Conditions at northeast side apartment complex create health hazards, but residents struggle for relief

Emauria Davis was in the middle of listing her complaints about the run-down apartment complex she lives in on an October afternoon when one of them came to life. A cockroach scurried up her leg. "Oh my gosh, there was just a f***** roach on me!" she screamed. "Oh f*** no, I can't do this. They crawl on you. That's not even f****** cool."

Davis lives at Village at the Mills Crossing on the east side of Indianapolis with her 3-year-old daughter after being houseless for a year.

The Marion County Health Department and Health and Hospital Corporation have visited Davis' apartment six times in the last four months. Complaints range from mold to cockroaches to raw sewage leaking and her toilet flooding her apartment with about an inch of water. And she isn't the only one.

The health department has 350 cases on file dating back to 2018, along with hundreds more before then for mold, pests, appliances that don't work and other complaints and violations. The Recorder obtained cases from the health department through a public records request.

"It's honestly heartbreaking," Davis said, "because I feel like no one should have to live in these types of conditions."

A spokesperson from The Community Builders, the owner of the property said they are working on fulfilling backlogged maintence requests and property managers have been instructed to address any specfic unit concerns as quickly as possible.

"As a nonprofit organization with a mission to build and sustain strong communities where all people can thrive, we are committed to responsible ownership of The Villages at Mill Crossing. We have taken impor-

Frederick Douglass Park breaks ground on new family center

Residents of the Martindale-Brightwood neighborhood can look forward to a new family center at Frederick Douglas Park. Community members and city officials broke ground on the project Oct. 13.

"It's really something that is long overdue," Mayor Joe Hogsett said, "and I'm so proud that the city of Indianapolis is able to do this for the neighborhood."

The \$20 million project, funded by the mayor's Circle City Forward Initiative, will include a computer lab, more space to host events, additional basketball courts, a track and more. The project is expected to be complete by early 2024.

"This will be a blessing to not only Martindale-Brightwood but the entire city of Indianapolis," said Andre Denman, principal park planner for Indy Parks. The historic park, named after abolitionist Frederick Douglass, opened in 1921 for the primarily Black neighborhoods located on the northeast side of Indianapolis during a time when they were not allowed in other parks in the city. The park's current family center was built in 1943. In 1944, there was a petition to request an expansion for the center because the building was inadequate to meet the community's needs. Ten years

later, plans were made for renovations, and almost 70 years after that, the neighborhood is close to finally getting its new family center.

Before she died in 2021, Frankie Casel, a co-founder of Friends of Frederick Douglass Park, made it her mission to push city officials and the park's current and former directors to expand the park and its family center.

Casel was one of many community members who spoke about the need for a new family center as they celebrated the park's 100year anniversary in 2020 and 2021. She moved to the area in 1971 and called the park a "home away from home" for her and her three children during a meeting in January 2020.

Federal lawsuit alleges heath care giant defrauded CMS of more than \$100M

Indianapolis-based health insurance giant Elevance Health, previously Anthem, Inc., will have to face a federal lawsuit alleging it pocketed at least tens of millions of dollars by submitting inaccurate claims to the U.S. Centers for Medicaid & Medicare Services.

The original lawsuit, filed by the U.S. Department of Justice in March 2020, alleges the company did not check diagnosis regulations.

"We are confident that our health plans and associates have complied with Medicare Advantage regulations, including those set forth by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services," the statement said.

Elevance said the company operated in "good faith" and that CMS should update regulations if the agency wants to "change how it reimburses Medicare Advantage Plans for health services."

codes it submitted for reimbursement between early 2014 and 2018 for its Medicare Advantage plans for senior citizens. These plans are run by private insurers like Elevance Health that contract with CMS. Around 28.7 million people - nearly half of all eligible Medicare beneficiaries — are covered under these plans.

Earlier this week, a U.S. district judge in Manhattan ruled the company failed to prove that the lawsuit lacked materiality. Judge Andrew Carter said the financial costs to the government were "substantial" and not "merely administrative" amounting to more than \$100 million. In a statement to WFYI, Elevance

Health said that it complied with federal

But the lawsuit alleges that when Elevance did a review of diagnosis codes it had submitted to CMS and found that some were not valid, the company did not "make any effort to verify or delete these codes." In his decision letter dated Sept. 30, Judge Carter said the plaintiff alleges the company was aware of CMS' requirements to submit diagnosis data.

1,000 Marion County K-3 students will have a chance to increase their literacy skills

Starting in early 2023, 1,000 Marion County students in grades K-3 will have an opportunity to be tutored in reading as part of a new program.

The city partnered with RISE Indy, Indianapolis Public Schools, Metropolitan School District of Warren Township and the City-County Council to

announce the \$1 million Circle City Readers initiative.

"Reading is an essential element to a successful, fulfilling life," said Jasmin Shaheed-Young, president and CEO of **RISE Indy.**

City officials and education leaders announced the yearlong program on Oct. 11. The Circle City Readers initiative will give students a chance to work with

tutors on their reading skills in small groups with a focus on those who demonstrate the greatest need.

Experts say Indianapolis' literacy rate for students finishing third grade has been too low for nearly a decade. Results from the state's most recent reading assessment for third graders called I-READ - showed about

New Palestine student disciplined for racist 'monkey' slurs toward Pike volleyball team

A New Palestine high schooler has been disciplined after making racial slurs toward the Metropolitan School District of Pike Township's volleyball players last week.

Multiple parents furiously took to social media after the volleyball game on Oct. 8 to address the racist behavior of the New Palestine student athlete, who called the opponents "monkeys" and beat on her chest.

In a Facebook post, Pike High school mother Sabrina Rogers Dryden said she's proud of the way the Pike volleyball players handled the situation.

"The feelings of anger and hurt are real for them, but they played with professionalism and dignity," Dryden wrote. "And for that I am so very proud of them. It is disheartening that we have to have this discussion with our girls still in this day and age."

On the northwest side of Indianapolis, Pike High School had over 3,300 students last academic year - about 59% were Black and 8% were White. New Palestine High School served over 1,100 students - almost 93% were White and fewer than 1% were Black.

According to staff at the Southern Hancock County Community School Corporation - which oversees New Palestine High School — a complaint about the incident was filed with Pike Township, then forwarded to New Palestine's athletic director. Both districts have worked together to address the issue. Pike Township has also filed an official complaint with the Indiana High School Athletic Association and requested they provide anti-racism training and counseling for all student athletes.

