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# City, organizers emphasize need for community input with new crisis response team

Details about a pilot for the city's new clinician-led crisis response team won't be released until closer to its launch early next year, but organizers who have helped the city put the program together are hopeful community input can make it successful.

Mayor Joe Hogsett joined Office of Public Health and Safety Director Lauren Rodriguez and Faith in Indiana at a press conference Sept. 9 to highlight the \$2 million allocated for the program as part of the mayor's proposed 2023 budget.

The goal is to implement a 24-hour clinician-led response team with at least two clinicians that will respond to nonviolent mental health calls and add mental health experts to the 911 call center. The team will initially operate in a limited number of districts before

expanding.

Rodriguez said city officials are still working out key details such as composition of the teams and what triggers a clinician-led response.

Faith in Indiana organizer Josh Riddick said it's important to be transparent throughout the process and continue to include the community's perspective in developing the pilot program. He said leaders in other cities such as Gary and South Bend are already looking at Marion County's pilot program to see how they can implement similar programs.

"This is the cutting edge of public safety," Riddick said. "We're convinced that collaborating together with voices in the community can ensure that this team represents and looks like the community it's serving."

Hogsett said it is important to begin

# To understand the real toll of gun violence, look to survivors and their families

When DeAndra Yates-Dycus got a phone call that her seventh grader was shot, she rushed to the hospital, frantic, hoping she wouldn't be asked to identify a body.

The sheriff met Yates-Dycus and told her that 13-year-old Dre "did not do anything wrong. He was just in the wrong place at the wrong time."

She recalls replying: "No, he was in the right place at the right time, because kids should be able to go to birthday parties."

Dre was at a friend's 13th birthday party at a home in what Yates described as a "nice neighborhood" on the northwest side of Indianapolis. They'd just sung "Happy Birthday" when a stray bullet from outside the house shattered a window and

## Agreement keeps water on at 4 city apartments, tenants are 'hoping for the best'

With more than 18 months of unpaid utility bills, more than two dozen water shut-off notices and 20 payment arrangements, an agreement with JPC Affordable Housing Foundation assures that water and gas will remain on at four city apartments while forcing the owner to sell its properties.

City officials, Citizens Energy Group and the attorney general's office announced the agreement with JPC Affordable Housing at a press conference Sept. 8.

"Frankly, it should not take a three-way lawsuit by a local government, a utility company and a state-level official to bring justice in such a clear case of neglect," Mayor Joe Hogsett said at the press conference.

In April, Citizens, the city and the state attorney general

## IPS unveils 'Rebuilding Stronger' draft that includes grade consolidation, school closures

Indianapolis Public Schools Superintendent Aleesia Johnson unveiled a draft of the district's expansive "Rebuilding Stronger" plan, which includes closing seven schools, building two new schools and reconfiguring grades at nearly three dozen schools.

The plan is meant to combat declining enrollment, financial issues and poor

facility conditions.

Johnson announced the plan during her State of the District address Sept. 13.

The plan, which would still need approval from the school board, consists of the following:

- Seven elementary school buildings would close next summer.
- The district would establish grade 6-8 middle schools that offer International Baccalaureate, STEM,

# Hendricks County Community Foundation survey to evaluate needs of diversifying community

The Hendricks County **Community Foundation** launched a survey with the goal of finding solutions to problems identified by an increasingly diversifying county.

The survey, available at hendrickscountycf. org, includes questions about what people see as the county's most pressing needs, along with its most valuable assets. There are also demographic questions.

The community needs assessment is a follow-up to one the foundation did in 2019, with more of an emphasis on getting responses from African Americans and other minorities. The goal in 2019 was to have 12% of total responses to be from resentative sample of

people of color, but the number ended up being 6%. This time, to match county demographics, the foundation wants about 14.5% of responses to be from people of color.

Bryan Chatfield, the foundation's community inclusion and engagement manager, said they are about 100 responses Bryan Chatfield is community inclushort of getting a rep-

# Explained: Biden's student loan forgiveness plan

President Joe Biden's administration announced plans Aug. 24 to implement a student loan forgiveness program that could erase up to \$20,000 in debt for borrowers, but not every borrower is subject to debt relief.

Federally owned student loans are the lone qualifiers, while private student loans and higher-income borrowers are excluded from the plan.

Individuals who make less than \$125,000 per year, or heads of household who make less than \$250,000, will be forgiven of loans up to \$10,000.

Those who received a federal Pell Grant while in college are eligible to receive up to \$20,000 of their loans forgiven.

Here's what else you need to know about student loan forgiveness:

# Are defaulted loans eligible for forgiveness?

Yes, defaulted loans are included in the forgiveness program, even for those who have a remaining balance on their loans. The Department of Education will have a "Fresh Start" initiative in place as soon as January 2023 as an opportunity for people to get out of default.

# I'm a current student in college. Am I eligible?

Yes, some current students still enrolled in school are eligible.

Eligibility for those who filed as independents on their Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is dependent upon the individual's household income.

#### Am I eligible if I'm a parent?

If your income falls short of the income threshold of \$125,000, you are eligible. Even parent borrowers with federal parent PLUS loans for multiple children are only eligible for up to \$20,000 in full forgiveness.

## How would I know if a received a Pell Grant?



Information about what loans and grants you received is available at studentaid.gov.

# Does student debt from graduate school qualify?

Yes, you're eligible if you meet the income threshold.

#### Key dates

- $\bullet$  Oct. 1 marks the day the student loan forgiveness applications should be available no later than the first week of the month.
- Oct. 31 is the expiration day for the Limited Public Service Loan Forgiveness (PSLF) Waiver. PSLF is a student loan forgiveness program for borrowers who devote their careers to nonprofit or governmental work. Under the Limited PSLF Waiver, rules governing "qualifying payments" were relaxed.
- Nov. 3 is the hearing on the final approval of

Borrower Defense to Repayment Settlement, which provides federal student loan forgiveness for borrowers who were misled or defrauded by their schools.

• Dec. 31 marks the end of the student loan pause. Borrowers should anticipate returning to repayments as early as January 2023.

#### Indiana will tax loan forgiveness

The Indiana Department of Revenue confirmed Sep. 6 that Indiana will levy income tax on those who participate in the loan forgiveness program at a rate of 3.23%. This means an individual who receives the \$10,000 forgiveness amount could be liable for state and county income taxes. Those who qualify for the full loan discharge could be taxed more.

If the job of an act/thr/hor is to scare the day-lights out of you, "Beast" gets the job done.

The success of this film's eye-catching, ear-grabbing hocus pocus can be traced back to smart direction, near seamless visual/sound effects, tight editing and the supremely talented Idris Elba.

"Cujo as a lion" was the goal. Screenwriter Ryan Engle ("Rampage") set the stage, created the characters, put the story in motion and pitted man against beast and beast against man in a fathomable setting. The movie's rogue lion may be bigger than life, but the setup is so feasible, it hooks you.

