### Man whose 1922 lynching was written off as suicide got new death certificate

When George Tompkins was lynched in 1922, his death certificate listed the cause of death as suicide, despite

a group gathered at the funeral home on a bitterly cold Saturday morning, "but unfortunately we have met him nonetheless."

Tompkins was born in November 1902 in Kentucky and had lived in Indianapolis for only two years before he was killed. His killers were never identified. Tompkins' body was discovered in the woods on the afternoon of March 16, 1922. He was 19 years old. According to the Indianapolis Star, detectives at the time believed Tompkins' death was a suicide, but the coroner thought he was killed somewhere

Now, a new death certificate says it was a homicide.

The Marion County Coroner's Office issued the updated death certificate during a memorial for Tompkins on March 12 at Floral Park Cemetery. "No person in this room met him physically," Rev. Clyde Posley said to

### Indy hosted first full-scale college football championship since pandemic

An official attendance of 68,311 people watched the Georgia Bulldogs defeat the Alabama Crimson Tide on Jan. 10, 2022, at Lucas Oil Stadium in the college football national championship game, marking the first full-scale season finale since before the pandemic.

Neither masks nor tests were required to attend the game, though the local health department "encouraged" both.

The game, along with all of the events that preceded it during the week, were a step forward compared to the unique NCAA men's basketball tournament the year prior, where Indianapolis essentially be-

By the time the College Football Playoff national championship reached Indianapolis, Marion County was experiencing one of its sharpest rises in daily COVID-19 case counts, with seven-day averages reaching above 2,000 for a short span of days. That was also around the time the first vaccine boosters were being administered, and about 60% of the county had received at least the first shot.

There wasn't an evident spike in COVID-19 cases after the national championship, but it may be

### YEAR IN REVIEW: IPS 'Rebuilding Stronger' plan faced backlash

Indianapolis Public Schools' ambitious restructuring plan, "Rebuilding Stronger," isn't fully across the finish line but has faced backlash from the community and incoming school board members.

Superintendent Aleesia Johnson revealed the first draft of the district's expansive plan during a State of the District address Sept. 13. Johnson said she had been working on it for over a year to "improve the student experience for all, not just some of our students."

Rebuilding Stronger includes six school closures, new grade configurations, the construction of eight new middle school buildings and school mergers — including innovation charter non-renewals and updated agreements in addition to inaugural enrollment zones and school replication.

The plan also expands special education services and provides early learning services for children 4 and younger across the district.

Johnson projected the majority of the changes will be implemented during the 2024-25 school year and estimated around 330 staff members will be impacted by closures, mergers and grade configurations, but she doesn't expect any layoffs.

"I believe that none of this is easy," Johnson said during a speech at Arlington Middle School on Sept. 13, "but it is what it takes to align resources and values."

The district continued to host public meetings at schools through the month of October for the community to discuss how the changes could affect them and collect feedback on ways to improve the proposal.

"We're excited to talk to our community about this," Johnson told the Recorder before an Oct. 27 board Indianapolis Public Schools Board President Evan Hawkins and Superintendent Aleesia Johnson listen during a board meeting presentation Nov. 17, 2022, at the district office. meeting, "to help make the case of why our students are deserving of the same opportunities that are afforded to other students around us in this community and to gain our community support."

The final draft of the Rebuilding Stronger plan was presented to the IPS school board Oct. 27 and included a few changes from the initial proposal, such as algebra and arts courses for all middle school students, shifts in transportation and accommodations, as well as a financing plan.

The IPS school board unanimously approved a proposal to place a \$410 million capital referendum on the May primary ballot to fund new school construction and renovations. Those funds would go toward a new \$34.6 million facility for Joyce Kilmer School 69 and renovations at approximately 20 other schools. If approved by voters, it would add \$3.18 per month for most taxpayers.

The board later delayed a vote on a separate \$413 million property tax referendum.

In total, the district is asking for more than \$800 million to fund the plan.

The votes came amid outcry from the community about the reorganizing plan. Plus, education reform groups have been calling for the district to share funds with independent charter schools. Johnson has said the district had no plans of sharing the funds with independent charter schools.

Many families in the community feel the plan features program expansions that haven't been well-researched and will increase the overall racial and socioeconomic equity gap between traditional public school and charter school students.

The IPS school board has until Feb. 17 to vote on the language to meet the

deadline for the May 2 primary ballot. "The specifics of the operating referendum are still under consideration as we continue conversations with our partners," Marc Ransford, spokesperson for IPS, said in a statement Dec. 13. "We remain committed to delivering on our Rebuilding Stronger plan and earning our community's support."

There will be an added wrinkle when the board votes on the \$413 million referendum because all three new members, who will join the board at the start of 2023, at one point said they would vote against the plan, though some later said they were undecided after the district made minor changes.

## "WHITNEY HOUSTON:

I Wanna Dance with Somebod

It's an illusion. When actress Naomi Ackie stands with her back to the camera, you stare at her clothes, wigs, physique and mannerisms and get tricked into thinking that's Whitney Houston. Then she turns around, and it's not. It's a recurring mirage. A string of images that give Houston fans something to cling to.

Veteran record executive Clive Davis met with screenwriter Anthony Mc-Carten (Queen biopic "Bohemian Rhapsody"), enlisted the aid of Gary and Pat Houston (Houston's brotherand sister-in-law) and this production evolved. Davis knew the singer's musical feats, her family understood her personal story, and McCarten created a script that shows the songstress' highs, lows and indelible performances.

