City announces 2nd round of grants to address violence

Fifty organizations will receive more than \$8.6 million in grants to address root causes of violent crime by investing in mental health resources and youth empowerment programs, city officials announced Oct. 6.

The second round of funding from the Elevation Grant Program, previously known as the Violent Crime Reduction Grant Program, will award grants to local grassroots organizations led by community members, Mayor Joe Hogsett said at a press conference with Indianapolis Foundation, an affiliate of Central Indiana Community Foundation.

"These grants are a demonstration of the city's belief that nobody knows a neighborhood better than the neighbors themselves," Hogsett said.

The city will invest \$45 million over the next three years to continue to address violent crime through the grant program, Hogsett said.

The grant program is a part of Hogsett's Violence Reduction Plan and will invest \$150

Starting in January 2023 students at Martin University can expect a 45% decrease in undergraduate tuition and a 42% decrease in graduate tuition, along with the potential to have up to \$10,000 from their previous account balance forgiven.

The university announced its Reset to Reemerge Campaign on Oct. 6 with the goal of making education more accessible and affordable.

"These new, lower tuition rates means that if an undergraduate student was eligible to receive Federal Pell Grants and other financial aid offers by the state of Indiana, they could complete their degree at Martin University debt-free," Martin University President Dr. Sean Huddleston said at a press conference.

The new tuition plan will allow students at the university to take between 12 and 18 credit hours

at a flat rate.

"Our new rates will position our university as one of the most affordable and one of the best values in higher education in the state of Indiana," Huddleston said.

Students who attended Martin University for two consecutive years prior to 2020 and have an account balance may qualify for the Pathways to Completion Initiative, which can forgive their past account balance. For more information, email admissions@martin.edu or call 317-917-3308

In the past, Martin University revamped its Prior Learning Assessment Program, which offers students college credit outside of the classroom through training programs, independent study and community service.

Biden administration launches environmental justice office

WARRENTON, N.C. (AP) — President Joe Biden's top environment official visited what is widely considered the birthplace of the environmental justice movement in September to unveil a national office that will distribute \$3 billion in block grants to underserved communities burdened by pollution.

Forty years after a predominantly Black community in Warren County, North Carolina, rallied against hosting a hazardous waste landfill, Michael Regan, the first Black man to serve as administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency, announced he is dedicating a new senior level of leadership to the environmental justice movement they ignited.

The Office of Environmental Justice and External Civil Rights — comprised of more than 200 current staff members in 10 U.S. regions — will merge three existing EPA programs to oversee a portion of Democrats' \$60

The community has ideas to redevelop the old Indiana Women's Prison — if they can get the state to listen

The Indiana Women's Prison site on Indianapolis' east side is a large property ripe for redevelopment. Community members are excited by future prospects, but they say a lack of communication with the state — which owns the property — is discouraging. With no word on plans, it's not clear what will happen to the site of the first public prison for women.

A creek flows under the Woodruff Place Baptist Church. It helps cool the early 1900's building on the near east side of Indianapolis. Residents have discovered the creek also flows through another historical site just a few blocks away: the now-abandoned Indiana Women's Prison.

When the wrecking crews showed up and buildings started coming down, residents had questions.

"Are they going to tear down all the buildings? Are they going to tear down some of the buildings?" Newsom said. "And then as the demolition continued, the place — the whole property — became more and more ransacked."

Joey Newsom lives across the street from the old prison and is part of an advocacy group trying to engage the state in discussions about the future of the 15-acre site. The property is owned by the state of Indiana after nearly 140 years as a prison.

A recent meeting was one of the first for community members excited about the future of the women's prison site. Melissa Benton is one of those neighbors.

"You can't deny the fact that having a prison in the middle of this urban neighborhood has been a barrier to redevelopment, and that we really strongly believe that the people who have

IPS school board candidates chat with parents and community members during public forum

Three candidates for the **Indianapolis Public Schools** board discussed school funding, student safety and the district's expansive reorganization plan during a forum Oct. 6 at KIPP Indy Legacy High.

Ahead of school board elections in November, candidates Hope Hampton (District 3), Kristen Phair (District 3) and Angelia Moore (at-large) met with parents and community members in the lunchroom to discuss issues presented by IPS students, parents and staff members. Nicole Carey (District 5) was invited but did not attend the forum, which was hosted by education group RISE Indy and neighborhood nonprofit Edna Martin Christian Center.


IndyStar Public Engagement Editor Oseye Boyd was the moderator. Approximately 115 IPS families and community members decided on the discussion topics through a survey ahead of the forum, Boyd said.

On the topic of the Rebuilding Stronger plan, all three candidates said as it stands now, they would vote no on the plan, which would include grade reconfiguration and some schools closing or merging. The board is expected to vote on the plan this fall.

Moore said there hasn't been enough research on the programs the plan intends to expand and that it must have positive outcomes for all students able to enroll before she would support it.

Phair said it was disrespectful to not bring the parents

in on this discussion in the first place. She said she knows people are anxious about the budget and how expensive the plan would be, and that it didn't make sense to go forward without enough parent

Candidates also discussed recruiting and retaining staff and programming that reflects schools' growing demographics and meets the needs of schools' bilingual students.

Hampton said the demographics within IPS schools are changing, and it's important that IPS reflects that more not only with bilingual teachers but Latino teachers and Native speakers.

"We shouldn't have to go looking for our language in paperwork," Hampton said. 'It should be dual language material, dual language on the website, dual language on the phone, and it should be easy to access."

Moore and Phair said engag-

in both English and Spanish in schools, that is not the job." and out of schools will make a big difference in how welcomed they feel.

A young IPS student asked candidates what they planned to do about securing students' academic, mental, emotional and social well-being in schools following the aftermath of the pandemic.

Phair said many of the schools within IPS are disproportionately funded and those that lack funding also lack wrap-around services for

Hampton said teachers cannot do everything by themselves. She said accountability for board members and partnering with outside organizations to make sure the needs of the students are met should be a priority.

"Teachers are supposed to be teaching," Hampton said, "and though we want caring teachers and we want our children

An IPS staff member and teacher asked about safety in the building and on the way to and from school. School safety, Phair said,

can take two forms: the scary things that could happen to kids at school and students' personal comfort in schools. Phair said investing in safety technology would help get alerts out sooner and take care of the kids more quickly.

"The other safety that I'm thinking of when it comes to our schools is how safe our children feel being in their own skin and their own bodies as they walk through the halls at school," Phair said.

With the possibility of schools closing, an IPS parent asked how candidates plan to ensure Black and brown families would have access to high-quality education in their neighborhoods.

