Gabriel Morley declined the CEO position with Indianapolis Public Library less than 24 hours after the board voted to offer him the job.

In a statement, Morley said it was clear this wasn't the right fit for him.

"I am disheartened by the way we have come to this point and decision," he said. "I wish IndyPL well in its future endeavors."

Attention now turns to Nichelle M. Hayes, who had been the library's interim CEO until the

board voted to offer Morley the permanent job Dec. 8.

Reached by phone after the announcement that Morley declined the offer, Hayes said she doesn't have immediate plans and hasn't thought about if she'll try for the permanent position again. Hayes, who is still employed by the library, was a finalist along with Morley.

Chief Public Services Officer Gregory Hill will serve as acting CEO, and a permanent CEO search will resume "in the near future," the library said in a statement.

Community members gathered on the steps of Central Library on Dec. 12 protesting in support of Nichelle M. Hayes as the next CEO of Indianapolis Public Library. Organized by members of the Party for Socialism and Liberation, more than 100

people — including current and former library workers and union members, community members and city officials – came together bundled up in coats, hats and gloves in support of hiring Hayes as the next CEO of Indianapolis Public Library.

The protest came three days after the library board's original choice for CEO, Gabriel Morley, declined the offer follow-

# From funeral homes to churches, violence plagues spiritual grounds too

Pamela Grant attended a funeral at Oasis of Hope Baptist Church to support her son, Alan Jermaine Turman, and his new wife, Shannon Turman, not knowing this would be the last time she would see

her son alive.

Grant was there when Alan Turman was shot in the church parking lot Nov. 5. In fact, she was standing right next to him.

"He got shot right in front of me, and he died right in front of me," Grant said in an interview with the Recorder a month after the incident. "I will probably never get over this."

A fight started outside of the church between Alan Turman and Stefen Lowe, Shannon Turman's exhusband. After people helped stop the fight, Lowe got in his car, drove up to Alan and shot him.

Grant wondered why and how this could happen, especially outside of a church.

From the killing of James Dixon III outside of his funeral home in August to shootings in church parking lots, violent incidents on spiritual grounds seem to be happening more throughout the city. According to Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department, criminal homicides are down about 14% as of Dec. 6 compared to the same time last year, yet people like Grant are still witnessing violence in the city and on spiritual grounds.

Grant held up some of her son's paintings, pointing out new details and trying to remember her son for the good and creative things he did in his life.

# Perry Township eliminates school choice for elementary students

The Perry Township school board voted on Dec. 12 to end school choice for elementary students effective next school year to help alleviate a severe bus driver shortage, despite significant opposition from parents.

The 6-0 vote will establish new elementary boundaries for each of the district's 11 elementary schools, which serve either the east side of Southport or the west side of Perry.

The change means that elementary students will no longer get free transportation to any school in the area where they live. Instead, each student will be assigned to a school within new elementary boundaries redrawn to enable more efficient bus routes. The district reported having only 102 bus drivers for the 140 staff and substitute positions it had as of Dec. 5.

The district also will create attendance boundaries for two schools, Jeremiah Gray **Elementary and Rosa Parks** Elementary, which will no longer receive students from other neighborhoods.

Families can still choose to send their children to a school outside of their attendance boundary, but only if there is space and if they provide their own transportation.

Officials estimate the plan, one of four options presented to the board, would eliminate the need for 15 to 36 bus routes and would require

roughly 2,300 students to change schools.

Board members acknowledged that the decision did not satisfy everyone.

"Nothing's going to be perfect; we're a massive, massive district and decisions are often difficult and complicated," board member Hannah Dale said. "But I know how much we've all listened and will continue to listen."

District officials hope to outline in January rules for the application process for student transfers. Superintendent Patrick Mapes said he hopes the district will process applications and notify students by the March spring break about school assignments for next school year.

"Then we'll start doing the open houses at those schools to invite the students who currently aren't there to come into those buildings," he told reporters after the vote.

Students who attend a choice school or a school outside of their attendance boundary will be given priority to stay at their current school if there is space and families provide transportation, Mapes said.

Parents and students pushed back against the plan before

the vote, arguing that the change would be unfair to students who love their school communities.

Leanor Formo, a third grader at Rosa Parks Elementary, described the challenge of leaving her friends at school when she was diagnosed with cancer before the pandemic.

"What you are doing makes me feel helpless again," Leanor said. "I don't want to be scared about starting over without my teacher."

Parents also urged the district to find another solution to the driver shortage, arguing that the plan does not fix the

problem and further disrupts children's learning after a rough few years from the pandemic.

"This proposal is a loose Band-Aid that will not serve Perry Township's transportation issues," said McKenna Allen, whose daughter attends Rosa Parks. "Quite frankly, our children deserve better than a loose Band-Aid."

Officials said the current choice program creates an inefficient transportation system that leaves some buses underutilized even as the district can't find enough drivers for all its buses.

Transportation issues have plagued districts across the state and country as schools grapple with a bus driver shortage.

"We'll be able to reduce the number of students that we're getting home an hour late from school currently, and we'll be able to really be more efficient with how we load our buses," Mapes said. "We have some buses right now that only have 25 to 30 students on them, and we'll be able to put a lot more students on the buses and be more efficient with our tax dollars."

Special education students will still receive free transportation to school, as required by law, under the new attendance boundaries.

Grant has lost a child before — one of her daughters was killed in a hit-andrun in 2015 — but she knows her son's death is different because she observed it firsthand.

She struggles with sleeping, and images of her son lying dead in the church parking lot are displayed in her mind throughout the day. As she rewatched some of Turman's videos he posted on Facebook, she questioned how she would move on. Her answer: her faith in God.

"If I just keep on walking with God, I will see them again one day," Grant said. "Until then, I don't know, I'll just have to take it day by day."

## A history of violence in the church

From arsonists to gunmen, there is a long history of violence against or on Black church campuses. Some of the more well-known violent acts that happened in Black churches around the country are:

16th Street Baptist Church bombing

The killing of four young girls Sept.

15, 1963, at 16th Street Baptist Church
in Birmingham, Alabama. The Ku
Klux Klan set off a bomb at the church,
killing the girls and injuring more than
20 other members of the church.

• Charleston church shooting — The killing of nine people at Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church in Charleston, South Carolina, on June 17, 2015. The shooter was a 21-year-old white man named Dylann Roof.

• Macedonia Church of God in Christ — The church was set on fire Nov. 5, 2008, hours after the election of President Barack Obama in Springfield, Massachusetts. Three white men were charged in connection to the fire.

