Eldridge to prioritize voter participation as 1st local Black Democratic Party chair

Myla Eldridge was elected Marion County Democratic Party chair Sept. 13, making her the first Black person in the role. She said her immediate priorities include voter participation and turnout.

Eldridge fills the open position left by Kate Sweeney Bell, who resigned Aug. 29 as part of a campaign promise as she runs for county clerk.

"I truly believe I was the best candidate to get the results to help Marion County Democrats win the election," Eldridge said in an interview with the Recorder.

Eldridge's extensive experience with elections — she worked in the Marion County Clerk's Office for more than 16 years, including as clerk for the last seven years — is what she said set her apart from the other candidates because she knows what it takes to win an election.

Starting in early February, there were calls for Sweeney Bell to resign by members of the Marion County Black Elected Officials and the Indiana Black Legislative Caucus. They voiced concerns about how the former chair "abused her power," citing conflicts of interest for seeking an

City settles nearly decadelong dispute with Towne & Terrace Corp., pledges to help residents

The city of Indianapolis announced an end to an almost decadelong legal battle with Towne & Terrace Corp., a nonprofit that owns neglected condominiums on the city's far east side.

The city will pay T&T "settlement payments" and, in exchange, gain a seat on the homeowners association that controls part of 102 city-owned properties, all vacant and left to fall into disrepair because of the legal battle.

The city will also appoint an ex officio board observer who can present proposals, participate in discussion and deliberation in meetings and have access to T&T's financial and corporate records. Having two people directly involved with the HOA will allow the city to address concerns of the conditions that residents have been facing, Mayor Joe Hogsett said at a press conference Sept. 22.

"For residents there, it has been a frustrating yearslong journey. As the court cases have played out, residents have had to put up with far too much going on around their homes, from vandalism, to neglect, to violence," Hogsett said.

Hogsett added he understands excuses for why the city couldn't legally act "means very little to a family that has had to put up with so much."

"Today's announcement is not a declaration of victory," he said. "It is a declaration of victory in the legal battle. ... This is just the beginning."

The agreement also resolves the bankruptcy case that stalled pending litigation in 2021.

After years of suffering from drug activities, gun violence and several homicides, the city intends to connect residents with services such as workforce programs, mental health services and legal support. The city became involved by acquiring the properties when no one bought them at a tax sale.

City-county councilor La Keisha Jackson, who represents the district where the apartments are located, said the agreement is a step in the right direction, but more work needs to be done to address the needs of the residents in the neighborhood.

Federal government approves INDOT's electric vehicle deployment plan

The Indiana Department of Transportation's Electric Vehicle Deployment Plan received federal approval, meaning INDOT can begin the process of installing charging stations throughout the state.

On Sept. 27, the Federal Highway Administration sent a letter to INDOT approving the \$100 million plan to deploy electric vehicle charging stations in Indiana. The funding comes from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, which was signed by President Joe Biden in November 2021.

INDOT released the final draft of the electric vehicle deployment plan to the public in July.

The plan lays out the locations where INDOT will install charging stations, including eight charging stations around Indianapolis and three in the neighboring cities of Brownsburg, Whitestown and Carmel. The department also plans to deploy charging stations in many of the larger cities throughout Indiana, including Gary, Kokomo, South Bend and Evansville.

The plan also explains INDOT's goals,

Serendipity for Newfields: 'We. The Culture' opens shortly after new CEO begins

The new CEO and president of Newfields, Dr. Colette Pierce Burnette, said she is "learning backwards to live forward" in her new role.

Burnette began a new chapter of both her life and for Newfields on her first day as president and CEO on Aug. 1. Burnette, who lives by the words of Swedish philosopher Soren Kierkegaard, said following controversy at the museum — when a job posting for a director said applicants would need to "maintain the museum's traditional, core, white art audience" — the new challenge was a welcomed one.

"It showed me that there's an opportunity for me to become a part of a template," she said, "of like a renaissance moment of really effecting change in the positive."

Initially, Burnette said she wasn't interested in the position as it wasn't "within my wheel-house." Having recently retired from her position as president of

the fall and hosting several talks or


events through the season, Steward said. When speakers are brought to Indianapolis for the series, Steward said they participate in a community lecture as well as hosting a workshop at a local school.

KIPP Indy's 1st graduation will mark historic moment for neighborhood

Shariah Miller will always remember leading more than 100 of her fellow students on a Juneteenth Peace Walk through Indianapolis' Martindale-Brightwood neighborhood this sum-

Their route passed by Miller's school, KIPP Indy Legacy High, where she and 98 other students will become the first graduating class this spring.

Reflecting on the moment when she took the megaphone to address the crowd during the walk, Miller said the KIPP teachers and staff who have known her since freshman year "never fail to remind me of when I first started here how quiet I was and how much I kept to myself."

That changed, she said, as she found a passion for social justice in high school, through events like the peace walk and in encouraging other young people to speak out.

"I spoke about how important it is for events like this to be student-led because it gives young people voices that deserve to be heard," she said of the walk. "They felt like they were making a change and their voices were heard by being at this event."

The Class of 2023 is not just Legacy's first class, but the first class to graduate within the boundaries of Indy's Martindale-Brightwood neighborhood, a historically Black, working-class area affected by industrial collapse, the construction of a highway that bisects the community and federally mandated busing.

That graduation will be a moment of pride for Martindale-Brightwood, where the school — part of the national KIPP charter school network and the Indianapolis Public Schools Innovation Network — has become a focal point in the neighborhood's efforts to improve residents' quality of life.

"It's been amazing to watch as they have grown not just in the physical sense but in knowing who they are and the impact they want to make on the community," said David Spencer, the school leader.

Adults working to improve Martindale-Brightwood have also been paying attention. Community leaders believe the students and the school have been a key part of efforts to boost the area's long-term prospects.

"We want high-quality options for our kids, where kids do not have to leave our neighborhood to have access to high quality education and be able to compete," said Barato Britt, executive director of the Edna Martin Christian Center, which provides social services in the neighborhood.