"MSD of Pike Township wholeheartedly believes it is essential for athletics and all other school sponsored activities to be safe spaces for all students," Pike staff said in a statement to WFYI.

A staff member with the Southern Hancock County Community Schools district said fall break prolonged its investigation into the incident. But they released a press release stating they reviewed film



of the volleyball game and spoke to coaches, players, parents, community members and Pike administrators who attended the event.

New Palestine High Schools Principal Jim Voelz and Athletic Director Al Cooper said the studentathlete didn't represent New Palestine's commitment to "character and class."

"Unfortunately, we fell short of this goal this weekend," the press release stated. "As an athletic department and school administration, we see this as a teachable moment. Actions and words matter. We thank our community for its support and look forward to a great rest of the season."

Southern Hancock County Community Schools said it disciplined the student in accordance with the school's athletic code of conduct. The district would not specifically state what disciplinary actions would

be taken to preserve the student's privacy.

In an emailed statement, IHSAA Commissioner Paul Neidig said he believes New Palestine has taken the right disciplinary actions, and that educators must use this as a teachable moment.

"It is never appropriate to make fun of, taunt, threaten, or belittle anyone over race, religion, nationality, or any other difference," said Neidig. "Instead, those differences are to be respected, celebrated, and championed. We look forward to the day when we do not have to have this type of conversation. Until that day, however, we must continue to educate the young people we serve."

spooky show for spooky seas

Beef & Boards Dinner Theatre's production of "The Addams Family" is a little messy, kind of creepy and all kinds of fun.

"The Addams Family," which first opened on Broadway in 2010, is based on Charles Addams' cartoon characters that inspired the 1960's show and several live-action and animated films. Hew things fluster the otherworldly Addams family. But Gomez Addams suddenly finds himself stuck after his daughter, Wednesday, confesses her plans to marry a seemingly "normal" boy he's never met and then begs him not to tell her mother, Morticia.

Things go from comically bad to comically worse as the Addams clan attempts to safely navigate a family dinner with Wednesday's "normal" fiancé and his parents.

Directed by Eddie Curry and choreographed by Ron Morgan, "The Addams Family" begins with the famous Addams family theme song accompanied by Lurch (Jeff Stockberger) mimicking the piano part. Audience members immediately jumped in to supply snaps in the right places before the scrim rose above the small stage and we were invited into the world of the macabre family for 2 1/2 hours.

It's lighthearted and funny, as most shows begin. But as we dove deeper into the story and met the cast of unlikely but lovable characters, Wednesday Addams (Shelbi Berry) and her "normal" fiancé, Lucas Beineke (Ray Gleaves), quickly become the sole focus. They're young and nervous and obviously in love, and the only problem is no one knows what to do about it.

Gleaves' performance as Lucas stood out, for more reasons than one: His sweet baritone voice, goofy boy-nextdoor persona and stunning wide toothy smile had audience members enthralled with his every move and had Wednesday practically swooning (girl, we get it).

Gomez (Eddie Curry) and Morticia Addams (Jill Kelly Howe) had a few bizarre moments where they took extra time to draw viewers in, committing to their characters' woes as if they lived and breathed as Gomez and Morticia

each day instead of only 8-11 p.m. on weekdays and Saturdays, etc.

Grandma (Amanda Butterbaugh), Pugsley Addams (Eli Neal) and Uncle Fester (Kurt Perry) are unlikely and unpredictable supporting characters who each make memorable standout performances on their own during the story. Butterbaugh's rendition of the kooky, old, witchy grandma was endearing and left me wanting more of her adorable little walk, laughter and head bobbles.

Whereas Neal is excitable and earnest in his singing, displaying brotherly concern over losing his sister in the only way an annoying little brother knows how: attempting to poison said Perry, however, fully bodied the character Uncle Fester. Between the many fourth wall breaks, iconic monologues and the wholesome but hilarious solo about falling in love with the moon, Perry was easily the show stealer of the production; giving probably the best vocal and most entertaining performance of the night.

As a theater gal myself, I would be remiss if I didn't give chorus members the recognition they deserve. The ancestors (David Buergler, Philip Crawshaw, Cameron Hicks, Logan Hill, Amy Owens, Hallie Quinn and Sally Scharbrough) dazzled on stage in powdery white outfits and wigs of centuries past, busting out "Newsies"esque choreography and stunning multipart harmonies. Moving throughout the show in a Greek chorus style hilarity, I couldn't take my eyes off of the ancestors, always wondering who kept hitting the high notes with flawless vibrato.

Although "The Addams Family" pushes its generous PG-13 rating to the limit — with some choice language, innuendos and repeated dark themes and references to sadism, death and the like — it's worth a trip to Beef & Boards with the family for an evening. "The Addams Family" is showing at Beef & Boards, 9301 Michigan Road, through Nov. 30 weekdays and Saturday evenings at 8 p.m., Sunday evenings at 7 p.m., and select matinees at 1 p.m. A dinner buffet will be served prior to each show. Additional information is available at beefandboards.



tant steps to improve the experience of the families who call this community home and secure funding for needed building and apartment upgrades," A spokesperson said in a statement to the Recorder. "In August 2022, we retained a new property management agent, with a focus on resident service and professional maintenance. We will remain committed to improvement during this transition and look forward to a sustainable future for the community."

Davis said her apartment has flooded four times since she moved in in August and has had to deal with mold making her daughter sick. Water stains remain from a leak in the closet where the washer and dryer hookup are and along the wall in the living room where her daughter plays. Davis said she had to throw away most of her clothes because of the mold growing on them.

Her daughter, Lovelii, was sick and struggling to breathe for a few weeks. Davis said although a pediatrician could not definitively link her sudden onslaught of illness to the conditions in the apartment, they said it is like toxic mold exposure.

No mail, unfulfilled maintenance requests

Mail doesn't get delivered to the apartment complex either, residents said. They have to pick it up from the post office 1.5 miles away. For residents like Davis, with a 3-year-old to take care of and no car, they can't make it to the post office often.

Residents also say their maintenance requests go unfulfilled, or they only receive temporary fixes. Resident KennyOwens has since started writing letters and making comments on work

orders to get them fulfilled. Owens said he put in maintenance requests for the roaches but eventually had to take care of it himself with foggers and roach powder.

