IMPD officer indicted for excessive force in 2021 Monument Circle incident

A federal grand jury indicted Indianapolis police officer Sgt. Eric Huxley for violating the civil rights of a Black man during an arrest on Monument Circle in September

Huxley, 44, is charged with one count of deprivation of rights.

Body camera footage shows an officer take the man, identified as Jermaine Vaughn, to the ground in handcuffs. Huxley then walked up to Vaughn, who was leaned forward on his back, and stomped once on


Huxley is a 15-year veteran of the India-



napolis Metropolitan Police Department. He remains suspended without pay pending a recommendation of termination to the IMPD Civilian Police Merit Board. The board only reviews an officer's status once the criminal process is complete.

"This incident was unnecessary and should have never occurred," IMPD Chief Randal Taylor said in a statement after the indictment was announced. "I would not tolerate this behavior from any community member; Sergeant Huxley is no exception. As law enforcement officers, we must understand that this behavior violates the community's trust. We have confidence the judicial system will bring justice to Mr. Vaughn and his family."

This fall marks five years since the opening of the Center for Black Literature & Culture at the Indianapolis Public Library.

The CBLC, funded by a donation from the Lilly Endowment, works to shed light on the vibrant and resilient heritage and positive accomplishments of Indy's Black community, Keshia McEntire, public relations and communications specialist for IndyPL, said in an email to the Recorder.

"This 5th-anniversary event allows us to celebrate all that the CBLC has done in the past and all that [it] plans to do moving forward," McEntire said. "It means a lot to walk into a space like the CBLC, to look at the photographs on the walls, and to see the faces of famed Black athletes, writers, politicians, activists, artists and musicians from Indiana reflected."

The CBLC regularly hosts local and national authors, poets, civic leaders, scholars and artists in addition to maintaining a safe space to hold events such as Kwanzaa celebrations, panel discussions, author talks and more.

"We've come so far since the founding of the Center for Black Literature & Culture," Amira Malcom, interim manager of the CBLC, said in a statement. "I love seeing how our space continues to enrich the Indianapolis community with new workshops, annual cultural celebrations such as the Juneteenth Bookfest and the Kwanzaa Celebration, and our growing collection of over 20,000 items."

Malcom took over for Nichelle M. Hayes, who is currently the library's interim CEO.

The fifth anniversary celebration, which McEntire said will allow people with African roots to see themselves reflected in powerful and positive ways, will include an appearance from Colts tight end Kylen Granson and a poetry reading from CBLC Poet Laureate Januarie York and National Youth Poet Laureate Alyssa Gaines.

Dr. Nicole A. Cooke, associate professor at the School of Library and Information Science at the University of South Carolina, will give the keynote address.

"I think having a space dedicated to highlighting the achievements of the Black community benefits Indianapolis

Libraries reach across digital divide

Darlin Martinez works in the computer lab at the Martindale-Brightwood branch of the Indianapolis Public Library. She helps out in the Career Center and teaches computer literacy classes.

Martinez lives in the neighborhood and has built connections with many of the regular

"I'm kind of fanatical about community," she said.

She teaches classes like "Introduction to Gmail" and "Microsoft Word." Most of the regular attendees are seniors learning how to use a computer for the first time.

She said most of them are reentering the workforce — and the job application process looks a lot different today than it did when they left. Instead of turning in a paper application, much of the work is completed online.

"I had a gentleman come in who was applying at the Safeway across the street," Martinez said. "The [people at Safeway] were like, 'No, go to the library, get on a computer, make a user, pick our location.' It was like a million and one steps."

Martinez said the patron came in to use the library computers to work on his application.

Indy Pride provides members of the LGBTQ+ community with over 50 inclusive employers at annual career fair

Job seekers swarmed the inside of Gainbridge Fieldhouse for Indy Pride's annual LGBTQ+ career fair, where Hoosiers were able to meet with more than 50 inclusive employers about their

open positions. A few of the companies present were GetGo, Eli Lily, IndyGo, Delta Faucet Company, the city of Indianapolis, Amazon and American Funds.

"We are a marginalized community and sometimes it is hard to find work," said Tierra Radford, a career fair attendee. "It might be based off

of outside appearance or assumption about the type of people we may be."

Radford said even when someone in the LG-BTQ+ community gets the job they want, they may find out the workplace isn't actually wel-

"This is something that is definitely needed," she said of the career fair.

According to a recent study from the UCLA School of Law William Institute, 45.5% of LG-BTQ+ workers have experienced unfair treatment at a job at some point during their life and over 31% of LGBTQ+ workers have experienced unfair treatment at a workplace within the past five years. Some of the unfair treatment reported included harassment, discrimination and even termination because of that person's sexual identity and sexual orientation.

"There are so many companies now that don't give everyone the opportunity to advance equally," GetGo representative BreAnne Middleton said. "Having events like this helps us stand out as employers to let people know that this is a safe place to be,

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Foster Grandparent Program enriches the lives of students and seniors

The Foster Grandparent Program gives people 55 and older the opportunity to mentor and tutor children for at least 15 hours a week. The program, not to be mistaken with foster parents, typically serves children 6 weeks old to 18 years old.

"It's a wonderful program not only for the children; it's a wonderful program for me," 65-year-old foster grandparent Caroline Whitaker said at a recent Foster Grandparent meeting at the Julia M. Carson Government Center. "Just to hear the kids say, 'Ms. Caroline, I love you,' that's all I need."

Whitaker said she enjoys helping the children at her current placement at a child care center. She has been a foster grandparent for a little over a year and as a former teacher, she said she has a lot of experience working with children of all ages.

When recalling her three years as a foster grandparent, 74-year-old Linda Evans spoke about a young boy who attends the ROCK Community Center for Youth & Children. Every day, when the boy gets to the community center, he looks for Evans, and when he leaves, they exchange an "I love you."

Evans said her contributions to his life and to the lives of the other children at the **ROCK Community Center will encourage** and uplift them in their future.

