WATER SHUT-OFF still a possibility at 4 city apartments

Even though the residents at four Indianapolis apartment complexes continue to faithfully pay their rent, they are still at risk of having their water shut off.

For 18 months, JCP Affordable Housing Foundation has failed to pay \$1.8 million in utility bills to Citizens Energy Group, leaving its apartment complex residents—Berkley Commons, Covington Square, Capital Place and Woods at Oak Crossing—anxiously waiting for what happens next.

"I really don't know what to do," resident Michael Boge, 54, said. "I am just in suspense right now."

Boge moved into the Woods at Oak Crossing in May of this year. About two months later, he came home to a notice on his front door stating that the water would be turned off Sept. 30.

This is Boge's first time living on his own, and he said he does not understand how the city and the utility company could even allow him to move in with the amount of utility debt the landlord accrued.

and arrangements to keep the water on have been made, but not all.

Daniel Considine, corporate communications manager for Citizens, said the utility company is working to get an agreement settled.

"This has really been unprecedented for us," he said. "We only exist to serve our customers. Disconnecting customers goes against everything we stand for."

The city and utility company plan to have everything resolved by the beginning of September, but the shut-off deadline is still on the table.

nut-off deadline is still on the tabl In February, Citizens shut off the water at the Berkley Commons and Capital Place, but the city stepped in and paid a portion of the bill to get the water back on.

The utility company has consistently reached out to JCP Affordable Housing Foundation in attempts to make a payment arrangement for the bill.

In April, Citizens, the city and the state attorney general filed three separate lawsuits against JCP Affordable Housing, an out-of-state nonprofit organization. Lenders for the four apartment complexes, Wells Fargo and Fannie Mae, also

Partnership gets \$4M to expand emergency, transitional housing

Two organizations will receive about \$4 million to expand emergency and transitional housing for youth and young adults over the next three years.

The money, awarded to VOICES and 91 Place, is funded by federal pandemic relief. The Youth and Young Adults Transitional Housing Grant Program is part of Mayor Joe Hogsett's three-year, \$150 million violence reduction plan.

The partnership between the organizations will focus on young people up to 24 years old with a high risk of exposure to the criminal justice system and lack of stable housing.

91 Place will use the funding for two new

Proposal amended amidst concerns about 'forgotten' neighborhood

Proposal 250 was amended at the City-County Council's Public Safety and Criminal Justice Committee on Aug. 24 to exclude Babe Denny Park as a location for a safe distribution site after city officials met with residents to discuss the proposal.

Prop 250, which will be voted on by the full council Sept. 12, would approve an additional \$76,000 in the Office of Public Health and Safety's 2022 budget to purchase two public restrooms and cleaning services at Old City Hall and another location. Old City Hall has been operating as a safe distribution site since July 2021. The original proposal would have placed the second distribution site at Babe Denny Park but was amended after 30 residents and descendants of Edward "Babe" Denny gathered

County Dem Party chair resigns, clergy groups want next chair to be African American

A coalition of clergy groups is calling for local Democrats to elect an African American as the next county party chairperson following the resignation of Kate Sweeney Bell, who stepped down from the position sooner than expected as part of a campaign promise as she runs for office.

The coalition — made up of the Concerned Clergy of Indianapolis, Baptist Minister's Alliance and and National Action Network of Indiana — said in a statement the next chairperson, aside from being African American, should not already be an elected official.

Ashley Hogue, a spokesperson for Concerned Clergy, said the

group's understanding is there are four people interested in the position, but she would not say who the four people are.

Sweeney Bell had said she would resign her position with the Marion County Democratic Party should she win the county clerk election in November. Sweeney Bell resigned Aug. 29, party spokesperson Jeff Harris confirmed. IndyStar was the first to report her resignation.

Though Sweeney Bell's exit came sooner than expected, county clerk is likely a safe seat for

Democrats. The current clerk, Democrat Myla Eldridge, won with 64.5% of the vote in 2018.

Harris said there will be a meeting of precinct committee chairs and vice chairs within 30 days to elect a new party chairperson. Per party rules, candidates have to be a party member, qualified voter and county resident. The current vice chair, David Bride, is now acting chair until a replacement is elected.

Earlier this year, members of the Marion County Black Elected Officials and Indiana Black Legislative Caucus called for Sweeney Bell to resign. They said she "abused her power" because, as party chair, she had the power to appoint people to vacant precinct committee party positions. Sweeney Bell has also been county recorder since 2015.

Other calls for her to resign came in later months, and criticism extended to Mayor Joe Hogsett and Rep. Andre Carson, who critics said weren't taking complaints seriously.

Black legislators and political activists have said the local Democratic Party is an insider game that discourages potential Black candidates from seeking the party's formal endorsement in a process known as slating. In May, Hogsett said it's time for the Marion County Democratic Party to end slating, a decision that would have to be made by the county party's central committee.

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

'RISE' up instead of tearing down schools

It's much easier to tear something down than to build it up, or to throw stones than to lay a foundation with them.

Lately, it feels like there are plenty of folks throwing stones at our city at a time when we need more people who are committed to strengthening its foundation.

Three years ago, I started RISE INDY because I believe every student in Indianapolis deserves access to a quality public school. Social justice starts with educational equity. But that's just the beginning.

In recent months, we have heard criticism from major employers that our workforce isn't ready for next-generation jobs. We're devoting resources to tackle the public safety crisis that swept the nation during the pandemic. We know we need to be healthier — both physically and mentally — as Hoosiers.

K-12 education is the foundation upon which all those things are built. If we want to build a strong city, it starts with great public schools.

That's where our approach at RISE INDY comes in: We're not here to tear down what's already in existence. We also know we can't do this alone.

Our organizing team, based in local public schools, spends each day working directly with parents and families to make sure they know how to navigate their child's school and what resources are available to registered so you can them.

Working directly in schools helps build bridges between educators and families that create opportunities for families to engage with teachers and other parents - the kind of relationships that exist in the district's most popular choice schools.

Our advocacy efforts include recruiting, training and electing strong champions for quality public schools, while building grassroots support to ensure elected officials are listening to all community voices, not just the loudest ones.

Finally, we focus our

policy work in six core areas of K-12 education:

- Empowering caregivers to advocate for their students.
- Best practices to improve literacy rates in local public schools.
- The need for mental health support for educators and students.
- Funding schools equitably and making sure resources flow to the classroom.
- Training, recruiting and retaining teachers of color.
- · Ensuring schools and school leaders have flexibility to meet the needs of their students.

This three-pronged approach means we can support great work that's already being done to advance K-12 education locally while ensuring the next generation of leaders is ready to act on behalf of our kids.

Don't get me wrong: We know there's plenty of improvement to be made, but if we focus on building up instead of tearing down, I believe more and more local residents will see that we can do big things together for every student who calls our city home.

And so, I ask you today, if you care about educational equity and making sure the foundation of our city is strong, 'RISE' up with me and get involved.

That could look like spending a few hours volunteering your time or attending an event where you can learn more about how the K-12 system functions. It could also be as simple as making sure you're vote this November in the IPS school board races that are on the ballot.

Whatever path you choose, we're in this together, and I can't wait to see what the future holds for a stronger city built on a foundation of great public schools for

2 races uncontested in IPS school board election, incumbents won't run again

For the first time in years, some ballot races for the Indianapolis Public Schools board will not be competitive.

Two candidates are unopposed in separate races. A third seat attracted only two candidates. The three incumbent board members chose not to seek reelection after a single term.

