HERMAN WHITFIELD III'S DEATH RULED A HOMICIDE

The in-custody death of Herman Whitfield III was ruled a homicide by the Maron County Coroner's Office. The coroner's autopsy report was provided by attorneys for Whitfield's family.

According to the report, Whitfield, who died in police custody in April during an apparent mental health cri-



sis, died of "cardiopulmonary arrest in the setting of law enforcement subdual, prone restraint and conducted electrical weapon use."

The office also listed "morbid obe-

In a statement, Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department said its investigators will move forward with the criminal and administrative investigations.

"Chief Taylor has instructed the IMPD Critical Incident Response Team to finish all remaining aspects of the crimi-

Police laud actions of man who killed Indiana mall attacker

GREENWOOD, Ind. (AP) - A 20-yearold man likely assembled a rifle in the bathroom of a suburban Indianapolis shopping mall before shooting five people in the food court, killing three of them opened fire at the Greenwood Park Mall shortly before it closed the evening of July 17, the city's police chief, James Ison, said at a news conference.

Sapirman continued shooting people until he was shot and killed by 22-year-old Elisjsha Dicken, of Seymour, a city about 45 miles south of Greenwood, who was shopping with his girlfriend, Ison said,

Modeling school to celebrate 50 years with reunion fashion show

The House of Jayne Charm and Modeling School will celebrate its 50th anniversary with a fashion show, which will display the talents of former models and honor the person who started it all, Miss Jayne Brown.

The reunion fashion show will start at 5 p.m. July 31 at The Jewel Event Center, 3333 N. Illinois St. The event will include a buffet, reception, music, entertainment and the fashion show. Admission is \$50.

History of the House of Jayne

When Brown became interested in modeling, she joined Cordie King Castle Modeling and Charm School. After graduating from the school in 1962, Brown began teaching modeling workshops at local community centers, where young Black boys and girls were able to develop their selfesteem. Brown enjoyed working with her students and seeing their development.

Some of the models were able to compete nationally in NAACP fashion shows, and, according to Brown, three of her models were placed in the top 10.

Many other business ideas were generated from the modeling school. House of Jayne would later branch into a boutique shop and a bridal service business all while maintaining the modeling school.

In 1976, Brown became immobilized due to rheumatoid arthritis — a chronic inflammatory disorder where the body's immune system attacks its own tissue and joints. Her family and friends helped maintain House of Jayne while she was on bed rest.

House of Jayne would close

Homelessness down 9%, but African Americans still overrepresented in annual count

Black families represent 82% of families with minor children experiencing homelessness, according to the Coalition for Homelessness Intervention and Prevention (CHIP).

"Particularly black female-led households with children, are experiencing homelessness at disproportionate rates. When you look at eviction data and who is most impacted, there are correlations," Chelsea Haring-Cozzi, CHIPS's executive director, said in a statement.

The coalition and the Center for Research on Inclusion and Social Policy at IUPUI's Public Policy Institute released an annual report on homelessness as required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Volunteers worked from Jan. 24-28 and asked people where they stayed on the night of the

nal investigation and present the case to the Marion County Prosecutor's Office (MCPO) by end of day Friday," the statement said.

The prosecutor's office will review the investigation and determine if criminal charges are warranted.

Following the criminal investigation and any criminal proceedings, the civilian-majority Use of Force Review Board will make a recommendation to IMPD Chief Randal Taylor on whether the officers' actions were in compliance with department policies and training.

Based on a review of the facts and the board's feedback, Taylor will consider discipline up to a recommendation of termination to the Civilian Police Merit Board.

Whitfield died April 25 after his mother called 911 and said her son was having "some sort of episode."

Police body camera footage shows officers entering the home in the 3700 block of Marrison Place and attempting to talk to Whitfield, who didn't appear to understand officers' questions or directives. He then ran from a bedroom to the kitchen, and then into the dining room, where an officer tased Whitfield.

Whitfield's family filed a wrongful death lawsuit against the city and police officers involved in his death, alleging they used excessive force.

time. Brown, who is now 83, will host the fashion show not only as a reunion but to also show the business's perseverance through the good and bad times.

"To reach 83 after going through all that I have been through and having my family with me to share this experience, I am just grateful," she said.

Where are the models now?

Valerie Lin McCray is not the shy 15-yearold she was when she first met Brown. Now, at 63, she is a Democratic politician whose most recent campaign was for U.S. Senate.

While she admitted she is still introverted, when she needs to give a speech, McCray uses the modeling tips Brown taught her, finds the confidence to get on stage and says what she needs to say.

"There's nobody like Miss Jayne," she said. "We were little kids from the hood, but she made sure that we were up on stage. Her idea of beauty transcended what traditional ideas of beauty were. She felt we were beautiful as is."

Gloria Payton enrolled in modeling school at 17, during her final year of high school. After participating in the modeling school, Payton became a hair stylist, and at 65, she is a salon owner. She said a lot of the lessons she learned from Brown are embedded in her everyday life.

"It helps you in every aspect of your life," she said. "It takes confidence and knowing how to communicate to all people. I contribute a lot of my success to her."

Sabae Jones-Martin is a certified paralegal and is going back to school at 64. She said she was blessed to meet and work with

Brown as a teenager because it showed her the potential she possessed.

"Jayne Brown took a group of young Black teens, gave us confidence and made us feel like anything is possible," she said. "She taught us that we could do whatever we wanted to do and be whatever we wanted

to be."

24th.

Homelessness continues to disproportionately affect Black people. They accounted for the largest percentage of those experiencing homelessness at almost 56%.