Maya Williams, who lives across the hall from Davis, said she has been in and out of the hospital with toxic mold exposure symptoms, including trouble breathing and a rash. Pipes busted behind her toilet, pouring water all over her bathroom. It wasn't fixed for weeks, she said, and snails and slugs began to make a home on her wet and moldy bathroom floor.

"When the maintenance man came to fix it, the drywall was so wet that it came down like paper," Williams said.


'I can't afford to move'

Many residents at Village at the Mills Crossing aren't in a financial position that allows them to move somewhere cleaner and safer.

The apartments, near the corner of East 38th Street and North Sherman Avenue, are in the Meadows Neighborhood, where in 2019 the unemployment rate was 15% and more than a third of people lived in poverty, according to The Polis Center at IUPUI.

Davis' upstairs neighbor, Owens, is among those who would like to move but can't. He lived in the same apartment as Davis before he said his doctor wrote a letter to the apartment complex forcing them to move him due to ongoing mold problems. Owens also deals with frequent wet carpet and pests in his new apartment. "I've always been like that, but I can't afford to move," Owens said.



Public comment period extended for a controversial wastewater

A controversial sewage plant could be built on Indianapolis' west side, pending an extension of a public comment period and a public meeting Oct. 26.

The Ben Davis Conservancy District that operates wastewater for more than 3,000 residents wants to build a sewage plant at 900 S. Tibbs Ave. to save residents money. The decision is years in the making as the district's board wants to combat rising wastewater treatments costs from Citizens Energy Group.

A public hearing concerning a pollutant discharge permit, formally known as an NPDES, will be held at 6:30 p.m. Oct. 26 at Indiana Government Center South Auditorium, 302 W. Washington St. This is the second public notice period for the sewage plant after the Indiana Department of Environmental Management received "multiple requests to hold a public hearing and extend the comment period for the permit," a spokesperson for IDEM said. The permit proposes the effluent


waste to be discharged into Neeld Ditch. The point of the permit is to control the discharge of pollutants into water so the quality of water is maintained with state standards. According to IDEM documents, ammonia "would cause a significant lowering of water quality into the receiving steam."

However, IDEM has made a tentative decision that the economic value outweighs the environmental risks and remaining connected to Citizens would create a "large impact" scenario whereas disconnecting and constructing a new plant would create a "midrange impact" scenario.

Residents with the West Indy Neighborhood Congress said dumping into Neeld Ditch goes against their qualityof-life plan and land-use plan.

Citizens tried to buy the conservancy district out of building a wastewater plant in May, but the board unanimously voted to reject the offer.

It's that haunted time of year again: Trick-or-treat night and Halloween safety tips

We know kids are excited to dress up and go knocking on doors for some sweet treats, but it's important to remember things can and will go bump in the night, even on Halloween.

With the help of the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department, Indianapolis Fire Department and Indiana Department of Homeland Security, we've put together a list of some things parents should keep in mind before the sun sets on Oct. 31.

Drivers and Pedestrians

Aleatha Henderson, captain and director of public education for the Indianapolis Fire Department, said pedestrian safety is one of the most important things to consider on Halloween, especially with the increased number of pedestrian accidents in Indianapolis this year.

Drivers should enter and exit driveways, alleys and parking lots slowly and carefully and keep an eye out for people walking in crosswalks, driveways, parking lots and sidewalks. Pedestrians should always use traffic signals and crosswalks, look left, right, then left again and make eye contact with the driver before crossing streets.

Jack-o-Lantern Carving

While a tradition for many, it's important to keep an eye on children while carving jack-o'-lanterns and never leave sharp objects unattended where children or pets can get to them.

Henderson said parents should consider using LED or battery-powered candles in jack-o'-lanterns instead of candles, especially if they will be easily accessible to children.

However, those who burn candles should keep a close eye on children, Henderson said. Candle fires are the leading cause of reported home fires, which she said add up to about 800 each year.

Porches, Walkways and

wearing collars with readable ID tags or chipped in case they run off or get loose.

COSTUMES AND VISIBILITY

Properly fitting costumes are not only key to ensuring a child is comfortable but also safe during Halloween. Oversized costumes, shoes, wigs, hats or masks can cause a child to trip and fall or obstruct their vision.

Children should be able to walk, talk, breathe, hear and see comfortably in their costumes. Avoid dark clothing or costumes, and if possible, place reflective tape on costumes or candy bags or have children carry flashlights or glowsticks to increase visibility.

Face paint and makeup should be non-toxic and removed immediately at the end of the night to prevent irritation or allergic reactions, according to The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Trick-or-Treating Young children should have a chaperone. Children should be reminded not to enter the homes or vehicles of strangers while out trick-or-treating, according to IDHS.

Older kids and teens should walk in organized groups or use the buddy system. All trick-or-treaters should stay in well-lit areas and avoid alleys. Anything suspicious should be reported to law enforcement.

Always be aware of surroundings and be able to describe where you are in case of an emergency, Henderson said. This means knowing street names and looking for house numbers.

Candy and Treats

Choking hazards are an increased issue during Halloween, Henderson said. It's best to have children wait until they get home, and a parent can check candy and treats before allowing them to binge eat their weight in sugar. This not only ensures they don't eat anything they shouldn't or are allergic to, but also decreases the chances of CHOKING.

It's imperative to remove potential hazards from walkways, front porches and yards, such as flowerpots, branches, candles, garden hoses, wired lighting and breakable or sharp decorations.

IMPD recommends keeping front porches, garages or areas where candy is being passed out well lit. Remember to keep doors locked when no one is home (this goes for every day, not just Halloween).

Henderson said to keep open flames away from dry decorations such as pumpkins, hay bales and scarecrows both inside and outside due to their high flammability.

Pet Safety

Trick-or-treat is bound to create a lot of commotion, and ensuring excitable pets are restrained and kept away from doors and visitors can reduce the chances of them getting out.

Pets joining in on trick-or-treating should be on a leash or harness and

Anything that appears to be unwrapped, rewrapped or homemade should be tossed. For those with food allergies, read every label and avoid candies or treats without labels, carry an epinephrine auto-injector (if prescribed). Parents can find more information about the Teal Pumpkin Project, a non-food Halloween treat initiative started by Food Allergy Research and Education, at foodallergy. org.

The CDC also recommends ensuring medications, vitamins and cough drops are stored properly as curious children might mistake them for candy this time of year.

