Indianapolis Public Schools released the final version of the district's contentious reorganizing plan and could ask voters to approve two tax referendums totaling more than \$800 million to fund it. If passed, the Rebuilding Stronger plan would include closing some schools, building new schools and reconfiguring grades at other schools.

The district introduced the final draft of the plan to the school board at its Oct. 27 meeting. The board is scheduled to vote on it Nov. 17. Find a school-by-school breakdown of the plan at myips.

IPS would ask voters to approve a \$410 million capital referendum along with an eight-year \$400 million operating property

tax referendum, which would come out to about \$50 million annually. IPS Superintendent Dr. Aleesia Johnson said the capital referendum would go toward the cost of facility updates, including building security, and the property tax referendum would support programming expansion and staff compensation.

The proposal — which includes a few changes from the previous version of the plan surrounding school programs, transportation shifts and accommodations following feedback from IPS families — didn't previously have a financing plan.

Johnson said the tax increase would come out to about \$6 per month for most taxpayers.

Along with the referendums, Johnson said IPS has been tightening its budget since 2014 to

Meet the candidates running for Marion County prosecutor

Two individuals contend for the position of Marion County prosecutor: Republican candidate Cyndi Carrasco and incumbent Democrat Ryan Mears.

Carrasco has worked in the legal field for almost 20 years. When she served as Indiana inspector general, she investigated white-collar criminal activity and worked with prosecutors statewide. She currently works as an attorney at Riley Bennett Egloff LLP.

Mears has worked at the Marion County Prosecutor's Office since 2006. He was serving as deputy prosecutor when he was appointed Marion County prosecutor in 2019 after Terry Curry stepped down because of health problems.

WFYI sent each of the candidates five questions to help voters prepare for early voting and Election Day, Nov. 8. Their answers are presented in alphabetical order.

Editor's note: Candidate responses were edited for AP style and grammar, and any numbers used were checked for accuracy. When a statement required more clarification or could not be independently verified, WFYI reached out to candidates before publication. Those instances, and those candidate responses, are noted throughout in editors' notes.

Cyndi Carrasco

What do you see as the most pressing issue in public safety, and what would you do about it?

I'm running for prosecutor because Marion County is facing a public safety crisis, and we deserve better. We're experiencing year after year of record homicides, nonfatal shootings, and other violent crimes throughout

our communities, and what the current prosecutor is doing simply isn't working. He has had a three-year job interview, and crime has never been worse in the history of Indianapolis.**

Tackling the public safety crisis requires change. It requires reorganizing the office to ensure that every taxpayer dollar goes towards fighting crime. It requires ensuring we attract, train and retain experienced and the most qualified deputy prosecutors. We must reestablish and foster partnerships with public safety stakeholders from all walks of life, and we must utilize all tools at our disposal to prevent crime before it happens. And we must finally begin to hold criminals accountable.

This is not a one-size-fits all approach. For some, accountability may mean enrollment in drug treatment or other programs, and for some, accountability means incarceration, especially for violent and repeat offenders. Continuing to fail to hold criminals accountable creates a revolving door of injustice, making our streets unsafe. Tackling the public safety crisis is a multi-front approach, but I will work tirelessly to hold criminals accountable and advocate for

What goals do you have, if any, in regard to diverting individuals away from the justice system?

Diverting individuals away from the criminal justice system begins with partnerships, one of the pillars of my campaign. Public safety is foundational to opportunity, and in order to achieve it, it's going to take many in our community working together. Whether it's law enforcement, faith-based organizations and nonprofits, or neighborhood associations, we all play a role and bear a responsibility in keeping our communities safe, and we must work together. Forming partnerships within our local communities - from educating our youth, to being vigilant for our neighbors, and yes, holding criminals accountable - we can make a difference and make Marion County safe and prosperous once again.

Whitfield III's 40th birthday

Family, friends and community members filled the seats at Friendship Missionary Baptist Church on Oct. 29 to remember what would have been Herman Whitfield III's 40th birthday.

Attendees cried as a slideshow of pictures of Whitfield played on big screens in the front of the sanctuary, remembering a son, musician and friend. There were 25 small blue candles lit on top of a podium accompanied by two of Whitfield's music medals and trophies.

Whitfield died in April in police custody during an apparent mental health crisis. He was remembered as a compassionate person and talented musician.

"I will never forget the first time I heard Herman play the piano," Susan Kitterman, founder of In-

dianapolis Youth Orchestra, said at the podium in front of about 50 people. "Herman was able to explore and organize the vast universe of emotions and sounds into profound and exciting compositions."

There were musical selections from people and groups, including Indianapolis Area Musicians and Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, which left family and friends in tears.

William Henry Curry, music director and conductor of the **Durham Symphony Orchestra** in North Carolina, wrote a letter to Whitfield's parents, Gladys Whitfield and Herman Whitfield Jr. Gladys Whitfield read the letter at a press conference before the memorial.

"I will forever be grateful to you for the gift of your son to the world," the letter read. "I am beyond consolation knowing there

The public agency that oversees the Marion County Public Health Department and Eskenazi Health has been accused of breaking the law. This comes as the agency prepares to argue a case before the Supreme Court next month.

A lawsuit filed Oct. 24 by Morgan Daly of

the Indiana Statewide Independent Living Council accuses the Health and Hospital Corporation of Marion County of violating Indiana's Open Door Law, which requires public agencies to meet to make decisions

► Continued from A1 ment agencies across the county and/or state?

As the former Inspector General for the state of Indiana, I have experience leading a law enforcement agency and working in partnership with law enforcement at the local, state and federal level. While the prosecutor's office is ultimately independent from other law enforcement agencies, it's absolutely crucial that we work together. The prosecutor sets the tone for public safety, and must work alongside law enforcement, not against them, to begin reducing the violence in our city.

The Indianapolis Fraternal Order of Police recently voted "no confidence" in the prosecutor's office and courts. What is your response to those concerns?

The Indianapolis Fraternal Order of Police's vote of no confidence in Ryan Mears is another glaring example of what I see and hear as I travel this county, every day, and that is - people are fed up. The fact that nearly 100 percent of participating officers voted no confidence in Mears reaffirms that he is unwilling and unable to work with stakeholders to end the public safety crisis. This results in violent, repeat offenders continuing to terrorize our streets.

As your Marion County Prosecutor, I will prioritize partnerships with a diverse group of public safety stakeholders, and I've already begun to do so. We all have a shared goal of keeping our community safe. I will work with law enforcement throughout our county to hold criminals accountable, support victims, and make Marion County safe and prosperous.

How would the state's near-total abortion ban impact your role as prosecutor?

This is a real issue for me, because my husband Robert and I lost our first daughter, Sophia, who was born with a fatal birth defect, when she was just seven weeks old. I understand the deeply held beliefs and hard decisions faced by mothers and parents on this topic, and it's not for me to judge people who make a different decision than I would.

I hear the voices of women, and men, across Marion County who are concerned about crime, abortion, and the economy, and I want them to know that I will not prosecute women who seek an abortion. I am laserfocused on addressing our community's violent crime crisis, not pursuing abortion cases, and I resent that, even though my opponent knows this is predominantly a legislative matter, he's using this topic to try to distract from his abysmal record on preventing and reducing the violent crime that has plagued our communities by

tapping into people's real emotions and fears on such a personal topic.

Ryan Mears
What do you see as the most pressing issue in public safety, and what would you do about it?

The most pressing issue facing public safety is the lack of trust our community has in the criminal justice system. Seventy percent of individuals who are the victims of non-fatal shootings refuse to collaborate with law enforcement. This sets up a system of retaliatory violence, because they don't trust law enforcement.

We've worked hard to reverse this cycle through several intentional efforts, including proactively increasing staff members' presence in our community. Far too often, the first interaction with someone from our office is inside a courtroom after a crisis has occurred, and that is unacceptable. As public servants, we need to simply meet with residents where they are to better understand their needs and expectations.

We've held several community conversations on topics such as gun violence and hate crimes, expanded the office's Community Outreach Team, and dramatically increased access and participation in our Second Chance Workshops and other community-based initiatives. Trust must be earned, and we have been taking the proper steps to build a foundation of trust that will positively impact public safety.

The prosecutor's office is already seeing this approach work. Since 2019, the office continues to set record high conviction rates in murder prosecutions, and this can be largely attributed to more community members trusting our office and having a willingness to work with law enforcement.*

What goals do you have, if any, in regard to diverting individuals away from the justice system?