The school opened its doors to its first class of 121 freshmen in 2019, and closed for COVID-19 only a few months later. When it reopened in 2021, one-third of all students didn't show up for in-person classes. Around 9% of all students didn't return to the school at all.

As with students around the country, the pandemic had hit them hard. They were living on their own in cars or sleeping on park benches, said Robyn Russell, a KIPP Indy Legacy mom who volunteered to go find them. Some students and their families were going hungry.

Devon Wilson, a senior, said that while he kept his grades up, "The part I didn't like about quarantine was the social part — you can't be social."

Miller, meanwhile, said she lost the motivation to do virtual school, which would later make an impact on her

GPA.

"I always think about how I wish I didn't. Because of the fact that I lost that motivation, I ended up ghosting school the rest of the year," Miller said.

And some students took on additional work on behalf of their peers. Senior Jessica Torres found herself translating the constantly evolving situation for

her fellow Spanish-speaking students. "I feel like that kind of put pressure on me, but I didn't mind helping them out because my parents have always shown me it's like being human," she said.

Having a high school that's within walking distance has been a boon for many students, school and community leaders said. Students gravitate to campus even when school isn't in session, said Russell, the school operations manager. They walk from school to the nearby Frederick Douglass Park.

Just over one-third of the graduating seniors come from Martindale-Brightwood's 46218 ZIP code, where the school is located and the median household income of \$26,615 is around half that of the figure for Indianapolis. The remaining students come from adjacent ZIP codes.

It was important for KIPP to embrace Martindale-Brightwood as it considered opening schools in the neighborhood, said Britt, the leader of the Edna Martin Christian Center who also serves on KIPP Indy's board.

The school hopes to host its graduation ceremony at Martin University, in the heart of Martindale-Brightwood, with enough space for students to bring as many guests as they wish.

Approximately 54% of the graduating class is interested in enrolling in a four-year college, while another 35% intend to pursue an associate's degree, career technical education or military training, said YeVonne Jones, the school's managing director of postsecondary counseling and social services.

After graduation, they'll still have access to Jones and KIPP Indy counselors, who will make sure they're on track with college enrollment deadlines and credits and even offer microgrants to students who are facing stumbling blocks.

The American Institute of Graphic Arts Indianapolis Chapter aims to provide BIPOC creatives a more visible platform through a new speaker series, "Creatives in Color."

Justin Muse, director of diversity and inclusion for AIGA Indianapolis, said speakers were selected with many layers of diversity in mind.

"I wanted the lineup to be as diverse as possible," Muse said. "Diverse in people of color and their career and so forth. ... I really wanted people who were in positions of leadership or leading things and been doing it for x amount of years or some time."

On Sept. 14, Sharmin Kent, manager and strategy lead at Studio Science, spoke about her journey as a creative professional and how her experience as a Black woman influenced her narrative process.

Kent said she worked her way through graduate school at various tech startups in Indianapolis before transitioning into academia, teaching digital marketing at Kenzie Academy and Kelley School of Business at IUPUI.

"To understand how someone like me moves through the world, it's important to acknowledge that stories like mine are not unique," Kent said. "They're just ignored."

As a Black woman in tech and creative spaces, as well as academia, Muse said Kent's career as a writer made her a standout for the series.

"I wanted people to see people in these levels and say 'wow, she made it,' and talk

about how she got where she got," Muse said. "It wasn't an easy road, obviously, but at the end of the day she got there."

Kent also touched on the topic of Black excellence and how the idea that people of color must work twice as hard to get half of their white counterparts is frustrating, exhausting and often leads to burnout in the workplace.

"Sometimes there's this idea that Black excellence — simply being the best — will save you," she said, "and that's simply not true."

Previous speakers in the series were Byron Elliot, an illustrator who talked about navigating the design industry and other predominantly white spaces as a Black man, and Terri Wada, who cofounded a design company and spoke about her experi-

ence as a Japanese American woman in a field dominated by white men.

"A lot of BIPOC creatives are just trying to survive; the element of speaking up or saying something isn't really an option sometimes," Muse said. "I wanted it to be an option, a platform to speak on those things, to be transparent and open as possible."

The "Creatives in Color" series will feature Eduardo S. Luna, a staff artist at Big Car and founder of Arte Mexicano en Indiana, on Oct. 5, and Ashley C. Ford, author of the New York Times Bestselling memoir, "Somebody's Daughter," on Nov. 30.

'Kids are not Krayons' to spark positive themes of identity for children

Teaching kids they're more than their skin color, Indianapolis writer and mental health therapist George Middleton's book "Kids are not Krayons" offers a creative and colorful lesson for parents and young readers.

Middleton's book aims to provide children with positive themes of identity early on by highlighting key points of identity, self-confidence and educating oneself on diversity with whimsical illustrations by Blake Frederick.

"The children's book is an attempt to be more of a prevention approach," Middleton said. "A threefold strategy of prevention, mitigation and repair, and the challenge is how do you prevent racism?"

Middleton's book was primarily designed to be a proactive tool for parents to begin having conversations about identity early on in their child's developmental stage — which is where one's identity is most permanently formed, he said.

Although the topic may seem challenging to present to children, inside the pages of "Kids are not Krayons" young readers and their parents will find colorful illustrations, visual imagery and rhyming and repetition rivaling Dr. Seuss.

The main takeaway — being more than one's race or skin color — is a necessary one, Middleton said. When put in an environment of love and nurturing such as a children's book, he said that message has a better chance of becoming "embedded in a child's mindset."

By introducing that idea ear-

Middleton said it felt organic and he had fun with the project.

"I didn't have to struggle because I knew what the message is," he said. "I happen to be a musician as well so I do a lot of writing from a creative perspective, and because I knew I wanted to use repetition that has a therapeutic tactic, it was simpler than I thought it was going to be."

Middleton's goal for the book was to introduce the idea of identity and discovering who one is without alluding to the ideation of race. In fact, the book steers clear of any mention of race or race-specific language.

"They don't even have to really discuss race as it pertains to their children; it's just an enjoyable reading book," he said. "And it's all focused on you having a way to be part of the development of your child's identity and self-esteem."





elected position while being the party chair, as well as discrimination against minority candidates.