There is also a history of violence against Indianapolis' oldest church, Bethel African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church. In July 1862, the church was destroyed by a fire, according to a timeline of local religion in Indianapolis Public Library's Encyclopedia of Indianapolis. It was most likely by pro-slavery arsonists because of the church's involvement with the Underground Railroad, but members raised money to rebuild the church in 1867.

Second Baptist Church — now Purpose of Life Ministries — was established in 1846, and five years later, the church became a target for arson when racially charged violence broke out during the 1851 Indiana Constitutional Convention. The congregation rebuilt the church at the same location in 1853.

#### Violence transformed over

community hubs. If there are a lot of people frequenting certain areas, she said violence is bound to break out.

"It's not an anomaly that this is happening at the church," Gladden said. "These things happen. I don't want us to be desensitized to it, though."

Some churches and religious organizations are still targeted because of racism, and Gladden said it's important to note the difference between racially targeted church violence and the broader violence that just happened to be at or outside of a church.

## Healing a wounded community

The Sunday following the shooting at Broadway UMC, Gladden preached about the importance of everyone's life and how the community needs to come together to stop violence.

In an interview, she said providing help and resources to meet the needs of the community — such as access to affordable health care, job security, mental health services and food security — will decrease not only the violence that happens at churches, but also the all-around violence in Indianapolis.

"It's not going to be one thing," she said. "It's going to be interlocking, intersecting responses to those human unmet needs that will then impact the ways that crime and violence are overtaking our city."

A study conducted by the American Sociological Association suggests Black churches can "help mobilize other churches, community organizations, police departments, and neighborhood residents in a coordinated effort to address urban youth violence."

That is what local churches, ministries and religious organizations do. "We exist to be a place that meets needs, but at the same time," Gladden said, "one church can't do it all and not everybody is coming into the church."

As a board member for Faith in Indiana — an interdenominational group of the state's religious leaders who work together for racial and economic equity — she highlighted the work the organization is doing to help create a clinician-led crisis response team for local mental health calls. The city's 2023 budget includes \$2 million to pilot a response team entirely made up of clinical professionals, which the city expects to launch in early 2023.

"We are working every day of the week," Gladden said about the city's pastors and ministers. "We are in this to make an impact, and it's a daily job." The senior pastor of Oasis of Hope,

Dr. Myron Duff Jr., agrees. Duff, who witnessed the aftermath

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### the years

While Rev. Shonda Gladden sat in her car and ate her lunch one day this fall, she witnessed a shooting outside of Broadway United Methodist Church that killed 61-year-old Walter Goodloe and injured two others.

"Sept. 22 was a lot," said Gladden, the senior associate pastor of Broadway UMC. "It was hard for me to sleep and talk and be present for the weeks following the shooting ... because it just felt so surreal that this type of violence could come so close to the place where we are dispensing hope and help and we were helpless in that moment to do anything."

There is a difference between the past violent acts on church grounds and the current violence happening at Indianapolis churches. The shootings at Broadway UMC and Oasis of Hope were personal, where two or more people knew each other, while other violent acts at churches, such as the 16th Street Church bombing, was a hate crime, targeting the church because of racial prejudices.

Gladden said she does see more violence happening in places of worship and believes it is because churches are of the shooting at his church Nov. 5, said systemic changes are needed for violence to decrease in the city. Solving issues of unemployment and low income, he said, will lower the number of local criminal homicides. However, Duff also believes meeting the spiritual needs of the community is another important resource.

"The only thing that can change any of this is the salvation of the heart," he said.

Duff thinks mentoring groups of people is another great way to do community outreach, but he said it is like putting "a Band-Aid" over the situation. He said the true solution is through systemic change and spiritual salvation. "All of us need Jesus," he said. "Not only do we need him so we can get to heaven, but we need him to guide us in some of these ways we operate in life in general."

#### PRYOR WILL BE 1ST BLACK WOMAN FROM INDIANA TO SERVE ON SEVENTH CIRCUIT COURT

An Indiana Judge will be the first Black jurist from the state to serve on the United States Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit. Doris. L Pryor was nominated by President Joe Biden on May 25 and confirmed by the Senate on Dec. 5.

Pryor was confirmed with 60 votes in favor and 31 votes against. Indiana Sens. Todd Young and Mike Braun, both Republicans, voted in favor of Pryor.

Pryor received more votes in favor of her nomination than Biden's two other nominees, Rachel Bloomekatz and Judge Florence Y. Pan.

She received her law degree from the Indiana University Maurer School of Law in 2003 and a bachelor's degree from the University of Central Arkansas in 1999. Pryor worked as a law clerk for federal judges following law school before she became a public defender for the state of Arkansas.

Pryor served as an assistant U.S. attorney for the Southern District of Indiana from 2006 to 2018 and as national security chief for the office from 2014 to 2018, working with the Department of Justice on domestic terrorism and international terrorism.

Pryor was a part of the team that prosecuted a man from Brownsburg for attempting to provide material support to designated foreign terrorist organizations.

In a statement, board president Jose Salinas said the board understands Morley's decision.

"Dr. Morley earned this offer on his own merit, through his qualifications, and decades of experience," Salinas said. "With this news the Library Board will consider how to move forward with another search."

The board voted 4-2 in favor of offering Morley the job.

In recent days, people who have worked for and with libraries Morley previously oversaw, including in New Orleans, spoke to Indianapolis media about their concerns, which ranged from the way he handled COVID-19 to misrepresenting budget cuts.

#### Not a popular decision

Many at the packed meeting were hoping the board would choose Hayes, who has worked at the library since 2015 and is founding director of the Center for Black Literature and Culture. Some shouted "shame" at board members and told Salinas he would be held accountable.

Board members Dr. Khaula Murtadha and Dr. Patricia Payne were the most vocal members during the meeting about their disappointment.

Murtadha said the board received written and verbal comment from the community and that the decision to offer Morley the CEO job instead of Hayes "is

#### against what the community has told us."

"We have an opportunity to finally choose someone who has come up through the ranks of this library," she said of Hayes, "who knows this city and knows the challenges of this city, someone who has worked hard and diligently and is an experienced leader, not only here but nationally as well. To ignore that is a travesty."

Payne said it was a shame to be part of the board. "But I don't intend to step down," she said. "I intend to serve out my term and just look at what's gonna happen when you bring in this unqualified person."

Michael Torres, Indy Library Workers Union president, said the news of Morley declining the position of CEO was a relief but has no idea where they go from here.