In the 1980s, a young Whitney (Ackie) sings backup for her mom Cissy Houston (Tamara Tunie) at the NYC nightclub Sweetwater's. Davis (Stanley Tucci), an exec at Arista Records, is imbut performance on the "Merv Griffin Show" introduces Houston to throngs of viewers. Her first album in 1985, "Whitney Houston," sells millions and its No. 1 hit single, "Saving All My Love For You," launches her recording career. International world tours, Grammy Awards and film roles ("The Bodyguard") propel her into stardom.

Fame comes with bouts of drug abuse, a troubled marriage to Bobby Brown (Aston Sanders, "Moonlight") and a strained relationship with her father/ manager John (Clarke Peters). Even a gossiped-about relationship with friend/lover/assistant/creative director Robyn (Nafessa Williams) is aired. Little is left unsaid or unsung.

Kasi Lemmons' ("Harriet") style of direction tends to be thorough and straightforward. The footage is direct, not stylish and tightly edited (Daysha Broadway, "The Forty-One-Year-Old Version"). Viewers may wonder if the film would have been more kinetic if a director with a music video background had taken the reigns. It's a debate worth having, as the film feels like a mix of staid TV movie, theatrical film and streaming production elements. Another worthy discussion is whether this project should have been a miniseries instead of a feature. That said, Lemmons gets the job done, her way.

Within the boundaries of the creative choices, the tech team recreates Houston's most iconic videos with perfect lighting, composition and cinematography (Barry Ackroyd, "Jason Bourne"). The production design (Gerald Sullivan), makeup (Jackie Aguece), art direction (David Offner) and costumes (Charles Antoinette Jones) are solid too. Reconstructed shoots of "I Wanna Dance ...," "I Will Always Love You" and "How Will I Know" mirror the originals.

It's all very entertaining, though not as gritty as one might hope. Some scenes feel melodramatic, like parts of Starz's "Power." For example, Whitney confronts her duplicitous father. Dad: "I'm the manger here." Whitney: "I know you are, you work for me!" Fortunately, emotions get a bit rawer and deeper when Bobby and Whitney have their volatile clashes.

Also, though the dialogue is service-

able, it isn't what it could be. When Whitney says, "I'm tired of being the good girl," it feels like the words of a screenwriter. As a tough Jersey girl, wouldn't she have said something saltier? Like: "Why do I always have to be the mother-----g good girl?"

Ackie reimagines the icon deftly with her very thoughtful interpretation. She walks, talks and lip syncs her way through a 2-hour, 26-minute homage, never letting the audience down. She's gleeful, hopeful and wallowing in mega-stardom one minute. Then doing drugs, drinking and leading a low life the next. You never question Ackie's performance. Nor that of Tucci as Davis or Tunie as Cissy.

If Whitney Houston fans long to feel her essence again, this movie and its illusions gives them a chance. But not like an extraordinary biofilm. More like a condensed diary with lots of wonderful music. In theaters now.





discovery in the lawsuit, but the city filed a motion to delay the release, citing an ongoing criminal investigation. The court denied the motion Dec. 27.

The department previously released an edited version of footage in June.

The court found that because a video has already been released, the city's argument that the jury pool could be tainted have already "been triggered by the publishing of the edited version," according to court documents.

The Recorder has filed a public records request to obtain the complete footage.

The department must also produce "any other documents" related to the lawsuit.

Attorneys for Whitfield's family issued a statement following the order: "They are very pleased with the court's order and believe it to be just and correct. The family believes the City should have produced the videos months ago."

### What happened to Whitfield?

Whitfield, 39, died April 25 after his mother called 911 and said her son was having "some sort of episode."

Police body camera footage shows officers entering the home and attempting to talk to Whitfield, who didn't appear to understand officers' questions or directives. He then ran from a bedroom to the kitchen, and then into the dining room, where an officer tased him.

When officers arrived, Whitfield's father, Herman Whitfield Jr., can be heard saying, "You guys should have called an ambulance," but it doesn't appear officers acknowledged or responded to him.

"For me, it takes a lot of energy and will," Whitfield's mother, Gladys Whitfield, said in an interview with the Recorder in September, referring to her son by his family nickname. "But my husband and I think because Tres can't be here to talk about what happened to him, we have to say something."

The family filed a wrongful death lawsuit in June, alleging officers used excessive force.

Gladys Whitfield told the Recorder her son wasn't behaving violently, but she and her husband thought he needed medical attention. Police initially said they "lost sight" of Whitfield in the home, and after 10 minutes of negotiating, he "moved quickly towards an officer."

"We just assumed that if we call for medical help, they're going to send out the people who render medical assistance," Gladys Whitfield said. "We don't understand who's coming out or what their uniform may say or look like or what their official title is or their training."


### Death ruled a homicide

The Marion County Coroner's Office ruled Whitfield's death a homicide in July, saying he died of "cardiopulmonary arrest in the setting of law enforcement subdual, prone restraint and conducted electrical weapon use."

The report also lists "morbid obesity" and "hypertensive cardiovascular disease" as contributing factors in his death. A classification of homicide from the coroner's office does not mean murder.

### How the city wants to handle mental health emergencies

In September, the city announced funding to pilot a 24-hour clinician-led crisis response team. The team will operate in a limited number of districts before expanding, and

details won't be released until early next year.

Black faith leaders, including those with Faith in Indiana, worked closely with the city to get to this point with a pilot program.

"This is the cutting edge of public safety," Faith in Indiana organizer Josh Riddick said at a press conference. "We're convinced that collaborating together with voices in the community can ensure that this team represents and looks like the community it's serving." Mayor Joe Hogsett said at the same press conference that it's not enough to "simply lock up those who are struggling with mental health."

else and likely taken to the woods and hanged from the tree.