"I think one of the most

important things we need to understand is that quality education is quite simple to define," Moore said. "It is a seat in a school that believes in the child that sits in that seat, that encourages that child to be their very best and has the resources they need to do that."

Quality seats should look the same in all neighborhood schools, Moore said. If the schools are unable to close the achievement gap, Moore said they're doing something wrong and should come back and reevaluate.

In-person voting will take place on Election Day, Nov. 8. Early voting begins Oct. 12 and the deadline for voting by mail is Oct. 27. The voter registration deadline is Oct. 11.

IUPUI's Center for Africana Studies launched new series with A'Lelia Bundles

The IUPUI Center for Africana Studies and Culture introduced a new webinar, "In Conversation with A'Lelia Bundles: Critical Discussion Series," on Oct. 5.

Bundles, the great-great-grand-daughter of Madam C.J. Walker and founder of the Madam Walker Family Archives, joined three other panelists to analyze how Black Midwesterners are portrayed in pop culture. The panelists were author Tamara Winfrey-Harris, NPR TV critic Eric Deggans, and artist and curator Mariah Ivey. Joseph Tucker Edmonds, associate professor of Africana studies, was the moderator.

Panelists talked about how the Black Midwest is often overlooked in conversations that involve popular culture, although the region has produced many successful people, movements, films and trends.

"If you don't see the Black Midwest, you cannot see America," Winfrey-

Harris said

Indianapolis native Kenneth Brian Edmonds, known as Babyface, is a singer and songwriter; Toni Morrison is an Ohio native and author; Michael Jackson is an Indiana native. These individuals represent just a few of the Black Midwesterners panelists spoke about.

During the conversation, some panelists noticed a trend: Most successful Black Midwesterners leave the Midwest and migrate to different cities to pursue their careers.


Ivey explained there's this idea of moving and taking things elsewhere because Black people must create their own spaces living in the Midwest, while in other places those spaces for Black creatives are already there.

"This is going to spark something in people to know that your stories are important," Bundles said.

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

to the neighborhood and said, 'We want to put this criminal justice campus here. What do you guys think?"

The community decided against that plan, and the redevelopment that's moving forward touches a variety of neighborhood needs.

The state has hired a community engagement consultant, but many community members doubt whether thoughtful engagement will really happen — or if the outreach is just another box to be checked off.

"We're the ones that are impacted by what happens at the site. What's happening now with the way the building is what's going to happen in the future, not the state, right? The state doesn't live here," Benton said. "But nobody's listening to us."

More than a century of history

Benton has a personal interest in the site. She was formerly incarcerated at the women's prison. So was Michelle Daniel Jones. Jones helped rehab. build and maintain spaces for the community. She had many ideas for reuse, but now several buildings are mountains of rubble. Jones said it seems nothing special will be done to remember the significance of the site that was home to the nation's first women's prison.

"I think about all of the women who were incarcerated in that place from 1873 to when we left in 2010," Jones said. "I feel deeply that we should have some consideration of what possibly becomes of that space, because that land is soaked with the labor, blood, sweat, and tears of thousands of women."

Jones said the women had a history of work progress at the prison. Community projects included restoration of the chapel built in the 1930's.

"The women did all that labor to rehabilitate that building. Just like the women did all the work to, you know, to outfit the industrial building now that sits in rubble over there," Jones said.

Identifying priorities

The entire Near Eastside is undergoing rapid change. With that change is a tug of war between community wants and economic demands.

A consultant for the state has said there will be a request for ideas, but that hasn't happened yet. They could also just sell the site and be done with it.

What many neighbors do not want to see is \$500,000 condos, which can add to gentrification and displacement.

Recently, the advocacy groups presented a list of priorities to the state Department of Administrations, which has control of the site. The list of suggested priorities includes recognition of the site's importance, the development of a communitybacked master plan, and securing the site so possible historic preservation doesn't become a moot point.

The prison site is in City-County Councilor Zach Adamson's district. He's tried to meet with state officials to discuss the site to no avail.

"It's in a neighborhood

that they have really sort of abandoned a long time ago, but this is our home,"

he said.

Adamson urged community members to continue to work for what they want, but understands the frustration of feeling like no one is listening.

"They take the talking points that the community gives, and they give them back to the state. What they do with them after that — they probably go right into the garbage. We have no idea," Adamson said.

He said the community engagement piece can work to improve the neighborhood and the city.

"But that should have happened over the last two years. And if we don't have a state use for this property now, there doesn't exist one," he said. "But we shouldn't be trying to create a state use, just to avoid letting progressive development in this area."

The Department of Administration says it has communicated with members of the neighborhood and listened to the concerns regarding clean-up of the site. Demolition for the rest of the buildings is on hold for now.

billion investment in environmental justice initiatives created by the Inflation Reduction Act. The president will nominate an assistant administrator to lead the new office, pending Senate confirmation.

"In the past, many of our communities have had to compete for very small grants because EPA's pot of money was extremely small," Regan said in an interview. "We're going from tens of thousands of dollars to developing and designing a program that will distribute billions. But we're also going to be sure that this money goes to those who need it the most and those who've never had a seat at the table."

Biden has championed environmental justice as a centerpiece of his climate agenda since his first week in office, when he signed an executive order pledging 40% of the overall benefits from certain federal clean energy investments to disadvantaged communities overwhelmed by pollution.

Now, Regan said, this new office intertwines environmental justice with the central fabric of the EPA, equating it to other top offices like air and water, and cementing its principles in a way that will outlive the administration.

North Carolina in 1978 designated Warren County, a small, predominantly Black farming community along the Virginia border, as a disposal site for truckloads of soil laced with highly carcinogenic chemical compounds that later contaminated the water supply.

As the first trucks rolled into town in 1982, hundreds of residents flooded the streets, blocking their path to the landfill. Though they were unable to shut down the operation after six weeks of nonviolent protests and more than 500 arrests, their efforts have been lauded by civil rights leaders as the impetus for a global uprising against environmental racism in minority communities.

Wayne Moseley, 73, was one of the initial protesters arrested on the first day of the demonstration. The Raleigh resident commuted to Warren County to march on behalf of his mother, whose health prevented her from participating. He called the ceremony "a homecoming" for himself and many other protesters he hadn't seen for 40 years.

"We became a family, no Black or white, no rich or poor — we were all one," Moseley said. "The state was hellbent on putting that dump site here. I knew we couldn't stop it, but we could elevate the consciousness of not only the state but the nation."

Dollie Burwell, a protest leader known in the community as "the mother of the movement," honored the bravery of her late daughter Kimberly Burwell, who was only 8 years old when she joined her mother on the frontlines.

was not afraid of being arrested. But she was afraid of her family and friends getting cancer" from carcinogenic compounds in the soil.