Awe and bickering breakout on a plane hovering over South Africa's gorgeous terrain. Dr. Nate Samuels (Elba) and his teen daughters Meredith (Iyana Halley) and Norah (Leah Jeffries) are returning to the motherland where he met his now-deceased ex-wife. The couple's breakup, her death from cancer and his time-consuming career are the bones of contention. Samuels: "I need you to forgive me." Upon arrival, the three are greeted by their old family friend Martin (Sharlto Copley, "Maleficent"), a wildlife biologist who manages an expansive game preserve.

The happy reunion and a tour of the environs are cut short when Martin



discovers a village whose citizens have been savagely mauled to death by what appears be a large lion. The formidable beast hunts humans not as prey, but for revenge. Poachers have killed off his pride of lions, and this ferocious cat wants payback. Danger looms when the four get stranded and radio communications fade. Are they doomed? Martin: "You don't understand, we're in his territory now."

Considering all the tourists who go to Yellowstone and get mauled by bears or bison, the premise seems possible. However, a leap of faith is required to believe that this crazed lion is bigger and badder than normal. Its size and sheer brutality will require audiences

to suspend disbelief for 93 very succinct minutes (editor Jay Rabinowitz, "8 Mile"). And this "Cujo" on steroids aspect takes the film from act/thr/dra to horror. Those who prefer realism may be disenchanted. Genre fans who covet gore galore may feel unfulfilled. But no one can deny the scariness on view.

The depth of emotions and relationship woes between Nate and his daughters feel viable enough to pull you firmly into their family strife. The way the film is written, Martin and Nate are not over-exaggerated superheroes, they're just courageous. As Mer and Norah squabble and make bonehead decisions, they exemplify teen angst and become

endearing. These characters make you feel you're stranded with them, in the middle of nowhere and fearing for your life.

The deft visual effects team, led by Victor Almela, has created big cats that look the part. Production designer Jean-Vincent Puzos ("The Lost City of Z") makes dwellings, truck interiors and abandoned buildings tangible sets. Costume designer Moira Anne Meyer gives the Samuel family lived-in clothes. The savannahs, valleys and hills appear mesmerizing because veteran cinematographer Philippe Rousselot ("A River Runs Through It") aptly captures the natural beauty of South Africa. And composer Stephen Price's score


ramps up the drama and intensifies scary moments.

Icelandic director Baltasar Kormákur's ("Everest") task is not easy. Help the actors project fear, coordinate vital visual, special and sound effects, balance sustained moments of dread with scary, credible bone-chilling bursts of violence. But, he gets the job done. You'll be so engrossed, jumpy and petrified you'll forget the fakery as tension builds and builds and builds...

The actors who play poachers court disdain. Copley as Martin seems earnest, while Halley and Jeffries display the right mix of naivete and courage as the attentionstarved daughters. But honestly Elba is the kingpin. He helps create illusions of animal attacks that feel horrifying. As the beast bangs down the doors of his truck, eager to maim and kill, fear and emerging bravery is expressed on his face, in his emotions and actions. The guiltridden dad morphs from absentee father to protector, leader and braveheart and that transition is a marvel. The kind of magic only a skilled thespian can deliver.

"Beast" is a guilty pleasure rife with danger, terror and peaked emotions. It will scare the hell out of you. But isn't that what you want?

# BUTTER 2 upped sales, attendance in 2nd fine arts fair

Local fine arts fair featuring the works of Black artist breaks sales record

A fine arts fair created by cultural development firm GANGGANG beat the sales record from its first event with BUTTER 2, which ran from Sept. 1-4.

This year, BUTTER, which has a goal of uplifting Black artists and promoting equity within art, nearly doubled its attendance and sold 109 works totaling \$250,005 with all of the profits retained by the artists. The fair included pieces from local and national artists such as April Bey, Kiah Celeste, Julian Jamaal Jones and Will Watson, and featured performances from entertainers such as Dorian Phelps, 81355, Deckademics and DJ Grapevine.

Several pieces were purchased for permanent collections as well. Local artist Courtland Blade sold three pieces to Eskenazi Health and the Central Indiana Community Foundation for their permanent collections. Jones, an Indiana University student, sold a piece to the Richmond Art Museum, and Newfields bought a textile piece from Bey.

the process early to learn what community members want and how to best implement practices. time is critical that we

Faith in Indiana and city officials have talked to more than 800 predominately Black community members who agree there needs to be a "different type of response," Riddick said.

"The truth is we can no longer afford as a community to simply lock up those who are struggling with mental health or diagnosed mental illness and substance issues and keep them incarcerated for the duration of whatever sentence they

might receive without any treatment whatsoever," Hogsett said. "The do this."

City officials and leaders with Faith in Indiana visited Denver last month to learn about the city's STAR program, a similar clinician-led response team, to help inform the establishment of the pilot program.

filed three separate lawsuits against JPC Affordable Housing.

In the settlement agreement, the owner must sell all four properties by the end of the year to a new non-affiliated ownership group. JPC Affordable **Housing and Berkley Commons** LLC will not be able to do business or own residential properties anywhere in Indiana for seven years.

Residents at Berkley Commons, Covington Square, Capital Place and Woods at Oak Crossing were scheduled to have their water shut off Sept. 30 because the property owner failed to pay what is now \$1.9 million in utility bills to Citizens.

Citizens President and CEO Jeffrey Harrison said that about 1,184 units were at risk of having their water turned off, with close to 3,000 people being impacted due to the property owner's negligence.

The agreement also allows the city to recover up to the full \$850,000 it paid in February to turn utilities back on at Berkley Commons and Capital Place.

"The mental anguish of not knowing what would happen on Oct. 1st is now over," the Concerned Clergy of Indianapolis said in a statement. "Hopefully, this announcement will be able to stabilize families in those apartments so we can have a more stable community."

While the agreement has been made, resident Brianna Bible does not feel much sense of relief.

The 38-year-old mother of two has been living at the Woods of Oak Crossing apartment complex for less than a year and is preparing to move when her lease ends in December. The main reason for her move is because of how the water shutoff situation was handled at the complex.

"As a resident, I am not feeling valued because throughout this whole process, we haven't received any communication from the apartment complex," she said in an interview with the Re-

corder after the announcement. "I am prepared for the worst but hoping for the best."

Jazmine Evans is "happy" that an agreement was made but wishes the property owner would have done a better job of upholding their leasing requirements from the beginning. "Just be honest with people," she said. "Just be transparent with your tenants and I am more than positive there will not

be any discrepancies." Even though the utilities will remain on, the 13-year resident of the Woods at Oak Crossing has learned "to not have any expectations."

"It's sad but it's the reality now days," she said.

people of color. Data is not yet disaggregated by race, but it could be if the foundation gets enough responses.

