Get answers to your big questions about the proposed IPS overhaul

The state's largest school district is on the brink of major overhaul under the Rebuilding Stronger plan proposed by Indianapolis Public Schools.

The plan, which awaits school board approval in November, calls for closing seven schools and configuring grades at 39 others in an attempt to cut costs

Mayor Hogsett signs property tax relief proposal, relief coming to 90% of single-family households

Indianapolis residents can expect a little relief on their property tax bill next spring.

Mayor Joe Hogsett, City-County Council President Vop Osili and Riverside neighborhood residents came together Sept. 14 to celebrate the signing and passage of Proposal 310. The proposal, which is set to allocate funding to property tax relief for Marion County homeowners, was approved unanimously by the City-County Council on Sept. 12.

"All levels of government need to help residents recover from the economic impact of the past two and a half years," Hogsett said in a statement. "Today, the City of Indianapolis provides a measure of relief targeted primarily at the homeowners facing challenges around taxes associated with a sudden leap in property value."

Hogsett said the prices of consumer and home goods are experiencing dramatic inflations, and while the city

cannot control those prices, he said it is able to provide a little bit of relief to residents during a time when they are hurting.

Hogsett extended his thanks to Osili, councilor Ali Brown and the rest of the City-County Council for their unanimous passage of his relief proposal — which he said will benefit homeowners across Indianapolis.

Although owner-occupied single-

family households are the only ones eligible to receive the funding, Hogsett said the credit will automatically appear on the spring 2023 property tax bill.

"This year, when homeowners get their spring property tax bill, a part of that bill will already be paid," he said at the signing.

Homes with an assessed value of \$250,000 or less would receive a \$150

Environmental organizations warn 2M tons of coal ash could spill into Lake Michigan

Residents and civil rights organizations in Michigan City are concerned they will face a water crisis if something isn't done about a power generating station's leftover coal ash.

The Michigan City Power Generating Station stores coal ash in ponds and uses it as fill. Coal ash, which produces the majority of

industrial waste in the U.S., is the material left after burning coal that contains carcinogenic chemicals such as mercury, lithium and arsenic, according to Indra Frank, director of Environmental Health and Water Policy at the Hoosier Environmental Council.

The Northern Indiana Public Service Company (NIPSCO) has already excavated most of the coal ash ponds and plans to fill the 10-foot cuts of dirt that were removed with noncontaminated soil — but Earthjustice, which is suing the EPA for allegedly failing to regulate coal ash landfills, estimates 2 million tons of coal ash fill will be left behind with NIPSCO having no plans to dispose of it and no federal regulations to require them to do so, said Mychal Ozaeta, senior associate attorney for Earthjustice.

Indianapolis police officers file lawsuit alleging they were retaliated against after reporting sergeant

Indiana high schoolers in foster care can sign up for more college, career support

A new statewide program aims to help hundreds of students in foster care determine how to achieve their post-high school goals.

Foster Success is a statewide nonprofit that supports 14- to 26-year-old Hoosiers as they transition out of foster care and into their next steps after high school. The nonprofit has focused on supporting college students through workforce readiness, physical and emotional well-being and financial empowerment programs. Now they're trying to connect with youth even earlier.

"There's a lot of things to sort out when you're in high school about what you're going to do afterwards," said Maggie Stevens, president of Foster Success. "And for our students who are in foster care, the layers of things to sort out are even deeper."

The new Pathways program will expose students to different opportunities so they have a better understanding of what they want to do next — trade or vocational school, college, military, joining the workforce or other options. Enrollees will participate in monthly one-on-one check-ins with staff members who are experienced in helping students in the foster care system.

The Pathways program will host group activities and college visits, which will begin later this fall, and build a peer network for students who are exploring different post-secondary options. The program will also provide participants with \$25 each time they engage in the program — whether it's a check-in or a college visit — to make sure students are compensated if they have to miss work in order to participate.

The new program is being funded through grants and donations, an organization spokesperson said.

In 2020, there were nearly 27,000 children in foster care in Indiana, the Indiana Youth Institute reported this year. About 18% of them are high school age. Stevens said many young people in foster care attend multiple high schools, which could lead to an inconsistent educational experience.

"Many times as they are just trying to acclimate to a new school, understand the systems there, the planning process for life after high school becomes secondary," Stevens said. "So a lot of our young people Pathways program will add another layer of support that we work with have not had the support in high school to help them explore the different options that

'LET THE WORLD SEE':

Emmett Till and Mamie Till-Mobley exhibit opens at the children's museum

The Children's Museum of Indianapolis opened the "Emmett Till & Mamie Till-Mobley: Let the World See" exhibit to bring more awareness to those who don't know the full or true story of 14-year-old Emmett Till, a victim of racial violence in 1955 in the Jim Crow South.

The exhibit opened to the public Sept. 17, following a heartfelt opening program and exhibit preview Sept. 16.

"The people, especially the children, who see this exhibit will have their hearts and minds opened," Patrick Weems, the executive director of the Emmett Till Interpretive Center, said at the exhibit's opening program. "The children are our hope for the future, and this exhibit will inspire them to lead the change to make our world a better place."