Government officials have routinely targeted low-income communities of color like Warren County to host hazardous waste facilities since the early 1900s. And the neglect of critical infrastructure in predominantly Black communities, ranging from Flint, Michigan, to Jackson, Mississippi, has led to problems still seen today.

An April study by the University of California, Berkeley and Columbia University found that the majority of Black and Latino neighborhoods that received low scores in a discriminatory federal housing program known as redlining were home to twice as many oil wells as majority white communities. According to the Clean Air Task Force, Black Americans are 75% more likely than white Americans to live near a factory or plant and nearly four times as likely to die from exposure to pollutants.

The Rev. Dr. William Barber II, a prominent social activist and leader of the Poor People's campaign, said he sees Regan's announcement as "a great starting point" and will continue to demand more of the Biden administration.

"Our votes are not support. Our votes are our demands," Barber said in an interview. "This is not about right versus left, it's about right versus wrong. This is about a lifestyle versus disability because when you poison the land and the water, you hurt people's everyday life."

Regan, who is from Goldsboro, North Carolina, said he grew up listening to local civil rights leaders like Barber and Burwell — the early inspirations for his work at the EPA.

"I'm taking all of these experiences (from my childhood) and matching that with the vision of the president," Regan said. "We're using this opportunity to not only honor those who came before us, but we're building on the work that they started. We're standing on their shoulders and trying to reach higher heights."

Regan is among several Cabinet members visiting North Carolina this month to promote the president's achievements, including the visits of Vice President Kamala Harris on Sept. 1 and Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen next Tuesday in Durham. Democrats have set their sights on the Southern swing state as a potential pickup in the narrowly divided U.S. Senate and other key offices.

Biden pardons thousands for 'simple possession' of marijuana

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Joe Biden is pardoning thousands of Americans convicted of "simple possession" of marijuana under federal law, as his administration takes a dramatic step toward decriminalizing the drug and addressing charging practices that disproportionately impact people of color.

Biden's move also covers thousands convicted of the crime in the District of Columbia. He is also calling on governors to issue similar pardons for those convicted of state marijuana offenses, which reflect the vast majority of marijuana possession cases.

Biden, in a statement, said the move reflects his position that "no one should be in jail just for using or possessing marijuana."

"Too many lives have been upended because of our failed approach to marijuana," he added. "It's time that we right these wrongs."

According to the White House, no one is currently in federal prison solely for "simple possession" of the drug, but the pardon could help thousands overcome obstacles to renting a home or finding a job.

"There are thousands of people who have prior Federal convictions for marijuana possession, who may be denied employment, housing, or educational opportunities as a result," he said. "My action will help relieve the collateral consequences arising from these convictions."

The pardon does not cover convictions for possession of other drugs, or for charges relating to producing or possessing marijuana with an intent

to distribute. Biden is also not pardoning non-citizens who were in the U.S. without legal status at the time of their arrest

The announcement marks Biden's reckoning with the impact of 1994 crime legislation, which he supported, that increased arrest and incarceration rates for drug crimes, particularly for Black and Latino people.

The Department of Justice is working to devise a process for those covered by Biden's pardon to receive a certificate of pardon, which they can show to potential employers and others as needed.

"The Justice Department will expeditiously administer the President's proclamation, which pardons individuals who engaged in simple possession of marijuana, restoring political, civil, and other rights to those convicted of that offense," the department said in a statement. "In coming days, the Office of the Pardon Attorney will begin implementing a process to provide impacted individuals with certificates of pardon."

Biden is also directing the secretary of Health and Human Services and the U.S. attorney general to review how marijuana is scheduled under federal law. Rescheduling the drug would reduce or potentially eliminate criminal penalties for possession. Marijuana is currently classified as a Schedule I drug, alongside heroin and LSD, but ahead of fentanyl and methamphetamine. The White House did not set a timeline for the review.

But Biden said he believes that as the federal government and many states ease marijuana laws, they should maintain limitations on trafficking, marketing and underage sales.

million from the American Rescue Plan in policing technology, additional professional and civilian positions with Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department, IMPD positions, mental health resources and addressing root causes of violence through grassroot organizations.

Howard Stevenson III said poverty is one root cause of violence that his project, Project Free University, works to address. Project Free University, part of Community Alliance of the Far Eastside, focuses on providing education in financial literacy and entrepreneurship to close the wealth gap and reduce the stress that people in poverty face. The project offers courses including budgeting and planning, understanding credit and paying for higher education. With more than \$230,000 from the grant, Stevenson said the project will be able to better educate mentors and expand the program.

City-county Councilor Keith Graves said it is important to invest in organizations involved directly with community members, especially ones such as Project Free University that work to "break the cycle of poverty and reduce financial insecurity."

"We must look to free ourselves not only from the signs and symptoms of violence but from its human costs," Graves said. "And my hope is that these agencies and these grants help us further our collective effort to ensure that Indianapolis is a safe, welcoming, inclusive and equitable city."

Indianapolis Symphonic Choir's "Mood Indigo" to return for 2 special performances

The Indianapolis Symphonic Choir is bringing back an old favorite, "Mood Indigo," for one night only.

Indiana Landmarks is set to host the Indianapolis Symphonic Choir for its special concert Oct. 15 at 2:30 p.m. and 6 p.m. "Mood Indigo" — named after a jazz song by Duke Ellington — started around 15 years ago with the goal of bringing together popular songs the choir rarely gets to perform, said Eric Stark, creative director for the Indianapolis Symphonic Choir.

"The Indianapolis Symphonic Choir is most known for performing major works for chorus, like Handel's 'Messiah' or the ninth symphony of Beethoven," Stark said. "It's just a lot of fun because we're doing music kind of all over the map," he said. "It's stuff that we all love, I love, the singers all enjoy it, my assistant conductor Dr. Michael Davis ... it's some of our very favorite things and we just don't get to do them very often."

This concert will be a smaller choral performance, with only about 30 singers, a few musicians and a special guest soloist, Everett Greene, a renowned jazz singer and Indianapolis resident.

Greene, who's been singing and performing in the jazz scene for about 70 years, said this isn't the first time he's performed with the Indianapolis Symphonic Choir, and each time they invite him to perform with them, he's happy to do it.

"They're just a marvelous group and everybody enjoys what they're doing, and that's one of the things that I like about it," Greene said. "They're doing the majority of the music, but I'm having the most fun."

Although Ellington's "Mood Indigo" was about feeling blue, Greene said there won't be a single "blue person" in the audience as the mix of music in the show will be lively and upbeat.


"What I do is I have my fun and hopefully it'll rub off on the person who's listening," he said. "If I can see a smile on their face from what I'm doing, that makes me happier."