"We know that our community made progress in our collective rehousing efforts in 2021 ... but we also know there is still significant work to do to address the ongoing racial disparities and to address the increase in family homelessness," Haring-

Cozzi said.

The count showed a 15.7% increase in family homelessness with children under the age of 18.

The coalition divides homelessness into three categories: sheltered, unsheltered or other (for example, staying with family or friends).

The number of unsheltered and sheltered individuals decreased by 9%. There were 202 unsheltered and 1,559 sheltered. The number of sheltered individuals is much higher because of emergency shelters and transitional housing.

Haring-Cozzi said the data can only give a snapshot of the problem rather than a definitive answer as to why it exists. But she believes federal COVID-19 relief and getting more people into permanent housing from shelters set up during the pandemic contributed to the progress.

For the first time in six years, there has been a decrease in the number of individuals experiencing homelessness at age 62 and older. The report also found veteran homelessness has decreased by 35%.

"Part of the strategy is to ensure that those who are being impacted and those with lived experience are at the table, informing decisions, and driving solutions," Haring-Cozzi said.

ILEARN scores show struggling students remain behind after pandemic

Student passing rates on Indiana's standardized test rose slightly last school year, but many students remain far behind where they would have been without the educational disruption caused by COVID-19. And state officials say some students are not making academic gains fast enough to catch up from the education they missed out on.

About 30.2% of Indiana students passed both the math and English sections of ILEARN in 2021-22, according to data released July 13. That's a 1.6 percentage point increase from the prior school year and several percentage points below the rate before the pandemic.

Indiana also released summary results from a study of how the pandemic impacted student learning conducted by the National Center for Assessment, a nonprofit. It found that while many students were learning as much - or more - as they did before the pandemic, the lowest-scoring students were still losing ground.

"Across the board, our lowest-performing students are not demonstrating improvement," said Charity Flores, the education department's chief academic officer.

Flores noted that English language learners in particular had smaller gains on the state English exam. Students who receive special education services also had declining or stabilizing results in English, although they saw improvement in math.

State board member Scott Bess, who leads a network of charter high schools said that if students progress through school without catching up after missing instruction during the pandemic, it will have a ripple effect that "scares the crap out of me."

"As a state, these kinds of results should be a big flashing red light that says we have to do something," Bess said after the meeting. "There's noth-

solving this problem."

The standardized test is given to Hoosier elementary and middle school students in grades three through eight. The state administered ILEARN for the first time in 2019, but it did not test students in 2020 due to the pandemic. When the test returned in 2021, passing rates declined significantly -asign of the societal and educational turmoil students endured.

Indiana Secretary of Education Katie Jenner said educators' efforts are having a positive impact. But for some students, the learning measured by the test stalled or was continuing to decline.

"We must continue to aggressively pursue innovative solutions to best support all of our students, especially

ing that I think is more important than our students who are still overcoming the challenges posed by the pandemic, as well as students who were underperforming prior to the pandemic," Jenner said in a statement.

Statewide, about 41% of students passed the English exam, while over 39% passed the math section in 2022.

Scores varied significantly among subgroups. Just about 17% of students who qualified for free or reducedprice lunch, a proxy for family income, passed both tests. Among affluent and middle-class students, about 42% passed both sections of the test.

Bess, the state board member, highlighted gaps in passing rates among Black, Hispanic and white students. About 10% of Black students passed both tests. Just over 17% of Hispanic students passed both. And almost 37% of White students passed both.

"We have to address that," Bess said. "This isn't like this is a surprise - part of the pandemic - this has been systemic."

The state has largely ended the negative consequences that schools used to face because of low passing rates. In 2021, the legislature eliminated consequences from its accountability model, such as state takeovers of local schools.

ILEARN scores also won't be used to give schools A-F letter grades. Instead, all schools will be assigned a "null" or "no letter grade" for the 2021-2022 school year. The state plans to launch a new performance dashboard in the fall.

'BLACK SKIN: The Definitive Skincare Guide' by Dija Ayodele, foreword by Caroline Hirons

Inside and out.

That's where you wear your beauty. Your eyes glow with warmth and your smile is sunshine; your heart touches people and lets them know they're loved. The body you've been blessed with is strong and comfortable. Now what about your largest organ? In "Black Skin" by Dija Ayodele, you'll see how you can care for it best.

Short shorts, tank tops, bare shoulders, barely-there sleeves. You want to wear them all this summer, and you want to look good doing it. So how do you make sure your skin is in the best shape possible?

Dija Ayodele is a skin care expert and the first thing you should know, she says, is that "flawless skin is for babies." You're an adult and you'll never achieve a "flawless" complexion again. But she has advice on how you can turn heads with a glow.

For centuries, Black women have been "actively told that Black is not beautiful." Avodele offers history to prove it: More than a hundred years ago, slaves were treated like they "were beastly and put on show as spectacles." For many Black people in the past, that led them reach for chemicals to lighten their skin, which breaks Avodele's heart. She hopes today's readers can learn to love their skin by becoming experts on it.

There are many similarities between Black skin and white skin; the differences are cultural and "physiological." Black skin has more melanin that helps protect from the sun, but don't get lazy: Avodele savs vou should use a sunscreen because Black skin is still prone to sunburn. Also, "Black

will crack if you're slack!" So use a really good moisturizer.

Know the difference between skin type and skin condition. Stop smoking, quit your bad diet, cut down on alcohol, stop stressing, and get some sleep. Be prepared for the things that can go wrong with your skin, and learn about keloids and hyperpigmentation. Bust some myths, know which products to leave in the store and how to find a professional if you need one, and build a regiment.

Your skin will thank you for it.

Show your shoulders, flash your fingers, flaunt your feet. Summer fashions practically demand that you do, but what if your skin isn't ready for all that? Reach for "Black Skin" and get some help that will take you far beyond your surface.

