


ELI LILLY TO LOWER COST OF INSULIN BY 70%

Eli Lilly & Company announced a 70% price drop in out-of-pocket insulin costs. The Indianapolis-based pharmaceutical company announced the price cut for its most prescribed insulins during a virtual news conference March 1. Effective immediately, the cut would cap out-of-pocket patient costs for insulin at \$35 per month, said company chairman and CEO David Ricks. This price cap will be available at participating retail pharmacies for those with commercial insurance using Lilly insulin. For those who don't have insurance, Ricks said they can visit insulinaffordability.com to download the Lilly Insulin Value Program savings card to still purchase Lilly insulins for \$35 per month. "Essentially, the big news for people who live with diabetes who use insulin is that when they go to the pharmacy – a retail pharmacy, they shouldn't pay more than \$35," said Michael Mason, Lilly executive vice president and president of Lilly Diabetes.

Mural by local Black artist to go to Philadelphia Flower Show

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Local artist Kyng Rhodes spent the last month painting a 75-foot mural for the 2023 PHS Philadelphia Flower Show.

The Philadelphia Flower Show, presented by the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society, is the nation's largest and longest running horticulture event, and this year, Newfields will be a featured exhibitor, said Philly Flower Show creative director Seth Pearsoll.

Rhodes, a member of the Eighteen Art Collective, said Newfields commissioned him to craft a mural as part of their garden display.

"I'm going to be honest, there was a moment where I had to just step back and I really was proud of myself," he said. "It's just one of those moments that we all have where you're a little nervous going into it because I felt like the odds were kind of stacked against me (with) the amount of time that I had to do it; the work that they chose."

Pearsoll said the show takes place over nine days at the Pennsylvania Convention Center in downtown Philadelphia and features extravagant floral and landscape designs, art installations,

sculptures and more from locally, regionally and internationally curated submissions.

"This year, I would expect a lot of colorful displays full of bold juxtapositions," Pearsoll said. "Like interesting flower combinations, a little eccentric, a little daring, maybe a little over the top in the best way possible."

Pearsoll said he recently walked through Newfields' display and said it was "going to be an absolute jaw dropper."

Newfields, formerly known as the Indianapolis Museum of Art, is located in the Virginia B. Fairbanks Art and Nature Park, at 4000 N. Michigan Road and is home to

modern and contemporary art as well as exhibitions from Indianapolis-based artists.

Newfields has had its eyes on the Philadelphia

Flower Show ever since the institution rebranded and incorporated its 52-acre botanical gardens, Rhodes said, but this was the first year they were

City calls for revitalization of Indiana Avenue

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An initiative that aims to revive Indiana Avenue is officially in the works.

The Indiana Avenue Certified Strategic Plan aims to honor the Avenue's "rich history" by redeveloping and preserving an area north to 16th Street, east to Capitol Avenue, south to Military Park and west to the White River,

"We are here today to invite proposals to develop a certified plan for Indiana Avenue," Mayor Joe Hogsett said at a news conference at the Kurt Vonnegut Museum and Library on Feb. 23. "This plan will honor the rich history of the avenue while developing on its considerable assets."

The initiative is a partnership between the Department of Metropolitan Development (DMD), Reclaim Indiana Avenue and Urban Legacy Lands Initiative. Hogsett said DMD is accepting proposals from consulting teams, community organizations and residents to begin drafting the plan.

As they prepare to "define the avenue's future," Hogsett said he acknowledges the

Indy Education changes name, launches partnership with Indianapolis Recorder

A local publication focused on allowing the community to start their own dialogue on education is changing its name. Indy K-12 — formerly known as Indy Education — will now be known as Indy Kids Winning. Under the new name, the organization will continue

to fight for education excellence and keeping parents informed.

The organization has shifted through national networks, amplifying voices of the Indianapolis community and will now partner with the fourth oldest surviving Black newspaper in the country to continue its mission.

Indy Kids Winning was born out of

a need to bring attention to education stories that may not get the coverage it deserves. The publication focuses on amplifying issues, finding solutions and breaking down the concepts of complex educational terminology in ways that any reader can understand. Uniquely, the organization is told through the voices of Black educators

who serve students and teachers in various educational spaces. Writers at Indy Kids Winning use their educational background to break down concepts and inform readers through their own knowledge and lived experiences as they cover education in Indianapolis and beyond. The Indy Kinds Winning team

