'It takes a lot of energy and will':

Parents of Herman Whitfield III open up about son's in-custody death

For Gladys Whitfield, continuing to get in front of people and share this painful story is a responsibility. She and her husband, Herman Whitfield Jr., have spent the last four months standing at podiums and microphones, beside friends and family and strangers, hoping what happened to their son doesn't slip out of the public's consciousness.

"For me, it takes a lot of energy and



will," Gladys Whitfield said in an interview with the Recorder, "but my husband and I think because Tres can't be here to talk about what happened to him, we have to say something."



Tres was the family nickname for 39-year-old Herman Whitfield III, who died in police custody April 25 during an apparent mental health crisis. His parents have found themselves now in the spotlight, trying to reconcile the reality of their son's death with the sting of telling his story.

'We're just trying to be patient'

It took two months for Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department to

Mental health the focus of budget hearing for public safety agencies

Public safety officials laid out their plans for making mental health a priority in 2023 during a city-county council committee budget hearing Aug. 31.

That includes a new division dedicated to mental health, a mental health crisis response team and coordinating with dispatch to figure out when a police response isn't necessary.

Under the proposed budget for next year, the Office of Public Health and Safety would add a Mental Health Division that would house the crisis response team. The division would also have its own deputy director dedicated to mental health pro-

Though the division wouldn't start until 2023, OPHS Director Lauren Rodriguez said the office is trying to prepare some of the logistics now, including adding a clinician to emergency dispatch to make sure dispatch gets codes right for mental health calls. There will also be two people hired to listen to past calls for key words that should tell dispatchers it's a mental health

The office's total proposed budget in 2023 is about \$21.5 million, with about \$4.5 million for the Mental Health Division. Currently there is no exact timeline on when the response team could start, but

Inclusive clinical trials could **Improve** health outcom **Getty Images**

In the U.S., Black people are twice as likely than white people to get Alzheimer's disease, according to data from the National Institute on Aging. Yet one study that began in 2016 to develop a drug to treat Alzheimer's had almost no Black participants.

This is not unique to Alzheimer's research. While 30% of all U.S. prostate cancer deaths are among Black men, they make up only 3% of participants in cancer clinical trials.

Health experts say this lack of representation leads to widening health disparities and ballooning health care costs.

An upcoming event in Indianapolis aims to increase awareness about the importance of diversity in clinical research. The 'Better Journey to Health" event will take place from 5-8 p.m. Sept. 14 at the Ivy Tech Community College Culinary and Conference Center.

The event is free and organized

by the nonprofit Center for Information and Study on Clinical Research Participation. Panelists will answer questions like what to expect as a clinical trial participant and the benefits and risks of participation.

One of the panelists will be Lena Harvey, a 37-year-old Indianapolis woman who lives with sickle cell disease. Harvey will discuss her experience as a participant in clinical trials.

While there are many reasons for lack of representation in clinical trials, Harvey said trust in the medical community is a big one.

Many of her older family members and friends do not interact with the health care system outside of emergencies or urgent problems because of the history of medical abuse. But she thinks that's changing, as Black community members, especially young people like her, have access to more information than ever before.

"We are more connected than

Indianapolis officials say white nationalist group didn't need permit to march but never notified city of plans

City officials say the white nationalist group that marched through downtown Indianapolis on Sept. 3 would not have needed a permit to do so, but the group gave no notice of its plans.

A now-viral video posted to Twitter showed some 70 members of the Patriot Front, identified by the Southern

Ruby Bridges, desegregation trailblazer, writes kids book

Ruby Bridges was a 6-year-old first grader when she walked past jeering crowds of white people to become one of the first Black students at racially segregated schools in New Orleans more than six decades ago. Now, with teaching about race in America more complicated than it's ever been, she's authored a picture book about her experience for the youngest of readers.

Bridges, along with three other Black students at a different school, were the first to integrate what had been all-white schools in New Orleans in 1960.

"I Am Ruby Bridges," featuring illustrations by

Nikkolas Smith, went on sale Sept. 6. Published by Orchard Books, an imprint of Scholastic Inc., it's aimed at readers as young as 4.

Complete with a glossary that includes the words "Supreme Court" and "law," the book is an uplifting story about opportunities and kids being able to make a difference, Bridges said in an interview with The Associated Press.

"It's a true reflection of what happened

Back to school season. Should parents be worried about monkeypox?

Monkeypox cases across the world are steadily increasing, with the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recording a total of 19,962 confirmed cases as of Sept. 2, and 172 of those confirmed cases belong to Indiana.

Meanwhile, most students have already completed their first week of school. Parents, teachers and students all have questions. Can monkeypox be spread while sitting in a classroom or walking through the hallways? Could it be transmitted through touching other students or sharing food? Is it tougher to combat than COVID-19? How cautious should college students be?

Dr. Virginia Caine, director of the Marion County Public Health Department, has all the necessary answers for curious parents or caregivers wanting to know more about monkeypox and maintaining their child's safety.

Recorder: How can monkeypox be spread?

Dr. Virginia Caine: The monkeypox, which appears to act more like the infection we saw with the HIV infection, has primarily been transmitted through people having intimate sexual contact.

I can be in a room of 50 people, and if I've spent more than 15 minutes with them in the room and they're within six feet of me just talking, or whatever, I can affect 90% of the folks in that room.

Recorder: Are there any protocols for monkeypox in place?

Dr. Virginia Caine: I'm sure that schools have changed and adapted a lot of their COVID protocols to monkeypox protocols.

Recorder: Should parents have to worry about monkeypox at all with their kids in the schools?

Dr. Virginia Caine: They should be more worried about COVID than they should be about monkeypox because of the lower rate of transmission related to monkeypox.



Now, it's not to say that they can't be exposed because what happens is that a person who has monkeypox is a person that may have blisters, lesions or a rash. They can contaminate with their hands and touch different objects surrounding them, contaminating the objects.

The person who's infected with monkeypox does have the ability of infecting others through bedding sheets or towels that they may share with you, and there does appear to be some transmission in the air. But it is not as contagious.

Recorder: Could monkeypox be spread by sharing food or drinks?

Dr. Virginia Caine: Not so much by sharing food or drinks.

Recorder: What precautions should college students take to ensure safety on their campuses?

Dr. Virginia Caine: I think college students have to be careful. We know they are 18- to 24-year-olds. A lot of times a significant number of them may have no symptoms but are contagious. They can spread that infection to their loved ones, someone who may be immunocompromised, so you wouldn't want to spread that infection to your grandparents or parents. Especially if they have an underlying

condition, such as high blood pressure, asthma, or renal failure.