Chatfield, who was hired in May, said one of his biggest responsibilities is getting into the community and building relationships with people of color. He said one of the barriers to getting enough people of color to participate is some don't feel like a true member of the community, so they "shy away" from taking a survey.

"I've been trying to lean in and make it very clear that, me in this role, I really need this information," Chatfield said. "I need to hear from the African American community and could be extended people of color at large."

Hendricks County is 9.5% Black or African American, according to estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau. In 2010, that number was 4.8%. The populations for Asian, American Indian and people who identify two or more races also

increased. The county's whole population has increased by about 20%, up to 174,788.

The plan is for the survey to close Sept. 16, but the deadline if there aren't enough responses by then.

arts or other programs. That would include two new schools at the former Broad Ripple and Thomas Carr Howe high schools.

- Grades at about three dozen schools would be reconfigured to offer preschool or kindergarten up to fifth grade.
- The district would build two new elementary schools and improve 14 facilities.
- Purdue Polytechnic North charter school would remain in the Broad Ripple High School building.
- The district would add one Montessori and two Center For Inquiry programs at current neighborhood schools.
- IPS would be divided into roughly four zones that reflect the district's diversity by race and income. Families could pick a school in their zone to at-

tend, and each zone would have similar offerings from grades K-5 and 6-8.

IPS estimates about 330 staff members would be impacted by the closures, mergers or grade reconfiguration, but Johnson doesn't expect layoffs.

"I believe that none of this is easy," Johnson said, "but it is what it takes to align resources and values."

The majority of changes would occur in the 2024-25 school year.

The district will host public meetings through October at schools for families to learn about how proposed changes could affect them.

pierced Dre's skull.

Dre survived the shooting, but he's paralyzed from the neck down.

This was February 2014. Gun violence has only grown as a public health concern since. While the rate of gun-related deaths, taking into account population growth, has not exceeded the historic highs set in the 1990s, the U.S. has seen more gunrelated deaths in the past two years than any year on record.

Gun violence incidents, which include nonfatal shootings, have spiked as well. And the trail of damage these shootings leave extends well beyond those who were struck by bullets. Studies show that even when someone survives a shooting, they and their families continue to struggle with financial, physical and mental health issues.

# We don't know much about survivors, but that's starting to change

For every person who dies from guns in the U.S., two to three people are injured, said criminologist Lauren Magee. But after shootings, the focus is usually on the number of deaths. Little is known about those who were shot and survived.

"Nonfatal shootings are the majority of gun violence that every city experiences," said Magee, an assistant professor at IUPUI, where she studies the policy and public health impact of gun violence.

Locally and nationally, there are no comprehensive records of basic information about the number of survivors and their health outcomes, Magee said, which hampers our understanding of the true toll of gun violence.

But more research on gun violence through a public health lens is emerging.

A recent study looked at the economic and health toll of nonfatal shootings on survivors and their family members covered by Medicare and private health insurance. Survivors saw higher medical costs, and both survivors and their family members were more likely to develop psychiatric disorders in the year following a shooting incident compared to people who were not affected by gun violence.

Ruby Mendenhall, a sociologist at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, has studied the impact of gun violence on Black women in Chicago's Englewood neighborhood, a predominantly Black community.

"Most of [the women] had headaches, stomach aches, backaches, hair falling out," Mendenhall said. "About 48% of the sample reported depressive symptoms and about 56% reported PTSD symptoms."

One woman who lost her son to gun violence said she couldn't taste food anymore.

"And she said that was something they used to do together — they would always cook and eat and that was their thing. And so after he passed, she just couldn't," Mendenhall said. "And she said that she actually started going to expensive restaurants to try to get food because she had to eat."

After her son was shot, Yates-Dycus began to have trouble sleeping. Her fight or flight reflexes kick in quickly, especially in large crowds or in places where she might feel confined.

"I've always had a little phobia of elevators; now it's to the 10th power," she said. "I'm always looking — where's the way out? What if a stray bullet comes?"

# Young kids have it even harder — and many don't get the help they need

The mental health toll of gun violence is greatest on siblings and young children. Research shows sometimes they have more serious mental health issues than the survivors.

Dre's younger brother was only 10

when Dre was shot at his friend's birthday party. Suddenly, he was helping change diapers for his teenage brother.

"That's a big deal," their mother, Yates-Dycus, said. "There were times where he was the only one in the house. So we had to do it. He would have to help me change him, bathe him, feed him, clean him, roll him over so we could adjust to the side that he slept on."

It's been eight years since the shooting, and Yates-Dycus said Dre's brother still struggles with anxiety and major depression disorder. He's seeing a mental health professional. But many survivors and family members do not get the mental health care they need.

One study in Indianapolis finds that even when survivors and their family members were interacting with the health care system in other settings for care related to their gun injuries, they were still not plugged into muchneeded mental health services.

"So there are opportunities throughout the clinical system, such as the emergency room or primary care doctors, perhaps on discharge from the hospital," said Magee of IUPUI, who authored the study.

Efforts to plug gaps, she said, could include making sure people touched by gun violence are screened for conditions like post-traumatic stress disorder and anxiety and referred to treatment when needed.

## Gun violence also has an economic toll

Gun violence costs the U.S. more than half a trillion dollars every year, according to a report by the nonprofit Everytown for Gun Safety. That includes medical costs, police and criminal justice costs, and costs to employers and workers.

After Dre was shot, Yates-Dycus said he needed multiple surgeries and

specialized care costing hundreds of thousands of dollars. Insurance covered most of the costs, but the family was still left with a hefty amount to pay.

Yates-Dycus had to go back to work, and also needed to send Dre to a special rehab facility. But there were no such facilities in Indiana that would take a child as young as 13. The closest was a facility in Carbondale, Illinois — 280 miles away.

"That's when I lost my job," she said, "because he kept getting sick while he's there. And so I would have to go and do extensive hospital stays. The longest was a three-week stay."

# Turning a tragic incident into community support

As gun violence gets worse, there's an urgent need for more resources to support survivors and their family members.


Yates-Dycus started a nonprofit organization called Purpose 4 My Pain. She holds events and support groups — which she calls "grief sessions" — with other Black women who have had family members killed or injured by gun violence in Indianapolis.

At a recent grief session on Zoom, nine women gathered and talked about their struggles with insomnia, anxiety, depression and high blood pressure. One mother said she felt like her stomach was ripped open. Another one talked about pain in her shoulders and her neck.

"The effect that has on your mind, body and soul — it's really hard to put into words," Yates-Dycus said.

## Local organizations join lawsuit against EPA for failing to regulate some coal ash landfills

A civil rights organization in Indiana and a local environmental organization are joining a federal lawsuit against the Environmental Protection Agency and its administrator for failing to regulate coal ash landfills that are causing concern for cancers and pollutants in low-income communities and communities of color.