"I was elated and glad but now I'm angry in a sense that I'm frustrated they put Nichelle through this," Torres said. "The only response is to hire her."

Torres called the board dysfunctional and said if they decided to do another search for a CEO instead of extending an offer to Hayes, their entire process should be examined.

"You had the right one in the first place, told her no, and the next day ... now they've declined," he said. "I think the process for this whole search needs to be examined, even the consultant's company, why they pushed this gentleman on us."

#### **CEO** search continues

Salinas and fellow board member Hope Tribble, both of whom voted in favor of Morley, said in a statement Dec. 13 the majority of the board sided with Morley, believing he was best suited for the job with 20 years of library administration experience, compared to Hayes' short stint as interim CEO.

"When considering this, alongside staff feedback, our own experience with the candidates, and several other inputs, we felt confident in our decision," they said in a joint statement.

Salinas and Tribble said the board has not had discussions about the next steps in naming a new interim CEO and starting a new search process. Hayes' term as interim ended when the board offered the permanent job to Morley.

"We, as a Board, absolutely recognize that the work on equity is continuous and ongoing," the statement said. "The work is not being done only by one person. We have many staff who continue to work on implementation of the Climate Improvement Process recommendations, and we do not anticipate that to change while the CEO search continues."

ing criticism from the community and even some board members for the decision to pass over Hayes, who was interim CEO.

Chants such as "We want Nichelle now," "Why not Nichelle," and "Hear your patrons' voice, Hayes is the people's choice," rose from the crowd as various speakers took to the mic to voice their concerns for the future of the library.

"Nichelle's power comes from the ranks of the workers and her deep and strong connections to family and community in her professional work – and faith in her professional work ethic – to get the job done," Stephen Lane, a former IndyPL special collections librarian, said to the crowd. "This is why we can't let this go."

In a statement, Morley said it was clear the position was "not the right fit" for him and he was "disheartened by the way we have come to this point and decision."

Public Services Officer Gregory Hill will serve as acting CEO and a search for a permanent CEO "will resume in the near future," the library said in a statement.

However, calls from the community to hire Hayes as CEO instead of conducting a new search have continued to pour in in the form of letters, social media posts and a petition that has earned more than 1,300 signatures as of Dec. 12 -including people from New Orleans Public Library, where Morley previously worked. Lane, Hayes' former mentee and a member of the Party for Socialism and Liberation, was one of many speakers who called out members of the board during the protest. He said the majority of the board is in violation of their duties and read from the board of trustees' manual, citing pages that outline various responsibilities of board members, including acting on the needs of the community, proper management of the library, employment discrimination, manipulating

funds and referring complaints to the library to the proper level on chain of command.

"We see a major roadblock to our success from the very library board itself," Lane said. "Now it's the communit's turn to remove a roadblock for Nichelle."

Among growing disdain for the board came public outcry from state Sen. Jean Breaux. Breaux told the crowd she didn't even know Hayes but couldn't understand why someone with her qualifications would have been passed over for the job.

"I am here because what's right is right," Breaux said. "Why not give it to her? That's why I'm here, I'm here to ask the question, why not Nichelle Haves?"

Indianapolis City-County Councilor Leroy Robinson spoke up in support of library board members Dr. Khaula Murtadha and Dr. Patricia Payne, telling the crowd how both women played a role in raising him and whatever decisions they made, he would always be on their side.

"I'm late for a city council vote, but this is more important to me," Robinson said. "The thing that perplexes me the most is that you had two finalists. One withdrew and one remains. "And what's her name?" he asked the

crowd, to which people responded with

tor of the Center for Black Literature and Culture, is still employed with the library.

Pike Township Trustee Annette Johnson, who was one of the organizers of the protest and addressed the crowd later in the night after the sun had gone down, and temperatures dropped. Johnson held a handmade sign that read "Do the right thing by Nichelle Hayes."

"I know it's cold out here but we're out here for a purpose, and sometimes these can be a little uncomfortable," she said before holding up her sign for all to see. "My sign says it all ... do the right thing by Nichelle Hayes, and that's what we want to take away tonight."

Johnson emphasized the upcoming library board meeting on Dec. 19, encouraging people to attend and sign on for public comment. In that same meeting, Lane said the PSL plans to present the petition to hire Hayes as CEO to the board in person.

Michael Torres, the library union president, also addressed the crowd,

calling for the board members – especially president Jose Salinas - to be held accountable and either hire Haves or give the community a reason as to why they won't hire her.

"We need to know why," Torres told the Recorder after the protest. "As I said earlier, they never gave us any reasonable statement, a public statement, as to why they won't hire Nichelle. At this point, it's personal."

Torres, who recently celebrated 25 years with IndyPL, said going forward the situation regarding the new CEO seems as if it would amount to easy an fix with enough community involvement.

"They can ignore the staff, they can ignore anything we say," Torres said. "But when they hear from the community, that's golden because the community is the one that supports the library...they will listen to the community before they listen to the staff."

Vickie Daniel, a local singer and actress, sang a verse from the song "If I Can Help Somebody" in support of Hayes. She told the Recorder in an interview that she still has hope in the library's future going forward but lacks confidence in the board – excluding Murtadha and Payne.

However, Daniel said she's concerned for Hayes' well-being through all of this and how the stress might be affecting her.

"I wonder about what price is she paving," Daniel said, "physically, emotionally and mentally for it."

## Asante Art Institute unifies community through the arts

As the lights shine dimly on a stage surrounded by multicolored Christmas trees at Warren Central High School, 9-year-old Kamyriah Taylor prances on stage with her peers, singing "Santa Claus is a Black Man" during a rehearsal in early December. It was their favorite song from a recent performance for the Asante Art Institute of Indianapolis.

The Asante Art Institute (AAI), formerly known as the Asante Children's Theatre, considers itself the premier African American arts and cultural organization in Indianapolis.

AAI provides creative arts training, performances, leadership skills development and opportunities for youth to explore their potential while interacting with professional artists and entertainers in preparation for their future career.

Deborah Asante, the founder of the institute, is well known in the Indianapolis area for providing resources for children and teens in the performing arts.

"The Asante Children's Theatre was an effort to strengthen children in the community by using arts, and we were doing that," Asante said at the rehearsal. So, we created the Asante Art Institute as an umbrella organization to encompass that reach."