During the memorial, Rebecca Shrum, an assistant professor of history at IUPUI, cited two patterns of anti-Black violence in the early 20th century that can help make sense of what happened.

First was the number of lynchings whites declared to be suicides: about two dozen, according to the Civil Rights and Restorative Justice Project at Northeastern University. Second was the emergence in the Midwest of "underground lynchings," which were carried out by smaller groups of whites.

"Whites in Indianapolis committed two violent atrocities against Tompkins," Shrum said. "They took his life, and then they erased the memory of the event and replaced it with a lie."

Attendees went to the site of Tompkins' unmarked grave, where the Indiana Remembrance Coalition unveiled a new headstone. Many braved the cold to place flowers on his headstone.

impossible to say if the same is true for the parts of the country fans traveled from – presumably Georgia and Alabama for the most part.

Even though the game and festivities leading up to it didn't experience disruptions, the College Football Playoff Committee did have extensive backup plans in case COVID-19 impacted one or both teams. That included vacating a national championship game altogether if both teams weren't able to play, rather than trying to reschedule it.

### UGA won its 1st title since 1980

The Bulldogs have spent much of the 21st century at or near the top of college football with 13 double-digit-win seasons going into the 2021 season. Still, that span only included three SEC titles and one championship game appearance:

a three-point loss to Alabama in 2018.

The only reason Georgia wasn't the No. 1 seed in the 2021-22 playoff is because of a loss to Alabama in the SEC championship game, which saw the Crimson Tide rack up 536 total yards on their way to 41 points. It was a different script in the national title game. The Crimson Tide still managed just shy of 400 yards, but Georgia forced two interceptions from Heisman quarterback Bryce Young, and the offense found timely, explosive plays behind quarterback Stetson Bennett.

Georgia won 33-18. "We talked about putting it on our shoulders and it being on us," Georgia linebacker Nakobe Dean said of the defense. "We knew when we took the lead, we knew that if they don't score no more, they don't win. That's the only thing that was going Ty\_Fenwick. through our mind."

For Bennett, a conventionally undersized signal-caller, his title run turned him into one of the more interesting figures in big-time college football. His grandfather once hitchhiked 400 miles to South Carolina to play football for the Gamecocks. And Bennett made headlines when he got rid of his iPhone in the summer of 2021, opting instead of the oldfashioned flip phone.

When media got a chance to speak with him a couple of days before the championship game, Bennett said smartphones offer too many distractions but that he wasn't ready to swear them off.

"I'm not gonna be some nomad," he said, "unless I decide to. I don't know."

school's co-founders, Harry and Michelle Dunn, as well as the executive director and principal.

The letter says school leaders considered "all reasonable options" before deciding to close.

Although the school will begin phasing out classes "as soon as practicable," the letter says no primary school operations will continue after Jan. 20, 2023.

"While we made valiant efforts to avoid this decision, we nonetheless very much regret delivering this news during the holiday season," the letter says.

Parents of students enrolled at HIM by HER are encouraged to begin searching for an alternative school to enroll their children in immediately. HIM by HER will host an enrollment fair at the school Jan. 6, 2023, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. to aid families in the process. If needed, there will be a second enrollment fair Jan. 14, 2023.

Parents are also encouraged to contact Enroll Indy. "We are truly sorry to have to deliver this news, as your children have been a blessing," school leaders said in the letter. "We pray for the success and happiness of all the families we have had the great pleasure to serve!"



The school, founded by the HIM by HER Foundation, first opened its doors in the fall of 2020 following a conditional charter agreement with Ball State University in October 2019. It offered an Afrocentric curriculum with a performance arts focus.

"We take pride in the many young lives positively affected," the letter says. "HBHCSA has been the anchor of a community development center like no other in Indianapolis."

### Proud to be in the center

My parents and grandparents are all deceased. That makes me an orphan. Using that term always feels a little odd given that I was 44 when I became one. (My mother was the last to pass away, in January 2014.) Fortunately, I did not have to navigate this reality when I was a child. Being an orphan isn't a unique

experience; there are plenty of people who share that distinction. Still, being one can be isolating. It can feel as though you're the only person who is enduring that state.

While I am a literal orphan in a familial sense, it often seems as though I am one in a political sense, too. tion to feel as though you're a stranger in the house I have frequently described myself as a "reluctant Democrat," which is to say that I'm a Democrat solely because I cannot in good conscience be a Republican. And, given everything that is at stake these days, I won't risk being in a third party.

I am a center-left person who is uncompromising in fighting for racial equity. While I could not identify with Ronald Reagan's GOP, even that iteration of the Republican Party is much preferable to the one that exists in Donald Trump's image. Still, I am increasingly uncomfortable in a Democratic Party that is lurching ever more leftward, apparently content to leave behind people like me.

Were it not for the threat to democracy that Trump poses, I doubt that Joe Biden — the quintessential centrist - would have won the Democratic nomina-

tion. People who are on the fringe are pushing both major parties to become more ideologically "pure." By degrees, they are supplanting the mainstream. If things continue to evolve (or devolve) as they are, both parties are in danger of collapsing. While some openly welcome that outcome, it is advisable to remember the Chinese proverb: "May you get everything that you ask for."

Naturally, most orphans want to feel that they are part of a family that loves, welcomes and values them. Political orphans don't need "parents," but brothers and sisters are paramount. I often feel like the guirky cousin. The other kids may talk to me out of a sense of obligation, but they don't want to.