The Hoosier Environmental Council and LaPorte County branch of the Indiana NAACP joined four other organizations in the lawsuit filed Aug.

The lawsuit claims an exemption in a 2015 EPA ruling allowed some inactive coal ash landfills to "escape critical safeguards, including monitoring, inspection, closure, cleanup, and reporting requirements.

A spokesperson for the EPA said it does not comment on pending litiga-

Coal ash, which produces the majority of industrial waste in the U.S., is the material left after burning coal that contains dangerous chemicals such as mercury, lithium and arsenic, according to Indra Frank, director of Environmental Health and Water Policy at the HEC. The chemicals are known to be carcinogenic and can

through wind, coarse ash that forms at the bottom of the coal furnace because it is too large to be carried into the smokestack, and a coarse, hard,

ash in landfills, ponds or reuse it in

cement or covering material for walls and ceilings in homes and businesses.

The 2015 ruling addresses the risk of coal ash disposal, including the risk of groundwater contamination and blowing of contaminants into the air as dust, but it created a loophole for early closures that exempt inactive landfills that ceased operations prior to October 2015. Inactive landfills are absolved from critical closing procedures such as groundwater monitoring and using caps and liners to prevent groundwater contamination. All of the landfills in Indiana without a liner have groundwater contamination, Frank said.

There are 21 inactive landfills in Indiana — half of which are in Petersburg, two on either side of the Indiana Dunes National Park and several others in southern Indiana.

In 2016, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit closed the loophole for coal ash ponds and ordered that they comply with closing procedures, but did not address coal ash landfills, said Mychal Ozaeta, senior associate attorney for Earthjustice, a group representing the two organizations in the lawsuit. The lawsuit aims to bring the same closing procedures to landfills.

The ruling subjected a local power generating station to comply with closing standards when it stopped burning coal in 2016. The Harding Street Generating Station had eight ash ponds before it closed, half of which are exempt from closing procedures. The Indiana Department of Management hasn't made a decision on the closure plan, said Tim Maloney, senior policy director at the landfills is producing the highest-risk outcome to the environment and the community, he said.

"Coal ash has toxic contaminants, yet our regulations are weaker than household trash," Maloney said.

The EPA is required to review the exceptions for coal ash landfills every three years, according to the lawsuit. That review is more than four years overdue as of the date of the filing, the lawsuit alleges

"It's almost like they're left there, no one's taking a look, no one's keeping an eye," Ozaeta said. "And I think the real issue, too, is historically a lot of coal-fired power plants are in predominantly low-income communities

There is enough coal ash in the inactive landfills around the United States to fill train cars that wrap around the Earth twice, according to Earthjustice.

Frank said revising the 2015 ruling could make the inactive landfills follow regulations and disposal stan-

We would be doing a much better job of protecting our water resources," Frank said. "And maybe that could stop some of the groundwater contamination that we're seeing now."

# Come together. Right now.

Blacks and whites who eke out a living on the lower end of the socioeconomic scale have always had much in common. Existing on society's margins should provoke among them a recognition and embrace of their shared interests. Tragically, those interests are too often overpowered by the racial strife

that has plagued this nation since ... before it became

The mind labors mightily in even attempting to calculate the magnitude of the lost scientific, cultural, economic and other opportunities that racism has cost America. The foregone compounded interest of equality could have easily lifted millions of Americans — of all races — out of poverty. Alas, history is not written in invisible ink (despite the wishes of some). We must wrestle with reality as it exists rather than fantasize about how we wish it were.

Still, it is important to know that, for the briefest of moments, Blacks and whites united to fight for their shared economic benefit against the ruling class that exercised socioeconomic power over them. Historians point to Bacon's Rebellion (1676-1677) as the catalyst that spooked Virginia's elites into devising a

scheme that would cement what we now call "whiteness" as the overarching criterion for social, economic and political mobility in the colonies. As a result, "race" became a thing, and the subordination of Black people would become a permanent feature of American life. (I should note that the ugly side of Bacon's Rebellion is that poor Blacks and whites were united against Native Americans.)

The Virginia Slave Codes of 1705, which were a direct response to the rebellion, spawned a host of similar laws that ultimately led us to where we are today. Indeed, I often think about how our history shapes and misshapes, informs and misinforms our contemporary state of affairs, especially regarding race and class in America. Specific recent examples include the water crises in Flint, Michigan, and Jackson, Mississippi. These very avoidable tragedies are due to decades of economic neglect and environmental racism that is endemic to America's predominantly Black cities.

Of course, environmental disasters that are brought on both due to the destruction of our climate and the decaying of our infrastructure are not limited to the Black sections of Anytown, USA. Inequality in the upkeep of public infrastructure, combined with environmental racism, will increasingly affect white communities — including affluent ones.

Indeed, such has already come to pass. Consider,

for example, the devastating flooding that continues to plague eastern Kentucky. (The state's death toll is 40 as of this writing.) As Martin Luther King Jr. presciently wrote: "We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly affects all indirectly." That network is barely holding up and that garment is tattered and torn.

None of the ties that might bind us — religion, class, national identity, even selfish interest — have been sufficient to overcome the seeds of racial division that were sown at our inception. Today, those seeds have grown into a dense forest of animosity and domestic terrorism that genuinely post an existential threat to our nation.

When our descendants look back at this time, they will know that we had more than ample opportunity to stem the tide of racial and other forms of bigotry, we had the means to halt (and hopefully reverse) the devastating effects of climate change, and that we had a roadmap to spread economic prosperity and universal health care to all our people. The only question is whether we have the will to make it so.

# Water crisis in Jackson reflects vicious neglect

(TriceEdneyWire. com) — In sweltering heat, 150,000 residents of Jackson, Mississippi, the state's capital and its largest city, now have no running water, after suffering under a "boil only'

order for weeks. The last catastrophe came after extreme rainfall in Jackson swelled the Pearl River and swamped the city's outmoded water treatment

This was a disaster waiting to happen. Why wasn't the system rebuilt years ago? In deep red Mississippi, every statewide elected official is a conservative Republican, and while Jackson is the state capital, it is also a poor, majority-Black city that Republican office holders find easy to short-change. Republican state lawmakers blocked the city's efforts to raise money for its infrastructure with a sales tax hike, while passing tax cuts — skewed to the wealthy — at the state level.

A Republican-controlled state legislative committee blocked a 2021 bill that would have allowed issuance of a bond to help pay for infrastructure improvements. The Republican governor, Tate Reeves, instead called for the city to do

a better job collecting water bill pay-

In the emergency, Mississippi will get immediate help from the federal government. And the state will get significant funding from the recently passed Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act signed into law by President Joe Biden that allocates about \$429 million to fund water system improvements in the entire state of Mississippi.

Yet every Republican member of the Mississippi delegation to Congress, except one, voted against that infrastructure bill. And of course, Republicans have for years scorned even the existence of global warming, while opposing any efforts to strengthen our roads, bridges and water systems to prepare for it.