"I think this whole program is good because there are a lot of kids who do not have grandparents or they are far away," she said. Everyone needs a grandparent. Grandparents are vital."

While the program is geared toward helping children, Joni Collins, Foster Grandparent Program coordinator, said the program is just as beneficial to the seniors as it is to the children. Not only are the seniors being "active citizens" and giving back to the community by mentoring the kids, she said they also are more physically active than other seniors, which could extend their lives.

The program offers seniors a modest stipend, transportation cost reimbursement, paid sick and vacation leave and a daily lunch. Virginia Muhammad was a foster grandparent for many years at Snacks Crossing Elementary School, but she left the program to take care of her husband. She decided

to participate in the program once again after her husband recently died.

"I think it's an excellent program," she said. "I enjoy working with children. You have to really love working with children."

The local director, Shelida Purnell, said the program continues to prioritize getting more seniors in the program to expand the outreach to other facilities across Indianapolis. To become a foster grandparent seniors must meet income eligibility requirements and pass a physical and background check.





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FINDING INNER BEAUTY:

The Actors Theatre of Indiana to bring 'Violet' to The Studio Theater


Preaching a lesson in self-love and courage, the cast of "Violet" will take the stage at The Studio Theater on Oct. 28.

The Actors Theatre of Indiana will present the Broadway musical "Violet" at The Studio Theater in Carmel as part of their 2023-23 season. With music by Jeanine Tesori and book by Brian Crawley, "Violet" is a Tony Award-winning show featuring bluegrass, R&B and country music.

"I think after people see it, it'll put them in a mood of gratitude so to speak," said Tiffanie Bridges, a local actress playing the role of Lula Buffington, the choir singer in "Violet." "Going into the holidays it kinda just gets people thinking about 'oh, I have so many reasons actually, to be thankful that I'm blessed."

"Violet" takes place in the Deep South in the early days of the Civil Rights Movement of the 1960s and follows the story of a young girl named Violet. Violet, whose face has been disfigured by a scar from an ax accident, embarks on a journey across state lines in search of a miracle to rid herself of it.

Violet's quest takes her from her hometown in North Carolina to Tulsa, Oklahoma, where she believes a TV evangelist

can perform a miracle to "cure" her disfigured face. However, along the way, Violet meets a young Black soldier who teaches her about love, courage and what it means to be an outsider.

"She is on a quest to find beauty, but in, like, a superficial way; she wanted to be seen," Bridges said. "On this quest she finds that beauty really is in the eye of the beholder, and it comes from within."

"Violet" contains many themes within the lines and music — a few of which Bridges said she recently discussed with the rest of the cast specifically, how the main character and her struggles are applicable to others in many ways.

"Now with Violet, there's this physical scar, but I think that a lot of us have scars even within where we're looking for some type of validation," she said. "We want that part removed because we think that will make us better."

At one point in the show, Bridges said the TV evangelist tells Violet something along the lines of "Well, your scar is already healed," in response to her request to be healed. Bridges said she hopes people will recognize the significance of that line within walk away with a little bit of their own healing.

Opening night for "Violet" is Oct. 28 and the show will run Wednesday through Sunday until Nov. 13. 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
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

Mural unveiling at the Madam Walker Legacy Center

Community members and leaders came together to celebrate the unveiling of the city's latest work of art honoring bicentennial legends.

On Oct. 13, the Madam Walker Legacy Center hosted a ribbon cutting and dedication of the new mural depicting its namesake, self-made millionaire and entrepreneur Madam C.J. Walker, in downtown Indianapolis at 315 N. Senate Ave.

The mural, which is a smaller rendition of a portrait of Madam C.J. Walker painted for the Indianapolis International Airport in 2021, was painted by Indianapolis-based artist Tasha Beckwith. This mural is the second in the City of Indianapolis Bicentennial Commission's Indiana Legends mural series, the first of which went up in 2021 and depicts African American cyclist Marshall "Major" Taylor on the Barnes & Thornburg building, located at 11 S. Meridian St.

"With the help of our community's

generous fundraising contributions we were able to ensure that this mural prominently displays our namesake for all to learn from and enjoy," Kristian Stricklen, president of the Madam Walker Legacy Center, said in a press release. "We're so excited to continue preserving and honoring the legacy of Madam C.J. Walker by way of this new beautiful mural."

Community leaders such as Con-

gressman Andre Carson, Mayor Joe Hogsett and City-County Council President Vop Osili were in attendance and spoke during the program.

Julia Moore, director of public art for the Indy Arts Council, said the mural series aims to spotlight those who have made an impact on Indianapolis but may have been overlooked during their lifetime because of their race, gender or social status. "Seeing these individuals' faces and learning about their contributions is vital to understanding who we are as a culture," Moore said. "Indianapolis would not be what it is today without Madam Walker's influence."

'I'm overpowered by what I've overcome':Community gathers to honor lives of domestic violence victims

The crowd was silent as Monica Conley walked to the front of Scott United Methodist Church's sanctuary. She set her typed notes on the podium and began reading her domestic violence survival story.

Conley was married to a man, and three months into the marriage, after being physically, mentally and emotionally abused, she filed for divorce. She thought the abuse would end once the divorce was finalized, but then her ex-husband stalked and harassed her for many months after, even with a protective order in place.

"I was drained by what I'd gone through, but now I'm overpowered by what I've overcome," she said. "Too many people have lost their lives to domestic violence. I hope that my story saves many more because there is nothing extraordinary about me. I'm just me, and if I can make it out, everyone else can, too."

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month, and on Oct. 25, people from Central Indiana came together at Scott UMC to honor those who have died from domestic violence in the last year and celebrate those who have survived. It took several days for him to figure out how to navigate the computer and online portal.

"He'd kind of be worn out after an hour and say, 'I've got to come back, I've got to step away," Martinez said. "I mean, he came in like six or seven times to work on that one application. And it was tough, because he was not comfortable on the computer at all."