But this book isn't just for those who are looking for beauty.

Ayodele helps you understand why you sometimes believe your skin has a mind of its own. She tackles acne, skin tags and vitiligo as well as ashiness and over-dry spots, and her advice is wide-ranging and easily understood. Best of all, she makes readers feel like their skin is a precious gift. Having that kind of information doesn't at all replace a dermatologist, but it's the next best thing.

Not just for women, this book also includes a chapter for men and children, too. Reading "Black Skin" is something you'll want to do, from the inside out.

night if not for a responsible armed citizen," said the chief, noting that authorities were still trying to determine a motive for the attack.

The Johnson County and Marion County coroners' offices identified the slain victims as a married Indianapolis couple - Pedro Pineda, 56, and Rosa Mirian Rivera de Pineda, 37 - and Victor Gomez, 30, also of Indianapolis. A woman and a 12-year-old girl who was hit by shrapnel were wounded in the attack, police said.

Although authorities said Dicken was legally armed, the mall prohibits people from carrying weapons on its property. The mall issued a statement saying it grieves for the victims and praising Dicken's "heroic actions." It didn't mention its no-weapons policy and its operator, the Simon Property Group, didn't respond to a request for comment.

As of July 1, Indiana law allows anyone age 18 or older to carry a handgun in public except for those prohibited for reasons such as having a felony conviction, facing a restraining order or having a dangerous mental illness as determined by a court. Indiana's Republican-dominated Legislature retained provisions in the law that allow private property owners to prohibit firearms.

The attack was the latest in a string of mass shootings in the U.S. Schools, churches, grocery stores and a July Fourth parade near Chicago have all become killing grounds in recent months, though the country's staggering murder rate can often be seen more clearly in individual killings that rarely make major headlines.

Authorities initially said that four of the victims were female and one was male, but they corrected to two males and three females.

Ison said Sapirman entered the mall and walked into a bathroom, where he spent about an hour before he emerged and opened fire. He said investigators believe Sapirman spent that time preparing and possibly assembling a disassembled rifle that he had brought in his backpack. He ended up firing 24 rounds within 15 seconds.

Ison said Sapirman used an AR-15style rifle during the shooting and that investigators found another one in the bathroom. They also found a handgun on Sapirman, who was wearing a waistband holster and had several magazines that contained more than 100 rounds of ammunition.

Although police don't know a motive

for the attack, Sapirman's relatives told investigators that he recently received notice that he was being evicted from his apartment, though Ison said authorities were still trying to confirm that. Relatives also said Sapirman resigned from a warehouse job in May, he said.

"Right now we have no motive. His family members that we spoke to, they were just as surprised as everyone else was. They said there were no indicators that he was violent or unstable," Ison said.

The chief said Dicken fired 10 rounds from his handgun, and that as he fired, Sapirman "attempted to retreat back into the restroom and failed, and fell to the ground after being shot."

"He engaged the gunman from quite a distance with a handgun and was very proficient in that, very tactically sound. And as he moved to close in on the suspect, he was also motioning for people to exit behind him," Ison said of Dicken.

Sapirman had a juvenile record, including for a fight at school and an incident where he ran away from home, but he had no criminal record as an adult, the chief said.

He said relatives told investigators that Sapirman has been practicing shooting at a gun range, and that records obtained by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives confirmed he had frequented the range and bought ammunition there over the past two years.

Ison said officers recovered a cellphone from a toilet in the mall bathroom that they believe Sapirman placed there. At Sapirman's apartment, they found a laptop and can of butane inside the oven, which was on and set to a high temperature, the chief said without elaborating.

The cellphone and the laptop, which was damaged by the oven's heat, will be analyzed by the FBI.

Mark Myers, the mayor of Greenwood, a city of roughly 60,000 people just south of Indianapolis, said the grieving community is shocked to be the scene of a mass shooting.

Your credit score is a number that tells a story of who you are as a customer. The good news is that understanding how it works and monitoring it can help you take control of the story over time.

Credit scores are determined by agencies called credit bureaus and are based on your accounts you have opened, and how and when you pay down debt. Learn your number. Knowing your credit score is the first step. There are many free credit check tools available that work by doing a 'soft pull' that won't affect your score. One example is Credit Journey by Chase. You can also request your credit report from all three credit bureaus for free once a year. The Federal Trade Commission – a government agency that supports consumer rights—offers more information at https://consumer.ftc.gov. You can also visit www.annualcreditreport.com.

Know how your score is calculated. There are six key areas that make up a credit score:

- vour payment history
- how much you owe on your debts or balances
- new accounts or credit opened
- credit checks
- available credit
- and your credit history or how long you have kept an account open.

These factors determine your score and influence any changes, however the most important one is making payments on time, which accounts for about 40% of the score¹.

Build your credit. Scores can range from 300 to 850. According to the credit bureaus, a score of about 700 is considered "good"². To build your score, pay bills on time and consider setting up automatic payments. If possible, pay down any debt you can, and only apply for accounts you need.

Prepare for large purchases. If you are getting ready to make a large purchase and plan to apply for new credit, such as a home or car loan, review your credit report and score to help you apply with confidence. Credit scores and credit history help lenders determine how much credit they will offer and at what interest rate. Sometimes, scores also can be affected by inaccuracies on your report, so checking ahead of time will help you identify and resolve potential issues before a lender does a credit check.