You may be healthy, or you may feel great. Not a problem. I'm less worried about you but I am worried about spreading the infection to others like your peers. So, I need you to get vaccinated and our African American males are the lowest in terms of getting vaccinated compared to any other racial group.

Recorder: What's the overall view you want parents, teachers and students to focus on when considering the risk of monkeypox?

Dr. Virginia Caine: That the transmission from the monkeypox is low. But if you should have a child that has a rash, especially a rash that has blister-like lesions, we ask that you cover those lesions up with a gauze. That lesion may itch, and they're scratching the lesion with their hands or fingers and may scrub their eyes where they can transmit that infection from their rash to their eyes. Try to get some gauze coverage.

Opera event at Garfield Park highlights well-known Hoosier opera singer and classical pianist

On Sept. 10, Angela Brown, international opera singer, and Joshua A. Thompson, classical pianist and musical sociologist, will perform during a free opera event at Garfield Park.

The Indianapolis Opera — an organization whose mission is to "educate, inspire and entertain" the community through "musical storytelling" hosts its 5th annual Opera in the Park performance at the MacAllister Amphitheater at Garfield Park, 2425 Conservatory Drive. This show begins at 7 p.m. and will not only highlight the Indianapolis Opera's 48th opera season but will also display the work of Black composers to Hoosiers.

Both Brown and Thompson are Indianapolis natives, and they will perform as soloists and duet partners during the opera event. Brown is excited about singing for her hometown.

"I always love to perform for my Indianapolis family because it's home," Brown said.

At the age of 5, Brown began her singing career like many Black musicians: singing in the Black church. The church helped her realize her talents and she said she is appreciative to have



gospel music in her "toolbox."

Brown likes to say that opera chose her after learning about the form of music at 21 because it came to her so easily.

"I took to it like a duck to water," she said.

Brown graduated from college with a degree in voice performance. After singing in 2004 at the Metropolitan Opera House in New York, she received international acclaim, and would later perform for audiences around the world.

While many in the Black community do not think that opera is a form of music for them, Brown believes differently.

"You can find yourself in opera," she said. "You just have to have an open mind about it."

To both, there is also significance in them being Black because it shows that Black people are in the opera and classical music scenes. "Representation is important," Thompson said.

Thompson — also known as "Sock Joplin" onstage for wearing socks during his performances — began playing the piano at 5, and the trumpet at 10. He graduated from DePauw University with a degree in sociology, and today, he

primarily plays the piano.

He acknowledged that many
people do not enjoy opera and/or
classical music but should give the

genre a chance.

"Sometimes everything is not meant to be liked, but it's meant to be experienced," Thompson said. "Whether you like opera or not, there's so much positive energy. I am very eager to perform."

This year, Thompson will have a collaborative performance with his twin brother, Jared Thompson, who performs jazz music. Joshua said it would be fun to bridge the two musical genres and perform with his brother.

The Indianapolis Youth Orchestra will also perform a 9/11 commemoration fanfare.

"You will not go home hungry from this concert," Brown said. "It will be like Thanksgiving. I am looking forward to it."

Family and friends can arrive at the Garfield Park amphitheater as early as 6 p.m. on Sept. 10.

Brown and Joshua also have a podcast, "Melanated Moments in classical music," an awardwinning podcast that is internationally listened to.



'THE FAME GAME:

An Insider's Playbook for Earning Your 15 Minutes' by Ramon Hervey II

Who are you? That's a common question and, depending on how it's asked, you might have a dozen

different answers. You're a parent, an athlete, a hard worker, a cook, a reader, someone who's curious, smart, colorful, serious, driven. You know who you are, and if you follow the new book "The Fame Game" by Ramon Hervey II, soon everyone will.

Like a lot of kids, Ramon Hervey II grew up with celebrities' names on the periphery of his attention, but it wasn't until he was a young man working as a Pan Am flight attendant that he had his first real brushes with fame. Before he switched careers to work in the music industry, he served Peter Jennings, actress Shirley McLaine and Miles Davis in-flight. Later, at Motown Records, he met Stevie Wonder, Smokey Robinson and Diana Ross. When he went into public relations at Rogers & Cowan, "one of the premier entertainment public relations companies in the industry," he worked with superstars like Babyface and Peter

Frampton. You'd think that with all those stars circling his life, Hervey'd know a thing or two about fame. And he does: He knows how you can catch it, or at least enter its orbit.

Comedian Richard Pryor, who was a challenge, taught Hervey that "a path of self-destruction

repeatedly gained and lost. From Quincy Jones, he learned that superstardom can be harder to manage than mere fame (and Jones did it gracefully). Rick James taught

the love of his life...

Sometimes, you have to shake your head until it rattles at the way your favorite celebrity acts like a fool. Still, you almost


> can't get enough of that knuckleheadedness, and "The Fame Game" gives you even more.

And yet, author Ramon Hervey II doesn't dish just for the sake of telling. You won't read about silly scandals inside this book, no sleeparound tell-alls or party-all-night tales. Instead, each chapter, which is built around one or more stars, offers a hint on how you can stay grounded if you're looking at (or for!) fame yourself. Chapter headers lead readers into the tip, and Hervey uses his time with the famous to illustrate his reasoning.

And there's where readers will smile: Hervey doesn't unnecessarily put himself on the stage here, and there's no gratuitous namedropping. He acts heroically

sometimes for his clients, but he's not the hero of the story, which allows his points to shine forth. And those tips make "The Fame Game" a winner, no matter who you are.

can sabotage fame." **Ever-gracious Bette** Midler taught him why authenticity is important and fame should never "define your self-worth." Hervey didn't trust Little Richard, who refused to let the public "dictate" his fame.

The Bee Gees showed him that fame can be

Hervey about being "obsessed" with the wrong thing. Andraé Crouch taught him to dream, and to be honest about "self-inflicted setbacks." Hervey showed Don Cornelius how much Cornelius needed the media's help to be famous. And a Miss America's "mistake" helped Hervey to find





release body camera footage, which shows a seemingly confused Whitfield running from the kitchen to the dining room, where one officer used a stun gun on him, and others detained him on the floor. He was pronounced dead at a hospital.