selected as a guest exhibitor. Rhodes said Newfields reached out to him back in December 2022 after seeing his work with the Eighteen Art Collective and the paintings he did for “We. The Culture.” He said Newfields CEO Colette Pierce Burnette wanted to incorporate art with nature at the Philly Flower Show as a way to introduce themselves to a larger audience. However, Rhodes said he isn’t a muralist — at least he wasn’t until now. With a little more than a month to complete the mural, which spans 18 4-foot by 8-foot panels, Rhodes said he was given creative freedom to tell the story of Newfields with the inclusion of native plants and wildlife. Though he ended up doing some of his own research to craft the mural, Rhodes said his trademark flora, fauna and botanical art borders shine through. “On the mural, there’s a great blue heron that is splashing water onto the garden,” he said. “And ... kind of sets off a ripple effect that sends other birds in the garden into flight carrying flowers around the garden that will drop seeds, allowing flowers that ‘weren’t allowed to grow’ in certain parts of the garden to bloom, which creates a more diverse and beautiful garden.” Entitled “Newfound Fields,” Rhodes said the mural is symbolic of the relationship Newfields has with its artists and the community going forward as it continues to work on building back trust with its board and unrepresented artists, such as LGBTQ, disabled and artists of color, Rhodes said. With all of the native flowers, birds and ultraviolet colors incorporated onto it, the mural Rhodes created doesn’t stray

far from the theme of “Garden Electric” of this year’s flower show. Pearsoll said the theme was chosen following two years of pandemic friendly outdoor events with calmer and more relaxing themes. “We wanted to remind people that gardens and flowers didn’t just have to be kind of calming and tranquil, they could be celebratory, they could be bold, they could be full of moments where they’re sort of coming alive,” Pearsoll said. “The Garden Electric is about that specific moment when you see something so beautiful — perhaps so rich or fragrant whatever it may be — that it can literally shock you or jolt you or move you.” Rhodes said the mural was sent to Philadelphia a week before the show to be set up, but he will be joining for the first few days of the show, which opens on March 4. Alongside the mural and horticulture, Rhodes said Newfields hired Blockhouse Studios to project LUME-like projections onto the inside of the mural. Rhodes said Newfields told

him they didn’t have enough time to prepare and grow all of the flowers they would have liked to in time for the show. But Johnathan Wright, the Ruth Lilly Director of The Garden and Fairbanks Park at Newfields, said his mural would be a large component of their display. “Essentially, it feels like nine-year-old me is looking at me now and is like ‘we came to the rescue for the museum,’” Rhodes said. “For the fine art museum of my city, I came in and helped them so they could display and be a part of the show the way they want it. It’s an incredible feeling.” PHS Philadelphia Flower Show takes place March 4-12 at the Pennsylvania Convention Center, 1101 Arch Street, in Philadelphia, PA. Indiana Landmark’s new program preserves Indiana’s Black history

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Indiana Landmark’s Black Heritage Preservation Program is working to preserve Indiana’s Black history one site at a time. “There’s value in our communities and we have to see that value,” said Eunice Trotter, director of the Black Heritage Preservation Program. The program awarded grants to numerous sites, including St. Rita Catholic Church in Indianapolis, Bethel AME Church in Richmond, and Lyles Station Historic Preservation Corp. in Gibson County. Lyles Station is documented as one of Indiana’s first Black settlements and currently is the only one that remains in the state. Currently, the property consists of an art museum housed inside of the former Lyles Consolidated School, an interactive classroom experience that gives visitors a glimpse at how school was back in the 1920s and several art galleries. According to Stanley Madison, president of the Lyles Station Historic Preservation Corp., Lyles Station received a \$15,000 grant from the Black Heritage Preservation Program. The organization plans to use the funding to add more lighting throughout their buildings, expand their parking lot and for marketing. Madison also said Lyles Station is looking to create an area for students to eat

when they come for field trips. The Black Heritage Preservation Program was launched in September 2022 with a focus to expand the work of the organization’s African American Landmark committee by locating and saving historic African American sites around the state. The program offers grants from \$500 to \$40,000 to restore sites and between \$250 to \$10,000 for projects that document and bring attention to heritage that is no longer present with physical sites. It is important to preserve the heritage of African American culture in Indiana because it is a part of the state’s overall history Trotter told the Recorder. Trotter said that along with saving Black historic sites, there is a need for writers to document this history. Indiana Landmarks held a free training course on Feb.7, to train individuals on how to conduct research, uncover and document Black heritage through a variety of the program’s projects statewide. 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Indiana Senate passes bill to ban ‘bad’ books, ease prosecution of teachers, librarians

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Senate lawmakers passed a bill Feb. 28 that would strip teachers and school librarians of a legal defense against charges that they distributed harmful material to minors.

Senators debated the legislation for roughly two hours, with supporters of the bill arguing that it closes a loophole, and opponents expressing fear that it will criminalize teachers and librarians and have a chilling effect on the types of books available in schools.

Under Senate Bill 12, if a prosecutor charged a teacher or school librarian with disseminating material that is harmful to minors, the school teacher or librarian would not be able to argue that the material had educational value as a defense. The measure also establishes a process for parents to file complaints over inappropriate materials.