Henderson said all 44 of the Indianapolis Fire Department stations will have candy for trick-or-treaters on Halloween from 6-8 p.m.

How To **TAKE CONTROL Of Your Credit**

Improving your credit score starts with understanding how all of the pieces work together and continues with building a plan to improve your credit.

Simply, a credit score is an indicator of how responsibly you handle your credit. Several factors impact your credit score, and you might be surprised what financial behaviors and information actually make a difference.

First, it's important to know the difference between your credit score and your credit report. Your credit score is based on the items found on your credit report, similar to how grades are based on homework and class assignments.

1. Employment history:

4. Where you live:

Your location doesn't affect your credit score. Your payment history does.

Paying on time:

"Pay all your bills on time. Every time." This is the golden rule of credit. Unfortunately, one late payment can significantly impact your score. Even high-income people struggle with this one!

Your credit utilization:

The balance of your accounts relative to your credit limits makes a difference in your credit report. The closer you are to maxing out, the worse the effect. Ideally, you'd keep this ratio to 30% or less, so if you have a \$1,000 credit limit, a balance higher than \$300 will start to drag your score down.

How long you've had credit:

It's called a credit history for a reason. The further back you can demonstrate that you regularly pay your debts back, the better your score. The advice about keeping a zero-balance card open comes into play here - just to show how long you've had it. Ideally, you'd have at least one account that is at least ten years old.

New accounts and credit checks:

Opening a slew of new accounts (or attempting to) in a short period is a red fag to a lender. It can indicate that you're planning a spending spree or expecting to lose your job. If you're planning to apply for a mortgage or other loan where your credit score determines your interest rate, try to avoid applying for any new credit cards within 3-6 months.

The number and type of accounts:

There are such things as "good debts" and "bad debts." Having a mortgage, student loan, or car loan looks better (as long as you don't have late payments on your record) because it implies that you're responsible enough to maintain a home, go to school, and take care of a car. Plus, the things that credit bought tend to last longer than the loan, making it good debt. Credit card debt isn't as fattering - especially a bunch of maxed out store cards.

Becoming creditworthy takes diligence and dedication. 

Some politicians confuse freedom with irresponsibility

(TriceEdneyWire.com) — As extreme weather caused floods in Kentucky, collapse of the water system in Jackson, Mississippi, and the savage destruction of central Florida — to say nothing of fires and drought and a growing water shortage in the West • we ought to agree on two simple

realities: America faces a growing challenge from both catastrophic climate change and a growing infrastructure deficit that is putting lives and communities at risk.

All should agree that we must act aggressively and at scale to address the climate challenge and rebuild our decrepit and aged infrastructure. We can invest now — or we will pay far more on the backside of calamity.

Yet that's not how it works. Florida's governor, Ron DeSantis, and his state's two senators, Mark Rubio and Rick Scott, all Republicans, now call fervently for federal aid and resources to help clean up the extensive damage caused by Hurricane Ian. With millions still without electricity or safe water, and many still endangered by floods, fallen bridges, downed electric lines and collapsed bridges, recovery will take years and cost tens of billions of dollars. The politicians are all in for getting federal dollars and resources to help in the wake of catastrophe. DeSantis regularly scorns federal spending in general and Joe Biden in particular, but when asked after Ian hit if he'd meet with Biden, he said, sensibly, "We need all the help we can get."

Yet, Gov. DeSantis, who has presidential ambitions, goes out of his way to dismiss warnings about extreme weather from catastrophic climate change. He said during his gubernatorial campaign that he doesn't want to be labeled "a global warming person."

When asked last December how he plans to address climate change, DeSantis replied that "people when they start talking about things like global warming, they typically use that as a pretext to do a bunch of left-wing things. ... We're not doing any left-wing stuff." Last year, he signed a bill that blocked Florida cities and towns from transitioning to 100% clean energy. He also championed a resolution prohibiting Florida's pension fund from considering the impact of climate change in its investment decisions.

The Lever, a reader-supported investigative news outlet, reports that about three months before Florida was clobbered by Ian, eight of the state's Republican lawmakers pressured federal regulators to halt a proposal requiring businesses to more thoroughly disclose the risks they face from climate change. Those lawmakers have raked in more than \$1 million of campaign cash from oil and gas industry donors.

Similarly, all of Florida's politicians voted against the bipartisan infrastructure bill that Biden managed to pass through the Congress. DeSantis scorned the \$19 billion that would go to Florida. Now, in the wake of Ian, of course, he wants a lot of "left-wing stuff," like massive funds from the federal government to rebuild Florida.

Politicians like DeSantis, Rubio and Scott confuse freedom with irresponsibility. They tout the freedoms of Florida, where public health officials won't tell you to wear a mask, planners won't tell you where to build your house, politicians won't tax your incomes. And if that leaves the state with vulnerable bridges and water systems, with homes exposed on flood plains, with impoverished communities, so be it.

Pundits regularly expose the hypocrisy of politicians like DeSantis, Rubio and Scott seeking billions in aid to help Florida rebuild in the wake of Ian, while voting against aid for other disasters in other states. One of the first votes DeSantis took when he was sworn in as a congressman in 2013 was to oppose aid to the victims of Superstorm Sandy. But hypocrisy is a relatively minor sin among politicians. A far bigger failing is to sacrifice the lives and the security of the people they claim to represent to embrace the corruption of fossil fuel campaign money and the blinders of ideological posturing.

A catastrophe like Ian or a shameful horror like the collapse of the water system in Mississippi's state capital should concentrate our minds. Accelerating the transition to renewable energy isn't "left-wing stuff," it is a moral and existential imperative. Rebuilding the resilience and efficiency of our dangerously decrepit infrastructure isn't a socialist plot, it is the foundation for safe communities and a robust economy.

In the wake of a natural disaster, people come together to help their neighbors. Smart politicians put aside their partisan posturing to join in doing what can be done to save the endangered and rebuild from the destruction. Now, we need to demand that the same common sense and responsibility be exercised to protect ourselves from the calamities to come, not just to rebuild after them.

educators – Mary Lou Allison Gardner Little, Dorothy Hanley Whiteside, Vivian Irene White Marbury, Nannie Mae Gahn Johnson, Hattie Mae Anette Dulin Redford, Bessie Mae Downy Rhoades Martin and Cubena McClure founded the sorority as a means of advocacy, racial uplift and educational service to women and children.