This is a stark comparison to previous elections when multiple candidates sought the same seat. And donations from outside groups who support partnerships with charter schools played a significant role. In the 2020 election, more than \$200,000 from political action committees was spent on four races. One incumbent who lost was outspent 72 to 1.

The filing deadline for school board candidates was noon Aug. 26. The election is Nov. 8. Four candidates are running for three seats on the ballot for the IPS Board of School Commissioners.

School board members are nonpartisan officials elected by voters. They don't manage the day-today of schools, but they approve the direction of the district, and what issues receive attention and

In all, there are seven elected IPS board members — five reside in districts and represent specific neighborhood communities, and two are elected at-large.

District 3

Hope Y. Hampton and Kristen Elizabeth Phair are in the race for District 3.

Hampton is the owner of Cozy, a local interior design company. She wants to hear community feedback about plans to improve the district, as well as other issues impacting K-12 education.

"In order for our schools to succeed, all parents and families need to be included and feel included, and I want to make sure that's happening throughout this process," Hampton said.

Phair is a parent of three district students and was formerly a state public defender for more than a decade. She wants to find solutions to the "glaring inequalities" in the district.

"We have schools that are significantly different in performing," Phair said. "It is alarming and it is not new. There is an opening in my district <code>[on</code> the school board and I want to contribute to this issue."

District 5

Nicole Carey is uncontested for District 5. Carey is the founder of two local businesses: Anda Spanish, an early childhood language acquisition company, and she serves as the chief executive officer of Indy Equity Collaborative, a consulting firm that offers diversity, equity and inclusion support

to schools. Three of her five children attend IPS

Carey wants the district to place more focus on equity and language justice strategies.

"We have a great district with great opportunities, we just have to make sure that we are showing our children those opportunities, and encouraging them to find what works for them," Carey said.

At large

Angelia L. Moore is running uncontested for the at-large seat that covers the entire district.

Moore is the deputy director of the Fay Biccard Glick Community Center. Previously, Moore worked for IPS as senior coordinator in portfolio management, the office that oversees charter schools in the district. She is an IPS alumna; three of her four children also graduated from the district, and one is still enrolled in the district.

"Even when we have to make those hard decisions around finances and facilities and things like that, are we putting kids first to make sure that we are producing students that are ready to become solid civilians and give back to the very community that educated them," Moore said.

Incumbents won't seek reelection

The seats on the ballot are currently held by commissioners elected in 2018. The three incumbents — Evan Hawkins (District 3), Taria Slack (District 5) and Susan Collins (at-large) — chose to not seek reelection after a single term. Each cited the time commitment involved among their reasons for not running again.

The 2018 election was focused heavily on whether andidates agreed with then-Superintendent Lewis Ferebee's ongoing push to collaborate with charter schools and restart failing district schools with outside nonprofits and charter operators as the managers. Ferebee left the district at the end of 2018.


Over the years, Collins' skepticism gave way to supporting some proposals opposed by Slack. Slack remained highly critical of the district's growing support of charter school operators.

Hawkins favored some of Ferebee's approach during the election and received campaign support from Stand for Children Indiana, the state chapter of a national education advocacy organization. Hawkins continued to support the reforms throughout his term as means to help students in the city. This year he was elected as board president by the other commissioners.

In the 2020 election, the four winners all supported charter-friendly reforms and Superintendent Johnson.

He works hard for the money. Hunting, killing and extracting teeth from vampires for a living in the hot San Fernando Valley is no joke.

Bud (Jamie Foxx) acts like he's just an innocuous pool cleaner in SoCal. But on the downlow, he's hunting bloodsuckers for cash. He just got kicked out of the international vampire hunters union for breaking rules and to make real dough, he's got to be a member. His buddy Big John (Snoop Dogg), a legendary hunter, pressures the union boss to give him another chance.

Bud is allowed to go on more hunting missions, but only if the dorky union rep (Dave Franco) accompanies him. He has to take the deal — he's desperate. His ex-wife (Meagan Good) says they need \$10,000 for their daughter's (Zion Broadnax) school tuition and braces. If he doesn't cough up the coin by Monday, she and the kid will move to Florida and live with her mom. Pressure. Lots of pressure.

Stunt coordinator J.J. Perry ("John Wick: Chapter 2," "X-men Origins: Wolverine") marks his directing debut with this misadventure, and his incessant stunt tricks don't cure what ails. Certainly, he starts the footage with a kinetic fight scene, and he knows his stuff. Vampires do backflips, contort their bodies and die miserable second deaths as they're decapi-

tated, but nothing seems fresh or innovative. Likely because his filmmaking lacks artistry and style. For example, even the film's chase scenes, which look stolen from a "Dukes of Hazzard" episode, are dull as hell.

Screenwriters Tyler Tice and Shay Hatten's ("John Wick: Chapter 3 Parabellum") tepid writing provides a very skimpy blueprint. Weak premise, feeble story line and not enough drama, laughs or scares to wake the dead. Even when the most venomous vampire, Audrey (Karla Souza), bullies Bud's wife and child, her threats aren't all that scary. Bodies pile up, money is made and none of it is memorable.

The sets (production designer Grey Berry; set decorators David A Cook and Lynne Mitchell) and



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costumes (Kelli Jones) don't look lived in. The overly bright cinematography (Tony Oliver) makes everything glisten like it's never been sat on, walked through or worn before. The pacing is decent (editor Paul Harb) and the musical score, too (Tyler Bates).


The irony is that the theme song for this venture has been made into the music video, "BUD (Mowing Down Vamps)," which is far more lively, animated, rhythmic and edgy then the entire film. Dave Franco starts the vid with the line, "Mowing down vamps with my best friend Bud." Then Jamie Foxx & the BSB Boys hit a contagious rebellious rap beat that hooks you in. The 3 1/2-minute video is dope. Cinematographer/director Taylor Chien directed it and should have directed or co-directed this movie. He's got the stylish swagger the film lacks, and

Perry's forte is stunts.

Leave it to the invincible Snoop Dogg to save the day. The other cast members may seem blasé, but he makes Big John tough, street smart and charismatic. If his badass hunter character had been the film's central focus it would have been better. Imagine a horror film where Snoop led the charge. He'd know how to "cut necks and cash the checks." A Snoop movie almost writes itself.


Streaming audiences, from the comfort of their sofas, won't complain. Viewers in a theater would not be so kind. Why? Because the bite in this vampire movie is only skin deep.

in the basement of Bethesda Missionary Baptist Church on Aug. 23 with city officials to discuss concerns.

Most residents expressed concerns that an already forgotten neighborhood will be overlooked further if restrooms and cleaning services were placed in the park. A fourthgeneration great-grandson of historic resident "Babe" Denny, Edward Denny IV, drove from Ohio to represent his great-grandfather's legacy. He said the neighborhood continues to be forgotten by the city.

"You're trying to add something else to where, that's going to only add to that forgottenness in that open wound," Denny said. "What it boils down to is these people have not been heard, and the park is being forgotten when it shouldn't be."

Resident Linda Floyd said it feels like the city is trying to devalue the area. Neighbors have already questioned the Department of Public Works' commitment to keeping the park clean during staffing shortages and missed trash pickups.

"I feel very strongly that the city has not done anything for this area ever," Floyd said. "Take it to someone else's neighborhood, take it to the moon, but not here."

The community already faces struggles with Intersate 70 creating a physical barrier that tore through historically Black neighborhoods, uprooted families and businesses and forced them to relocate. Remnants of a path under I-70 to get to the adjoining neighborhood are still used regularly to this day. Long-time resident, Kim Mayfield, who was best friends with Babe Denny's grandchildren and played with them at the park, said this

is what is "unhinging" about the city wanting to put in restrooms and cleaning facilities at the park.