Mississippi is not alone. The American Society of Civil Engineers gives America's storm water protections the grade of D on its infrastructure report card. Think about that.

In Arkansas, floods in 2021 wiped out bridges and roads, took out power lines, and buried homes and cities in mud and debris. Again, the federal government stepped in to help fund needed repairs. Arkansas now is slated to receive \$96 million for 19 flood control projects across the state from the infrastructure bill. Again, every single

Republican in the state's congressional delegation voted against the money for flood control.

In Kentucky, fierce floods — caused again by unprecedented rains that result from catastrophic climate change — took the lives of 37 people (and counting) and devastated entire communities. Much of southeast Kentucky remains under "boil water" orders because of overwhelmed water systems.

Senate Minority Leader Mitch Mc-Connell (R-Ky) admits that the \$1.2 trillion infrastructure bill is a "godsend" for his state. For that, he was bashed by Donald Trump, who criticized him and other Republicans who voted for the bill as voting "for Democrat longevity." For Trump and the vast majority of Republicans in the House and Senate, partisanship trumps even utterly necessary investment in the basics of any advanced country — clean water, strong bridges and roads, storm protections, broadband and more. And partisanship enlisted every Republican senator to filibuster against Biden's Inflation Reduction Act, which was focused on investments to address climate change as well as measures to reduce the cost of prescription drugs.

The reality is that we've been shortchanging investment in our basic infrastructure for years. And now aging, decrepit and outmoded systems face the new challenge posed by extreme weather resulting from climate change. Continued inaction and neglect will cost much more — in lives lost, property destroyed, hopes lost.

The water crisis in Jackson, Mississippi, like that in Flint, Michigan, reflects the vicious neglect that predominantly Black and poor communities suffer at the hands of callous politicians and their race bait politics. The suffering of largely white poor and working people in Kentucky and in Arkansas reflects the folly of antigovernment and partisan sentiment so extreme that it impedes even the most basic investments in our country.

Now, of course, the politicians in Mississippi and Arkansas and Kentucky who railed against the infrastructure bill will scurry to be at the front of the line to take credit for the ribbon-cutting events when repairs and renovations are begun.

But, as Nina Simone once sang, 'everybody knows about Mississippi [expletive deleted]." This country needs a major drive to modernize its infrastructure to secure it against the intensifying storms, floods, droughts and winds that are already hitting us. To do that, we need leaders who will lead, or get out of the way.

# **Accountability:** An insurrectionist removed from office

Judge Francis Mathew upheld a little-known provision of the U.S. Constitution and removed a public official for participating in the Jan. 6, 2021, insurrection. I hope other judges have the courage to follow his

The principle that no person is above the law that powerful people have to obey the laws like everyone else — is essential to a democratic society. If this principle is not enforced, corrupt leaders will undermine the rule of law and democracy itself.

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Judge Mathew ruled that a county commissioner who participated in the attack on the U.S. Capitol can no longer hold public office. The ruling was based on a section of the 14th Amendment to the Constitution, which was passed after the Civil War. It forbids anyone from holding public office if they had taken an oath to support the Constitution of the United States and then "engaged in insurrection or rebellion" against the country.

The judge found that Otero County Commissioner Couy Griffin helped lead the mob that used violence to try to prevent Congress from affirming Joe Biden's win in the presidential election. Griffin later bragged about his role and suggested that there might be another insurrection coming.

Judge Mathew's ruling is a milestone in the effort to hold public officials accountable for trying to overturn the 2020 presidential election. It should provide a road map — and some moral courage — to other judges considering legal efforts to hold state legislators and others accountable for trying to undermine democracy.

Another important effort to hold powerful people accountable for the insurrection is being conducted by the House Select Committee that is investigating the insurrection and the schemes that led up to it.

The committee's public hearings this summer gave the American people a powerful dose of truth-telling about the lies and deceptions of President Trump, members of his legal team and his political allies. The committee's investigation is continuing, and we can look forward to more public hearings this fall.

Members and staff of the committee have spent countless hours digging through emails and other public records and interviewing former Trump administration officials and lawyers, members of Congress and far-right activists who promoted Trump's lies about election fraud. They are still at it. Among

the people they hope to interview this fall are former Vice President Mike Pence, former House Speaker Newt Gingrich and far-right activist Ginni Thomas, wife of Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas.

Truth is a first step toward accountability. But it cannot be the only step.

The committee's efforts to get a full picture of the illegal scheming to overturn the election is essential. So is punishing wrongdoers and preventing future attempts to subvert our elections.

There are plenty of wrongdoers who need to be held accountable, punished and prevented from using powerful government positions to undermine democracy and the rule of law. And that includes former President Trump, whose lies about a "stolen" election fueled the insurrectionists' anger.

In our system of government, there are many people with roles to play in defending our democracy. Congress can use its oversight power to reveal the corruption within the White House. The Justice Department can prosecute criminals like those who attacked the Capitol Police — and those who broke other laws as they tried desperately to keep the defeated Trump in power. Judges can hold public officials accountable for violating the Constitution.

And we the voters can defend democracy by electing local, state and national officials who are committed to the democratic process — and rejecting those who seek power for the purpose of interfering with our elections and our ability to hold powerful people accountable.

## As hot days increase, so does concern for the future of agriculture

Despite the scorched watermelons, greens and heatstressed permission trees, Alex Sage looks upon the Heritage Community Garden with a

Sage said the community garden in Martindale-Brightwood has struggled with the record-setting number of extreme heat days and many of the crops in the garden have died because of it.

"I was afraid we were going to lose everything," Sage said. "So there was like a week of just panic."

Despite petty thefts and scorched vegetables, Sage tends with joy to the garden as a volunteer in between work schedules and his personal life, doing whatever he can to save the community garden from the heat.

Shade cloths and heat regulating plants have helped, he said, but his okra still isn't as tall as it should be, and his amaranth is still leaning.

Sean Mobley, senior policy associate for climate and clean energy at The Nature Conservancy, said we will see more extreme heat if we don't work to eliminate our carbon footprint, but there are steps to take to mitigate the impacts on agriculture. NASA has established as fact that the Earth is warming at rapid temperatures due to human activities, and global temperatures have roughly a 50/50 chance of raising the Earth's temperature more than 1.5 degrees Celsius, an iconic threshold for the international climate change treaty.

"I think that with extreme heat on the rise with what we're seeing this summer, it's not just going to be lawns dying and needing to put those water bags around trees," Mobley said. "But its impacts to people from heatstroke and things like that, which tend to affect the very young and the very old, a little bit more."

Indiana's forestry and ecosystems aren't meant to withstand such extreme temperature and droughts, Mobley said, and Indiana's colder seasons tend to kill off the insects such as mosquitos that carry diseases. Mobley fears we could see more diseases transmitted from animals to humans - also known as zoonotic diseases — if the ecosystem and its natural cycle are disrupted due to heat.