Digital inclusion ensures that people learn the skills they need to navigate an online world. But many people learning these skills don't own a computer. Even more can't afford internet at home.

In Marion County, it's estimated nearly 90,000 households are without a computer and more than 200,000 people live in homes without broadband internet. That's according to data from The Polis Center at IUPUI.

The same data indicates Black and Hispanic communities disproportionately lack internet and computer access at home. Almost half of all people without a computer in Marion County are Black, even though Black residents make up less than a third of the county's residents.

That's where the library comes in. All public libraries in Indianapolis provide free access to computers and the internet when they are open. Marianne McKenzie runs the digital inclusion program at IndyPL and says it is the only way for many to apply for jobs, pay bills, get health care information and attend school.

"And then during the pandemic," McKenzie said, "we realized that there

were people who maybe couldn't make it during our standard business hours, who still needed access to Wi-Fi to do things like complete homework."

Today, all branches are open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., and after hours, people can access the library Wi-Fi from the parking lot.

"So if you find that ... you've got to, you know, upload a resume to a job or complete that homework assignment, there are some options [for getting online] even when the branch is closed," McKenzie said.

The digital divide is fueled by systemic inequalities

Data from Ball State University indicates disparities in internet access are particularly stark for people already facing socioeconomic disadvantages. It shows single-parent households, households with parents not in the workforce, low-income households and households that do not speak English at home are all far less likely to have internet access.

Research from the Brookings Institute underlines that income disparity. Families earning less than \$25,000 a year lack broadband at a rate three times higher than households earning more than \$100,000 a year.

Similarly, renters are around 15% more likely to lack broadband than homeowners.

These demographic disparities deepen the problem, said Nicol Turner-Lee, a researcher with the Brookings Institute.

"It's still the traditional availability, af-

fordability, digital literacy, but now it's compounded even more," Turner-Lee said. "Because the people who are on the wrong side of digital opportunity are often the ones that are experiencing a series of systemic inequalities."

Digital inclusion efforts at the library focus on engagement with disenfranchised communities to figure out what people's needs are.

McKenzie said addressing gaps in digital literacy is key to addressing larger inequities.

"From the library's perspective, our mission is all around lifelong learning," she said. "And increasingly, both from grade school, through college and on into lifelong learning, you have to have access to the internet, to engage in that process."

Michael Hicks, an economics professor at Ball State, said gaps in digital literacy aren't going away any time soon. Technology progresses at a pace that can leave some people behind if they do not adapt to the changes.

"I wrote a doctoral dissertation using a mainframe computer on a dial-up [internet connection] and I thought the dial-up service was great," Hicks said. "That was only 25 years ago."

Hicks pointed out other problems that make it difficult to solve digital inequities. For example, there will likely always be people who can't afford to pay for the internet at home. There will also always be people who can't read or write — federal money alone can't remove these types of barriers.

He said he believes state and local initiatives are most effective in ad-

dressing these issues.

"There's no permanent technological solution to this," Hicks said. "It's going to be an evolving one forever."

A 'wealth of opportunity' to make progress on digital inclusion

Several ongoing efforts are taking place at the federal level to close the digital divide.

The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, which was signed into law last year, includes programs that help households with internet access costs.

It also funds the Digital Equity Act, which offers grant money "to ensure that all people and communities have the skills, technology, and capacity needed to reap the full benefits of our digital economy."

Most of this federal money gets distributed at the state and local level. "So there's just this huge wealth of opportunity," McKenzie said.

The Indianapolis Public Library is a big local player in these initiatives. McKenzie said that's why it's working on collaborating with local nonprofits and other organizations that can also help.

"Right now is the time that Indianapolis has to form a group of people sort of pulling in the same direction to address digital inclusion, so that we're prepared to capture that additional funding," she said.



this is a safe place to work."


There will be something for guests of all ages, McEntire said, including a kid's corner with activities such as coloring and face painting.


A portion of the proceeds from "Sista Strut," including T-shirt sales and donations made online at indystrut.com, will go to Cancer Support Community, Jones said.

The 222 North Alabama Street Redevelopment Plan is a continuation of Hogsett's Downtown Resiliency Strategy.



You say you want a revolution

"No taxation without representation" is perhaps the most famous rallying cry in American history. The provenance of that slogan stretches back at least to December 1754, when Benjamin Franklin wrote the following in a letter to British army officer and politician William Shirley:

"It is suppos'd an undoubted Right of Englishmen not to be taxed but by their own Consent given thro' their Representatives. That the Colonies have no Representatives in Parliament. ... That compelling the Colonies to pay Money without their Consent would be rather like raising Contributions in an Enemy's Country, than taxing of Englishmen for their own publick Benefit."

The roll call of the "founding fathers" who spoke out passionately against taxation without representation includes men like John Hancock, Patrick Henry and Samuel Adams. Complaints from them and their fellow colonists steadily grew, especially after the British Parliament passed the Stamp Act of 1765 and the Townshend Acts of 1767, both of which were designed to help the British government reduce its massive debt. Parliament eventually relented, repealing both broadly based taxes. Of course, there was one infamous exception. The British maintained the tax on tea, of which the colonists consumed copious

In December 1773, 19 years after Franklin's missive, the Sons of Liberty dumped 342 chests of tea into Boston Harbor. The first Boston Tea Party was born. (There would be a second, smaller one several months later.) Britain retaliated by passing the punitive Intolerable Acts. As a result, in September 1774, representatives of all the colonies (except Georgia) convened the Continental Congress. This was, in effect, the beginning of the American Revolution.

For those who are keeping score at home, the American colonists did not unite to overthrow a government that enslaved them. They did not unite to overthrow a government that routinely beat or unjustly imprisoned them. They united to overthrow a government that taxed them too much without allowing them to have a representative whom they elected. They fomented a war because they did not participate fully in democracy.