With the general election in November, many are wondering how Eldridge will unite the party. Right now, the new chair is prioritizing two things for the election: voter participation and voter turnout.

Eldridge pointed to the Indianapolis City-County Council, where Democrats hold 20 of the 25 seats, as one example of recent success for the party locally, which she hopes to continue under a five-step plan she's developed.

Some of the aspects included in her five-step plan are getting Democrats elected by "building our bench of candidates," uniting the party by making Democrats "feel welcome" and increasing transparency within the party. The plan also includes utilizing technology and investing in the party.

"It's about unity and moving the party forward," she said. "I want my work to speak for me and for my character."

Eldridge received about 96% of the votes cast by the 287 committee chairs and vice chairs who attended the party caucus Sept. 13. The other candidates on the ballot were Ashley Houge, Rosemary Turentine and Karla Nowlin.

There has also been criticism about the Marion County Democratic Party's endorsement process, commonly referred to as slating.


To participate in slating, candidates must donate 10% of the position salary they are running for to the party. From there, the party endorses certain candidates over others. Many have criticized the process

as one that favors insiders who are connected within the party.

In May, Mayor Joe Hogsett said slating needs to come to an end, and Eldridge plans to address this in the future

"We definitely need to have a conversation about slating," she said. "I want to get feedback from candidates, do the research and have that conversation."

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

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

Huston-Tillotson University in Austin, Texas, leading an art museum didn't seem like something she was equipped

However, after the first round of interviews and speaking with her son who she proudly expressed is a journalist and art museum aficionado — she realized the position was exactly what she wanted.

In fact, Burnette said seeing the headlines about the museum and its previous CEO made her want the job even more.

"I have this grand opportunity to use these tremendously wonderful vehicles of art and nature as a means of education and a means of growing people and opening people's minds," Burnette said. "And never does an open mind not move you forward in some way."

Burnette's vision for Newfields is lofty and big," she said. However, she has no doubt she can make her vision a reality. Although her time here will likely be a small window in the long history of the institution, Burnette said she hopes people will look at her tenure as a "true renaissance moment."

"A true transformational moment where Newfields in its entirety — the totality of Newfields — has reached communities that it has not before and has offered programming that it has not before and has advanced the collection in ways that it has not before," she said. "And that we could come to be seen as a place that really nourishes

There are many opportunities to engage with people from all walks of life at Newfields, and Burnette said she wants guests to feel as if their lives have been enriched. That, in short, is her mission.

"I don't have to think very hard to come up with a vision because the vision is to meet the mission," she said, 'And the mission is astounding in and

However, as the first Black woman to lead Newfields as president and CEO, Burnette faces hefty expectations. For anyone else, that thought may be daunting, but Burnette said she approaches her life with the attitude of being the best at whatever she does,

"I have a responsibility to continue to blaze those trails and to continue to

bust open that concrete ceiling," she said, "because I think for Black women, it is a concrete ceiling not a glass ceil-

Burnette graduated from Ohio State University with a degree in engineering in 1980 and was also a first-generation college student. To say she takes her role as a Black woman blazing trails seriously could be considered an understatement.

"I am unapologetically Black. I like being a Black female," she said. "It flavors everything I do; and I want to be a really good - I want to be an excellent, best-in-class president CEO who happens to be Black and female."

Burnette is already off to a good start as "We. The Culture," an exhibition from The Eighteen Art Collective — a group of 18 local Black artists opened Sept. 23. Whether serendipity or coincidence, Burnette said she couldn't be more excited this exhibit was the first to open during her tenure.

"To have those artists, many of whom grew up in Indianapolis, now have their creative genius unleashed," she said, "I think it's just a magical moment for Indianapolis, and particularly for Newfields."

Also coming up for Newfields is its 140-year anniversary next spring, a celebration which Burnette is taking advantage of to allow the community to learn and grow with the museum by taking a look at the past.

"It's like when you explore your history, your family roots, you understand yourself a little better," she said. "It's going to be a good exercise in Newfields and I'm praying that it's also going to be a good exercise for the community."

Burnette said Newfields will go back to its founding — by suffragette May Wright Sewall — and walk through its 140-year history, evolutions and changes parallel to the history of India-

effort," Williams said, "as well as the university's commitment to forwarding conversations and being part of platforms that speak to quality of life and issues that relate to our community as a whole and specifically to the community of color."

The theme of this year's series, "Arts 'N Culture and the African American Influence," follows the organization's goals of uplifting the local community by placing a spotlight on African American influences and contributions to society in the form of art and cultural expressions, said Kimberly Bostic, board chair and managing director for the series.

"I would say the goal of Steward Speakers Series is to inspire and invoke meaningful dialogue within the community by bringing nationally known speakers to this city," Bostic said. "They're talking about issues that, while they have a sometimes global or national focus, there's typically a local impact."

Kicking off the season Oct. 6 is a one-person play featuring Mzuri Moyo Aimbaye entitled "The Fannie Lou Hamer Story." The play follows the story of Fannie Lou Hamer, a women's and voting rights activist who co-founded the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party in addition to helping organize Freedom Summer in the 1960s.

"The Fannie Lou Hamer Story" will take place at the Pike Performing Arts Center, 6701 Zionsville Road. The VIP reception will begin at 6 p.m. in the foyer followed by the play from 7-8:30 p.m.

VIP tickets are \$75, general admission is \$40, and student group tickets are \$20 each for a group of 10. Tickets and more information about the Steward Speaker Series are available at

With stories such as Fannie Lou Hamer, Bostic said it's timely to show the importance of having leaders and advocates like her in the community today.

Bostic said the speaker series is unique in what it does, but the work they do is very real and important, especially in times like this where people are noticing that leaders are not displaying the art of debate very well. She said the series gives people the opportunity to enforce the need to listen to all sides to encourage conversation and understand one another.

"I think it's also encouraging to a lot of the young people that are here trying to do the work but feel resistance," she said. "It's not new, it's something that we have always — our community when I saw 'we' — have always had to overcome, and hopefully it's just something else that will give them that push

to keep going."