"Emmett Till & Mamie Till-Mobley: Let the World See," which is a few years in the making, is a partnership between the Emmett Till and Mamie Till-Mobley Institute, the Emmett Till Interpretive Center and the Children's Museum of Indianapolis.

Till's story is one many have heard before: Originally from Chicago, the Black teenager had been visiting family in Money, Mississippi, when he was kidnapped from his great-uncle's home, tortured and brutally murdered by Roy Bryant and J.W. Milam for whistling at a white woman in a grocery store. Both men were arrested for Till's murder but later acquitted by an all-white, all-male jury in 67 minutes.

The reason this exhibit exists today, as well as the reason Till's story continues to spark public outcry, is due to the decision Till's grieving mother, Mamie Till-Mobley, made to have an open casket funeral. She wanted the world to see what had been done to her child, and nearly 100,000 people witnessed Till's body at the A.A. Rayner Funeral Home and the Roberts Temple Church of God in Christ on Chicago's South Side, according to the exhibit.



"When Mamie Till-Mobley first took a stand in 1955, she must have been so alone," author and journalist A'Lelia Bundles said during the opening program. "But her bravery empowered others and sparked a movement."

Rev. Wheeler Parker Jr., Till's cousin who had traveled from Chicago with him, was 14 years old at the time of Till's kidnapping and murder. During his keynote speech at the program, Parker said he was "the scaredest I'd ever been" the night Till was taken, and hadn't done anything heroic, just lived to tell the story.

"He still speaks from the grave," Parker said. "Emmett's still speaking from the grave, that's why you're here, that's why the Children's Museum is doing what they're doing, and we appreciate

The exhibit tells the true story of Emmett Till, a 14-year-old Black boy who was visiting family in Money, Mississippi, in 1955, when he was kidnapped, tortured and murdered by two white men for whistling at a white woman.

and children 10 years and older. Family guides are available at the entrance of the exhibit that include information regarding things they will see and learn about inside as well as the emotions they may experience.


Content in the exhibit, such as photos of Till's body published in Jet Magazine in 1955, have sensitive content warnings on them.

Is the exhibit handson?

The exhibit features many points where guests are encouraged to interact with different parts of Till's story, whether it be with photos, short video clips, an audio clip of Rev. Parker's firsthand account and court room sketches from the trial. The museum encourages guests to remain respectful of these artifacts and the serious nature


How long is the exhibit?

In total, the exhibit takes approximately 20-30 minutes to go through. Each part of the exhibit features a descriptive account of Till's story in chronological order with photos, audio and videos. The exhibit also includes a small

viewing theater that plays a 10-minute video telling Till's full story on a loop.

Consider the sign

In the viewing theater, guests will find one of the four vandalized signs marking the site where Till's body was removed from the Tallahatchie River. The sign, which is on loan from the Emmett Till Interpretive Center, is one of many that have been placed as a historical marker at the river.

The original sign was placed in 2008 but was replaced in 2009 after being stolen and thrown in the river. The sign has been replaced four times, the last of which lasted 35 days before being shot again, Weems said at the opening.

Ripple of Justice


Toward the end of the exhibit is an area for the Mamie Till-Mobley Ripple of Justice. Guests are encouraged take a stand against racial injustice by having conversations, getting involved with local initiatives and contacting city officials by making a plan on interactive screens.

The exhibit also features an area. dedicated to Indiana's Connection and the state's history of racial violence in addition to its push for progress, including the drive for the 1931 Indiana Anti-Lynching law, National Black Caucus Conventions and Black Lives Matter protests.

Following its run at the museum, the exhibit will tour to the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute and five other national museums before becoming a permanent installation at the Emmett Till Interpretive Center in Sumner, Mississippi.

"Emmett Till & Mamie Till-Mobley: Let the World See" is open to the public Tuesday through Sunday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. through Oct. 30. Tickets for the exhibit are \$21 for adults and \$17 for youth and can be reserved at childrensmuseum.org.

and expand specialized academic programs to more students of color.

The proposal includes changes to nearly every IPS school. Here are answers to some of your big questions about it:

How many students will need to switch schools under this plan?

The district estimates that 5,454 students will move buildings when the changes take effect in 2024-25. These students will be moving due to grade reconfiguration, closures, or mergers.

My school is closing. What happens next?

If your school is one of the seven listed to close at the end of 2022-23, you will get priority in the Enroll Indy lottery system for the school of your choice in the 2023-24 school year.

If your closing school is merging with another school, you will have a guaranteed seat at the newly merged school.

I have opinions about the plan. How do I share them?

IPS will be holding 12 in-person and virtual meetings for the public to discuss the draft plan. The meetings will feature the IPS school board and district leaders and will each last 90 minutes. RSVPs are not required to attend. Here is information about the meetings:

How do enrollment zones work?

The district will still utilize the Enroll Indy lottery system, which runs its lottery twice a year and offers a summer enrollment period as well.

The four new enrollment zones essentially get rid of the overlapping zones the district currently has for its specialized Center for Inquiry, Montessori, Butler Lab and other choice schools. Previously, students who lived within designated zones these schools received priority and transportation.

Now, students will be able to apply for any school within their entire zone; each zone consists of 12 to 15 schools. They will receive transportation for any school within their zone.