There have been two internal investigations from IMPD, one criminal and another administrative. After the coroner's office ruled Whitfield's death a homicide in July, a police spokesperson said IMPD's Critical Incident Response Team finished the criminal investigation and presented the case to the Marion County Prosecutor's Office.

Meanwhile, Whitfield's family filed a wrongful death lawsuit against the city and police officers involved in his death, alleging they used excessive force.

All of that has led to a lot of waiting. "I understand that it's a process," Gladys Whitfield said. "It's a legal process considering criminal charges against members of law enforcement. I'm assuming it takes time."

"We're just trying to be patient," she said.

Patience is difficult, but she said she doesn't want anything to be rushed.

"Our son is dead," Gladys Whitfield said. "That's the main thing we think about over and over, that our son's dead and he's not coming back. Now all these things after the fact, they just take time."

Among other demands, the family wants the Department of Justice and FBI to investigate the incident and IMPD policies and practices.

The family also wants IMPD to release the full, unedited body camera

footage for officers at the home that night, saying the version police re-

leased in June is "selective and biased." Gladys Whitfield said police told them they weren't allowed to leave the house after their son was taken to the hospital and that police didn't give a reason for why they couldn't leave.

Asked to respond to the family's accusation and if the department plans to release the full, unedited body camera footage, an IMPD spokesperson declined to comment because of the pending litigation.

Whitfield's parents credit groups like Faith in Indiana for their support. Faith in Indiana has been active in bringing a clinician-led crisis response team to Indianapolis. The city plans to start a pilot for the program early next year as part of a new division dedicated to mental health. There is also a Change.org petition with the family's demands that has about 1,200 signatures

"Even though I may not have talked to any of those people, and I don't think I have, but to have a thousand signatures, that means somebody's on our side," Gladys Whitfield said.

'Confused and disoriented'

Herman Whitfield III was never diagnosed with a mental health condition, according to his family, but in hindsight his mother believes it's possible he could have been.

"He just seemed to be kind of sad at home," she said. "I noticed he was sad. Sometimes he didn't want to talk to us."

Gladys Whitfield said she called 911 in the early morning hours of April 25 because her son seemed "confused and

disoriented."

"He wasn't violent in any sort of way," she said, "but my husband and I thought he needed medical attention."

Gladys Whitfield told the dispatcher her son was having "some sort of episode" as he could be heard in the background arguing with his father.

When officers arrived, Herman Whitfield Jr. can be heard saying, "You guys should have called an ambulance," but it doesn't appear officers acknowledged or responded to him.

"We just assumed that if we call for medical help, they're going to send out the people who render medical assistance," Gladys Whitfield said. "We don't understand who's coming out or what their uniform may say or look like or what their official title is or their training."

The family is hopeful a clinician-led crisis response team can lead to better outcomes for people in their position in the future, but there's no guarantee of that.

"We never got a chance to find that out," Herman Whitfield Jr. said.

The city has a unit — the Mobile Crisis Assistance Team, or MCAT — that responds to mental health calls, but it doesn't operate 24/7 and wasn't available when Gladys Whitfield called 911.

A spokesperson for IMPD previously told the Recorder that police were dispatched on a disturbance run, not a mental health run, so MCAT wouldn't have initially responded anyway. It's possible that MCAT could have gotten involved later, though.

'I can write better music than that'

Like so many others, Herman Whitfield Jr. will remember the way his son played piano. It was "just so very smooth," he said.

"Sometimes he would play for me just to help me relax after a long day," he

Herman Whitfield III was interested in drums first when he was about 3 or 4 years old. His parents can't remember exactly how or when he turned to piano, but it probably had something to do with growing up in the church and hearing gospel music. They eventually found him lessons.

He also enjoyed writing music and told his parents one day that he listened to all types of music.

"I can write better music than that," he told them.

It was the mid-1980s, and Herman Whitfield III was writing music by hand until his parents splurged on a computer and got a music-writing program.

He went on to twice win the Detroit Symphony Orchestra's Annual Emerging Composers Readings national competition, according to Indy Arts Guide. The Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra premiered his piece, Scherzo No. 2 in E minor by Herman Whitfield III, in 2006.

Gladys Whitfield said the family may host an event for people to learn more about her son and "acknowledge that he was here on Earth and did good things."

Poverty Law Center as a designated hate group, marching through the streets with a banner that read "Reclaim America."

A campaign volunteer for Democratic 5th congressional district candidate Jeannine Lee Lake posted the video. Lake said seeing the march was disheartening.

"It makes me very sad to see. I thought we were past some of that stuff here in Indiana. And in America," she said.

Lake said plans are underway for a counter-demonstration sometime next weekend.

"We need to collectively, as leaders ... send them a message publicly to say don't come here with that," she said. "We don't know if they are from Indiana, we don't know if they are from Indianapolis, or if they came from outside, because these cowards put a sheet over their head and marched so they wouldn't be recognized."

Both Indianapolis Mayor Joe Hogsett and the Indianapolis Fraternal Order of Police released statements condemning the march. According to the Anti-Defamation League, Patriot Front is responsible for "the vast majority of white supremacist propaganda distributed in the United States." Patriot Front is a splinter group from Vanguard America, formed in the wake of the 2017 "Unite the Right" rally in Charlottesville.

In an online post, Patriot Front said its Indianapolis demonstration was "in recognition of Labor Day." The march occurred around the same time as the Indy Laborfest, put on by the local union group AFL-CIO.

David Goldenberg is Midwest regional director for the Anti-Defamation League. He said it's common for Patriot Front to try and adopt the language of existing events to attract new members.

"Earlier this year in Chicago, they attempted to co-opt a pro-life march," he said. "But those are things where they try and co-opt them as potential recruitment tools and opportunities."

Goldenberg said free speech is protected in the U.S., but Patriot Front pushes messaging that is

meant to incite.

"It's clear that their speech and their actions are about inciting hate and in some cases inciting violence," he said. "That's not OK, and that's something we should all be speaking out against."

This isn't the first time hate groups have marched around the city of Indianapolis. In 2021, the Proud Boys marched around the city on Jan. 6, coinciding with the insurrection at the U.S. Capitol.

Goldenberg said Indiana is a state with a history of white supremacist hate groups, but that history doesn't have to define the present or future.

"Now the question is: What do we do about it? How do we forcefully say this is not OK," he said. "How do we forcefully make clear that if they show up again they will be met with 10 times as many protestors and against those hateful views?"

Rodriguez said she hopes to have a pilot program ready for "early" in the year.

