Council delays hearing on proposal that would require registration for some charitable work

The Indianapolis City-County Council will delay a public hearing for a proposal that would require individuals and organizations to register with the city for some larger-scale charitable work after aid groups criticized it for being harmful.

Proposal 256 would require a person or group intending to deliver food, clothing or other donations to at least 10 people in a

register with the Office of Public Health and Safety with at least 48 hours' notice. It was packaged with Proposal 250, which would give OPHS money to purchase two public restrooms and cleaning services at Old City Hall and Babe Denney Park.

The hearing for both proposals is tentatively set for 5:30 p.m. Aug. 24.

The proposals were introduced to the full council July 11 and

public right-of-way or property to referred to the Public Safety and Criminal Justice Committee, which will host the public hearing. The committee will then send the proposal back to the full council with either a do-pass or do-notpass recommendation.

> Proposal 256 garnered attention because it's sponsored by three Democrats — President Vop Osili, Vice President Zach Adamson and Kristin Jones — and is similar to a failed proposal that Democrats rejected in 2020.

AES reassures capacity as report warns of potential coordinated power outages



Extreme weather is causing increasing challenges for the power grid across the United States, and a report found experts are concerned it could result in coordinated power outages in several regions in the Midwest, including Indiana. But AES Indiana says it has a plan in place to avoid an energy shortfall.



The region's grid operator, Midcontinent Independent System Operator (MISO), was warned of potential coordinated power outages as the heat rises and more people use their air conditioners to keep cool, according to a report by the North American Electric Reliability Corporation. The report said Indiana has a "high risk of energy emergencies during peak summer conditions."

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Admin-

Indiana Black and Minority Health Fair expected to offer thousands of dollars in free health services

The 2022 Indiana Black and Minority Health Fair will run from July 14-17 at the Indiana Convention Center in downtown Indianapolis.

The 36th annual fair will offer up to \$2,500 worth of free health screenings and educational sessions, said Antoinette Holt, director of Minority Health at the Indiana Department of Health.

The health fair takes place at the same time that the Indiana Black Expo Summer Celebration will be happening. Holt said she hopes families attending the festivities will come to the fair to take advantage of the plethora of health services.

"I'm excited that we're going to have, hopefully, more people than we had

the last time," Holt said.

Last year, the health fair saw lower turnout than usual because of pandemic restrictions with about 5,000 visitors, compared to more than 14,000 visitors during pre-pandemic times. Holt said organizers expect turnout will be higher this year. The fair is also expected to attract out-of-state visitors like previous years.

The health fair will provide services such as COVID-19 vaccination, HIV and Hepatitis C testing, dental screenings, breast exams, mental health education, foot and ankle health services, blood donation, and educational panels and live entertainment.

The slogan of this year's fair is "Commit To Be Fit!" Indiana health com-



Education is a key solution for Black males

When I was in fourth grade, the highlight of my day was playing with my friend Shane Wilson, who was white. We would race to the playground every day at

Frances Bellamy School #102. I knew Shane looked different than me, but it didn't matter. I thought he was mad cool and fun to hang with. We didn't understand racism, discrimination and cultural barriers at the time.

One day toward the end of the school year, I was told that I wouldn't be attending Indianapolis Public Schools anymore. Instead, I would be attending Perry Township Schools, which was almost an hour away from my house. I was hurt and devastated. I was confused. I loved my school and my teachers, especially my favorite: the firm, consistent, yet loving and caring late Dr. Delores Sangster. There was little explanation as to why I had to leave my school, my favorite teacher and, most disappointing of all, my friend Shane.

I tried to explain to Shane that I wouldn't be at the school anymore and neither of us understood. We were both emotional and heartbroken. I didn't understand why Shane couldn't come to my new school since we were such good friends. I never saw him again and always thought of him through the years.


In fifth grade I started at my new school in Perry Township. I remember there were police cars and dogs all over the place. I thought someone had committed a crime at the school. Little did I know, my Black classmates and I were integrating the schools in the mid-'80s and not everyone was happy about it. It was called busing. Neither the teachers, kids from Perry Township nor the kids from Brightwood understood the culture shock we were about to experi-

ence. Many teachers expressed their disdain toward the group of melanated students they were being forced to teach. Some even used racial slurs and microaggressions like, "You speak good English" or, "You are different than them." My first thought was, "Who is them?" I felt like I was being set up for failure from the very beginning.

My classmates and I from Brightwood were placed in remedial classes and had to test our way into standard classes. I was only 10 years old. I knew I was smart enough to be in standard or advanced classes. I made good grades at School #102, so I couldn't understand why those educators didn't think I could do the same there. I guess Perry Township felt like we had not been taught at the level of their current students. This psychological treatment took a toll on a lot of kids from my neighborhood, and they couldn't cope, either dropping out altogether or finding themselves in trouble often.

I was suspended on many occasions for trivial reasons. I learned absolutely nothing from those suspensions. Many kids from my neighborhood were also set up to fail. Many were also suspended and expelled, preparing them for the school-to-prison pipeline or death at an early age. I have witnessed both. I beat the odds and finished high school. Social interaction during my college years was much easier than my high school years.

This week I will be keynoting the Indiana Black Expo Education Summit, which comes with a lot of emotion. I can't help but think of all my friends and colleagues from Brightwood who didn't make it through the busing transition from IPS to Perry Township. I didn't feel like we had a voice or mattered back then. Black men in this country are often set up and expected to fail. The suspension rates speak for themselves, while their white counterparts get less punishment for the same



offenses. Systemic oppression is alive and well. We must fight this by obtaining our education and positioning ourselves to succeed.

A Black man can become a police officer, a lawyer, a doctor, an educator or international speaker and author. But even with an education, when he gets pulled over, he is still a Black man in America. As Black men, we give ourselves more options when we equip ourselves with an education, which is our civil right.