Williams said guests should be prepared to come with an open mind and a curious mindset. Most speakers do a Q&A after their lecture, and it provides a great opportunity to not only learn but engage with their community on certain issues.

On Feb. 23, 2023, Steward Speakers Series will host a panel discussion for Black History Month. The panel will feature Dr. Michael Eric Dyson; GANGGANG creators Mali Jeffers and Alan Bacon; artist and activist Ashley Chew, and Patrick Denard Douthit, known professionally as 9th Wonder.

On April 13, 2023, Tony-nominated actress and director Sanaa Lathan will give a lecture for Women's History Month.

civil rights and equity requirements, implementation considerations, and public engagement.

According to the plan, one of the goals is to eliminate "range anxiety" for electric vehicle users by making sure everyone is within 40 miles of a charging station and within 50 miles of a strategically located alternative fuel source. The plan also highlights alternative locations for the EV charging stations, which was determined by INDOT in case the "preliminary location is not feasible."

In response to INDOT's proposal planning process, Black business owners, faith leaders and NAACP chapter formed an alliance — the Indiana Alliance for Equity, Diversity and Inclusion for Electric Vehicle

Infrastructure and Economic Opportunities — to make sure their communities were represented.

"This is so critical to the urban communities in Indiana," pastor David Green, member of the alliance, said at a meeting between the alliance and U.S. Department of Transportation on Sept. 26, the day before the plan was approved.

With a total of four public engagement sessions, one virtual and the other three in person in Seymour, Plymouth and Indianapolis, the coalition criticized the accessibility Black people had to the public engagement session.

"Nothing is set in stone," Chris Small, USDOT's deputy assistant secretary, said at the meeting. "We have the ability to consistently review what the state does."

USDOT representatives said U.S. Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg can "fill in the gaps where he sees fit."

The representatives also said there is \$2.5 billion in discretionary funds for electric vehicle infrastructure, and individual people, businesses and groups can apply for grants at the beginning of 2023.

The angry Black man

A Black friend from high school recently contacted me to share a conversation that he had had with a white former classmate of ours. He did not share (and I did not ask for) the identity of our mutual friend. During their conversation, that friend lamented that some of his Black classmates — including the

two of us — often appeared to be "angry" when posting on social media. Our friend wondered aloud why "very successful Black men" complained about racism.

Black folks are quite familiar with this query from conservative whites — whether they are friends, enemies or complete strangers. This question — which is usually accompanied by displeasure, disdain or even disgust — is couched in economic terms. That's a red herring. I'll tell you why.

It's very rare for white Americans to criticize upper class or wealthy whites for complaining about what they perceive to be problems in our country. They don't ask why "successful" white people are so unhappy. Consider that a former president, who is reputedly ultrawealthy, spends most of his waking hours trashing America. (That's not surprising given his campaign slogan.)

Not once have I heard people like my unnamed friend argue that this former president, or other rich white people who share his political views, are "ungrateful" given their prosperity. In fact, that former president maintains strong support from those same conservative whites. Thus, we can reasonably

conclude that financial security is not the real issue behind the "angry Black person" question.

Importantly, the issue isn't even about race per se. How do I know? The people who bristle at "successful" angry Black folks love the perpetually perturbed (and highly successful) Candace Owens. I don't think that there is an angrier successful Black person in America than Ms. Owens. (Maybe Larry Elder?) Thus, being angry and Black — in and of itself isn't the real issue. The real issue is that a substantial percentage of whites are very uncomfortable with Blacks — or even whites — who fight for racial equity.

The fact is that there has never been a time in our history in which most white Americans supported an African American who confronted them about racism. For example, public polls consistently indicated that most white Americans had a negative view of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. at the time of his assassination. Dr. King became a hero to them only after he was no longer a threat to the established racial hierarchy. (I contend that he would be extremely unpopular among conservative whites today if they actually read what he wrote or listened to more than one snippet of one speech.)

When white Christians and/or conservatives complain about America, they perceive themselves to be patriotic." When Black people are angry at America, those same individuals perceive us to be anti-American. They try to transform our righteous indication into "ungratefulness." Those who want LeBron James to just "shut up and dribble" are completely fine with former baseball star Curt Schilling spouting his political views in every medium available.

As civil rights champion Tim Wise has observed, "Fish don't know they're in water until they're removed from it." In other words, white Americans often aren't aware of the privilege in which they swim until they notice people of color backstroking next to them. (Wise, who is white, speaks of the privilege of having grown up in the South with Black teachers and other authority figures.)

Am I an "angry Black man"? Damn right I am! In the words of James Baldwin, "to be (Black) in this country and to be relatively conscious is to be in a state of rage almost all of the time." I cannot witness the ongoing race-based disparities that the overwhelming majority of African Americans endure and be content.

White Americans tend to have an individualistic mindset, which might be simplified as, "I'm alright, so everyone should be alright." African Americans tend to have a collectivist mindset, which can be simplified as, "Others like me are struggling, so we're all struggling." It's the epistemology of Ayn Rand versus the theology of James Cone.

I'll let James Baldwin speak again: "I love America more than any other country in the world and, exactly for that reason, I insist on the right to criticize her perpetually." Being traumatized by that which you love either pulls you in deeply or repels you completely. I may have a right to remain silent, but I have a responsibility to speak.

The cruelty of exploiting vulnerable people for political advantage

(TriceEdneyWire. com) — There is always a new low for Trump Republicans. And that is pretty frightening.

Take the latest exercise in lawlessness, dishonesty and cruelty

from Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis. He chartered a plane to send dozens of mostly Venezuelan asylum seekers from Texas to Martha's Vineyard, an island community off the coast of Cape Cod in Massachusetts. He clearly was gleeful about the idea of sticking it to liberals and gloating about it on rightwing media.

It wasn't even an original idea. Texas Gov. Greg Abbott had already been putting migrants on buses to cities like Washington, D.C., where they have been dropped off in front of Fox News and outside the vice president's residence — a giveaway that the purpose is publicity.

The news of the DeSantis flight made it clear that he was exploiting vulnerable people for his own political advantage. And the more we learn, the worse it gets.