Only apply for credit when you need to. When you apply for new credit, lenders do a "hard pull"—which means getting access to your full report—which may cause your score to decrease. Black leaders must unite to make strides in our community

"If you want to go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go together." This African proverb often comes

to mind as I think of the work necessary to ensure that Blacks advance as much as they can. Sure, we can accomplish much as individuals or singular organizations, but we can achieve so much more when we join

forces

For example, in 2020, Lilly & Company approached me about an initiative they launched, Indy Day of Solidarity: We Stand Together. Rather than work solely with the Recorder, Radio One and WISH-TV also came on board. With this collaboration, all Black-owned media companies - print, radio and television - were able to demonstrate solidarity by working together in a very impactful way. Sure, any one of the three outlets could have done a successful job on its own, but by joining forces, we reached far more people and expanded our impact significantly. Indiana is very fortunate to have such established Black media entities.

Indianapolis is a unique city with wonderful opportunities. This is especially true for Blacks in this city, as we are leading some key organizations and businesses. Here's a quick list of some local entities that are led by Blacks:

Boys & Girl Club of Central Indiana, Edna Martin Christian Center, Engaging Solutions, Fathers and Families Center, Flanner House, Indiana Black Expo, Indianapolis Recorder Newspaper, Indianapolis Urban League, Indy Black Chamber of Commerce, Indianapolis Branch of the NAACP, LISC, Radio One,

United Way of Central Indiana, WISH-TV, Women's Fund of Central Indiana and InnoPower Indy LLC.

There are also a lot of organizations and businesses in Indy that have Blacks in key leadership roles. Here are some of them:

AES Corporation, Barnes & Thornburg, Bose, McKinney & Evans, CICF, UNCF, CICP, Indiana General Assembly, Indiana University Health, Marion County Public Health Department and Lilly Endowment.

The two lists above are just small samples of businesses and organizations. Still, it was important for me to list them so you can see how powerful Black leaders in Indianapolis can be if we work together more strategically to make more significant strides for our community. But in order to create actual substantive change, we'll need partners working with us to improve conditions for Blacks. Some of those partners are white allies who are genuinely interested in making Indianapolis more equitable.

I may make some people mad for the words you are about to read, but Blacks as a whole can be very divisive. Nothing frustrates me more than knowing that there are Blacks in this community who would rather do something on their own and achieve success, but not to the degree if they had collaborated with others. Even with the success of so many of our brothers and sisters, we are still far behind as a people. We must stop being so self-absorbed and egotistical that we are unwilling to work with others. We must stop thinking we are the only ones who know how to do something. We must stop competing with each other. We have to stop devaluing one another. And we must control our desire to appear to be the only ones with the right answers. Blacks must unite with each other, and then we must strategize

and activate with our white allies. This is how we will see genuinely transformative change. In 2022, our city and country are far different than where we were 50 years ago, but sadly, some things remain the same. The best way to eliminate the negative realities of today and from the past will take visionary, courageous and strategic collaboration.

Blacks and like-minded whites must combine our unique talents, think out of the box and remain solution oriented. If more Black businesses and organizations joined forces and showed solidarity with our white allies, it would be hard for others to tell us no. There is strength in numbers, and the result of such unified efforts would enhance our community in ways that could positively impact us for generations.

It's time for us to understand our true power as a collective unit. It's time for us to make moves for our community. Big, powerful moves. I'm willing to work with any Black or white leader in the city who is interested in making our community better. The Recorder will start by looking for several individuals to write a series of columns to help keep this conversation alive. This idea is consistent with the approach that the National Urban League, Indianapolis Urban League and the African American Coalition of Indianapolis took when they invited the community to share perspectives about the Quality of Life Initiative, funded by Lilly Endowment. The initiative focused on education, economic development, housing, health and wellness, and entrepreneurship. Let's keep the conversation going. Please join me in making a difference. 'Pro-life' means taking care of everyone

Let me begin by saying my Democrat colleagues and I hear you. Gas is high, the weight of inflation is crushing our communities, and there seems to be no hope. Fortunately, the Indiana General

Assembly will be gathering on July 25. Unfortunately, this special session will also define who we are in the political landscape of our country.

Firstly, we'll be debating a \$225 automatic tax refund (ATR). The House Democratic Caucus has for months been calling on Gov. Every human being deserves to live with dignity and be uplifted - regardless of their socioeconomic status or whether they are currently employed. By expanding the ATR to benefit the largest number of Hoosiers, we can ensure that we're making Indiana a better state for all.

We can't talk about quality of life in Indiana without addressing the abortion debate set to begin in the Statehouse on July 25. With House and

Senate Republicans considering passing legislation that would severely limit The freedom to have autonomy over abortion rights in Indiana, we have to consider the terrifying consequences this could have for Hoosier women.

First, let's be clear: Everyone is prolife; no one wants to see a life destroyed. However, in Indiana, we have the third highest maternal mortality rate in the nation. Pregnancy poses a significant risk to women in Indiana - especially Black women. A ban would be catastrophic for our state. In fact, a University of Colorado Boulder study found a nationwide abortion ban would lead to a 21% increase in the number of pregnancy-related deaths overall, including a 33% increase in death among Black women. If we are going to truly study maternal mortality during the interim, we need to be intentional by not making the issue worse before we even begin to improve it.

Secondly, I stand with Vice President Kamala Harris in the belief that "American souls are rooted in freedom." oneself and to make personal health care decisions ought to be the right of every American citizen. I and my Democrat colleagues will do everything in our power to ensure that those who need it will have access to adequate reproductive health care. Furthermore, we will not stop with health care, we will fight for safe lives and economic relief.

We've got some big fights ahead of us in the Indiana General Assembly, but with your advocacy, we are prepared to take action to help Hoosiers get back on their feet and make Indiana a beacon of freedom.

What's in a name?