The Democratic Party would not be viable — at all - without African Americans. It is a very odd sensathat you built. Black men who are Democrats often feel that way. The NBA and NFL are apt analogs. We dominate those respective leagues as players, but it is rare for us to be head coaches or general managers. And team ownership is nearly unattainable. I'm hopeful that the elevation of Hakeem Jeffries to be Democratic leader of the House heralds needed change. Hopeful, but not optimistic.

In addition to the racial component, my political sensibilities are increasingly unwelcome in the party. For example, while I did not support the overturning of Roe v. Wade, my personal moral stance is pro-life. Unfortunately, there are prominent Democrats who argue that there is no place in the party for people who aren't "all in" on being pro-choice. This is just one of myriad illiberal tendencies in the ostensible

"liberal" party.

The fact is that both major political parties share a proto-fascism in which loyalty is not enough; they demand an uncompromising fealty to a narrow set of principles or - in the case of Republicans - a person. We see this phenomenon even on a micro-level. In theory, Facebook, Twitter and other social media outlets offer a chance for the democratic exchange of disparate viewpoints. But it's up to us as individuals to be moderators. (We certainly can't depend on Mark Zuckerberg or Elon Musk.)

Many of my posts are designed to get people who have substantially different viewpoints to talk to each other respectfully. Such is the sine qua non of democracy. My desire is to provoke thought, not dissension. I don't allow myself to get caught in "liberal" or "conservative" echo chambers – despite Facebook's best efforts. I'm a Democrat; I'm also a democrat.

Unfortunately, I find that people often project their entire ideology onto me if I post something with which they agree. Then, if I post something with which they disagree, I have "betrayed the cause." When I attempt to engage in dialogue, rationality often gives way to an eruption of emotion. That, in a nutshell, is the contemporary state of our polity. At a minimum, it's exceedingly unhealthy for our democracy. At worst, it's an existential threat.

### This holiday season, judges give us something to celebrate

(TriceEdneyWire. com) — I've written about the importance of judges a few times over the last year. And every time I do, I realize that many people have never met a judge.

Or they have, but it was at a time when they'd rather have been anywhere else. So the idea that judges are on my mind as something to celebrate this holiday season may strike you as strange. But bear with me.

Since President Joe Biden came into office, he has made it a priority to nominate federal judges who are not only legal stars but are diverse, come from underrepresented professional backgrounds and have a deep commitment to civil rights. Many of them have been civil rights lawyers or public defenders. This is a real change, even from past Democratic presidents. For decades, presidents most often nominated corporate lawyers or prosecutors to the bench. Those people were also overwhelmingly white and male. Not anymore.

is the level above the district or trial courts and just below the Supreme Court, 41% of Biden nominees have been Black. So far, more Black women have been confirmed to the circuit court bench than during all previous presidencies combined. At the district level, Biden has nominated people of color, LGBTQ+ people and people of diverse faiths, who are historic "firsts" on their respective courts. Not only that, but we have our first Black woman on the Supreme Court, Ketanji Brown Jackson. Her presence inspires me every day, even though there are many reasons to be dissatisfied with the court's far-right majority.

Thanks to President Biden, Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer and Senate Judiciary Committee Chair Dick Durbin, the pace of nominations

pace is the second fastest in a quarter century.

And when the Senate returns in January, there will be a spectacular roster of nominees just waiting for the final step in their confirmation process: people like Nancy Abudu, an advocate for voting rights and civil rights through her work at the Southern Poverty Law Center and the ACLU; Natasha Merle, an advocate for racial justice at the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund; Tiffany Cartwright, a civil rights litigator whose cases include police misconduct; and Julie Rikelman, the longtime litigation director for the Center for Reproductive Rights.

So why does all this matter? It's not just because having people from underrepresented communities on our courts is inspiring to see and long over due. Both of those things are true. It's because the nominations and confirmations represent the administration's commitment to building fairer courts overall. When we have fair judges and fair courts, our lives are dramatically better. Fair courts hold police officers accountable for brutality. Fair courts protect our right to vote and strike

down laws aimed at voter suppression. Fair courts protect our jobs, our air and water, and our right to health care, including abortion care. The list goes on and on.

So in addition to celebrating all the great new judges the Biden administration and Senate leadership have given us, there's one more thing we can do. All of us can call our senators' offices in January and encourage them to keep up to the momentum by confirming all the rest of the president's judicial nominees. It's an easy way to make a difference.

As I'm thinking of things to be thankful for this holiday season, I'm thankful that many of our federal courts really are changing for the better. So many of the rights and freedoms we've worked for in the past and will work for in the tuture depend on this progress. We need to keep it going.

At the federal circuit level, which

security of a home, and who, for practical purposes, live in conditions as bad or worse than those of animals. Looking at homelessness through my "glass half-empty" lens, I see an issue of immense proportions growing at an ever-increasing rate. I commend generosity, but I think that too many Americans diminish the severity of the problem because of the gifts they give at stoplights while driving or as they pass spots where pedestrians are solicited for help.

This may ease their distress of seeing another human living in circumstances the individual donor feels intolerable, but reality demands that we realize that the problem of homelessness will not be remedied one gift at a time. Like everything else in our society, the collection of homelessness data has been affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. 2020 was the last year in which comprehensive data was available. Current statistics commonly reflect limited data when compared to that of 2020. According to the National Alliance to End Homelessness, in January 2020, there were 580,466 people experiencing homelessness on our streets and in shelters in America. Most were individuals (70%), and the rest were people in families with children. They lived in every state and territory, and they include people from every gender, racial and ethnic group. Decisionmakers are especially concerned about children and young people due to their developmental needs and the potential lifelong consequences of hardships in early life.