Cover crops, crop rotation and reduced tillage or no tillage are three practices that scientists agree can help make agriculture more resilient to the changing climate. Cover crops can be used to break up soil and act as a sponge to hold water, which would require less irrigation, Mobley said. Cover crops also prevent sediment runoff into nearby rivers and streams.

A popular practice in Indiana that Hoosiers see, often

called crop rotation, helps manage erosion, increase nutrients and improve overall soil health. Many farmers rotate corn and soybean.

Reduced tillage or no tillage prevents carbon stored in the soil from being released, Mobley said.

"Those three practices in combination can make an agricultural operation much more resilient to those negative impacts of climate change," Mobley said.

# **Kids Benefit from More** Fruits and Veggies

Sending kids off to school with a lunch packed with nutritious foods helps them with growth, fitness and learning. Snacks featuring fruits and veggies is a great way to do this.

Whether fresh, frozen, canned or dried, fruits and veggies as part of a balanced snack boosts a child's fiber intake along with vitamins and minerals their growing bodies need. Nine out of 10 Americans do not eat enough fruits and vegetables every day. This is surprising as adding more fruits and vegetables to meals and snacks is simple and delicious.

The Dietary Guidelines for Americans recommend that children consume 1 to 2 cups of fruit and 1 to 3 cups of vegetables each day, depending on their age. Fruits and vegetables are packed with fiber, which helps them feel full longer. They are also filled with nutrients like vitamin A, vitamin C, folate and potassium.

Fresh, frozen and canned are all excellent ways to eat more fruits and vegetables. Picked at the peak of flavor, freshness, nutritional value and processed immediately, frozen and canned produce are just as nutritious as fresh. Plus, they are often less expensive, making them budget friendly.



# The Catholic Church is increasingly diverse—and so are its controversies

(THE CONVERSATION) There is a lot of talk about "synodality" in the Catholic Church these days. Synodality refers to a process in which bishops and priests consult with lay Catholics about issues in the church.

In 2021, Pope Francis called for the "Synod on Synodality," a worldwide discussion of issues that impact the church, which will culminate with a bishops' meeting in Rome. A final report is scheduled for October 2023.

The Catholic Church in Germany has also moved forward with a national "synodal path" to restore trust after its own sexual abuse scandal.

The German synodal path has been controversial. On Sept. 8, a minority of German bishops blocked a motion to redefine Catholic teaching on homosexuality, bisexuality, gender identity and masturbation. In response, some proponents of these liberalizations warned they would "take it to Rome."

Church leaders around the world and in the Vatican have closely watched the German meetings. There has been sharp debate over calls by German Catholics for priests to ordain women and bless same-sex unions. These proposals have been embraced by some German church bishops but criticized by the Vatican as well as by an international group of 74 bishops.

As a scholar of global Catholicism, I believe this controversy reflects much wider tensions within Catholicism. In 1910, two-thirds of the world's Catholics lived in Europe. Today, just one in four do. The church's numbers have grown most quickly in Africa and Asia. As more power shifts to the global south, the church sometimes struggles to chart a path forward for all regions, each of which has its own distinct perspectives.

The German meeting spotlights particularly difficult topics about sexuality and women's roles, where some Catholics in Europe, North America



and Australia clash with Catholics elsewhere.

#### Continental divides

The Catholic Church is often assumed to look and feel the same everywhere. But Catholicism is culturally quite diverse.

The most public disagreement involves African Catholics and those in the United States and Europe. For example, Ghanaian Catholic bishops have criticized advocates for LGBTQ rights for imposing "their so-called values and beliefs." Other African bishops have said they feel betrayed by liberal sentiments in European Catholicism, such as the push to allow Holy Com-

munion for divorced church members. Polygamy continues to be a pressing issue in some regions of Africa. While Catholic doctrine prohibits polygamy, polygamous unions are still common in many countries with significant Catholic communities.

A crucial question is how to welcome polygamous families into the church. Some African bishops have suggested that the church's most important rites, called sacraments, should be available for at least some polygamous Catholics.

Tribalism also remains a challenge. For example, a Nigerian priest published a social media video asserting the superiority of the Igbo tribe. In rejecting such attitudes, other African priests have emphasized that African Catholics should draw on the philosophy of "ubuntu" that affirms collective belonging to humanity.

## Looking East

Issues in Asia, home to 12% of Catholics, are diverse.

In Japan, for example, where Catholics make up less than 1% of the population, the main dilemma is how Catholics can maintain their community identity. In the Catholic-majority Philippines, recent meetings for the Synod on Synodality have focused on how poverty and corruption impact the Catholic community and the nation as

In India, where 20 million Catholics live, the Dalit Catholic community is especially important. Dalit means "oppressed" or "crushed" and refers to the marginalized groups once known as India's "untouchables." It was only recently that a Dalit, Anthony Poola of Hyderabad, was named a cardinal, even though Dalits have long made up a majority of India's Catholics. Caste discrimination in the church is a reality that Dalit Catholics have joined together to protest.

Meanwhile, the Catholic Church in East Timor, where Catholics are 95% of the population, has experienced its own divisive sex abuse crisis connected with a highly regarded American

Catholic churches in China face unresolved disputes over who has final say in the appointment of bishops — the Vatican, or the Chinese government. Also, there are continuing issues about the status of the underground Catholic churches, which worship outside the purview of the state-sanctioned Chinese Catholic Patriotic Association.

In parts of Oceania, climate change is an existential concern. The spread of HIV/AIDS in Papua New Guinea remains an important issue as well.

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

# NBA icon Isiah Thomas has quickly become an entrepreneurial legend

### Isiah Thomas played basketball with the tenacity not often seen in today's game.

Whenever a team outscored his Detroit Pistons, it only meant a negative mark in the loss column, but never total defeat for Thomas.

An NCAA champion at Indiana, and a two-time NBA champ with the Pistons, much like basketball, Thomas has followed up his on-court success with an almost peerless triumph in the business world.

He told the National Newspaper Publishers Association's live morning show, "Let It Be Known," that his accomplishments as an entrepreneur result from what he learned playing basketball.

Thomas said building with the right individuals, seeking sound advice and closely monitoring the success of others have made him a giant in several industries.

"The first [being a business owner] teaches you in terms of basketball is teamwork. You have to work together collectively to make something happen in terms of vision and goal," Thomas

"The goal of winning a championship — how to do it together. So, when you're managing people, it's about giving them a vision and a goal and ensuring that we have the right game plan to get there. Basketball gave me a lot of those \[ \tautools \]. Having perseverance, getting knocked down, failing and regrouping.

Thomas hasn't experienced getting knocked down in his business ventures, always displaying a deft touch and a championship pedigree in boardrooms.