A lawsuit filed on behalf of people deceived into taking the flight says

the migrants were approached in San Antonio by people pretending to offer humanitarian assistance. They were promised that jobs, housing and other assistance were waiting for them if they were willing to get on a plane.

None of it was true. These vulnerable people were reportedly told lies about where they were going and given brochures with false information about help that would be waiting for them. Even worse, they may have unknowingly threatened their asylum claims by making it likely that they would miss court appointments scheduled far from where they had been flown.

DeSantis and his henchmen hadn't contacted government officials or nonprofit organizations in Massachusetts. It was a photo op. It was definitely political. And it was possibly illegal. The sheriff in Bexar County, Texas, has opened a criminal investigation into the false pretenses under which people were lured onto the planes. Alawsuit has been filed on the migrants' behalf.

White House Press Secretary Karine Jean-Pierre slammed DeSantis for "alerting Fox News and not city or state officials about a plan to abandon children fleeing communism," calling it "a cruel, premeditated political stunt."

Of course, it's not the first time that dishonorable politicians have exploited vulnerable people. In fact, racist white Southerners who were resisting segregation in the early 1960s did almost the same thing to Black Americans 60

The Washington Post recently highlighted that history. A group of segregationists organized "Reverse Freedom Rides" in 1962 as retaliation for the Freedom Rides that carried civil rights activists throughout the South in 1961. According to the Post, "The plot was organized by white supremacist Citizens' Councils in Arkansas, who bought radio ads and made fliers advertising the 'opportunity' to African Americans." One Arkansas woman and nine of her children were dropped off on Cape Cod near the Kennedy family's compound because she had been falsely told that Kennedy was going to greet them.

Sounds awfully familiar, doesn't it? Last year, journalist Adam Serwer published a book called "The Cruelty is the Point: The Past, Present, and Future of Trump's America." Serwer has made the point that Trump is a symptom, not the cause, of a cruel streak in American politics. There is a long history of backlash against progress, going back to the post-Reconstruction period in which white supremacists used violence to reverse the enfranchisement of Black people.

DeSantis' scheme to deceive, manipulate and harm vulnerable people seeking asylum in our country is evidence that the cruelty wielded by Trump and embraced by so many of his followers will continue to poison our politics if Trump or DeSantis or someone of their ilk is the Republican presidential nominee in 2024.

Recognizing this truth is important to understanding the work we have ahead of us. We must also recognize that the cruelty in our past and our present is not our whole story.

Our story also includes good people in Hyannis in the 1960s and in Martha's Vineyard this year who responded by mobilizing to welcome and support

We should be outraged at the cruelty displayed by some of our leaders. Let us also be motivated, and optimistic, that we can out-organize and overcome them.

Living in the 6th region of Africa

(TriceEdneyWire.com) — I had the privilege of attending and addressing the All African Diaspora Summit at the University of Cape Coast in Ghana. Convened by Dr. Edward Bush, president of Cosumnes River College, a community college near Sacramento, California, the conference drew more than 400 attendees, many from the

California community college system but others from other colleges and universities in the United States and on the African continent.

The keynote speakers included Dr. Anthony Browder, Dr. Chike Akua and me. We all pushed the envelope in defining education and how it must

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be redefined to respond to the needs of a global African people. As Audre Lorde said, "The master's tools will not dismantle the master's house." In other words, traditional, rote, European education will not empower Black people to embrace our destiny. Conventional wisdom certainly has its place, but another way of considering contemporary education is to reflect on Dr. Carter G. Woodson's declaration that it took him 30 years to get Harvard out of him.

Visiting the African continent is a first step toward considering how conventional education has a brainwashing effect. Connecting ourselves to the African continent is equally essential. That's why I was honored to spend a bit of time with Dr. Ereika Bennett, the founder and CEO of the Diaspora Africa Forum (DAF).

The Africa Union recognizes this organization as the sixth region of Africa. The five established regions of Africa are North, South, East, West and Central Africa. The sixth region is the Diaspora, the collection of 250 million African descendent people who live all over the globe. Thanks to ambassador Bennett (officially recognized as Diasporan ambassador to the Africa Union), the DAF now has a flag and will soon have a national anthem. Bennett has been a tireless advocate for the viability of the African continent and also an advocate for diasporan interests on the continent, including the possibility of dual citizenship (which exists in Ghana), the right of abode and the ability to do business and to invest.

Many African Americans recognize our ancestral roots, but we must do more than that. Dr. Toni Luck, an activist and entrepreneur serving on the DAF board, says that we can support DAF, its efforts to build bridges between the U.S. and the African continent, and educational efforts to support African youth. She suggests that we all need to expand our knowledge of the African continent, both in the past and today, and become advocates for Africa in the


United States.

I agree with her. Even the least conscious person possibly owns a piece of kente cloth, a few cowrie shells or African-inspired clothing. However, when we get past that symbolic sentimentality, we might all ask ourselves what we have done for Africa lately. Wearing African garb on our bodies does not necessarily demonstrate that we are Pan-African people in

I had the privilege of visiting the W.E.B. DuBois Center in Accra, where Dr. DuBois is buried and the DAF house is located. My visit to the DuBois Center, which I visit whenever I am in Ghana, is an opportunity for me to reflect on our roots and our need for re-education. For example, I referred to the buildings at Elmina as "castles," but Dr. Browder reminded me that these should be described more as "dungeons" than castles. Indeed, when I considered the square footage of these odious edifices, most of the space was used to shackle, torture, murder and export our people to the service of global predatory capitalism. Not castles, but dungeons and hell holes. As aware as I think I am, I needed my brother's perspective to remind me that we must always examine the lens through which we view the world and question whose lens we have adopted.

Hundreds of U.S. educators had the opportunity through the Africa Diaspora Education Summit to unpack western education and to consider its dismantling. Carter G. Woodson said it took him 30 years to get Harvard out of him. How long will it take for you to get colonialism out of you? Connecting with the Diaspora Africa Forum (DAF) might help. Achieving health equity begins with empathy

Health inequities due to discrimination, bias and lack of access are preventing many Americans from achieving their best health.