I commend Indiana Black Expo for understanding the need for an education conference like this and allowing me the opportunity to share not only my story, but what I have learned. I was a young man who never knew his father, grew up in poverty in Brightwood, faced many obstacles from being robbed and assaulted on my paper route to being traumatized repeatedly with the death of close friends. I started my teaching career at Arlington High School in Indianapolis Public munity m around or successful Kentucky the opporting ity of life a remind the tion is not it's up to the work. I'm a proud product of the Brightwood community. I stand on the shoulders of Ralph Dowe, who epitomized leadership and pushed education for Black children. There is a lot of negative news, but stars come out of Brightwood. One of my best friends, Dr. Sheila Thomas, who grew up on my block on Lasalle, is now a physician in Indianapolis. Sherri and Terri Murray are successful graduates of Jackson State University and are now lawyers and doctors. Diane Tate is a psychologist in Columbus, Ohio. Robert Jackson is an award-winning author and international speaker. Don't tell me Brightwood and inner-city neighborhoods can't produce successful students and adults. I know what the statistics say, but God's word is sufficient.

I believe for every problem there is a solution. The solution that we face with Black males in the school system today is more focused education. There was a time when the elders stepped up to push our kids and not condemn them. There is no such thing as a perfect parent or student. We must continue to educate, activate and motivate our kids to be great. The community must unite to wrap our arms around our youth and push them to be successful.

Getting my education at Western Kentucky University has allowed me the opportunity to live a better quality of life and mentor other kids and remind them that their current situation is not their future destination and it's up to them to change the narrative through their education by putting in the work.


Thank you, Indiana Black Expo, for over 50 years of service to the city of Indianapolis and surrounding cities in Indiana. I will work alongside you to get the message out and put in the work to change the narrative.

The 355 (**1/2)

Need a break from CO-VID-19 mania and winter melancholia? A dose of pure escapism may help. For 122 minutes this often generic but surprisingly engaging espionage action/thriller may take your mind off your troubles.

You'll suspend disbelief for James Bond and all his improbable stunts. You're perfectly OK with Shang-Chi fighting a dozen men at a time when that's really impossible. So, show some respect for the five petite women in this adrenaline rush who kick ass like MMA champs. Is it plausible? No. Fun to watch? Yes. Part of the captivation is the script by Theresa Rebeck (TV's "Smash" and "NYPD Blue") and writer/director Simon Kinberg. They spin a tale full of intrigue, seasoned with enough plot twists and betrayals to keep you guessing and guessing until the mayhem careens to false ending after false ending. Normally this kind of contrivance is folly. Here, it takes attention away from the film's B-movie

qualities.
Director Kinberg's
filmography is impressive: producer of "Deadpool" and "The Martian,"

writer for "Mr. and Mrs. Smith" and "X-Men: Apocalypse." His only previous feature film direction was on "X-Men: Dark Phoenix." Now, tasked with guiding a cast and crew and choreographing action scenes, it's obvious he's


still working out some kinks. It's most notable when the kinetic movement dies down and the four or five heroines just sit and talk. For example, after a small victory, the women have drinks at a bar and converse, way too much. Other misguided exposition-heavy scenes flounder too. A cleverer director would always give the ensemble a "bit of business" to do. As they talked, they'd load guns, demolish a room, or make cookies — something to keep the

viewer's attention off the film's shortcomings. Sitting idly is a no-no.

Some nutjob has invented a data key drive the size of a mini-iPhone that can remotely down a plane, hack computers and destroy the world bit by bit. Mace's (Jessica Chastain, "Zero Dark Thirty") job as a CIA agent is to buy and confiscate the device. As is said, "The enemy is invisible like ghosts. ... They can destabilize entire countries from the simple reach of their keyboards." She

and fellow agent Nick (Sebastian Stan) arrange a lunchtime rendezvous at an outdoor Parisian café. It's a simple cash-for-weapon pickup with Luis (Édgar Ramirez, "Carlos"), a rogue operative. Nothing goes right. Nothing. They and others are in hot pursuit of a mechanism that can wreak precision havoc. The chase starts in Europe, heads to Morocco and then Shanghai. Find the deadly gadget before time

runs out or — ya-da-ya-da-ya-da. In so many action films, if the good guvs don't win the world will be annihilated. In this instance, impending horrific chaos will be as selective as a surgeon's scalpel. Determining who is zooming who and where the plot will go next is paradoxically predictable and unpredictable. International locations traveled by a multicultural cast add dimension. Toss into the mix a deadly German BND agent (Diane Kruger, "In the Fade"), an ex-British MI6 cyber tech head (Lupita Nyong'o, "12 Years a Slave"), a Colombian psychologist (Penélope Cruz, "Parallel Mothers") and a mysterious Chinese saboteur (Bingbing Fan, "X-Men: Days of Future Past") and the female casting is tight. Add some cranky evil villains (Jason Flemyng, "Lock, Stock and Two Smoking Barrels"; Pablo Scola, "The Queen's Gambit") who are eager to kill, and the good fight is on. FYI, Kruger is the most convincing, Nyong'o the most alert, Cruz is stiff at first, but then finds her strength when her character becomes angry, scared and sad. Fan has the proper amount of mystery and Chastain is quite able as

the ringleader.

Cinematographer Tim Maurice-Jones is best at filming the gorgeous location shots, almost as good with the combat sequences and knows how to light the lavish interior sets. Production designer Simon Elliott, art director Jack Berk and set decorator Anna-Lynch Robinson make all the props, hotel rooms, boudoirs, offices, etc. look just right. Stephanie Collie's costumes exhibit a good color sense and a contemporary style that flatters the beautiful women. Producer/musician/composer Junkie XL's ("Mad Max Fury Road") driving musical score turns the mayhem up several decibels. The only scenes that drag are the slow aforementioned dramatic ones; otherwise editors John Gilbert ("Hacksaw Ridge") and Lee Smith ("Dunkirk") give the footage a steady manic pace.

Yes, some of this movie just doesn't gel, like a white woman walking through a medina in Morocco without being stared at. Never happens. Or a woman entering a men's hammam (Muslim steam room) nonchalantly. Never happens. Some action scenes look hopelessly nondescript too, but you'll get over it. In a theater those transgressions may matter. But when this film hits a streaming service or VOD it won't. Viewers will be stuck to their sofas and skip bathroom breaks for 2 hours and 2 minutes.