"The interstate wiped us out. Our neighborhood got demolished," Mayfield said. "I'm not against helping the homeless, but to bring that element in is kind of like throwing dirt in our faces, like we have no value to our history, we just want to use this land because it seems desolate. But there's a lot of history here and it just seems to be that that would be the last dagger."

Neighbors said they would like to see Babe Denny Park become a historical site so the legacy is preserved.

OPHS released a statement regarding the safe distribution sites:

OPHS and other city officials have conducted numerous community listening sessions with local charitable organizations, as well as stakeholders of Babe Denny Park. Based on their feedback, we asked the Council to amend Proposition 250 allowing OPHS more flexibility in choosing the locations for the safe distribution sites now and in the future.

Old City Hall is currently the only existing safe distribution site. It has been in operation since July 2021, and will remain in operation as the City makes investments in lighting, trash receptacles, and restrooms to make the site more usable. OPHS will continue to engage community members and providers to identify additional location for safe distribution. Babe Denny is not currently under consideration as a safe distribution site.

houses, which will add eight transitional housing beds for people ages 16-24. The organization will also expand its mental health services and increase professional staff capacity.

VOICES will use the funding for four living spaces for emergency shelter care and transitional housing for up to 22 people ages 14-24. The homes will be staffed 24 hours a day with support staff and case managers.

Kia Wright, founder and executive director of VOICES, said at a press conference Aug. 29 that organizations like hers can do good work in multiple areas of need, but one of the most important factors is making sure people have a safe place to live.

Jenna Shaffer, founder and CEO of 91 Place, said expanding capacity is important because waitlists can get so long that some people who ask about services are deterred by the long wait and don't apply.

Hogsett said the \$4 million for emergency and transitional housing

is another step in the city's "housing first" strategy, which prioritizes basic needs first, as opposed to making people meet other requirements before they can get housing.

"That means giving every young person in this city what they need to survive," he said.

There is limited data about the expansiveness of youth homelessness locally, but the annual Point-in-Time Count conducted in January by the Indiana University Public Policy Institute and other organizations found there were 313 children under the age of 18 who were homeless. The Indiana Department of Education, which uses a more expansive definition of homelessness, reported about 66% of homeless students in Marion County were Black.

filed lawsuits.

"With the climate of everything, I have no expectations," Jazmine Evans said. "All of those words are in one ear and out the other. It's just a bunch of empty promises. They get to be comfortable, but we have to be the ones who suffer."

Evans and her parents, Roosevelt and Gizele Evans, have lived at the Woods at Oak Crossing for 13 years, and while they do not want to leave their long-time neighborhood, they are seriously considering it because of the potential water shut-off.

They have watched the steady decline of the apartment's quality after several management changes. The family said the potholes resemble "craters" and are "known for breaking axles on cars," but having a residential water shut-off tops all previous issues

"This is really the icing on the cake," Evans said.

Bennett advised tenants to continue paying rent to avoid eviction. He also recommends people to not leave their residence because he does not want them to feel "forced" to move out.

Tenants, like Robin Young, a 13-year resident at the Woods of Oak Crossing, still have many unanswered questions and are nervous about the future.

"I feel stressed because I am putting all my faith on a promise," she said.

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Black August uplifted as alternative Black History Month

WASHINGTON (AP) — For Jonathan Peter Jackson, a direct relative of two prominent members of the Black Panther Party, revolutionary thought and family history have always been intertwined, particularly in August.

That's the month in 1971 when his uncle, the famed Panther George Jackson, was killed during an uprising at San Quentin State Prison in California. A revolutionary whose words resonated inside and out of the prison walls, he was a published author, activist and radical thought leader.

To many, February is the month dedicated to celebrating Black Americans' contributions to a country where they were once enslaved. But Black History Month has an alternative: It's called Black August.

First celebrated in 1979, Black August was created to commemorate Jackson's fight for Black liberation. Fifty-one years since his death, Black August is now a monthlong awareness campaign and celebration dedicated to Black freedom fighters, revolutionaries, radicals and political prisoners, both living and deceased.

The annual commemorations have been embraced by activists in the global Black Lives Matter movement, many of whom draw inspiration from freedom fighters like Jackson and his contemporaries.

"It's important to do this now because a lot of people who were on the radical scene during that time period, relatives and non-relatives, who are like blood relatives, are entering their golden years," said Jonathan Jackson, 51, of Fair Hill, Maryland.

George Jackson was 18 when he was arrested for robbing a gas station in Los Angeles in 1960. He was convicted and given an indeterminate sentence of one year to life and spent the next



decade at California's Soledad and San Quentin prisons, much of it in solitary confinement.

While incarcerated, Jackson began studying the words of revolutionary theoreticians such as Karl Marx and Vladimir Lenin, who advocated class awareness, challenging institutions and overturning capitalism through revolution. Founding leaders of the Panthers, including Huey P. Newton and Bobby Seale, were also inspired by Marx, Lenin and Chinese Communist leader Mao Tse-tung.

Jackson became a leader in the prisoner rights movement. His letters from prison to loved ones and supporters were compiled in the bestselling books "Soledad Brother" and "Blood in My Eye."

Inspired by his words and frustrated with his situation, George's younger brother, Jonathan, initiated a takeover at the Marin County Superior Court in California in 1970. He freed three inmates and held several courthouse staff hostage, in an attempt to demand the release of his brother and two other inmates, known as the Soledad Brothers, who were accused of killing a correctional officer. Jonathan was killed as he tried to escape, although it's disputed whether he was killed in a courtroom

shootout or fatally shot while driving away with hostages.

George was killed on Aug. 21, 1971, during a prison uprising. Inmates at San Quentin prison began formally commemorating his death in 1979, and from there, Black August was born.

"I certainly wish that more people knew about George's writings (and) knew about my father's sacrifice on that fateful day in August," said Jonathan Jackson, who wrote the foreword to "Soledad Brother" in the early '90s, shortly after graduating from college.

Monifa Bandele, a leader in the Movement for Black Lives, a national coalition of BLM groups, says Black August is about learning the vast history of Black revolutionary leaders. That includes figures such as Nat Turner, who is famous for leading a slave rebellion on a southern Virginia plantation in August 1831, and Marcus Garvey, the leader of the Pan-Africanism movement and born in August 1887. It includes events such as the Haitian Revolution in 1791 and the March on Washington in 1963, both taking place in the month of August.

"This idea that there was this one narrow way that Black people resisted oppression is really a myth that is dispelled by Black August," said Bandele, who is also a member of the Malcolm X Grassroots Movement, a group that raises awareness of political prisoners. "And what we saw happen after the

raises awareness of political prisoners "And what we saw happen after the 1970s is that it grew outside of the (prison) walls because, as people who were incarcerated came home to their families and communities, they began to do community celebrations of Black August," she added.

The ways of honoring this month also come in various forms and have evolved over the years. Some take part in fasting, while others use this time to study the ways of their predecessors. Weekly event series are also common during Black August, from reading groups to open mic nights.

Sankofa, a Black-owned cultural center and coffee shop in Washington that has served the D.C. community for nearly 25 years, wraps up a weekly open mic night in honor of Black August on Friday. The event has drawn local residents of all ages, many who have shared stories, read poetry and performed songs with the theme of rebellion.