As a Black man and a health care leader in the U.S., this issue is deeply personal for me.

Earlier this year, my mother's hospital pharmacist assumed she

didn't have health coverage for an expensive, lowrisk blood thinner and instead prescribed a risky, more affordable drug that could have killed her.

After the pharmacist substituted an inappropriate medication for my mom, I asked, "Would you prescribe that drug to your mother?" He switched the meds — and his approach. This experience once again showed me true health equity will only take place when we gain full awareness of the problem — and work toward treating all patients with the same care we'd want for our own loved ones.

Sadly, racial and ethnic disparities in health have been the norm in the U.S. for a long time. People of color face disparities in health care and coverage, including disproportionate rates of illness and death during the COVID-19

In Indiana, for example, only 37% of Black people have received COVID-19 vaccinations. Many blame this on vaccine hesitancy, but at the foundation is lack of access to trusted information and resources. In a recent NPR report, Dr. Rhea Boyd, a pediatrician and public health advocate, talked about how the primary barrier to COVID-19 vaccination is access:

"We sometimes blame individual patients or patients of color, like Black folks in particular, for many of their health ailments. ... In this country, one out of five Black adults are unlikely to have a regular provider. They don't have somebody that they go to who they trust for their clinical care."

To build trust, we must create a more inclusive and diverse health care system.


Another way to do this is through clinical trials. Clinical trials help create funding justifications for research to bring forward medical innovations and

breakthroughs that improve the quality of care. More inclusive and diverse clinical trials will help ensure those improvements are for everyone — not just certain populations.

To conduct diverse clinical trials, you need diverse trial participants. And to those who say it's too difficult to find people of color to take part in clinical trials, I say: Where are you looking?

The National Minority Quality Forum has cre-

ated a database using 5 million patient records and



Having this data on hand — and knowing where to target — empowers researchers to drive more representative clinical trials and tangible results.

Indianapolis is the U.S. headquarters for Roche Diagnostics, where more than 3,000 people work together to provide insights that help people manage and improve their health. Health equity in clinical trials is an important area of focus to me and my colleagues. We've set a goal at Roche to achieve broad coverage and access for new diagnostics, supported by inclusive clinical trial design

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Health Department Encourages Flu, **CÔVID-19 Vaccines**

Flu season is here, and the Marion County Public Health Department is offering seasonal flu shots by appointment only at its district health offices and ACTION Health Center.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends the flu vaccine for everyone six months of age and older. A flu shot is especially important for pregnant women, people aged 65 and older, and anyone with certain medical conditions including asthma, diabetes and chronic lung disease.

Flu shots through the health department are \$20 for ages 2 and older, and free for children under the age of 2. Health insurance, as well as Medicare and Medicaid are accepted.

COVID-19 vaccine is also available for free for all eligible ages – 6 months and older – at these locations, by appointment only. To make an appointment for either vaccine, please contact one of these locations directly:

Northeast District Health Office, 6042 E. 21st Street, 317-221-

Northwest District Health Office, 6940 N. Michigan Rd., 317-

South District Health Office - 7551 S. Shelby Street, 317-221-

Eagledale Clinic, 2802 Lafayette Rd., Suite 13, 317-221-7500 ACTION Health Center, 2628 N. Pennsylvania Street, 317-221-

Masks are required for everyone entering one of these clinics. More information about flu shots and other immunizations offered through the Marion County Public Health Department, including the schedule for each district health office, is available at MarionHealth.org/immunize. Questions can also be directed to the health department's Immunization Program at 317-221-2122. CDC recommends getting a flu shot by the end of October, but receiving the vaccine at any point during flu season offers important protection from the virus.

It takes about two weeks after vaccination for antibodies that protect against flu to develop in the body.

In addition to these locations, the Marion County Public Health Department is partnering with the Indianapolis Public Library to host four COVID-19 walk-in vaccination sites.

COVID-19 vaccine is available to anyone age 12 and older at the Indianapolis Public Library's Martindale-Brightwood Branch, 2435 N. Sherman Drive; College Avenue Branch, 4180 N. College Ave.; and East 38th Street Branch, 5420 E. 38th Street, on the same weekly schedule:

Tuesday through Friday, 10 a.m.-3:30 p.m.

Saturday, 10 a.m.-2 p.m.

The health department's mobile unit will visit the Garfield Branch Library, 2502 Shelby Street, to offer COVID-19 vaccine on Fridays from 10 a.m.-2 p.m.

COVID-19 vaccine is free, and no appointment is needed. Face masks are required for visitors while inside library buildings. The health department continues to offer COVID-19 downtown at IndyGo's Carson Transit Center, 201 East Washington Street, weekly Tuesday through Thursday from 10 a.m.-2 p.m. For more information about these COVID -19 vaccine clinics at the four public library locations or the IndyGo transit center,

please call 317-460-5807 or 317-460-9649. COVID-19 vaccines save the body from the risk of fighting this virus unprepared by giving the immune system instructions to recognize and kill the virus if exposed, greatly reducing the risk of serious illness due to the virus.

'Once a sister friend, always a sister friend': Sister Friends Fellowship ends after 20 years of ministry

In August 2002, 30 women gathered at Cornerstone Church of the Living God P.G.T. for the inaugural Sister Friends Fellowship meeting.

The women's ministry began as a place to connect with God and other women, and the ministry's creator, Deirdre Burton, believes she achieved that goal over the past 20 years.

"I really feel like we did as God has commanded," Burton said. "We felt like it was time for us to wrap it up."

After the initial event, Sister Friends Fellowship would have two gatherings annually, every August and December, for the next two decades, but on Aug. 27, the ministry hosted its final meeting.

"It's bittersweet because we have had a wonderful 20 years," said the ministry's secretary, Earlene Harrison

Over the years, the fellowship group would host many community projects, team-bonding retreats, conferences and classes, all filled with laughter, tears, hugs and worship. The Sister Friends Fellowship also awarded more than 500 scholarships to women over 40 going back to school.

Harrison said sharing with the other women what God can do throughout your life strengthened her relationship with God and helped her with her faith walk.