After 16 years at the prosecutor's office, the one thing I have learned is that justice takes

many forms. We have a responsibility at MCPO to keep individuals from getting jammed up in the criminal justice system, due to the inability to pay excessive fines or fees. and we've started multiple programs to achieve that goal.

In 2019, we also began our Second Chance Workshops to assist individuals in having their driver's licenses reinstated and criminal record expungements. When people have reliable transportation and opportunities for housing it puts them on the path to getting better employment. And when people are working, we rarely see them in the criminal justice system. By helping remove these barriers we are helping set individuals up for success.

How will you work with the other law enforcement agencies across the county and/ or state?

The prosecutor's office works with local and federal law enforcement agencies on a daily basis. Our partnership with law enforcement agencies goes beyond criminal investigations, task forces, and case work but extends into community events. We are always willing to assist law enforcement with investigations.

The Indianapolis Fraternal Order of Police recently voted "no confidence" in the prosecutor's office and courts. What is your response to those concerns?

Our office works with law enforcement agencies every day and more often than not, the first witness a prosecutor calls to testify is a police officer. One of the reasons the prosecutor's office has one of the highest conviction rates for homicides is due to the strong relationship between our office and law enforcement. At the same time, the community has made clear that they want an independent prosecutor who will administer justice fairly and hold everyone accountable, including law enforcement.

How would the state's near-total abortion ban impact your role as prosecutor?

Ever since the U.S. Supreme Court overturned Roe v. Wade, I have made my position clear. We will not waste any resources prosecuting doctors, nurses, or pregnant people. The priorities of this office should reflect that of the people we serve and that is why we will continue to devote our limited resources to what matters most - addressing violent crime. Most people are newly learning that Roe v. Wade began in a prosecutor's office.

LIBRARY TO HOST PUBLIC PRESENTATIONS FOR CEO FINALISTS

Finalists for the Indianapolis Public Library CEO position will give public presentations at 7 p.m. Nov. 30 at Clowes Memorial Hall on Butler University's campus.

There are three finalists, but the library won't disclose who they are until Nov. 28, citing potential issues with finalists' current em-

ployers. The library's previous CEO, Jackie Nytes, resigned in August 2021 amid allegations of racism. The allegations weren't limited to Nytes, but many staff and community members called for her to resign, saying the library needed new leadership.

Nichelle M. Hayes, founding director of the Center for Black Literature and Culture at Central Library, has been interim CEO.

PAC led by former Indy mayor Bart Peterson gives big to pro-charter school candidates

Netflix co-founder Reed Hastings has donated more than \$1 million to an Indiana political action committee chaired by a former Democratic mayor of Indianapolis. In turn, that pro-charter school PAC has become a large contributor to Indiana Republicans, campaign finance records show.

Hoosiers for Great Public Schools was created in April 2020 and is headed by Bart Peterson. The Democrat was mayor of Indianapolis from 2000 to 2008. He's now president and CEO of Christel House International, an Indianapolis nonprofit which operates K-12 public charter schools in high-poverty areas.

The Carmel-based PAC has since raised \$1.6 million — but despite its name none of that money came from Hoosiers.

The donations were made by just two wealthy supporters of charter schools: Texas billionaire John Arnold, and Netflix CEO Reed Hastings, who resides in California.

"This is a bi-partisan effort focused on supporting elected officials who share our belief in the need to fight for increased access to quality schools and more resources for all public school students, and especially low-income students and those of great need across Indiana," Peterson told the Indiana Capital Chronicle in an email.

Still, critics complain that charter schools aren't what's best for Hoosier students, citing less inclusivity, accountability and transparency than traditional public schools.

Although charters saw bipartisan support when introduced in Indiana 20 years ago, Democrats have also become less favorable to the publicly funded, privately operated schools. Lawmakers in Indiana's Republican supermajority, however, continue to rally behind charter school expansion and other "school choice" options, including the creation of a statewide voucher program for private schools.

Where the PAC gets its money

Arnold's one-time, \$200,000 contribution in May 2020 was the PAC's first. Half of those dollars went to Indiana's House Republican Campaign Committee the next day before Hastings made his first donation a separate \$200,000 gift — a few weeks later.

Hastings went on to give the PAC another \$500,000 in October 2020. The billionaire made another \$700,000 donation earlier this year in February, according to campaign finance filings.

The Netflix CEO has dished out millions to start new charter schools around the country. He currently sits on the board of the California Charter Schools Association and previously served on the California Board of Education for four years.

Arnold is an outspoken supporter of charter schools and is steeped in



the school privatization movement. His Houston-based foundation has previously gifted millions to The Mind Trust, an Indianapolis-based organization that has fostered charter schools throughout the city.

Peterson did not comment specifically on how Arnold or Hastings came to be involved with Hoosiers for Great Public Schools. Arnold and Hastings did not reply to multiple requests by the Indiana Capital Chronicle for comment.

"We are grateful to John Arnold and Reed Hastings for their support for this effort to close this significant opportunity gap for students in Indianapolis and across the country," Peterson said. "We welcome other donors with the ability to contribute who share our mission."

Former Democratic mayor at the helm

Peterson said charter schools, specifically those in Indianapolis, "are an important part of our public school system." He noted that the schools serve majority low-income families and families of color "who sought out quality schools for their children."

The former mayor continued that he's long supported making contributions to improve funding for charter schools — a move that bucks his own party.

"I've spent my career working across party lines fighting for equitable educational opportunities for students, particularly for low-income students in Indianapolis, and we support elected leaders who share this commitment to expanding access to quality schools," he said. "We have fought for all Indianapolis public schools, and our families, to receive their fair share of state public education funding."

But the Indiana Coalition for Public Education (ICPE) maintains that charters and "innovation schools" are not public schools — even though they are called such in state law. The advocacy group emphasizes that the schools often do not provide transportation to and from school, student enrollment is typically

decided through a lottery.

The ICPE also stresses that charter schools do not share the same accountability requirements as public school districts, including a duty to serve all students within a given geographic area.

The privately operated schools additionally lack governance by a democratically elected local board, and are also exempt from certain teacher certification and financial reporting requirements mandated for traditional public schools, according to the nonprofit.

The Indiana GOP candidates who benefit

Dozens of lawmakers in the Indiana General Assembly's Republican supermajority have benefited from the PAC's contributions in the last two years.

In 2020, Hoosiers for Great Public Schools contributed a total of \$150,000 to the House Republican Campaign Committee and another \$50,000 to Republican House Speaker Todd Huston's campaign, according to campaign

finance records. Hoosiers for Great Public Schools has additionally given to other PACs, including \$200,000 to RISE Indy, which describes itself as drawing attention to issues around student achievement and equity in local schools, and \$100,000 to Hoosiers for Quality Education, which broadly favors school choice. Peterson is also a RISE board member.

The PAC also gave generously to Indianapolis Public Schools board elections, contributing \$80,000 in 2020 to Kenneth Allen's campaign.

Since April, Hoosiers for Great Public Schools has doled out more than \$130,000 to GOP lawmakers who face contested races in the November election.

Among those receiving contributions this year are Reps. Bob Behning, Martin Carbaugh, Bob Cherry, Ed Clere, Michelle Davis, Chuck Goodrich, Todd Huston, Jack Jordan, Tim O'Brien, Elizabeth Rowray, Craig Snow, Jake Teshka and Jeff Thompson, as well as Sens. Kevin Boehnlein, Rodric Bray, Jon Ford, Mike Gaskill, Mark Messmer, Linda Rogers and Chris Garten.

It's not yet clear what charter school-related bills could be introduced in the upcoming 2023 legislative session.

The state Legislature passed a law in 2020 that says school districts "may" share referendum dollars with charter schools.

A separate bill that sought to go a step further, forcing Indiana's public school districts to share revenue from property-tax referendums with local charter schools died in the Senate without a hearing, however.

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

Racial equity institute gives Black women 'an opportunity to level the playing field'

At the beginning of the year, many Black women in Indianapolis completed the application for to be part of Six Sigma Racial Equity Institute's 2022 cohort, and in April, 15 of the applicants were selected for the training to receive the Six Sigma green belt certification.

"The green belt requires fortitude, perseverance and a strong commitment to achieve a highly coveted credential while also helping our communities," Joy Mason, founder and CEO, said in a statement.

Six Sigma Racial Equity Institute is a nonprofit that teaches Black female professionals problem solving skills to receive the institute's green belt certification.

Maria Wiley is one of the founding board members of Six Sigma Racial Equity Institute. She said the institute is "an opportunity to level the playing field" for Black women.

Six Sigma training is normally \$5,000, but the tuition is reduced due to sponsorships.