"This month is all about resistance and celebrating our political prisoners and using all of the faculties that we have to free people who are in prison, let me say, unjustly," emcee Ayinde Sekou said to the crowd during a recent event at Sankofa.

Jonathan Jackson, George's nephew, also believes that there are largely systemic reasons as to why Black August, and his family history specifically, are not widely taught.

"It's difficult sometimes for radicals who were not assassinated, per se, to enter into the popular discourse," he said. "George and Jonathan were never victims. They took action, and they were killed taking that action, and sometimes that's very difficult to understand for people who will accept a political assassination."

Jackson hopes to honor his father's and uncle's legacy through documenting the knowledge of elders from that era, as a means of continuing the fight.

"We need to get those testimonies. ... We need to understand what happened, so that we can improve on what they did. I think now is as good a time as any to get that done," he said.

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New rules make star college football players millionaires

Glance around the parking lot of the Woody Hayes Athletic Center at The Ohio State University this fall and you might come across a \$200,000 palace on wheels, the kind of luxury ride more likely to be found in the garages of movie stars, music moguls and titans of business than on a college campus.

That's assuming Buckeyes quarterback C.J. Stroud hasn't swapped out his silver Mercedes-Benz G-Wagon for a Bentley or a Porsche, which his name, image and likeness deal with Sarchione Auto Gallery allows him to do every 45 days.

"It's definitely changed my life for the future," Stroud said of the several NIL deals to flow his way over the past year, "and I think it's a jump-start to being a businessman before you get to the NFL, if that's your path."

More than a year ago, the NCAA lifted long-standing restrictions on players profiting from their celebrity status, and in some cases it turned elite players such as Stroud and Alabama quarterback Bryce Young into instant millionaires. But the financial benefits for some athletes are being weighed against the possibility that such deals will divide locker rooms, create tension within programs, produce an uneven playing field across college athletics and overwhelm students stretched for time.

"As far as NIL goes in the locker room, you see stuff, but no one ever talks about it," Oklahoma wide receiver Marvin Mims admitted. "It's never like, a competition, like, 'Oh, I got this much more money than you did. I've got this deal. You couldn't get this deal.' But you do notice the NIL deals that other guys are getting."

College football has witnessed the biggest impact from NIL legislation, though athletes in all sports have tapped into the sudden cash flow. Of the estimated \$1.14 billion that will be poured into the pockets of athletes in Year 2, the NIL platform Opendorse predicts nearly half of it will be spent on the gridiron.

The largest and most prominent deals are going to individual athletes who have successfully leveraged their exceptional ability, potential, influence and exposure: Young's portfolio is believed to have exceeded \$1 million before he ever took a snap for the Crimson Tide, while Alabama teammate Will Anderson signed an NIL deal that allows one of the nation's best linebackers to drive a \$120,000 Porsche Cayenne GTS.

At Texas, running back Bijan Robinson has deals with Raising Cane's restaurants, C4 Energy drinks and sports streaming platform DAZN,

while also forging a partnership with an auto dealership for the use of a Lamborghini. At Notre Dame, tight end Michael Mayer has parlayed his first-round draft stock into deals with clothing brands Levi's and Rhoback.

They are precisely the types of endorsement contracts, and cozy relationships with boosters and businesses, that once landed players on suspension and programs on probation.

"I feel bad for the older players that didn't have the opportunity to get money from this, like Braxton Miller, Cardale Jones, Justin (Fields)," Stroud said of the Ohio State quarterbacks who came before him.

"They should have made a killing," added Stroud, who also works with Value City Furniture, Designer Shoe Warehouse and the trading card company Onyx Authenticated. "It's just good that players have control now when it comes to money."

Along with deals signed by individual athletes, collectives have become a major player in the NIL landscape. Some are organized by schools and others by boosters acting on their own, but both distribute money gathered from businesses and donors for everything from endorsements to meet-and-greets and charitable work.

The Foundation, a third-party collective at Ohio State, says it has raised more than \$500,000 for Stroud, running back TreVeyon Henderson, wide receiver Jaxon Smith-Njigba and cornerback Denzel Burke. Texas Tech boosters have formed The Matador Club collective, which says it is signing all 85 scholarship players and 20 walk-ons to \$25,000 contracts this season in return for appearing at club

> events and doing a certain amount of community service. "I think we are well into the seven figures with all of our collectives," said Morgan Frazier, a former gymnast at Florida and now the general counsel for Student Athlete NIL, which operates

> > at Penn State and several other schools. Asked where the majority of money is going, she replied: "Overall,

nitely football."

It's almost impossible to determine how much players are earning from NIL deals, in part because reporting rules differ from state to state. The vast majority are relatively modest — perhaps \$50 for a tweet or \$100 for an autograph signing on platforms such as Cameo, vidsig and Engage. Rarely do deals exceed \$1,000.

But for premier position players at marquee programs, with NFL potential and huge social media followings, the money on the table can be life-changing. Twelve college players have a valuation of at least \$1 million entering this season, according to On3, a platform that uses an algorithm to factor such things as social media reach to project NIL worth.

More than 50 players have a valuation of at least \$500,000, with most of those playing in the SEC

"Having an opportunity to change other peoples' lives, that's what's cool about NIL," said Penn State quarterback Sean Clifford, who founded Limitless NIL, which is believed to be the first agency created by an athlete to help other athletes. Its clients include Nittany Lions receiver Ji'Ayir Brown.

"It's not what we're doing or what I'm doing," Clifford said, "it's about what Ji'Avir came from to now where he's at, being able to impact a dude like that. And I'm proud to be able to say he was our first guy to jump on board."

The spoils can come at a price. For one thing, players who may have already struggled to juggle classes and study halls with practice and film sessions now must balance meet-and-greets, autograph sessions and other work.

"If you want to monetize or be compensated for all the hard work (and) sacrifice that you're doing, this is part of it," said Kansas State's Deuce Vaughn, a preseason All-American. "I've learned how to read a contract. I have a marketing agent. I've learned how to talk to companies, how to get on conference calls and things like that."

Vaughn also acknowledged the additional pressure to perform: "With that money comes expectations."

Then there's the often-combustible locker room atmosphere, where lines have always existed between haves and have nots. In the past, those might have been between walk-ons and scholarship players. Now, they could be between players driving exotic cars or wearing expensive jewelry and those trying to scrape together rent.

"I know it could be a distraction," Robinson said, when asked what it's like driving his Lamborghini to practice. "If a teammate would bring it up, I would just joke around, be like, 'Oh, man, but it's not like what you're getting out there right now.' Just to not make it about yourself, because it's not about you.

"If you're not winning," Robinson said, "none of us can get these NIL deals."

Back to school, back to fighting far-right attacks on education

(TriceEdneyWire.com) — Just when you thought far-right attacks on public education couldn't get any more absurd, we hear about something new.

For the first time in almost 15 years, Sarasota schools this fall are turning down hundreds of free dictionaries from the local Rotary Club. Why?

Because the district is afraid of violating a radical new law that's part of Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis' crackdown on inclusive curricula. The district can't buy or accept any new books until it hires someone to make sure they comply with the state's draconian censorship regulations. So, the dictionaries sit on the

The idea that dictionaries might be hazardous to kids would be laughable if it weren't so dangerous. This new school year is starting as more states are passing laws to make it easier to ban books. States are also passing laws to stop teachers from talking about topics like racism; according to Education Week, 42 states have now enacted limits on what teachers can say about racism or sexism in the class-

These same political forces want to make schools teach a whitewashed version of our history and our current reality in the name of "patriotic" education. They're trying to take over school boards to impose their political ideology on teachers and students.