Sen. James Tomes (R-Wadesville) authored the bill in response to concerns from parents who claim that pornography is rampant in schools. Tomes wrote similar legislation in recent years that failed to pass.

When asked by Sen. J.D. Ford (D-Indianapolis) about what school corporations had pornographic material on their shelves, Tomes could not provide specifics. Neither Tomes, nor the bill’s second author Sen. Blake Doriot (R-Goshen), named specific titles of books that were both found in schools and obscene in nature. They encouraged lawmakers to visit them at their Statehouse desks if they wanted to see examples of such material.

Sen. Michael Young (R-Indianapolis),

a co-author of SB 12, described the unidentified books at Tomes’ desk as “really bad, sickening — no one in this room would show this to their young child and feel it was a good thing to do.”

Tomes said parents provided research to him about pornographic materials found in local schools. He named the far right Northern Indiana group, Purple for Parents — an organization that promotes conspiracy theories and believes schools are teaching LGBTQ identities and sexualizing children.

Tomes said he hadn’t personally found any such books in schools.

The bill passed the Senate in a 37-12 vote largely along party lines. All Democrats who were present voted against the bill, with three Republican Senators — Ron Alting, Jon Ford and Veneta Becker — joining them in opposition.

The bill now moves to the House for consideration.

‘A chilling effect’

When asked by Ford if he believes LGBTQ material is harmful to children, Tomes did not answer the question directly.

“That’s a broad statement, because if you’re talking about maybe explaining the lifestyle is one thing, but the books I’m talking about, Senator Ford, these books are just full bore graphic pictures and illustrations,” Tomes said.

Ford also asked Tomes if he believed this bill could have a chilling effect on the types of material students can access.

If schools are providing harmful materials, “I hope it does have a chilling effect,” Tomes said, “I hope it’s enough of a chilling effect that they will come to their senses.”

Ford referred to a recent survey of Indiana parents conducted by Gallup that indicated that most are satisfied with the subject matter taught in their schools. Tomes countered that he believes many parents don’t know what happens inside their schools.

Sen. Rodney Pol (D-Chesterton) criticized the legislation for allowing parents to file complaints over material that is “inappropriate,” which could lead to a flood of politically motivated grievances. He also criticized the bill for not requiring parents to complete the complaint procedure before attempting to file criminal charges.

Pol said current law already makes it illegal to provide minors harmful or obscene material. He said he agrees with the intent to create a process for parents to file complaints. But he said the word “inappropriate” is not defined.

Pol said removing “educational” from the statutory defense allowed for teachers and school librarians will have a negative impact on what materials schools offer.

“That’s about as un-American as it gets. We’re going to chill you into doing what we want. This is about moving the cultural and political war to the libraries,” Pol said. “This is about telling the librarian if you don’t get rid of those books that I don’t like, I’m gonna see if I can get you put in jail.”

Sen. Scott Baldwin (R-Noblesville) said that while many schools may not make pornographic materials available to students, “some of them do have a problem.” He said the intent is not to target libraries, but to close a legal loophole.

“You could take something that would

be illegal to hand to a child on the street — I would go to jail if I handed this to a child on the street — but if I was in a school building or in a library, it would not be illegal,” Baldwin said. “And that’s what this bill is trying to do, is try to correct that loophole.”

Baldwin said the complaint process in the bill would give parents a means to have their concerns heard by school administrators and school board members.

Sen. Andrea Hunley (D-Indianapolis), a former principal, said she supports parents having a voice, but she has concerns over the process outlined in the legislation.

“I think that the complaint process that we already have in place is working,” she said. She also questioned why the legislation allows parents to file complaints over “inappropriate” materials, instead of “pornographic.”

Because librarians and other school staff members may fear that a certain book could be construed as inappropriate by some parents, they may avoid stocking libraries with or teaching texts dealing with historical issues like slavery, Jim Crow laws and the Holocaust.

“And then we also have to think about our books that are dealing with tough modern issues, you know, racism, and sexism and mental illness and suicide and even assault, these books are more likely to be axed,” Hunley said. “We know this because we’re seeing it.”