Current cohort member Tamara Winfrey-Harris is the vice president of people, culture and brand at Central Indiana Community Foundation (CICF), and she said the Six Sigma training is essential and valuable to her and the work she does.

"As someone who wants to see my community be strong and to work to make the Indianapolis community better, this is a really, really important tool to have in my toolkit, especially as someone who works for a community foundation," she said.

Winfrey-Harris said members met all day Fridays for the six weeks of training, took a test about what they learned and are now putting what they learned into practice through community projects they started in June.

Each project group is made up of three women from the cohort and the institute's selected coaches, and together they use the methods they were taught in Six Sigma to problem solve. Her project group is working with Indianapolis Public Schools to identify the root causes of low FAFSA completion rates with Black students and create solutions to increase the

"It's a God-send that I was able to get this kind of learning and be able to add this certification to my toolkit," she said.

There is currently a waiting list for both businesses who want to submit projects and for Black women who want to participate in the institute's next cohort.


The institute is relatively new, Mason said, and while working with its second cohort of women, the institute has refined previous programs and started new programs.

Recently, Six Sigma added a yellow belt certification program, which is open to all genders, races and ethnicities. The yellow belt certification program will begin August 2023 and will expand the institute to reach more people.

The women in Cohort 2 will finish their projects by mid-November and will receive their green belt certification at the end of the year.

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Welcome back to 'Know Your Entertainers'

Any serious research into the history of Indianapolis music requires a visit to the Indianapolis Recorder archives. During the 20th century, the Indianapolis Recorder was the only media outlet covering the birth of jazz, soul, R&B, funk and rock and roll music in Indianapolis. The Recorder's detailed entertainment coverage documented the rise and fall of important Naptown music legends and captured the ambience of the local landscape these artists existed in. Today, the Recorder's archive stands as the most consequential resource for Indianapolis music history.

Over the years, the Recorder published an assortment of noteworthy entertainment columns, including Wesley O. Jackson's "Indianapolis Night Life," Elizabeth Brizentine-Taft's "In the Groove," Charlie Davis' "Listening In," St. Clair Gibson's "The Avenoo," Bob Womack's "Believe Me When I Tell You," Eunice Trotter's "Party People" and Lynn Ford's "Soul Sounds."

The majority of these columns had a relatively short life, appearing and disappearing within the span of a few years. But for avid Recorder readers, one column stands out among the pack: "Know Your Entertainers," which appeared semi-regularly in the paper for more than 40 years.

"Know Your Entertainers" was created in 1950 to celebrate the artistry of Indianapolis performers. The column's format was basic; each edition featured a photo of an individual artist or group, along with a few paragraphs about their work. Though the individual entries may be simplistic, the cumulative impact of the series is monumental, providing music fans and historians with essential information about lesser known, but historically important Indianapolis performers.

The first edition of the column appeared in the Feb. 4, 1950, edition of the Recorder, and featured the once-famous Indianapolis pianist and bandleader James "Step" Wharton. During the 1940s, Wharton penned

This cat certainly should be called the "Blues King" of our country and England . . . We have been advised that his records are seiling fast in the latter nation. All of his numbers can be obtained by writing to the Jazz Record Shop — 77 Charing Cross Rd., London W. C. 2, England. Incidentally,, Scrapper is an uncle of Harold Malone, one of our topflight pianists, who was featured with the JimmyCe group here in the city.—(Bob Womack, Sr.)

arrangements for music stars including Benny Goodman and Ethel Waters.

The column's scope was not limited to music alone. The second edition of the series, published in the Feb. 11, 1950, edition, featured the legendary Naptown dance team of Leonard and Leonard. The dance duo toured internationally and, at the height of their fame, appeared on the Ed Sullivan Show.


"Know Your Entertainers" even profiled industry insiders, including concert promoters, nightclub owners and representatives of the musicians' union. The fourth article in the series, published on Feb. 25, 1950, provides a perfect example. This edition featured a profile of the influential vaudeville producer William Benbow, who spent the final years of his life working on Indiana Avenue.

The column also featured entertainers whose work extended beyond the limits of standard nightclub fare, including female impersonators like Candy Laverne, who was profiled in 1968, and again in 1972.

Perhaps the most unique entertainer to be featured in the series was Iron Jaw Memphis, best known for performing feats of strength with his jaws. The climax of Iron Jaw's act involved placing an audience member on a table, and lifting the table with his teeth — while on roller skates! Iron Jaw Memphis was a popular nightclub attraction on Indiana Avenue during the '60s, and he was featured in "Know Your Entertainers" in 1985.

A variety of Recorder writers contributed to "Know Your Entertainers," but the column's primary author was Bob Womack, who also served as editor of the paper's entertainment section. Womack was a respected drummer and band leader, and had serious credentials in the local music scene. During the 1940s, Womack's Bobcats Orchestra toured across the Midwest. At their peak, the Bobcats featured vocals from the blues legend James Oden, better known as St. Louis Jimmy.

Womack's deep knowledge of the local entertainment scene was the basis






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of the column's success, and Womack guided "Know Your Entertainers" until his death in 1984.

After Womack's passing, drummer Clem Tiggs took the reins. Like Womack, Tiggs was also a respected member of the local music scene. Tiggs performed with a long list of Naptown jazz and soul greats, including Jimmy Coe, Pookie Johnson, Baby Leon and Mel Rhyne.

Sadly, the "Know Your Entertainers" series seems to end with Tiggs' departure from the paper. The last known edition of the column was published in December 1991 and featured a profile of the vastly underrated and unjustly forgotten vocalist Clyde Shelby. Tiggs died a few years later.

During the early days of the pandemic, I took on the task of cataloging the entire run of the "Know Your Entertainers" series. Look-

Brady firing hits a nerve in the **Black community**

"They are who we thought they were." So declared the late, great Dennis Green, who was a Black head coach who survived in the National Football League for just over a dozen years. Green, who led the Minnesota Vikings and Arizona Cardinals, was not a man who minced words.

Of course, this quote wasn't about the NFL more generally, but it certainly seems to fit today.

Indianapolis Colts head coach Frank Reich fired offensive coordinator Marcus Brady based on his team's poor offensive output. The problem is that Brady — who is Black — doesn't even call the plays for the Colts. Who does? Reich himself. In common terms, this is what we call scapegoating.

This firing has hit a nerve in the Black community. It is part and parcel of the longstanding tendency to blame Black faces for white problems. Tragically, Brady is in very good company.

Now I don't know everything there is to know about professional football, but there seems to be plenty of blame to go around for this abysmal season, and it appears that the Indianapolis Colts have decided to make Marcus Brady the fall guy for a lot of people who quite frankly aren't doing their jobs well at all.

But the offensive line coach gets to keep his job, even though ours is ranked 26th in the league. Same thing with the quarterbacks coach, who has managed to "coach" a quarterback to lead the league in turnovers, interceptions and fumbles. Yet, he keeps his job.

Most importantly, the head coach, who actually calls the plays and has the Colts ranked 30th in points scored, is keeping his job. Maybe

there is an implied "for now," but I won't speculate. I only deal in the now. Yeah, that looks like accountability. Or not. Same script, different

Can't we all agree to end racism beyond making that phrase a trendy one to put on jerseys?

A Washington Post analysis found that even when Black coaches win, they lose. The Post found that Black coaches in the NFL are twice as likely to be fired even when they have a record of .500 or better.

The NFL has repeatedly shown us that they aren't solely focused on talent. Despite that about 60% of the players in the NFL are African American, only three of the current 32 head coaches (9%) are African American. It has been like this for a while. Art Shell was named the head coach of the Los Angeles Raiders in


The NFL is yet another example as to how there is no such thing as a real meritocracy. It's small "p" politics and what coaching tree you come from. Reportedly, Jim Irsay did not fire Marcus Brady. Coach Reich and General Manager Chris Ballard did. They are engaging in business as usual.

The Colts also should get credit for hiring Tony Dungy. He got seven years, and the Colts got a 76% win/ loss record and a Super Bowl. We can't forget about that. The Colts also have done some good in being community partners. Owner Jim Irsay's leadership on mental health is important and a top concern in our community.

Hopefully, the colts can become who we know they can be.

Redevelopment options at east side site include housing, green space and retail space

Community members on the east side want to bring more employment, add housing options and provide green spaces to the former Black Mountain site on the corner of East Washington and Ewing streets.

The city and its consulting team asked the community what they wanted to see at the former site. Nearly half of the respondents said there needs to be better grocery options and places to eat, especially sit-down restaurants. Many expressed a desire for better pedestrian infrastructure, including improvements to connecting sidewalks and crosswalks, and better lighting in some areas. The few sidewalks that connect to the site are cited as unsafe or uninviting, according to the draft for public comment.