The chair and CEO of ISIAH International LLC and Isiah Imports, Thomas has an extensive portfolio of invest-

His holdings include Isiah Real Estate, Cheurlin Champagnes, One World Products, GRE3N and RE3 Recycling,

Sweetgreen and Popcorn Indiana. "I started my firm in 1990 to uplift the second-generation behind me out of poverty," Thomas said.

"We always talk about generational



start and get involved in the business. I didn't know that I was an ESG company — environmentally and socially conscious when I started. I was always interested in investing in things that impacted the community, impacted the family and had a chance to make sure there was some legacy coming behind. My economics teacher told me to invest in things that I like. So, one of the first investments was popcorn because it was a staple in my home. After all, we didn't have a lot of food, so my mom would pop a lot of popcorn."

Thomas' Indiana Popcorn, which comes in red packaging, marked him as one of the first to put colors on popcorn bags.

His foray into the industrial hemp business also counted as significant and rare.

"When you talk about industrial hemp and carbon reduction — industrial hemp takes more carbon out of the air than any other plant on the Earth," Thomas said.

"What you see at Isiah and One World is how to replace plastics in automobiles. Looking at hemp and carbon reduction, it goes across every

It runs the gamut of its usage, and at One World, we have the largest supply of hemp on this side of the equator."

Thomas' Cheurlin Champagne is also one of the best. The bubbly is pressed from the first grapes. He's the most prominent African American owner and importer of first pressed grape champagne globally.

"Anytime you buy champagne, you should ask if it's from the first pressed. That's important," Thomas said.

He also noted how his champagne allowed him to remain in the agricultural space.

"I didn't realize I was entering the agricultural space when I entered champagne," Thomas said. "I learned that the soil, the sun and the farmers make the best grape."

For the legend, it all comes back to the family.

His late mother, Mary Thomas, remains an inspiration.

"We were poor, but my mother was always positive and always gave of herself," Thomas said.

"I remember walking in the snow with my mom, and I had holes in my shoes, and I put cardboard in them. I looked at her, and she had glad bags over her feet. We were on welfare, but she used the money not to pay rent or buy food but to ensure we got an education."


With his children and other family members having roles in Thomas' businesses, the legend said his mission for them remains simple.

"We put them through school. They got student loans using the 'Thomas Bank,' and we require them to come back, put in six months or a year, free labor. That's how they pay off their student loans," Thomas said.

After that, there are no strings attached, he said.

"If they decide they like what they are doing in one of the companies or entities that we have, then this is a place where they can make a living, get a paycheck, pay their rent and buy food," he said.

"If they want to stay, great. If not, they've gained the experience and knowledge to go elsewhere. But, when you talk about trying to uplift your family out of generational poverty, that's the vision of Isiah International. So the diversification of the spaces we're in is because we have family members and me who have specialties in those spaces."

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



# MLB adopts pitch clock, shift limits, bigger bases for 2023

NEW YORK (AP) — Major League Baseball is introducing some of its most radical rules next season, adopting a pitch clock and limiting defensive shifts after concluding modern analytics created a slower, less entertaining sport.

The decisions were made Sept. 9 by the sport's 11-man competition committee over the unanimous opposition of the panel's four players. Commissioner Rob Manfred pushed for the innovations along with a management team that included former Boston and Chicago Cubs executive Theo Epstein, now an MLB consultant.

"The influx of data in our industry," Epstein said, "have not improved the game from an aesthetic standpoint or from an entertainment standpoint. So in my role now, it's my responsibility to try to look at the big picture, think about what's great for fans."

Players supported the third major initiative: larger bases that are expected to lessen injuries and lead to more stolen bases because of a decreased distance of 4 1/2 inches.

Manfred called the rules an attempt to "bring back the best form of baseball."

"Number one, fans want games with better pace," he said during a news conference. "Two, fans want more action, more balls in play. And three, fans want to see more of the athleticism of our great players."

Union head Tony Clark was noticeably absent, as he was at the announcement of an agreement in March that ended a 99-day lockout.

"Players live the game — day in and day out. On-field rules and regulations impact their preparation, performance, and ultimately, the integrity of the game itself," the union said in a statement. "Major League Baseball was unwilling to meaningfully address the areas of concern that players raised."

The pitch clock will be set at 15 seconds with no runners on base and 20 seconds with runners — up from the 14/19 tested at Triple-A this season and 14/18 at lower minor league levels.

There will be a limit of two of what MLB calls disengagements — pickoff attempts or steps off the rubber — per plate appearance, and a balk would be called for a third or more unless there is an out. The disengagement limit, which some players predict will benefit baserunners, would be reset if a runner advances.

A catcher is required to be in the catcher's box with nine seconds left on the clock and a hitter in the batter's box and focused on the pitcher with eight seconds remaining. Penalties for violations will be a ball called against a pitcher and a strike called against a batter.

A batter can ask an umpire for time once per plate appearance, and after that it would be granted only at the umpire's discretion if the request is made while in the batter's box.

The clock, which some players suggested be altered for late and close situations, has helped reduce the average time of a nine-inning game in the minor leagues from 3 hours, 4 minutes in 2021 to 2:38 this season. The average time of a nine-inning game in the major leagues this year is 3:07, up from 2:46 in 1989 and 2:30 in the mid-1950s.

"It reminded me of the game that I grew up watching in the '70s and '80," said former outfielder Raúl Ibañez, now an MLB senior vice president.

Two infielders will be required to be on either side of second and all infielders to be within the outer boundary of the infield when the pitcher is on the rubber. Infielders may not switch sides unless there is a substitution, but fiveman infields will still be allowed, MLB executive vice president Morgan Sword said.

Shifts have soared from 2,357 times on balls hit in play in 2011 to 28,130 in 2016 and 59,063 last year, according to Sports Info Solutions. Shifts are on pace for 68,000 this season.

"I think fans will cherish the moments absent the extreme defensive shifts when games are decided not by whether their team's infield is positioned by the perfect algorithm, but by whether their team's second baseman can range to make an athletic dive playing with everything on the line," Epstein said.

MLB's season batting average has dropped from .267 in 1997 to .243 this year, with a team's average runs declining from 4.77 to 4.33.

"The game has evolved in a way that nobody would have chosen if we were sitting down 25 years ago to chart a path towards the best version of baseball," Epstein said. "Nobody would have asked for fans to have to wait more than four minutes for balls to be put into play. Nobody would have asked for generational lows and stolen bases, triples and doubles."

Base size will increase to 18-inch squares from 15 — first basemen are less likely to get stepped on.

In addition, each team will be allowed a sixth mound visit in the ninth inning next year, if it has used five during the first eight innings. Until last winter, MLB needed one year advance notice to amend on-field rules without union approval but the March lockout settlement established the committee. Cardinals pitcher Jack Flaherty, Rays pitcher Tyler Glasnow, Blue Jays infielder/outfielder Whit Merrifield and Giants outfielder Austin Slater represented players, a group that included Cubs infielder Ian Happ as an alternate.