Using the N-word

It is easy to find daily examples of white people complaining that they can't use the so-called "N-word." I'm not referring to overt racists who take great pleasure in uttering that particular epithet. Neither am I referring to people — famous or unknown who get caught saying the word

and then offer the obligatory faux apology: "I'm sorry if anyone was offended ..." (Using passive voice is nearly obligatory.)

I'm referring to people who feel compelled to raise this issue while in social settings or in online discussions. They express, in varying degrees of consternation, how "unfair" it is that Black people "get to use" that word, but "white people are called 'racist' when we do." They will usually refer to rappers using that word liberally in their songs and then offer the accusation that Black people are "hypocrites" or even are "the real racists."

I find this phenomenon to be endlessly fascinating from a psychological perspective. One has to wonder about the mental and emotional state of people who lament that they lack the social cover to make offensive remarks without receiving backlash. The fact that so many (though obviously not all) white people get upset regarding the repercussions of using the "N-word" speaks to the eroding of white privilege. While the loss of that privilege is welcome and necessary for a healthy democracy, I believe that it often does result in a genuinely difficult shift in mindset.

At the same time, I will offer a necessary counterpoint. Specifically, I have not encountered this phenomenon vis-à-vis other groups of people who historically have enjoyed the upper hand in an unequal power relationship.

For example, as a man I can't imagine being upset that I'm prohibited from using the "B-word" when referring to women, whereas women are able to do so (playfully or otherwise) if they so choose. Indeed, I haven't come across any men who have expressed disappointment at not being afforded the latitude that women have in using that word. If I ever do, I'll quickly admonish them to get over it.

Similarly, as a heterosexual man, I've never been envious of the fact that gay men have license to call each other names that have historically been used to degrade and dehumanize them. I can only assume that they have much the same feeling as do Black folks who call each other the N-word. In other words, gay men are free to engage in linguistic jujitsu to disarm words that originated as slurs against them.

Further, while it's important to avoid engaging in false equivalency, I will hasten to add that straight white men have the right to use among themselves words that are intended to mock or degrade them. And, again, I haven't come across women or people of color who are upset about that. We simply do not

It should not be difficult to understand, or to accept, that members of groups that have been discriminated against for hundreds or thousands of years get to decide what is appropriate when they refer to themselves or to each other.

To be clear, not all African Americans use the N-word. Indeed, for a variety of reasons, many are assertively against its use — by anyone. In particular, they argue that Black folks should not use a word that is so closely associated with slavery, domestic terrorism, segregation and other forms of racial discrimination and violence. They believe that the use of that word among us is tantamount to psychological acceptance of second-class citizenship and even reduced humanity.

While I am very sympathetic to this view, it seems to me that the more we push to have that word essentially removed from the English language, the more we unintentionally bolster racists who understand how hurtful it can be. Without a counterbalance (albeit a problematic one), we surrender all our power to people who will continue to use that word as a blunt instrument against us.

To employ Black vernacular speech to this subject, if a white person "feels some kind of way" about being barred from using this word, he/she really needs to be deeply introspective and ask why that is the case. They should especially be on guard for reflexively responding "I'm not a racist" when defending obviously racist behavior. Being envious of Black folks' ability to linguistically, culturally, and psychologically remix bigotry in a way that empowers us is not a sign of solidarity; it is a sign of sickness.

If they're like me and a lot of other writers I know, they sit down at the computer and stare at Twitter until the "I really need to get this done" dread weighs too heavily. Then it's just eight

more minutes of Twitter and we're back to that Word doc.

Good ideas probably have a lot to do with life experience, too. I'm 27, married, but that's pretty much it. I didn't have a grand revelation in another country or go through something so traumatic that it opened my eyes to a new way of seeing the world. And life experience probably doesn't have to be on either extreme to be useful. I haven't raised kids or even repaired a lawn mower.

You might think these columnists have the easiest job in journalism. Who doesn't have a bunch of stuff stored in their brain that they can't wait to tell you about? But you're definitely confusing "columnist" with "someone who rants on social media." Go ahead, scroll Facebook and look at the unhinged opinions of your friends and family. I don't think any of them used an outline first or called a littleknown government agency to make sure their heroic, 135-word post with 32 misspellings and a grainy photo had the facts straight.

This is harder than you think. It's harder than I thought.

If you're not convinced, give it a try yourself. I'm sure a lot of you can do it, honestly, but consider the time commitment. Consider also the other crucial element of a columnist's job: fielding your tweets and voicemails and emails — usually 135 words with 32 misspellings.

Personally, I don't care if you're not all elegant writers because columnists probably aren't very good at whatever it is you do.

And this brings me to my final point, which seems counterintuitive to everything else I have said. The job can be difficult, but columnists — like everyone else in the world — aren't that special. They're just people, which means sometimes they're flat wrong. Tell them that; I don't care. We've all signed up for criticism by attaching our name to the work

Black wombs matter: See 'Aftershock'

(TriceEdneyWire.com) — Did you know that Black women are three or four times more likely to die from childbirth complications than white women? Congresswoman Robin Kelly (D-IL), who heads the Congressional Black Caucus Health Braintrust, says the data is direr depending

on where a mother lives.

In Illinois, Black women are six times as likely to die. In New York, Black women are 10 times as likely to die. And it's not just Black women. With a significant Indigenous population in Washington, those women are eight times as likely to die as white

The issue of Black maternal health care is tackled in the film "Aftershock," which can be seen on Hulu.

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Produced by Tonya Lewis Lee and Paula Eiselt, the film features families directly and painfully impacted by how Black women are treated as they deliver children. The Congressional Black Caucus Annual Legislative Forum featured several Braintrust meetings on health, including one titled "Creating Maternal Health Care Systems that Believe and Protect Black Women." It featured clips from "Aftershock" and included panelists affected by the Black maternal health crisis.

Shawnee Benton Gibson, whose daughter Shamony Makeba Gibson died from complications from childbirth only 13 days after she gave birth to her son. She complained of pain, shortness of breath and more, but health care providers told her these were "natural" childbirth symptoms. She was only rushed to the hospital to die when she could not move. Later, it was shown that health care providers ignored vital signs of her increasingly poor health. She died from medical indifference and incompetence.

Also featured in the film were Omari Maynard, Shamony's partner who is now raising two children alone, and Bruce McIntyre III, whose partner, Amber Rose Isaac, died after an emergency C-section. He says her death is the result of "medical negligence" and has joined several others in shining light on this pandemic of Black maternal health.

"Aftershock" lifts the importance of doulas (pregnancy coaches and advocates) and midwives, an essential part of maternal health. It also looks at the criminalization of midwives and those who eschew traditional birthing. Some midwives have been criminally prosecuted for bringing healthy babies into the world.