That's bad for our kids. And it's bad for our country. The freedom to learn is at risk.

This fall, it's more important than ever to stand for the rights of teachers to teach, and students to learn, about the full spectrum of the American experience. That means lessons that include and celebrate diverse communities. It means history that doesn't erase the experiences of Black people, brown people, LGBTQ people, women, immigrants, people with disabilities and other communities that have been historically marginalized. The director of the nonprofit EveryLibrary warns that the current wave of book bans amounts to "the silencing of stories and the suppressing of information" that will make "the next generation less able to function in society.

Children learn better when they can see themselves in others and see their communities as part of the great American story. At the same time, science tells us that learning how to understand and empathize with people across differences is essential to children's healthy development. Looking honestly at our past helps students develop critical thinking skills that are desperately needed when every smart phone is a gateway to disinformation.

Democracy, too, depends on informed citizens to function. It's no coincidence that the crowd that stormed the Capitol in 2021 was acting on lies and

Authoritarianism feasts on ignorance. Election deniers and censors of history are in the same camp and should get nowhere near our schools.

We cannot begin to heal our divisions until we

acknowledge and teach our whole history — good and bad. And we know that standing up for the freedom to learn will be a challenging task. This school year follows one in which reports of book bans and censorship reached record levels according to the American Library Association. Far-right groups and politicians are offering rewards and setting up tip lines to "report" teachers who cover "divisive" topics. School board members are receiving death threats.

But we don't shy away from these challenges when we act from a place of love. Loving our children means being advocates for them when political extremists want to limit what they can learn. It means showing up to school board meetings and organizing to make ourselves heard. It means running for the

It means rejecting one of the censors' most harmful assumptions: that students are too fragile to hear the history our people have lived.

Millions of families are getting ready to send their kids back to school. Let's also get ready to defend the freedom to learn. Before the dictionary ends up on your district's banned-books list.

Student loan forgiveness: A drop in the bucket

(TriceEdneyWire. com) — President Joe Biden made a campaign promise to alleviate some student loan debt, and on Aug. 24, he honored his commitment. Some say it is too little. Ob-

structionists say it is too much. Some economists say it may be inflationary, and loan defaulters like Congresswoman Marjorie Taylor Green, who default ed on a federal loan of her own, say it is "not fair" that some taxpayers should subsidize others. I say that student loan forgiveness is a step in the right direction. It is a drop in the bucket, to be sure, but it is a critical drop that makes way for a more insightful analysis of the cost of attendance and how people pay for higher education.

The headlines have focused that everyone with federal student loan debt will get \$10,000 of forgiveness for that debt. Those with Pell grants and student loans will get \$20,000 in debt forgiveness. Any amount of loan forgiveness is a good thing, but for those

who carry six figures worth of debt, it's just a drop in the bucket. When I was president of Bennett College, I'd often look at the debt that some of my graduates were carrying, sometimes as much as \$50,000 or \$60,000. Why? They may have had some grants but had to take out loans to cover their cost of attendance. Most colleges use the interest on their endowment to provide scholarships.

Nearly half of all Black college graduates owe 12.5% more than they did when they graduated, mainly because of accrued interest. In contrast, 83% of white students owe less. What's the difference? Family assistance. Black families have just a tenth of the wealth of white families.

While the loan forgiveness amounts are being trumpeted, I think the more significant part of President Biden's announcement is the change in repayment terms and structure. Currently, loan repayments are capped at 10% of gross income, with forgiveness happening after 10 years. The new terms cap repayments at 5% with forgiveness after 10 years. These new terms provide income flexibility for millions of borrowers who postpone adult deci-

sions because of the heavy burden of student loan debt. Some defer marriage and childbearing, new home and furniture purchases, and even aspects of career advancement because of their student loans.

Consider a graduate with a passion for education. She is agile in mathematics and would be a great math teacher. She could also go into some aspect of the finance industry as a bank, broker or portfolio manager and earn twice what she'd make as a teacher. With student loans crushing her, she might pragmatically choose finance instead of teaching. With a little help, she might follow her first love and go to the classroom. She might be forced to choose a lucrative but unfulfilling career with student loan shackles.

Too many have raised a "fairness" and 'equity" argument to oppose Biden's plan. It's a done deal, y'all, and President Biden needs to do more. Let's pause and applaud the Biden-Harris administration for this step in the right direction. And let's ask those attempting to incite class warfare about the roots of their objection. Few Republicans opposed the 45th president's tax cuts. Instead, they applauded them.

The rest of us paid for them. I didn't hear the MAGA right lamenting that most of us were paying for tax breaks for just a few of us. When Black businesses had difficulty qualifying for PPP loans because of the paperwork load, I didn't hear Republicans suggesting that less-advantaged companies were subsidizing, through their taxes, better-advantaged businesses. Some multimillion-dollar franchises seeking relief were shamed into turning their loan money back. The equity argument is nonsensical and deceptive, and for the record, most of the loan forgiveness goes to people who earn less than \$75,000 a year.

Thank you, President Biden, for this drop in the bucket. May you be inspired to do more, including examining higher education financing. What would it take to make undergraduate education free for everyone?

The right to register and vote is not a partisan issue

(TriceEdneyWire.com) — The right to vote, Dr. Martin Luther King taught in his famous "Give Us the Ballot" address, is one of the 'highest mandates of our democratic tradition." Democracy is founded on the right of citizens to decide via popular, free and fair elections who should represent them. Across the

world, the U.S. champions democracy. Yet at home the right to vote is embattled.

The United States trails most other developed democracies in voter participation. Our neighbors -Mexico and Canada, our European allies, our Asian friends like South Korea, and Australia — all have

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higher voter participation than the U.S. does.

The reason isn't a mystery. In most democracies, national governments take responsibility for registering their citizens to vote. In many countries, registration is automatic when citizens become old enough. In others, like the United Kingdom, governments take responsibility to seek out and register eligible voters, something like how our Census Bureau takes responsibility to get people counted in the census.

In the U.S., voting laws are decentralized. In most states, getting registered is left to the individual. Some states purposefully make it more difficult to register — requiring various forms of documentation, requiring in-person as opposed to online registration, limiting volunteer efforts to get people registered and more.

So, while turnout of those who are registered — 86.8% in 2020 — is relatively high, only 64% of the voting age population is registered. That compares to 92% in England, 93% in Canada, and 94% in

Failures in registration lead to lower voter turnout — and disproportionately impacts those who are younger, less educated and less wealthy. Blacks, Latinos and Native Americans are also less likely to be registered — and thus to vote.

The problem is reinforced by how our high-cost electoral campaigns are run. Campaigns target those who vote — not those less likely to vote. Candidates often make little or no effort to appeal to those who tend not to vote. That lack of appeal and attention then makes their turnout even worse.

Making it easy to register and vote should be embraced by all Americans no matter their party or their politics. The Freedom to Vote Act would set national standards for voting, including automatic voter registration, same-day registration, online registration, and standards for maintaining voter rolls and the like.

It failed in the Senate due to a filibuster supported by all Republican senators. Sen. Marco Rubio, (R-FL), a former presidential contender, claimed that the Act and the renewal of the Voting Rights Act constituted a "radical progressive agenda," pushed by "Marxists in Washington, DC" and a "leftist elite class." The Chamber of Commerce opposed making voting

Since Donald Trump spread the Big Lie that the election in 2020 was stolen, Republicans in states across the country have sought to make it harder to register and vote. Last year, according to the Brennan Center, Republican legislators in 19 states passed 34 laws making it harder for Americans, and particularly Black and Latino Americans to vote. Hundreds more were filed this year.

