The Indianapolis Recorder Newspaper is the fourth oldest surviving African American newspaper in the United States. Founded in 1895 as a modest twopage church bulletin by George P. Stewart and Will Porter, the publication has become one of the nation's most respected and enduring voices in Black journalism. In 1897, Stewart and Porter expanded their bulletin into a weekly newspaper, laying the foundation for a trusted news source to chronicle African Americans' triumphs, struggles, and everyday lives in Indiana and beyond. By 1899, Porter had sold his share to Stewart, who would carry the torch of the publication's mission forward.

Fast forward to 1990, when esteemed entrepreneur William G. Mays acquired the Recorder. Under his leadership, the newspaper entered a new chapter of innovation and sustainability. Mays appointed his niece, Carolene Mays-Medley, as president and general manager. For more than 13 years, Mays-Medley brought visionary leadership and a forward-looking blueprint for success before transitioning to serve the community through government roles.

> In 2010, Shannon Williams, a seasoned journalist and long time Recorder staff member, took the helm. As president and general manager, she launched the Recorder Media Group, which not only included the Indianapolis Recorder and its sister publication, Indiana Minority Business Magazine but also expanded into marketing and communications services. Her leadership further solidified the Recorder's role as a multimedia hub committed to advocacy and representation. After 18 impactful years at the Recordereight of those in the top leadership role-Williams transitioned to nonprofit leadership, where she continues to champion education equity.

Today, Robert Shegog serves as President and CEO of the Recorder Media Group. Under his leadership, the company has entered a new era of growth, innovation, and community impact. Shegog has been instrumental in strengthening internal systems, expanding digital platforms, and amplifying engagement strategies across all Recorder Media Group products. With a deep respect for the newspaper's historical legacy, Shegog and his team are committed to ensuring the Indianapolis Recorder and Indiana Minority Business Magazine continue to inform, inspire, and empower future generations.



Indianapolis stands as the 16th largest city in the United States and the second largest in the Midwest. According to the U.S. Census Bureau's 2023 estimates, the city's population is 879,293, reflecting a slight decrease of 0.9% since the 2020 Census. Despite this modest decline, Indianapolis continues to be recognized for its exceptional livability, seamlessly blending the vibrancy of a bustling metropolis with the warmth of a close-knit community.

The city comprises approximately 372,358 households, with an average household size of 2.51 individuals. The composition of these households is diverse:

- Married couples with children: 13.5%
- Married couples without children: 21.6%
- Single-parent households: 11.1%
- Individuals living alone: 37.7%
- Other household types: 15.2%

THE INDIANAPOLIS MARKET

A Thriving and Evolving Economy Rooted in Tradition For much of its history, Indianapolis oriented its economy around government and manufacturing. Today, the city has emerged as a dynamic, diversified economic hub, with major contributions from education, health care, finance, and technology. Tourism remains a vital pillar of the local economy, with Indianapolis attracting millions of visitors annually for its world-class sporting events, conventions, and cultural attractions.

Perhaps the most iconic event is the annual Indianapolis 500, which continues to draw global attention to the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. The Brickyard 400 returned to its traditional oval track in 2024, revitalizing interest in this beloved NASCAR race. The city also regularly hosts the Men's and Women's NCAA Basketball Tournaments, the Big Ten Football Championship, and a variety of youth and amateur sporting events.

In 2024, Indianapolis proudly hosted the U.S. Olympic Team Trials for Swimming at Lucas Oil Stadium, an unprecedented event leading up to the Summer Olympics in Paris. Additionally, the city welcomed several high-profile entertainment events, including Taylor Swift's Eras Tour, which generated a significant economic impact and showcased the city's capacity to host large-scale productions.

While Super Bowl XLVI in 2012 marked the city's first time on the world's biggest sports stage, the years since have cemented Indianapolis as a premier destination for sports, business, and entertainment. With its mix of Hoosier hospitality, strategic infrastructure, and innovative spirit, Indianapolis continues to evolve while staying grounded in its legacy of excellence.