I embrace many identities. I'm a Christian. I'm a father. I'm an American. I'm an athlete. (Well, I was an athlete.) And I'm Black or African American — terms that I use more or less interchangeably. The only identity that some people ever challenge is the last one. By "some people" I mean some white people. Their op-

position to that particular part of my identity is due to complex historical, sociological and psychological factors that I don't have space to exegete fully.

In my experience that objection nearly always comes from people who are well-meaning, including friends. (Somewhat ironically, the people who tend not to raise objections to Black folks' selfidentification usually are those who complain about things like Black History Month.) The bottom line is that Black people do not want white people to try to dictate how we should self-identify, irrespective of their intentions.

This phenomenon is white people's awkward and inappropriate way of saying "You're one of us. Be proud!" It is an attempt at inclusion. They will say things like, "You're an American" or "You're Larry" -

as if these identities are mutually exclusive. Or they'll say, "You know that you're not actually Black, right? Just like I'm not actually white!" Or they'll say, "Elon Musk is a real African American! He's from Africa!" If Mr. Musk wants to identify in that way – and I don't know that he does — more power to him. But that has nothing to do with how Black folks identify ourselves.

My personal favorite is when people tell an obvious fib by saying, "I don't see color." At that point I'll suggest that they go "see" an optometrist. Most importantly, I share that if they would focus on racial equity as much as they focus on how we identify ourselves, this issue would eventually go away. "Talking about race" is a problem only for those who are not interested in eradicating racism. What actually deepens the racial divide? Racism does.

Unfortunately, white privilege and its attendant paternalism are ingrained in our culture. Trying to disguise it by saying "you're one of us" is offering racism with white gloves and a slice of apple pie. On the contrary, I've lived for half a century and I don't recall ever witnessing a Black person telling a white person what color or race they should embrace. White people should take their cue from that and cease their attempts to rob us of self-determination.

Some people approach this discussion from an academic standpoint. They emphasize that race is a social construct. As a result, they argue that race isn't "real." This argument is accurate — and utterly irrelevant. What's important is our lived experience. Race doesn't have to be "real" to have real consequences. Some people emphasize the importance of class, as if wealth somehow mitigates racism. I remind them of the old "joke" about what racists call a Black person

who has a lot of money. One could substitute a doctorate, fame or any other achievement. The answer to the "joke" remains the same.

The fact is that Black folks did not create the concept of race; white people did. Europeans conceived it. White Americans perfected it. White South Africans copied it. Centuries ago in Africa we did not consider ourselves to be "Black," any more than Europeans considered themselves to be "white." We weren't even "Africans." We were Maasai, Zulu, Xhosa, Asante, Yoruba, Himba, etc.

The sole reason for creating race was to establish a hierarchy — with Blacks on the bottom. We have even been subjected to hierarchies within our race. At a young age I was told the following by whites and Blacks: "There are Black people and then there are ..." (Indeed, you can't understand the Rwandan genocide if you don't understand the intra-racial strife that Europeans created to divide that nation.)

I often hear people ask, "Can't we just 'get past' race?" I suppose we could. Will we? I highly doubt it. Nothing about our nation leads me to believe that will ever be the case. Virtually every week we hear about Black people who are fleeing the police being shot to death. Even if the officers aren't consciously thinking, "I'm going to shoot this Black person," I am certain that they aren't thinking, "I'm going to shoot this American."

In the end, it's all good. Black folks have taken lemons and made lemonade. Or, to be culturally appropriate, we have taken social chitterlings and made them a delicacy. Don't tell us how to eat it.

AES announces possible price increase for fall months

AES Indiana could increase its prices by almost 19% for three months in the fall, and some struggling customers are worried they won't have a way to pay.

An AES spokesperson said the price increase comes from an increase in natural gas prices. Natural gas prices are expected to be 288% higher in September, October and November this year as compared to last year, AES said in a statement. The average customer using 1,000 kilowatt-hours per month will pay \$24.39 more.

Other states are also seeing price increases due to high costs and "market events," AES said.

"AES Indiana maintains its commitment to reliably serve our customers with the least reasonable cost options today and into the future," the company said in a statement.

The increase has to be approved by the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission. An evidentiary hearing will be held Aug. 11.

Jacqueline Ardon raises her 11-yearold grandson Prince with her husband Carlos.

"It's Prince Josiah out of the Bible," she said. "That's Josiah who was a very brave and nice and kind prince."

The Ardons have had custody of their grandson since he was a newborn, she said. The biggest challenge of raising him for the past 11 years: the mood swings of a neurodivergent pre-teen, his never-ending hyperness, having to say no to a WWE toy at the grocery store to put food on the table or keep the lights on.

Their household is on a fixed income, she said, and receives social security. Both Ardon and her grandson have asthma, and extreme heat could cause an asthma attack. When the pandemic hit, their economic hardships became tougher when the entire household came down with COVID-19 and they lost other loved ones due to the pandemic. Exhausting both their checking and savings accounts, they struggled and got behind on their bills, Ardon said.

"There's just so much going on in life

in general and people are struggling," Ardon said. "It takes a toll on people."

The stimulus check helped them catch up, but it wasn't enough to get them ahead. Now through inflation and economic consequences of a possible recession, it's even more difficult to stay ahead, she said.

"It's like after one crisis, another one hits," Ardon said.

Local faith-based organizations and community organizations, such as the John Boner Neighborhood Centers, have helped local residents like Ardon with utilities.

The Energy Assistance Program was created to help low-income residents pay for electricity and heating, said Carla James, the center's director of basic needs and systems integrations. Indiana households that make 60% or less than the state median income may qualify; applications open in October.