Partnering with the Moorhead Com-

munity Resource Center on the east side, AAI increased its presence on the far east side based on community needs. # Black Business Bazaar gearing up for 'bigger, better' holiday event

The Black Business Bazaar is back and bigger than ever following a brief pandemic hiatus.

The holiday-themed community event, which originated in 2016, aims to be a family-friendly, welcoming environment where people and children can come together to celebrate the holidays, said Dominic Dorsey, founder of DONT SLEEP and the organizer of the bazaar.

Each year, Dorsey said the bazaar gets "bigger, brighter and better" as more people and local businesses get involved.

"It's really an opportunity to galvanize community to activate so many different aspects of support," Dorsey said. "For businesses, it's not just about commerce, it's an opportunity for economic uplift."

This year, the bazaar will include 100 Black vendors ranging in everything from art to youth services, technology, crochet gifts, candles, beauty products and more, making it the most diverse bazaar they've had to date, Dorsey said.

The event will be from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Dec. 17 at the Fay Biccard Glick Neighborhood Center, 2990 W. 71st St.

Vendors will be set up in three main areas with food trucks parked in front of the main building. There will also for the last three years. Guy said this event is not only an opportunity for small businesses to network with each other but for community members both young and old — to have a chance to love on one another.

There's an abundance of exciting things for attendees to look forward to at the Black Business Bazaar, Guy said, from the vendors to the food. At Guy's Cooking Creation, he said they'll be serving rib and turkey tips, burnt ends and "Wakanda Wings" — a brand new offering.

"I'm excited to be there, excited to sell food," Guy said. "I'm looking forward to feeding the hungry mouths of our people in the community."

Dorsey said local saxophonist Jerome Saxton will provide live Christmas jazz music and DJ Grapevine will be spinning a holiday mix.

The bazaar will also feature a Wakanda Wonderland section for kids including a Black Santa, vendors and indoor ice-skating. The ice skating will be on a synthetic 48-by-32-foot rink with free skate rentals. Dorsey said they will have about 65 pairs of skates and can safely have 24 people skate at a time.

The Black Santa experience includes a writing station for letters to Santa, with elves passing out cookies to the first 1,000 kids. Family photos with Santa are \$10. Families must register for a photo slot on the website. "It's very beautiful and magical to witness when kids see a brown Santa," Dorsey said. "It makes them feel part of holiday season." Dorsey said they've also partnered with IU Health and Light of the World Christian Church to offer free CO-VID-19 booster vaccines and flu shots. He said they're also offering \$50 gift card incentives for the first 300 participants that can be used to get food or shop the vendors at the bazaar.



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be food vendors throughout the venue.

Dorsey said attendees who come and shop the vendors are supporting small, local businesses, which in turn goes to pay for some child's tuition, another person's light bill or someone's dream. The Black Business Bazaar aims to help facilitate creativity and keep money in the Black community.

"It means a lot for my company and other companies," Phillip Guy, owner of Guy's Cooking Creation, said. "It's an outstanding thing for the community. I love seeing people coming together, seeing kids have a good time."

help them get back on their feet.

Fagan was in the Air Force from 1967 to 1970, where he fought in the Vietnam War.

"I wanted to go serve the country and help people," Fagan said, adding that the Air Force had a "great" impact on his life.

"It shows the sacrifices people made for their life and for the country and supporting other people. It opened my eyes to a lot of great things," he said.

Fagan noticed that after he came home from the war, there were many people who did not want to support veterans and treated them like strangers. According to Fagan, many veterans felt hopeless and had post-traumatic stress disorder.

Fagan said many veterans are not aware of the resources out there to help them once they come back home.

Lanny Crabens is a retired veteran who joined Heroes Without a Home in 2017. Crabens was in the Air Force from 1980 to 1986 and served in the Vietnam War. Crabens said he not only wanted to serve his country, but he also joined the Air Force to get into electronic warfare because of his fascination with the rise of electronics around that time.

Crabens came back home in 1986, where life for him had changed drastically. He had a difficult time finding a home and a job. The places where Crabens could find housing were in unsafe areas, and he noticed many people did not respect him for serving in the military. Crabens said it was difficult for him to adjust to normal life after his time in the military. He found Heroes Without a Home while living in a homeless shelter.

"It's allowed me to get my purpose back," Crabens said, adding that the program has a "wonderful environment."

Crabens is currently in school for cyber security and is living in one of the homes the program has provided for him.

us and to keep us safe and allow us to accomplish our mission and return safely. In this we pray in the name of ItnYeshua, Ha Mashayach, Jesus the Christ, amen."

After the prayer, Rozzell followed Ajabu out of the parking lot to embark on the 3 1/2-hour journey to Bowling Green.

#### The long road ahead

Groups including the Veterans Association of African Descendants, the New Black Panther Party and True Healing Under God (THUG) came together to bring justice to Emmett Till and his family with a two-part demonstration in the city where Carolyn Bryant, who was involved in the 14-year-old's kidnapping and death, was last known to live.

As the sound of soft jazz music played in the background on Rozzell's radio, the passengers discussed the way Black people are treated in America.

"For too long we've lived in a system that is unfair to us," Devon Johnson, a passenger and member of the New Black Panther Party, told the Recorder, "and honestly, I am at a point where if we're going to keep living in a system like this then it needs to be fair. It needs to be upheld the way that it is towards us when we do wrong and when we are crucified for things."

#### The summer of 1955

In August of 1955, Till, a Chicago native, visited family in Money, Mississippi, where he was accused of whistling at Bryant, a white woman. Bryant's husband, Roy Bryant, and her brother-in-law, J.W. Milam, kidnapped Till and forced him to carry a 75-pound cotton gin fan down to the bank of the Tallahatchie River.

There, Till was beaten by Bryant's husband and brotherin-law, who gouged out the 14-year-old's eyes, shot him in the head and lynched him. On Aug. 29, 1955, the sheriff of Leflore County issued a warrant for Carolyn Bryant, Roy Bryant and Milam for the kidnapping.

In September of 1955, Roy Bryant and Milam went to trial where they were acquitted by an all-white jury in Sumner, Mississippi. Later both men admitted to the murder. Both men have since died, and now Carolyn Bryant is 88 years old.

In 2004 the U.S. Department of Justice opened an investigation to determine if there were others involved in the murder. A grand jury in Leflore County later declined to indict Bryant, citing insufficient evidence to charge her.

In 2017 author Timothy B. Tyson published a book, "The Blood of Emmett Till," which tells the story of Till's murder and includes information from a 2007 interview with Bryant. In the book, according to Tyson, Bryant admitted that Till never made advances toward her, which contradicts her original statement she gave in the 1955 trial.