Given that history, it is reprehensible that the state of Alabama earlier this month argued before the U.S. Supreme Court that it should not have to comply with a finding from a lower court which held that the state's voting map violates the Voting Rights Act of 1965. In short, the court found that the map disenfranchises tax-paying African Americans, who comprise 27% of the state's population. (Notably, two judges from the lower court were appointed by former President Donald Trump.)

The reasonable remedy to this problem would be to ensure that two of Alabama's seven congressional districts are majority African American — or substantially close to it. However, the Republican-led state Legislature maintained the one majority Black voting district that already existed, thereby severely diluting the Black vote across the rest of the state.

Perhaps the most ridiculous argument that Alabama is making is that taking the racial makeup of congressional districts into account violates the Equal Protection Clause of the Constitution. Essentially, attorneys for that state are arguing that the only way to ensure "race neutral" districts is to continue to disenfranchise Black voters in a state that has a very long history of doing just that. They're offering the tired sophistry that "you can't cure racism by taking race into account." Not only is that argument historically and logically flawed; it is morally indefensible.

I would love to offer the following rebuttal to the attorneys for Alabama: "If race does not matter, you should be in favor of Alabama reconfiguring its congressional districts to ensure that all of them have Black majorities." (I would ask the attorneys who are arguing before the Supreme Court in favor of dismantling affirmative action a very similar question about Harvard only admitting Black students.)

Fortunately, newly seated Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson swatted down Alabama's false premise by offering a textbook-worthy history lesson regarding the 14th Amendment, which enshrines the Equal Protection Clause. Sadly, however, it is likely that the Republican-led court will rule on favor of Alabama.

I'm reminded of a song from the Beatles:

"You say you want a revolution

Well, you know

We all want to change the world You tell me that it's evolution

Well, you know

We all want to change the world."

Oppose Kroger and Albertsons merger

(TriceEdneyWire.com) — Think the cost of food is high? Just wait.

Last week, Kroger announced plans to acquire Albertsons in a staggering \$24.6 billion deal. If the deal goes through, it will merge the No. 1 and No. 2 stand-alone grocery chains, which together operate nearly 5,000

stores around the country and generate more than \$200 billion in revenue each year.

If you think this doesn't affect you, think again. Kroger and Albertsons are holding companies as well as brands. Kroger brands include Ralphs, Dillons, Fred Meyer, Harris Teeter, King Soopers and several more. Albertsons operates under the names of Safeway, Haggen, Jewel-Osco, Shaws, Pavilions,

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Vons and several others.

Well versed by their financial advisers, the companies' CEOs are saying all the right things. The merger, they maintain, will allow major savings and efficiencies, some of which they will reinvest, much of which they will return to consumers in lower prices. And if you believe that, there is a bridge in the Utah desert that they'd like to sell you.

In reality, the merger will further consolidate the grocery store market. Right now, before the merger, according to the National Grocers Association, five companies control a stunning 60% of all U.S. grocery sales. After the merger, the combined company plus Walmart, by far the largest food seller, would control nearly 50% of the market.

That kind of concentration will lead to the loss of jobs for workers, rising prices for consumers and monopoly profits for the companies. Working families are already stretching to meet their food needs as food prices are rising rapidly. Eggs are up over 30% for the year, chicken over 17% and coffee over 15%. As the American Economic Liberties Project summarized, this merger "would be disastrous for market competition, small businesses, and especially consumers' pockets."

There are a lot of factors hitting food prices these days — the Ukraine war, drought in large portions of the U.S. and in China, an avian flu epidemic and more. But, as David Dayan of the American Prospect reports, one contributing factor is that consolidated companies take advantage of the moment to raise their own prices and profits even more. Dayan quotes Kroger CEO Rodney McMullen, who will head the merged company, saying that "a little bit of inflation is always good in our business" because 'customers don't overly react" — that is, blame the companies — to increases in prices.

Happily, Joe Biden has chosen anti-monopoly advocates to lead the agencies that police mergers, like the Federal Trade Commission that oversees grocery

chains. FTC head Lisa Kahn will surely challenge this merger. What the companies are counting on is that conservative judges will overturn the agencies and give the merger a pass. No question with billions at stake, they will have the best lawyers in the world

This is part of a bigger story. Today, American wages aren't keeping up with rising prices, while corporations — particularly in industries dominated by a small number of companies — pocket record profits.

to wage the legal war.

Reacting to inflation, the Federal Reserve is doing what it always does to lower prices — hike interest rates to slow the economy, throw millions out of work and force wages down.

But workers' wages aren't driving inflation. What's needed instead is a concerted effort to straighten out supply chains (and bring more manufacturing home), rebates to consumers paid for by taxes on oil and drug companies that are driving prices up, and an aggressive anti-trust effort to challenge the excess profits exacted by CEOs in concentrated industries.

Not surprisingly, a lot of money goes into convincing politicians to ignore large mergers. And a lot of money goes into grooming conservative judges to frustrate efforts to police mergers. Sen. Bernie Sanders has called the proposed merger an "absolute disaster," but few politicians are sufficiently independent to challenge the big money behind the proposed

So, it is vital that this not be left to the politicians and the judges. Leaders of communities — particularly rural and urban communities with poor and lower wage families — should demand to meet with the CEOs of Kroger and Albertsons to express opposition to the merger.

This merger will end with more parents unable to afford the food their children need. It must be stopped.

After Black infant mortality surged in Kansas, birth workers jumped into action

Peggy Jones-Foxx knows what it takes to raise a baby.

"It's the hardest work I've ever done," she said. "And I have a master's degree."

At the Dellrose United Methodist Church in Wichita, Kansas, Jones-Foxx teaches pregnant women, particularly Black women, about that work — with the understanding that, statistically, their babies are less likely to live to see their first birthday than white children.

So she coaches them on how to stay healthy during pregnancy: Are they taking their prenatal vitamins? Do they have strategies for managing stress? Do they know what resources exist if they need help buying healthy

During a recent class, Jones-Foxx, who is president of the Wichita Black Nurses Association, lingered on a slide about the importance of communicating with their doctors. She told the women to write down any questions they might have ahead of a checkup, and insisted that they get answers. After all, she said, it can make a big difference when it comes to keeping Black mothers and their children alive.