There's a lot to learn from a group of women in their early 20's who saw a need in their community and vowed to address it despite the social conditions they experienced — namely racism and sexism. These seven were among the first to trailblaze at Butler University, a predominantly white campus missioned to be equitable and accessible for all people, including women and people of color as they pursued their teaching degrees. Today, we boast more than 90,000 members around the globe

making impact through scholarship, sisterhood and service. As I reflect on the legacy they left for the members and descendants, it is clear that we have much to gain from the pathway they created.

As a member of Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority and as a founder legacy, I believe one piece of wisdom I have gained is to make no excuses. In the face of continued racism, sexism and other injustices, we have to be bold about our positionality and our advocacy on the things that matter the most to us.

Today, it is so easy to scroll past an injustice, turn the channel or simply ignore what many of our ancestors fought against without wavering. In many ways, people have become desensitized to the harm that is happening to our people and even to themselves. We've normalized trauma and therefore are not intentional about addressing it. We can be full of excuses that interrupt our need to fight for ourselves and our future generations. For our seven pearls, it didn't matter that the KKK leader's home was directly across the street from their college nor that they were part of a select few gaining entry into the school, they realized the responsibility they had to the women and children in their communities. They would become educators by any

means necessary and serve. If they could do it in the 20's with far fewer resources, why can't we now? We must give up our excuses and get to work to better our communities.

Another piece of wisdom I have gained is that our works will speak for us, so we don't have to parade our deeds. One of the most valuable lessons I learned from my great-grandmother, Vivian Irene White Marbury, is that she didn't go around heralding that she was a SGRHO founder. In fact, I never heard her utter those words. Instead, she embodied being a Sigma woman through her actions, her service, her poise and her words. What she did was not about her: I believe she saw herself simply as a vessel of service to others.

What if we could all do that today? Be more concerned about our neighbors, the children in our city, the people we interact with instead of our own gains. Serve others without having to post on social media, give anonymously, share our wisdom without expectations of a return favor. I believe we would be a richer people and more selfless if we could only be fully in service to others.

to be carried forward. There was likely much resistance and difficulty to get that flame established in 1922, and over the years it has both flared and dimmed, but either way the torch was meant to be carried forward. Not by just one, but by the many who realize the impact of community activism, change, education and community.

As we continue to navigate some of the very social issues that they did in the 1920's, we must identify new ways to keep the fire ablaze. We have to work together, we have to care, and we have to realize our collective power. As that happens, each flame in the torch will burn brighter and serve as a representation of our unity and impact.

To the members and affiliates of Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority, an early happy Founder's Day! May your thoughts be centered around your individual role in carrying the torch forward through the next 100 years. To those in our communities, may you be inspired by the actions of our seven pearls and realize your own purpose and role in carrying the torch forward.

This November, unite to defend the Black vote

(TriceEdneyWire.com) – Right before our last national elections in 2020, thousands of Black voters in Detroit got a call from someone posing as a woman named "Tamika Taylor." She warned them that if they voted, the government would collect their personal information and come after them for credit card debt,

outstanding warrants, even forced vaccinations. The calls were a voter suppression scam, and the two white guys behind it were prosecuted. But we'll never know how many people were nervous enough to

avoid voting that year.

Dirty tricks like this make me sick. And as we get closer to this year's midterms, civil rights leaders are warning that we're likely to see more of them. The far right is waging a war on Black voters, and disinformation is among its favorite weapons. Another one is passing laws to make it harder for Black citizens to vote. The Brennan Center at NYU keeps track of these efforts. The legal scholars there report that since 2020, lawmakers in 49 states have introduced more than 400 bills that would make it harder to vote. This midterm election is the first nationwide election since that massive voter suppression campaign started, and we have one way to fight it: massive voter mobilization.

Getting our friends and neighbors to vote so we can have a say on issues that affect our daily lives is a calling for all of us. I am fortunate to lead an organization that will make Black male voters the focus of our Get Out the Vote efforts this year. Our initiative, Defend the Black Vote, will reach out to Black men in 15 states who are registered but skipped two out of three of the last elections. Our focus will be men because they still don't vote in the high percentages Black women do. Our message will be simple: Vote this November. Vote because your vote is your voice and your power. Vote because of everything that is on the line in these elections: jobs, reproductive rights, mass incarceration, who sits on our courts, education for our kids, health care, pollution in the environment where our families live.

Vote because we need to ban the box. Vote because Black Lives Matter. Vote because you have a dream of American Way and professor of the practice at the entrepreneurship. Vote because your mental health, and your family's mental health, matters. Vote because the white supremacists don't want you to, and are doing everything they can to stop you, and that

tells you how important it is.

I know that some folks don't vote because they believe their vote doesn't matter. History shows that it does. The best example I can think of is what happened in Georgia in 2020, the first year we ran our Defend the Black Vote campaign. We motivated over 200,000 additional Black men in Georgia to vote that year — a year when the presidential election in the state was decided by 12,000 votes. The Black men who voted in Georgia made a historic difference, and the numbers prove it.

We know there's one more way today's far right and their predecessors — the Klan, the White League and all the other terrorists like them - have tried to suppress Black votes, and it's the ugliest: intimidation and threats of violence. Our ancestors faced a real risk of being attacked or murdered for registering to vote or voting. Today the intimidation might be more high-tech: Is your name in the system, will you be accused of an illegal vote? Florida's arrests of returning citizens who voted - after being issued new voter registration cards by the state itself - are especially cruel. They were meant to scare people, and they probably did.

So, vote because we refuse to be intimidated. Because those who went before us put their lives on the line to cast a ballot. And if you are a man who doesn't have a plan to vote, or you have a father, brother, uncle or son who doesn't have a plan, it's not too late to make one now. We need you.

When the inevitable hurricanes threaten New Orleans, it's hard for India Scott to figure where to go. In the city where she was born and raised, she's stayed in hotels, relief shelters and, during Hurricane Katrina, in the famously overcrowded Superdome.

But it is always a gamble choosing where to seek refuge. A lot of places that are safe for most people aren't safe for her because they aren't accessible to people like her, people living with disabilities.

Scott has used a wheelchair her entire life; she was born with a disability. Even when the weather is calm in New Orleans she is reluctant to leave home to visit friends or go out to shop or eat, because places outside her house can't guarantee that she'll be able to maneuver even basic things like using the restroom, passing through an entryway or getting into bed.