In June, a group from the Emmett Till Legacy Foundation worked with filmmaker Keith A. Beauchamp to discover an unserved warrant for Bryant from 1955; it was in the basement of the Leflore County Courthouse. This motivated many people across the country, including the passengers inside Rozzell's and Ajabu's cars, to push authorities to serve Bryant the warrant.

The Recorder contacted the office of the district attorney's office for the Fourth Circuit Court District of Mississippi, where no one was available to give comment regarding the process of serving Bryant the warrant.

"The fact that there was a

warrant out for her arrest changes the whole dynamic of justice at this point," Johnson said during the car ride. "So, I feel like this is a pivotal point in history to really have justice be served and prevailed over what used to happen back then."

As their journey on the highway continued, winds picked up and howled loud enough to be heard inside of the car. The sky was gray and filled with clouds. Two hours had elapsed, and Rozzell turned off the jazz music, and conversations ceased as passengers read a public safety warning that popped up on their phones the same way an Amber Alert does. "The Bowling Green Police Department has received a threat to the groups who intend on protesting in front of the Justice Center and the 1000 block of Shive Lane," the warning read. "An unknown person threatens to shoot protesters and anyone helping protestors. We are working diligently to determine the origin of the threat."

The threat caused the city to cancel its Christmas parade, but it did not discourage the passengers from continuing their journey.

#### 'Justice does not have an expiration date'

Both cars made it to Bowling Green around 10 a.m. During one of the group's stops before the protest, Ajabu spoke about the importance of getting justice for Till.

"We have a situation where a young 14-year-old boy was lynched by people in Mississippi, and one of those people that was involved in that lynching is still alive," Ajabu told the Recorder as the Kentucky wind blew into his face. "There was a warrant issued out for her arrest. That warrant has not been served and just because it was issued in 1955 doesn't mean that it expired in 2022. Justice does not have an expiration date." According to Ajabu the goal of the protest was to heighten awareness of where Bryant lives. Ajabu explained to the Recorder how he was told that the warrant for Bryant could not be served because law enforcement could not locate her. "Go serve the warrant," Ajabu said.

#### 'A Mother's Love Never Dies Justice Shall Prevail'

Around noon both cars made their way to the Warren County Justice Center in Bowling Green, where the first part of the protest began.

Meeting them there were Till's cousin, Priscilla Sterling, along with people from the town, students at Western Kentucky University and organizations from across the country.

The winds calmed, and the once-cloudy skies were blue with the sun shining bright on everyone as they made their way to the front of the Justice Center.

As members of the New Black Panther Party and Veterans Association of African Descendants made their way to the stairs, Ajabu encouraged some of the protesters to join them. Standing on the bottom stairs of the Justice Center was Sterling wearing a white shirt that read "A Mother's Love Never Dies Justice Shall Prevail" in bold black lettering.

Standing behind Sterling was Ajabu dressed in black pants and a black buttondown shirt, and pinned to his chest was a New Black Panther Party pin. The people were quiet as Ajabu looked around. "I'm concerned that I fought for a country and a system that would hide a woman — a white woman! — who participated in the lynching of this woman's cousin," Ajabu said as he pointed to Sterling.

Ajabu then introduced Sterling, who gave her speech with tears filling her eyes.

"I came all the way from Mississippi — Jackson, Mississippi — to be here, to be a part of this, because the world needs to know about the injustice that continues to happen," Sterling said as tears fell. "White supremacy helped these people get away with the kidnapping and murder of Emmett, my relative."

Sterling told the crowd that white supremacy rules the state of Mississippi and that there are many racist organizations in the state, including the Council of Conservative Citizens and the Southern White Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

Sterling confirmed she plans to file a lawsuit against the state of Mississippi for not serving Bryant the warrant.

"Denial of justice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere," Ajabu said to end the first protest.

With his fist raised high in the air, Ajabu started a calland-response of "Black power" and instructed everyone to meet at Bryant's house next. "I feel so empowered and so honored to stand with Emmett Till's family," Western Kentucky student Darinda Reddick said after the protest.

#### 'We are not running from the fight; we are running to the fight'

As Rozzell and Ajabu pulled into a Big Lots parking lot, there was a group of protesters who came marching across the street toward Bryant's apartment — or at least the last place she was known to live.

"No justice, no peace!" protesters chanted back and forth until they got to the grassy hill area of the parking lot. See PROTEST, A13>

Bowling Green Police Department officers were across the street by the apartment building, preventing protesters from getting close.

As the area filled with more protesters, attorney Malik Zulu Shabazz, president of Black Lawyers for Justice, grabbed the microphone.

"When we were driving in here, they said there were threats that somebody was going to come out here and they were going to kill us," he told the crowd. "But I came here to tell you that there is but one God, and besides God there is no other and we fear nothing but God and God alone."

Shabazz continued: "We are not running from the fight; we are running to the fight."

He asked the crowd, "How do we find the state of Kentucky?"

"Guilty!" they responded. Bryant wasn't seen at the protest, and it wasn't

clear if she was at her apartment. Washington, D.C., radio

host Nia 2X also spoke, addressing her comments to the officers.

"Some of you all are looking for problems, but you all already got a problem, and you won't do nothing about it, and you call yourself a police officer — an officer of the law. No, you're not," she yelled. "We're not the

enemy and you know it." With fists raised in the air, protesters chanted "Black power," which concluded the demonstration.

Protesters dispersed back into the Big Lots parking lot, where civil rights activist John C. Barnett, founder and president of the group THUG, recalled a quote from Malcolm X about getting a root canal.

"Nobody wants that shot from the dentist," Barnett said. "But if you get that shot and they remove that bad tooth things are going to be a whole lot better. "So today is the shot we had to give Bowling Green," he said. "This is the shot that America needs to face and this is the first step for them to hear our cry."

Later that night, they went to a celebratory dinner with Shabazz and more out-of-town protesters.

Around 7 p.m., the group from Indianapolis said their goodbyes and started their journey back home.

During the car ride home Johnson spoke of the impact the day's events had on him.

"I feel powerful," Johnson said. "I went to serve a purpose and that purpose was served for the betterment of my people, for the betterment of Emmett Till's family. I feel like we all grew today in a huge way. I'm honestly honored to be a part of history."

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## **EDITORIAL Rebuilding IPS**

It is a fact of life that some businesses experience a mass exodus of customers. Sometimes that's due to poor products or service. Other times it's due to forces that are beyond their control. Some of them limp along for a few years; most simply go out of business. But what about when that "business" is a public school system?

