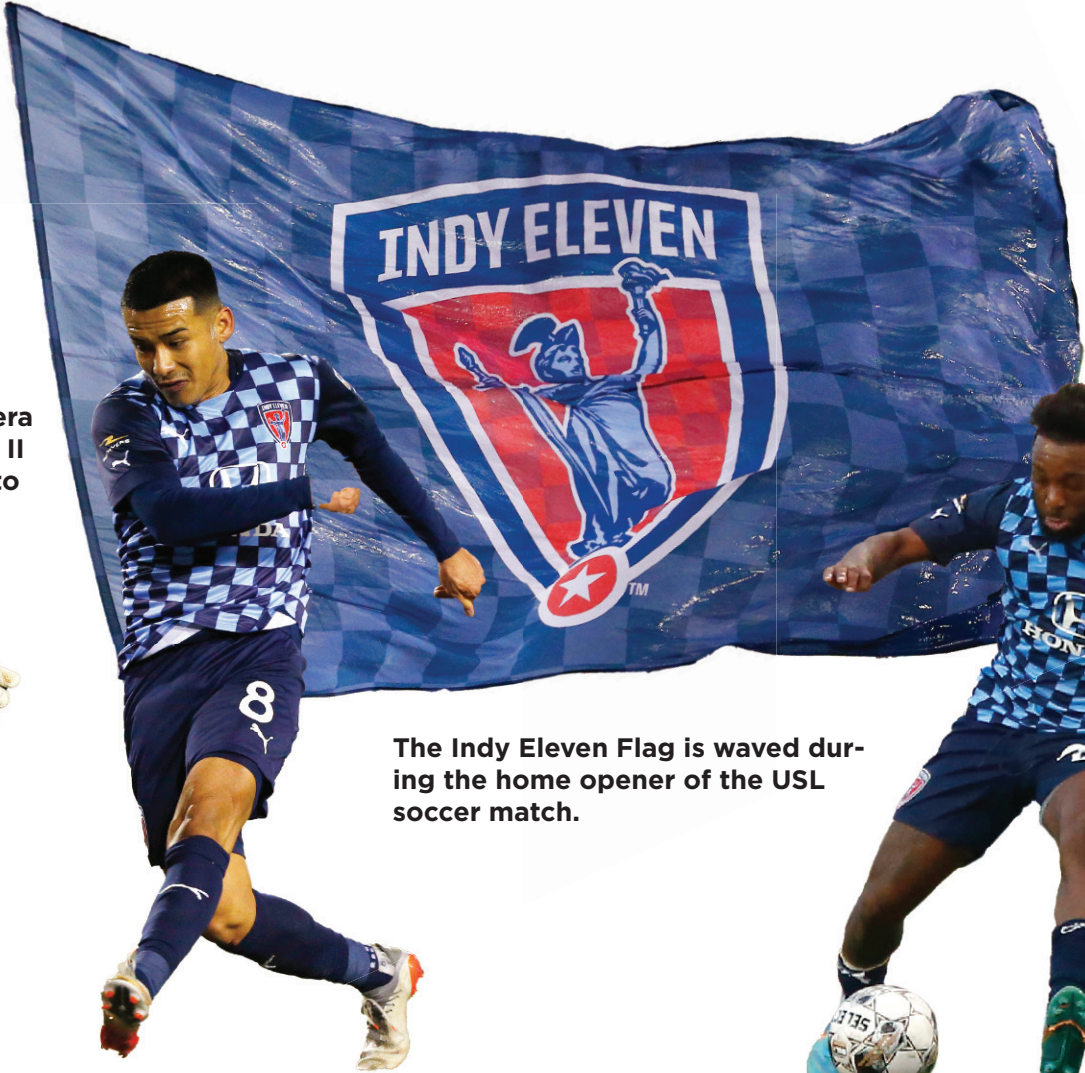
Griner’s legal team has been quietly seeking her release and has declined to speak out about the case since her arrest was made public.

Of the thousands of U.S. citizens arrested and jailed in prisons abroad, a small subset are designated by the U.S. government as wrongfully detained — a category that affords their cases an extra level of government attention and places them under the auspices of the Special Presidential Envoy for Hostage Affairs at the State Department. The U.S. government has not yet put Griner’s case in that category.

Griner is not the only American detained in Russia. Marine veteran Trevor Reed was sentenced to nine years in prison in 2020 on charges alleging that he assaulted police officers in Moscow. And Michigan corporate security executive Paul Whelan is serving a 16-year sentence on espionage charges that his family and the U.S. government have said are false. U.S. officials have publicly called for Moscow to release them.