Fifty-eight percent of respondents said they wanted to see more parks and green spaces in the area. Green spaces are known to enhance youth support, reduce stress and violence, and improve physical and mental health. A green space would provide safer walking conditions.

The site allows for varied redevelopment options. The city has come up with three potential concepts to address the guiding principles that the community wants to see. The concepts include townhome residential space, small retail space, flex industrial space, and temporary or permanent green space.

A flex industrial space is a modern warehouse with taller ceilings, capable of holding modern HVAC equipment, flexible floorplans and more loading docks with wide turning radius for semis.

The first scenario would be the best green infrastructure option to mitigate stormwater and emphasize conservation. Purdue University and Eli Lilly and Company are establishing a new pharmaceutical manufacturing scholarship program and have renewed their research collaboration.

Lilly has committed \$92.5 million to the West Lafayette campus through the two programs. Lilly's commitment includes \$42.5 million over 10 years to fund pharmaceutical manufacturing scholarships for incoming Purdue undergraduate

students, offering 75-100 students each year full tuition with a guaranteed internship or co-op at Lilly. "Lilly is among Purdue's most important partners, and this latest commitment reaffirms our longtime collaboration. Through these collaborations, Lilly and Purdue are helping to build a critical pharmaceutical ecosystem in the heartland," Purdue President Mitch Daniels said in a press release.

Court late last year without its board of trustees taking a public vote. The Supreme Court agreed to look at the case — HHC et. al, v Talevski — and will hear oral arguments on Nov. 8.

In an opinion submitted as part of the lawsuit, Indiana Public Access Counselor Luke Britt said not every decision needs board approval, but "the decision to file a petition for certiorari with [the U.S. Supreme Court] is a monumental undertaking."

"If an act as momentous as petitioning [the U.S. Supreme Court] to reverse the Seventh Circuit is treated as a rote, secretarial task, then a board simply becomes a performative, rubber stamp for executive staff," Britt wrote.

HHC argues it did not violate Indiana's Open Door Law and that its "statutory corporate structure" allows the board to delegate decisions regarding legal defense to its executive staff, headed by CEO Paul Babcock.

In a response to the public access complaint, HHC counsel Tenley Drescher-Rhoades said the agency acted in this case as it does in the nearly 3,000 other litigation matters it's involved in every year.

"It would not be practical, feasible, or in the Corporation's or the public's best interest for the Corporation's governing body to attempt or have to make litigation decisions in each of these matters, as to which they have no day-to-day oversight, involvement, or knowledge, which is why they long ago delegated this authority to the Corporations' executive staff," Drescher-Rhoades said in the response.

In the Supreme Court case mentioned in the lawsuit, HHC questions whether people on federal assistance programs like Medicaid can sue states if their rights are violated. There are decades of legal precedent in which Medicaid bene-

ficiaries have sued states and won. Legal experts and patient advocates are concerned this case threatens the rights of millions of Americans to hold states accountable.

More than 82 million Americans are covered by Medicaid — almost a quarter of the entire U.S. population.

"What happens if Marion County wins? It's probably a slower rolling disaster than we saw after Dobbs," said Sara Rosenbaum, a professor of health law and policy at George Washington University, referencing the recent Supreme Court decision to reverse the Constitutional right to abortion. "Suddenly you have a situation where there will be no consequences, literally no consequences, if a state misbehaves."

Other groups and Republican officials such as Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita have sided with Marion County, arguing that when private actors — like Medicaid beneficiaries — sue states and their agencies in federal court, it cripples states with legal fees. They also argue that there are other avenues that beneficiaries can use to voice their grievances if states violate their rights.

Patient advocates say these avenues are often not enough to hold states accountable or stop the harm to beneficiaries, who are mostly poor, elderly or have disabilities.

The case has drawn national attention from public health and legal groups across the country, including members of Congress like House Speaker Nancy Pelosi and Majority Whip James Clybrun.

Indiana Democratic

Congressman Andre Carson tweeted, "I join community activists and concerned citizens in urging the HHC board to reconvene and vote to withdraw this case, which has the potential to affect thousands of vulnerable individuals across the country."

The local group Concerned Clergy of Indianapolis, a group of African American pastors and community members, asked HHC to withdraw its lawsuit. "It is frustrating and sad to know that our community's health agency is now taking action that can tangibly

Migos rapper Takeoff dead after Houston shooting, rep says

Migos rapper Takeoff is dead after a shooting early Nov. 1 outside a bowling alley in Houston, a representative confirmed. He was 28.

Takeoff — whose name was Kirsnick Khari Ball — was part of Migos along with Quavo and Offset. A representative for Migos, who was not authorized to speak publicly, confirmed to The Associated Press that Takeoff had died.

Police responded shortly after 2:30 a.m. to reports of a shooting at 810 Billiards & Bowling, where dozens of people had gathered on a balcony outside of the bowling alley, which is on the third floor, police said. Officers discovered one man dead when they arrived.

Security guards who were in the area heard the shooting but did not see who did it, a police spokesperson said. Two other people were injured and taken to hospitals in private vehicles.

No arrests have been announced.

The Grammy-nominated rap trio from Georgia have had four Top 10 hits on the Billboard Hot 100, including their multi-week No. 1 "Bad and Boujee" featuring Lil Uzi Vert. They put out a trilogy of albums called "Culture," "Culture II" and "Culture III," with the first two albums hitting No. 1 on the Billboard 200 album chart.

They earned an ASCAP Vanguard Award in 2018, for their streaming success with multiplatinum songs like "Motorsport (featuring Cardi B and Nicki Minaj)," "Stir Fry," and "Walk It Talk It."

They also played a fictional version of themselves on an episode of the hit TV show "Atlanta."

Offset, who is married to Cardi B, released a solo album in 2019, while Takeoff and Quavo released a joint album "Only Built for Infinity Links" last month.

better align the budget with its values, and "leveraging our dollars where they matter most." This included working with local business leaders and implementing their recommendations for operational efficiency.

"We're excited to talk to our community about this," Johnson said to the Recorder before the board meeting, "to help make the case of why our students are deserving of the same opportunities that are afforded to other students around us in this community and to gain our community support."

If passed, Johnson said the district would begin pursuing the referendums in May of 2023 and then begin implementing the plan in August of 2024. The 2024-25 school year would be the first year of full implementation.

However, renovations to the buildings would likely be timed over a longer period based on labor availability, supply chains and other seasonal factors, Johnson said, although renovations could ideally start upon passage of the proposal.

School mergers will likely begin during the 2023-24 school year and begin with buildings that no longer have students in them. Shortly after, they plan to launch the new middle school, Johnson said.

However, the Rebuilding Stronger plan has faced backlash from families and school board member candidates because they feel there hasn't been enough research on the programs the plan would expand,

as well as not enough parent input.

Education group RISE Indy called for the IPS school board to delay the vote until next year.

"IPS is asking residents to approve more than \$800 million in new spending," Jasmin Shaheed-Young, president and CEO of RISE Indy, said in a statement Oct. 28. "Families, students and voters need more time to consider these changes and dig into the details."

Indiana University Health, Eskenazi Health and Community Health Network launched the "We Ask Because

We Care" campaign last month. The campaign highlights why it is important for health care organizations to gather patient information on race, ethnicity and language (often referred to as "REaL" data) and how it helps ensure that everyone receives the highest level of care.

These local participating health networks believe health disparities are a very real threat to the health and well-being of the neighborhoods they serve, and believe this is an important collaboration that will confront many important issues facing our community.

The 'We Ask because We Care' campaign is centered around providing the highest quality of personalized care by better understanding our diverse patient population and their unique needs. Without accurate baseline data about their race, ethnicity and language, it's impossible to really understand the specific nature and drivers of racial and ethnic disparities in patients' experiences and outcomes of care. It's critical that we measure the size of these disparity gaps; and monitor our progress in closing those gaps over time. Equity reports allow the participating health care providers to compare quality outcomes across demographics for each service line and region.

The pandemic brought forth many challenges including reemphasizing disparities of health in our community and the 'We Ask because We Care' campaign is centered on providing the highest quality of personalized care by better understanding our diverse patient population and their unique needs.

Having this information available on a broad scale will help the health systems know more about the communities they serve and the additional services they can provide to keep Indiana as healthy as it can be. By working together, we can help team members and patients understand why this information is so important to improve the quality of care and to move the needle on health equity.