People in families with children make up 30% of the homeless population. Unaccompanied youth (under age 25) account for 6% of the larger group. Additionally, individuals with disabilities have also: 1) been continuously homeless for at least a year, or 2) experienced homelessness at least four times in the last three years for a combined length of time of

at least a year. Chronically homeless individuals are currently 19% of the homeless population. Finally, veterans represent 6% of people experiencing homelessness.

Recently, the issue of homelessness was illuminated in historic proportions. Kamala Harris, the first woman and first woman of color to be vice president, administered the oath of office to Karen Bass, former congresswoman and first female mayor of Los Angeles. Ms. Bass focused her inaugural remarks on her plans to solve the city's housing crisis. Approximately 40,000 people live on the streets, and innumerable other "Angelenos have no choice but to crowd multiple families into one home, and to work multiple jobs just to barely pay rent," Bass said.

She added, "Tragically, our city has earned the shameful crown as being home to the most crowded neighborhoods in the nation." She said her first act as mayor would be to declare a state of emergency on homelessness. As a former resident and frequent visitor to Los Angeles, I see its problems as representative of homelessness problems across the nation. The cause of the problem is as individual as those who suffer from homelessness — unaffordability, unemployment, physical or mental disability, or a myriad of other issues.

I commend Mayor Bass. Her recognition of the depth of the problem and placing its resolution in high priority is the only pathway to solving the problem. Her approach serves as a model for other public officials.

# Sports unraveled, collided with politics, racism in 2022

The unspoken deal between sports fans and their favorite teams and players has been, in theory: Sure, there are billions of dollars being thrown around, but at the core, sports are supposed to be fun and games, a neverending menu of two- or three-hour escapes into a land of winners and losers where nobody really gets hurt.

For all but the most starry-eyed fanatics, that worldview unraveled in 2022 — much as it did the year before, the year before that, and the year before that, and so on. A more accurate assessment might be that sports are not so much an escape from the world's problems as simply another window into them.

The AP Sports Story of the Year was about a basketball player, Brittney Griner, whose plan to travel to Russia to play in the offseason ended up as a high-stakes diplomatic battle between the United States and Russia.

Griner was sentenced to nine years in prison for possessing a small amount of hashish oil, which is illegal in Russia. Months of tense negotiations ensued. Ultimately, Griner was released, and the sign-off for both countries' negotiating teams came from none other than Presidents Joe Biden and Vladimir Putin.

In basketball, Griner's was hardly the only story that strayed far outside the lines. The year was filled with reports about the rot that infiltrated the NBA's Phoenix Suns, whose owner, Robert Sarver, was pressured into selling the team after the details emerged. Employees documented years of abuse and toxic workplace culture that included frequent disrespect of women and use of racially inappropriate language.

Another owner behaving badly: Daniel Snyder of the NFL's Washington Commanders.

Snyder found himself accused by a congressional committee of standing in the way of investigations about sexual harassment and misconduct that had allegedly been prevalent throughout the organization for two decades. Part of the investigation suggested the franchise was receiving help from the NFL itself in slowing down investigations. It's a claim the NFL has denied, while pointing to its own outside probes into conditions that existed on Snyder's team.

In many corners, the saga reflected poorly on a league that has long been trying to grow its female fan base. Not helping was the ongoing story of one of the league's best quarterbacks, Deshaun Watson, who, in 2022, reached settlements with 23 women who accused him of sexual misconduct while he was getting massages. He served an 11-game suspension that ended just in time for the holidays. He has not admitted guilt.

But perhaps the single issue that underscored the inseparable bond between sports and all it touches was the furor over the future of transgender athletes.

It is among society's most complex topics, one steeped in a mix of physiological science, common sense, human decency and, yes, politics — and one that has left different sides of the debate at seemingly intractable loggerheads.

The international swimming federation, in the wake of Penn transgender swimmer Lia Thomas' title at the NCAA championships, was among a number of global sports entities that wrote, or updated, guidelines in 2022 in an attempt to bring clarity. So did legislatures in no fewer than 18 states across the U.S.

One goal, said Olympic swimming champion Donna de Varona, an outspoken advocate in the transgender debate, should be to find some nuance in both the debate and the policymaking.

"But nobody wants nuances," she conceded.

Such is the bottom line in sports, the place where fans go not for shades of grey, but, rather, to see wins and losses neatly summed up in black and white.

What became clear as ever in 2022 is how far past the scoreboard we have to look to see the true outcomes of the games.



### YEAR IN REVIEW: Abortion ban passed then blocked, so what's next?

It's been six months since the U.S. Supreme Court overturned Roe v. Wade, allowing each state to decide whether abortion should be legal. Since the court's decision, Indiana drafted, passed and signed a bill to further restrict abortion access, but the law has since been blocked on two separate occasions.

As of right now, abortion rights are protected in Indiana, but many wonder what the future holds for safe and legal abortion access in the state.

### Timeline of Indiana's abortion law

On June 24, Roe v. Wade was overturned by the U.S. Supreme Court, making way for each state to decide whether abortion should be legal.

Hoosiers from all around the state protested outside of the Indiana Statehouse the next day.

Indiana legislators convened July 25 for a special legislative session to discuss the abortion bill drafted by Republicans. Even Vice President Kamala Harris got involved, coming to Indianapolis to support abortion rights.

Gov. Eric Holcomb signed the near-total abortion ban Aug. 5, making Indiana the first state to pass new legislation that further restricted abortion access since Roe v. Wade was overturned.

The law went into effect on Sept. 15 and banned abortions with a few exceptions, including incest, rape and if the pregnancy would have "substantial permanent impairment" to the mother's life.