Tom Sellas, chief of the Metropolitan Emergency Services Agency, which operates the county's 911 emergency dispatch system, said the agency is working with IMPD, Eskenazi Health, Faith in Indiana and other groups to develop better ways to respond to 911 calls with a behavioral health component that don't require a police response.

The city has worked with groups including Faith in Indiana to set up the crisis response team pilot. The issue became more urgent after the death of Herman Whitfield III, who died in police custody in April during an apparent mental health crisis.

Whitfield's mother, Gladys Whitfield, spoke at the Public Safety and Criminal Justice Committee budget hearing and said she appreciates the focus on a crisis response team but reiterated the family's demands, including having the officers who were involved fired and charged.

One of the challenges for OPHS brought up at the hearing is that a deputy director for the Mental Health

Division will have a tall task coordinating efforts from the federal, state and local government, along with nonprofits. Rodriguez said the office is working with a local clinician to figure out how to recruit the right person.

Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department also presented its budget to the committee. IMPD's total proposed budget, about \$313 million, represents 22% of the city-county budget.

IMPD is consistently budgeted for more officers than the department has, so to get more, the budget includes an increase for starting salary, bonuses for officers and signing bonuses for new officers. As of Aug. 31, IMPD's staff was at 1,595, with about 200 unfilled positions.

In all, the proposed 2023 budget includes more than \$300 million for public safety, a record for the city.

Council committees will continue to host budget hearings through early October.

Some animals are more equal than others

Contrary to what one might expect, a high percentage of middle-class Americans do not think that the government should forgive student loans, even though said loans disproportionately affect them. They, along with a substantial number of working-class Americans, often act in ways that work to the detriment

of their economic self-interest. (Student debt relief will benefit millions of low- and moderate-income Americans.)

Overall, most polls indicate that slightly more than half of all Americans support President Joe Biden's plan to relieve student loan debt of \$10,000 to \$20,000 per person. (People of color, who tend to be saddled with higher student loan debt, are more supportive of this move than are white Americans.)

One could argue it's good that a plurality of Americans believes in "personal responsibility" as regards to repaying such debts. However, to be clear, it's exceedingly rare to find those who argue that people should knowingly accrue a large amount of debt — for a college education or otherwise — and then intentionally shirk their responsibility to repay it.

Obviously, it is honorable to repay one's debts. But is it inherently dishonorable to accept loan forgiveness? This non-rhetorical question is especially relevant given today's hyper-political environment. The overwhelming majority of Republican politicians argue that it's wrong to excuse student loans, though they are perfectly fine with forgiving Paycheck Protection Plan loans — from which many of them

benefitted. (Incidentally, former President Donald Trump spoke in favor of student debt relief.)

The Pandemic Response Accountability Committee, which was created to track how pandemic funds are used posted an update on PPP loans, stating that more than 10 million loans (out of 11.5 million issued) had been fully or partially forgiven as of July 4. Further, the average amount of loan forgiveness was \$72,500, which is \$50,000 more than the maximum amount of student loan forgiveness. Also, the Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget estimates that changes established by President Biden's plan will cost roughly \$500 billion over the next 10 years, with \$360 billion earmarked for student debt cancellation. The PPP has given \$793 billion to small businesses as of July 4, forgiving all but \$50 billion

Admittedly, the key difference between student loan debt relief and PPP debt relief is that the latter were intended to be forgiven assuming that they were used for legitimate business purposes (e.g., payroll costs, business mortgage interest payments, utilities, rent, etc.) within eight to 24 weeks after the loan was received. On the contrary, student loans were designed to be repaid.

The bottom line is that student loans are disproportionately borne by people who have low to moderate incomes, whereas PPP loans tended to be taken out by people whose incomes were well above those of the average worker. Without any apparent self-awareness, hypocrites blithely advance the "good for me but not for thee" argument, offering bland excuses in the process. How many angels can electric slide on the head of a pin?

While I understand the ire of those who never at-

tended college (and thus didn't incur student loan debt), student loan forgiveness is not a handout. Most people pursue postsecondary education to improve their earning potential. The result is that, on average, they will pay more in income taxes (and other taxes) than those who do not earn a college degree. As is the case with all government debt, the middle class will disproportionately bear the cost regardless of whether they attended college. This is why it is in their economic self-interest to vote for politicians who shun regressive tax policies that overwhelmingly favor wealthy individuals and wealthier corporations.

Further, there are at least two other incredibly important issues to consider. One is that for-profit colleges are often guilty of predatory recruiting and lending practices, especially regarding students of color. I have yet to see those who are raging against President Biden's ungodly debt cancellation plan express any concern about that issue. Secondly, as outgoing Purdue President (and former Indiana governor) Mitch Daniels points out, college tuition rates far outpace inflation — even more than health care costs do. Thus, college debt leads millions of Americans to file for bankruptcy.

While it's true that not everyone needs to pursue a four-year degree, the fact is that most jobs for the foreseeable future will require some level of postsecondary education. As the saying goes, if you think that education is expensive, try the alternative.

(TriceEdneyWire. com)-Throughout history, humankind has been blessed with prophets whose wisdom, insight and predictions have provided others with a pathway to prosperity.

Unfortunately, as often as not, humankind has foolishly rejected the wisdom of its prophets and has suffered regrettable consequences.

One such prophet for our times was Marvin Gaye. I can say with absolute authority that we should have listened in 1971 when he sang:

Whoa oh, oh mercy, mercy me Oh, things ain't what they used to be,

Where did all the blue skies go? Poison is the wind that blows from the north and south and east

Oh, mercy, mercy me

Oh, things ain't what they used to be What about this overcrowded land? How much more abuse from man can

she stand? Marvin's song was a call to action, especially for Black people. He understood that most Black people were forced to focus on the daily, immediate challenges to survival more than predicted future environmental threats.

But the future is now, and "responsible living" requires us to amplify our focus on the immediacy of environmental threats and what we must do to survive this new reality.

The current flooding in Jackson, Mississippi, serves to refocus our attention on environmental issues as we observe the unnecessary suffering of people who look and live like us.

As Michael Goldberg of the Associated Press wrote, "the forecasted flooding in Mississippi could not have come at a worse time for Veronique Daniels, who became homeless three months ago and was sleeping on her mother's back porch in Jackson."

Goldberg noted that Daniels' mother lives in Canton Club Circle, the same Jackson subdivision that flooded two years ago. Residents have been taking precautions as the previous flooding loomed large in their memories.