Like "The 355" for what it is, not for what it isn't. Escape into it and enjoy the performances of five skilled international female actors who bring it.



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

Media fasts are a necessity for Black mental health

Anti-Black racism appears to be at an all-time high. Many are still traumatized by the targeted mass shooting of African American shoppers at Tops grocery store in Buffalo, New York, that left 10 people dead and three injured. Eleven of the 13 victims were African American. The alleged suspect was obsessed with

"replacement theory," which has been debunked and cited as a conspiracy theory based on paranoia and fear and not fact. He livestreamed the killings on

The killer's violent act brought back memories of other anti-Black mass shootings like the 2015 white supremacist murders of nine church members at Emanuel African Episcopal Church affectionately referred to as Mother Emanuel in Charleston, South Carolina. The constant exposure to this type of senseless violence, usually through social media platforms, causes mental and emotional stress to many, especially African Americans living in the United States, who have lived with centuries of domestic terrorism and anti-Black racism.

The verbal and physical harassment of Black Americans by white women is so prevalent that the name "Karen" has been used to describe irrational encounters in which some women violently attack the Black victim verbally or physically or weaponize the police against them. One only has to think of the

viral video of the former football player assailed and assaulted by a United Airlines baggage handler. The football player defended himself and was arrested, which is often the case when we defend ourselves.

Thus, it is often necessary to take a break from the media and to engage in what media scholars call a "media fast." A media fast is when you thoughtfully and intentionally disengage from forms of media for a fixed amount of time in order to give your psyche a break from the onslaught of often violent, stressful images, and stories found on traditional and digital media platforms.

According to media scholar Dr. Racquel Gates, media fasts serve a purpose because of the volume of images African Americans are exposed to. "It's not just the violent anti-Black content of the media; it's the omnipresence of it on every platform, coupled with a society where every interaction is increasingly happening in mediated spaces," says the associate professor of film and media studies at Columbia University. "You watch the news and have to hear about police brutality. You go online to look at social media and an associate shares a disturbing video."

Media fasts give African Americans a break from the stress of being Black in America and the constant mediation of Black trauma.

According to a 2021 study, Blacks reported poorer mental health in weeks when two incidents of anti-Black violence occurred when national interest was higher. This study identified 49 incidents of racial violence in the U.S. occurring between 2013 and 2017 and received widely varying levels of search interest.

The reality is that exposure to anti-Black violence has real consequences for Black mental health, so it is imperative that African Americans consider taking a break from traditional and online media.

What can African Americans do during a media fast? African Americans can take walks, do yoga, meditate, read books on uplifting or inspirational topics, play board games, knit and listen to music that makes you feel good. Form a group of non-toxic individuals and have coffee or tea and conversation about fun topics.

Don't feel compelled to give up everything all at once and for long periods of time, which can also cause stress. Start out slow and choose one media platform to give up for a few days and see how you feel. Then continue or add another or do what feels

Once you break your media fast, don't jump back in and pick up the same media habits. Instead of watching news shows that are opinion heavy, focus on traditional news programs that offer information with no editorializing. If watching the news causes you to lose sleep at night, then try reading it instead.

Whatever you do, make sure you take an occasional timeout from media in order to support your mental health because being Black in America is more than

Childhood is not meant to be deadly

(TriceEdneyWire. com) — In every child's life, there comes a point where innocence succumbs to life's cruelty and pain. It is the moment when the child starts to become aware of the

cold-hearted world in which we live. "It takes a village to raise a child" is the African proverb that means an entire community of people must provide for and interact positively with children for those children to experience and grow in a safe and healthy environment. It means we care for children even when the child is not our own. It also means, as adults, we make sacrifices for the child's welfare. So many times, the failure of the "village" destroys a child's innocence and life.

The senseless death of any child, regardless of race or class, is heartbreaking, yet it never ends. In 1944, the death of three children from Alcolu, South Carolina, reminds us of how history of violence, its hate-driven

criminal and judicial systems, and the cruel influence of people with power. Mary Emma Thames, 7, and Betty June Binnicker, 11, were murdered by severe blunt force trauma to the face and head, while George Stinney Jr., 14, was executed by the electric chair. Thames, Binnicker, and Stinney were like any typical kid, but Stinney, who was Black, was accused of murdering the two girls who were white. For decades, civil rights lawyers have cited the George Stinney case as one of the most blatant examples of racially biased justice, yet it is a widely unknown

Binnicker's and Thames' bodies were found in a ditch after the girls had failed to return home the night before. The two girls were last seen alive riding their bikes looking for flowers when they saw Stinney and his younger sister near their home. The two girls asked Stinney if he knew where they could find flowers. After police learned from a witness that Binnicker and Thames were seen talking to Stinney, the 14-year-old was arrested while his parents were not home. He was interrogated alone for hours without the presence of his parents or an attorney.

Police later claimed that Stinney confessed to the murders, but according to his sister Aime, she was with him when the crime occurred.

He he was tried before a jury of all white men. While whites crowded the courtroom, Blacks were not allowed to enter. His court-appointed counsel was a tax commissioner who never challenged the police officers who testified that Stinney confessed to the two murders, nor did he challenge the prosecution's presentation of two contradictory versions of Stinney's verbal confession. The trial presentation lasted only 2 1/2 hours. After deliberating for fewer than 10 minutes, the jury found Stinney guilty of murder.

On the same day, the judge sentenced him to death by electrocution. Standing at 5 feet, 1 inch tall, and weighing 95 pounds, George Stinney was too small for the adult-size electric chair. The mask and the straps were also too big to contain him. His family buried him in an unmarked grave, fearing vengeful whites would vandalize it.