James said the center has seen more people applying who need assistance with a 22% increase in applications since last year. James said she "has no doubt" that the price increase will

impact the amount of applications the center sees.

Ardon said she hopes to see more investment in local community organizations to help people pay their bills.

With the price increase, Ardon said all she can do is "continue struggling" and continue a budget plan.

"We take it day by day," she said, trying to do what's best for her grandson. "We're sure all we can do is support him and do the best we can with the struggles we're going through."

Indiana Black and Minority Health Fair offered health services, education and entertainment

This year's Indiana Black and Minority Health Fair coincided with two other events in Indianapolis: Indiana Black Expo Summer Celebration and the centennial of the historically Black sorority Sigma Gamma Rho. While thousands of Hoosiers and outof-state visitors flocked downtown to attend Patti LaBelle's free concert, some also took the chance to swing by the health fair for a free health checkup.

John Lee, a retired Hoosier, said this is his first time coming to Black Expo and the health fair since the coronavirus pandemic. He took time to stop by many of the booths that lined the venue.

"I had blood tests done," Lee said, carrying a stack of papers showing his lab results. "So, prostate screening, blood sugar, cholesterol, the PSA, sickle cell, the whole nine yards. I mean, why not?"

He said getting those free tests helps him stay on top of his health without the burden of multiple doctor visits and medical bills. There's also the sense of pride he feels when attending Black community events like Expo and the health fair.

"I'm all about supporting Black events like these," Lee said.

Organizers said the fair offered nearly \$2,500 worth of free health services per attendee, including blood tests, breast cancer screening, and dental and vision checkups.

Addressing health care disparities

Black Americans are more likely to be uninsured or underinsured than white Americans. A recent study published in JAMA Network Open looked at a population of patients covered by Medicare and found primary care physicians are less likely to refer Black patients to specialists than white patients. This means Black patients are less likely to receive specialized care when they need it.

While events that provide free health care, like the Black and Minority Health Fair, are not a sustainable solution to some of the longstanding racial disparities in health care access, Linda Evans, 65, said she feels these events help fill the gap.

"The health fair is just awesome," Evans said. "I do have [a] primary care [doctor], but for people who don't, and don't get to see the doctors, you're able to get all this information and you're able to get labs done. You're able to find out everything about your health, so it's just awesome."

Evans said she's been coming to Black Expo for 51 years and has attended the health fair for more than three decades.

Besides the health exams, the fair also offered wellness services like massages.

"One lady had tears in her eyes," said massage therapist Jamal, the owner of Lamaj Salon and Spa. "People just love it. Especially if they never got it before. They don't realize some of the pain their bodies are in until somebody else touches it."

On the other side of the convention hall, Curtis Gray stood at a booth speaking to visitors about help available for families affected by the trauma of gun violence. Gray, a victims advocate with Eskenazi Health, handed out free naloxone nasal spray — a medication to help reverse opioid overdoses. "We have a high rate of overdoses in the city due to fentanyl. And these can potentially save a life," Gary said.

A recent study published in the American Journal of Public Health found that Black substance use disorder patients are less likely to have access to naloxone and less likely to have training for how to use it. The study found that Black overdose deaths are starting to surpass white overdose deaths for the first time in nearly 20 years, and that the rate of opioid deaths among Black people increased by 38% from 2018 to 2019.

Raising awareness and recruiting for research studies

Several other booths were staffed with researchers looking to recruit people of African descent for ongoing studies. A team from the Boston-based Dana Farber Cancer Institute attended the fair to provide free screenings for multiple myeloma and recruit patients for examining why people of African descent are nearly three times more likely to develop the blood cancer.

"We thought it would be a great opportunity for us to talk about our study, but also increase awareness of myeloma, because although it is the second most common form of blood cancer, it's not well known," said Maya Davis, a clinical research coordinator at Dana Farber.

"Often people are diagnosed when it's too late to treat. And so we want people to know the symptoms early so that people can get screened and get care before it's too late."

The fair also included educational panels on a range of topics such as mental health, youth suicide, substance use disorder, Alzheimer's and dementia care, patient self-advocacy and diversity in research studies.

This is the Indiana Black and Minority Health Fair's 36th year. The annual event is organized by the Indiana State Department of Health.

Religion What does it mean to be a 'person'? **Different cultures have different answers**

(THE CONVERSATION) Opponents and proponents of abortion rights often frame their positions in terms of two fundamental values: "life" or "choice."

However, many defenders of "life" are comfortable with taking human life in situations such as war or capital punishment. Many on the side of "choice" advocate for government regulation of guns or mandates on masking and vaccines.

As I see it, "life" and "choice" are not, in and of themselves, really the issue. The central question is what - or who - constitutes a person.

This question has long preoccupied anthropologists, particularly those like me who specialize in the study of non-European religions. Some ideas usually taken for granted in the United States and Europe about what it means to be a person are, quite simply, not shared with followers of other religious traditions and cultures.

Ideas about personhood in U.S. culture are largely a product of Christianity, in which personhood is inextricably tied to the notion of the soul. Only a being who possesses a soul is a person, and personhood is treated as a blackand-white matter: Either a being has a soul or it does not.

As a specialist of religion in Africa, I have become aware of religious traditions that treat personhood in very different and more nuanced ways. The majority of people in Africa identify as Muslim or Christian, but indigenous religions remain widespread, and many view personhood as a process rather than a once-and-for-all phenomenon.

Gradual personhood

This is well illustrated by beliefs about babies in the Beng culture of Côte d'Ivoire, which anthropologist Alma Gottlieb details in her remark-

able 2004 ethnography, "The Afterlife Is Where We Come From."

For Beng, all babies are reincarnations of people who recently died. They emerge from a place called "wrugbe," which is simultaneously the afterlife and a sort of before-life.