"It's going to be hard on guys. ... It's a shame that that we weren't taken more seriously," Merrifield said. "It's an overcorrect and they're going to have to tweak it. And that's just what we were trying to avoid."

Seattle chairman John Stanton headed the committee, which included St. Louis CEO Bill DeWitt Jr., San Francisco chairman Greg Johnson, Colorado CEO Dick Monfort, Toronto CEO Mark Shapiro and Boston chairman Tom Werner, along with umpire Bill Miller.

"It's hard to get consensus among the group of players on changing the game," Manfred said. "I think at the end of the day what we did here was about giving fans the kind of game they want to see."

# The Tiafoe Effect: US tennis star-has big impact in Africa

FREETOWN, Sierra Leone (AP) — Last year, Sam Jalloh zig-zagged across West Africa coaching tennis to kids, taking with him rackets, balls and a cellphone loaded with photos and videos of a pro player in action to inspire the youngsters.

The player? Frances Tiafoe.

That move to encourage young Africans by showing them images of Tiafoe, an American with Sierra Leone roots, has paid off. Jalloh's phone has pinged and pinged text messages from many of the kids, delighted by the 24-year-old Tiafoe's incredible run to the semifinals at the U.S. Open, where he beat Rafael Nadal along the way.

"They're saying, 'coach, have you seen Frances? This is really good.' When these things happen ... you can see that it motivates children," Jalloh said. "They are very, very excited and it's not just kids from Sierra Leone. I've got kids from Gambia, kids from Ghana, kids from Nigeria. This will bring a lot more inspiration for them."

Tiafoe was born in the United States to parents who emigrated from Sierra Leone — also Jalloh's home country — and while Tiafoe offers new hope for the future of American tennis, the African link made him an ideal role model for Jalloh to use, even before this breakthrough U.S. Open where he advanced to the semifinals before losing in five sets to Carlos Alcaraz.

Tiafoe's parents, Frances Sr. and Alphina, struggled when they first arrived in the U.S. Frances Sr. worked as a laborer and then janitor at the Junior Tennis Champions Center in Maryland. Alphina put in long night shifts as a nurse. Frances Jr. and his twin brother, Franklin, were born in Maryland and lived for much of the first 10 years of their lives in a converted office at the tennis center.

With that backstory, Jalloh could see kids in West

Africa make "a connection" to Tiafoe even though he also showed them clips of 22-time Grand Slam singles champion Nadal and other top players.

"It inspires them to go on and be great in tennis or whatever they aspire to be."

whatever they aspire to be," Jalloh said. He feels the Tiafoe effect in Africa will "go on for a long time."

Jalloh insists tennis is more popular than many think in West Africa. He's seen enough courts in enough towns and cities and enough young hopefuls to make that claim.

Some of the courts he's coached on are neatly marked out and surrounded by fences. Many aren't. Jalloh has made use of whatever he's found. Some are little more than cracked strips of concrete in between houses in poor, inner-city neighborhoods. Others are stretches of flat earth carved out of the wilderness outside town.

It's here that Jalloh hopes Tiafoe's stirring performance at Flushing Meadows sparks something in tennis authorities in West Africa like it has in his young players.

"Once we have the organization and the people with the passion, then you'll see a lot of talent come from Africa," Jalloh said.

There have been positive signs in Sierra Leone in the past week. The national media, normally with eyes only for soccer, has taken notice of tennis and Tiafoe has received much praise.

Fatima Bio, wife of Sierra Leone President Julius Bio, posted on her Facebook page about Tiafoe: "You are such an amazing guy and I want you to know we are celebrating you at home." Former Sierra Leone soccer captain Kai Kamara called Tiafoe "one of us" and said the country was behind him.

Jalloh became aware of Tiafoe when he won the prestigious Orange Bowl junior tournament in Miami at the age of 15. Jalloh wanted to know more about the young talent with Sierra Leonean heritage and eventually became good friends with Tiafoe's dad. They speak often on the phone, Jalloh said, and were in contact this week as Frances Jr. blazed his trail at the U.S. Open.

It has also reinvigorated Jalloh, whose own life story is quite extraordinary.

Jalloh was born in the Sierra Leone capital, Freetown, one of 11 children and his parents gave him up for adoption at the age of 6 because they couldn't afford to keep him. He ran away from his adopted family and lived on the streets of Freetown before reuniting with his mother.

He then found tennis and went from playing on the streets with his hand, and later homemade wooden bats, to a Sierra Leone national tennis player, which earned him \$250 and a team tracksuit, his "greatest dream," he said.

He now coaches players on the pro tour from his home in England and is already planning his next coaching trip to Africa. He's aiming to go to Kenya, Zimbabwe and South Africa at the end of the year and back to West Africa in early 2023, he said, with his tennis equipment and plenty of new video clips of Tiafoe.

"Oh yes, I've got so much now. I will have a lot to show to the kids," Jalloh said.

# Suns owner Sarver suspended 1 year, fined \$10M after probe

NEW YORK (AP) — The NBA has suspended Phoenix Suns and Phoenix Mercury owner Robert Sarver for one year, plus fined him \$10 million, after an investigation found that he had engaged in what the league called "workplace misconduct and organizational deficiencies."

The findings of the league's report, published Sept. 13, came nearly a year after the NBA asked a law firm to investigate allegations that Sarver had a history of racist, misogynistic and hostile incidents over his nearly two-decade tenure overseeing the franchise

decade tenure overseeing the franchise. Sarver said he will "accept the consequences of the league's decision" and apologized for "words and actions that offended our employees," though noted he disagreed with some of the report's findings.

The report said Sarver "repeated or purported to repeat the N-word on at least five occasions spanning his tenure with the Suns," though added that the investigation "makes no finding that Sarver used this racially insensitive language with the intent to demean or denigrate."

The study also concluded that Sarver used demeaning language toward female employees, including telling a

pregnant employee that she would not be able to do her job after becoming a mother; made off-color comments and jokes about sex and anatomy; and yelled and cursed at employees in ways that would be considered bullying "under workplace standards."

The \$10 million fine is the maximum allowed by NBA rule.

"I take full responsibility for what I have done," Sarver said. "I am sorry for causing this pain, and these errors in judgment are not consistent with my

personal philosophy or my values. ... This moment is an opportunity for me to demonstrate a

capacity to

learn and grow as we continue to build a working culture where every employee feels comfortable and valued."

Sarver, the league said, cannot be present at any NBA or WNBA team facility, including any office, arena or practice facility; attend or participate in any NBA or WNBA event or activity, including games, practices or business partner activity; represent the Suns or Mercury in any public or private capacity; or have any involvement with the business or basketball operations of the Suns or Mercury.

The league said it would donate the \$10 million "to organizations that are committed to addressing race and gender-based issues in and outside the workplace."