Cruelty has become so accepted and normalized that even innocent children will not be safe and protected from death if it goes against safeguarding the interest of those with wealth and power. While they took 10 minutes to convict him, it took 70 years to exonerate him. Rumors about the actual culprit had long traveled through Alcolu's tight-knit Black communities. An alternate version of who killed the girls said the culprit was a well-to-do white man whose father had steered blame onto Stinney and away from his son. The real killer was never brought to justice. The fact that two girls suffered a horrific death and people knowingly punished the wrong person because of his race is an injustice and insult to those young girls' lives.

Some would say times are different now. While it is true we are no longer living in the Jim Crow era, we are still living in a world where powerful people of influence can be cruel.

Prayer in schools

The Supreme Court recently decided in Kennedy v. Bremerton School District that a now-former high school football coach had the right to lead his team in public prayer following games. The central constitutional question was whether such prayer was "state-sponsored" endorsement of religion. (The high school in

question is public.) Also at issue was whether some athletes may have felt the need to please their coach and to ensure playing time.

Following the decision, I reminisced about my childhood athletic experiences. I was a three-sport athlete in a public high school in the late 1980s. At the time it was common for coaches to lead teams in prayer following contests or practices. The "prayer circle" often included members of opposing teams, which we viewed as a gesture that transcended competition and sportsmanship. To my knowledge, no one — whether a student, parent or spectator — ever voiced opposition.

Did I feel coerced to participate? Not at all. Indeed, as a lifelong Christian, I welcomed it. As far as I knew, so did all my fellow athletes. While it was clear

that some students were more devout than others, I would have been quite surprised if my "less believing" teammates felt uncomfortable. It never occurred to me that coaches might dole out playing time based on whether a student joined the prayer. Of course, I can't say for sure whether some athletes felt pressure to participate. And, to be honest, I probably would not have been sympathetic to any who did not want to participate. (I have matured since then, despite

what my two teens might say.)

Millions of Christians, especially Evangelicals and conservative Catholics, are rejoicing at the court's decision — their concerns about school officials "indoctrinating" children notwithstanding. We should be clear that their joy is not about fealty to the Constitution; it is about the notion that Christianity is being "attacked" in America. To be sure, America is much less religious than it has been in decades past. Further, millions of people who formerly might have been silent about their opposition to Christianity are forcefully speaking out. However, opposition is not oppression. Religion — especially Christianity — is protected in America perhaps more than in any

other nation. As an Evangelical, I am grateful that I have freedom of religion. And, as an American who understands our history, I embrace the fact that freedom from religion is equally important. Christianity is not built on coercion or chauvinism; it is based on grace (from God) and evangelism. If more Christians were more concerned with presenting our faith in a loving and persuasive manner, we would lead more people to Christ. Spreading the "good news" — with a good attitude - should be our focus. Research shows that negative public perception is one of the key reasons why hundreds of thousands of people leave our faith

each year, not to mention the millions of nonbelievers who want nothing to do with Jesus based upon

their experience with Christians. Some will argue that they are not willing to "compromise" their beliefs, even if it means that there will be fewer Christians. First, there is no need to compromise one's beliefs, though it is clear that some tenets of Christianity (as many practice it) run counter to a pluralistic democracy. Second, many of my fellow believers have either forgotten or are unaware of Apostle Paul's strategy: "I have become all things to all people, that by all means I might save some' (1 Corinthians 9:22). To make matters worse, the sad reality is that too many of us have sold out our faith to a political party that places white Christian nationalism above the redemptive sacrifice of Christ

Unfortunately, too many Christians want to create a de facto theocracy. Indeed, far too many favor tactics and even laws that are more appropriate for countries like Saudi Arabia or Afghanistan than the U.S. They seem not to understand (or care) that the Constitution's establishment clause guarantees that people of other faiths are equally able to express their beliefs. Lost on them is the irony of exercising one's constitutional rights in such a way that is likely to result in the reduction of others' rights. Further, it will be interesting to see their response once Muslims and others begin to assert their right to public prayer.

I pray for the day that more Christians will have as much zeal to fight for those whom Jesus called "the least of these" as they do for the right to publicly parade their piety.

Concerned Clergy of Indianapolis joined local attorneys and the Indianapolis police chief to discuss their concerns with gun violence in Marion County now that the state's new permitless carry law is in

Concerned Clergy President Rev. David Greene said there is a lot of work to do and knows "no one individual can do it by themselves."

"Our job is not to toughen our children up to face a cruel and heartless world," he said at the press conference July 12. "Our job is to raise children who will make the world a little less cruel and heartless."

The Indiana General Assembly passed a law that removes the requirement to get a permit to carry a firearm; the law went into effect July 1. Any individual wanting to purchase a gun will still need to get a background check; however, they no longer need a license to carry a handgun.

"We do not take a position on state legislation or state policy, but we operate in this environment where in past several years we've seen epidemic and unacceptable levels of gun violence targeting innocent folks every day," U.S. District Attorney Zachary Myers said.

There are some restrictions on who can legally carry a handgun in public, including people with past criminal convictions or restrained by an order of protection. Several law enforcement leaders have criticized the law, including Indiana State Police Superintendent Doug Carter and IMPD Assistant Chief Chris Bailey.

Myers said it is a goal of the attorney's office is to find out where people are getting guns to commit crimes and look at how they are getting into the hands of children and teenagers. Myers said they will prosecute people who lie to legally obtain a gun, or people who buy guns to traffic them.

"Those illegally obtained, illegally transferred guns are fueling the crimes on our street," Myers said.

Myers said the office is shifting its focus to federally investigate and prosecute serious armed offenders.

The new law changed law enforcement's ability to enforce and prosecute cases, Marion County Prosecutor Ryan Mears said.

"We were really able to make significant progress in terms of how we were able to investigate and prosecute cases," Mears said. "We no longer have that tool available to us."

One thing the prosecutor's office wants to focus on is how young people get access to firearms.

One way, Mears said, is acquiring guns through social media. Private gun sales are not regulated in Indiana, Mears said, which makes it difficult to find and locate illegal gun sales.

It's too early to tell what, if any, issues are directly

related to the permitless carry law, IMPD Chief Randal Taylor said.