The idea that babies are reincarnations, especially of ancestors, is hardly specific to the Beng - or to African religions, for that matter. Indeed, a newborn has not really left "wrugbe" until her cut umbilical cord has dried out and fallen off. Only then is the infant considered in any sense a person. If she dies beforehand, she does not receive any sort of funeral. Even afterward, until children are several years old, people believe they remain poised between "wrugbe" and the world of ordinary humans.

For Beng and many other peoples, rituals mark the development of personhood. Some cultures believe children do not fully have a gender until they have undergone initiation. The process of initiation itself is a symbolic death and rebirth, as though the initiate becomes a new person. In some societies - for example Tallensi of northern

Ghana - if an individual ever achieves viewed as a process, not a steady state, full personhood, it is only after death, when they become an ancestor, fully in- automatically possessed. Second, volved in the lives of their descendants. personhood is not a purely individual

Not just humans

"Persons" are not even necessarily human. In Mande cultures in West Africa, such as the Dyula communities where I have done research, every clan is associated with a "ntana," a large and dangerous wild animal species: lions, leopards, elephants, crocodiles or and this soul's salvation or damnation pythons, for example. Members of the species are considered persons, but only for individuals in the associated clan.

Members of the clan must not kill or eat their ntana, and contact with or even sight of the remains of the dead animal is considered dangerous.

Two aspects of personhood stand out in particular when we compare how paradigms vary from culture to culture. First, personhood is sometimes

Christianity, on the other hand, emphasizes the soul and individual salvation: A being either possesses a soul or doesn't, is the individual's responsibility.

Independence, interdependence and ending hunger

"Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ." -Galatians 6:2

In 1852, Frederick Douglass, a leader in the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church and a Republican abolitionist, was invited to give a Fourth of July speech. His address, "What,

to the Slave, is the Fourth of July," acknowledges the successes of the young democracy that became independent from England. It also offered a courageous challenge to the institution of slavery. The summation below reflects this sentiment:

"I do not despair of this country. ... The arm of the Lord is not shortened, and the doom of slavery is certain. I, therefore, leave off where I began, with hope. While drawing encouragement from the Declaration of Independence, the great principles it contains, and the genius of American Institutions, my spirit is also cheered by the obvious tendencies of the age."

Indeed the "doom of slavery" did come with the signing of the executive order of the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863 and the successive law in 1865. Douglass' speech became another catalyst for increased advocacy to end the policy of slavery in the United States.

Today, Independence Day is celebrated twice as federal holidays in the United States: July 4 and Juneteenth, June 19, which became a national holiday 1865 and 2021 did and still do reflect the pain of

disproportionate levels of hunger and poverty among people of African descent in the U.S. and Africa. Associate professor Angela Odoms-Young of Northern Illinois University captures this history:

"It really is not surprising when you consider the drivers of food insecurity: Income, employment. It's also an accumulation of disadvantages that happens. I don't think people always recognize that accumulation-how disadvantages can accumulate over generations and cause those disparities in wealth."

Independence matters, but so does interdependence when addressing the drivers of food insecurity Dr. Odoms-Young speaks to. Independence of any people and the governance that follows should build interdependence among the peoples. Interdependence is a biblical concept that undergirds a spirit for collaboration to end challenges like hunger. In the case of Pan-African communities, interdependence invites the recognition of historic and present-day inequities that prevent access to nutritious food and lands to grow nutritious food but also invites collective action.

People of faith are called to create and lead communities of interdependence and collaboration, which is a value of Bread for the World. Advocacy to end hunger is one of the ways we recognize our interdependence for and with each other and, thereby, "bear one another's burdens" as was done in 1863 and 1865. Bread for the World believes there is enough for all. Please join us in advocating together at bread.org.

Dire US labor shortage provides opportunity for ex-prisoners

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — When Antonio McGowan left the Mississippi State Penitentiary at Parchman after serving 17 years, he was free for the first time since he was 15. But as an adult finally out from behind bars, he immediately found himself confined to menial labor.

McGowan needed stable work, for a paycheck and to keep busy, but temporary gigs were all he could find. Just as those around him counseled the importance of maintaining a routine, he became trapped in a cycle of odd jobs and irregular hours. He trimmed grass one week and painted a house the next. But he couldn't land anything full time, and the unpredictability of his income proved challenging. Disconnection notices and unpaid bills piled up.

"Things weren't in place," McGowan said. "They weren't where I wanted them to be as far as being an individual back in society. It was a struggle."

After several years adrift, McGowan was finally able to regain his footing with the help of the Hinds County Reentry Program, a workforce training program for former inmates. Reentry programs are one way employers are trying to fill some of the 11.3 million open jobs in the U.S. amid a dire national labor shortage. The practice of employing people with a criminal record is known as "second-chance hiring."

In rosier economic times, many former prisoners faced steep obstacles to finding work. The labor shortage sparked by the COVID-19 pandemic now presents them with opportunities, said Eric Beamon, a recruiter for MagCor, a company that provides job training to people in Mississippi correctional facilities.

"We think the pandemic, in a sense, was a big help," Beamon said. "If no one wants to work anymore or if everyone wants to work from home, employers are begging for employees." Some studies have shown that stable jobs are a major factor in reducing recidivism. Still, not everyone is willing to hire an ex-convict, and a lack of job opportunities for those with a criminal record is still stymieing workforce participation in the economy, Stephanie Ferguson, a senior manager of employment policy at the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, wrote in a May report.

According to the National Conference of State Legislatures, barriers faced by people with felony convictions were linked to a loss of at least 1.7 million employees from the workforce and a cost of at least \$78 billion to the economy in 2014, the year that McGowan left prison.