Scott's house in the Algiers neighborhood of New Orleans is comfortable with features that are required by code yet often missing, like widened entryways for her wheelchair. It has a bed lower to the ground that's easier to get in and out of it. But because she lives near a levee, she leaves that comfort behind whenever a major hurricane or tropical storm is forecast because rising floodwater that would challenge anyone would surely be fatal for her.

"I try my best to make my home comfortable," she said, "but if that water ever comes through, I'm in trouble."

Scott said she can't rely on the city, state or federal government when storms come, only friends. She said there is inadequate support for disabled people before, during and after disasters, from emergency management agencies at all levels of government. "We're on our own," she said, through tears, to The Associated Press.

Experts and activists echoed her view, telling the AP people with disabilities are left out of emergency and disaster planning, and face hurdles that ablebodied people don't when disasters strike.

As climate-related disasters become more common and more severe, most countries in the world are "neglecting their obligations to respect, protect, and fulfill the rights of persons with disabilities in their responses to the climate crisis," according to a June report from the Disability Inclusive Climate Action Research Program at McGill University and the International Disability Alliance.

The researchers found that only 32 of the 192 countries that are signatories to the United Na-

tions Framework Convention on Climate Change's Paris climate accords in 2015 refer to people with disabilities in their official climate plans. Forty-five countries refer to disabled people in their climate adaptation policies and no country mentions disabled people in its climate mitigation plans. Many of the world's biggest contributors to climate change — the United States, China, Russia, Brazil, Germany, Japan and the United Kingdom — don't figure people with disabilities into any of these plans, according to the report.

That is despite the fact that 185 countries ratified the United Nations' Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, drafted in 2006, which says that countries will take "all necessary measures to ensure the protection and safety of persons with disabilities in ... humanitarian emergencies and the occurrence of natural disasters." The U.S. was one of eight countries that signed the treaty but haven't ratified it.

People who are disabled are not a small segment of the population. According to the World Health Organization, there were over a billion people in the world living with a disability in 2011, which was 15% of the global population at the time. The organization plans to release an update on disability prevalence in December.

More recently, researchers with the Disability Data Initiative estimated the percentage of people with disabilities averages 12.6% across 41 countries for which they have data, as of 2021. One of them, Sophie Mitra, said the WHO figure of one billion is likely to have grown since 2011.

A clear example of this failure took place at the U.N. Climate Change Conference (COP26) in November 2021. Israeli Energy Minister Karine Elharrar, who uses a wheelchair, was prevented from entering a conference event by police officers. A day later, after the incident was publicized, conference organizers and the British government constructed a ramp so she could attend.

But the problems people face go beyond access at international conferences and happen on the national, state and local level. When people can't access climate planning talks, it's more likely they won't be figured into emergency management plans.

And the climate crisis isn't only affecting people with physical disabilities, Grace Krause, policy officer for Learning Disability Wales, said in a 2019 blog post. Krause said it was "alarming" how little information on climate change was presented in an "easy read" format for people with certain cognitive



disabilities. That format uses short sentences, active voice and explanation of any complex words and ideas in a separate sentence.

Font choices that make text easier to read for people with dyslexia is another way climate communications can be more accessible.

In 2019, the UN Human Rights Council adopted a resolution calling on governments to take climate action that is inclusive of people with disabilities, but there still isn't much action from the UN's official climate policy arm, the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change.

There were two disability-related events at COP26 – one on designing cities that are both climate resilient and accessible and another on mental health and climate action – but they were side events. Disability inclusion in climate action has rarely taken the main stage.

Julia Watts Belser, a Georgetown University professor who uses a wheelchair, said the inclusion of people with disabilities in climate mitigation and adaptation planning "matters deeply" to her. She leads an initiative exploring the intersection of climate change and disability at Georgetown and teaches a class called Disability, Ethics, Ecojustice.

"I think about wanting us as a society to invest in the infrastructure for our communities so that we are better able to adapt and respond," she said, "so we aren't leaving people behind, so we aren't leaving people to die."

While there is no cure for diabetes, healthy lifestyle habits such as taking medicine as prescribed, diabetes self-management education, and keeping doctor appointments can improve a person's quality of life.

This year's conference focuses on kidney health and is offered to anyone with diabetes or kidney disease, as well as family members, caregivers, and friends.

"Too Sweet for Your Own Good" takes place on Saturday, Nov. 12 from 10 a.m.-2:30 p.m. at Fairbanks Hall, 340 W. 10th Street, on the IUPUI campus.

The conference is free and includes lunch, but registration is required. Free parking is also available.

Presentations will include information about diabetes from an endocrinologist, kidney health from a nephrologist, nutrition management and exercise. Kidneys are important to good health. The main job of the kidneys is to filter the blood in the body, which goes through the kidneys several times a day.

The kidneys remove waste from the blood and adjust salts, fluid and minerals. This waste is turned into urine, which then travels to the bladder and eventually exits the body.

Most people have two kidneys, but the body can function well with only one.

Kidneys need a certain level of pressure to work properly. They use hormones and fluid levels to control this pressure. For example, if the pressure inside the kidneys is too low, the kidneys make a hormone that causes blood vessels to constrict. This has the effect of increasing blood pressure.

Maintaining normal blood pressure keeps the heart, brain and other organs healthy.

When the kidneys slow down or stop working, the body cannot remove excess fluids and waste. Over time, toxins build up and make a person feel sick.

Damaged kidneys affect every part of your body. This condition is called chronic kidney disease (CKD).

One out of every 3 adults in the United States are at risk of life-threatening kidney disease. Most people don't even know they are at risk, which is why kidney health screening can help save lives.

The album also includes the choir's renditions of Sam Cooke's "A Change is Gonna Come," which was released in 1964, as well as "Stand Up," an original song from the 2019 film "HARRIET." Soweto, South Africa, is well known

for the uprising that happened in 1976. Oct. 18. IU's African American Choral Students from the Soweto Township in Johannesburg, South Africa, peacefully protested the government's enforcement of teaching Afrikaans - a creole language which evolved in 19th century southern Africa that was widely regarded by Black South Africans as the language of the oppressor — in schools. During the protests, South African police fired tear gas and live ammunition, killing more than 170 protesters.

Judge gauges if Indiana abortion ban defies religious rights

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - A top Indiana lawyer on Oct. 14 questioned the validity of a lawsuit brought by a group of residents who argue that the state's abortion ban violates their religious freedoms.