The new patient reporting system

will be accompanied by extensive training on unconscious bias for each of the hospital's workforces. The participating hospitals also are taking proactive measures to reevaluate and advance hiring policies, salaries, retention efforts and procurement policies to better reflect diversity, equity and inclusion The promotional efforts around this campaign includes a radio spot that will run in both English and Spanish on Central Indiana radio stations as well as other informative materials that will be available in physician offices, outpatient clinics and surgery centers. Registrars also will soon be provided printed information to help patients request interpretation services in more than two dozen languages.



What really matters

Any psychologist who works with the court system will tell you that eyewitness testimony is tricky for both the prosecution and defense because people view the exact same incident from completely different vantage points. Those differing perspectives often serve to distort reality, even when people are attempting to

Taking such reality distortion to the next level, we live in an age wherein people are enamored of telling "their" truth — objective facts be damned. While this phenomenon is generally associated with left-leaning people, there is at least as much warping of facts on the right. All this has put millions of Americans on edge as we approach next week's midterm election.

The only thing that Democrats and Republicans seem to agree about is the fact that the stakes in this election are very high — though their reasoning tends to be vastly different. Having achieved their decades-long goal of overturning Roe v. Wade, Republicans no longer need to bring up abortion. Instead, they are laser-focused on inflation, crime and immigration. They hammer away on the price of everything from gas to milk, painstakingly recount the details of horrific murders (particularly in urban areas) and gleefully exalt Southern Govs. Ron DeSantis and Greg Abbott for "exposing the

hypocrisy of the libs" by shamelessly (and perhaps illegally) transporting undocumented immigrants to

Of course, Roe is on Democrats' minds for the opposite reason; the Supreme Court's overturning of a constitutional right after nearly 50 years is something few thought they would ever experience. And, to be sure, Democrats are also very concerned about the economy; mortgage rates don't care whether there is a "D" or an "R" after one's name. But the most important concern for at least a plurality of Democrats is the precarious state of democracy itself. We are enduring the greatest assault on African Americans' right to vote since the Civil Rights Move-

Republican legislatures across the country have passed extremely restrictive laws. Not to be outdone, the Supreme Court is highly expected to finish suffocating what remains of the Voting Rights Act when it rules on Alabama's Merrill v. Milligan case.

It is extremely difficult for me to be as concerned about inflation as I am about the disenfranchisement of African Americans. The recent images of Black people in Florida being handcuffed for voting after the state told them that they were eligible are seared into my consciousness.

Conservative politicians and pundits have been critical of those who believe, as I do, that our democracy is teetering on a precipice. Admittedly, I'm solidly middle class, so I worry less about filling my tank than Americans who are not situated as comfortably. But even if that weren't the case, I'd rather be stranded on the side of the road than barred from the ballot box. It is beyond disingenuous to pretend that they would not be arming themselves to the teeth if their right to vote were being challenged.

This leads me back to a point that millions of Americans either cannot understand the link between voting and their economic status. As many others have pointed out, voting against one's own economic interests has real-world consequences. (Simply look at the average salaries, health care coverage, educational attainment and overall standard of living in states that have Republican-led legislature.) Yet, millions of low-income Americans do exactly that. Repeatedly.

For example, consider the Trump-era passage of a \$1 trillion tax cut that overwhelmingly benefits billionaires and millionaires. That tax bill put a few hundred dollars in most people's pockets — even as it will add tens of thousands of dollars to our individual tax liability in the not-too-long run.

Voting is a right that, shamefully, is not guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution. Beyond being a right, it is a moral imperative. Conscience should demand that we all make the moral choice.

Race neutrality is anti-Blackness

(TriceEdneyWire. com) — During this Supreme Court session, the justices will tackle affirmative action in two cases brought by Students for Fair Admissions, opposing affirmative action

policies at Harvard University and the University of North Carolina. According to its website, this group represents '20,000 students, parents, and others who believe that racial classifications and preferences to college admissions are unfair, unnecessary, and unconstitutional." Where were these people when African Americans were explicitly excluded from college admissions? Where were they when Black folks had to sue to be admitted?

Consider George v. McLaurin, where McLaurin, an African American man, was denied admission to a graduate program at Oklahoma University solely because of his race. In 1950, it was illegal in Oklahoma to attend, teach at or operate an educational institution that admitted both white and Black students. Tax payers, including Black citizens, funded this university. This was affirmative action for white folks. but no Students for Fair Admissions

challenged the racist policy.

Anti-Blackness was acceptable historically, and it is alive and well today. The bizarre concept of race neutrality in a racist society is nothing more than historical denial. Anti-Blackness is woven into the fabric of our nation, and affirmative action, minority set-asides, and other race-conscious remedies are merely the antidote to historical structural racism. These Students for Fair Admission have embraced the absolute unfairness of how national public policy is tilted against Black people.

Enslavement was not race-neutral. Jim Crow laws were not race-neutral. Redlining was not race-neutral. But these Students for Fair Admissions want race neutrality. They need the education in American history they missed since they did not study how so-called race neutrality has harmed Black people.

Once admitted to Oklahoma University, George McLaurin was segregated in the library, classrooms and cafeteria. The lower court ruled that his "inconvenience" was minor. The Supreme Court found for McLaurin, but only after a multiyear battle. Meanwhile, Oklahoma University found his classroom presence so onerous that he was forced to listen to lectures in a closet that was separate from the classroom space for other students.

McLaurin was not the only student who attempted admission to Oklahoma State University, nor the only one who challenged them in court. Ada Lois Sopuel Fisher applied to OU's law school but was denied entry because of her race. Thanks to the NAACP and the McLaurin agitation, she was admitted in 1949 and graduated in 1951. She was appointed to the OU board of regents in 1992.

In Oklahoma and many other states, justice delayed has been justice denied. Like many other plaintiffs, McLaurin was over 60 when he pursued his case. He held a master's degree and was a professor at HBCU Langston University for over 30 years. But the Supreme Court case seemed to take its toll on him. There is no record that he graduated, although his wife, Peninah, earned a master's in Home Economics from OU in 1954. George McLaurin died in 1968.

Do these Students for Fair Admissions know this? Do they care that George McLaurin, and so many others, experienced no fairness? Does it matter to them that the antidote to this unfairness is affirmative action? Or do privileged whites and white-adjacent people (like the Asian Americans who embrace anti-Blackness and white privilege) simmer in their faux superiority to attack Black people?

Affirmative action opened doors that had, for so long, been shut in the face of Black students. These Students for Fair Admissions want to close the doors again. Associate Justice Clarence Thomas has his fingerprints all over this. Two of his former law clerks are the attorneys for Students for Fair Admissions. Thomas is a study of racial contradictions, but the best analysis comes from Associate Justice Thurgood Marshall, who said that whether a snake is Black or white, it is still a snake. Thomas would describe himself as a constitutional strict constructionist. I'd call him an example of how Black folk can embrace anti-Blackness and deny history in their effort to appease and embrace white predatory capitalists.

The Students for Fair Admissions and their Thomas-connected allies deny history, but they are not alone in their anti-Black attacks. Let's not fall for their rhetoric of "race neutrality Denying race history and racial oppression is nothing more than virulent anti-Blackness.

(TriceEdneyWire.com) — While the Philadelphia Phillies and the Houston Astros are competing in the 2022 World Series, it becomes the first time since 1950 that there will not be a single American-born Black player on either team's 26-person roster. "I don't think that's something that baseball should really be proud of. It

looks bad," Astros manager Dusty Baker told the Associated Press. "It lets people know that it didn't take a year or even a decade to get to this point." Compare 2022 with 1979 when Willie Stargell and Dave Parker were among 10 Black players on the "We Are Family" Pittsburgh Pirates championship team. Long

versity, but his excellence on the field introduced the Brooklyn Dodgers to a prototype player who blended speed with power. His example paved the way for

future players with similar attributes to be acquired by all MLB teams. Today, baseball is not the game of choice for most

inner-city youth. The choice is easily basketball or football. Baseball is mainly a white suburban sport which is supplemented on the professional level by foreign labor. We cannot dismiss how important it is for youth of any race to have someone in the home who has a love for baseball and for that love to be passed down.

This disparity was decades in the making. On Dec. 18, 2019, shortly after signing his nine-year, \$324 million dollar contract to pitch for the New York Yankees, Gerrit Cole stood at a podium at Yankee Stadium and thanked Curt Flood. Just as Jackie Robinson was a Black player who forever changed the sport of baseball, the same was true with Curt Flood. There was a period of time when most players had jobs during the offseason to make ends meet. Every MLB player had in his contract what was known as "the reserve clause," which bound players to their teams. Contracts, which were limited to one season, "reserved" the team's right to retain the player for the next season. The players, even superstars, had no leverage to negotiate better deals.