The purpose is clear. In the South after the Civil War, Jim Crow laws were passed to keep Blacks from voting. The plantation crowd wanted to keep newly freed Blacks from combining with working and poor whites to form multiracial coalitions to transform their states. "Thus," Dr. King noted, "the threat of the free exercise of the ballot by the Negro and the white masses alike resulted in the establishment of a segregated society."

Today is no different. Republicans — supported by corporations and the rich — want to limit the ability of working and poor people to come together and vote to transform the country. So, claims of voter fraud focus on urban areas with large minority populations. And voter restriction schemes are targeted to make it harder for those populations to vote.

But America cannot credibly champion democracy abroad while undermining it at home. Those like Sen. Rubio, who consider democracy a Marxist plot, do this nation a great disservice. The right to register and vote is not a partisan issue — it is a democratic essential. And now once more, citizens must rally to defend it from those who would undermine it.

Keep in mind, some physical activity is always better than none at all, and your health benefits will also increase with the more physical activity you do.



SICKLE CELL PATIENTS ARE LEFT FOR 'EDUCATED GUESSWORK' TO GET TREATMENT. ONE PROGRAM AIMS TO CHANGE THAT.

Monica Brown is used to hearing people say she looks young for her age. She's 41, but feels decades older - mainly because of her struggle with sickle cell disease, a genetic disorder that affects her blood.

"People say, 'Oh you look so good,' but they do not know what's going on inside," she said.

Brown's chronic pain lands her in the emergency room every few weeks. A few years ago, she moved from California to Fort Worth, Texas, to be closer to family. For three years, she spent hours on the phone nearly every day looking for a sickle cell specialist within driving distance. No one was close by, and even doctors hours away told her they were booked out for years or didn't treat sickle cell disease.

"I was losing hope. I didn't want to live," she said.

Brown is one of an estimated 100,000 people living with sickle cell disease in the U.S. The exact number of sickle cell patients in the U.S. is unknown because data on the genetic disorder is lacking.

Most states don't have basic information like the number of sickle cell patients, the counties where they live or the type of health insurance they have. This means these patients' needs aren't taken into account when it comes to federal and state-level public health planning and budgeting.

The Sickle Cell Data Collection Program aims to address that data gap. The program is supported by a combination of federal funding and charitable donations to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Foundation.

The program, which began collecting data on California in 2015, has enlisted 11 states to start collecting aggregate data on sickle cell disease and patients.

So far, only two states have data available on the CDC website: California and Georgia. Indiana, Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota are among nine other states for which full data will be coming soon.

Initial findings from the Indiana program shared by the Indianapolis nonprofit Martin Center Sickle Cell Initiative in early August show that 1,659 residents live with sickle cell disease. A little more than half — 52% – are female, and 87% are Black. And 69% of sickle cell disease patients in Indiana are on Medicaid.

Dr. Julie Kanter, a sickle cell specialist in Alabama, said having national data is crucial for improving patient outcomes.

"If we don't understand the disease, we're just not going to be able to make headway," said Kanter, who also serves as president of the National Alliance of Sickle Cell Centers, which collaborates with the CDC on the data program.

Uninformed doctors can't give patients the care they need

Sickle cell disease causes a patient's red blood cells to change from their typical doughnut shape into a banana or sickle shape. Pain is the hallmark of this complex, multi-system disease. Brown described it like someone is stabbing her with a blunt knife all over her body nonstop for hours or some-

But there is a nationwide shortage of sickle cell specialists, and many nonspecialized health care providers don't know how to treat sickle cell disease. Patients like Brown who can't find a specialist to treat their disease holistically instead rely on emergency department visits for relief during pain crises.

But patients can come to be labeled 'drug-seeking," which Brown saw written in the patient notes included with her medical records.

"If you don't have a hematologist it's really hard, if you're dealing with doctors who are like, 'I'm gonna do this because that's how I treat all of my sickle cell patients," Brown said. "We are all different. What works for this person might not work for me."

Brown had close friends with sickle cell disease who chose to stay home and suffer through a crisis rather than go to the hospital and risk being mistreated. The majority of sickle cell patients in the U.S. are Black, and patients and researchers say systemic racism impacts the care patients receive.

Access to data takes away 'educated guesswork'

For other diseases like hemophilia a genetic blood disorder that is less common than sickle cell disease and affects majority white patients — there are national registries, databases and clear guidelines that inform patient

Dr. Brandon Hardesty, a hematologist at the Indiana Hemophilia and Thrombosis Center, which is one of the organizations working on the CDC data collection program, treats both sickle cell and hemophilia patients.

Hardesty said a national data system provides doctors with a bigger pool

of health data so that when a patient shows up with less common symptoms, providers are more likely to find information that helps them determine the best treatment for that patient.

There is no database for sickle cell patients. So Hardesty said he has to do a lot of "educated guesswork" to provide the best care for his patients.

Kanter of the National Alliance of Sickle Cell Centers said some experts suspect that people born with sickle cell disease who've had a specific complication called dactylitis, which causes inflammation to the toes and fingers by age 2, will likely have more severe disease. But data is not available to explore this hypothesis. The CDC's data program could help researchers find the answer.

"And the reason to ask a question like that is so you could say, OK, this is the group of patients that might need to consider stem cell transplant early on, or this is the group of patients that need more intensive therapies," Kanter

Fresh produce is great, of course, but it's not the only way to get the benefits of these healthy foods. Here are some ideas to try throughout the day:

- Dried fruit added to oatmeal for breakfast is a great way to add flavor and nutrition, and to feel full for a while after eat-
- Cereal is one of the most frequent ways people enjoy fruit. Pairing fresh fruit with cereal is a quick and easy plantpacked breakfast, snack, or even dinner.
 - Add frozen berries in with yogurt for a snack.
- Canned fruit makes for a sweet complement to greens, such as a salad, and pickled veggies can add a twist.
- For quick energy, grab a glass of 100% fruit juice to help hold over hunger until dinner.
- Add a handful of frozen veggies to a morning omelet. Sun-dried tomatoes add texture and bold flavor to a favorite pasta recipe.
- Using 100% vegetable juice as the liquid in smoothies add nutrients and save calories. Short on time for dinner prep? Add canned tomatoes,
- beans, ground meat, and favorite go-to spices into a slow cooker and come home to a dinner that smells good and is ready to eat. At the end of the day, the goal of National Fruits & Veg-

'Honoring our past, envisioning our future': Bethesda Missionary Baptist Church commemorates 100 years

Walking past the black vintage car, through strings of clear beads, the Silver Centre Event Hall resembled stepping into a Harlem speakeasy in the 1920s.

The men wore old-fashioned suits and top hats while the women had on sequence dresses, pearl necklaces and feathered headbands.

For 100 years Bethesda Missionary Baptist Church, on the south side of Indianapolis, has served as a spiritual refuge for Indianapolis' Black residents, and Aug. 26, the church celebrated its anniversary with a '20s themed party, which Rev. Timothy Ramsey said is "honoring our past" while "envisioning our future."

Timothy was ordained as pastor of the church five years ago, and while pastoring the Baptist church through the pandemic, he began to see how churches can strengthen local relationships even outside of the sanctuary.

"The church is not just a building," Ramsey said. "It's a community made up of family and friends."

Members of the church as well as ministers, pastors and other congregational leaders attended the centennial celebration to support the church's accomplishment.