One of the most memorable events for the fellowship group was their trip to Bedford in August 2012. There was a convention at the Salvation Army Hidden Falls Camp and Conference Center that the "sister friends" went to. Harrison enjoyed watching the women zipline, while Burton's favorite memory was when the members walked across a suspension bridge.

"I think just going across there and cheering the other ladies on, I think that was my most memorable event," Burton said. "That truly was a walk of faith."

The final gathering was very emotional, Burton said. There was a slideshow of pictures from over the years, and Burton received a \$1,600 scholarship to help pay the costs of her schooling. They gave away commemorative coffee cups to all the members.

The members participated in their final community project, donating 200 men's and women's deodorant.

"Once a sister friend, always a sister friend," Burton said. "So, although we won't have our gatherings anymore, we're always sister friends. The community continues to live on."

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

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
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How firm is your life's foundation?

"Therefore everyone who hears these words of mine and puts them into practice is like a wise man who built his house on the rock. The rain came down, the streams rose, and the winds blew and beat against that house; yet it did not fall, because it had its foundation on the rock. But everyone who hears these words of mine and does not put them into practice is like a foolish man who built his house on sand. The rain came down, the streams rose, and the winds blew and beat against that house, and it fell with a great crash." - Matthew 7:24-27 NIV



The Pantheon in Rome, a tall domed colonnade religious structure, stands just as it did well over 2,000 years ago. People today tour it without worry

of it crumbling down on them or caving in under them. This would not be possible had its foundation not been right.

Remember "The Three Little Pigs" fairytale? After leaving home to pursue their lives and protect themselves from the big bad world depicted by the big bad wolf, each of them sets out to build their homes. One little pig built his house of straw because it was the easiest thing to do. The second little pig built his house of wood because it seemed to be a stronger substance than straw. The third little pig built his house of brick because it was more durable than either straw or wood. Then the inevitable troubles of the world came tumbling into their lives — the big bad wolf turned down each of their streets. Presenting his challenge, the wolf "huffed and puffed" and blew down the houses that were built of straw and wood, but he could not blow down the house built of brick.

What is depicted in this fairytale, and true of the Pantheon, is also true about our lives. Strength, stability and security of a person's life are predicated upon the durability of the foundation that life is built

What kind of foundation is your house made of? Sand and water, cinderblocks without mortar, different materials that don't fit to-

gether, miscellaneous rocks thrown on a pile? Or poured concrete and top-of-the-line, steel-reinforced concrete blocks with mortar?

Jesus, possibly demonstrating his knowledge of building techniques learned from his father who was a carpenter, uses the imagery of building to picture the life choices one makes: We either hear, listen and follow God's way, or we hear, refuse and go our own way.

The picture is not of two persons who deliberately select foundations, but contrasts how they chose to construct it. One who carefully chooses how it is constructed and properly prepares is depicted as wise. One who carelessly chooses how it is constructed and haphazardly prepares is depicted as foolish.

Each of us fall into one of these two categories. The wise are those who care enough about themselves and their future wanting a firm foundation for their life. The foolish are those who care only about how fine they look regardless of how flakey their life is. Which would you be identified with and called: wise or unwise? There is no in-between.

What foundation are you building your life on? The sayings of Christ, or secular opinion and the wishy-washy worldly values of our culture; calling Jesus "Lord" with your lips, but not living a life for him?

What truly makes a dependable foundation for life? The words of Jesus Christ are a dependable foundation, and obedience to him determines the quality of our foundation. Any foundation apart from Christ and his word will not stand.

Senators push to reform police's cellphone tracking tools

NEW YORK (AP) — Civil rights lawyers and Democratic senators are pushing for legislation that would limit U.S. law enforcement agencies' ability to buy cellphone tracking tools to follow people's whereabouts, including back years in time, and sometimes without a search warrant.

Concerns about police use of the tool known as "Fog Reveal" raised in an investigation by The Associated Press published earlier this month also surfaced in a Federal Trade Commission hearing three weeks ago. Police agencies have been using the platform to search hundreds of billions of records gathered from 250 million mobile devices, and hoover up people's geolocation data to assemble so-called "patterns of life," according to thousands of pages of records about the company.

Sold by Virginia-based Fog Data Science LLC, Fog Reveal has been used since at least 2018 in criminal investigations ranging from the murder of a nurse in Arkansas to tracing the movements of a potential participant in the Jan. 6 insurrection at the Capitol. The tool is rarely, if ever, mentioned in court records, something that defense attorneys say makes it harder for them to properly defend their clients in cases in which the technology was used.

"Americans are increasingly aware that their privacy is evaporating before their eyes, and the real-world implications can be devastating. Today, companies we've all heard of as well as companies we're completely unaware of are collecting troves of data about where we go, what we do, and who we are," said Sen. Ed Markey, a Massachusetts Democrat.

Panelists and members of the public who took part in the FTC hearing also raised concerns about how data generated by popular apps is used for surveillance purposes, or "in some cases, being used to infer identity and cause direct harm to people in the real world, in the physical world and being repurposed for, as was mentioned earlier, law enforcement and national security purposes," said Stacey Gray, a senior director for U.S. programs for the Future of Privacy Forum.

The FTC declined to comment specifically about Fog Reveal.

Matthew Broderick, a Fog managing partner, told AP that local law enforcement was at the front lines of trafficking and missing persons cases, but often fell behind in technology adoption.

"We fill a gap for underfunded and understaffed departments," he said in an email, adding that the company does not have access to people's personal information, nor are search warrants required. The company refused to share information about how many police agencies it works with.

Fog Reveal was developed by two former high-ranking Department of Homeland Security officials under former President George W. Bush. It relies on advertising identification numbers, which Fog officials say are culled from popular cellphone apps such as Waze, Starbucks and hundreds of others that target ads based on a person's movements and interests, according to police emails. That information is then sold to companies like Fog.