After the 1969 season, the St. Louis Cardinals decided to trade Curt Flood to the Philadelphia Phillies, but he refused to move to what he called "the nation's northernmost Southern city." Flood wrote to MLB Commissioner Bowie Kuhn explaining why he refused to accept being traded. "I do not feel that I am

a piece of property to be bought and sold irrespective

of my wishes," Flood wrote.

Kuhn denied the request. Knowing he would be blacklisted as a player and as a future coach or manager, Flood still made the decision to sue Kuhn and MLB arguing that the league's control over players' employment violated federal antitrust law and workers' rights. Over the next few years, the Supreme Court ruled against Flood in a 5-3 vote. In 1975, a loophole was found in the reserve-clause language that didn't require going to court. As a result, an arbitrator ruled in favor of the players which meant the end of the reserve system and the beginning of what we now know as free agency. Thanks to Curt Flood's bold courage and sacrifice, players' wages, benefits, pensions and working conditions dramatically improved.

When baseball free agency increased players' salaries, one response by MLB teams was to increase their efforts in other countries such as the Dominican Republic, Venezuela and Cuba when seeking the Jackie Robinson-type players who possess the same combination of speed and power. The Latin American pipeline provides MLB with a lucrative investment opportunity because they have historically been able to sign players who are desperate and see baseball as their only means of escaping poverty. In other words, it's a source of cheap labor. While MLB diversity development programs such as the PLAY BALL Initiative and the Reviving Baseball in Inner Cities (RBI) program are designed to steer children from underserved and diverse communities in the U.S. toward baseball, the love of basketball and football will always be tough to overcome.

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

Strong RSV vaccine data lifts hopes after years of futility

New research shows vaccinating pregnant women helped protect their newborns from the common but scary respiratory virus called RSV that fills hospitals with wheezing babies each fall.

The preliminary results buoy hope that after decades of failure and frustration, vaccines against RSV may finally be getting close.

Pfizer announced Nov. 1 that a large international study found vaccinating moms-to-be was nearly 82% effective at preventing severe cases of RSV in their babies' most vulnerable first 90 days of life. At age 6 months, the vaccine still was proving 69% effective against serious illness — and there were no signs of safety problems in mothers or babies.

"Moms are always giving their antibodies to their baby," said virologist Kena Swanson, Pfizer's vice president of viral vaccines. "The vaccine just puts them in that much better position" to form and pass on RSV-fighting antibodies.

The vaccine quest isn't just to protect infants. RSV is dangerous for older adults, too, and both Pfizer and rival GSK recently announced that their competing shots also proved protective for seniors.

None of the findings will help this year when an early RSV surge already is crowding children's hospitals. But they raise the prospect that one or more vaccines might become available before next fall's RSV season.

"My fingers are crossed," said Dr. William Schaffner, an infectious disease specialist at Vanderbilt University. "We're making inroads."

The data was reported in a press release and hasn't been vetted by independent experts. Here's a look at the long quest for RSV vaccines.

WHAT IS RSV?

For most healthy people, RSV, or respiratory syncytial virus, is a cold-like nuisance. But for the very young, the elderly and people with certain health problems, it can be serious, even life-threatening. The virus can infect deep in the lungs, causing pneumonia, and in babies it can impede breathing by inflaming tiny airways.

In the U.S., about 58,000 children younger than 5 are hospitalized for RSV each year and several hundred die. Among adults 65 and older, about 177,000 are hospitalized with RSV and 14,000 die annually.

Worldwide, RSV kills about 100,000 children a year, mostly in poor countries.

WHY IS THERE NO VACCINE?

A tragedy in the 1960s set back the whole field. Using the approach that led to the first polio vaccine, scientists made an experimental RSV vaccine by growing the virus in a lab and killing it. But testing in children found not only was the vaccine not protective, youngsters who caught RSV after vaccination fared worse. Two died.

"For a period of 20 years, even though science was advancing, nobody wanted to go near development of an RSV vaccine," Schaffner said.

Even today's modern RSV vaccine candidates were tested first in older adults, not children, he noted.

WHAT GOT **DEVELOPMENT BACK ON TRACK?**

Modern vaccines tend to target the outer surface of a virus, what the immune system sees when a germ invades. For RSV, that target is the so-called F protein that helps the virus latch onto human cells. Again there was a hurdle: That protein is a shape-shifter, rearranging its form before and after it "fuses" to cells.

It turns out that the immune system only forms effective RSV-fighting antibodies when it spots what's called the pre-fusion version of that protein, explained structural biologist Jason McLellan of the University of Texas at Austin.

In 2013, McLellan and virologist Barney Graham were working at the National Institutes of Health when they homed in on the correct shape and figured out how to freeze it in that form. That finding

opened the way to today's development of a variety of experimental RSV vaccine candidates.

(That same discovery was key to the hugely successful COVID-19 vaccines, as the coronavirus also is cloaked in a shape-shifting surface protein.)

WHAT'S IN THE PIPELINE?

Several companies are creating RSV vaccines, but Pfizer and rival GSK are furthest along. Both companies recently reported final-stage testing in older adults. The competing vaccines are made somewhat differently but each proved strongly effective, especially against serious disease. Both companies plan to seek regulatory approval in the U.S. by the end of the year, as well as in other countries.

The older-adult data "looks fantastic," said McLellan, who has closely followed the vaccine development. "I think we're on the right track."

And if vaccinating pregnant women pans out, it could be "a win for two individuals instead of just one," by offering protection to both mom-to-be and baby, said Dr. Wilbur Chen of the University of Maryland School of Medicine.

Pfizer's maternal vaccine is the same recipe that it tested successfully in older adults — and it also plans to seek Food and Drug Administration approval for those vaccinations by year's end.

The new study included 7,400 pregnant women in 18 countries, including the U.S., and spanned multiple RSV seasons. Preliminary results reported show the vaccine was most effective against severe disease. For milder illness, effectiveness was 51% to 57% — short of the study's statistical requirements but a result that Pfizer still called clinically meaningful because it could mean fewer trips to the doctor's office.

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RSV Can Cause Illness in Some Infants, Older Adults

Respiratory syncytial virus, more commonly called RSV, is a common respiratory virus that usually causes mild, cold-like symptoms. Young children and older adults are the most vulnerable to having complications from this virus.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reports an increase in RSV detections and RSV-associated emergency department visits and hospitalizations in several U.S. regions. Hospitals in the Indianapolis area are reporting a rise in RSV cases.

The Marion County Public Health Department wants residents to better understand what RSV is and the potential health threats.

RSV can be dangerous for some infants and young children. Each year in the United States, an estimated 58,000 children younger than 5 years old are hospitalized due to RSV infection.

Those at greatest risk for severe illness from RSV include children younger than 2 years old with chronic lung disease or congenital (present from birth) heart disease, children with weakened immune systems, and children who have neuromuscular disorders, including those who have difficulty swallowing or clearing mucus secretions.

Virtually all children get an RSV infection by the time they are 2 years old. Most of the time RSV will cause a mild, cold-like illness, but it can also cause severe illness such as Bronchiolitis, an inflammation of the small airways in the lungs, and Pneumonia, an infection of the lungs.

Nearly 2 out of every 100 children younger than 6 months of age with RSV infection may need to be hospitalized. Most improve with this type of supportive care and are discharged in a few days.

RSV may not be severe when it first starts. However, it can become more severe a few days into the illness. Early symptoms of RSV may include a runny nose, decrease in appetite, and cough, which may progress to wheezing.

Infants who get an RSV infection almost always show symptoms. This is different from adults who can sometimes get RSV infections and not have symptoms.

For infants less than 6 months old, the only symptoms of RSV infection may be irritability, decreased activity, decreased appetite, and apnea (pauses while breathing). Fever may not always occur with RSV infections.

RSV infections can be dangerous for certain adults. Each year, it is estimated that between 60,000-120,000 older adults in the United States are hospitalized and 6,000-10,000 of them die due to RSV infection. Adults at highest risk for severe RSV infection include:

- Older adults, especially those 65 years and older
- Adults with chronic heart or lung disease
- Adults with weakened immune systems

When an adult gets RSV infection, they typically have mild cold-like symptoms, but some may develop a lung infection or pneumonia. RSV can sometimes also lead to worsening of serious conditions such as asthma, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), and congestive heart failure.

Older adults who get very sick from RSV may need to be hospitalized. They are at greater risk than young adults for serious complications from RSV, including death, because immune systems weaken with age.