Families will fill out their preferred schools in the Enroll Indy process.

Students can apply to schools outside of their enrollment zones, but those who have a sibling at a school and who already live in the school's zone will get priority in the lottery.

What happens if I don't get the school I want within my zone?

Students may still get matched at one of the other schools you listed in your Enroll Indy application.

Families could still try your luck in the next lottery or participate in the late enrollment process in the summer.

Students can also try to enroll in another school in a different zone, but remember students within the enrollment zone get priority for those schools.

What if students' new zones do not encompass the school they currently attend?

The district says it will provide all families with transportation for one year if the school they currently attend is not within the boundaries of their new zone.

This will give time for families to ar-

range for transportation or find a new school.

What happens if my child attends a specialized choice school that is losing its middle grades?

District officials say students who are already in an elementary school with a specialized program will get priority into the corresponding middle school with the same program.

How will teachers get assigned to new standalone middle schools?

The district says that its human resources department will extend new job offers to employees based on available vacancies, their credentials, licensing and experience. If teachers accept their new positions, they will work there. If they do not, the district says it will work to find places for them that fit their criteria and preference.

What does the teacher's union think of the plan?

The Indianapolis Education Association said in a statement that there are parts of the proposal the union supports, such as expanding program offerings.

"But many of the concerns that our community members brought to the previous school board meeting are not addressed in this proposed plan," the union said. "It is pivotal that this process is transparent and fair to everyone involved and there are still too many questions posed that remain unanswered."

"The district has presented this plan as a done deal, but we are committed to consulting with our full membership and the larger community to present a clear list of demands to ensure that any action taken by the school board is truly aligned with the best interests of our students, staff, and families," the IEA statement also said.

How are other education organizations responding to the plan?

The Mind Trust, a powerful nonprofit that has helped the charter school sector grow in Indianapolis, also had mixed reviews of the plan.

"Ultimately, in its current form, we believe the plan does not yet fully address the needs of all IPS students and families," the organization said in a blog post. "Input from a representative cross-section of the IPS community, especially historically marginalized families, should drive needed changes to the plan prior to board action in November."

The group wants more partnerships with charter operators that have successful academic results for students of color. It also argues that the CFI and Montessori programs that the plan expands are disproportionately white schools that have large racial disparities in achievement.

"Because of these factors, we worry that an aggressive replication of these programs could widen the district's racial achievement gaps," the Mind Trust said.

RISE INDY, another nonprofit that is closely linked to the charter school movement, encouraged parents to submit feedback.

"Every family, student and educator will connect with this plan differently — and all of those perspectives are critical as we move forward," the group said in a statement. "That's why RISE INDY has launched an easy-to-use feedback form on our website where anyone affected by Rebuilding Stronger can submit their comments or questions. This information will be shared with IPS without identifying respondents."







credit while homes with an assessed value falling between \$250,000 and \$400,000 would receive a \$100 credit, Hogsett said.

An estimated 191,500 Indianapolis households are expected to receive the credit, representing about 90% of owneroccupied single-family homes in Marion County.

The relief comes to the aid of residents in a time of considerable inflation as well as escalating property values — which Hogsett said drastically affects homeowners' property tax bills.

"The truth is, since the start of the pandemic, demand for homes in Central Indiana and throughout Indianapolis

has exploded," he said. "That demand has led to an exponential rise in the assessed value of many homes, which obviously affects the amount homeowners pay in property taxes."

Osili said the proposal would also provide some relief to many families who are continuing to experience the hardships of the pandemic and inflation.

"Along with providing some relief, this proposal plays a small role in ensuring families are not pushed out of their homes as property values increase," he said. "The work certainly does not end here. There continue to be significant racial disparities in homeownership, especially with redlining and mortgage lenders."

According to SAVI, a data system at IUPUI, Black borrowers are twice as likely as white borrowers to be denied a loan, even when their income and debt are the same.

"This must change," he said, "and we must continue to work together to address those disparities and ensure Indianapolis is a city where all residents can build on their generational wealth."

In a plaza near the Martindale Brightwood CDC, Matthews went inside the Fifth Third Bank eBus — a bus with customer service and learning stations — where she was able to learn about her options to buy a home in the

Martindale-Brightwood residents have been without a bank in the community for nearly three years, as the last bank, PNC Financial Services, closed Nov. 15, 2019. Amina Pierson, executive director of the Martindale Brightwood CDC, said the event helps residents learn about banking.

"Banks can do so much for the community," she said. "Once you build a relationship with a bank, it opens so many doors for small businesses."

Inside the bus, people could speak with Fifth Third bankers, learn budgeting and saving strategies, get a free credit score report and learn how to raise their credit scores.

Several vendors were also selling their products at the event.

Pierson said the Martindale Brightwood CDC is working on getting a bank back in the area. She encourages people to plan all purchases and to teach their children about banking.

"Getting your finances in order is the beginning of getting out of debt and being able to start building a financial legacy for your family," Pierson said.