"When you've had one church that's been here for a long time, you keep

supporting that church," Denise Latimore said. "There's nothing better than the Black church."

Latimore, a member of Ebenezer Baptist Church, and her husband, David Latimore, executive pastor at Ebenezer, said they have seen several Black churches close because of lack of community assistance. The couple love the Black church and are happy to support a church's milestone in the community.

"When believers don't support the church, they close down," David said. "Spiritually, we have to support one another. If Black people don't support the Black church, then who will?"

At the event, dazzling table décor had feather centerpieces, rhinestones and photographs of Black people from the '20s in silver picture frames.

Dr. Clyde Posley Jr., Union District Association Moderator and senior pastor of Antioch Fountain of Grace Missionary Baptist Church, was a guest speaker at the event. Guests also enjoyed a best-dressed competition and a silent auction. Comedians Danise Barlow and Donald "FoSho" Martin kept the church goers laughing with their jokes about their upbringings in church.

Dr. W.V. Pickens III has pastored Greater Mount Calvary Missionary Baptist Church for nine years, and believes Bethesda's milestone is a true testament to the strength of Black Christians' faith.

"It means a lot to the African American community," he said. "It shows how

much we treasure our spirituality and how much we cherish God."

As the church commemorates its milestone, it will continue looking forward, adapting to the changes and being a place of spiritual support for its members.

"It's such a blessing to be 100 years old," said Mona Ramsey, Bethesda's first lady. "I know for certain we'll survive another 100."

Lag in slavery reparations from US Jesuits irks descendants

Last year, the U.S. branch of the Jesuits pledged to raise \$100 million for a reconciliation initiative in partnership with descendants of people once enslaved by the Catholic order. Recently, a leader of those descendants expressed deep dissatisfaction with the order's lack of progress since then.

Joseph Stewart, in a publicly released letter to the head of the order, contends the Jesuits have failed to uphold their side of the partnership with the urgency the circumstances demand. Stewart and other descendants are the progeny of 272 enslaved men, women and children sold in 1838 by the Jesuit owners of Georgetown University to Louisiana plantation owners to pay off the school's debts.

The Jesuits "are in a state of disillusionment," Stewart wrote, warning of the possible disintegration of the partnership between the Jesuit Conference of Canada and the United States, and the GU272 Descendants Associa-

tion, which represents those whose ancestors were sold.

If the partnership falls apart, "the Jesuits leaders of today will effectively betray Descendants today just as the Jesuits of the past betrayed our ancestors," Stewart wrote. "Jesuits will attempt to put Reconciliation back on the shelf for another 200 years as voices

for 'reparation' get stronger and stronger and louder and louder."

Their partnership and joint creation of the Descendants Truth & Reconciliation Foundation was announced in March 2021. The Jesuits pledged to raise \$100 million within five years with a broader goal of reaching \$1 billion from an array of donors. The money would pay for educational opportunities for current and future descendants, and the foundation would oversee fundraising and grant allocation.

In his letter to the international religious order's leader, the Rev. Arturo Sosa, Stewart called on the Jesuits to act urgently and fund the descendants' trust so racial reconciliation grants, scholarships and care for the elderly could move forward.

Stewart suggested the funding delay has been caused by the Jesuits' reluctance to move about \$57 million in proceeds from 2009 plantation land sales into the trust. In his letter to Sosa, he urged the sale of remaining planta-

tion lands and depositing those proceeds by Christmas. Stewart also laid out an incremental, multiyear funding timeline starts with a lion deposit by July 2023 and finishes with a \$1 billion addition by July 2029.

"Fundraising alone has

not produced sufficient

resources to make the foundation effective and to begin delivering on the promise," Stewart told The Associated Press. "It has not derailed the initiative, but it's just going too slow. We need to

accelerate it."

The Jesuit USA East Province has hired two firms to help sell the remaining Jesuit-owned land with proceeds going entirely to the descendants trust, the East Province said in a statement

It also is in discussions about how the province can use the proceeds from the 2009 sale of the Maryland plantation to benefit the descendants trust, but one province or conference cannot make a unilateral decision for the order, the statement said. Some of that \$57 million was used to build a retirement center and supplement a fund that helps African American students attending Jesuit schools, with the remaining money being deposited into the Jesuit aged and infirm trust.

The Rev. Timothy Kesicki, the chair of the descendants' trust and past president of the Jesuit conference, said

the process of transferring funds from the land sale to the trust is already in motion, but it is complex and "the pace of the fundraising has been rough."

He added that the process is so new to all involved.

"How this founda-

tion will operate is still in question. There is still a lot of work we're doing to bring this vision to a broader community," Kesicki said. "I'm not surprised by a slow start. But we are committed to seeing it through to the finish line."

The Jesuits are still on track to transfer \$100 million into the trust within three to five years of their March 2021 announcement, he said. Kesicki is seeking grants to bring in more people and money to accomplish those goals.

In 2017, he delivered an apology to the descendants of the 272 enslaved people who were sold by the university's Jesuit owners. Stewart would like Pope Francis to make a similar apology. In his letter to Sosa, he asked after his April invitation for Francis to visit with the descendants.

It would be a deeply meaningful papal act, said Stewart, who spoke of the hurt he personally endured as a devout Catholic whose ancestors were enslaved by the church he holds dear.

"It all starts with admitting the

wrong," he said. "But if you apologize and walk away, there is no value to it. It has to be stepping off point to make change that uplifts lives."

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
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

Fed tackles inflation with its most diverse leadership ever

JACKSON HOLE, Wyoming (AP) — When Diane Swonk first attended the Federal Reserve's annual economic conference in Jackson Hole in the late 1990s, there was a happy hour for women who attended the event. It barely filled a single table.

Now, the "Women at Jackson Hole" happy hour draws dozens of female economists and high-level decision-makers, from the United States and overseas.

"I'm just glad that now there's a line for the ladies' room," said Swonk, a longtime Fed watcher who is chief economist for the accounting giant KPMG.

It's not just at Jackson Hole but also in the Fed's boardroom where its leadership has become its most diverse ever. There are more female, Black and openly gay officials contributing to the central bank's interest-rate decisions than at any time in its 109-year history. Many are also far less wealthy than the officials they have replaced.

Over time, economists say, a wider range of voices will deepen the Fed's perspective as it weighs the consequences of raising or lowering rates. It may also help diversify a profession that historically hasn't been seen as particularly welcoming to women and minorities.

"Broadly, that's helpful," said William English, a former senior economist at the Fed who teaches at the Yale School of Management. "There's evidence that diverse groups make better decisions."

The central bank, as it is doing now, raises its benchmark short-term rate when it wants to lower inflation, and reduces it when it wants to accelerate hiring. Such moves, in turn, affect borrowing costs throughout the economy — for mortgages, auto loans and business loans, among others.

On Aug. 25, in his speech to the Jackson Hole symposium, Chair Jerome Powell stressed that the Fed plans further rate hikes and expects to keep its benchmark rate high until the worst inflation bout in four decades eases considerably — even if doing so causes job losses and financial pain for households and businesses.

Rhonda Vonshay Sharpe, an economist who is president of the Women's Institute for Society, Equity and Race, said she welcomed the broadening of the Fed's leadership. Sharpe said she's "hopeful that a more diverse group of people will pay attention" to what the Fed does and aspire to high-level economic roles.

Colleges and universities, she suggest-

ed, should do more to encourage and prepare students for economic careers, including steering more of them to study mathematics.