There are absolutes to this discus-

We need clean air to breathe. We need clean water to drink.

We need uncontaminated food to eat. Natural disasters, toxins and contaminants are detrimental to good health.

Racism is thoroughly enmeshed in discussions of environmental concern. Few can disregard the issue of racism in a discussion of the environment. In

part, Wikipedia summarizes environmental racism as "lack of affordable land, lack of political power, lack of mobility, and poverty. Minority communities are left in the inner cities and in close proximity to polluted industrial zones."

In these areas unemployment is high and businesses are less likely to invest in area improvement, creating poor economic conditions for residents and reinforcing a social formation that reproduces racial inequality.

Jackson, Mississippi; New Orleans; and Flint, Michigan, stand out as examples of this definition of environmental racism.

All have suffered life altering disasters of immense proportion. To varying degrees, each has fallen victim to recurring environmental disasters. They all reflect a benign neglect of interest in majority communities of color and poverty, and inaction in the resolution of long-standing environmental issues.

According to census data, Jackson is 82.5% Black and 16.2% white; New Orleans is 59.2% Black and 33.4% white; Flint is 54% Black and 38.4% white. There are multiple factors creating their respective problems, but the common link is their disparate demographic numbers.

Jackson suffers from an aging water treatment facility and inadequate flood abatement infrastructure. New Orleans suffered from an aging and mechanically deficient levee/flood control system. Flint's water problems are at least a century old with a history of the Flint River being used as an unofficial waste disposal for industry, a receptacle for raw sewage from the city's waste treatment plant and rumored to have caught fire — twice.

These problems require allocation and spending money. Sadly, the choice has been the tolerance of acceptable human collateral damage.

I can remember when African Americans growing up in South Carolina could barely hope for change. Now, we can vote for change. Racial divides still exist, but we have achieved greater equality under the law today than we could hardly have imagined 70 years ago. America is still a work in progress, but progress has been made. Black soldiers coming out of World War II returned to a country that would not allow them to stay in a white hotel or to use a whites-only restroom. Across the South, schools were legally segregated and unequal.

Blacks and women couldn't sit on juries. Blacks were systemically denied the right to vote.

Today, African American mayors govern in cities across the South. Blacks, Latinos, women and Asian Americans are competing in and often winning elections. A Black man was elected president of the country with a majority of the votes — twice. Board rooms that once were all white and male now have opened the doors, at least a crack, to minorities and women. African American actors find roles in advertisements for general audiences. The popular culture is far more integrated than most of our neighborhoods. Dr. King's "dream" became famous. We're still dreaming today, with much to be done, but some of

the dream has already come true. Progress is never easy and never unopposed. Every era of reform sparks a reaction. We see that now. When Lyndon Johnson, a Democrat from the South, championed the Voting Rights Act and the war on poverty, Republicans responded with their "Southern strategy," grounding the party in the South among whites embittered by the change. Police brutality against Blacks — some of it caught on video for the first time — sparked the largest interracial protests across the country in our history. Now the reaction against Black Lives Matter and police reform is a central theme in our elections. Inequality has reached obscene extremes, yet Republican obstruction aided by a few corrupted Democrats blocked

long overdue tax reforms.

As the culture has become more enlightened, the reaction has become ever fiercer. Progress is not a guaranteed outcome. A right-wing majority on the Supreme Court overturns settled law and precedent to rule that abortion is unconstitutional. Justice Clarence Thomas argues that contraception and the right to love the one you choose are similarly at risk. Conservative justices have opened the floodgates to dark money in our elections. They've invented gun rights that would have astounded the founders. They've gutted the Voting Rights Act and are targeting affirmative action.

In the end, however, democracy empowers the people to decide. Even a reactionary majority in the Supreme Court can be overruled. When the people in the red state of Kansas voted overwhelmingly to protect the right to abortion, they sparked a response that is spreading across the country.

Now our democracy itself has come under attack. Yet it is worth noting that when Donald Trump sought to overturn the results of a presidential election, public officials at the state level — almost all of them Republican ironically — and public officials in the Justice Department and the White House, including the vice president, again all loyal Republicans, stood firm on respecting the people's choice.

We have every reason to be frustrated and enraged by the inequities and the injustices of today's America. Sometimes it seems that those who want to take us backward are on the march, and those who want to make a more perfect union are in retreat. Yet, look back at the past decades, we've come a long way — despite the setbacks, the rancor, new unmet challenges. Despair may be fashionable, but hope is rational. And with hope, commitment and energy, we can continue to make America better.

through my own eyes," she said.

But books by or about Bridges have been challenged by conservatives in several school districts amid complaints over race-related teaching. Bridges said she hopes the new book winds up in elementary school libraries.

"I've been very, very fortunate because of the way I tell my story that my babies come in all shapes and colors, and my books are bestsellers, and maybe banned in schools," she said. "But I think parents really want to get past our racial differences. They're going to seek out those books."

Bridges was born in 1954, the same year the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that racial segregation of public schools was unconstitutional. Southern school districts, including New Orleans, continued resisting integration for years.

But on Nov. 14, 1960, Bridges — carrying a plaid book satchel and wearing a white sweater — was escorted by four federal marshals past a taunting white crowd into segregated William Frantz Elementary School. The scene was made famous in the Norman Rockwell painting "The Problem We All Live With," which hung in the White House near the Oval Office during the tenure of former President Barack Ohama.

The book's theme plays off the author's name: "Ruby" is a precious stone, and "Bridges" are meant to bring people together. Told with a touch of humor from the vantage point of a first grader, the book captures the wonder of Bridges' experience — rather than just the scariness of that raucous first day at the school.

"It really looks like Mardi Gras to me, but they aren't throwing any beads. What's Mardi Gras without beads?" Bridges writes.

The only parade that day was out of the school. White parents immediately began withdrawing their children, so Bridges spent the entire year by herself with white teacher Barbara Henry, who is still alive and a "very best friend," Bridges said. Henry's acceptance and kindness during a fraught time taught her

an important lesson, she said.

"That shaped me into a person that is not prejudiced at all. And I feel like that little girl is still inside of me, and that's it's my calling to make sure kids understand that you can't look at someone and judge them," Bridges said.

Elsewhere in New Orleans on the same day Bridges went to school, Gail Etienne, Leona Tate and Tessie Prevost entered the previously all-white McDonogh No. 19 elementary school. Last year, New Orleans held a weekend of events to remember Bridges and other women.