Move carefully

The first permanent settlement in what would become the United States was established in September 1565 by Spanish soldier Pedro Menéndez de Avilés. While most of the first denizens of the town were Spanish, several Africans were among the

This history — combined with centuries of voluntary migration and the transatlantic slave trade — makes it extremely troubling that millions of Americans have such a negative visceral reaction to immigrants, including legal ones. (We won't delve into the near genocide of the indigenous peoples whose land Europeans "discovered" - and confiscated.)

Recently, there has been vast coverage of the removal of Hispanic migrants from Southern cities to a few "drop off spots" in the North. Based upon what is coming to light, migrants allegedly were flown to Massachusetts under false pretenses. (Various authorities are investigating whether that action broke any laws.)

It is important to note that the migrants are here legally (i.e., as asylum seekers). Our asylum laws are intended to protect migrants who are escaping persecution in their native country due to their "race, religion, nationality, membership in a particular social group, or political opinion." It is a shame that so many people in our relatively young nation, which was seeded with people who escaped religious and economic persecution, are so resistant to downtrodden migrants who seek refuge in our "melting pot."

To be clear, it is reasonable for Americans to fear

that drugs are entering the U.S. via illegal border crossings. However, the fact is that 90% of methamphetamine, fentanyl and heroine, as well as 80% of cocaine, enters the U.S. through legal ports of entry.

There is also widespread concern about crime that immigrants, especially undocumented ones, commit. This is a common justification for anti-immigration efforts — especially in Texas. Yet, according to that state's own arrest records, U.S.-born people were twice as likely as undocumented immigrants to be arrested for violent crime from 2012-2018. Similarly, U.S.-born people were two-and-a-half times as likely to be arrested for drug crimes.

Further, concerns about "foreigners taking jobs from Americans" rings especially hollow given our extremely low unemployment and birth rates. (Consider the near ubiquity of "Help Wanted" signs that dot our rural, suburban, and metropolitan landscapes.) There are too many jobs for too few workers.

Finally, there is the reasonable argument that people should come to America "the right way" (i.e., legally either through our immigration or asylum processes). I very much agree with that view. Of course, most people who are now in the U.S. illegally did enter legally — through the visa process — and have overstayed. Most of the migrants who reach our borders apply for asylum, so they're here legally as

This is a problem that Congress could solve if it actually wanted to, but politics is always at play. To his credit, former President George W. Bush made a gallant effort to forge a bipartisan deal, but Republicans sunk it. Further, none other than the late President Ronald Reagan gave — gasp! — amnesty to undocumented immigrants.

If we want fewer people migrating to the U.S. —

which is a bad idea — we need to help our neighbors in Central and South America strengthen their economies and address violent crime and drug trafficking. Most migrants come here because the situation in their home country has become untenable.

Sadly, outrage at immigration is based largely on $migrants' countries \ of \ origin-particularly \ Central$ and South America. Would there be such opprobrium if the immigrants were Canadian — or even Ukrainian? I highly doubt it.

I hate to call it racism. (Actually, I don't. Because that's what it is.) Even the language that opponents of immigration tend to use — referring to human beings as "illegals" — drips with xenophobia and misanthropy.

Further, millions of Americans beat their chests about their Christianity. As a Christian, it is exceedingly disturbing to me that so many anti-immigration zealots share my faith. Apparently, they have forgotten that Jesus was what they would refer to as "an illegal immigrant." This is a moral question. I am reminded of the line from a Chris Rock movie: "God bless America — and no place else." For too many people, religion doesn't trump "Replacement Theory."

As governors are using human beings as pawns, I am reminded that the game we now know as chess originated in India roughly 1,400 years ago. As legendary player Philidor observed: "Pawns are the soul of chess." There are many more of them than the other pieces. And, crucially, they can bring down kings and queens. Politicians should consider their

Student loan debt hurts Black and brown families

When President Biden announced last month that he would be canceling up to \$20,000 in student debt, there were varied reactions.

Is this unfair to borrowers who have already paid off their

loans? Is this enough? Is it too much? First, it's important to know the facts. One of the most important facts is that student loan debt disproportionately hurts Black and brown borrowers.

According to the Education Data Initiative, Black college graduates owe an average of \$25,000 more in student loan debt than white college graduates. They also are more likely to take out debt in the first place, pay more interest and make larger monthly payments. After taking on debt, people of color tend to earn less income than their white counterparts, with many unable to even complete their degree — the cost of attendance is simply too high.

If a student does not come from a family with generational wealth, they need to take out larger loans. Those larger loans accumulate with larger amounts of interest. Upon entering the workforce, people of color make less money than white individuals, on top of being saddled with debilitating monthly payments. This is the result of centuries of systemic discrimination and unequal access to opportunities like education, jobs, housing and healthcare.

It's no wonder there is a racial wealth gap in this country. According to data from the Federal Reserve, Black and brown households earn less than white households and own only 15% to 20% of the wealth of those other households. And lifting just a portion of disproportionate student loan debt can make a

Here's the next fact: President Biden's Student Loan Reduction Plan includes three parts to address student loan debt. One is to cancel debt for those making less than \$125,000 a year if you received a Pell Grant, you are eligible to have \$20,000 forgiven. If you did not, you are eligible to have \$10,000 forgiven. Second, ALL federal loan payments are paused until after Dec. 31, 2022. And third, the Biden administration is proposing new rules that will make the system more equitable to current and future borrowers.