These "Baby Talk" prenatal education classes represent a new partnership between the nurses association and the University of Kansas School of Medicine-Wichita's Center for Research for Infant and Birth Survival, or CRIBS.

The impetus? New data revealing that Black infant mortality in Kansas surged 58% in 2020.

While the U.S infant mortality rate declined from 2019 to hit a record low in 2020, some states are starting to see the reverse trend — with the rate of Black infant deaths far outpacing that of white infants. In Kansas, 17 Black babies out of every thousand die before their first birthday — over 3.5 times the rate of white babies. Of the 2,369 Black babies born in the state in 2020, 40 died in their first year.

'WE CLEARLY HAVEN'T DONE EVERYTHING WE CAN DO'

The classes Jones-Foxx teaches are part of a multi-pronged effort by CRIBS in response to the increase in infant mortality. The center also runs an in-home visitation program for young families. Director Cari Schmidt said she and her staff are trying to secure funding for research that would help the center better understand the causes of sudden unexpected infant

"As long as there is a disparity" between white and Black infant mortality, she said, "we clearly haven't done everything we can do."

Public health experts are still trying to understand why Kansas saw so many babies die during the first year of the pandemic. Most suspect the virus has something to do with it — whether from direct impacts to fetal development or stress from job loss and isola-

Both of those experiences were more common in Black communities, said Sharla Smith, a KU Medical Center professor who directs the Kansas Birth Equity Network: Black people were more likely to catch the coronavirus and they tended to feel the pandemic's vast economic fallout more acutely.

"All of this has just contributed to the stress on the Black body," Smith said.

WHAT'S CAUSING **BABIES TO DIE**

Focusing on the health of Black mothers will be crucial to addressing Black infant mortality going forward because of racial differences in why babies die in Kansas, Smith said.

While white and Hispanic infant mortality is most commonly caused by birth defects, Black infant deaths more frequently stem from complications related to being born too early and underweight.

Premature birth can be caused by a

host of factors, including a pregnant person's preexisting health issues and challenges accessing prenatal care.

Smith said both can stem from bias and systemic racism within the medical field. Research shows doctors are less likely to diagnose Black women with endometriosis or refer them for cardiac treatment, and are more likely to ignore their pain.

"This is not just about getting an appointment," she said. "Black women are just not heard."

A HOLISTIC APPROACH TO IMPROVING **OUTCOMES FOR MOMS AND BABIES**

A few miles away in North Wichita, Sapphire Garcia-Lies is trying to tackle those non-medical factors that contribute to poor health outcomes, through the Kansas Birth Justice Society, a nonprofit that serves Black, Latino and Native American families.

The group's approach is holistic, focused on improving both maternal and infant health.

The goal is to help Black, Native American and Latino families, who breastfeed at lower rates than white and Asian families, continue breastfeeding past the newborn stage — which research indicates is correlated with a lower risk of infant death.

"It provides protection from infectious diseases and sudden infant death syndrome," said Lisette Jacobson, a KU School of Medicine-Wichita professor who studies the relationship between breastfeeding and infant health. "To optimize those benefits, you want to


be exclusively breastfeeding for at least six months."

For families of color, meeting that target often involves navigating more roadblocks than white families do.

"Lots of times, the biggest obstacle is that they have to go back to work really early," Garcia-Lies said. "For some of them, it's two weeks or less after they give birth."

This year, the Kansas Birth Justice Society will pair around 75 families with doulas who'll support them throughout pregnancy, birth and infancy. That can involve advocating for patients during doctor's visits and ensuring they aren't pressured into medical interventions in the delivery room, like labor induction or C-sections.

Breast Cancer Awareness and Risk Factors

Each year in the United States, about 264,000 women get breast cancer and 42,000 women die from breast cancer. Men also get breast cancer, but it is not very common. About 1 out of every 100 breast cancers diagnosed in the United States is found in a man.

During Breast Cancer Awareness month in October, the Marion County Public Health Department wants to help educate women and men about symptoms and prevention.

Most breast cancers are found in women who are 50 years old or older, but breast cancer also affects younger women.

Other than skin cancer, breast cancer is the most common cancer among American women. Mammograms are the best way to find breast cancer early, when it is easier to treat and before it is big enough to feel or cause symptoms.

A mammogram is an X-ray picture of the breast. Doctors use a mammogram to look for early signs of breast cancer. Regular mammograms are the best tests doctors use to find breast cancer early, sometimes up to three years before it can be

There are different symptoms of breast cancer, and some people have no symptoms at all. Symptoms can include:

- Any change in the size or the shape of the breast.
 - Pain in any area of the breast.
- Nipple discharge other than breast milk (including blood).
- A new lump in the breast or underarm.

If a person has any signs that cause worry, they should see a doctor right away.

Studies have shown that the risk for breast cancer is due to a combination of factors. The main factors that influence a person's risk include being a woman and getting older. Most breast cancers are found in women who are 50 years old or older.

Some women will get breast cancer even without any other risk factors that they know of. Having a risk factor does not mean you will get the disease, and not all risk factors have the same effect.

A few risk factors for breast cancer that a person can control: keep a healthy weight and exercise regularly; choose to not drink alcohol, or drink alcohol in moderation; if taking hormone replacement therapy or birth control pills, ask a medical provider about the risks; and, for moms who have just given birth, breastfeed if possible.

Someone with a strong family history of breast cancer or inherited changes in their BRCA1 and BRCA2 genes may have a high risk of getting breast cancer. This may also mean a high risk for ovarian cancer.

In addition to a mammogram, doctors often use additional tests to find or diagnose breast cancer. They may refer women to a breast specialist or a surgeon. This does not mean that she has cancer or that she needs surgery. These doctors are experts in diagnosing breast problems.