Another problem the department is running into, he said, is the magnitude to which guns are evolving. Now, people have the ability to 3D print gun accessories online. A Glock switch is a simple but illegal device that can be 3D printed, which turns a semiautomatic Glock pistol into a fully automatic firearm, according to the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives. The prosecutor's office has 32 pending cases involving Glock switches, compared to zero cases in 2019, Mears said. Most of the individuals are younger than 22 years old.

"So, we have younger people with a more highpowered firearm and access to higher firepower than they ever did before out there on the streets," Mears said. "That's a real challenge for us and law enforcement ... which is why it's so incredibly important that we invest in our community relationships and community partnerships."

Chief Taylor said it is up to individuals to carry responsibly. Taylor said to always store your gun in a safe, locked location and not in places such as a car or kitchen counter, and have a holster to carry it. "Please don't think this is a free-for-all," Taylor said.

missioner Dr. Kristina Box said the pandemic has meant that some people may have missed routine check-ups and other preventive measures such as childhood immunizations.

"I think people have a renewed outlook on the importance of their health. And so what we want to do is capitalize on that and show them, educate them about how they can prioritize their health by doing a few simple things, like getting a checkup on a yearly basis, like knowing their numbers," Box said.

Visitors can get their blood sugar, cholesterol levels, blood pressure and BMI measured at the health fair.

Families with children will be able to get school sports physicals, required back-to-school immunizations for free, and Indiana residents can also obtain a birth certificate for \$10.

Beside the health services, the fair will also offer a series of panels to

educate people around different issues, Box said.

"Throughout COVID, a lot of people became caretakers for family members and other people. And we are planning a lot of different panels around caretaking and Alzheimer's for our elderly population," Box said. "Mental health has become a huge issue and really exacerbated by the pandemic. So lots of great informational panels for people to attend."

The health fair will take place from 4-8 p.m. July 14, 1-7 p.m. July 15, 10 a.m.-7 p.m. July 16 and noon-6 p.m. on July 17.

There is no registration needed to attend the fair or receive free health services. A valid ID is required for families that need to get childhood immunizations and obtain a birth certificate.

istration is predicting an increase in above-normal average temperatures for most of the U.S. for June, July and August. Young said AES works closely with MISO to monitor the grid and weather, and both short-term and long-term plans are in place to avoid a blackout.

"We are aware of an elevated risk of energy shortfalls this summer and we're on high alert to make sure our customers have capacity," Young said.

AES does have the capacity, Young said, and coordinated power outages are extremely rare. There has never been one in the state of Indiana, and AES has no plans to implement a coordinated power outage as of now. Coordinated power outages are an emergency step that is only taken as a last resort, Young said.

"At AES we manage our generation and fuel supply, we know we have a capacity," Young said.

In June, AES joined Climate READi, a three-year initiative to address resilience and adaptation to the energy system as extreme weather events continue. This will enable better planning in the wake of climate change, designing and operating.

AES is also investing \$1.2 billion through revAMP, an initiative that modernizes the electric grid to meet ever-changing energy needs. The investments will help upgrade and replace aging equipment and provide new technology such as smarter technology that troubleshoots the grid in real time and intelligently connected "smart" meters, according to a press release.

"Joining EPRI's Electric Power Research Institute Climate READi Initiative will help us build on our existing improvement efforts by providing valuable insights into future climate impacts, rather than relying on historical data," said Kristina Lund, president and CEO of AES US Utilities said in a





The impact of COVID-19 on HBCUS and Black students

While the world has been focused on the growing numbers of COVID-19 causalities, the media has somewhat ignored the long-term educational and economic impacts of the pandemic especially for Black students. Although there has been some attention given to the disparities between Black Americans and other groups contracting the virus, it is not an exaggeration to say that the Black community will be recovering from the impact of CO-VID-19, health-wise, economically and educationally, for at least the next two decades.

Throughout the pandemic, historically Black colleges and universities (HBCUs) have been on the frontlines addressing the impact the pandemic has had on students, faculty, staff and surrounding communities. In March 2020, when college campuses across the country closed and sent students home, many HBCUs continued to house hundreds of students who did not have homes to return to. Groups of students were stuck on campus with-



The Thurgood Marshall College Fund (TMCF) worked with our member schools — America's 47 publiclysupported HBCUs — and many of their corporate partners to help secure access to needed support for students. Beyond academic scholarships, TMCF stepped up to help provide grants for students, assisting them with rent, groceries and transportation. At one HBCU, more than half of the students and faculty did not have the adequate computer hardware or broadband internet access to participate in remote classes. Corporate partners supported the purchasing of laptops and hotspots for both students and faculty to facilitate the pivot to online learning.

Despite their long history and accolades, HBCUs as a collective have continued to struggle with proper



funding, receiving less per-student aid from their states, along with less research funding from the federal government. These institutions are highly tuition dependent, which can cause a great challenge anytime enrollment numbers are compromised. Closing campuses and sending students home meant that many schools had to return housing funds that traditionally would have supported the university's operations. Recognizing the great infringement that the pandemic placed on the schools, we shifted part of our focus of providing scholarships and career readiness opportunities to work with HBCUs to provide support restructuring their finances, securing new resources and planning for the 2020-21 and 2021-22 academic years.

Part of the shift also included engaging corporate partners to help find new and creative ways to help students succeed in this environment. For example, McDonald's expanded its partnership with TMCF in 2020 to provide additional scholarships beyond their original commitment for HBCU students. This commitment extended in 2021 to support students who overwhelmingly were high-achieving performers but came from low-income backgrounds and needed the extra support during this unprecedented time. As a nonprofit committed to the advancement of Black students, we understand that the best way to address disparities is to invest in students so they can persist in their studies, graduate and progress to economically sustainable careers.

We also partnered with our member schools to provide enhanced mental health resources to help students address the emotional needs that may have emerged as a result of the changing landscape of the world. Among other amenities, TMCF scholars were offered access to Shine, a minorityowned mobile app which offers self-

care resources to better manage mental health challenges like stress and anxiety.