Approximately 1 in 4 Black Americans have negative net worth, meaning their total debt exceeds their total assets. The Biden administration estimates that the first \$10,000 of debt relief will move over half a million Black Americans from a negative to a positive net worth.

That positive net worth means there are more opportunities to generate wealth. From home ownership, to building credit, to investments and

possibly new minority businesses there are new opportunities to build a better community.

The overall changes to the student loan debt problem proposed by President Biden will address some persistent inequities that make it harder for Black and brown Americans to pursue higher education or complete higher education. With this reform, college as well as the chance to achieve higher paying jobs post-graduation — will be more accessible, with less risk of becoming stuck under the weight of unbearable student loan payments.

It's important to ask ourselves yet again the question on many folks' minds — are these efforts enough? The answer is NO, but President Biden's plan is a good start.

Let's not forget: White Americans benefited from low-interest loans from the G.I. Bill in the 1940s. Practices like Jim Crow laws and redlining plus the economic and social legacy of slavery and colonialism, there are quantifiable factors that contribute to modern day income and wealth disparities in the

There is no one solution to erase the centuries of institutionalized racism in our country. But President Biden's plan is a move in the right direction that will have a positive impact on this generation and generations to come. No American should be punished for trying to achieve the American dream. And affordability should never be a

barrier to education.

It will take more bold solutions to address the chronic inequities and systematic racism plaguing our country. That's why it is more important than ever to support Democrat-led policies that will help undo generations of harm to Black and brown Americans.

In the age of COVID-19 and what seemed like new "unprecedented moments" every day, in a time of significant firsts and what we can only hope are unequivocal lasts, lowering student loan debt should stand out in history for what it is: a momentous step toward an America that is finally more fair, more just and more equitable for

Improving literacy in our community

nounced an unprecedented partnership to spend up to \$111 million on a statewide literacy initiative that will train educators how to teach

using the "science of reading."

The "science of reading" is a research-based strategy that integrates instructional practices with efforts focused around phonics, phonemic awareness, fluency, vocabulary and comprehension. Decades of child development and brain research emphasize the need for all of these components to be taught to students to ensure they

have the reading skills necessary for future aca-

demic and life success. This investment is going to be critical to closing the opportunity gap for students in our community who are not reading on grade level.

If you look at the most recent statewide IREAD scores, which measure third graders' reading proficiency, just 64.1% of Black students and 69.6% of Latino students passed the assessment. Compare that to 87.5% of white students who passed. Locally, the overall pass rate for students

in Indianapolis Public Schools was 62%.

The statewide announcement is huge, but we also need to lift up local efforts that have been underway over the past year to help our students combat pandemic learning loss when it comes to reading.

Last school year, Indianapolis Public Schools piloted tutoring projects at several of its locations, and the district rolled out its free "tutoring for all" initiative as this school year got started. Beginning in October, students who signed up

for tutoring will meet virtually twice weekly for one hour in the afternoons.

Similarly, a microgrant program that directly provides families with funds to spend on tutoring will be coming online in the coming months. Lawmakers created that program earlier this year, and IPS was the first district in the state to commit to matching the state's \$500 per-student investment with an additional \$500, ensuring that every IPS student who qualifies for the program will have \$1,000

to spend on tutoring

services. Last, but certainly not least, I am heartened to hear the city of Indianapolis is considering a \$1 million investment for the Circle City Readers program, which will provide in-person, highdosage reading tutoring for more than 1,000 Indianapolis students.

I am encouraged by all of this investment in literacy, and I can't wait for the funding to start flowing to our educators, families and students. Our kids have long deserved this kind of attention and investment in their educational success — especially when it comes to the fundamentals of reading.

Telehealth providers are navigating murky legal territory as abortion bans take effect

Allison Case, a family medicine physician, spends much of her time working in a hospital where she delivers babies and provides reproductive health care services, including abortions.

Case lives and works in Indiana, where abortion is now banned with few exceptions. She's also licensed to practice in New Mexico, a state where abortion remains legal.

Before Indiana's abortion ban took effect, Case would use her days off to provide reproductive health services, including abortion care, via telemedicine through a clinic that serves patients in New Mexico. Many of them travel from neighboring Texas where abortion is banned.

Some travel solo, she said, others have their children with them.

"Some people are buying hotels, others might have family or friends they can stay with, some are just sleeping in their cars," Case said. "It's really awful."

Since Roe was overturned, clinics that provide abortions have seen an increase in demand. Many clinics rely on help from physicians out of state, like Case, who are able to alleviate some of the pressure and keep wait times down by providing services via telemedicine.

But as more states move to restrict abortion, providers are finding themselves navigating an increasingly complicated legal landscape.

Is abortion by telemedicine legal? It's complicated

Medication abortions work for most people who are under 11 weeks pregnant, and research suggests medication abortion via telemedicine is safe and effective. Yet many states have enacted legislation to ban or limit access to telehealth abortions.

But it's not always clear what that means for doctors like Case who are physically located in a state with abortion restrictions, but have a license that enables them to provide care via telehealth to patients in states where it is legal.

Case said she has consulted several lawyers and none of them had a concrete answer for her.