How the threat of 'taxpayer-funded abortion' is being used to mobilize conservative religious voters

(THE CONVERSATION) Following the U.S. Supreme Court's ruling in Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization and the wave of state-level abortion bans that followed, it might appear that anti-abortion activists could declare victory and go home.

However, from their perspective, a major threat still looms: Their tax dollars may be used to fund abortion in states where abortion is legal.

As it currently stands, several policies are in place that almost entirely prevent federal funds from being used to directly pay for abortion services. Since 1976, the Hyde Amendment has prohibited the public funding of abortion through Medicaid except in rare exceptions. In the years since, "Hydelike restrictions" have been added to other federal health care programs, as well as to private insurance plans purchased through the health insurance exchanges established by the Affordable Care Act.

There are also restrictions on federal funds granted to organizations that provide reproductive health care for low-income women, like Planned Parenthood, such that these funds cannot be used for abortion services. Even so, anti-abortion activists insist that because money is fungible, any federal support for organizations that provide abortion services or counseling represents an indirect taxpayer subsidy to the "abortion industry."

As such, despite the multitude of

restrictions currently in place, antiabortion activists promote the idea that Americans are nonetheless being forced to pay for abortions. When the Democratic Party declared in 2016 its intention to roll back these restrictions, framing them as unjust barriers to abortion access, anti-abortion activists only ramped up this existing rhetoric.

In the post-Dobbs world of the 2022 midterms, abortion debates are primarily focused on whether abortion will be legal, but anti-abortion leaders are also highlighting the implications of these laws for voters' tax dollars.

This should not be surprising. In the course of my research on debates about taxpayer-funded abortion, I found that this threat has historically been used to motivate and mobilize anti-abortion voters. This message has especially resonated for those conservative evangelical Christians and Catholics who believe that when abortion is funded using their tax dollars, this makes them personally complicit in sin.

Opposition to public funding

The U.S. Council of Catholic Bishops has long been a central player in advocacy campaigns to "stop taxpayer funding of abortion." As one message encouraging voters to support this advocacy puts it, "Don't let our government force you to pay for the deaths of unborn children."

This concern resonates for Catholic Republicans, more than 7 in 10 who oppose the use of public funds for abortion, according to an analysis of national survey data that I conducted

in 2021 with scholars Andrew Whitehead and Ryan Burge. This opposition is even stronger among Republicans who identify as born-again or evangelical Christian — between 84% and 90%.

But abortion funding bans also appeal to fiscally conservative voters who oppose welfare spending in general, whether or not they are morally opposed to abortion. Since the 1970s, anti-abortion leaders have argued that "funding bans protected taxpayers' wallets as well as their consciences," according to the legal historian Mary Ziegler. National survey data my colleagues and I analyzed suggests that this argument continues to resonate. Six out of 10 Republicans with no religious affiliation support abortion funding bans; so do between 14% and 17% of Republicans who support legal

Opposition to taxpayer-funded abortion, even more than abortion itself, is a thread connecting religious and fiscal conservatives within the Republican coalition.

A winning strategy

Campaigns to prevent tax dollars from funding abortion have kept these anti-abortion activists and other Republican voters engaged and mobilized for decades, even when a ban on legal abortion itself seemed unlikely.

abortion itself seemed unlikely.
As one leader of an anti-abortion organization told me in a 2021 interview:
"Ultimately, I think our focus should still remain on criminalizing

abortion... But I think in the

meantime we also should oppose the taxpayer funding of it ... just because

it's a winning strategy."

This seems no less true post-Dobbs.
As the midterms approach, I have found that Republican candidates and movement leaders are continuing to stoke fear about taxpayer-funded abortion in order to mobilize voters, especially religious conservatives.

Bill codifying federal abortion rights

A major issue energizing voters this cycle is the possibility that Congress might pass a bill codifying abortion rights. While the primary issue at stake is whether abortions would be legal nationwide, abortion opponents are quick to note that such a bill would also "force taxpayers to pay for them," as the anti-abortion news website LifeNews. com put it.

National Right to Life president
Carol Tobias warned in the September
2022 issue of the organization's newsletter that "Proponents of the bill claim
this bill would codify Roe v Wade.
Don't be fooled – it goes much, much
further." In particular, she writes, "tax
dollars would flow to pay for abortion."
Jeanne F. Mancini, president of March
for Life, warned that if this "extreme
bill" is passed, it would "force taxpayers
to pay for abortions nationwide — up
until birth."

Even in the absence of such a bill, abortion opponents are raising the alarm about existing Biden adminis-

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

St. Rita Catholic Church receives \$150,000 grant for church preservation

St. Rita Catholic Church was awarded a \$150,000 grant from the National Fund for Sacred Places, a collaborative program of the National Trust for Historic Preservation and Partners for Sacred Places.

As one of 16 churches across the nation to receive the grant this year, St. Rita will use the money to begin the church's preservation project, which includes brick restoration for the bell tower and church cantilever. The bell tower was designed to be a key structural component of the church building, and over the years, the metal ties that hold brick cladding onto the tower have corroded.

Sister Gail Trippett, a member of the church, worked with four other members to complete the application for the grant.

While they have been awarded

the grant, she said there is still more work to do. One of the requirements of the church is to double the contribution of the grant, meaning the church will need to raise \$300,000, bringing the total to \$450,000, to complete the full restoration project.

"It's not just money that is given to you, but it is also garnering the support of not only your congregation but the community," she

Trippett said the congregation has already begun looking for donors and other ways to raise the money, and they hope to begin the project sometime in 2023.

tration policies that allow public funds to be used for abortion services, like a new Pentagon policy that would "pay for service members to travel for abortion

As reported by the Baptist Press, the Southern Baptist Ethics & Religious Liberty Commission raised concerns that "the interim rule forces taxpayers to fund the taking of preborn human lives." Meanwhile, the Christian right organization Concerned Women for America warned, "A baby has already been killed under this cruel ploy. ... Not only that, but the Administration wants Americans to pay for it."