The resilience of Black students in the face of the pandemic further illustrates the importance of HBCUs for engaging the Black community. Though the pandemic has presented extraordinary challenges in the last two years, HBCUs have emerged even stronger. While many colleges had steep drops in enrollment during the pandemic, HBCUs experienced the exact opposite. Many of the country's largest HBCUs are seeing record numbers of applications. The COVID-19 crisis inspired a new approach to working together as a network and building new capabilities in online learning, student retention and attraction, and more. This has only strengthened HBCUs' unique position to help fill the social and economic gaps Black Americans experience, given these institutions' assets, experience, and cultural and historical significance.

As a legacy corporate partner, Mc-Donald's stepped up to support HBCU students because of its longstanding commitment to supporting the Black community and empowering the next generation by creating opportunity through educational initiatives. Today, we call on other major corporations to do the same — address inequities by investing in diverse students, who are posed to be the next generation of changemakers. Their journey to leadership starts with a college degree, and with the proper resources that degree can come from an HBCU.

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












Summer and hot weather go together, so be sure to take steps and stay cool when temperatures rise. Getting too hot can make you sick. The main things affecting the body's ability to cool itself during extremely hot weather are:

High humidity. When the humidity is high, sweat won't aporate as quickly, which keeps your body from releasing heat fast as it may need to.

Personal factors. Age, obesity, fever, dehydration, heart disease, mental illness, poor circulation, sunburn, and prescription drug and alcohol use can play a role in whether a person can cool off enough in very hot weather.

Those who are at highest risk include people age 65 and older, children younger than two, and people with chronic diseases or mental illness. Closely monitor these vulnerable populations, especially those who depend on you for their care.

Take time and make sure they drink plenty of water, have access to air conditioning, and have anything they might need to keep cool.

Some other important ways to prevent illness or death from the heat:

Stay in air-conditioned buildings as much as possible. People can reduce the risk for heat-related illness by spending time in public facilities that are air-conditioned and using air conditioning in vehicles when possible.

Do not rely on a fan as a primary cooling device during an extreme heat event. Drink more water than usual and don't wait until you're thirsty to drink.

Even young and healthy people can get sick from the heat if they participate in strenuous physical activities during hot weather. Limit outdoor activity, especially midday when the sun is hottest. Wear and reapply sunscreen as indicated on the label.

Start activities slow and pick up the pace gradually. Drink more water than usual. Muscle cramping may be an early sign of heat-related illness. Wear loose, lightweight, light-colored clothing.

When playing a sport that practices during hot weather, protect yourself and look out for teammates. Schedule workouts and practices earlier or later in the day when the temperature is cooler and monitor a teammate's condition and have someone do the same for you. Also, seek medical care immediately if you or someone else has symptoms of heat-related illness.

Resources on staying health and safe in the hot weather are available at CDC.gov.

Free Diabetes Self-Management Classes

The program provides access to educational services and information in the area of managing and preventing diabetes.

Information presented in the classes aims to empower those with diabetes to achieve and maintain good health, prevent complications that may develop from uncontrolled diabetes, and increase knowledge and skills for successful diabetes self-management.

Instruction is given on medications, nutrition, exercise, monitoring, complications, and available community resources.

Class members participate in individual consultations with a registered dietitian, registered nurse and a health educator.

Classes in August will be offered online on Tuesday, Aug. 9, 16, 23 and 30 from 1:30-3:00 p.m. The series is free, but registration is required one week prior to the first class. 'Faith without works is dead': Indy's Black faith leaders use religious conviction to push community change

The Black church has been and continues to be a place for Black people to seek refuge. With concerns about violence, mental health and rising prices throughout the city, the faith leaders and their congregations are answering the call for the community.

For Rev. David Greene, president of Concerned Clergy of Indianapolis and pastor at Purpose of Life Ministries, his religious conviction is what drives his continuous involvement in community

"Faith without works is dead," he said. "For me, faith is not something that is just locked in a Sunday service or Wednesday Bible study. The needs are so vast to just sit on the sidelines and pray about it."

People rely on faith-based communities for not only their religious practices but also for mental health care, financial assistance, day care and education. Like Greene, the faith of many other prominent community figures motivates the work they do for the Black community.

The Black faith leaders and their congregations are also at the frontlines of many of the social justice initiatives. In the last few months, Dr. Carlos Perkins, senior pastor at Bethel Cathedral AME Church, has worked with other faithbased organizations, such as Faith in Indiana and Indiana's Black Church Coalition, to advocate for better mental health policies in the community.

"For us, the work continues around advocacy and around pushing those legislators as much as we can, to make of all," he said.

They have demanded from elected officials, including Mayor Joe Hogsett, action on gun violence prevention and a crisis team to respond to mental health calls. While he said his church is dedicated to community involvement, his religious beliefs are the leading source for his participation in social justice movements throughout the city.

"My faith practice has been the foundation of my community work," he said. "The practice of our beliefs, faith, requires us to be social justice minded. To provide food to those who are hungry and visit those who are incarcerated


sure that they are considering the rights and sick, that's what our faith believes and that's how it's manifested."

> Dr. Lionel Rush, president of the Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance of Greater Indianapolis, is a part of another alliance — Indiana Alliance for Equity, Diversity and Inclusion for Electric Vehicle Infrastructure and Economic Opportunities — to ensure the plan to place electric vehicle charging stations throughout the state will benefit the Black community. He

said his faith in God gives him a broader view on life and helps him be consistently involved in the community, like God.

"Faith needs to be consistent," he said. "I believe in a holistic God, the body, the soul and the spirit. If God is anything, he is consistent, and I believe that applies to every segment in life."

Local Black faith leaders have varying stances on abortion

Early on in her college career, Rev. Shonda Gladden learned she was pregnant. About three months into the pregnancy, the slight bump on her stomach made her and her partner's excitement grow.

"We were looking forward to being parents," she

However, when the couple went in for their first ultrasound, they learned there was no baby, just tissue in the uterus that needed to be removed. A molar pregnancy is a rare complication where a noncancerous tumor develops in the uterus and results in a nonviable pregnancy, according to the Mayo Clinic.