The film also highlights the racist origins of the OB/GYN medical specialty. Developed by a sadist white physician, James Marion Sims, the specialty has its roots in experiments on enslaved Black women. Indeed, the lie that Black people can withstand enormous pain is rooted in enslavement and the brutal way Black women were experimented on.

Because Sims believed Black women could stand all kinds of pain, he conducted painful experiments without anesthesia. Really? Yet some medical professionals continue to laud his work, and until 2018 a statue celebrating him was part of New York's Central Park. His defenders say he was just a product of his times, but it is clear that he not only experimented on enslaved women that he owned but also purchased women to experiment on them. I reject the notion that Sims was a product of his times. He was a sadistic brute who denied Black women's very humanity.

Congresswoman Lauren Underwood (D-Ill), the youngest member of the Congressional Black Caucus, has introduced the Black Maternal Health Momnibus Act, an essential step toward eliminating the treatment Black women experience as they give birth. A 12-part comprehensive piece of legislation, the act includes expansion of mental health services for mothers, telehealth for new moms, increased data collection and funding for community-based organizations working on maternal health issues. Supported by more than 250 organizations, including the American Nurses Association, the Association of Black Women Physicians, the Center for American Progress, the Children's Defense Fund, Families USA, the NAACP and others, the legislation has more than 30 congressional co-sponsors. The legislation has yet to pass the House of Representatives, and it is unlikely to pass the parsimonious Senate. People can get involved by reminding their legislative representatives of the importance of this Momnibus Act.

Shawnee Benton Gibson, Shomany's mom, said that if Black lives matter, then Black wombs must also matter. She has turned the pain of her daughter's death into powerful advocacy for Black maternal health. She is among the many, including Congresswomen Robin Kelly, Lauren Underwood and many others, who must be applauded for addressing this issue. Black wombs matter. Watch "Aftershock"!



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

When cancer screenings are free but follow-ups aren't, patients foot the bill

If you've gotten a free cancer screening in the past decade, you likely have Dr. Mark Fendrick to thank. Fendrick is an internist and director of the Center for Value-Based Insurance Design at the University of Michigan.

"I have to tell you that the intuitive idea of having more of the good stuff in health care and less of the bad stuff, did seem to be pretty well-received," he said of the 15 years he's spent pushing state and federal policymakers to see the benefits of health care screenings — and to pay for them.

Fendrick helped design a popular part of the Affordable Care Act that made nearly 100 preventive care services free, including screenings for some of America's deadliest cancers: lung, cervical, colorectal and breast cancer.

Before the ACA, people with private insurance could spend \$600 on average for colonoscopies that screened for colorectal cancer. The free screenings represented a huge step forward.

But by 2016, Fendrick began to see a major flaw in the part of Obamacare he helped write.

Only the first screening tests — in the case of colorectal cancer, it could be an inexpensive at-home test — were paid for.

To actually diagnose cancer, most patients need follow-up tests. Research shows these secondary tests for lung, colorectal, breast and lung cancer can cost on average between \$100 and \$400 out-of-pocket.

"The emotional toll of being told that your first test is positive and you may have cancer is huge. Add on top of that a financial burden that might put you in dire straits, leading you to give up on food, rent or gas," Fendrick said. "This infuriates me."

Fendrick thought regulators and health insurers had distorted the original intent of the preventive care provision, which was to make the entire diagnostic process free, so he started rounding up his Affordable Care Act allies to see what a fix could look like.

Reducing disparities by covering followup screenings

Around the same time, in Oregon, advocates for colorectal cancer had been working to change state policy to make follow-up colonoscopies free to patients.

Gloria Coronado, an epidemiologist at Kaiser Permanente Center for Health Research, studies disparities in colorectal cancer screening.

Shortly after the ACA passed in 2010, she was encouraging community health centers in Oregon to recommend easier at-home screening tests. Clinicians hesitated to promote testing because of expensive follow-up tests for low-income patients.

Coronado brought this problem to an influential Oregon lawmaker, who led the effort to update state law in 2014 to require both Medicaid and some private insurance plans to make follow-up colonoscopies free for patients.

In 2017, three years after

Oregon's new law, the 40% disparity in colorectal screenings between Medicaid patients and people with private insurance vanished. Data also showed the state's community health centers, which serve some of the state's poorest patients, were doing more of these screenings than their peers in neighboring states. Eight states soon passed similar laws.

By 2021, federal screening guidelines were updated to include follow-up colonoscopies. That laid the groundwork for regulators to start forcing private insurance companies to cover these tests for colorectal cancer this year. Medicare is expected to follow suit beginning in 2023.

Spending on tests could save money

One reason colorectal cancer advocates succeeded is because this policy may save insurance companies money. With the first screening and follow-up test fully covered, Fendrick projects more people are likely to take the less expensive at-home tests, and he argues costs of covering that second round of screenings will be offset.

"Because most people are negative, the math just works out in a way that if you waive cost-sharing for follow-up, it is actually made up by getting more people to get less expensive initial tests," he said.

Cheaper, reliable at-home screening tests don't yet exist for lung, breast and cervical cancers. However, home tests are in development for human papillomavirus, or HPV,

the virus that causes cervical cancer.

Advocates for cervical and lung cancer are in the early days of tackling this follow-up

coverage dilemma.

Meanwhile, breast cancer

advocates have made progress for the estimated 12 million women who get follow-up procedures each year. At least 10 states have passed laws requiring coverage for more testing. "The only opposition we've

"The only opposition we've seen are [insurance companies]," said Molly Guthrie, vice president of policy and advocacy at Susan G. Komen, a breast cancer advocacy organization.

She said the group plans to introduce bills in several more states, including Florida, Missouri and Iowa, next year.

If more states move to require insurers to fully cover tests for the other three cancers, companies would likely pass those costs along to health care consumers in the form of higher premiums.

It is difficult to gauge insurers' interest in paying for tests to confirm a diagnosis. Representatives from UnitedHealthcare and the industry trade group AHIP said in emails they support the ACA screening guidelines and covering costs for additional colorectal screenings.

Legal challenges threaten screening coverage

A court ruling in September has the potential to invalidate the required free cancer screenings.

A federal district court judge in Texas ruled the key part of

the ACA that requires insurers to fully cover these cancer screenings is unconstitutional. The judge said that since the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force, a 16-member panel of independent experts, was not appointed by the president and confirmed by the U.S. Senate, the Task Force lacks standing to set coverage policies for insurers.

The case is moving through the courts, but if the decision stands, the country could return to the days when individual insurers could decide which, if any, screening tests to cover.