Abortion on state-level **ballots**

Voters in several states are also directly deciding the fate of their states' abortion laws in November 2022. In at least two of these states, anti-abortion leaders are highlighting the implications for voters' tax dollars.

For example, in Kentucky, where a near-total abortion ban went into effect shortly after Dobbs, voters will decide whether to amend the state constitution to say, "To protect human life, nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to secure or protect a right to abortion or require the funding of abortion."

Explaining why voters should vote "Yes for Life," the chair of the campaign supporting the amendment led with its implications for taxpayers: "The constitutional amendment is very clear. It protects taxpayer dollars, and it makes sure there is not an interpreted right of abortion in the constitution."

In Michigan, where a ballot measure called Proposal 3 would

enshrine abortion rights, backlash from anti-abortion activists led by local Catholic organizations prominently features the claim that "If passed, Proposal 3 would result in taxpayer-funded abortion."

Municipal politics

Cities dedicating public funds to abortion post-Dobbs have also faced scrutiny in the lead-up to the midterms, especially from conservative religious groups.

In Philadelphia, for example, anti-abortion activists represented by the conservative Catholic Thomas More Society have filed suit against city leaders "for illegally using taxpayer money to pay for abortions." Only weeks before the election, the Pro-Life Union of Greater Philadelphia rallied supporters to a hearing on the case, pleading "Don't let Mayor (Jim) Kenney get away with it!"

Abortion debates are not only about how abortions will be paid for. But journalists and scholars often pay far too little attention to anti-abortion activists' persistent focus on the possibility that some abortions will be paid for with their tax dollars. If history and current research is any guide, this threat resonates with an array of Republicans and will be used to mobilize voters in 2022 and beyond.

Business Equity for Indy:2-Year anniversary reflections

During the summer of 2020, at the height of racial tensions coupled with the dire, disproportional impacts of the coronavirus pandemic, the Central Indiana busi-

ness community united to form Business Equity for Indy (BEI). Through this initiative — a partnership of the Central Indiana Corporate Partnership and Indy Chamber with support from the Indianapolis Urban League, led by 120 growing businesses — we're working to create collaborative, sustainable solutions to dismantle more than 240 years of systemic racism, injustice and inequity that are preventing our Black and brown Hoosiers from opportunity and advancement.

The creation of BEI was quite daunting — with goals of growing a more inclusive business climate and greater equity and economic opportunities for the region's Black residents and people of color — and yet, when I look back at the work that's taken place over the last two years, I remain more energized each day.

Over the last two years, as the chairman of BEI, I've had a front row seat to the energy, effort and passion that Central Indiana businesses and business leaders of all sizes and from all industries have been able to demonstrate and maintain with their time, resources and commitments to this initiative. This is illustrated by the outcomes BEI has had to date and the impact of those outcomes have had on our most disenfranchised residents.

As BEI has grown, learned and evolved over the last two years, we've been able to make great strides in providing Central Indiana employers with resources to better support their Black and brown employees. Some of the most impactful accomplishments of the last two years of work include:

- BEI's Procurement & Participation Taskforce had been laser focused on creating opportunities for Central Indiana businesses to increase their supplier diversity. Through quarterly Procurement Roundtable events, contract-ready, Black-owned businesses are matched with Central Indiana businesses for multiyear, multi-dollar contracts.
- BEI's people initiative taskforces have united to create an inaugural Workforce Pilot. The intensive, two-year cohort is designed to assist companies with adopting evidencebased strategies alongside industry experts that will reduce disparities, drive equity, and support companies' talent strategies. The participating companies will be announced later this year.



- BEI's Learning & Talent Taskforce hosted an Employer Opportunities Summit to connect business leaders across the Indy region with critical resources to address equity within their Taskforce remains dedicated to buildindustries and companies. As a result of insights shared during the summit, the BEI website now houses these employer recommendations, free for companies to reference and implement within their own organizations.
- Additionally, the Taskforce assembled a virtual Education and Workforce Development Catalogue available to the public. This resource allows companies to search a database filled with more than 200 local companies that are doing work to support the education and training needs of Black and Hispanic individuals, ages 0 to 25, in greater Indianapolis.
- BEI's Impediments to Health Taskforce assembled a first-of-its-kind Impediments to Health Playbook which provides a variety of recommendations that companies can consider

implementing to improve equity across stand if they're leading the pack, in their companies and in the communities they serve.

Finally, BEI's Public Policy ing relationships, identifying and advocating for policies that remove barriers to opportunities for Black people and other people of color. The Public Policy Taskforce was able to leverage community partnerships that worked to shut down anti-CRT legislation in Indiana — Indiana was notably the first red state to accomplish this as reported by

Nearly all of the resources produced by BEI over the last two years are available to businesses across the country, free of charge - and that was an intentional decision by task force members. One of the things we excel at as Hoosiers is uniting to support one another. Through BEI, we've come to terms with the realization that our companies are on the equity spectrum. The journey of BEI is helping companies to under-

the middle of the pack, or just getting started in their actions to ensure equity and opportunity for Black and Brown employees — and that's OK. The goal of BEI is to help companies understand their gaps today that lead to actionable steps toward equity tomorrow.

As BEI celebrates two years of work toward equity, we also recognize that in many ways, our journey is just beginning. Working together, we must continue to question how our actions today are leading to positive impacts and improvements in the quality of life for Black and Brown residents in the years to come. Some of our actions will succeed, and some of them will ultimately fail, but the energy, attitude and commitment of Central Indiana leaders will allow us to make positive impacts and create equitable opportunities for everyone in our community.

Exhumations resume for DNA to **ID Tulsa Race Massacre victims**

By KEN MILLER **Associated Press**

The process of re-exhuming some of the 19 bodies exhumed a year ago for testing in an effort to identify victims of the 1921 Tulsa Race Massacre, then reburied in an Oklahoma cemetery, began Wednesday to gather more DNA from the

remains. The latest exhumations of bodies that were taken fro Oaklawn Cemetery in Tulsa, will be followed by another excavation for additional remains.