Bridges, a Mississippi native, still lives in metro New Orleans and has authored or co-authored five books. She published "This Is Your Time," which is intended for older children than her new book.

ever," she said. "The Internet absolutely changed everything. It offered us a more level playing field in terms of access to information."

This includes access to support groups, patient advocates as well as information about clinical trials and specific doctors.

Harvey said she has taken a proactive approach to her health, empowering herself with information to make sure she got the care she needed. She participated in two clinical trials on drugs and procedures for sickle cell disease. Plenty of internet research and conversations with her husband and trusted sickle cell physicians helped her come to the decision to enroll. She understood that even if the trials did not help her personally, the results of the studies could help others down the

"Because sometimes it takes several years, decades for people working on something to get it to where it really needs to be. None of that work is in vain," she said.

Why representation matters

Clinical trials are typically initiated by a research question from community organizations or scientists at academic centers or industry labs.

Then, funding flows in from federal agencies, the private sector or charitable foundations. The clinical trial team then recruits participants through social networks or primary care settings. This is where more than half of the trials fail.

According to a report from the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine, 55% of clinical trials stop because they were not able to recruit the participants needed to complete the study. This happens even after money and resources have been

flowing into the trial for months or even years.

The financial fallout from lack of representation in clinical trials extends to individuals and their communities.

Disparities for some health and quality-of-life outcomes, including life expectancy and years in the labor force due to physical ability, could be mitigated if clinical trials were more inclusive.

"Of course, better representation in clinical research will not completely alleviate these disparities—after all, they have many interconnected and interdependent causes. However, to the extent that representation in clinical research may improve generalizability of scientific findings across a range of clinical studies for these important health states ... representative clinical research may play a role in alleviating these inequities," according to the NASEM report.

If better representation in clinical trials would alleviate just 1% of health disparities, it would result in economic gains of as much as \$40 billion for diabetes and \$60 billion for heart disease alone, the report explains.

Treatment and prevention depend on studies

Experts refer to a drug called warfarin as a cautionary tale of how lack of representation can be detrimental to patients' outcomes. Warfarin is used to prevent clots in blood vessels and is crucial to prevent deadly conditions like strokes and pulmonary embolisms. It is also a leading cause of adverse drug events in the U.S. because the wrong dose of warfarin can result in complications like excessive bleeding and even death.


Patients require different doses of warfarin, and that's largely because of genetic factors. For example, patients of African ancestry require a higher average daily dose of the drug than patients of Asian ancestry. But most of the trials studying warfarin involved white people of European ancestry. Warfarin was approved for human use in 1951, but it took 62 years for scientists to learn that genotype-guided dosing is important for patient outcomes.


But it is not just the development and utilization of drugs that is affected by lack of representation in clinical trials. Preventative measures such as screening for certain diseases is also at stake.

One example that the NASEM report gives is screening for colorectal cancer in Black adults. The U.S. Preventive Services Task Force, which informs screening recommendations for different diseases, was not able to "make" a separate, specific recommendation on colorectal cancer screening in Black adults" because of the lack of representative studies on Black adults. But data show that Black adults in the U.S. have the highest rates of being diagnosed with and dying from colorectal cancer. Other national guidelines suggest that they can benefit from earlier screenings.

Should you get a new COVID booster? If so, when?

John Wherry will wait until later in the fall to consider getting an updated COVID-19 booster. The University of Pennsylvania immunologist knows it's too soon after his shot late this summer, especially since he's not at high risk from the virus.

It's the kind of calculation many Americans will face as booster shots that target currently circulating omicron strains become available to a population with widely varying risks and levels of immunity.

Here are some things to know:

HOW ARE THE NEW BOOSTERS DIFFERENT?

They're combination or "bivalent" shots that contain half the original vaccine that's been used since December 2020 and half protection against today's dominant omicron versions, BA.4 and BA.5. It's the first update to COVID-19 vaccines ever cleared by the Food and Drug Administration.

WHO'S ELIGIBLE?

Updated shots made by Pfizer and its partner BioNTech are authorized for anyone 12 and older, and rival Moderna's version is for adults. They're to be used as a booster for anyone who's already had their primary vaccination series — using shots from any U.S.-cleared company — and regardless of how many boosters they've already gotten.

IF I JUST GOT ONE OF THE ORIGINAL BOOSTERS, SHOULD I GET THE NEW KIND RIGHT AWAY?

No. The FDA set the minimum wait time at two months. But advisers to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said it's better to wait longer. Some advise at least three months, another said someone who's

not at high risk might wait as long as six months.

"If you wait a little more time, you get a better immunologic response," said CDC adviser Dr. Sarah Long of Drexel University.

That's because someone who recently got a booster already has more virus-fighting antibodies in their bloodstream. Antibodies gradually wane over time, and another shot too soon won't offer much extra benefit, explained Wherry, who wasn't involved with the government's decision-making.

WHAT IF I RECENTLY RECOVERED FROM COVID-19?

It's still important to get vaccinated even if you've already been infected — but timing matters here, too.

The CDC has long told people to defer vaccination until they've recovered but also that people may consider waiting for three months after recovering to get a vaccination. And several CDC advisers say waiting the three months is important, both for potentially more benefit from the shot and to reduce chances of a rare side effect, heart inflammation, that sometimes affects teen boys and young men.

HOW MUCH BENEFIT WILL THE NEW BOOSTERS OFFER?

That's not clear, because tests of this exact recipe have only just begun in people.

The FDA cleared the new boosters based in large part on human studies of a similarly tweaked vaccine that's just been recommended by regulators in Europe. Those tweaked shots target an earlier omicron strain, BA.1, that circulated last winter, and studies found they revved up people's virusfighting antibodies.

With that earlier omicron version now replaced by BA.4 and BA.5, the FDA ordered an additional tweak to the shots — and tests in mice showed they spark an equally good immune response.

There's no way to know if antibodies produced by an omicron-matched booster might last longer than a few months. But a booster also is supposed to strengthen immune system memory, adding to protection against serious illness from the ever-mutating virus.

HOW DO WE KNOW THEY'RE SAFE?

The basic ingredients used in both omicron-targeting updated vaccines are the same. Testing by Pfizer and Moderna of their BA.1-targeted versions proved safe in human studies and CDC's advisers concluded the additional small recipe change should be no different.

Flu vaccines are updated every year without human trials.

CAN I GET A NEW COVID-19 BOOSTER AND A FLU SHOT AT THE SAME TIME?

Yes, one in each arm.