Black church tradition survives Georgia's voting changes

ATLANTA (AP) — Black church leaders and activists in Georgia rallied Oct. 30 in a push to get congregants to vote — a longstanding tradition known as 'souls to the polls" that is taking on greater meaning this year amid new obstacles to casting a ballot in the midterm elections.

At Rainbow Baptist Church just outside Atlanta, about two dozen cars and a large bus emblazoned with the image of civil rights icon John Lewis formed a caravan in the parking lot. Teresa Hardy, an organizer with voting rights group The Georgia Coalition for the People's Agenda, led a prayer before the caravan set out for a polling site at a nearby mall.

Few people in the group actually cast a ballot there, but organizers said it was important to promote voting, particularly in the wake of new restrictions enacted by the state Legislature.

"Your rights are being taken away," said Comarkco Blackett, a minister at Rainbow Baptist. "We have to get out, stand together across color boundaries.'

State lawmakers nearly did away with Sunday voting under a bill signed into law last year. The Republican-sponsored legislation followed former President Donald Trump's false claims that voter fraud cost him reelection in 2020.

Though lawmakers backed off the Sunday voting ban, the bill shortened the time to request a mail ballot, rolled back the COVID-19 pandemic-driven expansion of ballot drop boxes, reduced early voting before runoff elections and prohibited groups from handing out food and water to voters in line.

Republicans said Georgia's new law was necessary to restore confidence in the state's election system. Civil rights advocates saw it as an attack on Black voters, who helped Democrats win the presidential contest in Georgia in 2020 for the first time since 1992 and later take the state's two U.S. Senate seats. They are pushing back by redoubling efforts to turn out Black voters.

"No matter what barriers they try to put in place, we're going to find a way for our people to get around



those barriers so they can actually exercise their right to vote," said Helen Butler, executive director of the People's Agenda.

Sunday's caravan ended at a strip mall, where several dozen people held signs encouraging passersby to vote. Georgia has experienced a significant jump in turnout during early voting, which runs through Nov. 4. As of Friday morning, more than 1.25 million voters had cast ballots in person, according to the secretary of state's office, a jump of more than 50% from the 2018 midterm contest.

"Our ancestors fought far harder than we're fighting," said Rhonda Taylor, a leader in the AME Church in Atlanta who participated in the rally. "We got to keep going.'

U.S. Sen. Raphael Warnock, the pastor of Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta who is facing reelection in November, attended a separate "souls to the polls" event at a church in Atlanta.

"Souls to the polls" reflects the Black church's central role in the fight for justice and freedom in the U.S., said W. Franklyn Richardson, chairman of the

board of trustees of the Conference of National Black Churches.

Richardson said efforts like it are particularly critical this election cycle.

"It's the cumulative accomplishment of our people that is being challenged and threatened that makes this such an urgent election," he said.

The idea for "souls to the polls" goes back to the civil rights movement. The Rev. George Lee, a Black Mississippi entrepreneur, was assassinated by white supremacists in 1955 after he helped nearly 100 Black residents register to vote in the town of Bel-

It reflects a larger effort in the Black community to leverage the church for voting rights, said Dartmouth history professor Matthew Delmont.

In addition to motivating potential voters, pastors provide the "logistical support to get people to go directly from church service to go to vote," he said.

United Methodists are breaking up in a slow-motion schism

United Methodists have for generations been a mainstay of the American religious landscape — one of the most geographically widespread of the major Protestant denominations, their steeples visible on urban streets, in county seats and along country roads, their ethos marked by a firm yet quiet faith, simple worship and earnest socia service.

But the United Methodist Church is also the latest of several mainline Protestant denominations in America to begin fracturing, just as Episcopal, Lutheran and Presbyterian denominations lost significant minorities of churches and members amid debates over sexuality and theology.

In annual regional gatherings across the U.S. earlier this year, United Methodists approved requests of about 300 congregations to quit the denomination, according to United Methodist News Service. Special meetings in the second half of the year are expected to vote on as many as 1,000 more, according to the conservative advocacy group Wesleyan Covenant Association.

Scores of churches in Georgia, and hundreds in Texas, are considering disaffiliation. Some aren't waiting for permission to leave: More than 100 congregations in Florida and North Carolina have filed or threatened lawsuits to break out.

Those departing are still a fraction of the estimated 30,000 congregations in the United States alone, with nearly 13,000 more abroad, according to recent UMC statistics.

But large United Methodist congregations are moving to the exits, including some of the largest in Arkansas, Georgia, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas.

The flashpoints are the denomination's bans on same-sex marriages and ordaining openly LGBTQ clergy though many see these as symptoms for deeper differences in views on justice, theology and scriptural authority. The denomination has repeatedly upheld these bans at legislative General Conferences, but some U.S. churches and clergy have defied them.

This spring, conservatives launched a new Global Methodist Church, where they are determined both to maintain and to enforce such bans.

A proposal to amicably divide the denomination and its assets, unveiled in early 2020, has lost its once-broad support after years of pandemic-related delays to the legislative General Conference, whose vote was needed to ratify it.

Now the breakup and the negotia-

tions are happening piecemeal — one regional conference at a time.

New York Bishop Thomas Bickerton, president of the Council of Bishops, issued a statement in August denouncing "a constant barrage of negative rhetoric that is filled with falsehood and inaccuracies" by breakaway groups. In particular, he disputed allegations that the church is changing core doctrines.

He said the denomination seeks to find a balance between encouraging churches to stay yet enabling them to

"It's a both/and," Bickerton said in an interview. "We want people to know straight up front that we don't want them to leave. We need traditionalists, we need centrists, we need progressives willing to engage in a healthy debate to discern what God's will is."

But more departures are expected next year.

In just the Western Pennsylvania Annual Conference, about 300 of its 800 churches have begun inquiring about the process of leaving by the end of 2023, according to the Wesleyan Covenant Association. Not all may follow through, but some see it as inevitable.

"We feel like to stay the same in our mission and theology, we need to change denominations," said the Rev. Steve Cordle, lead pastor of Crossroads Church. Based in Oakdale, Pennsylvania, it's one of the largest congregations in the conference. It's considering going independent or joining the Global Methodist Church.

A few miles away in Bethel Park, another Pittsburgh suburb, Christ United Methodist Church remains committed to the denomination.

The Rev. Chris Morgan said his church has a "big tent" of liberals and conservatives with most congregants "leaning in toward the center." The church recently hosted an educational series on hot topics including the schism, guns, abortion and COVID-19.

"Instead of becoming like society, we're trying to become an example of what it looks like to disagree and still treat people with respect and care and love," Morgan said.

He was far from the only one to see a

parallel between the Methodist debates amined at every step of the ordination and broader societal polarization.

"We live in a world of division. Just look at our political front," said Bishop David Graves, who oversees the South Georgia and Alabama-West Florida conferences. Both conferences have dozens of congregations moving to the exits, though the large majority are staying so far.

Graves said he wants to help enable churches to leave if they want to but has spent long hours urging them to consider all the factors and be sure it is God's will.

"It's very taxing," he said. "Those are intense meetings."

Conservatives say denominational leaders are making it difficult for those who want to leave to do so, however.

Currently churches may leave after paying two years' worth of "apportionments" — essentially denominational dues — plus their share of unfunded pension liabilities. Conferences may also impose additional requirements, and some are asking for a percentage of the property value of church buildings.

"In many cases, (the requirements) are onerous, they are punitive," said the Rev. Jay Therrell, president of the Wesleyan Covenant Association, a conservative advocacy group that is working to help churches jump to the Global Methodist Church.

Bishop Karen Oliveto of the UMC's Mountain Sky region — who in 2016 became the UMC's first openly lesbian bishop — said via email it is "extremely wounding to LGBTQ persons that our very personhood is being used as a wedge to disrupt unity in the church." She expressed hope that UMC churches "will be safe places for all people, regardless of sexual orientation or gender he said. identity."

Conservatives have lamented that UMC has failed to enforce its Book of Discipline on standards for ordination and marriage.

Oliveto said, however, that sometimes "the Holy Spirit runs ahead of us and gives us a glimpse of the future to which we are called. This is certainly the case across the denomination, where LGBTQ persons have been exprocess and found to possess the gifts and graces for ordained ministry."

United Methodists are part of a global movement that traces their origins to the 18th-century English revivalist John Wesley, who emphasized personal piety, evangelism and social service. American membership has declined

to about 6.5 million, from a peak of 11 million in the 1960s. Overseas membership soared to match or exceed that of the U.S., fueled mostly by growth and mergers in Africa.