"One lawyer was like, 'If anyone tells you they think they know [or] they have certainty about this stuff, they're out of their mind," she said.

In many states, patients seeking a telehealth abortion have to be physically present in a state where telemedicine abortion is legal, even if it's just to have a brief virtual consultation with a provider, who may be located in an entirely different state.

Telemedicine abortion providers are finding themselves in a murky legal gray area, having to weigh

how much risk they're willing to assume to care for their patients, or consider halting this aspect of care altogether.

Katherine Watson, a law professor and medical ethicist at Northwestern University Feinberg School of Medicine in Chicago, said this is unchartered territory.

"The stakes are so high. We're talking about something that's a protected right in one state and a felony in a sister state," Watson said. "And the map is a

patchwork. So this is an absolutely radical change."
She said people have to understand the distinction between the letter of the law and the enforcement environment. Even if the law does not explicitly criminalize what doctors like Case do, the enforcement environment can ensnare some of them in legal trouble, Watson said.

"In a draconian enforcement environment, you may not have violated the letter of the law. But creative prosecutors may look for a reason to persecute you," she said.

There is no slam-dunk argument prosecutors can use, she said, but in a charged political environment, there is a real risk. Look no further than Dr. Caitlin Bernard, an Indiana OB-GYN who spoke out about a legal abortion she provided this summer to a 10-year-old rape victim from Ohio and was vilified and publicly accused of wrongdoing by the state's attorney general.

Providers have to weigh the risks

Dr. Case works with Whole Woman's Health, a reproductive health clinic that offers telemedicine abortion in five states: Illinois, Minnesota, New Mexico, Virginia and Maryland. The organization does not have a brick-and-mortar clinic in some of these places, but it works with providers who have medical licenses there to staff virtual appointments.

Whole Woman's Health President and CEO Amy Hagstrom Miller said she speaks with providers about the risks they face working for the clinic. She suspects the lack of clarity in state laws is by design, intended to "scare people away from providing safe abortion care."

The clinic has already stopped working with providers based in Texas because of the way the abor-

tion lawthere allows for anyone — even if not personally affected — to sue anyone who performs, aids or intends to aid in an abortion. That opens the door for political, cultural and even personal grievances to interfere with health care providers' work.

"Just because you comply with the law doesn't mean that anti-abortion people won't come after you and try to vilify you and make your life difficult," Hagstrom Miller said.

On one of Dr. Case's days off from her job caring for Indiana patients in late August, she sat at her laptop as one of her cats nestled in her lap quietly and her first telemedicine abortion patient logged on.

The woman was a pregnant student from Texas who sat in her car. The camera only displayed the top half of her face. She had driven for hours to New Mexico seeking a prescription for abortion pills.

Case walked her through what to expect, explaining that abortion pills stop the pregnancy from progressing and prompt the body to eject the fetus within a few hours.

"It depends on the person, but many people describe it as a heavy period," Case told the young woman.

The patient asked for a medical note to excuse her from school, but asked that the note not mention that she had an abortion.

It's women like these who motivate Case to take on telemedicine abortion cases.

But now that Indiana's abortion ban has taken effect, Case said she will likely stop those services. The risk is too high.

"It really has left me feeling kind of helpless, like I'm not able to help people out. And that's sad," she said.

If providers in these states decide the risk is too high, Hagstrom Miller said, the clinic is ready to divert the patient load to providers in states where abortion remains legal and protected.

For her part, Case said, if the patient volume is high enough, she might consider driving to Illinois to provide those telemedicine services.

"I just think it's a crazy thing to think I will drive one and a half hours to Illinois to use my New Mexico license to help people driving from Texas to New Mexico to get their abortion," she said. "It's just like madness."

EATING WELL: Fruit and Vegetable Safety

A diet with plenty of fruits and vegetables provides important health benefits, but it's important to choose and prepare them safely.

Fruits and vegetables add nutrients to your diet that help protect from heart disease, stroke and some cancers. Choosing vegetables, fruits, nuts, and other produce over high-calorie foods can also help with weight management.

Sometimes, though, raw fruits and vegetables contain harmful germs, such as Salmonella, E. coli and Listeria, that can cause illness. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) estimates that germs on fresh produce cause a large percentage of foodborne illnesses in the United States.

The safest produce is cooked; the next safest is washed. Enjoy uncooked fruits and vegetables while taking steps to avoid foodborne illness, also known as food poisoning. Sprouts are a particular concern because the warm,

humid conditions needed to grow sprouts also are ideal for germs to multiply. Eating raw or lightly cooked sprouts may lead to food poisoning. Avoiding raw sprouts is especially important for those

who are more likely to get seriously sick from food poisoning, which includes pregnant women, young children, older adults, and people with weakened immune systems.

When shopping for fresh produce at the grocery store or farmer's market, choose produce that isn't bruised or damaged; keep pre-cut fruits and vegetables cold by choosing produce that is refrigerated or kept on ice; and, separate fruits and vegetables from raw meat, poultry, and seafood in shopping carts and in grocery bags. When preparing fruits and vegetables at home, follow these healthy tips:

Wash hands, kitchen utensils, and food preparation
surfaces, including chopping boards and countertops,
before and after preparing fruits and vegetables.