One of the commonly used methods to remove the tissue is the same method used during early-term abortions called dilation and curettage (D&C).

Gladden is the pastor at Broadway United Methodist Church, a multicultural church, and she advocates for women's rights to safe abortion practices, among other social justice initiatives.

It has been more than 20 years since Gladden had the D&C procedure, and now with Roe v. Wade overturned, she worries this might not be an option for women who could go through something similar if abortion becomes illegal in Indiana.

"It's certainly disheartening," she said. "An abundant life means the ability to choose."

The U.S. Supreme Court's decision to overturn Roe v. Wade on June 24 has opened the door to ban or further limit abortion access in Indiana. Black churches and faith leaders, who are both anti-abortion and support abortion rights, have expressed concerns about how the decision could negatively impact Black women more than others.

Dr. Reginald Fletcher, pastor at Living Word Baptist Church, describes himself as pro-life but still does not believe the court's decision was rational.

"Even though I support pro-life, that does not negate the fact that they are hurting people that need support," he said. "My faith is based upon the life that Jesus Christ set for us as an example. I want to first hear what people are going through in order to help

them from a balanced perspective, not by what I think is right and what I think is wrong."

Living Word Baptist Church has several counseling groups to support women. These groups are open to the public and are also available to people who need support through grief.

Rev. David Greene, president of Concerned Clergy of Indianapolis and pastor at Purpose of Life Ministries, said his church has been advocating for better health practices and assistance for Black mothers and their children long before the court's decision.

"We respect that a doctor and a woman should be able to make their own decisions," he said.

In 2018, Black women in Indiana accounted for 18% of maternal deaths while Black babies made up only 13% of births, according to a report from the Indiana Maternal Mortality Review Commit-

When Greene learned of the many complications Black mothers could have during childbirth, he and his church began to do something about it. They started fundraising for Zeta Phi Beta Sorority Inc.'s annual infant mortality fundraiser. He said he will continue to advocate for better health insurance policies and more support for Black

Abortion is still legal in Indiana, but that could soon change in the Republican-controlled Statehouse. There will be a special session starting July 25 where Indiana legislators will address abortion and inflation relief.

Whether abortion becomes illegal or not, Black faith-based institutions say they will continue to support Black women.

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



Record inflation shrinks housing affordability, worsens racial wealth gaps

This summer, temperatures are not the only thing rising above normal.

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported that the nation's consumer price index (CPI) at the end of May was the largest since December 1981, more than 40 years ago. This key economic measure tracks the change in prices paid by consumers for goods and services for about 93% of the total U.S. population.

The most recent report released on June 10 showed double-digit CPI increases for fuel, food, utilities, and both new and used vehicles.

Even before this data release, many consumers already adjusted their lives to compensate as best they could for \$5 per gallon gas prices, keeping family cars longer and taking fewer family outings to free up funds for still-rising food prices.

But how much longer can housing remain affordable when prices for both homes and rents are rising even higher?

Homeownership, historically a reliable building block to family wealth, is more of a challenge today for first-time homebuyers. As of 2022's first quarter, the median price of an existing single-family home grew to \$368,200, according to the National Association of Realtors (NAR), 15.7% higher than a year

Families able to afford a 20% down payment on this median-priced home can look forward to a monthly mortgage of approximately \$1,383, which is \$319 more - 30% higher - than a year ago, according to NAR.

For Black America, however, a history replete with systemic discrimination in education, employment, lending and housing imposes additional harsh realities that have yet to be effectively addressed.

From 2013 to 2019, after adjusting for inflation, the median household income of Black households increased by just \$800, compared with about \$3,000 for white households and \$3,700 for Latinx households, according to research by the National Equity Atlas that analyzed the nation's 100 largest metro

of neighborhoods affordable to Black households dropped by 14%.

"Shrinking neighborhood affordability and the dearth of affordable neighborhoods that provide the necessary conditions for health, well-being, and economic success in many large metros are reinforcing longstanding patterns of racial segregation and creating new ones," concludes the report.

Other new research from Freddie Mac sought to identify the causes of soaring home prices and where affordable homes might still be found.

What drove home price growth, and can it con-

Freddie Mac's new report found four factors driving escalating home costs:

Record low mortgage rates in 2020

- and 2021 generated a race to beat future rate increases. Home inventories were limited due to
- underbuilding on one hand, and below average distressed sales on the other. The number of first-time homebuy-
- ers grew due in part to favorable age demographics. Many consumers left high-cost cities
- for cheaper ones that already had a housing shortage. Where affordable homes can be found brings to mind an old adage in real estate, "location, location, location."

"As of February 2022, migration out of the largest 25 cities remains three times higher than the rate pre-pandemic," states the Freddie Mac report. "The most significant increase in migration has been to midsized metro areas with populations between 500,000 to 1 million, followed by smaller midsized metros and smaller metro areas."

The irony is that today, many consumers are paying more for fair market rent (FMR) than many monthly mortgages that lead to home equity and wealth.

The down payment

monthly mortgage note — is the primary barrier to homeownership for many renters. With a rising cost of living, few — if any — dollars remain at the end of a month for many families. And even if a family has managed to save a few hundred dollars or more, home down payments on the private market are tens of thousands of dollars.

Some home lenders may offer adjustable-rate mortgages (ARMs) as an alternative to cash-strapped buyers. But the key word in these loans is "adjustable." When loan interest resets occur, borrowers should plan for higher interest rates. It would also be prudent to remember that the foreclosure crisis of the early 2000s was fueled by high-cost mortgage loans that left millions of Black and Latino homeowners either without a home or remaining in one with a loan balance larger than its market value.

If this nation really wants to address its affordable housing crisis, then it is time to give Black America a level playing field with access to affordable and sustainable mortgages. It is equally important to diversify new-construction housing.

Currently, the vast majority of new-construction housing — whether for rent or for purchase — is for higher-income consumers, leaving moderate and low-income families with severely shrinking housing

Every family of every income needs a home. Effective housing reforms would offer both access and affordability — not either-or.

versus Goliath matchup in the playoffs against a largermarket team. Just give me that and a twilight double-

header Getty Images to boot and I'll be more than just fine.