The current desperate straits in which employers now find themselves could help spur a change. In a 2021 survey conducted by the Society for Human Resource Management, or SHRM, the SHRM Foundation and the Charles Koch Institute, 53% of human resource professionals said they would be willing to hire people with criminal records — up from just 37% in 2018.

That's where programs like Hinds County Reentry and MagCor step in, helping to make former inmates more desirable as candidates by properly training them to reintegrate into society and matching them with jobs tailored to their skills and interests.

McGowan said he'd like to work in air conditioning and heating repair, and the program's staff members recommended him to Upchurch Services, a Mississippi-based company that allows workers to take classes in repair services while gaining experience in the field. McGowan was hired the second week of May.

He makes \$15 per hour, working 40 hours per week with paid overtime. He said he has full health care coverage — and he loves the work.

"Summer, winter, spring or fall, you'll need either heat or air conditioning," he said. "So I found something I can help people out with. At the same time, it can keep me in the working class, so I don't fall back into the things I used to do."

In addition to skills training, the workforce reentry programs can provide parolees with mentors who have firsthand knowledge about the travails of life after incarceration. For Savannah Hayden, who was released from prison in November after serving time for five felony convictions, that person was Cynetra Freeman. Freeman is the founder of the Mississippi Center for Reentry, an organization offering work readiness programs to inmates preparing to leave prison.

Freeman remembers taking a bus to an employment agency the day after she was released from prison. She said the agency told her she would never get a job because of her record.

"This crushed me and made me think about others who felt the same devastation," Freeman said. "Employment is one of the toughest aspects for a person who is just returning home."

Hayden thought she might string together temporary jobs to make ends meet. But Freeman encouraged her to think long term, specifically about a job in which she could use her experience as a formerly incarcerated person to help others reentering society. Hayden now works for Freeman as the mental health and drug addiction coordinator at the Center for Reentry.

"After so many doors are slammed in your face, you get tired of asking," Hayden said. "But there will be a person who says 'yes,' and that will change your life."

WNBA's Griner gets support at trial from character witnesses

KHIMKI, Russia (AP) — Brittney Griner's drug possession trial resumed July 14 with the head of the Russian club she plays for in the offseason and a teammate from that squad testifying in support of her character and what the WNBA star has meant for women's basketball in the country.

Griner, who pleaded guilty the week before, did not testify as expected at the third day of the trial. She has been detained in Russia since February, and the U.S. government is under pressure at home to do more to secure her freedom. Her guilty plea could be an effort to expedite the court proceedings so any negotiations about a prisoner exchange could move forward.

Griner was arrested at the Russian capital's Sheremetyevo Airport when customs officials said they found vape canisters with cannabis oil in her luggage. She acknowledged in court that she possessed the canisters, but said she had no criminal intent and said their presence in her luggage was due to hasty packing. She is facing up to 10 years in prison.

In Russia's judicial system, admitting guilt doesn't automatically end a trial.

Most journalists were denied access to the session July 14, but the director of UMMC Ekaterinburg, for which she plays during the WNBA offseason, told reporters afterward that he testified as a character witness.

"Our task today was to tell the court about her characteristics as an athlete, as a person - tell about how she played a big role in the success of the Ekaterinburg club and Russian women's basketball as a whole," club director Maxim Rybakov said.

"Today is the first day when we have seen our basketball player since February. Thank God, she feels well, looks good," Rybakov said outside the courthouse in the Moscow suburb of Khimki, where the airport is located.

Player Evgenia Belyakova said she testified that "Brittney has always been a very good teammate, so my role here is just to be with her, to support her."



"We miss her very much, we miss her energy," Belyakova added. "I was very happy to see her, and I hope this trial will be over soon and with a positive outcome."

Also in court were Elizabeth Rood, charge d'affaires of the U.S. Embassy in Moscow, and other consular officials, and they were able to speak to Griner, who told them she appreciated their presence, the U.S. State Department said.

Griner is one of the most prominent female athletes in the U.S., a standout for the Phoenix Mercury and a two-time Olympic gold medalist.

U.S. President Joe Biden and Secretary of State Antony Blinken have said they were doing all they could to win her release, as well as that of other Americans the U.S. considers "wrongly detained" by Russia, including former Marine Paul Whelan.

Washington may have little leverage with Moscow, though, because of strong animosity over its military operation in Ukraine.

Russian media have speculated that Griner could be swapped for Russian arms trader Viktor Bout, nicknamed "the Merchant of Death," who is serving a 25-year sentence in the U.S. after being convicted of conspiracy to kill U.S. citizens and providing aid to a terrorist organization.

Russia has agitated for Bout's release for years. But the wide discrepancy in the seriousness of their cases could make such a trade unpalatable to Washington. Others have suggested that Griner could be traded along with Whelan, who is serving 16 years in Russia on an espionage conviction that the U.S. has described as a setup.

The State Department's designation of Griner as wrongfully detained moves her case under the supervision of its special presidential envoy for hostage affairs, effectively the government's chief hostage negotiator. The classification has irritated Russia.

Asked about the possibility of Griner being swapped for a Russian jailed in the U.S., Deputy Foreign Minister Sergei Ryabkov, the senior Russian diplomat, has noted that until her trial is over "there are no formal or procedural reasons to talk about any further steps."

Ryabkov warned that U.S. criticism, including the description of Griner as wrongfully detained and dismissive comments about the Russian judicial system, "makes it difficult to engage in detailed discussion of any possible exchanges."

Griner's detention has been authorized through Dec. 20, suggesting the trial could last months. Griner's lawyers, however, said they expect it to conclude around the beginning of August.