Clean fruits and vegetables before eating, cutting, or cooking, unless the package says the contents have been washed. Wash or scrub fruits and vegetables under running water—even if you do not plan to eat the peel. Cut away any damaged or bruised areas before preparing or eating. And, dry fruit or vegetables with a clean paper towel.

 Keep fruits and vegetables separate from raw foods from animals, such as meat, poultry and seafood.

 Refrigerate fruits and vegetables that have been cut, peeled or cooked within two hours, or one hour if the outside temperature is 90 degrees or warmer.
 Chill them at 40 degrees Fahrenheit or colder in a clean container.

Consuming dangerous foodborne bacteria will usually cause illness within 1 to 3 days of eating the contaminated food. However, sickness can also occur within 20 minutes or up to six weeks later.

Although most people will recover from a foodborne illness within a short period of time, some can develop chronic, severe, or even life-threatening health problems. Foodborne illness can sometimes be confused with other illnesses that have similar symptoms. The symptoms of foodborne illness can include vomiting, diarrhea and abdominal pain, as well as flu-like symptoms, such as fever, headache and body ache. If you think that you or a family member has a foodborne illness, contact your healthcare provider immediately.



'Hope been happening here':

Light of the World celebrates National Back to Church Sunday

Light of the World Christian Church made sure to create a welcoming environment for members and guests during Sunday worship service Sept. 18 for its National Back to Church Sunday service.

The third Sunday of September is National Back to Church Sunday — a day to encourage friends, neighbors and coworkers to try church again or for the first time. This year's Back to Church Sunday theme was "Hope Happens Here," and during Light of the World's service, guest speaker Rev. Sheila Spencer performed a poem addressing the many ways churches cultivate hope for their congregations.

"Hope happens here because even when physical doors were closed the church never ever shut down," Spencer said. "When I was reflecting on all of that, it became crystal clear the title of this poem is 'Hope been happening here."

National Back to Church Sunday began as an initiative to increase church attendance in America after seeing a decline over the years while also sharing love, peace and hope from church to the community, according to the National Back to Church Sunday website. Since the creation of the event, more than 4 million followers have participated at more than 40,000 churches.

The service began with a musical performance from Randy Weston & Judah Band. During the "pass the love" section of the service, members of the congregation and guests of the church greeted the people around them.

Light of the World's pastor, Rev. Janae Pitts-Murdock, came on the stage singing with the congregation. Her sermon was about how to live a "faith-filled" life as a Christian.

"Faith-filled living is after you have done all you can, God will step in and do the rest," she said.

"Wherever Jesus is, hope is."

Moved by Pitts-Murdock's sermon, many people walked to the front of the sanctuary during the "invitation to discipleship" — the end of the service where the pastor asks people in the crowd if they want to become a member of the church and be baptized.

After the service, Light of the World had activities including food trucks, games, voter registration and free health screenings for diabetes, cholesterol and blood pressure.

Minetta Richardson, 73, said these activities were a way to engage the younger generations and spread "the Gospel through food, fun and fellowship."

Norman Stewart has been a member of Light of the World since 2003, and he said he has not missed a Sunday service. Even during the pandemic, the 83-year-old made sure to watch the church via livestream, and Stewart said this church service was just as important as every other Sunday worship service.

"It's important to be here today because it's just another Sunday to be with the Lord," he said.

Light of the World will baptize about a dozen people Sept. 25, and the church will continue to share the word of God and faith throughout its congregation and the community.

"Hope been happening here," Spencer said in the poem. "Even though we may be wearing masks, God's love and spirit is not hidden or covered. Even though we may be social distancing, we're still spiritually connected."





With Griner in jail, WNBA players skip Russia in offseason

SYDNEY (AP) — Brittney Griner's highly publicized legal woes in Russia and the country's invasion of Ukraine has the top WNBA players opting to take their talents elsewhere this offsea-

For the past few decades, Russia has been the preferred offseason destination for WNBA players to compete because of the high salaries that can exceed \$1 million — nearly quadruple the base salary of top WNBA players and the resources and amenities teams offered them.

That all has come to an abrupt end. "Honestly my time in Russia has been wonderful, but especially with BG still wrongfully detained there, nobody's

going to go there until she's home," said Breanna Stewart, a Griner teammate on the Russian team that paid the duo millions. "I think that, you know, now, people want to go overseas and if the money is not much different, they want to be in a better place."

Griner was arrested in February, then detained and later convicted on drug possession charges amid Russia's invasion of Ukraine. Griner was sentenced last month to nine years in prison.

Now, Stewart and other WNBA All-Stars, including Jonquel Jones and Courtney Vandersloot — who also have made millions of dollars playing in Russia — are going elsewhere this winter. All three played for Ekaterinburg, the same Russian team as Griner. That club won five EuroLeague titles in the past eight seasons and has been dominant for nearly two decades with former greats DeLisha Milton Jones and Diana Taurasi

Nearly a dozen WNBA players competed in Russia last winter and none of them are heading back this year.

playing there.