Of the 19 bodies previously exhumed, 14 fit the criteria for additional DNA analysis, but just two of the 14 had enough usable DNA recovered to begin sequencing by Intermountain

Forensics of Salt Lake City. Danny Hellwig, director of laboratory development for Intermountain, said Wednesday that the DNA recovered from the remains had degraded during the more than 100 years

they were buried. "These samples are very ... degraded," Hellwig said. "There are samples that are very light right now on DNA, some that are semi viable, some that are just on the threshold" of being viable."

Hellwig said work to develop a genealogy profile for the two remains with enough viable DNA is expected to start in about a week and couple be completed within a few weeks, but efforts to identify the remains could take years. **Intermountain Forensics**

is also seeking people who believe they are descendants of massacre victims to provide genetic material to help scientists find potential matches. Following the exhumations,

another search will begin

for 18 bodies with gunshot wounds whose burials in plain caskets were documented at the time, but without information where within the cemetery, according to forensic anthropologist Phoebe Stubblefield. "We will be targeting in our

dividuals" who are male, based on the contemporary reports, Stubblefield said. The search area is south and west of previous excavations conducted in 2020 and 2021, said state Archaeologist Kary

Stubblefield, who is leading the project. The remains will be reburied, at least temporarily, at Oaklawn, where the previous reburial was closed to the public, drawing protests from about two dozen people who said they are descendants of massacre victims and should

have been allowed to attend. The exhumations will be followed by another search for bodies in an area south and west of the areas previously

excavated in 2020 and 2021.

None of the remains recovered thus far are identified or confirmed as victims of the massacre in which more than 1,000 homes were burned, hundreds were looted and a thriving business district known as Black Wall Street was destroyed. Historians have estimated the death toll to be between 75 and 300.



--To make kale and quinoa bowls: In large bowl, toss kale, parsley and shallots with 2 tablespoons olive oil; set aside 10 minutes.

In bowl of food processor, puree remaining olive oil, lemon juice and zest, garlic, yogurt, 2 ounces feta, 1/3 of the walnuts and salt.

Pour dressing over greens then fold in quinoa, remaining walnuts, cherries and remaining feta.

Cover and refrigerate at least 1 hour before serving with several grinds of black pepper.

To make salmon: Wrap fillets in paper towels then heat large castiron skillet over medium-high heat

When skillet is hot, season fillets with salt. Add oil to skillet and carefully tilt to evenly cover bottom. When oil shimmers, slide fillets in, skin-side down, pressing each fillet firmly down with spatula.

Reduce heat to medium-low and cook 3 minutes then cover and cook 2 minutes.

Carefully flip fillets, cover and cook 1 minute, or until fillets reach desired doneness or internal temperature of at least 130 F** on thermometer inserted into centers.

**The United States Department of Agriculture recommends a minimum internal temperature of 145 degrees Fahrenheit.

Comparing Colts and Pacers is both interesting and easy

There was a time when you just couldn't deny it. Indiana was a basketball state until the Indianapolis Colts came to town. Despite all the success the Pacers had in the American Basketball Association and the rich history of both college and high school basketball, NFL football came to town and with a Super Bowl victory the Colts supplanted all the noise that was hoops-related in the state.

Sure, a couple of modern-era NCAA Tournament championships at Indiana University and an NBA Finals appearance by the Pacers aside, Indiana was morphed into a football state over time, and the NFL stranglehold continues to be a powerful reminder of the insatiable appetite those throughout our state have for pro football.

Despite the variance in terms of popularity, there are some obvious similarities one can draw when examining the two franchises, as well as some glaring differences, so at the risk of becoming persona non grata with both organizations, I thought it would be at the very least, quite interesting to simply compare them to one another and dissect the facts.

Let's start with the multibillionaires who currently own the teams. Herb Simon, if nothing else, has been a good steward of the franchise.

He, along with his late brother Melvin, stepped in when the Pacers were in murky financial waters and purchased the team for a mere \$10.5 million in 1983. The team is currently valued at approximately \$1.2 billion, so for that reason alone it's obvious why there's always a willing buyer when an NBA franchise is out up for sale. Over the nearly 40 years in which the Simons have

confidant of

owned the club, there's been a number of significant changes, including a new arena and one trek to the NBA Finals, both of which were engineered by then general manager Donnie Walsh, who today remains aclose the owner.

Over the years the Simons have enjoyed the generous underwriting of the Capital Improvement Board, which included that new arena that was recently upgraded substantially just in time for when the NBA All-Star Game comes to town next

Simon recently shed his tight-fisted image in terms of coaches' salaries by paying future Hall of Famer Rick Carlisle over \$7 million annually in an attempt to return to a competitive level.

All in all, Pacers fans have been relatively fortunate under Simon's tutelage in terms of stabilizing the franchise, but a vast improvement in terms of competitiveness is without question, long overdue.

The situation surrounding the Indianapolis Colts is rather different, but in some senses, some similarities

When the late William Hudnut convinced both government and civic leaders that a domed stadium

could lead to an NFL franchise here locally, many individuals scoffed at the idea.

Enter one Robert Irsay who was disgruntled with his financial arrangement in Baltimore and looking to pad his coffers with both a new stadium and a sweetheart deal that contained both revenue sharing and the constant financial support of the same Capital Improvement Board that subsidizes the Pacers.

With his passing in 1997, the team was inherited by his son James who has shown a propensity for both the good life as well as overpriced free agents. When subpar football delivered a No. 1 pick named Peyton Manning, a Super Bowl championship was delivered in February 2007 and the mega-generous deals from our fair city kept coming with the opening of Lucas Oil Stadium in 2008, which was built for \$720 million, which seems like a bargain at today's prices.

Irsay has also benefitted greatly from the tenure of the Colts' chief operating officer, Peter Ward, who is widely recognized around the NFL as a phenomenal administrator, one who is clearly Irsay's right hand man and then some.