It's too early to say if there will be widespread departures from international churches. African churches, for instance, often combine conservative stances on sexual issues with progressive views on the economy and colonialism's legacy.

Several African bishops issued a statement denouncing conservative advocacy groups, including one called the Africa Initiative, for collaborating to "destroy our United Methodist Church."

The Africa Initiative replied that it respected the bishops but would continue its efforts "to see biblical Christianity taught, lived and sustained."

Neal Christie of the Love Your Neighbor Coalition, a partnership of progressive and ethnically based Methodist advocacy groups, said the "notion that outside the United States there's one monolithic voice is a caricature."

The coalition is promoting a more decentralized church where regions could make their own decisions on issues such as LGBTQ inclusion based on their cultural contexts.

"We believe this is a big tent church, that the church is big enough for all,"

But after decades of controversy, some are done.

"The traditionalists decided this is like a toxic relationship now, and we're just harming each other," said the Rev. Laura Saffell, chairperson of the Western Pennsylvania chapter of the Wesleyan Covenant Association. "The best we can do is bless and send" each other their separate ways.



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
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

Manifesting the mind of Christ

"In your relationships with one another, have the same mindset as Christ Jesus: Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God some-

thing to be used to his own advantage; rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to death—even death on a cross!" -Philippians 2:5-8 NIV

The United Negro College Fund's (UNCF) iconic motto, "A mind is a terrible thing to waste," is so true. It was originally used as a public promotion and societal call for funding college education for Blacks who were financially unable to attend college. Salary transparency laws aim to combat pay disparities

NEW YORK (AP) — Starting this week, job seekers in New York City will have access to a key piece of information: how much money they can expect to earn for an advertised opening.

New York will require employers as of Nov. 1 to disclose "a good faith salary range for every job, promotion, and transfer opportunity advertised," according to the city's Commission on Human Rights.

Similar salary transparency laws are being adopted by a small but growing number of cities and states across the country in an effort to address pay disparities for women and people of color.

Seher Khawaja, senior attorney for economic empowerment at Legal Momentum whose organization helped draft the New York City law, said salary transparency "gives existing employees and workers information to better gauge how positions within their workplace are valued and whether they're being paid fairly."

It also gives employers a way to avoid

"It puts their feet to the fire to think about how they're setting pay and to avoid discriminatory practices that were working their way in previously," Khawaja said.

Haris Silic, vice president at Artisan Talent, a staffing agency that places hundreds of creative professionals in New York City and across the country, said the law's implementation may initially be tough on the employer's side, but he thinks "everyone sees the value."

"Every employer was an employee once," he said.

Business groups, including New York's five borough chambers of commerce, have argued that the law could create "dissatisfaction in the workforce and demands to adjust existing pay scales that the employer may be unable to afford."

"During a labor shortage, or in the context of achieving diversity goals, the posted maximum may be significantly higher than the historical salary ranges," the groups wrote in a letter to the New York City Council.

Colorado was the first to adopt a salary transparency law in 2019, followed by California, Maryland, Nevada, Rhode Island, Connecticut, and Washington, as well as cities like Cincinnati and Toledo, Ohio.

Rules for salary disclosures vary. In some cases, they require employers to share the information upon request or after an interview, with exemptions for small businesses. In other cases, employers must post salary ranges.

In Colorado, for example, a recent job posting on hiring site Indeed for an executive assistant in Denver advertised a salary range of \$57,131 to \$88,516 a year. A human resources data analyst role listed a range of \$67,488 to \$111,355 a year. A retail position at Target advertised an hourly salary of \$23.75 to \$40.40.

New York City's law is similar to Colorado's, but it applies only to employers with four or more workers rather than all businesses. That accounts for one-third of employers in the city but



roughly 90% of workers, according to state Labor Department statistics.

The new wave of legislation marks a shift in who bears the onus for making salaries transparent, with more employers now being held responsible for creating an open work environment instead of leaving it to employees to figure out how their pay compares to their coworkers and whether to ask for fair compensation, according to Andrea Johnson, director of state policy at the National Women's Law Center.

Mary Ramsay, 55, a health educator based in Syracuse, New York, who is looking for a job with higher pay, said she hopes New York City's salary transparency law will soon apply to the entire state, something that legislators are currently considering.

"Hiring people should be seen as a two-way contract," she said. "You're looking for a good partnership."

In September, California Governor Gavin Newsom signed a law requiring any employer with at least 15 employees to publish pay scales with its job listings. The law also went further than Colorado and New York by requiring large employers to submit an annual report to California's Civil Rights Department breaking down salaries by race, ethnicity, and sex.

In 2021, the median pay for full-time women workers was about 83% of men's pay, according to federal data, and women make less than their male counterparts in nearly all fields. For women of color, the numbers are even worse. A report by the National Partnership for Women and Families found that Black women make 64 cents for every dollar paid to white, non-Hispanic men. For Latina women, it's 54 cents and for Native American women, it's just 51 cents.

Khawaja said the disclosure of demographic information is a heartening addition to the California law, noting that one of the most significant reasons for persistent wage inequities is occupational segregation by gender and race. So long as women and people of color disproportionately work in lower wage industries, pay gaps will exist, she added.

"A disproportionate number of women are working lower wage jobs," Khawaja said. "So legislation to increase the minimum wage and eliminate exceptions, such as the tipped wage for certain categories of workers like restaurant workers, are really essential to closing that gap."

DISCUSSING PAY WITH CO-WORKERS IS LEGAL

"The National Labor Relations Protection Act protects employees who dis-their interventions in the way compacuss pay because it protects employees who discuss workplace conditions, and pay is a work condition," she said.

A lack of transparency around pay typically disadvantages women and people of color — the very same groups that are already statistically less likely to fare well in negotiations, Johnson added.

IT'S OK TO WITHHOLD YOUR SALARY HISTORY

Don't feel compelled to disclose your salary history with a potential employer. In fact, some cities and states have passed laws forbidding employers from even asking, a practice that can depress wages and lock in inequities.

"There's a fundamental information asymmetry in salary negotiation," said Kate Bahn, chief economist at the Washington Center for Equitable Growth. "Employers inherently have better information about wages, meaning they have an upper hand. The party that has more information is going to fare better."

SAME GOES FOR SALARY EXPECTATIONS

Some employers get around the salary history legal constraint by asking applicants to share their salary expectations, but Bahn said that can have the same effect of lowering offers.



OnyxFest to return with 6 locally written and produced one-act plays

OnyxFest, a theater festival dedicated to amplifying the work of Black playwrights, is returning this fall for two consecutive weekends.

Presented in partnership with IndyFringe and sponsored by the Africana Repertory Theatre of IU-PUI, the 12th annual fall theater festival will feature six newly produced one-act plays written by local playwrights Nov. 3-6 and Nov. 10-12.

Vernon A. Williams, communication and community engagement strategist for IUPUI and the executive director of OnyxFest, said one of the things taken into consideration when choosing plays for the festival is substance and entertainment value.

OnyxFest gives local Black playwrights a platform and a stage to showcase work that otherwise likely wouldn't be seen. However, another one of the goals of the festival is to present audiences with an idea to think about.

"We want it to be something that is beyond fluff," he said. "We want it to be something that has substance, something that after you see it, you're glad you did."

The lineup for this year's festival includes one of Williams' own plays entitled "A Noise In The Attic," which he said is a family-centric drama/comedy about a woman whose husband has put his own dreams and aspirations above hers for seven years.

However, someone else enters the situation, Williams said, causing the wife to gain some perspective, addressing her own frustration and then deciding to do something radical.

Other plays featured in OnyxFest will include "Police State" by Rain Wilson, "Houseless, Not Homeless" by Michael Florence, "Black Is My Color" by Celest Williams, "Majesties" by Charla Booth" and "Your Love Will Be Judged" by Gabrielle Patterson.

"We really go through a lot to make sure that everybody has a different story to tell," Williams said. "So when a person buys a ticket, they can buy a ticket for all six of these shows and not see the same story told — not once — because they're also differ-

OnyxFest is open to the public and each of the plays is appropriate for viewers of all ages, Williams said. Any show dealing with mature themes does so tactfully and tastefully, he said.

OnyxFest will take place at IndyFringe Basile Theatre, 719 E. St. Clair St., Nov. 3-6 and at the IUPUI Campus Center Theatre, 420 University Blvd., Nov. 10-12. Tickets for OnyxFest are \$15 and are available with a full play schedule at indyfringe.org/onyxfest. More information about show times can also be found at onyxfest.com.