Members of the community continued to rally in support of Nichelle M. Hayes for CEO of the Indianapolis Public Library during the library’s Board of Trustees meeting Feb. 27. Residents, library workers and patrons squeezed into a small conference room at the Martindale-Brightwood branch for the board’s regular monthly meeting. Many held up yellow signs that read “No New Search” or “Appoint Hayes Now” in support of Hayes, who held the position on an interim basis for eight months, ending in December. During the public comments portion of the meeting proceeding its regular business, there were calls for board President Hope Tribble, and members Curtis Bigsbee and Raymond Bierderman to resign. Others demanded the board to “do the right thing” and hire Hayes as CEO. Sam James, a community member, called the board’s decision to have armed IMPD officers at meetings disrespectful and “goofy,” saying “No one has been violent.” In response to armed police on-site, newly appointed trustee Stephen Lane asked why the entire board wasn’t involved in that decision, to which

Tribble said she arranged for security at the meetings out of concern for board members’ safety. “Contrary to what has been said, members have been aggressively approached,” Tribble said. Asked as to the cost of the security, Tribble said she didn’t know. “No one is on the board by themselves,” Lane said. “We’re all in this together, therefore the decisions that we make even when it comes down to security or anything like that that has a cost to it or charging the public library, we should all be a part of that decision making process.” Dr. Patricia Payne echoed Lane’s sentiments, while Bigsbee agreed with Tribble and said he doesn’t see a problem having security at the meetings for safety reasons since staff had asked for it. However, Bigsbee said a smaller police presence may be better. **Important library updates** Martindale-Brightwood library branch manager Jena Mattix kicked off the meeting with a board presentation regarding the library’s history in the area, its weekly and monthly programming — such as free after-school meals and COVID-19 vaccinations — and community partners and staffing. “The Martindale-Brightwood library

branch serves about 13,000 people in this community, and about 91% of our population is people of color,” Mattix said. “The patrons in this area worked really hard for this new branch to be opened and they’re very proud of this branch, their community and history in this area.” Adam Parsons, director of facilities, announced construction at the Fort Benjamin Harrison branch is set to be completed by June, with a grand opening in late August. Work at the Glendale branch has seen some delays, but Parsons said it is expected to have substantial completion by late July. The Nora and Pike branches, which are both undergoing \$2 million renovations, have begun holding community engagement meetings. The Nora Branch held its first meeting last week and Pike will host its first meeting March 1 at 7 p.m. at the branch at 6525 Zionsville Road. Additionally, Parsons said landscaping around Central Library downtown will resume with the removal of invasive species and dead trees, and replacing them with native plants. Lastly, chief administrative officer Anita J. Harden presented an update on the evaluation of the previous CEO search. She and acting CEO Gregory Hill have been reviewing the materials

from the search, including the timeline and job description, though Harden said they’ve spent most of their time interviewing members of the search committee. “We’ve been asking questions such as ‘what went well with the process,’ what didn’t go well with the process’ and ‘what are your recommendations for the future?’” Harden said. She said there are still three more people to interview, including former interim CEO Hayes, and they plan to have that completed by March 7, with a recommendation to the Diversity, Policy and Human Resources Committee by March 14. The library continues to go without a permanent CEO since Jackie Nytes resigned in August 2021 amid allegations of racism and Dr. Gabriel Morley turned down the job in December 2022, less than 24 hours after the board voted to offer him the position. The next regular Board of Trustees meeting will be on March 27 at 6:30 p.m. at the Southport Branch, 2630 E. Stop 11 Road.

city of Indianapolis’ part in the avenue’s traumatic history. Once the cultural hub for the African American community, culture, music and commerce, the rich history of Indiana Avenue reached beyond the boundaries of the city. As one of four diagonal thoroughfares of Indianapolis, the historic block was home to the Walker Manufacturing Company — now the Madam Walker Legacy Center — and Indianapolis Recorder Newspaper until 1975. Urban renewal drove widespread displacement, and the people left on the avenue suffered from unsafe roads, degrading infrastructure and noise and air pollution for too long, said Paula Brooks, third-generation resident, activist and founder of Reclaim Indiana Avenue. The people of Indiana Avenue are deserving of “a clean, safe and healthy environment,” Brooks said, and this plan aims to finally give them that. “We’re here to reveal, protect and restore the rich heritage of Black Americans,” said Claudia Polley, founder and president of Urban Legacy Land Initiative. “Our work is to help all of you realize the depth, the value and the future of Indiana Avenue.” City-County Council President Vop Osili said the plan is a chance to envision a future “that would make all of our grandparents proud.” “It’s a chance to do something that — to be frank — our city has generally failed to do,” Osili said, “and that is thoughtfully preserve the history and the

legacy of Black neighborhoods and planning in concrete and specific terms for inclusive and racially equitable development and redevelopment.”