Federal oversight of companies like Fog is an evolving legal landscape. Last month, the Federal Trade Commission sued a data broker called Kochava that, like Fog, provides its clients with advertising IDs that authorities say can easily be used to find where a mobile device user lives, which violates rules the commission enforces. And a bill introduced by Sen. Ron Wyden that is now before Congress seeks to regulate the way government agencies can obtain data from data brokers and other private companies, at a time when privacy advocates worry location tracking could be put to other novel uses, such as keeping tabs on people who seek abortions in states where it is now illegal.

"It wasn't long ago that it would take high-tech equipment or a dedicated group of agents to track a person's movements around the clock. Now, it just takes a few thousand dollars and the willingness to get in bed with shady data brokers," said Wyden, an Oregon Democrat. "It is an outrage that data brokers are selling detailed location data to law enforcement agencies around the country — including in states that have made personal reproductive health decisions into serious crimes."

Because of the secrecy surrounding Fog, there are scant details about its use. Most law enforcement agencies won't discuss it, raising concerns among privacy advocates that it violates the Fourth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which protects against unreasonable search and seizure.

Advocates on both sides of the aisle should be concerned about unrestricted government use of Fog Reveal, said former Virginia Republican Rep. Bob Goodlatte, who previously served as U.S. House Judiciary Chairman.

"Fog Reveal is easily de-anonymized tracking of Americans' daily movements and location histories. Where we go can say a lot about who we are, who we associate with, and even what we believe or how we worship," said Goodlatte, who now works as a senior policy advisor to the Project for Privacy and Surveillance Accountability. "The current political climate means that this technology could be used against people left, right and center. Everyone has a stake in curbing this technology."

The New York Police Department used Fog Reveal at its Real Time Crime Center in 2018 and 2019, a previously undisclosed relationship confirmed by public records. A spokesperson said in an emailed statement that the NYPD used Fog on a trial basis, "strictly in the interest of developing leads for criminal investigations and lifesaving operations such as missing persons." The department did not say if it was successful in either scenario.

Two nonprofits that have supported privacy rights cases in New York City said the tool exploited consumers' personal data and was "ripe for abuse," according to Surveillance Technology Oversight Project Executive Director Albert Fox Cahn.

"The lack of any meaningful regulation on the collection and sale of app data is both a consumer and privacy crisis," Legal Aid Society Staff Attorney Benjamin Burger wrote in a recent post. "Both federal and state governments need to develop policies that will protect consumer data."

NFL ends Pro Bowl; skills competitions, flag game instead

The Pro Bowl got a major makeover.

The NFL has eliminated its full-contact all-star game and is replacing it with weeklong skills competitions and a flag football game.

The new event will be renamed "The Pro Bowl Games" and will feature AFC and NFC players showcasing their football and non-football skills in challenges over several days.

The 2023 Games will be held in Las Vegas, and the flag football game at Allegiant Stadium is Feb. 5. That is one week before the Super Bowl in Arizona.

"Maybe a different format could bring a little juice, a little more energy," said New Orleans Saints running back Mark Ingram, a three-time Pro Bowl participant.

Peyton Manning and his Omaha Productions company will help shape programming and promote the event's content throughout the week. Manning, a 14time Pro Bowl pick during his Hall of Fame career, will provide his perspective and will also be a part of the coaching staff for flag game.

"The Pro Bowl is something that we've been looking at for a while, really continuing to evolve," NFL executive Peter O'Reilly told The Associated Press. "Coming out of last year's game, we really made the decision based on a lot of internal conversations, getting feedback from GMs and coaches, getting a lot of feedback from players. We think there's a real opportunity to do something wholly different here and move away from the traditional tackle football game. We decided the goal is to celebrate 88 of the biggest stars in the NFL in a really positive, fun, yet competi-

"The feedback very directly from guys who had been in the Pro Bowl recently was to keep the construct of the week, make sure you're having that multi-day element. It was overwhelmingly positive both from players as well as from clubs."

The Pro Bowl debuted in January 1951 in Los Angeles and stayed there for 21 seasons before the game moved to different cities from 1972-80.

Hawaii hosted from 1980-2009, and the game has



had several homes Miami, Phoenix, in the years since, including Orlando and Las Vegas.

"The game was kind of silly, I guess," Saints twotime Pro Bowl offensive lineman Ryan Ramczyk said. "Guys weren't out there playing true football. Hopefully, there'll be a lot of interactions with the fans and guys will get their opportunity to go out there and show some skills. I could see that being a good change."

Quality of play in the Pro Bowl has often been criticized. Players, understandably concerned about getting hurt, treat it as an exhibition more than competition. A flag football game could increase competition while avoiding potential injuries resulting from tackling, blocking and hitting.

"You definitely don't want to get hurt," Ingram said. "It's an all-star game, essentially, and you want to put on a good product for the fans and for yourself but at the same time, the season is over for you, essentially. You don't want to be going into an offseason or into a contract year and getting hurt in a Pro Bowl game."

The NFL has a major interest in flag football. The league partnered with the International Federation of American Football to bring flag football to The World Games in July with an eye on the 2028 Olympics in Los Angeles.

"You tap into all the stuff that feels great about Pro Bowl week, the skills, the helmets off, the engagement and then culminate that, keeping the AFC-NFC construct, in something that's really important,

which is flag football and that opportunity to have the best athletes in the NFL out there playing this game that is so much about the future of our sport," said O'Reilly, the league's executive vice president, club business and league events. "It's been an evolution, but coming out of Las Vegas last year, we really focused on how do we reinvent and celebrate our all-stars even better."

Manning has always been an advocate for the Pro Bowl and supported it when the league considered drastic changes a decade ago.

"The Pro Bowl has always been a time to step back and celebrate the game of football with teammates, fans and family," Manning told the AP. "I'm thankful I can continue to be part of the week as all of us at Omaha Productions work with the NFL to reimagine The Pro Bowl Games. Making Sunday's game a flag football game is great to see. Youth football has been extremely important to me, and knowing NFL FLAG will help grow this sport, I hope boys and girls can see themselves playing the same game as the best players in the world."

Fan voting will still help determine the AFC and NFC team rosters. Tom Brady has the most invitations to the Pro Bowl with 15. Four players got 14 invites, including Manning. The East-West Shrine Bowl will be held at Allegiant Stadium on Feb. 2.