More than 2.5 Million Youth Reported E-Cigarette Use in 2022

A study released this week from the Food and Drug Administration and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) found that 2.55 million middle and high school students in the U.S. reported e-cigarette use in 2022.

The findings, published in the Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report, are based on data from the 2022 National Youth Tobacco Survey (NYTS), a cross-sectional, self-administered survey of U.S. middle students in grades 6–8 and high school students in grades 9–12. The study assessed current use in one or more of the past 30 days of e-cigarettes, including how often it was used, the type of device used, flavors, and brand.

"This study shows that our nation's youth continue to be enticed and hooked by an expanding variety of e-cigarette brands delivering flavored nicotine," said Deirdre Lawrence Kittner, Ph.D., M.P.H., director of CDC's Office on Smoking and Health. "Our work is far from over. It's critical that we work together to prevent youth from starting to use any tobacco product – including e-cigarettes – and help all youth who do use them, to quit."

Youth use of tobacco products in any form, including e-cigarettes—is unsafe. Such products contain nicotine, which is highly addictive and can harm the developing adolescent brain. Using nicotine during adolescence might also increase risk for future addiction to other drugs.

Among the youth surveyed who currently used e-cigarettes, more than one in four used them daily. The most used e-cigarette device type was disposable, followed by prefilled or refillable pods or cartridges, and tanks or mod systems.

More than 8 in 10 youth who currently used e-cigarettes reported used flavored e-cigarettes, which means flavors other than tobacco. Overall, the most used flavor was fruit, followed by candy, desserts, mint, and menthol.

"Adolescent e-cigarette use in the United States remains at concerning levels, and poses a serious public health risk to our nation's youth," said Brian King, Ph.D., M.P.H., director of the FDA's Center for Tobacco Products. "Together with the CDC, protecting our nation's youth from the dangers of tobacco products—including e-cigarettes—remains among the FDA's highest priorities, and we are committed to combatting this issue with the breadth of our regulatory authorities."

Since 2014, e-cigarettes have been the most used tobacco product among U.S. youth. As the tobacco product landscape continues to change, the sustained implementation of comprehensive tobacco prevention and control strategies at the national, state, and local levels, coupled with FDA regulations, is critical to prevent and reduce youth access to and use of e-cigarettes.

E-cigarettes are electronic devices that heat a liquid and produce an aerosol, or mix of small particles in the air. They come in many shapes and sizes. Most have a battery, a heating element, and a place to hold a liquid.

Some e-cigarettes look like regular cigarettes, cigars, or pipes. Some look like USB flash drives, pens, and other everyday items. Larger devices such as tank systems, or "mods," do not look like other tobacco products.

The organ piano, a staple instrument in the Black church

With the ability to play melodies, harmonies and bass, the organ piano is an essential companion to Black churches worship service.

"I cannot imagine attending a church service without an organist or pianist," Teresa Lee-Robinson said. "When the service first starts, the music is playing. It helps promote the Gospel."

Lee-Robinson's long silver nails clicked on the organ piano keys when she played in Zion Hill's empty sanctuary. When she paused from playing, she recalled some of her early memories as an organist.

At 8, Lee-Robinson started taking piano lessons, and after years of practice, she gained the confidence to take her talent to the next level. At, 16, she became the organist Zion Hill Missionary Baptist Church needed.

Occasionally, her hands and fingers would cramp up and bleed, so her father, Pastor David Lee of Zion Hill, prayed and anointed her hands. Some nights she would jump out of bed, race downstairs to the piano and play the chords she heard in her dream in order to remember them.

She has played for the church for 47 years. These days, she mainly plays piano for the church. However, playing the organ has a special place in her heart.

The instrument was created more than 2,000 years ago, and while there have been technical developments, the operations remain unchanged, according to Britannica. By moving pressurized air through the organ's pipes, it creates rich, elongated chords, well known to many churchgoers.

The type of organ piano commonly played in Black churches is the Hammond organ, which was created in 1935 as a cheaper alternative to the pipe organ.

Organist Michael Dixon Sr. said the musical component the organ brings can intensify the service by connecting to the members of the church.

"It enhances the service because we are so in tune to music," he said. "The organ just gives a more full connection to the church. It reaches the heart."

Listening to cassette tapes and records, Dixon taught himself how to play the piano at 16. He later received mentorship from multiple artists, including his former music teacher, Professor Nathaniel Truedell.

"The gift — not knowing at the time — was already in me," he said.

His first performance as an organist — he was a drummer for many years — was with Broad Ripple High School's Contemporary Choir in 1990, which put Dixon in a position to later play for many audiences across the nation.

One thing that took him by surprise was when his son, Michael Dixon Jr., began learning how to play the piano.

"I never saw that coming," Dixon Sr. said. "He learned pretty fast. He's a phenomenal musician now.



John's gospel brings us to Jesus' first public miracle. It wasn't healing the sick. It wasn't raising the dead. It wasn't even anything spiritual. It was turning water into wine. Think about that for a moment. The first recorded

was on a mission to save the world, the greatest mission in the history of humankind. Yet, He took time to attend a wedding and take part in its festivities. We may be tempted to think that we should not take time out from our "important work" for social occasions. But these social occasions are often an important part of our overall mission.

Social occasions are amazing opportunities to share our faith. Many people who are not followers of Christ or regular church attenders (if they attend at all) frequent social events. Jesus valued weddings because they involved people. And Jesus came to be with people. Our mission as Jesus' disciples can often be accomplished in the joyous times of celebration

Some of our most effective ministry will not happen in the confines of the church walls, in church settings or with church people! Some might be alarmed by this statement because we have been lulled into thinking that every interaction with unchurched people has to be "churchy" or "oily."

I've found that attending backyard barbecues, graduation celebrations, sporting events and other nonchurch social gatherings allow people to see a more human side of me. It also allows us to meet people where they are, in the comforts and confines of their world. This is the example we see Jesus displaying in

Let's look a little deeper at the text. Weddings in Jesus' day were weeklong festivals. Banquets would be prepared for many guests and the week would be spent celebrating the new life of the married couple. Often the whole town was invited, and everyone would come. It was considered an insult to refuse an invitation to a wedding.

To accommodate the many people who would attend, careful planning was performed. Running out of wine was not only an embarrassment; it broke the strong unwritten laws of hospitality. Jesus was simply about to respond to a heartfelt need and help his neighbors avoid a major embarrassment.

We can learn two things from this biblical account. First, don't dismiss the messenger. Mary was the messenger, not Jesus. If we are not careful, we can

Getty Images miss the message by dismissing the messenger. Mary did not understand what Jesus was going to do, but she trusted him to do what was right. So, she told the servants: "Do whatever He tells you."