Rebuilding around the Madam Walker Legacy Center

The Walker building is the last functioning historical landmark on Indiana Avenue, Kristian Little Stricklen, president of the Madam Walker Legacy Center, said. The Walker has remained entirely Black-owned and operated in its 95-year history, giving a place for Black entrepreneurs to have office space. The theatre, which was historically a place for movies, has hosted Black artists and local heroes such as Wes Montgomery, J.J. Johnson, Freddie Hubbard, Babyface and Mike Epps. “A lot of times we refer to it as ‘The Apollo of the Midwest,’” Stricklen said. “When you think of what the Apollo means to Harlem, that’s exactly what the Walker means to the Avenue.” Ever since IUPUI’s campus was built, there has been a community desire to see something other than parking lots and knocked down buildings along Indiana Avenue, said A’Lelia Bundles, journalist, biographer and great-great-granddaughter of Madam C.J. Walker, for whom the building is named. “That’s why this proposal that Mayor Hogsett is offering is so important because if this development does not happen in an equitable and visionary way

in 2023, it really is the last moment to do the right thing,” Bundles said. “That means 50 years from now, we’ll look back and say there’s nothing there that has any anything to do with the heritage of the neighborhood.” Bundles said the Walker Legacy Center is the anchor point of the avenue, and the redevelopment project should be built up around the Walker instead of everything around it having nothing to do with the culture and heritage of the neighborhood. “We are happy that the city is willing to do the work to invest back into the Avenue,” Stricklen said, “and maybe reignite a similar feel for that area that is similar to what had been in the past but of course making it relevant to today.” Indiana Avenue used to be home to everything from storefronts and jazz clubs, Witherspoon Church, a drug store, a bowling alley and a cleaners, Bundles said, adding that she hopes it will once again be home to a flourishing Black community. Though the initiative was announced last week, Stricklen said the Walker Center is “open to hearing more” and is waiting to see what the process for the Indiana Avenue Certified Strategic Plan will look like. Responses for the Indiana Avenue Certified Strategic Plan are due to DMD by March 23.

Eunice Trotter is from a pioneer Black family with roots in Indiana dating back to the late 1790s. She attended public schools in Indianapolis and worked her way through college. She holds a journalism undergraduate degree and an MBA. She began working at The Indianapolis Recorder during her high school years and in 1987 purchased controlling interest of that newspaper, which is one of the oldest African American newspapers in the country. She sold her interests in the paper in 1991. She was the first African American editor at The Indianapolis Star and held editing or reporting positions at several other newspapers, including The New York Post, Florida Today, the Palm Beach Post, Stockton Record, Fort Wayne News-Sentinel and the Lafayette Journal and Courier. She has won numerous reporting and writing awards and in 2017 was

inducted into the Indiana Journalism Hall of Fame. She has written several historical articles and received the Indiana Historical Society’s Dorothy Riker Historian Award. She recently published her first book, “Black in Indiana,” a book about a little-known Indiana State Supreme Court case which set a precedent for ending a ruse for slavery in Indiana known as indentured servitude. The central figure in the book is Eunice’s great great great grandmother, Mary Bateman Clark. The book received a first-place award from the Indiana Press Women’s Club and the national Federation of Press Women. For several years, Eunice has taught genealogy research techniques to

hundreds of people searching for their family roots. She has assisted hundreds in documenting their family histories. She is now director of Indiana Landmark’s Black Heritage Preservation Program, founded in 2022 to save and prevent the erasure of Black heritage statewide. She is now building Black heritage organizations statewide and managing the program’s grant fund. Indiana Landmarks is the largest not-for-profit statewide preservation organization in the country.



Holcomb opposes East Palestine waste coming to Indiana landfill

Toxic waste from the East Palestine, Ohio, derailment is coming to Roachdale, Indiana. And Indiana Gov. Eric Holcomb doesn't like it.

The Putnam County town of 1,000 people hosts a hazardous waste landfill that accepts waste from other states. The EPA chose the Roachdale site as a waste destination alongside three sites in Ohio.

Putnam County Commissioner David Berry expects around 2,000 tons of butyl acrylate to arrive.

Inhaling butyl acrylate can cause headaches, dizziness, nausea and vomiting.

Berry said shipments like this come to Roachdale all the time. The only thing that's different is the high-profile situation.

"I think the reason people are upset is the way the EPA handled it at the site," Berry said. "People don't feel like they responded quickly enough and more transparent. So now people are scared."

Holcomb said he learned of the EPA decision third hand and tweeted, "the materials should go to the nearest facilities, not moved from the far eastern side of Ohio to the far western side of Indiana."

Sen. Mike Braun also objected, saying any material being transferred to

Indiana is concerning.

William Muno is the former director of the EPA's Region Five Superfund program. He's skeptical that the governor could actually prevent waste from entering Indiana.

"Hazardous waste moves throughout the country on a daily basis," Muno said. "The Commerce Clause of the Constitution doesn't permit any one state to impede lawful transportation of hazardous waste."

The Roachdale site has been run by Heritage Environmental since 1981. It's an EPA licensed site and hasn't had issues with groundwater contamination, although it did receive a violation in 2019 for not analyzing inbound waste.

Having managed disaster cleanup, Muno said the people of Roachdale shouldn't be worried.

"I have no concern whatsoever that the Heritage Environmental services facility in Roachdale is going to be able to accept this waste and treated dispose of it properly," he said.