After the World Cup tournament, Stewart is going to Turkey to play for Fenerbahçe. Top players can make a few hundred thousand dollars playing in Turkey, much less than their Russian salaries. Playing in Turkey also allows Stewart to be closer to her wife's family

"You want to have a better lifestyle, a better off-the-court experience, and just continue to appreciate other countries," Stewart said.

Like Stewart, Vandersloot also isn't headed back to Russia, choosing to play in Hungary where she obtained citizenship in 2016.

"I am Hungarian. I thought it would be special since I haven't played there since I got the citizenship," Vandersloot

The 33-year-old guard said a lot would have to change before she'd ever consider going back to Russia to play even though she

has many fond

memories of

he Russian people. "The thing is, we were treated so well and made such by our club strong relationships with those people, I would never close the door on that,"

she said. "The whole situation with BG makes it really hard to think that it's safe for anyone to go back there right Jones will be joining Stewart in Turkey, playing for Mersin. The 6-foot-6

Jones said she would consider going back to Russia if things change politically and Griner was back in the U.S. The Griner situation also is weighing heavily on the minds of young WNBA

Rhyne Howard, the 2022 WNBA Rookie of the Year, is playing in Italy this winter — her first overseas experience. She said she was careful when deciding where she wanted to play.

"Everyone's going to be a bit cautious seeing as this situation is happening,"

It's not just the American players who are no longer going to Russia. Chicago Sky forward Emma Meesseman, who stars for the Belgium national team, had played in Russia with Stewart, Jones and Vandersloot. She also is headed to Turkey this offseason.

The WNBA has also been trying to make staying home in the offseason a better option for players. Commissioner Cathy Engelbert said at the WNBA Finals that top players could make up to \$700,000 this year between base salary, marketing agreements and award bonuses. While only a select few players could reach that amount, roughly a dozen have decided to take league marketing agreements this offseason.

Big Ten RB tradition alive and well behind Brown, Ibrahim

The Big Ten's tradition of producing elite running backs is alive and well.

The conference features the nation's top two rushers in Illinois' Chase Brown and Minnesota's Mohamed Ibrahim, and four others are running for better than 100 yards per game. No other league has more than

The Big Ten is the only conference in the last 10 years that has had at least two players end the season with rushing averages of 100 yards per game or better.

"Doesn't surprise me," said Wisconsin coach Paul Chryst, whose program has developed stars like Jonathan Taylor, Melvin Gordon and Montee Ball the past decade and has one on the rise in Braelon Allen.

For those who do it best, the future is

Taylor led the NFL in rushing last year. Ezekiel Elliott (Ohio State) was first in 2016 and '18. Jordan Howard (Indiana) was second for 2016. Saquon Barkley (Penn State) was second in 2018 and is this season's leader through Week 2.

Brown, averaging 165.3 yards, is the first Illinois player to run for at least 140 in three straight games. He also leads the nation with 18 runs of 10 yards or longer and, according to Pro Football Focus, is tied for second with 24 forced missed tackles.

"He's an animal," quarterback Tommy De-Vito said. "Sometimes I hand off the ball, I'm

supposed to keep my little boot going out, fake going upfield. Sometimes I give a little peek just to watch him because he's a special dude, for sure. He can turn something out of nothing. Anything can be a play where he'll break one."

Ibrahim, back after missing last season's final 12 games with a torn Achilles tendon, has proved tough to bring down in his six years at Minnesota. Ibrahim is averaging 154.7 yards per game, albeit against weak opponents, and leads the nation with 315 of his 464 yards coming after contact by PFF's

Ibrahim ran for 202 yards and scored the Gophers' first three touchdowns in a 49-7 win over Colorado. He has 12 straight 100yard games and four career 200-yard games, both school records.

"Well, obviously you'd always like to have a bunch of Mos," Gophers coach P.J. Fleck said. "Just keep bringing 'em, right?"

The other Big Ten backs averaging at least 100 yards are Nebraska's Anthony Grant (116), Penn State's Nicholas Singleton (111.3), Wisconsin's Braelon Allen (110.7) and Northwestern's Evan Hull (102.7).

Not on that list is Ohio State's TreVeyon Henderson, an Associated Press preseason All-American who has been a bit under the radar. He has split carries with Miyan Williams, with coach Ryan Day saying the idea is to keep both fresh.

Singleton is the nation's top freshman rusher after showing up at Penn State as the nation's No. 1 running back prospect, according to 247Sports.com. Henderson was the top prospect in 2021.

Singleton ran for 124 yards and two touchdowns in the 41-12 win at Auburn, and the week before he had 179 yards and two TDs against Ohio. He carried just 10 times in each game.

"He's explosive, he's fast, he sees it well," Penn State quarterback Sean Clifford said. "He just adds that dynamic of being able to get on the perimeter and then finish plays in the end zone."

Wisconsin's Allen originally was recruited to play linebacker but was switched to running back after he put up huge rushing numbers in his final year of high school.

He ran for nearly 1,300 yards with 12 touchdowns as a freshman in 2021, and he recorded the longest run in the nation so far this season when he went 96 yards on his fourth carry in the opener against Illinois State.

"I would just say the style of football is a little different, a little more running involved in the offenses compared with the Pac-12 or ACC or whatever conference," Allen said. "Running backs want to come to a school in the Big Ten so they can run the ball."