However, a week later, the law was blocked by an Owen County judge who said the law violated the state constitution. This allowed for legal abortions to continue throughout the state up to 20 weeks postfertilization or 22 weeks of pregnancy.

On Dec. 2, a Marion County judge further halted the ban, ruling it violates Indiana's religious freedom law that was signed in 2015 by former Gov. Mike Pence.

### Community's response

Health professionals, religious leaders and other members of the community have had various responses.

Indiana resident Christy Johnson, 49, told the Recorder she wished her mother could have had an abortion 50 years ago, even if that means she would not be alive today.

"I really wish she could have had an abortion for



her," Johnson said in an interview. "It ruined our relationship before it even started. My mother wasn't able to ever really connect with me."

Dr. Caitlin Bernard, an Indiana OB-GYN, received backlash after discussing an abortion procedure she provided to a 10-year-old girl from Ohio. Some who would describe themselves as pro-life, like Dr. Reginald Fletcher, pastor at Living Word

Baptist Church, still did not believe the U.S. Supreme Court's decision was rational. "Even though I support pro life that does not

"Even though I support pro-life, that does not negate the fact that they are hurting people that need support," he said in an interview before the law was passed. "My faith is based upon the life that Jesus Christ set for us as an example. I want to first hear

what people are going through in order to help them from a balanced perspective, not by what I think is right and what I think is wrong."

### What's next?

Abortion is still protected in Indiana for now, but in January, the Indiana Supreme Court is scheduled to hear an abortion ban challenge on the grounds that the ban violates the state's constitution.

Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) expanded the use of the bivalent COVID-19 vaccines for children ages 6 months through 5 years.

Children in this age group who previously completed a Moderna primary series are eligible to receive a Moderna bivalent booster 2 months after their final primary series dose.

Children ages 6 months through 4 years who are currently completing a Pfizer primary series will receive a Pfizer bivalent vaccine as their third primary dose.

These recently-approved COVID-19 bivalent vaccines are formulated to protect against both the original virus that causes COVID-19 and the Omicron variant BA.4 and BA.5 which are circulating.

COVID-19 vaccines are critical to providing ongoing protection as immunity wanes and the virus continues to mutate.

The majority of children in this age group have not received any doses of a COVID-19 vaccine. CDC is working to increase parent and provider confidence in COVID-19 vaccines and improve uptake among the 95% of children who are not vaccinated or who have not completed the COVID-19 vaccine primary series.

Parents should talk to their child's health care provider to ensure their child is up to date on their COVID-19 and other vaccines.

The emergence of COVID-19 variants further emphasizes the importance of vaccination and prevention efforts needed to protect against COVID-19. Data show that an mRNA booster increases the immune response, which improves protection against serious COVID-19 infection.

Scientists are monitoring how long vaccine protection lasts. COVID-19 vaccines work well to prevent severe illness, hospitalization, and death. However, public health experts are seeing decreases in the protection COVID-19 vaccines provide over time, especially for certain groups of people.

Since flu rates are still high, Marion County Public Health Department Director and Chief Medical Officer Virginia A. Caine, M.D., says both the flu vaccine and the COVID-19 are needed.

"As with vaccines for other diseases, people are best protected when they stay up to date with the recommended number of doses, including COVID-19 boosters, when eligible," says Dr. Caine. "Getting a vaccination is also a safer way to build protection than getting sick with the virus."

COVID-19 vaccine is still free and is available through the Marion County Public Health Department by appointment only at its district health offices and ACTION Health Center. To get a list of locations and phone numbers for these clinics, please visit MarionHealth. org/immunize or call the Immunization Program at 317-221-2122.

The seasonal flu vaccine is also available at these health department locations by appointment. The cost for a flu shot is \$20 for adults and children ages 2-18, and free for children under the age of 2.

Flu vaccination reduces the burden of flu illness, hospitalization, and death and getting vaccinated could also help protect those who are more vulnerable to serious flu illness, like babies and young children, older people, and people with certain chronic health conditions.

Everyday preventive actions like staying away from people who are sick, covering coughs and sneezes, and frequent handwashing can help slow the spread of germs that cause respiratory illnesses such as flu.

# State lawsuits defend abortion access with religious freedom

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - Cara Berg Raunick watched with bafflement as Indiana's Republican legislators took less than two weeks to debate and pass an abortion ban that the governor signed quickly into law.

The women's health nurse practitioner from Indianapolis was struck by just how frequently faith was cited in the arguments as reason to ban the medical practice. But Berg Raunick, who is Jewish, said those views go against her beliefs.

To her, a pregnant woman's health and life is paramount, and she disagreed with legislators' assertions that life begins at conception, calling that a "Christian definition."

"That is a religious and values-based comment," said Berg Raunick. "A fetus is potential life, and that is worthy of great respect and is not to be taken lightly, but it does not supersede the life and health of the mother, period."


Arguments like this were central to an Indiana lawsuit filed in September against the state's abortion ban, which is on hold amid multiple legal challenges. On Dec. 2, a judge ruled the ban violates the state's religious freedom law, signed by then-Republican Gov. Mike Pence in 2015.

Critics of religious freedoms laws often argue they are used to discriminate against LGBTQ people and only protect a conservative Christian worldview. But following the U.S. Supreme Court's overturning of Roe v. Wade in June, religious abortion-rights supporters are using these laws to protect access to abortion and defend their beliefs.

The Dobbs v. Jackson ruling left abortion rights up to the states. As a result, lower courts in at least five states, including Indiana, have issued rulings in abortion-related religious freedom lawsuits.