WHAT IF I WANT TO WAIT?

People at high risk from COVID-19 are encouraged to get the new booster when they're due. After all, BA.5 still is spreading widely and hospitalization rates in older adults have increased since spring.

Most Americans eligible for an updated booster have gone at least six months since their last shot, according to the CDC — plenty of time that another shot should trigger a good immune response.

But the original formula still offers good protection against severe illness and death, especially after that all-important first booster. So it's not uncommon for younger and healthier people to time boosters to take advantage of a shot's temporary jump in protection against even a mild infection, like Wherry did.

A healthy 51-year-old, Wherry said he postponed the second booster recommended for his age for seven months, until late summer — just before an international trip that he knew would increase his risk from unmasked crowds.

With the updated boosters now rolling out, he plans to evaluate in four or five months — when presumably his antibody level starts waning and he's planning holiday gatherings, whether he'd benefit from another shot.

Suicide Awareness Can Help Save Lives

Suicide is a serious public health problem that can have lasting harmful effects on individual, families, and communities. In 2020, suicide was among the top 9 leading causes of death for people ages 10-64, and the second leading cause of death for people ages 10-14 and 25-34.

Many people are uncomfortable with the topic and don't openly communicate about thoughts of suicide or self-harm. When important problems are left hidden in secrecy, prevention efforts are less effective.

National Suicide Prevention Week, Sept. 4-10, provides the Marion County Public Health Department and other community agencies an opportunity to educate residents about facts, warning signs, and how to connect to services and support.

Risk factors can increase the chance that an individual may try to take their life. They include:

ake their life. They include:
History of previous suicide attempts

Family history of suicide

History of depression or other mental health conditions

History of alcohol or drug abuse

Stressful life event or loss of a loved one

Stigma associated with mental illness and reaching out for help. Access to a lethal means such as firearms or drugs

Warning signs include feelings of hopeless, loss of interest, agitation, shame, a sudden improvement or change in mood, talking about wanting to die, having a plan on how they would end their life, increasing alcohol and drug use, giving away possessions, and withdrawing from friends and family.

Deaths by suicide are only part of the problem. Those who attempt suicide should not be forgotten and need follow up care as they may experience serious injuries that can have long-term effects on both their physical and mental health.

People who survive an attempt can also struggle with depression and other mental health illnesses that may impact their daily lives. Suicide is preventable, and everyone has a role to play to save lives and create healthy and strong individuals, families, and communities. Prevention requires a comprehensive public health approach.



Jehovah's Witnesses knocking on doors again

Jehovah's Witnesses resumed door-to-door ministry beginning Sept. 1, when a 2 1/2-year suspension of the work is officially lifted. It's just in time to begin a global campaign featuring a new interactive Bible study program.

The decision to resume their door-to-door ministry marks the complete restoration of all prepandemic in-person activities for the 1.3 million Jehovah's Witnesses in approximately 13,000 congregations in the United States.

Houses of worship, Kingdom Halls, were reopened April 1, witnessing in public places resumed May 31 and in-person conventions are once again being planned for 2023.

"I can't wait to knock on my first door," said Eric Sowell.

Another congregant, Shavon Sowell, added, "Writing letters and calling are wonderful ways to check in on people, but there's nothing like seeing a person's face and their expressions."

The suspension of the public ministry was a proactive response by the organization to keep communities and congregants safe. The move was also unprecedented. Jehovah's Witnesses had been preaching from house-to-house without interruption for more than 100 years through an economic depression, two world wars and global unrest. But COVID-19 demanded a different response.

"We believe that the early decision to shut down all in-person activities for more than two years has saved many lives," said Robert Hendriks, U.S.

Pan-African women of faith advocate to prevent malnutrition

Recently, the Pan African Women of Faith/Pan African Women's Ecumenical Empowerment Network (PAW/PAWEEN) presented a workshop, exhibition and reception at the 11th Assembly of the World Council of

Churches in Karlsruhe, Germany.

The assembly included many member churches and partners of Bread

for the World. Approximately 25 global members of PAW/PAWEEN represented the group in person. They were blessed with sponsorships from their churches and other partners to participate in this way.

PAW/PAWEEN has advocated for Bread's values and public policy agenda, bringing a lens of racial, gender, and class equity—as well as nutrition and climate justice. This informs their advocacy to change policies, programs, and conditions that allow hunger and poverty to persist.

In partnership with Bread, PAW/PAWEEN's advocacy and organizing workgroup members presented a paper entitled, "Global Faith Voices of Women of Africa and of African Descent: Nutrition, Food Security, Economic Empowerment, and Just-Peace."

Bread's advocacy on the U.S. Global Malnutrition Prevention and Treatment Act (GMPTA) was featured during the presentation.

The paper cites alarming data from recent reports on nutrition, equity, and the environment. It also analyzes how they intersect and impact African women and women of African descent.

In addition, the paper includes the 2022 State of Food Security and Nutrition in the World (SOFI) report, which highlights the increase of the major drivers of food insecurity and malnutrition: conflict, climate extremes, economic shocks and growing inequities.

In addition, a joint UN Women and UN Development Programme report, "Government responses to



COVID-19: Lessons on gender equality for a world in turmoil," indicates that emergency preparedness requires gender-aware responses to reduce burdens of care, violence, and economic insecurity on women.

The PAW/PAWEEN paper helped us learn about a North American economic perspective, a Caribbean historical perspective, a Brazilian political and religious perspective, a Portuguese and French perspective on the collaborative framework of the Global Malnutrition Prevention and Treatment Act, an African perspective on the causation and solution to hunger, and a British perspective on the advocacy role of churches.

The presentation and writings inform us of how the everyday and long-term impacts of food insecurity,

malnutrition, economic insecurity, racial inequity, and war are tied to the livelihoods of African women and women of African descent.

In sum, these women admonish us that time is of the essence to address the inequities they and their communities face. An important way to do this is through policies such as the Global Malnutrition Prevention and Treatment Act. You are invited to read the paper here. Soon you will also be able to see the entire PAW/PAWEEN at the Assembly of the World Council of Churches.





spokesperson for Jehovah's Witnesses. "We're now ready and eager to reconnect with our neighbors once again - person-toperson, face-to-face. It's not the only way that we preach, but it has historically been the most effective way to deliver our message of comfort and hope."