Finally, don't miss your miracle. When we run into difficulties that we don't understand, we must continue to trust Jesus to work out the situation in the best way possible. Mary submitted to Jesus' way of doing things. She recognized that Jesus was more than her human son. He is the Son of God.

When we bring our problems to Jesus, we may think we know how he should take care of them. But He may guide us on a completely different path. Like Mary and the servants, you must be willing to "Do whatever he tells you."


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

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

EXPLAINER: How will OPEC+ cuts affect oil prices, inflation?

FRANKFURT, Germany (AP) — Major oil-producing countries led by Saudi Arabia and Russia have decided to slash the amount of oil they deliver to the global economy.

And the law of supply and demand suggests that can only mean one thing: higher prices are on the way for crude, and for the diesel fuel, gasoline and heating oil that are produced from oil.

The decision by the OPEC+ alliance to cut 2 million barrels a day starting next month comes as the Western allies are trying to cap the oil money flowing into Moscow's war chest after it invaded Ukraine.

Here is what to know about the OPEC+ decision and what it could mean for the economy and the oil price cap:

WHY IS OPEC+ CUTTING PRODUCTION?

Saudi Arabia's Energy Minister Abdulaziz bin Salman says that the alliance is being proactive in adjusting supply ahead of a possible downturn in demand because a slowing global economy needs less fuel for travel and industry.

"We are going through a period of diverse uncertainties which could come our way, it's a brewing cloud," he said, and OPEC+ sought to remain "ahead of the curve." He described the group's role as "a moderating force, to bring about stability."

Oil prices have fallen after a summer of highs. International benchmark Brent crude is down 24% from mid-June, when it traded at over \$123 per barrel. Now it's at \$93.50.

One big reason for the slide is fears that large parts of the global economy are slipping into recession as high energy prices — for oil, natural gas and electricity — drive inflation and rob consumers of spending power.

Another reason: The summer highs came about because of fears that much of Russia's oil production would be lost to the market over the war in Ukraine.

As Western traders shunned Russian oil even without sanctions, customers in India and China bought those barrels at a steep discount, so the hit to supply wasn't as bad as expected.

Oil producers are wary of a sudden collapse in prices if the global economy goes downhill faster than expected. That's what happened during the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020 and during the global financial crisis in 2008-2009.



HOW IS THE WEST TARGETING RUSSIAN OIL?

The U.S. and Britain imposed bans that were mostly symbolic because neither country imported much Russia oil. The White House held off pressing the European Union for an import ban because EU countries got a quarter of their oil from Russia. In the end, the 27-nation bloc decided to cut off Russian oil that comes by ship on Dec. 5, while keeping a small amount of pipeline supplies that some East-

Beyond that, the U.S. and other Group of Seven major democracies are working out the details on a price cap on Russian oil. It would target insurers and other service providers that facilitate oil shipments from Russia to other countries. The EU approved a measure along those lines this week.

ern European countries rely on.

Many of those providers are based in Europe and would be barred from dealing with Russian oil if the price is above the



HOW WILL OIL CUTS, PRICE CAPS AND EMBARGOES CLASH?

The idea behind the price cap is to keep Russian oil flowing to the global market, just at lower prices. Russia, however, has threatened to simply stop deliveries to a country or companies that observe the cap. That could take more Russian oil off the market and push prices higher.

That could push costs at the pump higher, too.

U.S. gasoline prices that soared to record highs of \$5.02 a gallon in mid-June had been falling recently, but they have been on the rise again, posing political problems for President Joe Biden a month before midterm elec-

Biden, facing inflation at near 40-year highs, had touted the falling pump prices. Over the past week, the national average price for a gallon rose 9 cents, to \$3.87. That's 65 cents more than Americans were paying a year ago.

"It's a disappointment, and we're looking at what alternatives we may have," he told reporters about the OPEC+ decision.

WILL THE OPEC PRODUCTION CUT MAKE INFLATION WORSE?

Likely yes. Brent crude should reach \$100 per barrel by December, says Jorge Leon, senior vice president at Rystad Energy. That is up from an earlier prediction of \$89.

Part of the 2 million-barrelper-day cut is only on paper as some OPEC+ countries aren't able to produce their quota. So the group can deliver only about 1.2 million barrels a day in actual

That's still going to have a "significant" effect on prices, Leon

"Higher oil prices will inevitably add to the inflation headache that global central banks are fighting, and higher oil prices will factor into the calculus of further increasing interest rates to cool down the economy," he wrote in a note.

That would exacerbate an energy crisis in Europe largely tied to Russian cutbacks of natural gas supplies used for heating, electricity and in factories and would send gasoline prices up worldwide. As that fuels inflation, people have less money to spend on other things like food and rent.

Other factors also could affect oil prices, including the depth of any possible recession in the U.S. or Europe and the duration of China's COVID-19 restrictions, which have sapped demand for fuel.

Americans should brace for a potentially cold and wet winter, according to NOAA and this year's Farmer's Almanac Winter Outlook. That means now is a perfect opportunity to think about preparing your family and home for the colder months ahead.

From heating homes with a highperforming furnace or fireplace to keeping children warm and comfortable on school buses, propane can help keep families cozy this winter.

Relying on a diverse energy mix - including propane, solar and wind - can help ensure you're prepared for whatever winter brings and reduce the strain on the fragile electric grid. Plus, propane is a stable energy source that is stored on-site and can keep homes operating during severe weather or utility power interruptions. Using propane also produces 43% fewer greenhouse gas emissions than an equivalent amount of electricity generated from the grid.

Have Your Furnace Serviced. Proactively think about ways you can reduce the demand on your heating system. In addition to scheduling routine maintenance by a trained professional, there are a few things homeowners can do. First, open all air vents and make sure they are uncovered as blocked airflow forces the furnace to work harder.

Check the thermostat to ensure it's working properly by increasing the

temperature by 5 F and waiting to hear the furnace turn on. Consider setting the thermostat a couple degrees cooler than what might feel comfortable as doing so not only saves money but lessens the load from your furnace. Keep thermostats at 65 F during the day and 55 F at night, closing off rooms that don't need to be heated.

Using a programmable thermostat can save homeowners as much as 10% per year on heating costs, according to the U.S. Department of Energy. It's also a good idea to replace air filters every 1-3 months to help keep your furnace working efficiently and effectively.

Upgrade Your Furnace. If it's time to upgrade your home's climate control system, it's a smart idea to do your homework and explore your options. There are several state and federal incentive programs to help homeowners upgrade their current systems to a clean energy option like propane. Propane is an affordable, comfortable, reliable and efficient energy source. It's also a clean, low-carbon option. What's more, propane-powered furnaces last 50% longer than electric heat pumps, which means a lower lifetime investment. Propane furnaces also provide warmer air than other heat sources (115-125 F), are less impacted by outdoor temperatures and produce 50% fewer greenhouse gas emissions than electric furnaces and 12% less than fuel oil furnaces.