Heritage Environmental said it's providing support in accordance with a plan by the EPA and Indiana Department of Environmental Management.

The Putnam County Emergency Management Agency said it does not know when the waste would arrive.

ET TU, DILBERT?



Wondering what other people are thinking is a basic human impulse. (Does my boss value me? Is this person attracted to me?) If the technology to read people’s minds existed, many would go to any lengths to possess it.

But there also are times when we wish that we didn’t know what someone was thinking. Scott Adams’ verbal dysentery falls into that category for some. Adams, who is best known for creating “Dilbert”, recently made virulently racist comments during his podcast. Among his statements was: “The best advice I would give to white people is to get the hell away from Black people; just get the f**k away.”

Adams was reacting to a Rasmussen poll in which 53% of Black respondents agreed with the phrase “It’s OK to be white”, whereas 26% disagreed and 21% were not sure. Adams combined the latter two percentages to argue that nearly half of all Black people don’t like white people. (To be clear, Rasmussen is a propaganda machine that masquerades as a polling organization.)

Importantly, the phrase “It’s OK to be white” is part of white nationalists’ recruitment strategy. Its use has been promoted by David Duke, among others. The strategy found success with Adams, who concluded that African Americans constitute “a hate group”.

I, for one, am pleased to know what Adams honestly thinks about Black folks. It’s crucial that some well-known people are willing to say “the quiet part

out loud. Adams is a multi-millionaire who has an MBA from Berkeley. I highlight those facts because people too often associate racism with those who are less educated and have few financial resources. How did a young boy who was enamored by Charles Schulz’s iconic “Peanuts” comic strip transform into a 65-year-old man who is a poster child for white nationalism?

Adams’ political views have been, to put it mildly, heterodox during the last couple decades. In 2007, he argued that Michael “Stop-and-Frisk” Bloomberg would be a good presidential candidate. Before the election the following year, Adams said, “On social issues, I lean libertarian, minus the crazy stuff.” Ahead of the 2012 election, Adams indicated that following Bill Clinton’s advice “would lead to policies that are a sensible middle ground.”

Yet, he wrote in an October 2012 blogpost: “While I don’t agree with (Mitt) Romney’s positions on most topics, I’m endorsing him for president.” Although Adams initially stated that he would not endorse a candidate for the 2016 election, he repeatedly lauded Donald Trump’s “persuasion ability,” which he chronicled in his book, Win Bigly: Persuasion in a World Where Facts Don’t Matter. Adams predicted that Trump would become president long before most others did. (Some of his other prognostications failed to materialize).

Perhaps surprisingly, as late as 2016 Adams wrote: “I don’t vote and I am not a member of a political party.” Later, in a post dated September 2017, Adams said that he was “left of Bernie Sanders, but with a preference for plans that can work.” Trying to keep

up with his political views is much more difficult than understanding his cartoons.

In processing Adams’ multiple controversies and mercurial political leanings, I can’t help but to note that he established his bona fides by capitalizing – figuratively and literally – on workers’ fears of being “downsized.” Perhaps a similar fear is now gripping him. In 2020, he said: “For context, I expect my Dilbert income to largely disappear in the next year as newspapers close up forever. The coronavirus sped up that inevitable trend. Like many of you, I’m reinventing my life for a post-coronavirus world.”

Given the headwinds that newspapers face, Adams is perhaps hedging his bets by attempting to become a new Tucker Carlson. Or maybe he is genuinely afraid of being “replaced” by people of color. After all, a few years ago he claimed that UPN canceled his TV show “because (he’s) white”.


Unlike in years past, overt racism tends to have consequences. Dilbert has been dumped by hundreds of newspapers across the country, including the Washington Post, the Los Angeles Times, and papers that are affiliated with USA Today. Andrews McMeel Syndication, which distributes Dilbert, announced that it cut ties with Adams. Portfolio, which publishes his books, announced that it would drop his upcoming non-Dilbert project. Not surprisingly, Adams has attempted to walk-back his comments... sort of.

Scott Adams created a make-believe world that suited him just fine. Unfortunately for him, he has to live in the real one.

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African American Quality of Life Initiative announces second round funding

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The African American Quality of Life Initiative announced a second round of grant funding, totaling \$21.5 million, to support more than 50 local nonprofit groups. They include community development corporations, grassroots groups, neighborhood centers and education organizations.

The quality of life initiative, created by the Indianapolis Urban League in 2020, aims to address years of historic, place-based inequity for Black residents in Indianapolis.

The first round also distributed \$21 million in funding. The United Northeast Community Development Corporation received two of those grants, for a total of \$1 million. CEO Ashley Gurvitz leads the group, which has steered redevelopment in the area.

“Now we’re solidifying the home and making sure that as new devel-

opment comes, we’re really creating a space that everyone knows that they belong and belong in their homes,” Gurvitz said.