Yes, as screwed up as the professional game has become, I can't shake the memories of Willie Stargell going deep as I inhale a bratwurst and a 44-ounce beverage. Those memories are forever, no matter how much MLB continues to alter what was once so frick-

So grab a loved one and visit the old ballpark soon. I'll be there, you know, the one they're attempting to move out of a box seat after discovering I simply moved down from the upper level when the usher turned away for a moment.

Wave at me as I'll be there, still trying to figure out why they sing Neil Diamond's "Sweet Caroline" during the seventh inning stretch instead of "Take Me Out to the Ball Game."

LONDON (AP) — Olympic great Mo Farah — the winner of four gold medals and one of Britain's greatest and best-loved athletes — has been carrying a secret burden all these years: He was illegally brought to the U.K. as a youth and forced to care for other children before he escaped a life of servitude through running.

In a new documentary, Farah says his real name is Hussein Abdi Kahin and that he was from taken from the East African nation of Djibouti when he was about 8 or 9. He says a woman he didn't know brought him to Britain using fake travel documents that included his picture alongside the name Mohammed Farah.

The revelations come as Britain struggles to deal with a surge of people fleeing conflict and hunger in Africa, the Middle East and Asia on flimsy boats organized by human traffickers who assist the desperate to cross the English Channel. Criminal gangs are also smuggling people into the country and forcing them into sex work, criminal activities and unpaid labor.

In the documentary, produced by the BBC and Red Bull Studios, Farah said he thought he was going to Europe to live with relatives and had a piece of paper with the contact details.

"The lady took it off me and right in front of me ripped them up and put it in the bin," Farah said in the film. "And at that moment I knew I was in trouble."

The woman took him to an apartment in west London where he was forced to care for her children, Farah said. He wasn't allowed to go to school until he was 12.

"I wasn't treated as part of the family," Farah said. "If I wanted food in my mouth, my job was to look after those kids — shower them, cook for them, clean for them."

Farah was granted U.K. citizenship in 2000 and represented Britain at three straight Summer Olympics starting in 2008. He captured hearts in Britain and elsewhere with the look of joy

and astonishment after his triumph in the 5,000 meters at the 2012 London Games after earlier winning the 10,000-meter title. He won the same races at the 2016 Games in Rio de Janeiro.

He was knighted by Queen Elizabeth II in 2017.

Farah previously said he had moved to Britain with his parents as a refugee from Somalia. But in the documentary, he says his parents never were in the U.K. His father was killed by gunfire during unrest in Somalia when Farah was 4, according to the film. His mother and two brothers live on the family farm in Somaliland, a breakaway region of Somalia that

recognized. Farah says his fortunes changed when he was finally allowed to attend school. A teacher who was interviewed for the documentary recalled a 12-yearold boy who appeared "unkempt and uncared for," was "emotionally and culturally alienated" and spoke little English.

But he began to blossom on the track and eventually told his story to a physical education instructor. The teacher contacted local officials, who arranged for a Somali family to take him in as a foster child.

"I still missed my real family, but from that moment everything got better," Farah said. "I felt like a lot of stuff was lifted off my shoulders, and I felt like me."

Farah said he had feared he would be deported if he spoke about his childhood experiences. He decided to tell his story to publicize and challenge people's perceptions of human

trafficking, he said.

"I had no idea there was so many people who are going through exactly the same thing that I did," he said. "It just shows how lucky I was."

In 2020, more than 10,000 people were referred to authorities in Britain as potential victims of modern slavery, up from 2,340 in 2014, according to the Home Office, the government agency responsible for border enforcement.

Immigration authorities are also under pressure as the number of people lives," she said. entering the country on small boats jumped to 28,526 last year from 299 in 2018, government statistics show.

The U.K. has struck a deal with Rwanda to send some asylum seekers on a one-way voyage to the East African nation, where they would be able to apply for asylum. While Prime Minister Boris Johnson says this will break the business

of pounds to cross the Channel, immigration rights groups say it is illegal and inhumane.

But modern slavery doesn't only affect migrants. Nongovernmental organizations are at pains to insist that victims of modern slavery are forced into servitude bound by coercion and violence rather than shackles. Such organizations have often found it difficult to put a human face on the crime, posted three emojis of folded hands trauma. That alone makes Farah's case unique.

Justine Carter of Unseen, a charity that deals with victims of modern slavery, stresses that it takes courage to

overcome such conditions. Farah's revelation will let people around the world know that modern slavery can happen anywhere.

"I just have to take my hat off to somebody who has come through that trauma and has lived that experience, but has actually still succeeded in life, because I think there are far too many people that, for them the trauma is too much and unfortunately don't have the right support mechanisms in place to kind of thrive and move on with their

Besides raising awareness, Farah's example could encourage others to seek

"There is always a way out, an alternative, a channel that you can go down. And I think Mo Farah has been living, breathing proof of that," she said.

Britain's Home Office said no action would be taken against Farah — and not just because he is a prominent athlete.

Home Office guidance makes clear that the agency assumes a child is not complicit in gaining citizenship by deception, stating: "If the person was a child at the time the fraud, false representation or concealment of material fact was perpetrated, the caseworker should assume that they were not complicit in any deception by their parent or guardian."

Politicians, sports figures and celebrities rushed to offer Farah their support. London Mayor Sadiq Khan praised his courage.

"Everything Sir Mo has survived proves he's not only one of our greatest Olympians but a truly great Briton," Khan tweeted. "@Mo Farah thank you for sharing your story & shining a spotlight on these awful crimes. We must build a future where these tragic events are never repeated."

Usain Bolt, an eight-time Olympic champion sprinter from Jamaica, fearing that exposure will inflict further sometimes referred to as "prayer hands" - on Farah's Instagram page. Andrew Butchart, Farah's teammate in 2016 and sixth-place finisher in the 5,000 meters in Rio, posted "Much love" and "very proud" along with a heart emoji.