The change at the Fed has been a rapid one, with three African Americans and three women having joined the central bank's 19-member interestrate committee just this year. (Under the Fed's rotating system, only 12 of the 19 committee members vote each year on its rate decisions.)

The Fed's influential seven-member Board of Governors, based in Washington, now includes two Black economists, Lisa Cook and Philip Jefferson, who were both nominated by President Joe Biden and were sworn in this May. They are the third and fourth Black people on the board. Governors get to vote on every Fed rate decision.

Biden also elevated Lael Brainard, a governor since 2014, to the board's powerful vice chair position.

In addition, two of the presidents of the Fed's 12 regional banks are now Black — Raphael Bostic of the Atlanta Fed and Susan Collins of the Boston Fed. Collins, formerly provost of the University of Michigan, became Boston Fed president this year. Bostic took office in 2017.

Just last week, Lorie Logan, a former senior official at the New York Fed, became president of the Dallas Fed. Five of the regional bank presidents are

Nela Richardson, chief economist at the payroll processing firm ADP, noted that the education and experience of the new policymakers are similar to their predecessors, with Cook, Jefferson and Collins all Ph.D. economists — an above-average proportion among new Fed officials, she said.

Richardson suggested that having more women in the Fed's leadership is particularly important now, because many of the problems the central bank faces — including very low unemployment that is fueling wage increases and inflation — are related to women's ability to join the workforce. Fewer women, particularly mothers of young children, are working now compared with prepandemic trends.

That shortfall is driven, in part, by a drop in the number of child care workers since the pandemic. With fewer women working or seeking work, many businesses must raise pay to compete for a smaller pool of labor. Those higher wages are then often passed on to consumers as higher prices, thereby fueling inflation.

Swonk credits Esther George, president of the Kansas City Fed, for driving change at the Jackson Hole conference



by inviting more women over the years, including Cook and Collins, to attend and participate in panels. Each year, about 130 influential central bankers and economists gather at Grand Teton National Park in Jackson Hole at the end of August to network and discuss the economy's challenges.

This year, Biden also named Michael Barr, a former Treasury Department official, as a Fed governor, filling all seven seats on the board for the first time in nearly a decade.

Vincent Reinhart, a former Fed economist who is now at Dreyfus and Mellon, said it's unusual for the Fed to have experienced so much turnover so quickly. Fed governors serve staggered terms that are intended to result in one vacancy every two years. The regional bank presidents have five-year terms that can be renewed.

"This has got to be the most dramatic change in Fed leadership in one year on record," he said.

tees could start to argue for an end to the increases — or even to cut rates.

The result might be less unanimity

The new members, including Barr, are more likely to favor lower rates to support the economy and hiring, Reinhart said. Yet for now, with inflation near a 40-year high, the Fed's policymaking committee is moving unanimously to sharply raise rates to try to cool the economy and lower inflation.

There's little sign of any dissent from that approach, for now.

Tim Duy, chief U.S. economist at SGH Macro, suggested that the Fed is unlike the Supreme Court in one important respect: Just because a president has nominated several new Fed board members doesn't necessarily affect the central bank's policymaking.

The Fed is a more technocratic institution, Duy said, "where you're more likely to see people's views evolve over time," in response to changing economic data. At its July meeting, all 12 members of the Fed's policy committee voted for a large three-quarter-point rate hike — an unusually large increase.

Still, Reinhart said, if inflation should fall substantially and appear to be under control and if unemployment began to rise as the Fed's rate hikes squeeze the economy, some of Biden's appointees could start to argue for an end to the increases — or even to cut rates.

The result might be less unanimity around the Fed's decisions, Reinhart said. Or Powell might end up suspending rate hikes earlier than he would prefer, to preserve consensus.

"There's a lot more opportunity for differences of opinion as we get longer into this rate-hiking cycle," he said.

Serena's example: Tennis icon's impact felt in Black America

NEW YORK (AP) — In 2016, responding to the fatal police shootings of two Black men just a day apart, Serena Williams joined a small chorus of top Black athletes in speaking out. "I won't be silent!" she

"Have we not gone through enough, opened so many doors, impacted billions of lives?" Williams asked in a Facebook post in the wake of the backto-back killings of Philando Castile just outside St. Paul, Minnesota, and Alton Sterling in Baton Rouge,

"I realized we must stride on — for it's not how far we have come but how much further still we have to go," she wrote.

That wasn't the only time Williams would wade into the politically thorny topic. It's an outspokenness for which other Black athletes, from Muhammad Ali to Colin Kaepernick, have paid a steep professional

After nearly three decades in the public eye, few can match Williams' array of accomplishments, medals and awards. Through it all, the 23-time Grand Slam title winner hasn't let the public forget that she's a Black American woman who embraces her responsibility as a beacon for her people.

Now that Williams, 40, has indicated she is getting ready to hang up her tennis racket for good, perhaps even right after the U.S. Open, which started Aug. 29, sports analysts will take stock of her reign as one of the greatest athletes of all time. But no matter how her swan song plays out, Williams' icon status on and off the court, as well as her impact on the Black community, are indelible.

"Most Black folks, they understand the sacrifices," said Elle Duncan, an anchor for ESPN's SportsCenter. "If they can't pull apart your game, they will find other reasons: your braids, your hair, your attitude, your body type, the clothes that you wear."

When Black women and girls were berated for wearing beads in their braids in the workplace, classroom or while competing in sports, they could

Some of Williams' competitors, daunted by the task of beating her, turned to speaking disparagingly about her physical build and allure. Her response? A dignified, seemingly unbothered Williams brushed off press questions about it.

After she won the championship at Wimbledon in 2016, Williams was asked what should be done to address underlying issues after the fatal ambush of several Dallas police officers gunned down by a sniper to protest the shooting of Black men by police.

"I don't think that the answer is to continue to shoot our young Black men in the United States ... or just Black people in general," she said. "Also, obviously, violence is not the answer of solving it. The shooting in Dallas was very sad. No one deserves to lose their life — doesn't matter what color they are, where they're from. We're all human."

After gun violence touched their own family, Serena and Venus Williams opened a community center in Compton in 2016 to offer counseling and therapy to residents affected by violence.

"The way people could connect with not having to be wealthy to play the game, not having to go through the traditional pathway to make it," said Blackman, now the general manager for player and coach development at the U.S. Tennis Association.

At a pivotal point in her career, Williams chose to stay away from the Indian Wells tournament in California for many years after she and her father said they heard racist taunts from fans upset by Venus defaulting before a head-to-head match with Serena.

The slights to Serena Williams didn't end there, especially in moments when her conduct was deemed by some as unsportsmanlike.

During her loss to Naomi Osaka in the final of the 2018 U.S. Open, Williams shouted angrily in response to what she felt was unfair treatment by the chair umpire. An Australian newspaper lampooned Williams in a cartoon, depicting her with exaggerated physical characteristics strikingly similar to racist caricatures of Black people from the Reconstruction

Players who have emerged after Williams, like Osaka and Coco Gauff, are among the talents who

Osaka, who was born in Japan to a Japanese mother and Haitian father, and moved to the U.S. when she was 3, has called Serena "the main reason why I started playing tennis."

The same influence hasn't been seen in other diversity-starved sports, ESPN's Duncan said.

"With Tiger Woods, we kept hearing about how he was inspiring this new generation of Black and brown kids to golf," she said. "Have you seen it? I don't see it. We see it with Serena."

"Will she go down as one of the greatest athletes of all time?" Duncan asked. "Yes. But I think more than anything, she's one of the greatest influencers of all time."