The group has used the money to double awards for home repairs and help others reach the goal of home ownership.

Other awards are focused on businesses, education, employment, health and wellness, housing and home ownership.

More money will be available for organizations engaged in quality of life improvements for Black people in Marion County.

The Indianapolis Urban League received a \$100 million gift from Lilly Endowment to create the Indianapolis African American Quality of Life Initiative.

According to the CDC, social determinants of health are the nonmedical factors influencing health outcomes. They are the conditions in which people are born, grow, work, live and age, and the wider set of forces and systems shaping the conditions of daily life that included economic policies and systems, development agendas, social norms, social policies, racism, climate change and political systems.

Social determinants of health have been shown to have a greater influence on health than either genetic factors or access to health care services. Social determinants of health including the effects of racism, are key drivers of health inequities within communities of color. The impact is pervasive and deeply embedded in our society, creating inequities in a range of social and economic benefits such as housing, education, wealth and employment that put people at higher risk of poor health.

Bringing the arts, religion and spirituality together, internationally renowned opera soprano Angela Brown will be featured in “A Plea for Healing” service March 7 at St. Paul’s Episcopal Church, 6050 N Meridian St., on the city’s northside.

The interfaith service, as part of the Faith Justice and the Arts initiative of St. Pauls Church, will highlight Indianapolis’ diverse religious and artistic community through prayers and performances as a means of helping the community heal from the divisive political and social aspects of today’s society.

“I am inviting faith, community, and arts leaders, everyday citizens, and lay leaders to convene and demonstrate the impact and power of community strength,” Brown said in a released statement. “It is my hope that this purposeful gathering will transform beyond one prayer service to rouse a rallying cry for cooperative and impactful action throughout the city of Indianapolis.”

Brown has appeared on stage in concert halls internationally and across the nation, including in Indianapolis, Cincinnati, Atlanta and Washington, D.C. Her debut performance of Verdi’s Aida at the Metropolitan Opera in New York in 2004 was so well-received that an article about her appeared on the front page of the New York Times. For two decades she has given free concerts titled, Opera . . . from a Sistah’s

Point of View.

By bringing together different perspectives of religion and the arts, the event aims to connect and heal the wounds of Indianapolis’ community, organizers said.

The event will begin at 6:30 p.m. on March 7 at the St. Paul’s Episcopal Church of Indianapolis.

Several local pastors and Jewish leaders will offer prayers, and local artists will perform poetry in different languages. Sandy Garcia will perform a poem in Spanish and Anselme Blaise Argelier will perform a poem in French.

Music, dance, and spoken word will be used to enhance “the spirit of evocation and unity” throughout the prayer service.

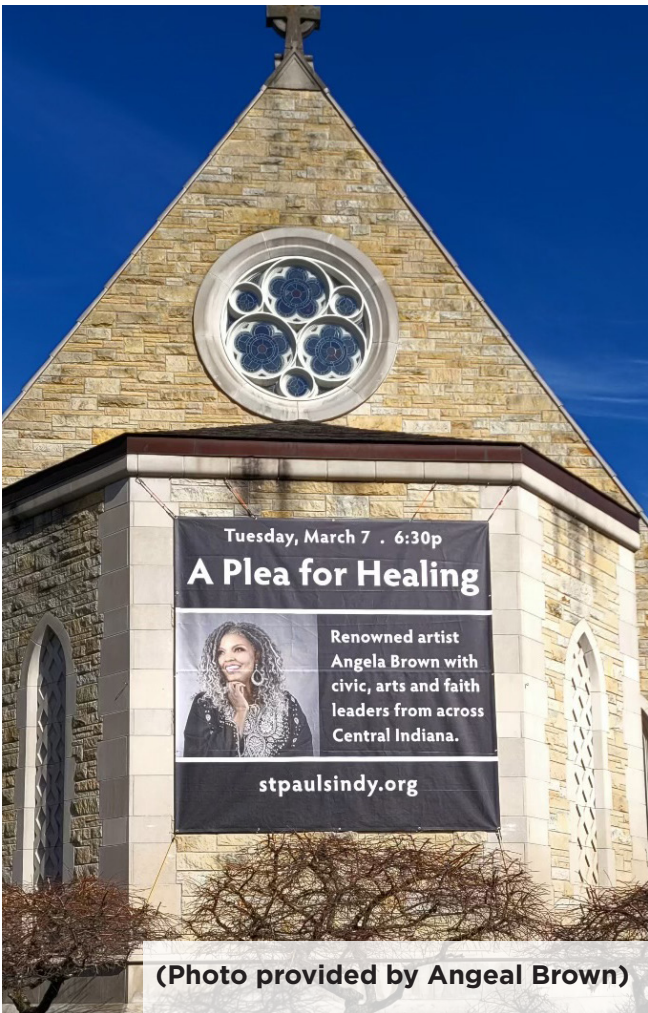

Ramadan fast 2023 is approaching

Author’s Note: This month of March marks my 31st anniversary of writing an Islamic column for this historical institution The Indianapolis Recorder newspaper. I thank the staff and my readers for the many joyful years of support.