For more than a century, the Indianapolis Public School (IPS) system was predominantly white. At its peak, IPS boasted well over 100,000 students. However, "white flight," combined with judicial action, led to substantial demographic changes - and substantially lower enrollment. In 1971 federal judge S. Hugh Dillin found that IPS had engaged in decades-long de jure racial segregation. Two years later, one-way busing began - meaning that Black IPS students were sent to surrounding townships. Crucially, white students were not bused into IPS; they remained in the townships unless their families moved into the district.

This practice was formally halted in 1998. Today, with roughly 30,000 students, IPS is substantially smaller than it once was. Depending on what sources you believe, it's no longer the state's largest district. (That distinction might belong to Fort Wayne Community Schools.)

Having been reared on the city's east side, I attended IPS schools until I entered sixth grade. At that point, I was bused to nearly all-white Perry Township on the city's south side. The ride was 50 minutes on a good day. During winter it could easily take

more than an hour — not counting the extended wait for the bus to arrive.

Though there were some very tough days, I don't necessarily regret this experience. I have deep, lifelong friendships with people of all races. Still, it's impossible to say whether my Black classmates and I (or the thousands of other kids who were bused) would have been better off academically, socially and emotionally had we stayed in IPS.

There is no doubt that IPS students have suffered in many ways over the decades, but that was predictable given the social and economic upheaval that has taken place. And, to be sure, IPS has had many missteps over the years. Some of its superintendents have been grossly ineffective. Some have had a bloated administrative staff. But it's far from the only school system about which such complaints could be made. The difference is that most IPS students are Black. This means that its mistakes are magnified, its successes are minimized, and its legitimate struggles are dismissed.

IPS Superintendent Dr. Aleesia Johnson recently proposed an \$823.6 million plan called "Rebuilding Stronger." The board of commissioners approved the first of two parts of the plan; they are likely to approve the second part in short order.

Rebuilding Stronger, which includes closing some schools, does not please everybody; no plan would. Frankly, there are components that I would change. But I think that it's important to give Dr. Johnson and the plan - a chance. If voters approve the plan next May, those who own a median-priced home in the district would have about a \$6 increase in property taxes.

In the spirit of disclosure, Dr. Johnson is a colleague and friend of mine. I wish nothing more than to see her succeed. She is a conscientious and dedicated public servant. Of course, most people believe that they could do her job better than she does. I am not one of them.

Sadly, volitional amnesia causes many of us to ignore that racial discrimination in employment, lending and housing is the key antecedent for the situation in which IPS finds itself. Indianapolis has a long and sordid history of (1) relegating Blacks to jobs that pay lower wages than whites, (2) banks refusing to give mortgages to the relatively few Blacks who could afford to live in more upscale neighborhoods, and (3) restrictive covenants that kept Blacks out of white neighborhoods. And when redlining and restrictive covenants weren't enough, whites often resorted to domestic terrorism. Even "sundown towns" are still a thing here. In short, IPS' reality (and that of most of our city's Black residents) isn't accidental; it's intentional.

The word "rebuilding" often has a negative connotation. Either something has been damaged and needs to be built back up, or something is subpar and needs to be demolished and started from scratch. Either way, the effort to rebuild is a recognition that things are not the way they should be. The question is whether we are willing to locate and deploy the right building blocks. Whether those are in place remains to be seen.

The IndyPL board has made a series of critical missteps going back to at least 2020 that led to this moment, including doing nothing as former IndyPL

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trustee Dr. Terri Jett was being pushed off the board and her work limited by board president Judge Jose Salinas in retaliation for doing her job to hold then-CEO Jackie Nytes accountable and address mounting problems with library personnel and operations. Proper oversight from the IndyPL board at that time likely would have allowed former CEO Jackie Nytes to keep her job and legacy intact.

But some of these problems finally came to a head at a May 24, 2021, board meeting.

Salinas took preemptive action to mute former employee Bree Flannelly on a board call she was scheduled to speak on, just because Nytes had sent an email to the board implying she was lying and would not allow her to speak until Dr. Payne and Dr. Murtadha intervened.

Other trustees of the IndyPL board took no action to address the relationship between the board president, board and Nytes, let alone the problems highlighted by numerous past and present employees in the press that really did make our library system seem like it was being run like a plantation. These failures only encouraged more problematic behavior from Nytes and did her no favors in the long run. In July 2021, Jackie Nytes accidentally sent the following email to Eagle Branch staff:

"... I assume you have seen the recent press about the Library, much of which is the result of some personal disagreements," Nytes wrote. "We are talking about a letter from Black community leaders supporting me, the board and the Library. This could be sent as a Letter to the Editor of the Star, IBJ and Recorder with multiple signatures. DO you think you could recruit some Black leaders to sign it? Would you sign it? I don't want to offend by asking, but it is clear that the Library is getting damaged by the current narrative and I just don't think it is an accurate narrative and I am trying to counter it!"

She sent it to Eagle Branch staff members instead of the intended recipient, and it exposed she was conspiring with someone else (possibly IndyPL

trustees) to obtain a letter of support from "Black community leaders" characterizing the allegations of discrimination as "personal disagreements" to gaslight the community.

Still the IndvPL board did nothing. It was only in August 2021, when a major funder, Central Indiana Community Foundation, stepped up to demand action about the constant scandals before funding IndyPL again, that Nytes finally resigned, allowing the library to move on.

In September 2021 the IndyPL board spent \$100,000 on a climate study that later revealed IndyPL staffing disparities compared to similarly sized library systems in other cities. It also reveals severe DEI issues among the staff, morale issues with employees feeling overworked but underappreciated, and deep mistrust of management. Only 45% of the 458 employees surveyed believed satisfactory action would be taken to address discrimination, harassment, bullying, etc., while 80% of employees surveyed trusted their colleagues to do the right thing for the organization, but only 29% trust the board to do the right thing or to even advance diversity, equity, inclusion and accessibility.

All of this confirmed there were serious problems with the library system that weren't being addressed, directly supporting the allegations brought to the press, and yet the board took no substantive action to address its own role in contributing to the library's climate problems.

In April of 2022 the IndyPL board formed a CEO search committee and hired a search firm at the cost of \$27,000 that ultimately ended up finding two candidates: Dr. Gabriel Morley, former New Orleans Public Library CEO who resigned in a residency scandal, and Nichelle M. Hayes, a third-generation Indianapolis resident who had been running IndyPL for the previous eight months.