There is a "huge diversity of the kinds of claims being made" in these cases, said Elizabeth Reiner Platt, who studies religion and abortion rights as director of Columbia University's Law, Rights and Religion Project. The religious freedom complaints are among 34 post-Roe lawsuits filed against 19 states' abortion bans, according to the Brennan Center for Justice.

For some, abortion access can be a way to exercise one's religion, Platt said. Other lawsuits challenge the bans under constitutional clauses that say the government is "establishing" a religion, imposing a law on residents who do not share that belief. In the Indiana case, lawyers for five anonymous women - who are Jewish, Muslim and spiritual - and advocacy group Hoosier Jews for Choice have argued the state's ban infringes on their



The Indiana attorney general's office this month appealed a ruling siding with the women and asked the state Supreme Court to consider the case. In January, the Indiana justices are already scheduled to hear another abortion ban challenge on the grounds it violates the state constitution's individual rights protections.

Meanwhile, in Kentucky, three Jewish women are arguing the state's ban violates their religious rights under the state's constitution and religious freedom law. They say in a lawsuit, which has been removed to federal court, that Kentucky's Republican-dominated legislature "imposed sectarian theology" by prohibiting nearly all abortions. The ban remains in effect while the Kentucky Supreme Court considers a separate case challenging the law.

For those wanting to end abortion bans, lawsuits arguing state governments are establishing a religion via the bans could be more effective than ones arguing for the free exercise of religion, said Elizabeth Sepper, a University of Texas at Austin law professor. The former would apply to more people, she or most cases. Similarly, about 7 in 10 said.

If an abortion ban violates either a state establishment clause or the federal establishment clause, then the entirety of the statute comes down," Sepper said.

That same month, a lawsuit partly based on Wyoming's religious-liberty clause blocked the state's abortion ban. The Wyoming high court said Dec. 21 it would not weigh in on the state's new abortion ban for now.

Elsewhere, Florida religious leaders in June cited the state's religious rights law and state constitution's privacy protections in multiple lawsuits against their state's 15-week abortion ban. A request to hear an appeal of the ban, which remains in effect, rests before the women.' Florida Supreme Court.

Amid the legal machinations, abortion access remains a divisive issue among the nation's faithful. In June, clergy across the U.S. reflected that divide and its nuances as they rearranged worship plans to provide religious context - and competing messages after Roe was overturned.

groups say abortion should always be illegal, according to AP VoteCast, a sweeping survey of the midterm electorate. But religious groups differ in their level of support for abortion.

While Protestants in general are closely divided over whether abortion should generally be legal, most white evangelical Protestants — about 7 in 10 - say abortion should be illegal in all Mormon voters say abortion should be

restrictions after Dobbs. The state law displeased both abortion-rights advocates, who say it goes too far, and antiabortion activists, who said it didn't go far enough.

State Rep. Ann Vermilion, who opposed the ban, condemned her fellow Republicans that called women "murderers" for getting an abortion.

"The Lord's promise is for grace and kindness," Vermilion said. "He would not be jumping to condemn these

Dr. Kay Eigenbrod, an Indianapolis obstetrician-gynecologist who attended Indiana Right to Life's "Love them Both" rally during the debate, said in a July interview that, because of her Catholic upbringing, she supports a complete abortion ban without exceptions.

"Women just don't have to turn to Across the U.S., few voters in religious abortion for any reason," she said. "We as a society just need to be better about supporting them both."

Months later, Berg Raunick, a member of Hoosier Jews for Choice but not involved in the lawsuit, hopes lawmakers will continue to value religious freedom.

"That has to mean protecting all religions, not just Christianity, and not just the majority," she said. "Now, we sort of wait and see how how true that is."

## Year in Review: City's Black churches commemorate 100 years

Several Indianapolis Black churches celebrated their 100-year anniversaries in 2022, and more Black churches will celebrate in the future.

During the first wave of the Great Migration – the early 1900s to the 1940s - Indianapolis' Black population grew as people were migrating north from the South. As more Black people moved to Indianapolis, seeking educational and economic opportunities, they also were looking to have their religious and spiritual needs met.

"We have so many churches celebrating 100 years because ... they have learned the power of collaboration instead of competition," said Dr. Joseph Tucker Edmonds, associate professor of religious and Africana studies at IUPUI. "They've leaned into community building rather than competition and I think that is what made Indy a better community for its Black population."

The dark side to this, Edmonds said, is the fact that there was a reemergence of racial oppression. The rise of the KKK and racism had Black people looking toward religion to "create meaning for Black suffering."

#### **Bethesda Missionary Baptist Church**

On Aug. 26, Bethesda Missionary Baptist Church celebrated its 100-year anniversary with a '20sthemed party.

"It's monumental," Rev. Timothy Ramsey said.

The south side church has served as a spiritual refuge for Indianapolis' Black residents through some of the most challenging times, such as segregation and the displacement of Black neighborhoods because of the construction of I-70 and I-65.

Ramsey was ordained as pastor of the church five

years ago, and after the anniversary celebration he noticed a change in the congregation: a newfound appreciation and dignity in their church home and what it represents.

"We came out with a renewed sense of pride," he said.

Sunday worship began looking different, Ramsey said, because together they overcame those challenges, stayed together and connected.

#### Mount Nebo MB Church

Mount Nebo Missionary Baptist Church honored its centennial with a celebration Oct. 9.

Mount Nebo began as a small body of believers with its first pastor being Rev. Walter Highbaugh. In 1923, the church moved to an unfinished basement at its current location, 2325 Hovey St., and has been a beacon of light in the Martindale-Brightwood community since then.

During its celebration, the congregation honored not only the church's establishment, but one of the oldest members of the church, Wilma Ledell, who's been a member of the church for 92 years.