Restoration of the public ministry coincides with a global campaign to distribute a new interactive Bible study program available in hundreds of languages at no cost. The program comes in the

form of a book, online publication or as an embedded feature within the organization's free mobile application. Released in late 2020, the interactive study platform combines text, video, illustrations and digital worksheets to help learners of all ages.

"This new study program is designed to match the learning needs of the 21st-century student," said Hendriks. "We're excited to begin sharing it with our neighbors as we return to making personal visits."

The pandemic forced Jehovah's Witnesses to quickly pivot to virtual meetings and conventions, while conducting their ministry exclusively through letters, phone calls and virtual Bible studies. This has led to growth in meeting attendance and the number of congregants, with more than 400,000 newly baptized witnesses joining the ranks of 120,000 congregations globally in just the first two years of the pandemic.







Mississippi capital's Black business owners decry water woes

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — When John Tierre launched his restaurant in Jackson's neglected Farish Street Historic District, he was drawn by the neighborhood's past as an economically independent cultural hub for Black Mississippians, and the prospect of helping usher in an era of renewed prosperity.

Recently he sat on the empty, sun-drenched patio of Johnny T's Bistro and Blues and lamented all the business he has lost as tainted water flows through his pipes — just like other users in the majority Black city of 150,000, if they were lucky enough to have any pressure at all. The revival he and others envisioned seems very much in doubt.

"The numbers are very low for lunch," Tierre told The Associated Press. "They're probably taking their business to the outskirts where they don't have water woes."

Torrential rains and flooding of the Pearl River in late August exacerbated problems at one of Jackson's two treatment plants, leading to a drop in pressure throughout the city, where residents were already under a boil-water order due to poor quality.

Officials said that most of Jackson should have running water, though residents are still advised not to drink straight from the tap. The city remains under a boil water notice. Officials also said future repairs leave potential for fluctuations in water pressure.

The water crisis has compounded the financial strain caused by an ongoing labor shortage and high inflation. And the flow of consumer dollars from Jackson and its crumbling infrastructure to the city's outskirts hits Blackowned businesses hardest, the owners say.

Another Black entrepreneur who has taken a hit is Bobbie Fairley, 59, who has lived in Jackson her entire life and owns Magic Hands Hair Design on the city's south side.

She canceled five appointments on a recent day because she needs high water pressure



to rinse her clients' hair of treatment chemicals. She also has had to purchase water to shampoo hair and try to fit in whatever appointments she can. When customers aren't coming in, she's losing money.

"That's a big burden," she said. "I can't afford that. I can't afford that at all."

Jackson can't afford to fix its water problems. The tax base has eroded over the past few decades as the population decreased, the result of primarily white flight to suburbs that began about a decade after public schools integrated in 1970. Today the city is more than 80% black, and 25% of its residents live in poverty.

Some say the uncertainty facing Black businesses fits into a pattern of adversity stemming from both natural disasters and policy decisions.

"It's punishment for Jackson because it was open to the idea that people should be able to attend public schools and that people should have access to public areas without abuse," said Maati Jone Primm, who owns Marshall's Music and Bookstore up the block from Johnny T's. "As a result of that, we have people who ran away to the suburbs."

Primm thinks Jackson's longstanding water woes — which some trace to the 1970s when federal spending on water utilities peaked, according to a 2018 Congressional Budget Office report — have been made worse by inaction from Mississippi's mostly white, conservative-dominated Legislature.

"For decades this has been a malignant attack, not benign. And it's been purposeful," Primm said.

Political leaders have not always been on the same page. Jackson's Democratic mayor, Chokwe Antar Lumumba, has blamed the water problems on decades of deferred maintenance, while Republican Gov. Tate Reeves has said they stem from mismanagement at the city level.

On Aug. 29, the governor held a news conference about the crisis, and the mayor was not invited. Another was held later in the week where they both appeared, but Primm

said it's clear that the two are not in concert.

"The lack of cooperation speaks to the continued punishment that Jackson must endure," she said.

Under normal circumstances, Labor Day weekend is a bustling time at Johnny T's. The college football season brings out devoted Jackson State fans who watch away games on the bistro's TVs or mosey over from the stadium after home games. But this past weekend many regulars were busy stocking up on bottled water to drink or boiling tap water to cook.

Even as revenue plummeted, Tierre's expenses increased. He has been spending \$300 to \$500 per day on ice and bottled water, not to mention canned soft drinks, tonic water and everything else that would typically be served out of a soda gun. He brings staff in a few hours earlier than usual so they can get a head start on boiling water to wash dishes and stacking the extra soda


In total, Tierre estimated, he's forking over an added \$3,500 per week. Customers pay the price.

"You have to pass some of this off to the consumer," Tierre said. "Now your Coke is \$3, and there are no refills."

At a water distribution site in south Jackson, area resident Lisa Jones brought empty paint buckets to fill up so her family could bathe. In a city with crumbling infrastructure, Jones said she felt trapped.

"Everybody can't move right now. Everyone can't go to Madison, Flowood, Canton and all these other places," she said, naming three more affluent suburbs. "If we could, trust me, it would be a dark sight: Houses would be boarded up street by street, neighborhood by neighborhood."

Black women gymnasts make history at championships

Black girl magic reigned at the 2022 U.S. Gymnastics Championships in Florida as Jordan Chiles, Shilese Jones and Konnor McClain won the top three spots in the senior all-around competition.

The trio made history as the first three Black female gymnasts to sweep the podium.

"It's so unreal," said McClain in an interview with NBC Sports. "I'm still in shock a little bit."

This summer, the gymnast returned to competition following two stress fractures, a concussion, the flu and her father's death in December.

McClain, who lives in Las Vegas, captured the senior women's all-around title.

Her combined eight-rotation 112.750 beat out all competition for the night's



biggest prize, and she added balance beam gold (28.900) along the way, Indianapolis-based USA Gymnastics reported.

Jones of Auburn, Washington, finished a close second with a 112.000, while Chiles of Spring, Texas, finished third (111.900).

"This is the legacy of Gabby Douglas, Simone Biles, Dominique Dawes and so many other trailblazers who trained and stood alone," Dr. Cathryn Stout tweeted.

According to Essence, Douglas became the first African American gymnast to win gold in the individual all-around and team events at the same Olympics in 2012.

She retired in 2016.

Biles has won 25 World Champion-

ship titles and seven all-around titles and is tied with Shannon Miller for the most Olympic medals won by an

The next time fans can see McClain, Jones, and Chiles compete will be at the 2022 World Gymnastics Championships, which begin on Oct. 29 in Liverpool, England.