# Juul to pay Indiana \$15.7M as part of multistate settlement

Indiana will receive \$15.7 million from e-cigarette manufacturer Juul Labs, Inc., as part of a multistate settlement.

Dozens of states alleged that Juul used unethical marketing practices that led to the rise of the nation's youth vaping crisis over the past few years.

"Wrongful actions that jeopardize children are especially repugnant and shameful. Fortunately, the money we have recovered in this settlement can go toward safeguarding the same young people targeted by the unethical marketing strategies employed by Juul," said Attorney General Todd Rokita in a press release.

Juul will pay a total of \$435 million to settle allegations made by 32 states, including Indiana. Per the agreement, Indiana expects to receive the first installment of settlement money worth \$1.5 million by Dec. 31. Juul has the option to pay the total amount in installments over six to 10 years. If the company takes more than 10 years to make the full payment, the amount Indiana receives would increase to \$17.1 million.

According to the attorney general's press release, the money will "be used in support of prevention, education, harm reduction and mitigation efforts related to youth using electronic nicotine delivery systems."

A multistate investigation in 2019 found that Juul used marketing tactics like using popular influencers on social media to mislead young people to believe its products did not include nicotine at all or contained a lower concentration of nicotine than they actually have. The investigation also suggests that the company failed to verify the age of its buyers, which led to purchases by minors.

In a statement, Juul said the settlement is part of its ongoing commitment "to resolve issues from the past" and that it awaits a decision by the U.S Food and Drug Administration on whether the company can continue to sell its products. The company did not acknowledge wrongdoing.

Most e-cigarettes contain nicotine, a highly addictive substance that can harm brain development in young people through their mid-20s. Ecigarettes also contain other harmful substances besides nicotine and young people who use e-cigarettes may be more likely to use cigarettes in the future, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The vaping crisis, which peaked in 2019, left at least 68 people dead and 2,807 hospitalized across the country as of February 2022, according to CDC data. The data show the median age of people who were hospitalized was 24, and 15% of all cases occurred among people under the age of 18. Studies with small sample sizes suggest that a substance called vitamin E acetate, an additive the FDA found in some e-cigarettes, has been strongly linked to serious vaping-associated lung injury. CDC data shows

Indiana has seen between 100 and 149 deaths and hospitalizations related to e-cigarette use so far.

Indiana alleged that Juul's actions were in violation of the state's Deceptive Consumer Sales Acts. Under the agreement, Juul agreed to: refrain from including depictions of people under 35 in marketing, disclose the amount of nicotine their products include in their advertising, stop selling flavored products unless approved by the FDA and tighten its monitoring of purchases.

But Juul had already stopped selling flavored pods and also halted some of its marketing practices a few years ago when pressure from lawmakers and medical experts ratcheted up during the peak of the youth vaping crisis. A recent CDC survey found that teen e-cigarette use has fallen over the past few years. The survey suggests that 14.1% of high school students report using e-cigarettes at least one day during the past 30 days compared to 27.5% in 2019.

# 'How the past shapes the present': **Timeline features city's Black church history**

It has been over a year since the Encyclopedia of Indianapolis launched digitally, and now it features a religion timeline, which includes a timeline of the establishment of prominent African American congregations and their involvement in Indianapolis' culture.

The Encyclopedia of Indianapolis, which launched November 2021, has more than 2,000 entries available and more than 118,000 people have viewed it from across the world, according to Indianapolis Public Library.

"We at the encyclopedia just want to bring all of these things that we think that citizens of Indianapolis should know about their city and help them understand how the past shapes the present," said Elizabeth Van Allen, the managing editor for the encyclopedia.

While the timeline is not exclusive to Black churches in the city, it details a lot of historical events, figures and buildings centered around Indianapolis' Black religious communities.

The timeline displays the city's oldest church history, such as the establishment of Bethel African Methodist Episcopal (A.M.E.) Church in 1836 and the establishment of Second Baptist Church – which today is Purpose of Life Ministries — in 1846.

The timeline also identifies important religious figures such as Willis R. Revels, former pastor of first Black woman elected as an Episcopal diocesan bishop in the city.

Recently, the encyclopedia added a new redlining feature that allows users to explore how redlining impacted the neighborhoods people live in and visualize how the past continuously shapes the present.

Indianapolis Recorder archives, helped with creating entries and finding other topics that need to be added.

"We don't see any of these things as finished," Van Allen said.

The encyclopedia will publish 50 new entries by the end of December, including an African American timeline.

The African American timeline will display some of the contributions Indianapolis' Black community has had on the city's landscape. While separate from the religion timeline, Van Allen said there will be a lot of overlap between the two timelines because of how important religion is to the Black community.

"African American religious groups are so very Bethel A.M.E., and Jennifer Baskerville-Burrows, the important to the development of the city and impact civic culture altogether," she said.

The encyclopedia, as well as the timelines, are updated continuously, and Van Allen invites churches, historians and other organizations to contribute to the timeline.

It launched this year during the Advent season, Dec. 5-8.

Africa, Jesus' place of refuge, is also a critical refuge for those who share African roots. The UN can now play a stronger role of engaging with people of African descent alongside the African Union, which welcomes the African diaspora as the sixth region of the union. May the vision of people of African lineage — who have been advocating



for this moment for so long - find this new consultative mechanism impactful "as a platform for improving the safety and quality of life and livelihoods of people of African descent."

# Getting serious about Hoosiers' mental health

It's difficult to place a number on the cost of one's suffering — but it is something that must be done. Mental illness holds 1 in 5 Hoosiers — a disproportionate share of which are people of color — in a tight grip. It will take a combination of intentional outreach, supportive services and funding to help

someone break free. \$4.2 billion.

That is the estimated annual cost of untreated mental illness in our state. Researchers with the Indiana Behavioral Health Commission and Indiana Family and Social Services Administration estimate that number represents 1.2% of our state GDP or the equivalent economic impact of 100,000 jobs.

In order to thrive, Indiana needs to invest in its core economic asset: its people. Let's be clear: Getting our neighbors the help they need is not only the right thing to do, it's the right thing for business. So where do we start? Fortunately, we already have, making great strides in recent years. The Central Indiana business community has rallied around our people, working together to craft the BEI Impediments to Health Playbook and Workforce Pilot so employers can help their employees and their families grow and thrive.