A judge heard arguments for about an hour in an Indianapolis courtroom, spurred by claims from five anonymous residents - who hold Jewish, Muslim and spiritual faiths - and the group Hoosier Jews for Choice. They argue the ban — which is currently blocked due to a separate lawsuit – violates their religious rights regarding when they believe abortion is acceptable. The lawsuit says the ban violates the Jewish teaching that "a fetus attains the status of a living person only at birth" and that "Jewish law stresses the necessity of protecting the life and physical and mental health of the mother prior to birth." It also cites theological teachings allowing abortion in at least some circumstances by Islamic, Episcopal, Unitarian Universalist and pagan faiths.

"The state simply cannot decree what is religious and what is secular," Ken Falk, the American Civil Liberties Union of Indiana's legal director, said Friday.

Filed in Marion County court, the religious freedom lawsuit is the second of two challenges against the ban filed by the ACLU. It cites a state law that then-Gov. Mike Pence signed in 2015 to prohibit any laws that "substantially



burden" a person's ability to follow their religious beliefs. Critics have decried the Republican-backed measure as a thinly disguised attempt to permit discrimination against gay people.

In response to the religious freedom complaint, the state attorney general's office said the anonymous stories cited in the lawsuit are too abstract to be analyzed, adding that "their asserted harms regarding changes to their contraceptive and sexual practices do not outweigh the grave consequences of killing an unborn child."

Solicitor General Thomas Fisher reiterated that argument, when he maintained the anonymous plaintiffs' "hypothetical" reasons for an abortion do not meet the religious freedom law's "case-specific, factual inquiry" requirement.

"We're not in the moment when the abortion is becoming part of the religious exercise, if ever it does," Fisher Republican Indiana Attorney General said.

Marion County Judge Heather Welch said both sides must submit additional written arguments by Oct. 28 and she will make her decision within 30 days after that.

The ACLU's other lawsuit revolves around claims that the ban violates the state's constitution, something the Indiana Supreme Court said it would consider next year.

The high court took over appeals of a judge's decision in September that blocked the ban a week after it took effect and denied a request from the state to set aside the temporary block. A scheduled hearing on the lawsuit, filed in August by abortion clinic operators, is set for Jan. 12.

Because the state Supreme Court is considering the other case, Fisher said issuing a preliminary injunction for the religious freedom one would have 'symbolic significance" only.

"Symbolic rulings are not the role of the court," Fisher, a top deputy to Todd Rokita, said.

Falk, however, told reporters after the hearing that having a second preliminary injunction against the ban creates more certainty, especially because the lawsuits deal with separate aspects of the law.


The abortion ban, which includes narrow exceptions, was approved by the state's GOP-dominated Legislature on Aug. 5 and signed by Republican Gov. Eric Holcomb. That made Indiana the first state to enact tighter abortion restrictions since the U.S. Supreme Court eliminated federal abortion protections by overturning Roe v. Wade in June.

No faith is monolithic on the abortion issue. Yet many followers of faiths that do not prohibit abortion have lamented that tighter abortion laws could supersede their individual rights and religious beliefs, such as the position of Judaism as outlined in the lawsuit.

Similar lawsuits have been filed elsewhere recently, including in Kentucky and in Florida, where a synagogue in June argued that the state's abortion restrictions violates the religious freedom rights of Jews.

As the causes of US inflation grow, so do the dangers

WASHINGTON (AP) — What keeps driving inflation so high? The answer, it seems, is nearly everything.

Supply chain snarls and parts shortages inflated the cost of factory goods when the economy rocketed out of the pandemic recession two years ago. Then it was a surge in consumer spending fueled by federal stimulus checks. Then Russia's invasion of Ukraine disrupted gas and food supplies and sent those prices skyward.

Since March, the Federal Reserve has been aggressively raising interest rates to try to cool the price spikes. So far, there's little sign of progress. An Oct. 13 report on consumer prices in September came in hotter than expected even as some previously big drivers of inflation — gas prices, used cars — fell for a third straight month.

Consumer prices, excluding volatile food and energy costs, skyrocketed 6.6% from a year ago — the fastest such pace in four decades. Overall inflation did decline a touch, mostly because of cheaper gas. But costlier food, medical care and housing pointed to a widening of price pressures across the economy.

High inflation has now spread well beyond physical goods to the nation's vast service sector, which includes everything from dental care and apartment rents to auto repairs and hotel rates. The broadening of inflation makes it harder to tame. The report underscored that the Fed may have to jack up its key short-term rate even higher than had been expected — and keep it there longer — to curb inflation.

Such action would mean even higher loan rates for consumers and businesses. It could also cause recessions in both the U.S. and global economies, international financial officials warn. Higher U.S. rates encourage investors to pull money from foreign markets and invest it in U.S. assets for a higher return, a shift that can cause upheaval in overseas economies.

Here's what's driving persistent inflation and what it means:

SPENDING STILL HOLDING UP – FOR SOME

Consumers, on the whole, are still managing to spend more, even though average wage gains over the past year haven't kept up with inflation. Many businesses, particularly larger corporations, have taken advantage of rising wages and increased consumer savings from government stimulus checks to raise their prices.

PepsiCo, for example, said that while purchases by volume fell 1% in the third quarter of the year, it was able to boost prices 17% without losing customers.

"We obviously exited the third quarter with the consumer still very healthy in terms of our particular categories," the company's chief financial officer, Hugh Johnston, told investors.

Still, for many Americans, declining wages (after adjusting for inflation) could eventually slow demand and help force companies to lower prices.

Already there are signs that some Americans, particularly lower-income families, are balking at inflated prices. Sales of used cars fell over the summer. One major car dealer, the CarMax chain, blamed "vehicle affordability challenges that stem from widespread inflationary pressures, as well as climbing interest rates" for the decline.

At the same time, Jonathan Smoke, chief economist at Cox Automotive, said that many higher-income consumers have stepped into the used car market, offsetting at least some of the loss from previous buyers.

"We see increases in higher-income households buying used vehicles," Smoke said. "The profile of who's buying used is a dramatically upper-scale type of customer."

SERVICES INFLATION TAKES OVER

Rising prices can often lead consumers to switch their spending to other things, rather than cutting back overall. Right now, for instance, Americans are switching more of their spending from physical goods to services. And that shift is evident in the categories where prices are rising.