"The church has lasted because it is built on a foundation," Rev. Cecil Golder III said during the celebration. "And any church that is built on the right foundation will last 100-plus years. So, we need to understand that the church is not here because of you, it's here for you."

### Free Church of God

Free Church of God honored its 100-year church anniversary the weekend of Oct. 22 with a banquet dinner and two church services. The church was established in April 1922 by Bishop William B. Stubbs. According to the church website, "Bishop William B. Stubbs has had a lasting legacy for the last 100 years, because of his belief in righteousness, unconditional love for humanity, and the teachings of Jesus of Christ."

#### **Future centennials for Black Churches**

This is just the beginning; over the next 20 years, other Black churches in the city will celebrate their 100-year anniversary as the first wave of the Great Migration ended in the 1940s. Other churches will honor other milestones, and Edmonds said this shows the tenacity, resilience and persistence of Indianapolis' Black community.

"These churches are still relevant, and they are still speaking to a Black community in Indianapolis," he said.

## **EXPLAINER: 2023 tax credits for EVs will boost their appeal**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Starting Jan. 1, many Americans will qualify for a tax credit of up to \$7,500 for buying an electric vehicle. The credit, part of changes enacted in the Inflation Reduction Act, is designed to spur EV sales and reduce greenhouse emissions.

But a complex web of requirements, including where vehicles and batteries must be manufactured to qualify, is casting doubt on whether anyone can receive the full \$7,500 credit next year.

For at least the first two months of 2023, though, a delay in the Treasury Department's rules for the new benefit will likely make the full credit temporarily available to consumers who meet certain income and price limits.

The new law also provides a smaller credit for people who buy a used EV.

Certain EV brands that were eligible for a separate tax credit that began in 2010 and that will end this year may not be eligible for the new credit. Several EV models made by Kia, Hyundai and Audi, for example, won't qualify at all because they are manufactured outside North America.

The new tax credit, which lasts until 2032, is intended to make zero-emission vehicles affordable to more people. Here is a closer look at it:

### WHAT'S NEW FOR 2023?

The credit of up to \$7,500 will be offered to people who buy certain new electric vehicles as well as some plug-in gas-electric hybrids and hydrogen fuel cell vehicles. For people who buy a used vehicle that runs on battery power, a \$4,000 credit will be available.

But the question of which vehicles and buyers will qualify for the credits is complicated and will remain uncertain until Treasury issues the proposed rules in March.

What's known so far is that to qualify for the credit, new EVs must be made in North America. In addition, caps on vehicle prices and buyer incomes are intended to disqualify wealthier buyers.

Starting in March, complex provisions will also govern battery components. Forty percent of battery minerals will have to come from North America or a country with a U.S. free trade agreement or be recycled in North America. (That threshold will eventually go to 80%.)

And 50% of the battery parts will have to be made or assembled in North America, eventually rising to 100%.

Starting in 2025, battery minerals cannot come from a "foreign entity of concern," mainly China and Russia. Battery parts cannot be sourced in those countries starting in 2024 — a troublesome obstacle for the auto industry because numerous EV metals and parts now come from China.

There also are battery-size requirements.



### WHICH VEHICLES ARE ELIGIBLE?

Because of the many remaining uncertainties, that's not entirely clear.

General Motors and Tesla have the most EVs assembled in North America. Each also makes batteries in the U.S. But because of the requirements for where batteries, minerals and parts must be manufactured, it's likely that buyers of those vehicles would initially receive only half the tax credit, \$3,750. GM says its eligible EVs should qualify for the \$3,750 credit by March, with the full credit available in 2025.

Until Treasury issues its rules, though, the requirements governing where minerals and parts must be sourced will be waived. This will allow eligible buyers to receive the full \$7,500 tax incentive for qualifying models early in 2023.

The Energy Department says 29 EV and plug-in models were manufactured in North America in the 2022 and 2023 model years. They're from Audi, BMW, Chevrolet, Chrysler, Ford, GMC, Jeep, Lincoln, Lucid, Nissan, Rivian, Tesla, Volvo, Cadillac, Mercedes and Volkswagen. Yet because of price limits

or battery-size requirements, not all these vehicle models will qualify for credits.

### WHAT ABOUT PRICE?

To qualify, new electric sedans cannot have a sticker price above \$55,000. Pickup trucks, SUVs and vans can't be over \$80,000. This will disqualify two higher-priced Tesla models. Though Tesla's top sellers, the models 3 and Y, will be eligible, with options, those vehicles might exceed the price limits.

Kelley Blue Book says the average EV now costs over \$65,000, though lower-priced models are coming.

### WILL I QUALIFY FOR THE CREDITS?

It depends on your income. For new EVs, buyers cannot have an adjusted gross income above \$150,000 if single, \$300,000 if filing jointly and \$225,000 if head of a household.

For used EVs, buyers cannot earn more than \$75,000 if single, \$150,000 if filing jointly and \$112,500 if head of household.

### HOW WILL THE CREDIT BE PAID?

At first, it will be applied to your 2023 tax return, which you file in 2024. Starting in 2024, consumers can transfer the credit to a dealership to lower the vehicle price at purchase.

### WILL THE CREDITS BOOST EV SALES?

Yes, but it probably will take a few years, says Mike Fiske, associate director for S&P Global Mobility. The credit may cause a bump in sales early next year because of Treasury's delay in issuing the stricter requirements. But most automakers are now selling all the EVs they build and cannot make more because of shortages of parts, including computer chips.

And automakers may have trouble certifying the sources of battery minerals and parts, a requirement for buyers to receive the full credit. Automakers have been scrambling to move more EV supply chains to the U.S.