Ramadan is the 9th month of the Islamic, lunar based, calendar. The anticipated day for the start of the Ramadan fast this year is Thursday March 23rd. The actual start date must be confirmed with the physical sighting of the new moon.

Worldwide, Muslims observe the Islamic fast during this holy month. During the daylight hours, the Muslim faithful do not eat, drink, or engage in sexual activity. The time is spent otherwise with prayer, reading of the Holy Qur’an, and other Islamic activity, i.e., teaching Islam to others.

Ramadan is the month for restraining one’s appetites, desires and passions. Allah (G-d) revealed in the Qur’an. “O’ you who believe, fasting is prescribed for you, as it was prescribed to those before you, that you may learn self-restraint...” - Sura (Chapter) 2, ayat (verse) 183.

The Muslim actually begins their daily fast in the darkest hour of the day, just before the break of day appears in the eastern horizon. The individual fasting that day eats a light meal, called “suhoor” in Arabic. He, or she, begins each day stating their intention to fast for Allah (G-d), the Lord Cherisher and Sustainer of all life.

The Qur’an is conveniently divided into thirty sections. The Muslim will read 1/30 of the Qur’an each day, thus completing the whole of the Holy Qur’an during the month of Ramadan. It is common to see the youth and the elderly reading their daily portion of the Qur’an in mosques around America, and the world. Allah teaches humanity another valuable lesson. “Nothing misleads mankind more that his appetites unchecked by knowledge.” Therefore the reading of the entire Qur’an, during Ramadan, becomes ever more important.

The fasting Muslim maintains his or her five daily prayers during Ramadan. Additional prayers are said at night prior to bed. The first of the five prayers is said after dawn begins, but before the sun rises above the horizon. The second prayer is said just after high noon.

During the day when the fasting Muslim may feel hunger pangs, he or she knows that this is a time to reflect upon the individuals who may be involuntarily hungry year-round. Allah gives the believer no more than they can bear. Through the disciplines of fasting, the Muslim learns to appreciate to the blessings of Allah that He has freely bestowed upon humanity. Blessings that the fast of Ramadan reminds us, that we often take for granted.

Ramadan is very beneficial to our youth who often are the main targets of the commercial world. The lessons learned from practicing self-restraint support our youth in saying “no,” and practicing “no.” The practice of no food and no drink for 29 to 30 consecutive days builds within our youth the mental and moral muscles to say no to drugs, unlawful sex, and other evils. We are proud and supportive of our youth’s willingness to serve Allah

by fasting in Ramadan.

The third prayer is said in the afternoon. The mind is still the master over ruling over our body’s calling out for pleasure and food. This is Ramadan wherein the human person exerts their human will power – controlling their desires and passions – not for themselves, but for the good pleasure of Allah. Ahh! What a wonderful feeling! The perfect praise be to Allah.

As the sun makes its final descent in the waning hours of the day, the faithful Muslim knows that in a couple of hours he or she will be able to eat. The hunger pangs are no longer a challenge because, the desires of the human body, has submitted to the will of the fasting Muslim.

Immediately upon sunset the fasting Muslim must break their fast by eating and drinking a small portion. Some Muslims may feel a desire to fast beyond sunset; however, obedience to Allah is more important than fasting beyond sunset. Therefore the fasting Muslim will break their fast, and say the sunset prayer, before eating a full meal.

The fifth prayer is said when the sky is completely dark in the western sky. Additional prayers, as performed by Prophet Muhammed, are said after the night prayer. This prayer includes more reading of the Holy Qur’an.

Soon the Muslim retires for the evening for rest. Tomorrow is another day of fasting for the good pleasure of Allah. When the 30 days of Ramadan are complete, the Muslim community will gather for the first of Islam’s holidays. These special days are called “Eid,” days that consist of prayer, exchanging of gifts, and joy on the part of the Muslim for completing another month of fasting for the good pleasure of Allah (G-d).

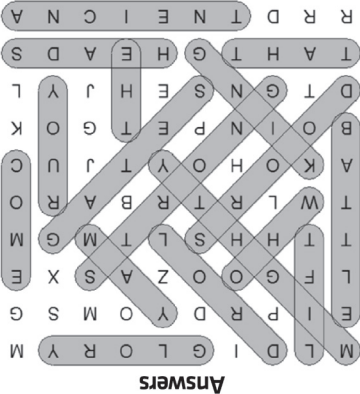