Rethink Your Boiler System. For a home that runs on a boiler system, you can make upgrades that improve performance while providing space savings and the versatility to provide heating, hot water and even snow melt. High-efficiency propane boilers can last up to 30 years and have significantly lower emissions than those fueled by heating oil.

Take Advantage of Your Fireplace. The warm glow of a fire isn't only comforting; it can be a practical and effective way to increase the heat inside your home. Not only do propane fireplaces offer 5-6 times the heating capacity of electric fireplaces, they're also more energy efficient, environmentally friendly, convenient to use and easier to install than woodburning models. They also emit less soot and other emissions.

Be Efficient with Water Heating. Water heating can be a large expense, accounting for 14-18% of home utility bills, according to the U.S. Department of Energy. Set your water heater no higher than 120 F and install lowflow shower heads or temperature-sensitive shower valves to reduce energy consumption. High-performance propane tankless water heaters can reduce a home's energy consumption because it only heats the water when you need it, ultimately saving you money.

Preparing for Winter Storms

Before, during and after a storm, consider these key factors to help keep your family and home as safe as possible.

Have an Adequate Propane Supply

Discuss the possibility of scheduling regular winter visits with your propane supplier so you always have an adequate supply of propane in your tank. This can reduce your chances of running empty in times of heavy snowfall when roads may be inaccessible for delivery.

Create an Emergency Plan

Make sure to follow the manufacturer's instructions regarding installation, location and maintenance.

Keep a battery-powered radio handy, so you always have a way to receive updates on weather conditions. As storms approach, it's also smart to charge your smartphone to use as an additional tool for communication through a power outage. Purchasing a propane generator is another option to ensure you always have reliable power, even during blackouts.

Inspect Damage Cautiously

If a storm causes harm to your property, be careful when assessing damage. Downed power lines, damaged gas lines and dislodged propane tanks can lead to dangerous situations. In the dark, use a flashlight instead of candles to avoid combustion if there is a leak.

Call the Experts in Dangerous Situations







Colts grind out 12-9 win over Broncos in injury-filled game

DENVER (AP) — Matt Ryan kept the faith through all the sacks, interceptions, fumbles and three-and-outs that made for a streaming snooze-fest on Oct. 6.

"It was just kind of a slog of a game," the Indianapolis quarterback said after Stephon Gilmore batted away Russell Wilson's pass to Courtland Sutton in the end zone on fourth-and-1 from the 5 to give the Colts a 12-9 overtime victory over the Denver Broncos.

The game featured seven field goals, a dozen punts, 25 third-down stops, four interceptions and six fumbles — none of which were recovered by the otherwise disruptive defenses.

"Our defense played lights out," said Ryan, who emerged victorious despite getting sacked six times, giving him 21 so far this season, throwing a pair of interceptions to Caden Sterns and fumbling for the 10th time this season.

"We need to play better for sure, but I'm proud of the guys," Ryan said. "Wins are what we need. We're right in the mix. ... I thought the two drives at the end showed a lot of guys. You just keep battling and it helps when your defense is shutting them down, too."

Gilmore also intercepted Wilson's pass just before the 2-minute mark of the fourth quarter to set up Chase McLaughlin's tying field goal with 5 seconds left.

"That's the definition of a big-time player making big plays in the moment," Colts coach Frank Reich said about Gilmore. "Isn't it awesome you can have a game like that and still win?"

McLauglin connected from 47 yards 4:10 into overtime to give the Colts (2-2-1) the lead in the first game in NFL history that pitted quarterbacks with at least four Pro Bowl appearances each yet featured zero touchdowns.

The Broncos (2-3) decided against a tying chip-shot field goal by Brandon McManus or even a first-down play on fourth-and-less-and-a-yard from the 5, and Wilson lined up in the shotgun next to running back Melvin Gordon, then threw incomplete over the middle.

"We wanted to win the game," Broncos coach Nathaniel Hackett said. "We hadn't moved the ball very

well the whole night and I thought we had a spectacular drive to get all the way down there."

Wide open and uncovered — but unseen by Wilson — was KJ Hamler, who tore off his helmet and slammed it to the ground after Wilson's final pass was batted away, sending the Broncos and their awful offense to their second loss in four days.

"There's going to be a bunch of what-ifs," Broncos guard Dalton Risner said. "You know what, if we score that touchdown, everyone thinks it's the best call in the world."

McLaughlin sent it to overtime with a 31-yarder after Gilmore intercepted Wilson's pass to Tyrie Cleveland in the end zone on third-and-4 from the 13.

"Just can't throw that," lamented Wilson. "Got to throw it out of bounds if it's not there."

Wilson was sacked four times and picked off twice. His four TD throws through five games marks the worst start of his 11-year career and he hasn't looked anything like the Broncos expected after giving him a \$245 million contract extension before his first snap for Denver.

"It's very simple: at the end of the day I got to be better," Wilson said. "I got to play better. I let the team down tonight. One thing I know about myself is I'm going to respond."

The game pitted veteran quarterbacks struggling with their new teams. It looked like neither team practiced much during the week because neither team did as they worked in new running backs and key defensive replacements on a short work week.

And as is common on Thursday nights, there was a rash of injuries with the most serious to Indy's Kwity Payne (leg) and Denver's Garett Bolles (right knee), both of whom were carted off.

With reigning NEL champion Jonethon

With reigning NFL champion Jonathan Taylor (ankle, toe) out for Indy and the Broncos lamenting the loss of Javonte Williams to a shredded right knee, the grind-it-out nature of the game was entirely expected.

The Colts came in averaging 14.3 points, the lowest in Ryan's 16-year career, and the Broncos entered the night averaging 16.5 points, the worst in Wilson's 11-year career.

Nyheim Hines got the start for Indy, but he went

out with a head injury after his third snap when D.J. Jones knocked him down and Hines' helmet bounced on the ground. He wobbled as he tried to leave the field on his own and had to be guided to the sideline, where he was evaluated for a concussion.

REVENGE OR REDEMPTION

Many fans were wondering if this game would be one of revenge — Phillip Lindsay returning to his hometown to beat the Broncos — or redemption — Gordon atoning for his big fumble the Sunday before that was returned 68 yards for a touchdown by the Raiders.

It turned out to be neither.

Lindsay ran for 40 yards on 11 carries and Gordon had 54 yards on 15 carries, and he was flipped by safety Rodney McLoyd Jr. at the 6 on his way to the end zone when it