"Most people in America spend pretty much their whole budget anyway," said Eric Swanson, an economics professor at the University of California, Irvine. "So the money's going to get spent, it's just a question of what it's going to get spent on."

In September, the price of one major service — restaurant meals — jumped 8.5% from a year earlier. It was the largest such increase in 41 years. Likewise, Delta and American Airlines are reporting strong revenue gains as more Americans show willingness to spend on travel.

Yet restaurants, airlines and hotels all still have far fewer workers than they did before the pandemic. With demand healthy, companies in those industries have been forced to provide hefty pay raises to attract or keep workers. Those raises are often then passed on to consumers in the form of higher prices — a cycle that feeds inflation.

Many other services are also reporting big price increases, including health care, car insurance, veterinarian services and dentists' visits. Eye care and eyeglasses jumped 3.2% from August to September, the sharpest increase for that category on record.

HOUSING PRICES DEFY FED

The Fed's rate hikes have led to vastly higher mortgage rates, which have contributed to a 20% plunge in home sales from a year ago. Once-hot home prices even fell in July on a monthly basis, according to the most recent data from the S&P Case-Shiller home price index.

Apartment rental costs are also starting to slow, according to real time data from ApartmentList and Zillow.

Yet in the inflation report, one key measure of housing costs jumped 0.8% from August to September. It was the largest monthly increase in 32 years. The divergence occurred because the government's rent gauge operates with a significant lag: It tracks all rent payments — not just those for new leases — and most of them don't change

from month to month. Economists say

it could be a year or more before the declines in new leases feed through to government data.

WILL THE FED CAUSE A RECESSION?

That's the biggest fear overhanging the economy. Chair Jerome Powell and other Fed officials have said that they will base their policies only on changes in the government's inflation data, rather than in response to data from other sources.

Yet that sets up a high-risk challenge for the central bank: Will it keep hiking rates, or leave them at high levels, if forward-looking data suggests that rental costs are declining?

For now, the Fed is willing to err on the side of continuing to raise borrowing rates. According to the minutes of its last meeting in September, policymakers "emphasized that the cost of taking too little action to bring down inflation likely outweighed the cost of taking too much action."

Colts receiving group takes major step in win over Jaguars

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) – Indianapolis coach Frank Reich and general manager Chris Ballard spent the spring and summer insisting the Colts receiving group would be strong, deep and productive.

Yes, they expected it to take time for a young, mostly unproven group of receivers to grow into new roles and jell with another new quarterback.

In Week 6, the contingent finally demonstrated what it could do - together.

Rookie receiver Alec Pierce and rookie tight end Jelani Woods each caught one touchdown pass. So did the oft-injured Parris Campbell. Second-year tight end Kylen Granson and Michael Pittman Jr., the most accomplished receiver, routinely turned short throws into big plays.

The combination produced Indy's best offensive game of the season, a 34-27 victory over Jacksonville.

"It definitely felt great for this offense to really come into our own, having a bunch of the young guys stepping up," Granson said Oct. 17. "It felt really good putting that on tape."

Quarterback Matt Ryan wore down Jacksonville's defense with a flurry of short, quick throws that gave receivers a chance to make plays with their legs. The no-huddle strategy worked perfectly.

Ryan completed a career-high and franchise-record 42 passes for 389 yards, the last coming on a 32-yard score to Pierce with 17 seconds left.

Pierce played the third-and-13 call like a veteran.

"I thought if they came up and pressed like they did, he was going to throw the ball my way," Pierce said. "Knowing they were going to play the sticks, playing aggressive, just trying to get us out of fieldgoal range. ... I just saw the ball up in the air. I had a little bit of a step, at least he (Shaquill Griffin) was in panic mode, so he was chasing and wasn't able to react."

He wound up with three catches for 49 yards though the stats never seem to reflect Pierce's true impact. He also got Griffin twice for an additional 24 yards on pass interference calls - calls that made Griffin more hesitant at the end.

It's not just Pierce.

While Pittman remains Ryan's most consistent target, Campbell, Granson and Woods matched Pittman's 13 receptions and combined for 163 yards. And ed free agent, was a perfect 10 for 10 on balls thrown his direction for 79 vards.

Reich and Ballard believe this group can keep it up and after the confidence-building performance so does everyone else.

"That is the key thing, taking another step, trying to keep this rolling and keep that rhythm going," Woods said. "We know what we have, and we know the things we can do. We just have to put it all together and keep going."

WHAT'S WORKING

No-huddle offense. The quicker pace certainly gave Ryan & Co. a jolt of energy. Perhaps most important, it kept Ryan upright. While he did take some big hits, Ryan was not sacked and had no fumbles for the first time all season. Indy also finished with its highestscoring total in 13 games.

WHAT NEEDS HELP

Run defense. Maybe it's a Jacksonville thing. Indy entered the week with the league's No. 4 run defense but allowed 243 yards Oct 16. It was most allowed by Indy since giving up 179 in November 2021 -to the Jags. It needs to be cleaned up quickly with Derrick Henry up next.

STOCK UP

Jackson. He filled in nicely at Denver but made an impressive starting debut gameday with 12 carries for 42 yards, capped by a powerful 3-yard TD run in addition to his pass-catching prowess.

STOCK DOWN

Bernhard Raimann. Days after Reich said the rookie would continue playing left tackle and the Colts would live with the growing pains, Raimann left after Indy's second possession. Reich said the plan was to alternate Raimann with veteran Dennis Kelly but Kelly played so well they kept him in the game. That does not appear to be a permanent decision.

INJURIES

Jackson left late in the game with an injured quad, but the bigger concern is Keke Coutee. The veteran took a big shot on a punt return and remained down

second-year running back Deon Jackson, an undraft- for several minutes, a scary enough sight that players from both teams took a knee. Eventually, he walked to the locker room and was diagnosed with a concussion. Reich doesn't expect him to play at Tennessee.

KEY NUMBER

Four. The Colts ended a 110-minute, 20-second touchdown drought by scoring four touchdowns in the final 32 1/2 minutes against the Jags. Indy had six TDs in its first five games.

NEXT STEPS

The victory, and the offensive performance, were promising signs. Now the Colts must prove it wasn't just a one-game fluke with a visit to division-leading Tennessee. A win in Nashville would put Indy atop the AFC South and even its division record at 2-2-1.