Additionally, the state established the Indiana Behavioral Health Commission to create a framework for the future of mental health care in our state. The light at the end of the tunnel is visible, but to reach it, we must implement the commission's recommendations.

Business Equity for Indy's member companies and community partners are grateful for the efforts of leaders like state Sen. Mike Crider, who is working



with the General Assembly and state of Indiana to take the next step and begin building a three-tier Comprehensive Crisis Response system.

Tier One: Someone to Contact: 988 Crisis Line Operators

Tier Two: Someone to Respond: Mobile Crisis Teams

Tier Three: Someone to See: Crisis Stabilization Units

This system is critical for our state, and in this upcoming legislative session, we must ensure that these structural reforms and investments are implemented equitably. The Indianapolis African American Quality of Life Initiative (IAAQLI) found that the Black community is concerned with the lack of mental health resources that exist statewide. Faith in Indiana, a group of faith leaders and community members, is a strong voice for promoting equity in state-funded programs too.

There are many more organizations and individuals who know — and have made it their mission to prove — that equity is critical to the competitiveness of our state. As businesses and corporations, we do everything we can for our employees — now it's time to take those company policies statewide.

We as a business community have a major opportunity during this next session to work together and collectively advocate for the quality of care that all Hoosiers deserve.

# A diminished US workforce could lead Fed to keep rates high

WASHINGTON (AP) — Still eager to hire, America's employers are posting more job openings than they did before the pandemic struck  $2\frac{1}{2}$  years ago. Problem is, there aren't enough applicants. The nation's labor force is smaller than when the pandemic struck.

The reasons vary — an unexpected wave of retirements, a drop in legal immigration, the loss of workers to COVID-19 deaths and illnesses. The result, though, is that employers are having to compete for a smaller pool of workers and to offer steadily higher pay to attract them. It's a trend that could fuel wage growth and high inflation well into 2023. In a recent speech, Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell pointed to the shortfall of workers and the resulting rise in average pay as the primary remaining driver of the price spikes that continue to grip the economy. Though inflation pressures have eased slightly from four-decade highs - average gasoline prices are now below where they were a year ago costs are still rising fast in much of the economy's vast service sector. As a result, the Fed is expected Wednesday to raise its benchmark short-term rate for a seventh time this year, though by

a smaller amount than it has recently. The central bank has boosted its key rate by a substantial three-quarters of a point four straight times, to a range of 3.75% to 4%, the highest level in 15 years. Powell has signaled that the Fed will likely raise its benchmark rate by a half-point, and many economists expect quarter-point rate hikes after that.

Cumulatively, those rate increases may be helping slow inflation. But they have also sharply increased borrowing costs for consumers and businesses — on mortgages, auto loans and credit cards, among other loans. Many economists have warned that the resulting decline in borrowing and spending will likely cause a recession in 2023. Yet with price increases still uncomfortably high, Powell and other Fed officials have underscored that they expect to keep rates at their peak for an extended period, possibly through next year. On Wednesday, members of the Fed's rate-setting committee will update their projections for interest rates and other economic barometers for 2023 and beyond. The higher wages that many employers are having to offer don't always lead to higher inflation. If companies invest in more efficient machines or

technology, workers can become more productive: They can increase their output per hour. Under that scenario, businesses could raise pay without having to raise prices.

But productivity has been especially weak in the past year. And Powell has noted that higher pay will likely feed too-high inflation in the service sector — everything from restaurants and hotels to retail stores, medical care and entertainment. The employers in these industries are laborhigher prices.

Higher wages also typically spur Americans to keep spending, a trend that can perpetuate a cycle that keeps prices high.

"This labor shortage that we have," the Fed chair said, "it doesn't look

like it's going away anytime soon. It's been very

disappointing and a little bit surprising."

## Trading Turner is business, not personal for the Pacers

If I live to be 100 I'll never forget when a young Al Pacino as Michael Corleone told James Caan portraying his older brother Santino in the epic movie "The Godfather" that eliminating their adversaries was nothing personal, but yet just business for their family.

Unlike the Corleone regime, the Indiana Pacers are truly a completely legitimate, reputable business but perhaps that business philosophy is exactly what they need in terms of trading Myles Turner before the deadline for such on Feb. 9, 2023.

For those of you who aren't interested in the dealings of your local franchise, allow me to give you a brief synopsis of what's happening (or not) with a few folks in the Pacers organization who are clearly supposed to know more about these matters than yours truly.

The unpredictable and clearly uninterested Turner is in the last year of his contract and has absolutely no desire to remain with his current employer unless they level a huge financial deal his way before that pesky deadline I mentioned. If they fail to do such, then he'll continue to take the advice of those who constantly enable him and test the free agency market where there's probably one inept general manager out there who actually thinks ol' Myles is the missing link to their championship aspirations and, in the process, overpay him.

Granted, paying too much in the NBA free agency market will always be fashionable as long as you're not the team doing it, but the guy is still an asset you can clearly trade for draft capital as opposed to another highly inconsistent player that won't be in your training camp come next fall. It's obviously worth mentioning again that Turner has been a solid citizen off the floor and, as I've said previously, quietly benevolent in the community.

Those attributes mean a lot, but they haven't translated into the scoring and rebounding he should be delivering for his current price tag of \$18 million.

For those who have given even a shred of credibility to reports of the Pacers receiving a high first-round draft pick in exchange for a role player who's proclaimed himself as a shooter and not a post player, I must ask you to remove all sharp instruments in your home and await the arrival of a medic ambulance being dispatched as we speak.

There is indeed hope for you but not as it pertains to your assessment of a truly nice individual, but woefully inadequate player who also told an ESPN reporter that the Los Angeles Lakers should "reconsider" acquiring him and pull the trigger on the deal.

The worst scenario for the Pacers is allowing Turner to burn rubber out of town the minute he becomes a free agent, getting nothing in return for him, and that's exactly what he'll do. I don't blame him for grabbing a bigger contract in a new ZIP code, as that's precisely what I would do if I was a foot taller and simply 40 years younger, as I too am a capitalist, albeit with limited ability from the 3-point arc and dreadfully slow on both ends of the court.

Again, there are some people employed by the Pacers who are smarter than me about the evaluation of talent, trades and free agency (Rick Carlisle), but the sense of urgency surrounding this situation is getting a bit warm, as the expiration date on this debacle is only about 58 days away, and while that seems like a lot of time it truly isn't.

I'm thinking Turner's agent is sitting by the phone

waiting for it to ring to notify him of what should be an easy decision. Question is, why aren't the Pacers dialing him up?
